In the following pages, Catholic New York presents profiles of the 50 Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of New York, with information on courses, clubs, activities, sports programs and tuition. The day, date and time of open houses are included at the end of each profile for students to take a closer look at the schools that interest them. The Web address of each school is also included. Information on the Cathedral Prep program for boys in high school who are considering the priesthood is also included.

Each school is accredited by the New York State Board of Regents, with many schools receiving other distinctions. Most schools require the Test for Admission to Catholic High Schools (TACHS), which will be administered on Friday, Nov. 4, in the archdiocese. For more information, visit www.tachsinfo.com.

THE BRONX

Academy of Mount St. Ursula

The Academy of Mount St. Ursula, a girls' school, was founded in 1855 by the Ursuline Sisters.

Students can take Advanced Placement courses in European history, American history, Spanish, English, biology, chemistry, physics and calculus. Eligible juniors and seniors may take college level courses through a partnership with St. John's University and Mercy College.

Some 20 clubs include cultural clubs; a visual art academy with internships possible through the Metropolitan Museum of Art; a vocal ensemble and Urban Voices music program taught in collaboration with the Metropolitan Opera Guild; Juilliard Instrumental Musical Program taught by teaching fellows from the Juilliard School; a music theater program; and an emerging media arts program.

The sports program includes basketball, volleyball, softball and step.

All Hallows High School

All Hallows is a boys' school founded in 1909 by the Irish Christian Brothers.

It was named one of the Top 50 Catholic High Schools in America by the Catholic Honor Roll for the sixth time in 2010-2011.

The school offers Advanced Placement courses in world history, U.S. history, English literature, microeconomics, biology and Spanish. Students can take special courses from the following: Gilder Lehrman School of American History and the Gilder Lehrman Saturday Academy, The Montefiore Mentoring in Medicine Program or the St. John's University C.A.P. Program for college credit.

Students can choose from more than 40 activities, including leadership programs in the United States and Ireland. The sports program includes basketball, baseball, soccer, track, bowling and golf.

Aquinas High School

Aquinas High School, a girls' school, was founded by the Dominican Sisters of Sparkill in 1923.

The school is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and twice named a Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education.

The school offers eight Advanced Placement, honors and Regents courses.

The school offers more than 35 clubs and activities including student council, string orchestra, marching band, drama, cheerleading, robotics and more. Students volunteer at Thorpe Family Residence, Midnight Run, parish service and other community organizations. Travel abroad and internship opportunities are available. The sports program includes volleyball, basketball, softball and track.

Cardinal Hayes High School, a boys' school, was founded in 1941 by the archdiocese.

The Middle States-accredited school offers Advanced Placement courses in U.S. history, biology, calculus and English. The school offers a special Academy Program for students with learning disabilities.

Clubs and activities include student council, school newspaper and yearbook, as well as altar servers and a chess club. The sports program includes baseball, basketball, bowling, football, lacrosse, track and field and soccer.

Cardinal Spellman High School, a co-educational school, was founded by the archdiocese in 1959.

Advanced placement, Regents and honors courses are offered. In addition to the regular curriculum, students can take elective courses in forensic sci-

ence, anatomy and physiology, psychology, law, journalism, mechanical drawing, computer applications, media and marketing.

Students can choose from more than 50 clubs and activities. The sports program for boys and girls includes all major sports. The school has two outdoor all-weather fields and a fitness center.

Fordham Prep is a boys' high school founded by Archbishop Hughes in 1841. It is a Jesuit school.

Students can select from 18 Advanced Placement courses, including Latin, studio art, biology, chemistry, physics, macroeconomics, computer science, and those in English, history and Spanish. Courses are available in Greek, Latin, Chinese, French, German, Italian and Spanish. There are nine new, fully equipped science labs.

There are more than 45 clubs and activities for students, including astronomy, guitar, chess, math, comic books, rock climbing and politics. The sports program includes baseball, basketball, bowling, crew, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, lacrosse, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Mount St. Michael Academy, a boys' school, was founded by the Marist Brothers in 1926.

Advanced Placement courses are available in English, calculus, U.S. history, biology, world history, psychology and Spanish. Mount St. Michael was recognized as a School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education and voted one of the nation's Outstanding High Schools by U.S. News and World Report.

Activities include special interest clubs, campus ministry, school yearbook and newspaper, drama, art, peer tutoring, computer and chess, among others. The sports program includes football, soccer, cross country, lacrosse, basketball, track, baseball, wrestling, bowling, tennis and ice hockey.
