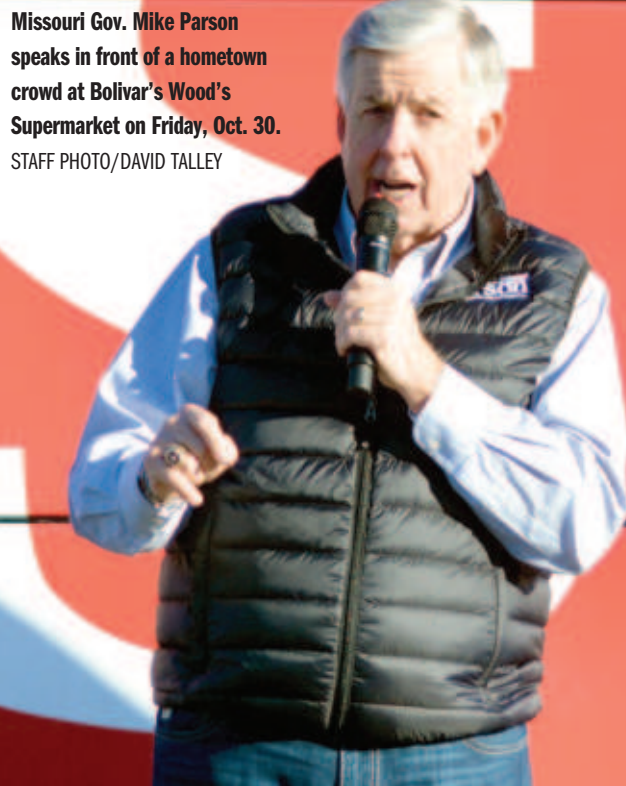

Parson wins governor's race

Every time Mike Parson raised his voice Friday, Oct. 30, standing atop a temporary stage at a campaign rally at Woods Supermarket in Bolivar, a gust of wind picked up the Missouri state flag behind the governor.

Parson, who previously served as Polk County's sheriff and is a Bolivar resident, was in his element — and at times seemingly in control of the elements — in front of a hometown crowd of supporters, including a group of Bolivar DAV members who planned to present the governor with a hat.

"Any time the flag of this state flies alongside the flag of the United States of America, it's a good day," Parson told the BH-FP after the rally.

The governor's control extended to the results of the Tuesday, Nov. 3, general election, where he soundly defeated Democratic challenger Nicole Galloway with 57.171% of the vote to Galloway's 40.587%, according to unofficial results provided by the Missouri Secretary of State's Office.

Unofficially, Parson received 1,713,152 votes statewide to Galloway's 1,216,192.

The governor's support was even stronger in Polk County, where he won with 12,318 votes to Galloway's 2,474, or about 82% of the vote, ac-

ording to the unofficial results from the Polk County clerk's office. That total eclipsed his 2016 earnings when he earned around 80% of the county's vote in his successful lieutenant governor bid.

"THANK YOU MISSOURI!" the governor tweeted just before 11 p.m. Tuesday night, following Galloway's official concession.

In her speech conceding the race, Galloway, who has served as state auditor since 2015 and is Missouri's only female and only Democratic statewide elected official, encouraged her supporters.

"Over the course of this campaign, we built a coalition of Missourians See Parson, Page 2A

Red all over County supports GOP, marks high turnout

Polk County reinforced its position as a GOP stronghold Tuesday, Nov. 3.

Every race that could go to a Republican candidate went to a Republican candidate as the county saw historically high turnouts at the polls.

According to the Polk County Clerk's Office, voter turnout was about 73%, as compared to 69% in 2016 and about 66% in 2012.

Polk County Clerk Melinda Robertson told the BH-FP the turnout surpassed her office's records, which date back to 2000.

"Our highest before this was 69%," Robertson said. "We knew it would be high this year. We got through it."

Robertson said of the 15,155 ballots cast in Polk County, 2,904, or about 20%, were cast absentee.

According to unofficial results from the Missouri Secretary of State's Office, about 70% of the roughly 4.3 million registered Missourians voted statewide.

"The success of yesterday's historic election is thanks to the tireless effort of Missouri's voters, election authorities and poll workers," Secretary of State John Ashcroft, who won his own re-election bid, said

in a news release Wednesday. "Election officials and their staff work long hours under stressful conditions, and it's their preparation in the weeks and months prior and their diligent effort on Election Day that made Missouri's elections run smoothly. It was great to see so many Missourians participating in our democracy and making their voices heard."

At the top of the local contests were two races for the Polk County Commission, where Robertson, a Republican, defeated Democrat Al Skaliky for the southern district seat with about 78% of the vote, and Republican incumbent Kyle Legan defeated Democrat challenger Leonard Walburn with about 84% of the vote for the northern district seat.

Robertson told the BH-FP she would be required to sub-

mit a letter of resignation to several state and local agencies, including the Polk County Commission and the Secretary of State's office. The commission will appoint a temporary clerk, and then the governor will appoint a clerk to fill the remainder of Robertson's term.

"It won't require a special election," she said.

Mike Stephens, representative for Missouri's 128th District, will retain his seat after soundly defeating Democrat challenger Marvin Manring. Polk County gave Stephens 83%. He won the district, which also includes Cedar County, with 81.669%, according to the Missouri Secretary of State's Office.

In the open race for coroner, Jeff Witt beat Debra Volcko with 66% of the vote. Both appeared on the ballot

as independents.

Tuesday also saw Morrisville voters approve two measures that should close a taxing loophole and help fund the city's first police department, which it will operate in conjunction with the Marion C. Early School District, per previous coverage.

Morrisville voters approved the propositions with 63% and 60% of the vote, respectively.

Robertson said turnout in Morrisville was strong enough that the polling location ran out of paper ballots, and eight voters were asked to use American Disability Act equipment, which prints off a custom ballot.

"We weren't concerned they might run out," she said. "Because of the ADA equipment, which has a printer attached to it, we'll never actually run out. Anyone has always been welcome to use it. You don't have to be handicapped."

Rumor has it

Robertson said the county was able to handle the increased turnout, though several issues did create stress.

"We dealt with lots of phone calls," she said. "There are people out there that wait and only vote in this election, and so most of our phone calls were people who hadn't updated their address. We also had people who got upset with the time

SYC sign-ups underway

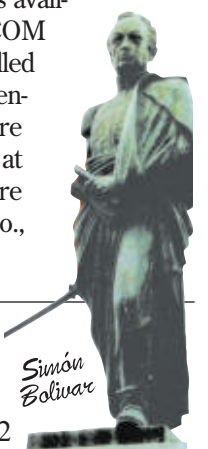

who are united around a few simple values: that we can no longer ignore science and the growing threat of COVID-19; that no one should be denied access to healthcare in this deadly pandemic; and that our children deserve to live in a Missouri that is fair and accountable to all of its citizens," Galloway said.

Galloway also pledged to keep working. Her term as state auditor ends in January 2023.

"For the past 5 years, I have been proud to serve as your independent watchdog in Jefferson City," Galloway said. "As state auditor, I have uncovered millions in waste, fraud and abuse and have taken on corruption at every level. It has been an honor of my life, and you can bet I'll keep demanding accountability and transparency from politicians in Jefferson City for years to come. I'm not going anywhere, Missouri."

The result means Parson, who was elected lieutenant governor in 2016, will now serve his first full term in the state's top office after taking over the job following the June 2018 resignation of former Gov. Eric Grietens.

The last two years have seen Parson face challenges, including the COVID-19 pandemic and civil unrest in the state.

As the BH-FP previously reported, Parson is the first Missouri governor to call Polk County home.

As lieutenant governor, he was the first statewide official to be elected out of the county since 1928, when Charles U. Becker won his third term as secretary of state.

Parson was previously the Polk County sheriff, state representative for the 128th district from 2005 to 2011 and state senator for the 28th district from 2011 to 2017.

His win Tuesday was just one part in a Republican sweep of statewide offices, which includes victories by incumbents Lt. Gov. Mike Kehoe, Attorney General Eric Schmitt, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick.

The governor hit on his roots in his speech Friday, where he said his home, his values and the work ethic he learned both as a farmer and veteran guide his decisions in office.

"Protecting basic freedoms and fundamental values are why I go to work every day," he told the BH-FP. "I don't need any more titles. I don't need any more money. But I want these kids, the members of the next generation, to have the enjoyment I did growing up."

Parson said campaigning at home meant a great deal to him.

"I always love coming home," he said Friday. "I miss home. I miss my friends. I miss my family. I miss my grandkids. There are so many people I don't get to see anymore, so it's always great to come home. The people are so good to me. This is a special place."

it took their ballot to go through the machine, but we don't have any control over that."

The county also handled questions from people who were driven by social media rumors speculating Sharpie markers handed to them at their polling places were part of a conspiracy to invalidate their votes. The clerk's office fielded 10 to 12 calls about the markers Wednesday, she said.

The rumors are false, Robertson said. Every voter in the county was handed a Sharpie, she said.

"And, unless they snuck in a pen, that's what they used," she said. "Pens work, too. This is the fourth time this year we've used these Sharpies, because that is what the voting machine vendor suggested we use," she said. "Ink pens blot and can damage the reader in the voting machines. Sharpies are faster drying."

Robertson also pointed out the county conducts and publicly announces pre- and post-election testing of its voting machines.

"Anyone is welcome to come out to watch the testing," she said. "Also, you can just volunteer to be an election worker if you want to know how the process works."

Other contests

The county also voted heavily Republican in other state and national races.

Gov. Mike Parson's home county voted overwhelmingly to give the former Polk County Sheriff his first full term in the Governor's mansion and similarly supported every other state Republican down the ticket.

Parson won Polk County with about 82% of the vote. His statewide count

totaled about 57.171%.

In national races, Polk County supported President Donald Trump almost as soundly as it did Parson and also gave 7th District U.S. Rep. Billy Long another term in office.

Trump won 79% of the vote in Polk County, but his re-election prospects remained unclear as of Thursday, Nov. 5, as votes in several states were still being counted.

The county gave Trump around 75% of its votes in 2016, the BH-FP previously reported.

Long, whose district extends into other counties, including Greene, won Polk County with about 77% of the vote and won re-election with 68.749%.

The only time Polk County split with the state was on Constitutional Amendment 1, which would have limited the lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor and attorney general to two terms of office. The governor and state treasurer have been limited to two terms of office since the mid-1960s. Polk County voters approved the amendment with about 52% of the vote. The amendment failed statewide, garnering just 48.026%.

The county did echo the state in voting for Constitutional Amendment No. 1, which undid several of the provisions of 2018's Clean Missouri Amendment, including reverting redistricting decisions to a bipartisan commission instead of a newly-created state demographer.

Polk County previously supported the Clean Missouri amendment, with nearly 54% of the vote, as the BH-FP previously reported.

The first place Bolivar High School senior Luke Sergent's thoughts went after his Liberator soccer team won the Class 3 District 11 championship were to his teammates and the impact they've had together.

"It wouldn't have been possible without the great team we have," Sergent told the BH-FP.

Bolivar claimed a 1-0 win over Willard on Wednesday, Nov. 4, to win its first district title since 2011. It also won titles in 2010 and 2009, when it advanced to the state title game and eventually placed second, according to the Missouri State Highschool Activities Association website.

The significance of the moment isn't lost on the team, Sergent said.

"I am proud of their effort last night and this season," he said. "There have been many obstacles over the course of the season, and these guys just kept pressing on."

Bolivar's goal from the opening whistle had been to frustrate Willard's

defense, which was "in scramble mode the entire first half," Fast said.

In the 51st minute, Bolivar's Andrew Lewis scored the game's lone goal with an assist from Zach Warwick.

Fast said the sophomore Warwick was able to head the ball to Lewis, a junior, who buried a jumping volley shot past the stunned goalkeeper.

"Willard came at us re-

ally hard after that, even pressing more guys up from the defense to try and equalize," he said. "Our defenders did an outstanding job holding them off."

Goalkeeper Trenton Arnold clocked nine saves.

"This was a tremendous effort by our defense and goalkeeper," he said. "Willard averaged four goals a game and had won 16 games this season against

a very tough schedule. It was impressive to see a total team effort from our guys. You could see their confidence getting stronger and stronger as the game went on."

Up next

Bolivar will play Neosho at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 7, in Neosho in state sectionals.

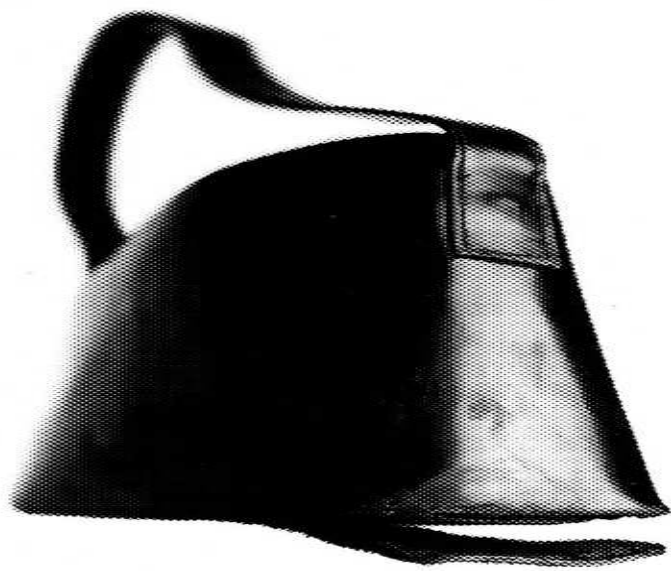
