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PULSE Can Logan Square be revitalized?

City officials struggle with obsolete facility and troubling activity

A 30-acre shopping plaza — Logan Square — in southwest Lansing is once again catching the eyes of city officials as it struggles with vacant storefronts, illicit businesses and code violations.

Brian McGrain, director of economic planning and development for the city of Lansing, late last month took a veritable army of code compliance officers, fire marshals and others through the facility. Councilman Adam Hussain has also been fighting behind the scenes to bring down the full weight of the city on the shopping plaza after a shooting there this summer.

"There's a lot going on there," McGrain said. "Some of it good, some of it we want to support. Other things, you know, need improvement."

The shopping plaza at the corner of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard and Holmes Road opened in south Lansing in 1962. After several years of recent management issues, Mayor Andy Schor had targeted the site for improvements in early 2018. But rather than fix the issues, Southfield-based Meram Properties sold Logan Square for \$2.85 million in 2018.

At the time, Schor ordered his administration to crack down on the shopping center with plans to bring a nuisance property lawsuit against the owner and eventually seize the land.

"We have cited him and cited him, and my understanding is that previously it was always, 'I'll fix it," Schor

explained. "And then he never did. And I said, 'Let's take action,' and we are."

After the property was sold to California investors Kevin and Mike Zhang, city officials decided to give the new owners time to get their legs under them and revitalize the area. New lighting has been installed in the parking lot. Some storefronts have been spruced up with fresh paint.

Efforts to reach the new owners for comment were unsuccessful.

New tenants have also arrived. But not all of those tenants have been good for the area.

"I have done everything possible to bring these guys to the table with our economic development team, but there's limitations in terms of what I can do as a legislator," Hussain said. "We need this administration to take this seriously. Period."

In a walk around the facility last month, Hussain pointed out his concerns. In the back of the building are several disabled vehicles with flat tires and hanging exhaust systems that have apparently had catalytic converters removed from them. Hussain also pointed out concerning locations where illegal nightclubs — often called Blind Pigs — had been operating off the radar.

In June, Lansing Police Department officers responded to Logan Square after shots were fired. A large crowd was dispersed at the time. When Hussain was down there, he said he noticed a large crowd of people "partying" inside one of the storefronts and gathering behind the facility.

McGrain alluded to ongoing police investigations throughout Logan Square, but he declined to discuss specifics. Last month, a clothing retail storefront — Head Over Heels Boutique — was shuttered as part of a multi-state heroin and other illicit drugs bust. McGrain said his team has lingering concerns about some of the businesses operating in the mall, calling them "sketch."

Despite the possibility of continued criminal activity, McGrain said there are also businesses within Logan Square that are making a difference. He said Lansing Wholesale, a distributor located in the mall, was an example of an economic success story for Lansing. The company started on Cedar Street, but it grew so quickly that it had to lease space at Logan Square. It has continued to grow such that it is now seeking a new operations location, McGrain explained.

The parking lot has also seen the advent of a combined Amazon Prime parking zone — where the international online retailer parks delivery vans — and a driving education program.

"It puts eyes on the area at all times," said McGrain. "That's a good thing."

Hussain said that is part of the irony with Logan Square. Along with the bad apples, there are, he said, really committed business owners in the area working hard to improve the south side.

"But this property owner, and, frankly, the city of Lansing, is allowing for other less aboveboard operators to come in there to run disreputable businesses, and that's an absolute detriment to the folks and their businesses," Hussain added.

For his part, McGrain said he is already deploying parking enforcement teams to the area to ticket people parking in the fire lanes — an all-too-common occurrence throughout the facility.

He has also made clear to management that all new businesses moving in need to make sure that the storefronts they are taking over have upgraded fire suppression and electrical systems. McGrain is also expecting new businesses to come to the city for the proper permits to do the work and allow city officials to inspect the premises. He has also demanded a list of all the occupied storefronts and the businesses involved to be filed with the city's fire department to facilitate effective responses in the event of a fire or other disaster at the shopping plaza.

McGrain said there are also a few new businesses on the horizon at Logan Square — including a billiard hall and an eatery. The city also has plans to hire a full-time staffer to focus on local economic improvement through the newly established MLK Corridor Improvement Authority.

Both McGrain and Hussain have high hopes for progress.

Corridor improvement plans focus on redevelopment and business opportunities from the railroad tracks on the north, just past the old drop forge facility south to Edgewood Boulevard. Logan Square represents a key economic cornerstone within that strip, but there are also blocks of retail space along the entire miles-long corridor in need of support.

"In putting some paint on the building and slapping a couple of lights up — I'm sorry, the folks in South Lansing deserve much better than that," said Hussain. — **TODD HEYWOOD**

Local businessman lobs racial slur at school board officer

An 11-second video shared by Lansing School Board Vice President Rachel Willis shows that she was subjected last week to a racist tirade by the owner of a court process servicing firm in Delta Township.

Willis, who is Black, said she was driving on Saginaw Highway in Eaton County on Thursday when a motorist honked at her, followed her several blocks and called her the N-word numerous times. The driver who ver-

bally assaulted Willis was subsequently identified as Michael Hellman

The reason? Hellmann, the owner of Serves You Right Processing Service, accused Willis of failing to stop at a stop sign. In the video, Hellmann can be heard calling Willis "an ignorant fucking n****r bitch." Willis responded by thanking the man and wishing him a "really nice day."

Hellmann hung up the phone on this reporter when asked about the incident,





but he was identified by his distinctive black Jeep with a Punisher logo on the tire cover on the back - a reference to a Marvel Comic character who is a cop who turns vigilante and kills criminals. The logo was also prevalent at the pro-Trump insurrectionist riot at the U.S. Capitol building on Jan. 6.

Hellmann's Facebook page features several pictures of his black Jeep with either a Blue Lives Matter flag or a Trump 2020 flag. His Facebook page also identities him as a former officer at the Fort Wayne Police Department and air marshal with the U.S. Federal Air Marshal Service. Calls to Fort Wayne Police to confirm Hellmann's employment were not immediately returned.

Willis, who is a Lansing City Council candidate, said she called Eaton County Sheriff's officials. A sheriff's deputy said the incident will be investigated.

"There needs to be accountability beyond just the fact that this happened to me," Willis said, noting that the incident showcases the prevalence of racism in the Greater Lansing community.

She added: "My issue was that I am a Black, educated woman with some level of agency and that happened to me.

It doesn't matter when you control for education and pedigree. It doesn't matter when somebody chooses to be racist and hateful to you.

Spiral Dance Club may reopen under new ownership

Local businessman says he has a purchase pact, hopes to reopen this fall

Spiral Dance Club is on its way to a new life, says businessman Adam Brewer, a native of Leslie.

Brewer, 36, said he has made a nonrefundable deposit on a purchase agreement for the LGBTQ nightclub at 1247 Center St. in Old Town. It closed in March 2020 because of the pandemic and never reopened.

Efforts to reach the club's owner, Tom Donall, have been unsuccessful.

Brewer said today he is awaiting final approval from governmental authorities on the transfer of the liquor license. He said he expects that to happen by the beginning of October.

City Council must approve the transfer of the liquor license as must the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

He hopes a swift approval by the beginning of October will result in an opening shortly after.

Brewer said he will update the location some, but attendees can expect an LGBTQ community-focused club with dancing to contribute to the community.

"It will be very similar," he said. "I own several properties in Old Town and I think this is just an important part of the community. I am excited to bring it back."

If response to his Facebook post announcing that he was seeking employees for the new club is an example of the eagerness to see the club lights flashing and the bass booming, he's likely in for a success. He said the post he made resulted in over 100 shares.

"That's unusual for me," he said with a chuckle on the phone.

He has begun to advertise for new employees.

Rodger Geissman, known as DJ Lipgloss, has been hired as entertainment manager and show director for the new club. Geissman has a long history in Michigan's LGBTQ community of developing and promoting drag shows from Lansing to Grand Rapids.

Brewer, who lives in Okemos, owned Brewer Iron and Metal, 2547 W. Main St. It was a local recycling business located focused on recycling and selling used cars. He sold the business to Padnos and now tows vehicles to them for recycling with his tow company Gigi's. In addition, he has property holdings in the city under three different limited liability companies: Old Town L.L.C., Drew L.L.C and Brewer Housing L.L.C. It is not uncommon for businesses to create separate businesses for various property interests to protect assets from the liabilities of another business venture.

With Spiral closed down as Donall sought to sell the business and property, the only bar specifically designating itself as an LGBTQ bar was Esquire, a block away in Old Town. However, that bar, at the corner of Turner and Center streets, does not allow anyone under the age of 21 to enter. In addition, while it has a small dance floor, it is mostly a neighborhood bar designed for socializing.

Spiral went on the market in April 2019. Donall told City Pulse then that he was hoping to keep the property and sell just the business and liquor license to operate it. Brewer said he's purchasing the business, liquor license, the 4,870-square-foot building and 0.375-acre property.

Spiral opened in 2000 as part of the influx of investment into Lansing's Old Town neighborhood. It was also a time

which had been ousted from Michigan Avenue to make way for the baseball stadium. The establishment helped anchor Old Town as an LGBTQ-friendly stronghold in Lansing, where there was also an LGBTQ bookstore, The Real

World Emporium, which served as an informal community center and political headquarters for the community. — **TODD HEYWOOD**





Marvin Gardens Apartments



Don't be fooled by this week's eyesore. Although it bears the same name as one of the ritziest sets of property on a standard Monopoly

game board, this apartment complex near the corner of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard and Cavanaugh Road in South Lansing desperately needs some work to live up to its name.

It has all the hallmarks of the shabbiest properties that typically earn a spot in this recurring feature: several shattered and boarded-up windows, a crumbling parking lot, broken deck railings, a sinking roof and other rundown exterior fixtures. We can only imagine the inside. Some units have trash collecting outside. There's even a car on blocks in the back parking lot.

The kicker: A car reportedly crashed into the side of the building more than two months ago. Fortunately, nobody was injured. Unfortunately, management has yet to complete the repairs. Two beams pressed against a few sheets of plywood seem to be holding the building together. Our calls to the management office (and the "emergency maintenance" line) for Marvin Gardens Apartments were left unreturned. Online reviews suggest that residents have had similar luck.

County records show the complex was purchased by MG72 LLC in 2016 for about \$1.4 million. State records list an office address for the company at Beverly Place Apartments on Kalamazoo Street. Big surprise: There were several shattered and boarded-up windows over there too.

This apartment complex was also located in the center of a concentrated outbreak of COVID-19 that was detected by the Ingham County Health Department last summer in zip code 48911. Residents over there could use a break. Here's hoping that this glowing feature motivates the management to start taking the living conditions of their tenants seriously — or else perhaps just consider changing the name to Baltic or Mediterranean Apartments. It would be more fitting.

Lansing to remember 9/11

Lansing Mayor Andy Schor announced plans to honor and remember those who lost their lives, the families and the survivors of the World Trade Center attacks. Schor, U.S. Rep. Elissa Slotkin, Interim Police Chief Ellery Sosebee and Interim Fire Chief Greg Martin will give remarks beginning at 8:30 a.m. on Saturdayat Wentworth Park in downtown Lansing.

Ingham County demands masks in schools

A new order from the Ingham County Health Department requires all students and staff in schools and daycares regardless of their vaccination status — to wear a face mask while indoors. Health Officer Linda Vail said she first wanted to give local school districts leeway to enact their own rules before she issued a mandate, but districts in Webberville and Dansville had refused to comply with recommendations, necessitating a county-

wide emergency order. COVID-19 cases have now been tracked at every school district in the county. County officials also tracked a 515% increase in cases among those ages 17 and younger from Aug. 12-25.

Whitmer: Protect right to choice in Michigan

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer called on state lawmakers to pass legislation to repeal Michigan's 1930 law that criminalizes abortion, which is not in effect because of the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court Decision in Roe v. Wade. Repealing the state law would ensure that the right to choose remains a right, even in the face of continued attacks on that legal precedent, Whitmer said.

Shutdown continues at General Motors

The shutdown at GM's Delta Township plant continued into its ninth week due to a global semiconductor shortage. According to LSJ reports, the company will idle production through at least Sept. 20. The Grand River plant remains partially open as one of only four U.S. plants still in production.



Lansing man pleads guilty to embezzlement

Joseph Pettit, a former employee of the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy, pleaded guilty to embezzlement over \$100,000 and uttering and publishing — felonies that could carry a maximum sentence of up to 34 years in prison. As an environmental quality specialist from 1996 to 2020, Petitt created fake vendors and then diverted bond funds to bank accounts that he supplied to those fraudulent vendors. State officials became aware of the issue last September and contacted police.

Underage booze stings underway in East Lansing

Young, legal-age mystery shoppers have been heading into party stores and bars in East Lansing to see if they'll be asked to provide photo identification as part of a new statewide pilot program to curtail the sale of alcohol to



minors in Michigan's college towns. Owners and managers will receive confidential reports from the state Liquor Control Commission. Last year, about 86% of licensees checked for ID.

Lansing businesses rake in grant cash

A total of 268 businesses in Ingham County — including 135 in Lansing — were awarded a combined total of \$3.3 million in Ingham County Sunrise Grants in partnership with the Ingham County Board of Commissioners and the Lansing Economic Area Partnership. The grant program was created in April using \$11 million from the county's first tranche of federal coronavirus relief as authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act. More grants are en route.

MSU suspends deputy chief

Traci Ruiz, the deputy chief of the Michigan State University Police Department and a retired Lansing Police Department officer, was placed on administrative leave and MSU officials aren't releasing any information about the situation. A spokesman labeled it a "personnel matter" and declined to elaborate, except to note that there is no "safety concern" for the local community.

Anthony announces bid for State Senate

State Rep. Sarah Anthony announced plans to run for the State Senate next year in hopes of succeeding term-limited State Sen. Curtis Hertel Jr. If elected, Anthony would make history as the region's first Black woman to serve in the State Senate. Former House Democratic Leader Sam Singh also announced plans in June to run.

Dunbar joins 'The Crew'

Lansing City Councilwoman and mayoral candidate Kathie Dunbar has joined forces with two Council candidates — Claretta Duckett-Freeman and Oprah Revish — in a newly formed political alliance called "The Crew." Club Tabu scrutiny sets off alarms

An investigative report by City Pulse's Todd Heywood in last week's edition revealed some disconcerting information about another investigation, this one conducted in secret by the Lansing Police Department's Special Operations Section. The target of the undercover operation was Club Tabu, a members-only social club on the city's south side that caters primarily to gay men.

Police scrutiny of the club was triggered by an anonymous email received by Lansing City Councilman Adam Hussain, which included images of unclothed club members and a litany of unsubstantiated complaints alleging prostitution and drug use at the establishment. Hussain promptly forwarded the email and images to several of his Council colleagues and staff, the City Attorney's office and to LPD.

Hussain may have unwittingly committed a felony in doing so. Under Michigan law, it is illegal to use a computer to transmit sexually explicit images that were obtained without the consent of the individuals depicted in the images. It is highly unlikely that Hussain will be charged with a crime, however, since a key element of any criminal offense is intent. We doubt he intended to violate the law or cause harm by forwarding the email and the images to other city officials in the course of doing his job as an elected official. State law also provides an exception for the dissemination of sexually explicit images in the reporting of a crime.

That exception may not protect the anonymous emailer since it appears that multiple felonies were committed, one by taking the illegal photos, which constitutes a massive invasion of privacy, and another by transmitting the images to a third party via computer. Given clear evidence that suggests unlawful conduct, either by the author of the email or an accomplice or both, one might think the Police Department would have started an investigation to learn the identity of the emailer and pursue appropriate charges. We find it perplexing that this hasn't happened.

Imagine if an anonymous emailer sent compromising, illegally obtained photos of a top city official to a member of City Council. We daresay an investigation would have commenced immediately, using every tool and technology at the Police Department's disposal to uncover the identity of the anonymous emailer. That no one in the LPD chain of command responded in a similar fashion to this outrageous, illegal breach of privacy gives rise to legitimate concerns that implicit or even explicit bias against gay men caused the department to look the other way. To their credit, when asked by City Pulse, Councilmembers Hussain, Patricia Spitzley and Council President Peter Spadafore all agreed that the source of the email and illicit photos should be investigated.

Equally disturbing is that LPD has no records whatsoever of the investigation. According to a police spokesman, no criminal activity was observed in the course of the operation so no report was written. A spokeswoman for Mayor Andy Schor's office had a different story: The city doesn't have enough officers to write reports for every investigation. We think the department's failure to keep records of its investigations, secret or not, is a serious mistake that needs to be remedied. Furthermore, we think the excuse proffered by the Mayor's Office is utter nonsense: Transparency and accountability demand that the Police Department document its actions — even undercover operations — in case they later come under scrutiny or give rise to legal claims.

This episode is but one more example of a troubling lack of transparency that appears to permeate LPD. It wasn't so long ago that the department intentionally misrepresented the real cause of Anthony Hulon's death in the Lansing lockup at the hands of city jailers, which only came to light after Hulon's family filed a wrongful death lawsuit. Both the Hulon death and the Club Tabu investigation occurred on the watch of former LPD Chief Daryl Green, who has since moved on to a new position at Michigan State University. His replacement, Interim Chief Ellery Sosebee, has yet to make a public comment on the Club Tabu controversy. We think he should speak up and clarify his position both on undocumented secret investigations and his department's failure to investigate the source of the illegally-obtained Club Tabu images.

As Mayor Schor embarks on a national search for a permanent police chief, we urge him to make a demonstrated track record of transparency a key criterion for the new hire. And, given that the City Charter charges the mayor with supervising the Police Department, we also urge Schor to direct LPD to immediately commence an investigation into the identity of the anonymous emailer.

Finally, the mayor should think twice before allowing his spokeswoman to so cavalierly dish out lame excuses when LPD policies and procedures are publicly called into question. A better answer would have been agreeing that records of all investigations should be kept and that the mayor will promptly confer with the police chief to find out why it isn't happening. To do otherwise suggests that Mayor Schor shares LPD's apparently trifling concern with the egregious invasion of privacy that occurred at Club Tabu.

Trump issues endorsements as '22 MI campaigns heat up

Former President Donald Trump is officially involved in Michigan's 2022 elections.

The one-term president announced

this week OPINION his political action com-

mittee's support for "fake 2020 election" sympathizer Kristina Karamo for secretary of state and "forensic audit" bill sponsor Rep. Steve Carra to take out U.S. Rep. Fred Upton in the 6th Congressional District.

Trump has yet to endorse for governor, attorney general or in the 3rd Congressional District, where U.S. Rep. Peter Meijer also supported Trump's impeachment, but that's coming ... at least in MI-3.

The endorsements likely clear the Republican primary field of other "America First," pro-Trump Republicans, freeing up Karamo and Carra to receive a piece of what is reportedly a \$62 million cache in Trump's "Save America" PAC.

In the case of Karamo, Trump's backing may have cleared the field for her to win the Republican nomination next year to face Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson.

The former 2020 election poll challenger at the TCF Center in Detroit has been running unopposed for the GOP nomination all summer. She's ingratiated herself to "patriot" rally participants across the state, talking

about her first-hand observation of the Arizona election audit, among things.

Election security will be a driving motivational tool in this race for the Republican grassroots. It's hard to see how anyone who doesn't support — at a minimum — a "forensic audit" (whatever that looks like) of the 2020 elections winning a GOP convention.

A bigger name emerging from the political right - Rep. Matt Maddock or MRP Co-chairwoman Meshawn Maddock, for example - isn't going to happen.

Without Trump's backing, there's no point. An "establishment candidate," someone like Rep. Ann Bollin or Ottawa County Clerk Dan Krueger, will need to throw together a campaign in six months with little-to-no statewide name ID or money running into a Trump headwind?

Fat chance.

Same thing in the 6th Congressional District, where Fred Upton is crossways with Trump for voting to impeach him. Upton felt Trump stirred up the crowds that trashed the U.S. Capitol Jan. 6 in the hopes of stopping the Electoral College certification.

That obviously didn't happen, but what did happen is Upton earned himself four primary opponents and a possible fifth in Gina Johnsen, who narrowly lost last year to state Rep. Angela Witwer of the Lansing-area legislative delegation.

Even before Trump's endorsement,

Carra, 32, was the clear frontrunner. He had raised at least \$100,000 as of July. The other three in the race raised \$15,000 combined. With Trump's endorsement no longer on the table, it's hard to see where Johnsen goes for support, having not actually lived in this Southwest Michigan district.

The question now will be whom Trump backs for governor. Will he go with James Craig, who has a lot of institutional support and whom he spoke highly of when Craig was Detroit chief of police?

Will he go with Garrett Soldano? The anti-lockdown organizer raised far more money than other like-minded candidates like Ryan Kelley or Austin Chenge.

Could conservative talk show host Tudor Dixon nab it? She's got a lot of national exposure and has the potential to raise a lot of money across the country.

Or Trump may sit this one out. To him, any of the choices are better than Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. Why get involved if Craig, Soldano and Dixon are all willing to kiss his ring?

The bigger question will be in the 3rd Congressional District, where Meijer's primary challengers aren't in the same league as Carra. Tom Norton only reported \$11,000 in cash on hand as of July. His opponent, Audra Johnson, barely raised anything.

The two are openly trashing one another behind the scenes in the hopes of getting the backing of Trump and/or old rocker Ted Nugent. All the while, it's not clear either have the juice to win a popular vote, even among Republicans.

With Trump already endorsing a candidate for Michigan state Senate, it appears no office is too small for the Trumpster. And if endorsements are







'Inner shining light'

Broad Museum's 'Free Your Mind' looks inside, and outside, prison walls

'Free Your Mind: Art and Incarceration in Michigan'

MSU Broad Art Museum Through Dec. 12, 2021 Panel Discussion and Open Forum 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 12 barrier. The scene is familiar to most people as a movie cliché, but it gets a wrenching twist in a painting

by Dara Ket, part of an exhibit of Michigan-based art by incarcerated people at Michigan State University's Broad Museum.

The prisoner, seen from the mother's point of view, is a giant baby, complete with prisoner ID number embroidered on his knitted cap.

Each of the nation's 2.2 million incarcerated people is someone's baby, spouse, partner, friend, uncle, father, or all of the above.

"Free Your Mind," part of a museum-wide set of exhibits on mass incarceration now at MSU's Broad Art Museum, breathes thought and feeling into numbing prison statistics by giving pride of place to deeply personal art by Michigan prisoners.

It's a departure from most exhibits at the Broad. None of the artists were trained in schools. All were either selftaught, after going to prison, or mentored by other prisoners.

"It's not responding to an art world trend, it's just coming out of the person's need to make a statement," exhibit co-curator Janie Paul said.

Oliger Merko's "Imaginary Cello" shows the artist marching in a prison yard lineup, awash in wintry yellow-white light. He pauses to gaze

at an alternate version of himself, playing the cello he studied in his youth. The rich and beautiful impasto, or visible brushwork, harks back to the master painters Merko saw in his youth, in his native Albania, but


Merko never picked up a brush until he was in prison.

Much of the exhibit is taken up with scenes of everyday prison life, combining close attention to detail with a strong point of view. John Bone's "Cell Scene" shows the artist gazing outside the bars, surrounded by banal details like cracked plaster, a sink and toilet and ear buds strewn on a pillow. But there's a neat psychological twist: the picture you are looking at is already hanging on the wall of the cell, with the same picture on the wall within that picture, and so on, into infinity.

"You don't know if it's a way out, or an infinite tunnel where you can't get out," exhibit co-curator Steven Bridges said.

Museum visitors who are ready to set aside expectations of technical excellence might be surprised.

Daniel Valentine, a mechanic who built motorcycles before being incarcerated, turned his meticulous hand to colored pencils, producing a hyper-realistic, lush image of a woman's hand holding a rose in "The Scarlet Fancy." The fleshy red rose, and the woman's glossy red fingernail polish, are distinguished from each other by subtle under layers of black.



"He figured these things out on his own," Paul said.

Andy Wynkoop's "Economic Redistribution" is a panorama of weirdness inspired by the 17th century Flemish master Pieter Bruegel the Elder, with the cast of "The Wizard of Oz" and Adolf Hitler tucked into bit roles. While in prison, Wynkoop saw a Brueghel painting on a CD cover and "everything opened up for him," Paul said.

Bridges and Paul wanted the exhibit to reflect a full range of experiences and emotions, from the anguish and frustration of incarcerated people to their capacity for joy and fulfillment.

"The work is disarming," Bridges said. "It's not all gloom and doom. There's joy, dignity, pride, there's this

inner shining light. It welcomes people in a way that might be unexpected for some visitors."

Bridges and Paul tailored "Free your Mind" to complement "Per(Sister)," a stunning exhibit on art and incarcerated women, also on view at the Broad. "Per(Sister)," a traveling exhibit focusing mostly on Louisiana women, was developed by the Broad Museum's new director, Monica Ramirez-Montagut, while she was the director of Tulane University's Newcomb Art Museum in New Orleans.

"We wanted to bring the conversation back home, to mid-Michigan," Bridges said.

The subject matter was new to Bridges, so he called Paul, co-founder of a series of annual exhibits of art by Michigan prisoners, now in

its 27th year, organized by the Prison Creative Arts Project at the University of Michigan.

Paul said that the longstanding project has enabled thousands of incarcerated people in Michigan to become artists.

"We reach into every single prison in the state," she said.

Exhibits like "Free Your Mind" complete the circuit by connecting incarcerated artists with an audience.

The benefit is mutual. Paul and Bridges find that viewers relate deeply to the art on several levels.

"These are people that took up art once they got into prison — all kinds of people," Paul said. "It makes you think: "I can identify with that,' or even 'I can do that."

At the same time, the patience, focus and persistence of some of the artists on display seem almost superhuman.

In an intricate and symbolic soft sculpture called "Redeemed," Susan Brown fashioned the head of a deer from 347,929 tiny beads laid over an armature made of easily obtainable materials like toilet paper and glue.

"When people see the incredible skill, and their ability to evoke so many emotions and reactions, they are taken aback," Paul said. "It makes them reconsider their stereotyped image of people who are incarcerated."

So, I was understandably excited when Skymint reached out with some samples from its latest "Tailgate" lineup - a clear nod to college football fandom in both East Lansing and Ann Arbor.

Green Machine Cannabis-Infused Gummies Price – \$16/10 pieces THC content – 100mg

Skymint has two new flavors of gummies to help celebrate college football season this fall: Green Machine and Varsity Blue. Green Machine is a tribute to the Michigan State University Spartans — a package of 10 dank green



(lime) and white (coconut) gumdrops. Varsity Blue is blue and yellow (pear, passionfruit and pomegranate) for the University of Michigan Wolverines.

I'm a bit biased, but I think MSU

clearly got the short end of the stick on flavors in this new lineup. The Green Machine tasted entirely of coconuts and not the tangy, fruity pina colada sort of coconuts. Even the lime gummies tasted like dull

cream. They were objectively terrible.

Even if you truly bleed green and white, consider snagging the Ann Arbor variety for gameday. I still wouldn't eat either gummies for the flavors alone, but Varsity Blue is much more palatable.

The good news: You only need to eat four or five of these treats to stay ripped through halftime. These edibles are also a steal of a deal at only \$16 per bag; Similar gummies are usually \$20.

I found myself in a euphoric and dazed state of happiness for four hours after consuming about half the bag of Green Machine before the matchup with Northwestern University on Friday evening. I also fell asleep before the game was over. Pro tip: The effects take about an hour to kick in, so give the first few gummies time before you impatiently chow down the whole bag.

When I was younger, my family and I got a pair of boxing gloves for Christmas. Whenever we attended family gatherings, we'd sneak over the boxing gloves and beat each other up in the backyard. We also had annual Halloween parties at my cousins' house. We kept it like a tradition when we were young, just having harmless fun every year. 





MSU Special Collections gains treasure trove of cookbooks


Following Hurricane Katrina in 2005, the hottest selling items on online booksellers like Amazon, AbeBooks and e-Bay were cookbooks originating from New Orleans and the rest of Cajun Louisiana. The hurricane had destroyed treasured family cookbooks that had been passed down for generations and family members were anxiously trying to replace them.

Cookbooks are treasures, especially the handwritten or manuscript-style cookbooks. Recently, Michigan State University's Special Collections acquired more than 6,500 cookbooks and cooking ephemera from the Brass sisters of Cambridge, Massachusetts, including more than 100 manuscript cookbooks and other rare cookbooks.

Marilynn and Sheila Brass, now in their 80s, are longtime foodies in the Boston area who co-authored four cookbooks and at one time were the co-hosts of the PBS cooking show "Food Flirts." The sisters are recognized for their desserts, a serendipitous result of growing up on a street known as Sea Foam Avenue in Winthrop, Massachusetts.

The sisters are at work on a joint memoir of their childhood days spent in the kitchen with their mother, Dorothy Brass. The dynamic cooking duo has appeared on numerous television cooking shows, such as "Throwdown with Bobby Flay," where they destroyed Flay with a delicious pineapple upside-down cake. In addition to collecting recipes, the sisters have accumulated a large collection of antique food molds not included in the acquisition, which they heralded on "Antiques Road Show."

The collection came to the attention of MSU when a Cambridge historian — who had helped the sisters catalogue their cache of materials — con-

tacted Leslie McRoberts, head of MSU Special Collections, about its availability. McRoberts said after she received the 500-page catalog, she enlisted the help of Peter Berg, the former head of MSU Special Collections, to assess the collection. Berg had shepherded earlier acquisitions for MSU Special Collections – including the collection of Lansing woman Shirley Sliker and her husband, Alan, whose collection of 15,000 items of cooking ephemera is also held at MSU Special Collections.

"After reviewing the collection, it would be foolish not to acquire the vast collection," Berg said.

"The collection helps tell the story of America's diverse food culture and its historical context," McRoberts added.

One item in the collection that immediately drew the eye of McRoberts was Julia Child's childhood textbook of French conjugation signed "Julie McWilliams," by the famed cookbook author on the cover. The collection contains numerous signed Child cookbooks, which is not unexpected since Child was a longtime resident of the area and Radcliffe College holds Child's papers. The East Coast area was a fruitful source of the sisters' collection of British cookbooks

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Culinary collections are more than just "famous" fudge recipes. They provide context for our history — especially community cookbooks and manuscript recipes, which often contain keys to how recipes adapted to the food shortages of the Great Depression, World Wars and the Civil War, which has been documented by MSU Professor and food writer Helen Veit in her books on the food of

the North and the South during the Civil War.

For their books "Heirloom Baking" and "Heirloom Cooking," the sisters drew heavily on their collection of handwritten cookbooks and recipe cards, which help us recall everyday life of previous generations. For those of us who have frequented estate sales and flea markets, items in the Brass collection will seem familiar. It consists of little wooden boxes containing worn, food-stained recipe cards for desserts like "Heavenly Hash," handwritten cookbooks clumsily stitched together with yarn, recipes clipped from newspaper food sections and the backs of cardboard Betty Crocker boxes.

In MSU's collection of more than

Think of these treats sort of like Burnett's flavored vodka: Nobody actually enjoys drinking the stuff, but it's cheap, effective and people sure do guzzle a lot of it during their college years. But if you're looking for the single-barrel Scotch of the cannabis world, consider looking elsewhere.

Tailgate Vape Cartridge Price — \$25/.5g

THC content - 84.3%

This is another utilitarian cannabis product designed for game day. The half-gram package is chalked full of football-themed marketing lines like "time to get blitzed," and "take a hit," but it doesn't actually provide any real information about which strains are included in this distillate — only that it's a "tailgate" flavored blend of cannabis extracts and botanical-derived terpenes.

That flavor (much like the game day gummies) left much to be desired. I detected some very mild berry notes with a hint of pine, but otherwise didn't taste much of anything at all. The cheap plas40,000 cookbooks are those by MSU graduate Julee Rosso, who revolutionized cooking with her cookbook "The Silver Palate Cookbook." It also holds Martha Stewart's "Entertainment," early editions of "The Joy of Cooking" and local cookbooks from across the country, such as "Copper Kettle Cookbook," by Lansing's own Martha Dixon, who wrote while hosting a cooking show for WJIM Television for more than 25 years beginning in the '50s.

McRoberts said cookery collections also give us insight into food advertising and how companies "pushed their products and how products evolved over time."

You are likely to find thousands of recipes for Jell-O within the collection, along with the quirky recipes for dishes that are "enriching the blood." You'll also discover cookbooks for school lunch ladies that guided institutional cooking with recipes that start with "boil one hundred pounds of potatoes."

McRoberts said MSU Special Collections is always looking for additional material, big or small, to add to its cookery section. I'm sending off a cookbook from the Alcatraz Women's Club, which has no recipe for bread with saw blades.

tic cartridges produced a fair amount of vapor. It was also exceptionally smooth. But I prefer my distillate blends with a bit more cannabis-flavored zest and far fewer marketing mysteries.


It was also disappointing to see that this cannabis oil was just a distillate with added terpenes — not a genuine live resin oil cartridge. For the price point, however, I can't complain too much.

Any cartridge on the shelves for less than \$30 makes my wallet happy, as long as it actually works. And this stuff definitely works. The high hits real quick, and it lasts for quite a long time.

I also took periodic puffs almost all of Labor Day weekend and still have plenty left for the week.

This cartridge isn't likely to win the next Cannabis Cup, but it'll get the job done with an uplifting, energetic and invigorating sort of high that might be just right for your next big football game.





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

A LOOK BACK: THE VERVE PIPE'S 'UNDERNEATH' LP TURNS 20

The brilliant, Adam Schlesinger-produced album that led to a 13-year hiatus

Four years after The Verve Pipe's "Villains" LP reached Platinum status, and its breakout single "The Freshman" became a legit mainstream radio hit, the East Lansing band returned to the studio to cut "Underneath," its fourth proper full-length record — and their best record.

Don't agree? Talk to the band's vocalist/guitarist Brian Vander Ark who told this to the Chicago Tribune in 2015: "I think 'Underneath' was our best, and that was the one that really nobody heard."

Of course, there is a lot of baggage as to why "nobody" heard it. But now, obscurity aside, and on the eve of its 20th anniversary, the album remains special in many ways. Firstly, it was produced by the songwriter/ engineer Adam Schlesinger, a Grammy and Emmy Award winner — not to mention a founding member of wildly popular bands like Fountains of Wayne and Tinted Windows. Sadly, Schlesinger died unexpectedly on April 1, 2020, due to COVID-19 complications.

But his fingerprints were left on stacks of albums, for one: the bubbly title song to "That Thing You Do!", which he wrote and co-produced for the 1996 Tom Hanks film. Beyond that, Schlesinger — a power-pop devotee— also made his mark on the legacy of The Verve Pipe, who ventured deep into the world of pop-infused rock 'n' roll when they recorded "Underneath" with him.

On paper, the RCA Records-issued album seems like it should have been a new start for the local boys. It could have been a pathway to a radio-friendly career, but given its release date, Sept. 18, 2001 (aka the week after the 9/11 attacks), much of the world was still in shock, and not too concerned with buying new CDs.

The lead single, "Never Let You Down," did score some airplay and some moderate Adult Top 40 chart action, but didn't get near the traction of the previous two albums. However, the 11 original songs (two co-written by Schlesinger) are worth revisiting for those into shamelessly poppy hooks. From front to back, its stacked with lush harmonies (the title track, "Underneath"), crunchy '90s guitars ("Happiness Is"), and even some delicate ballads ("Colorful"). Beyond that, "Gotta Move On" sounds like a lost Peter Gabriel track where he was backed by the Fab Four.

Or, as AllMusic Guide accurately stated back in 2001, the album "returned the group to the sound of their early, self-released albums, showcasing a guitar pop band born and raised on college rock bands like R.E.M., XTC, and Hüsker Dü."

It's hard to tell exactly why this dynamic disc quietly faded into the ether. Perhaps it was because The Verve Pipe left behind much of its gloomier side in favor of sparkly, polished tunes. Perhaps it was changing trends: Lifehouse, Incubus and Train were (chart-wise) crushing it at the time. There are no echoes of The Beatles or Big Star in that radio drivel realm. No benefit of Schlesinger's golden ear at the mixing board, either.

Commercially, "Underneath" was not a huge triumph, however, it did garner critical praise. The Detroit Free Press called the album "the best stuff the group has concocted in half a decade." Meanwhile, The South Bend Tribune wrote: "Vander Ark writes five of the songs on Underneath, and drummer Donny Brown writes four of them, and the differences between them help to make 'Underneath' a constantly shifting tilt of emotions and, probably, a much better album than if just one of them had been the main songwriter."


In that 2015 Chicago Tribune feature, Vander Ark told reporter Allison Stewart that the undeserved flop of "Underneath" was hard on him and his bandmates. "All the stars were aligned, then 9/11 hit literally four or five days before our album was to be released, and it just killed us."

And, in a way, it did — at least for a long stretch of time. Its next album, "Overboard," wouldn't hit stores until 2014. That's a 13-year gap. Since their return, the members of The Verve Pipe have remained active, releasing both children's music and adult music. Brown, the band's drummer, left the band but releases solo records.

In May 2020, a month after Schlesinger's untimely death, Brown returned to the studio with fellow Verve Pipe alumni Andy Reed and recorded "All Kinds of Time," a song written by their friend Schlesinger. A fitting bookend tribute to the man behind the board on their best album.

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


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FOOD & DRINK AND A DRINK AND A

"Leave the gun. Take the cannoli."

In "The Godfather," by Mario Puzo, there is a scene where Peter Clemenza shows Michael Corleone how to make spaghetti and meatballs. Clemenza was the smoothest character in the story, after the Godfather himself, of course, and quite possibly a better cook. That scene, especially in the movie, which is much more detailed, improved my pasta.

Clemenza was a jovial reaper. It is poetry in motion when he mixes business with pleasure, as a wedding dancer, a chef and as an orchestrator of hits. Like on Pauli, for example, the driver who set up the boss. On the way home from their cannoli run, they pulled over so Clemenza could take a leak. He never got back in the car, which wound up covered in Paulie's blood, thanks to Rocco in the back seat. They walked home and brought the cannoli, presumably ricotta-stuffed, to a room full of angry men and proceeded to cook them dinner. The Don was in the hospital with gunshot wounds, thanks to Paulie, and the men were preparing for war.

Clemenza pulled Michael Corleone aside to give his future boss some bits of unsolicited, if solid, advice on love and cooking. After telling the youngest Corleone to sing to his girlfriend, he says, "Come over here kid, learn something. You never know, you might



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have to cook for 20 guys someday. You see, you start off with a little bit of oil. And you fry some garlic. Then you throw in some tomatoes, tomato paste — you fry it and make sure it doesn't stick. You get it to a boil, then you shove in all your sausage and your meatballs. Add a little bit of wine. And a little bit of sugar. And that's my trick."

At that moment in the story, Sonny bursts in. "How's Paulie?" Clemenza kept stirring his sauce. "Oh Paulie? Won't see him no more."

A few decades later in Missoula, Montana, a certain Dadfather had problems of his own. No gunshot wounds to speak of, thankfully, but his two sons weren't behaving in a manner befitting the children of a sensitive chef. They purported zero interest in dinner, from his kitchen, at least. Other kitchens had takeout, take-and-bake pizza, macaroni and cheese and Chef Boyardee. These are a few improvements to the Dadfather's fare, where no dessert is served until salad is swallowed and the cooked food is often too chunky.

The Dadfather had to dig deep up the sleeve of his white sleeveless undershirt, which looked like the shirt he imagined Clemenza wore, to find the classic movie character's trick. Using the fresh tomatoes of summertime, he took care to ensure the spaghetti was thick with meatballs and the sauce was not chunky.

It was a pasta they couldn't refuse.

Pasta Clemenza

When you haven't gone to the mattresses and you have the time, you don't need paste and canned tomatoes, especially when they're in season. Either way, this dish really hits the pasta spot, especially in the middle of winter with some sauce you froze this coming week. Serve it with a lusty red and eat it until you feel as round as Clemenza's belly. 5 pounds fresh tomatoes. I used Oxheart Paste Tomatoes from my garden. 2 heads of garlic, whole cloves $\frac{1}{2}$ cup olive oil

- *1 teaspoons salt*
- 1 large onion, minced finely
- 1 cup red wine

Herbs: oregano, thyme, and sage, about $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of fresh, chopped, or two tablespoons worth of dried

Four Italian sausages (or 20 meatballs) One pound of dry pasta. They used boxes in "The Godfather." I use bags of fancy pasta, dried in cold air and imported from Italy

Six quarts water plus 1 tablespoon of salt (or stock)

2 more cloves of garlic

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup grated Parmesan or Romano cheese

Optional: Fresh basil leaves as a garnish

Optional: hot red pepper flakes

Trim and core the tomatoes and slice them in half, tip to core. Lay them on baking sheets, with garlic interspersed, drizzled with a few tablespoons of oil and a teaspoon of salt. Preheat the oven to broil. Place the sheets in the oven. Rotate the trays every five or so minutes, so they all cook evenly until the skins, facing upward, begin to wrinkle and start to blacken – about 20 minutes. Remove the trays of tomatoes. When they are cool enough to work with, pull off the skins.

Fry the onions in a half cup of olive oil in a heavy bottom pan. When they are translucent, add the tomatoes and the water in the baking pans. Add the herbs. Simmer for about an hour, stirring often to make sure it doesn't burn. If it burns, don't scrape the burnt stuff into the sauce — change the pot.

Season to taste with salt and perhaps more herbs. When it tastes good, turn it off and let it cool to room temperature. There is an argument to be made for Courtesy

cooking it all day and then letting it sit overnight. I'm in favor of less cooking, especially with fresh ingredients. Cook until it tastes good and call it good. It will keep cooking as it cools. And then you should let it sit overnight in the fridge.

The next day, blend it until smooth, and then filter out the seeds with cheesecloth or a thin mesh strainer. You now have a velvety smooth, not chunky, sauce – much more than you will need to accompany a pound of pasta. The sauce freezes well in quart freezer bags, stacked flat on their sides.

Heat the salted pasta water (or stock) and cook the pasta al dente. Don't worry, it will cook more in the sauce. While the pasta cooks, cut each sausage into five pieces and fry them in enough oil to coat the pan. Brown them as much as you like. They will cook more in the sauce later.

Toss the noodles in olive oil and crushed garlic and add them to the pan with the meatballs. Sauté for five minutes. Add two cups of sauce per pound of pasta (or whatever seems right with the amount of noodles you made). Simmer the noodles and meatballs gently in the sauce until the noodles are to your liking. Garnish with grated cheese, fresh basil, red pepper flakes (if you like) and serve.

David MacDougall Jr. started working at D.P. Dough as a delivery driver. Over a decade, he worked his way up through the company. Now, he is the proud owner of two franchise locations. One is in Kalamazoo, and the other is opening up in East Lansing later this month.

There, you'll find all the typical pizza toppings and some unique options like

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tater tots, scrambled eggs and pulled pork. You also have the option to choose from a variety of sauces like blue cheese, BBQ sauce, hot sauce and ranch.

As far as sides go, D.P. Dough has a plethora of menu items to pair with your calzone.

"We have our own version of cheese sticks, garlic parmesan sticks, dough bits and boneless wings," said MacDougall

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
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Jr. "We also have desserts like an Apple Zoni and edible cookie dough."
