

PULSE NEWS & OPINION Rural Maple Valley Schools caught in national debate on LGBTQ youth

It was high school homecoming in Vermontville. An autumn chill settled into downtown as a parade of fire trucks, pickups and tractors rumbled down the eightblock parade route. Children and adults lined the sides of the road, showered in candy tossed by people on the various entries.

There was the homecoming court, the king and queen, the princes and princesses.

At the very end of the parade was a hay wagon festooned in rainbow flags and a banner identifying the parade entry as coming from the nonprofit I'll Be Your Rock.

Board President Christine Terpening and Vice President Kallie Strouse sat at the head of the wagon. Terpening was holding a rainbow flag with the seal of the State of Michigan on it. Strouse was tossing mini-bags of Skittles. Everyone on the float was on high alert.

"I originally said no one was going to ride the float," said Terpening. "We had credible threats of violence against us, and I was not going to put anyone in harm's way."

But some of the adults would not accept that idea.

"We needed to be here," said Strouse. "People need to know we

support them." The parade came at the culmination of a tumultuous week in the Maple Valley School District. On Oct. 10, a presentation at a board committee meeting on creating a Gay Straight Alliance in the school set off a battle of opinions at a full board meeting right after the committee met.

Leading the charge against the formation of a GSA were Jeff Hodge, pastor of Nashville Church of the Nazarene, and school board candi-

dates Scott Leslie II and Rick McCloy.

Leslie declined an interview when reached by phone. McCloy did not respond to an email or phone messages left for him. Hodge did not respond to a Facebook message and the number for his church had no voicemail set up. In addition to his pastoral duties with the church, Hodge also serves as the chaplain for the Barry County Sheriff's Department, according to his Linked-In profile. Sheriff Dar Leaf has been a central figure in election denial circles and identifies himself as a "constitutional" sheriff, meaning he believes he is the ultimate law enforcement agent in the county. Leaf came under scrutiny when pictures surfaced of him on stage at an anti-COVID measures protest in Grand Rapids with some of the men accused of plotting to kidnap Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. The seven-member Maple Val-

The seven-member Maple Valley school board was expected to consider and vote on approving the formation of the extracurricular GSA after one more committee meeting. A review of the board's bylaws and policies put an end to that plan, Katherine Bertolini, the superintendent of the Maple Valley School District.

"I think that was everyone's understanding at the time. But as I have dug into our administrative guidelines, it doesn't really require a board vote to authorize a club, at all," she said. The principal will now make that decision, but it's unclear if the group will be approved.


Bertolini said that there were "outbursts" from people on both sides of the Gay Straight Alli-


ance discussion "that need to be redirected on both sides."

Terpening said that opponents who spoke during public comment referred to GSA advocates as "MAPs."

"I didn't even know what that meant," she said. "I had to ask one of the youth from our group."



and LGBTQ sexual orientation have long been tied together by anti-LGBT activists, including Anita Bryant and her crusade in 1977 to roll back a local law protecting the LGBTQ community from discrimination. Bryant would go on to create the group "Save Our Children."

Just as Bertolini and school officials were getting their arms around the GSA controversy, a parent posted on Facebook an image of the graphic novel "Heartstopper," claiming it was required reading in a seventh-grade classroom.

Bertolini informed the school community on the district's website that the book was available from the classroom library but not required reading.

"The book in question in the post is a free read book," Bertolini wrote. "I hope parents regularly engage in conversations with their children about what they are reading, thinking and doing in their growth as youngsters and young adults."

Controversies over books have also become part of a larger national movement, often targeting LGBTQ-specific books as well as books related to race. Opponents of such books argue they want more parental choice in what books their children have access to and whether a child can read specific books. Dearborn Public Schools had a contentious board meeting over access to LGBTQ content last week. Fox 2 News reported that Republican leaders, such as Attorney General GOP nominee Matthew DePerno, were present for the debate.

"We're seeing this across the country," National Gay and Lesbian Task Force spokesperson Cathy Renna said. "And not just in red states."

Renna said the connection to pedophilia when discussing youth and LGBTQ issues is one used to stoke fear in parents.

"It's not like reading about gay people is going to turn anyone gay," Renna noted.

In fact, reading about LGBTQ people by heterosexual youth might turn them off.

A 2016 study published in The International Journal of Communication found that the response of heterosexual, cisgender youth exposed to a story of two 13-year-old gay characters was negative.

"For LGBTQ youth, the story evoked hope and fostered positive attitudes; however, it tended to produce a boomerang effect among heterosexual/ cisgender youth, eliciting the emotion of disgust and leading to significantly more negative attitudes toward LGBTQ people and issues," the study 469 youth concluded.

Jay Kaplan, staff attorney for the ACLU of Michigan LGBTQ+ Project, said controversies over books and student organizations are "spreading like wildfire" across the nation and the state.

"It is both disheartening and disconcerting seeing school boards and school districts under attack for being inclusive and supportive of all students, including LGBTQ students," Kaplan said. "The groups who are engaging in these attacks do not represent the views of a majority of the community that want their kids to learn about our country's history and the diversity of its people. These attacks represent censorship and marginalization of community members, as well as raise serious constitutional issues."

GOP gubernatorial nominee Tudor Dixon accused Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, a Democrat, of wanting to put biological boys in little girls' locker rooms and pushing a "sex and gender agenda." She's called for legislation to ban transgender youth from participating in sports based on their gender identity and expression. She wants legislation similar to a law signed by Florida Gov.

Rick DeSantis that has been dubbed the "Don't Say Gay" law. That law prohibits educators from discussing sexuality in grades K-3, and then only as age appropriate after that. Teachers in Florida who break that law could face the loss of their licenses.

Dixon called for the resignation of Michael Rice, the state's supintendent of public instruction, over allegations that the Michigan Department of Education was instructing teachers to not disclose a child's sexual orientation or gender identity to the child's parents — even if the child is suicidal. It's a deliberate manipulation of the video obtained by a conservative news outlet. The instructors in the video explicitly tell teachers they are required by law to report suicidal issues to parents and beyond. The training tells educators that the concerns about suicidality can be raised without "outing" or disclosing the youth's sexuality or gender identity.

Strouse, the vice president of the nonprofit rural support group I'll Be Your Rock, didn't allow her 11-year-old son to ride on the float Friday out of concern for his safety.

"He was disappointed," she said. "Very disappointed."

The reason? Her son, Landree Kaminski, has declared himself gay, disclosing to adults and some youth in the community.

He said when he came out at 10, he felt "free."

"For me, I just know," he said of his sexuality.

"I just felt like I understood myself more," he said in an interview at his mother's workplace Saturday afternoon. He was dressed in a light pink patterned dress shirt, white windbreaker with rainbows, and bright pink pants and shoes. Strouse's boyfriend, Ethan Oslund, sat next to Kaminski throughout the interview. "I also felt like I was more myself."

He attends a one-room charter school in Oneida Township, but he and his family will face a decision next year as he finishes sixth grade and prepares for entry to a school district for seventh grade. Maple Valley is an option, Strouse said.

Despite not attending the school district yet, he's watching the political attacks closely. Those attacks, he said, do make him scared "a little."

And he has an opinion about the kerfluffle on LGBTQ youth and books.

"I think it's just kind of outrageous because, like, just let people be who they want to be," he said. "Just leave them alone. There's nothing you can do about it."

A flurry over furries in Grand Ledge school board race

The three conservative candidates for the Grand Ledge school board have earned themselves a nickname: the Kitty Litter Caucus.

That's because two of them are pushing a discredited claim that the schools are providing litter boxes in school bathrooms for self-identifying "furries" to use.

Furries are a subculture of people who roleplay as anthropomorphized animal characters.

Conservative candidate Kim LaForet, a local real estate agent, has claimed in at least three board meetings that the schools were providing litter boxes for furry-identifying students. The district has denied the allegation.

"These were not rumors," Laforet said during public comment at a Sept. 26 board meeting. "A Grand Ledge teacher informed us of the kitty litter incident but asked that we not use their name out of fear of retaliation."

District spokesperson John Ellsworth denied the allegations by LaForet and fellow conservative candidate Jason Devenbaugh.

"I taught at the high school for 20 years," he said. "Never, not once, was a litter box reported by students or faculty that I was aware of. In my five years at central office, I have only heard about the litter boxes, I believe, at public comment. We do not put litter boxes in the bathroom. And have not. Nor would we."

LaForet first began accusing the district of putting kitty litter boxes in bathrooms on Feb. 14 during a school board meeting when she announced she was seeking a seat in the Nov. 8 election.

Three seats are up for election. The conservative slate of Devenbaugh and Ashley Oneil are seeking full six-year terms, and Kim Laforet is seeking a partial four-year term. They are running against incumbent Denise Dufort

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and Ashley Kuykendoll for the six-year slots and Toni Hughes Glascoe, who is seeking the four-year term.

LaForet made her first claim in the middle of February.

"I have heard about so many more things, including litter boxes in the bathrooms that were taken out afterwards for kids who identify as furries," she said.

Board member Sara Clark-Pierson took a jab at LaForet at the end of the Feb. 14 meeting.

"I want to say, Kim LaForet, you are running for school board, and I congratulate you on that. But, my God, you just got completely pranked. That is absurd you were pranked by a bunch of internet silliness."

LaForet attempted to defend herself and rushed the podium during Clark-Pierson's comments, causing the chair to gavel her out of order.

But LaForet returned to the school board meeting Feb. 28 to double down on the claims. Devenbaugh, as well as his wife, stated during the meeting their daughter had been "barked" at by furries. In the Sept. 26 meeting, LaForet called



for a censure of Pierson-Clarke for continuing to point out LaForet was spreading false information about the schools by discussing the kitty litter box allegations. The board took no action on that call.

Pols in the Lansing community have taken to calling the conservative trio the Kitty Litter Caucus, said Adrian Hemond, CEO of Grassroots Midwest, a political consulting firm that is uninvolved in the Grand Ledge school race.

Old Union Depot, 637 E. Michigan Ave., Lansing

Locals will recognize this week's Eye Candy as Clara's, a popular restaurant on Michigan Avenue for nearly 40 years before closing in 2016. The building has recently secured new tenants: Starbucks and Michigan-based restaurant Bobcat Bonnie's. Starbucks is now open, and Bobcat Bonnie's is expected to open its doors this coming spring to serve brunch and more.

The old Union Depot received a facelift by owner the Gillespie Group in preparation for its reopening. Notable changes include a new slate-colored roof, upgraded sidewalks and landscaping, and a fresh paint job on the sleeper rail car parked nearby. Its Tudor-inspired design still shines through; limestone arches pop against the red brick and grey roof and new windows breathe life back into the wonderfully asymmetrical structure. Globe lights are a nice finishing touch for the exterior. Inside, its famous quarter-sawed red oak finish has been retained.

Union Depot has been on the National Register of Historic Places since 1995. It operated as a railroad passenger station beginning in 1902, serving as the Lansing station for the Michigan Central and Pere Marquette railroads. After World War II, automobile use increased and the development of the interstate highway system significantly reduced demand for passenger rails. Transportation service ceased at Union Station in 1971. Fortunately, its contribution to Lansing as a beautiful building with rich history continues. **JAMES KNARIAN**

Heading into the final three weeks of the campaign, U.S. Rep. Elissa Slotkin's war chest has quite a bit more in it than Republican state Sen. Tom Barrett's. As reported by the Detroit Free Press and according to recently filed campaign finance reports in the 7th Congressional district race, Slotkin had close to \$4 million on hand on Sept. 30, compared to around \$120,000 for Barrett. During the quarter, she raised \$1.9 million, for nearly \$9 million total this election cycle. Barrett, meanwhile, reported raising \$670,195 for the three-month period and about \$2 million for the cycle through his main campaign committee and a separate fund.

An Eaton County judge who supervises the county's sobriety treatment court appears to have a personal relationship with a convicted felon whose record includes three intoxicated **driving convictions.** As reported by the Lansing State Journal, Timothy Pitcher III, 32, was found on June 26 in a vehicle parked in the driveway of District Judge Julie O'Neill's Charlotte-area home with an

open alcohol container. Michigan State Police troopers were investigating threats he was accused of making against an exwife in Lansing earlier that day, according to a police report. Pitcher's ex-wife told police Pitcher was staying with his girlfriend, O'Neill, in Charlotte. Police located O'Neill's address before finding Pitcher in the driveway of the home, according to a police report.




Prolific audiobook narrator Dick Hill, who narrated more than 1,000 audiobooks during a lengthy career, has died. Hill, 74, died Oct. 4, months after choosing to forgo an aggressive form of chemotherapy, a decision he shared publicly. Hill's rich baritone was the voice behind more than 1,000 books, including Jack Reacher and Harry Bosch novels, and gave life to works from authors such as Dave Barry, Lee

Child, Michael Connelly, Dean Koontz, Pat Conroy and Nora Roberts. He was also a fixture on the Greater Lansing theater scene.

Well-known conservative commentator Candace Owens attacked the "trans agenda," "climate alarmism" and higher education during a recent speech at Michigan State University that drew hundreds of spec-



some were turned away when the hall ran out of space. While Owens had supporters, including some students, protests from MSU community members began in tandem with the event. About 20 protesters inside the lecture hall interrupted Owens minutes into her appearance, but attendees quickly drowned then out. The protesters were removed by police after about two minutes of chanting.



Lansing police recently released video footage from an incident where Lansing officers fatally shot a 31-year-old man outside of a residence near Interstate 496. Terrence Robinson died from gunshot wounds Oct. 4 after an encounter with police outside a home in the 2000 block of West Malcolm X Street. "What we are showing you today is meant to provide a level of transparency that both allows the community to better understand the deadly encounter faced by the officers, the witnesses and the citizens on Oct.

4, while at the same time not impeding the Michigan State police investigation," Police Chief Ellery Sosebee said in a video voiceover. Sosebee identified the two officers who fired their weapons as Dan Salinaz and Nicholas Zuber, who have two and eight years of experience, respectively. In accordance with LPD's policy, the officers were placed on paid leave pending an investigation into the shooting.



A former Capital Area Transit Authority bus driver recently convicted on sexual assault charges in Lansing went on to work for the Ann Arbor public transit system despite the charges, the man's attorney alleged. The



59-year-old public bus driver, Magdi Mustafa Yousif, will spend 16 to 24 months in a Michigan prison for a 2014 sexual assault against a then-20-year-old female passenger. Yousif worked for TheRIDE, Ann Arbor's public transit authority, from 2015 until Oct. 5, when he

was sentenced. At sentencing, County Circuit Judge Rosemarie Aquilina called him a predator and his crimes "heinous." A spokesman for TheRIDE disputed the attorney's claim that CATA and TheRIDE officials had discussed the charges before he was hired in Ann Arbor. "TheRide hired Mr. Yousif prior to criminal charges being filed," TheRIDE spokesperson wrote by email. "All new hires undergo a criminal background check. No criminal charges or convictions were attributable to Mr. Yousif at the time of hire." All routes for TheRIDE go through the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor campus.

Looking at the first two state proposals on the General Election ballot, the phrase "don't let the perfect become the enemy of the good" comes to mind.

Neither Proposal 1 nor Proposal 2 is perfect. We'd prefer to see a different term limits scheme and more collaborative approach to a better election system, but both are improvements to the status quo, so we're urging a "yes" vote

on both. We've previously endorsed Proposal 3 on reproductive rights.

Proposal 1 re-jiggers legislative term limits and creates, for the first time, some level of personal financial disclosure for state public officials.

First of all, this is a proposal crafted

and promoted by Lansing insiders. There is no way around that. Special interest groups across the political aisle want this to pass because the Michigan state House is not functioning well.

Proposal 1's crafters work in state government. They know state government. You can call it the "swamp" if you want, but they know what's going on. If you want to fix anything, you rely on experts in the field to assist. You don't call a plumber to do your taxes. You don't call an accountant to pump water out of your basement.

Yes, organized labor and the business community have a vested interest in seeing people stay longer in the Legislature, but that doesn't mean it's not a good idea.

The truth is limiting a person to six years in the state House of Representatives, as our current state constitution reads, means average House member spends their first two-year term figuring out what they're doing. The second term is figuring out what they're doing it. The third term is figuring out what's next in life.

The churn is constant. The ideas don't change. New people pick up the baton of those who preceded, but they need time to get up to speed. Spending a night in a Holiday Inn Express doesn't prepare you for the job of a state representative.

Not every community is fortunate enough to have a Sarah Anthony, for example, someone who was a legislative staffer, served in county government and hit the ground running upon taking office.

Allowing state representatives to serve six two-year terms in the House makes much more sense. Allowing state senators to serve three four-year

terms in the Senate makes much more sense.

What makes more sense is financial disclosure. Michigan is one of only two states without it. Today, we need to trust the word of legislators that they don't have a conflict of interest when voting on an issue. We need more than faith.

We wish the proposal would require more exact numbers on assets. We are concerned the Legislature — in doing the required follow-up legislation — will require such wide reporting bands that the eventual public information won't be as meaningful. But, again, something is better than nothing.

On Proposal 2. We're supportive of initiatives that make it easier for people to participate in the voting process. Allowing a signed affidavit in lieu of an ID is good. Nine days of early voting is good. More ballot drop boxes are good. Election audits are good. Giving our overseas military a little leeway in voting is good.

A yes on Proposal 2 is needed.

However, cluttering up the Constitution with this level of nuts and bolts is not good. These are specific policies that deserve to be in front of voters through a citizens initiative that would become part of state law. From there a super-majority of the Legislature could fine-tune them when needed.

The marijuana legalization proposal is a good example. A bipartisan coalition of legislators have tinkered with the that law to make it better.

On the other hand, voters chiseled the Citizens Independent Redistricting Commission into the Constitution. While the commission was a net positive for the process, it's much more difficult to make changes. At this moment, these commissioners are making \$55,755 a year to do close to nothing, and there's nothing anybody can do about it.

Also, Proposal 2 was crafted and bankrolled behind the scenes with shady

dark money from the enigmatic Sixteen Thirty Fund. Clerks were not consulted in its crafting. If they were, allowing for early processing and tabulation of absentee ballots with proper security and oversight would have been part of the



Congratulations to the micromanaging Michigan State University Board of Trustees for making the job of president so undesirable that the office's current occupant is quitting a year and a half early and leaving at least \$1.5 million in salary on the table.

Nearly a year ago today the MSU board members felt so highly of Dr. Samuel Stanley that they gave

him a 20% raise. Last week, Stanley gave MSU his 90-day notice, weeks after the board's junior members worked to show him the door, despite the public objections of Chair Dianne Byrum and their most

experienced trustee, Melanie Foster.

Stanley's offenses? Not keeping some board members up to speed on some Title IX reporting requirements while supporting the demotion of Business School Dean Sanjay Gupta, who didn't strictly adhere to the school's sexual harassment protocols.

So, which is it? Is Stanley too lax when it comes to reporting or too strict? Or is it that Stanley didn't check in with some board members before making his executive decisions?

The word "micro-managing" came out of Stanley's lips during his farewell video, and we'll go with that since he's the only one who's talking.

The board kicked out a sanitized public statement that told us nothing. All eight members have hit the bunker, hoping the storm will blow over.

We'd wait for the next public hearing, but we know from past experience that the board's longstanding practice of conducting all of their important discussions behind closed doors isn't changing. Far be it for this board to run anything better than a tightly scripted performance as its "public" meeting.

Something needs to change here, and we're not talking about the president's position.

This insular MSU Board of Trustees is out of control. They are running this public, taxpayer-funded university through another ring of Larry Nassar hell without publicly explaining themselves.

If a Harvard-trained physician with prior university leadership experience and broad support from MSU faculty and students isn't whom this board is looking for, who is?

And how did the board go from giving Stanley a \$160,000-a-year raise to wanting him gone in 10 months? How can this board pour hundreds of thousands of dollars into independent investigations that relitigate a decision from the provost?

How can publicly elected public officials be so reckless with taxpayer money? What is the quality of the individual who will want to become MSU's next president under these toxic dynamics? Who wants to be a puppet for an arrogant board that is accountable to nobody but party hacks, that is listening to nobody, that doesn't seem to care what anybody else thinks and that clearly has no idea what it's doing.

We stand with the Michigan State Faculty Senate and give our vote of no confidence to this board.

We see no evidence that Tebay, Scott, Rema Vassar, Pat O'Keefe or Dan Kelley are cut out for the position they are holding. We hoped the addition of Vassar and O'Keefe in 2021 would help turn the page to positive reforms that put the heinous acts of Nassar far in the rearview mirror.

The canned statement she issued through the Democratic Party after Stanley's departure announcement left a lot to be desired. Like most of the rest of this cloistered group of eight, she serves as more of an example of why big reforms are needed for the board than a reason she deserves to continue on it.

We do support Democrat Dennis Denno, whose grasp on reality and his knowledge of the Legislature, where he worked for 17 years, will benefit the board.

It is clearer than ever that a constitutional amendment making the trustees an appointed position, as opposed to an elected position, is sorely needed.

The state Constitution requires the governing boards of MSU, the University of Michigan and Wayne State University be elected among candidates nominated by political parties. For Democrats, the process typically yields former athletes, boosters, union officials or folks who would diversify the ticket. For Republicans, it's political ideologues or people lucky enough to have with solid Irish surnames.

The polls also show Republicans are starting to warm to Dixon. The Oct. 10-12 survey from Cygnal for the Michigan Association of Broadcasters had 7% of voters without an opinion of Tudor Dixon. Last month, 32% of voters didn't have an opinion of Dixon, according to an EPIC-MRA survey for the Detroit Free Press.

From August until now, Dixon's favorability number has gotten higher as the number of those without an opinion of her has gone down.

As for undecided numbers. The CBS/You.gov survey had 0.4% undecided, which is hard to believe, but with a +/- 3.6% margin of error, the poll allows for the real number to be as high as 4%.

The Oct. 12-14 Emerson College poll has a 4% margin of error +/-3%, which means the undecided is between 7% and 1%.

You get the idea. In the grand scheme of the population, there aren't many undecided voters.

Estimation is a tough business. Fiscal forecasts during the height of the COVID pandemic were all over the place. Bids for contracts are routinely revised because something comes up. Construction contractors try to set realistic deadlines, but sometimes it doesn't happen.

Nobody is perfect, including pollsters, who certainly are not in business to put out inaccurate numbers. They're trying the best they can with a Republican voter base that has been thrilled about answering surveys for a while.

Pollsters are changing how they collect data with the rise of smart phones. Landlines have become a museum exhibit.

So, where are we with this gubernatorial race? The governor is up a little bit. It's going to be close.



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

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

"Growth is not linear." That's music business advice you'll receive from Of Virtue, a seasoned and road-tested metal band. Over the past three years, the group has fought through many challenges but has also made some inspiring and remarkable leaps forward.

Pre-pandemic, the band was performing to a swelling international fanbase. Of Virtue became ardent road warriors, touring over 30 countries on three continents. Not surprisingly, that all came to a halt. After a January 2020 gig at The Loft, things went quiet. The shutdown devastated them and touring bands across the map - it even led to The Loft permanently closing.

But the band fought through it and is back on its skyward track. Of Virtue, which comprises Tyler Ennis (vocals), Damon Tate (guitar, vocals), Michael Valadez (guitar) and Ryan Trin (drums), signed to A Rising Empire in Spring 2022. It's a welcomed bit of news for the cautiously optimistic outfit.

"Success, or however you perceive it, can come in a lot of different forms," Tate said. "Nobody wishes COVID, a worldwide panic or an economic crisis on anybody. If you do have to take

something away from it, for us, it was taking a few steps backward in order to take that step forward."

In August, the label released the "Sinner" EP and a video for the title track. Their arsenal of new tunes has been spun on Sirius XM Octane and 31 FM stations, including Lansing's Q-106. Globally, streams exceed 10 million. YouTube views are over 1.75 million.

For band members, these astounding numbers reflect the hard work they and their label have put in. They've come a long way since their debut, 2009's "To Breathe Again" EP.

leased via Sharptone Records.

"Damon and I have always bounced ideas back and forth, and whenever Mike was available, he would do that also," Ennis said. This whole process for the EP, and moving forward, is a lot different. This was different because it wasn't just ideas we wrote at home and brought to the studio; it was just that most of the songs we wrote and recorded over the last 2.5 years have been a collective writing session."

Tate said that with this collaborative go-around, prepping the new music felt like a return to Of Virtue's early days.

Back then, "you'd just show up at people's houses, sit there, hanging out, enjoying their company, and something might or might not get done," Tate re-

called. "We needed the breath of fresh air in some aspects. It was a cool process - everybody contributing from the ground floor and spitball ideas."

When it came to the new music's themes, the band also saw some of their personal growth seep into the tracks.

"There were some things all of us needed to unpack," Tate said. "In the case of 'Sinner,' where it's talking more about the addictive side of myself personally, we don't normally go into this realm of these topics. But in this case, we had to get comfortable with that un-comfortability.

"You try to dress up as a musician, and you need metaphors, but sometimes you can just be as direct as possible so that when people hear it, they understand and connect to it," he added.

While the music is catchy and melodic, the lyrics get dark and visceral, according to Tate. Keeping that honesty and transparency concerning mental health is an integral part of the band and keeps them going.

"It's what we set out to do," Ennis said. "I think the best thing for our band, and one of the things that sets us apart, is the fact that we try to have a message sent through our lyrics and music."

Before COVID, when the band could tour, many of their favorite moments on the road took place while meeting fans. But when face-to-face interaction with strangers became frowned upon, and concerts became super-spreaders, the band was forced to interact with their fans in other ways. Enter social media, where the band shared different aspects of their lives, including personal anecdotes.

"We always want to promote that kind of stuff," Ennis said. "That it's OK not to be OK. I know it's cliché to say that, but I have felt a lot better from talking with people. We've had people message us personally and say, 'Hey, I was going through a really rough time, and this song helped me out.' It's very humbling, and it's a very good feeling."

Another humbling moment came from a career highlight, playing WRIF's Riff Fest at Pine Knob in Clarkson last month, opening up for Disturbed and In This Moment. Growing up, the band attended many outdoor rock shows at the legendary amphitheater. Now, the band's upcoming local show at Double Clutch is on their minds.

"It feels a little foreign almost because we haven't played here in so long, but people have kept up to date with us, which is awesome," Tate said. "Everybody that's coming to play the show is excited."

Of course, Tate is also excited to showcase the band's all-around growth evolution on their home turf in front of friends, family and longtime fans.

"There's no way you can come out of the past couple of years and be the same person," he said. "It's just impossible. The music is different. The tone is different. The image is different. We have to change for our live show to change. I think everything has only gone up since then. We'll see what happens from here."

So, what do I recommend? In no particular order, here's a quick cheat sheet of seven incredible edibles: Lions Labs Potdots: Chocolate Candies

Starting "low and slow" is the best advice you can give to any stoner. Lion Labs, located here in Lansing, has taken that concept a step farther with its new product, Potdots. These little sugar-shelled milk chocolate candies are the perfect way to find the proper dosage for you. Each Potdot contains 1 mg of THC, making it microdosable and customizable to each individual. No more worrying about if the edible will

> get you too lit in front of your parents.

The folks at Banned must also have that same issue — hence why they created their infused Cookie Creampies. Featuring flavors like oatmeal, chocolate chip and birthday cake, these delicacies taste as sweet as a Little Debbie. Banned offers these in both 100 mg and 200 mg options.

Detroit Edibles THC Fudge: Chocolate Baked Good

Michigan is a state known for its incredible homemade fudge, and the Detroit THC Fudge from Detroit Edibles



owns this legacy. Their decadent chocolate square is probably the best fudge I've ever had. It melts in your mouth and provides one of the most euphoric body highs I've ever had after an edible. My wife and I were laughing over nothing after splitting the 100 mg fudge, so you know I'm also going to stock up on their new 200 mg option.

MotorCity Cannabites Pretzels: Savory Snack

plete without a bag of pretzels, and MotorCity Cannabites is taking tailgating to the next level with its new line of infused pretzel sticks. Each stick is about 2 inches and contains 2.5 mg of THC. Overall, each bag contains 100 mg. These things taste so good that I almost ate the whole bag myself. (The MSU vs OSU game is a little hazy, but probably for the best.) I enjoyed the garlic parmesan pretzels, but I plan to explore some other flavors soon, such as Honey Mustard and Hot Sauce.

MKX Xnuts: Savory Snack

While on the topic of savory snacks, let's talk mixed nuts. It's an edible I would've never thought could be infused. Thankfully, the brains at MKX got toasted and came out with their new line of Xnuts, cinnamon-toasted almonds, cashews and peanuts. Each nut contains 5 mg of THC, with 20 nuts per package, making it another excellent microdose option.

Errlking Pot Rocks: Candy

Adding to the list of "Things I Never Thought You Could Put Weed In" is Pot Rocks. Inspired by the popping candy of yesteryear, Pot Rocks makes you feel nostalgic and high. What's cool about this is that by sucking on the candy, consumers absorb the THC through the soft tissue in the mouth. When absorbed sublingually like this, the THC hits your bloodstream faster than eating and digesting a typical edible. Pot Rocks are available in blueberry, cherry and green apple flavors and come in two dosages: 25 mg packs and 100 mg packs.

Chill Medicated Syrup: Beverage

Infused syrups have become another fun alternative in the edible category. Chill Medicated has created an impressive line of medicated syrups. Folks can either use the measuring cap and ingest the syrup by itself or combine it with water, soda or another beverage. Flavor options are strawberry, grape and cherry, and they come in 100 mg and 200 mg bottles.

These are only a handful of options of what's available in Lansing dispensaries right now. With Halloween just around the corner, now is the perfect time to grab some infused treats and enjoy another beautiful fall in Michigan.

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'Raising Bean' raises consciousness about Indigenous people and in his essay, "Gratitude," h retells the traditional story of th Coyote and Prairie Dogs to Bean

W.S. Penn's new book, "Raising Bean," is a written testament to Native American storytelling. Penn wrote the collection of essays for his granddaughter Bean (Clare) in the form of conversations as a guide to Native perspectives on life.

Penn dubbed his granddaughter

"Bean," who is 7, while she was still in the womb. "Using the nickname Bean became a habit when my daughter was pregnant, and the little thing was growing inside her," he said.

In the book's William S. Penn first essay, "In

the Nick of Names," Penn explores not only the history of nicknames but their importance in culture, family life and friendships.

He writes: "Names have power. They describe for the rest of the world either a relationship to family or an expectation. Accidental or not, kids — often-with uncanny, innate and unarticulated purpose — grow up to inhabit their names to become the meaning their names have given them for all sorts of their available lives."

In his essays, Penn draws heavily on the oral tradition of his Nez Perce tribal customs, where stories were passed down from his grandfather, who ran away at age 13 from an Oklahoma Indian boarding school that later became Haskell Indian School. Official school records say he deserted. Penn was raised in the 1950s in a housing project near the LaBrea Tar Pits in Lo Angeles, a far cry from how Native Americans were portrayed with traditional headdresses. "I chose the book's subtitle, 'Essays on Laughing and Living,' because I didn't want to sound like a lecture. I wanted Clara Bean to find something she could laugh about."

"Life has a lot of humor. I wasn't supposed to live at birth, but I'm still here, and that's pretty funny to me," he said.

Penn's road to Michigan State University, where he taught in the English Department until he retired, was circuitous. He was living in New York when he attended the famous Yaddo writers and artists program there and met a man who was teaching at MSU. Penn joined the faculty there in 1987 on a tenure track. "I had a wonderful experience at MSU," he said.

The oral tradition of Native Americans is important to Penn. He points to his grandfather as helping carry on that tradition "where facts don't matter as much as how facts are told."

"Our family liked to say my grandfather deserted from the Indian School, and we never knew what day he was born, so we created one: Thanksgiving," Penn said. Penn's granddaughter Bean has even anointed him with a nickname: "Bumpa," after he bumped his head on some furniture.

"I like to think I have a strong background in the oral tradition of storytelling," he said. It's clear that is the case, and in his essay, "Gratitude," he retells the traditional story of the Coyote and Prairie Dogs to Bean. The coyote-dog story, in essence, is about commercialism, jealousy and how it backfires on the prairie dogs.


In "Gratitude," Penn helps define storytelling and how it is refined and changed over time. He writes how Bean asks him to tell a story over and over: "She wants to hear how the story will change details and events because the stories aren't memorized and told only one way ... and stories told over and over become legends until they are so ingrained in a community's soul that they become myths that tells us how a community is."

In his life and career, Penn says, he was cautious not to become what he calls "a professional Indian," and he re-

tells that story in the essay "A Harvest Moon," which details an Indian's visit to his granddaughter's classroom. In that essay, he informs his granddaughter about the subtle and not-so-subtle ways in how Native American, Indian and Indigenous are used interchangeably and decisions are made about how they should be used.

As he walks in for the school show, Penn brings a beaded handbag, a Kachina, a Hopi pot and a Navaho marriage pot to illustrate his talk and, as is the case, the stories a phantasmagoric. As he ends, a student says, "That's a stupid story, and that's not true." In a fictional recasting of the event, he replies to the student, "It won't ever be for you."

Even though Penn says that "I'm too old to write another book," he's start-

> ed on a young adult novel. "It's hard keeping the language aimed at 10 to 14-year-olds," he said.

> In his career at Michigan State University, Penn won the distinguished Faculty Award and authored several books, including "All My Sins are Relatives" and "Feathering Custer."

All of Penn's books are witty, acerbic and filled with modern-day absurdities told by an author who stands in two worlds. Bean, who has not read the books yet, will soon be old enough to begin, and that's when the fun will begin.



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

a brick-and-mortar location near the shop's humble beginnings inside the market. The store's expansion is a part of Lansing's literary boom that saw seven indie bookshops open amid the pandemic. But Jajuga said her interest in books and literature goes back well before the shutdown.

"I have a bunch of memories about

interacting with books at a young age," Jajuga said, "including hiding books in my room in case I got grounded since my parents figured out the most effective punishment was to remove them."

While living in Chicago, Jajuga frequented many niche bookstores with varied vibes.

"I realized there were a lot of cool concepts that bookstores employed that might be novel in the mid-Michigan area," she said. The idea got filed away for some time as Jajuga got busy managing an independent journal, Open Palm Print.

After starting a hiking group in the winter of 2020, Jajuga was chatting with Peffer Bennet, who casually suggested starting a bookshop. For Peffer Bennet, a doctoral candidate in English at Michigan State University, becoming a writer and bookseller was a dream come true.

"After reading 'Lord of the Rings' and realizing I couldn't be an elf, I thought being a writer and bookseller would be the next best thing," she said.

The duo began scouting downtown

Lansing, window-shopping for potential sites. After a tip from a friend about an MSU Surplus online auction of several pallets of books, they placed a winning bid for 1,000 titles.

"We started doing pop-ups," Jajuga recalled. "As we like to say serendipitously, it just so happens our very first pop-up was in the building we now occupy when it was still Soul Nutrition."

After carting books around all summer at festivals and special events, the

duo joined the initial cohort of small business incubators inside the Middle Village Micro Market in the fall of 2021. After a retail space opened up a few blocks down the street, the duo jumped at the chance to write the next chapter of their book business.

The 2,000-square-foot space carries carefully curated new and used book selections and literary events with a mission to support the wide-ranging storytelling community. Featured titles at A

> Novel Concept spotlight underrepresented voices and perspectives from women, BIPOC, LGBTQ+, Indigenous people, international authors and local writers.

> "We plan to work toward expanding these offerings, especially those produced by local vendors," Jajuga said. "We are also excited about collaborating with the fantastic artist Sara Pulver, who will open her retail studio space inside our shop for November and December."

> Beyond the thriving local book community, the duo hopes to do their part in the strong revitalization efforts in the capital area.

"We want to help make Lansing a city that folks don't just bypass on their way to Grand Rapids or Detroit or up north," Jajuga said.

'Corktown': An earnest but sloppy exploration of gentrification

On paper, the plot and themes of playwright Jeff Augustin's work "Cork-

town, Or Through the Valley of Dry Bones" is an intriguing play for Michigan



the Corktown neighborhood as it goes through the gentrification process that displaces minority residents.

This theme plays out in urban settings across the nation, and a story that exposes the downside of urban revitalization should be an important piece. Unfortunately, "Corktown" is not that piece.

Guided by Jackee (Rashad Bates), a 14-year-old resident of Corktown whose side hustle is giving tours to urban decay fanatics, the audience is guided through the neighborhood's gentrification and the changing lives of its residents.

The script is earnest but sloppy. Augustin chose to model the play after Thorton Wilder's "Our Town," which could be an effective model if done well. It seems like Augustin wants to objectively present multiple sides of the gentrification struggle through a range of characters who react differently to the change.

The well-intentioned Clarke (Ben Barber) intends to open a gallery in Corktown to help spark a renaissance, but his actions eventually and improbably spark a fire. Disaffected tagger Atlas (Bashar Byrouthy) embraces the change, horrifying his girlfriend Phylicia (Nakayla Morgan) when she returns home from university to find too much change for her taste.

The conflict over the gentrification of Corktown culminates in some acts of violence that lack gravitas. In the final act, the script jumps to the future, and the scene is split between the ghosts of residents talking in a graveyard while two of the newly gentrified residents drink coffee in a chichi café. This scene is highly discombobulating, as the characters in both scenarios talk over each other, and key plot points are lost depending

on which group the viewer tries to focus on.

Perhaps some of the script issues would have been less frustrating if the overall production was better.

From the opening lines, it was clear that some of the cast was not prepared to project their voices to overcome the cavernous nature of the Pasant Theatre. The pacing was often an issue, as characters delivered lines too fast to be understood or trailed off as they departed the stage.

The play is not without some bright spots. Jewell Redman is terrific as Cor-

ner Prophet or "Proph." A combination of town crier, local historian and news source for Corktown, Proph is the heart and soul of the neighborhood, and her eventual departure is a truly moving scene. Michale Coffey is very

Kasee Arnett's scenic design is eye-popping,

further enhanced by Nicklas Casella's fantastic lighting design. The use of music by the MSU Gospel Choir is a nice touch.

Director Chamara Jewel Kwakye's program notes indicate this is an important story to tell, and that is true. Unfortunately, "Corktown" is not strong enough to make us worry about similar things happening in our town.

When I was a student at Sexton High School, we had an hour-long lunch and an open campus. My friends and I frequented the usual suspects on West Saginaw, including a now-defunct Blimpie location that today, in a totally different

Choupli Wood-Fired Kabob.

In a way, Choupli is like Subway for Middle Eastern food. Your food is prepared in front of you, and fried items are made to order. On a recent visit, I chose a halloumi and mushroom

chunks of one of my favorite cheeses, halloumi. This cheese can withstand high heat and becomes irresistibly gooey and decadent when

shawarma wrap (\$6.99). He hailed it as "one of the most affordfrom downtown Lansing, where we both work, to Choupli is quick that we'd ever do that.

But, no worries. The kofta at Choupli is fantastic. It's moist, juicy and well-spiced. He ordered it like an absolute pro, with sides of fries, house salad and rice. One of the world's best condiments is garlic sauce, and a bite that includes both kofta and a French fry with a dip in garlic sauce cannot be beaten. The crispiness of the fries, the meatiness of the kofta and the tang of the garlic is a tantalizing combination.

I chose the veggie kabob plate (\$10.29) and loaded it with more salad, hummus and rice. I've been trying to be much more mindful about incorporating meatless meals into my diet, and I find that when I pair my vegetables with a starch-like rice and a healthy fat like hummus, I don't miss the animal protein. This checked all pickled turnips on my salad because I love the

What to expect if you haven't been to Choupli?

A quick meal. It is fast and casual. You place your order and pick it up at the counter before sitting down. Fried items take a few extra minutes to prepare, but everything else is ready, and the line moves quickly. For under \$20, you can have lunch for two if you're thrifty with the wrap options. But if you're hungrier than that, which I always am, two plates will still only set you back around \$25.

One of the things I love best about the Greater Lansing area is our absolute infatuation with Middle Eastern cuisine. I'm happy to have solid, delicious options from one side of town to the other.

On a return visit, Mr. She Ate leveled up and ordered the lamb kofta plate (\$12.29.) As one of the most expensive items on the menu, it comes with three sides and is still entirely reasonably priced. For those unfamiliar with kofta, imagine a cylindrical-shaped burger pattie spiced with allspice, coriander, cinnamon and cumin. It's melt-in-your-mouth delicious, but here's the thing about kofta: if it's dry, it's awful.

my share of fish and chips ... and one less-than-stellar traditional English breakfast.

However, I found the kabob shops a far more preferred option. In Europe's big cities, Mediterranean-inspired fare is found on roughly

every other corner. Meat piled high on spires or spits and shaved into pita bread offer sustenance for hungry bespoke suits during the day or sweaty, starving ques outside the club after long nights out (or so I've heard, wink-wink).

Here in the Lansing area, there are several quality restaurants, some local franchises, others strong independent operations that serve robust flavors rooted in the Mediterranean basin. These flavors

are influenced by a wide reach of nations from Algeria and Spain in the western Mediterranean Sea to Turkey, Syria, Iran and Iraq toward the East.

Choupli Wood-Fired Kabobs in Delta Township is a no-frills kabob shop with a handful of tables but lots of takeout traffic. Meals are ordered as either wraps (\$8.99-\$9.39) or plates with a choice of three sides (\$13.99-\$16.39). The staff is eager to please with spoon-heaping portions of side dishes onto your plate or to-go box. Choupli isn't as fancy as some of the other more well-known local Mediterranean restaurants, but for a quick pop-in and pick-up, it's on par with other kabob shops across the pond.

What's not on my plate

My better half enjoyed the soslu patlican, a tomato-based eggplant dish served cold. She said the sauce is faintly sweet and liberally smothers generous cubes of eggplant, chunky tomato and red pepper. She is spice-averse and had no complaint with the hint of spice in this dish, nor was there any comment about the often-overbearing oiliness that other soslu patlican's have.

I have continuously documented my wholehearted disdain for the devil's fruit (more commonly known as tomato), and this offering was no exception. The baba ganoush - a hummus lookalike that includes pureed eggplant instead of chickpeas - was a delight for my favorite dining partner. She said the olive oil and lemon juice played in the background allowing the roasted eggplant and tahini flavors to shine through.

What's good

The best Chicken shawarma in our area can be as debatable as the best pizza. Lots of people have strong opinions. Choupli makes a convincing argument to at least be in the conversation. Tender and succulent, it has a deep flavor profile that includes garlic, turmeric, cinnamon and cardamom. The meat rotates on a spit until crispy on the outside and is then shaved into a dish to continue simmering in its juices.

Choupli's shawarma is best enjoyed with the house-made garlic sauce. On the first visit, we loved it over the rice, and the second time with the bulgur wheat (a whole grain that's like a pilaf) was just as good.


The beef kabob was juicy, tender and smartly seasoned to let the quality of the meat speak for itself. The kabobs are grilled as you wait over coals on a skinny rectangular grill and paired to perfection, either as a wrap or over rice, with

the pickles and banana peppers made for an awesome sour and savory contrast. Side note: The soft pita bread is individually wrapped and ever-fresh. It is simply

delish every time. That consistency alone deserves acknowledgment. Best bite

The Lamb Kafta was very flavorful, with garlic and notes of cumin and other herbs. This ground lamb dish is shaped into a skewered oblong meatball. The garlic sauce was better on the shawarma (garlic overkill?), but when the lamb was combined with the pita dipped in olive oil drizzled hummus with a dusting of paprika, "yum" is all you can say.

Burning love

At the 12th annual Butte Bouldering Bash a few weeks back, rock climbers gathered to scramble up the crystal-flecked boulders that sprout from the earth along the Pipestone section of Montana's continental divide. Climbing requires much nourishment. Carbohydrates to keep you going, and protein to rebuild those tired muscles. And, just as important, we need the morale boost that good food can impart to keep us happy and excited to be in the game. Even climbers need flavor to keep us eating and stories to keep us engaged because food is more than mere fuel for the tank.

And that is why a private chef named Meg Koenig showed up at Boulder Bash headquarters, having driven from Bozeman with a rig full of warm food and intoxicating smells. Her taut, climber arms laid out a taco buffet with fillings of black bean mole and a blend of slowcooked lamb, beef and pork alongside steaming stacks of tortillas with all the fixings. The crown jewels of the spread were jars of fresh, flame-roasted salsa. There were visible flecks of charred goodness floating in the salsa, giving it a soulful, smoky look that you could almost taste through the glass. She agreed to share her salsa recipe but warned that it's a feeling as much as a formula.

She explained that the exact proportions are flexible and market-dependent, but certain elements, such as tomatoes and/or tomatillos, must be there. There must be onion, garlic, and chile peppers of varying types. Whatever you use must be charred.

I'm not typically a fan of blackened foods. Too often, it's overdone to the point where the food is burnt beyond recognition and burnt is the only flavor you can taste. But if we think of that burnt flavor as a seasoning, not the goal of the dish, it can work beautifully, in the same way that the right amount of salt can season a dish without making it taste salty.

Koenig's "Salsa Tatemada," which translates to "charred salsa," is bright and spicy with layers of sweetness, pungency, wafting herbal aromas and a chunky consistency that's punctuated by a bitter, burnt speck. These interlocking flavors practically beg for fat and protein for the salsa to enhance, but if you can handle the heat you add, the salsa works as a stand-alone dish. And if you close your eyes, the thick chunks of pepper have the mouthfeel of seafood.

Here is Koenig's recipe, followed by some notes of my own.

Montaña Salsa Tatemada

You can use tomatoes or tomatillos for this recipe – or both – and can be flexible with which type of chiles you use and the amount you add according to your heat tolerance. Mince, mash, press, or plane the garlic separately to ensure you don't have big chunks.



Ingredients: Makes about a quart of salsa 2 pounds tomatillos, tomatoes,

or a mix 1 fresh Serrano chile

1 fresh Hatch or Anaheim chile 1 fresh large poblano

1 fresh bell pepper 1 peeled large white onion (about 8 ounces)

4 cloves of garlic, peeled and chopped

Juice from 3 juicy limes 1/4 tsp smoked chipotle from

Burlap & Barrel 1 large handful of fresh basil or

cilantro

2 teaspoons salt

Start the grill or pre-heat the broiler. When hot, place the whole tomatillos, chiles and onion on the grill or under the broiler, and let the ingredients char for about 12 to 15 minutes, flipping about every three minutes. Pull them off the grill once cooked.

The tomatillos should be completely mushy as their skins start to break and their juices start to come out. The chiles should be wilted, charred black



and wrinkled. The onion should be darkened and softened. Keep the green pepper raw. Sometimes I use raw onion for a little more spice as well.

Place all the ingredients in a food processor and pulse until roughly chopped. Alternatively, chop it all finely by hand. Place

everything in a bowl, and add salt and lime juice. Mash and mix with a fork. Do not be afraid to add a little extra salt!

Serve immediately, or cover and refrigerate for up to five days. The salsa can be eaten cold, though it is best consumed at room temp or hot. If desired, you can reheat it in a small saucepan. This salsa will also freeze well for up to three months.

Notes:

While there are many ways to char the ingredients, I prefer under the broiler. This allows me to contain the juices that inevitably leak from the tomatoes and tomatillos by charring them on a tray, which catches the luscious liquids so I can add them to the salsa. I will even push on them with a plate to further extract the juices.

Getting onions right is tricky because charring them for too long renders the onions too soft and sweet for salsa. I cheat by using raw onions while separately charring some onion peel, which I add to the salsa.

When juicing limes, I always roll them hard against the counter, either with my hands or a cutting board, before juicing them. This increases the amount of juice that comes out.
