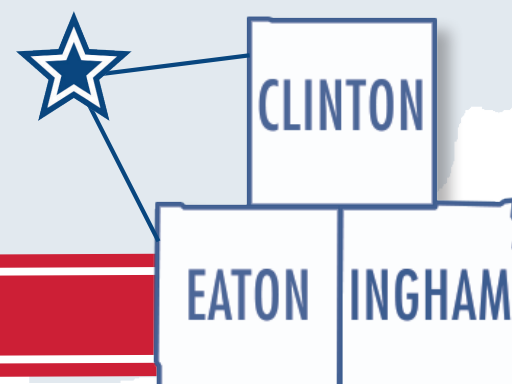

Election Day is November 5, 2024

➤ Absentee voter ballots available for voters September 26.

➤ Last day to register by mail or online October 21.

➤ New voter registrations required an in-person visit to your clerk’s office from October 22 - November 5.

➤ Early Voting period October 26 - November 3, but can be longer. Check with your local clerk.

Michigan has 2 Options to Vote Early

➤ At an early voting site prior to Election Day

➤ By using an absentee voter ballot prior to Election Day

Options for Straight Ticket or Split Ticket

Voters may “split” their ticket in the general election (November). Per the passage of Proposal 18-3 in 2018, Michigan voters also have the option to vote straight-ticket by selecting the option on the side of their ballot with partisan races. Voting straight ticket does not automatically include selections on the non-partisan side of the ballot.

WHO can vote? \*

➤ A United States citizen

➤ A Michigan resident (at the time you register) and a resident of your city or township for at least 30 days (when you vote)

➤ At least 18 years of age (when you vote)

➤ Not currently serving a sentence in jail or prison

\* To ensure accuracy, voting information has been copied with only minimal editing from the Michigan Secretary of State’s website.

What is Early Voting?

Early voting is the opportunity to cast a ballot in person at an early voting site before Election Day. For voters, the early voting experience will be similar to the experience of voting at a polling place on Election Day and will include feeding your completed ballot into a tabulator. To find your Early Voting Site go to Michigan.gov/vote and click on Early Voting or contact your local clerk.

What is Absentee Voting?

Absentee voting is the process of requesting a ballot from your city or township clerk, receiving and filling out the ballot, and then, returning the ballot to your city or township clerk, either in-person, in a secure ballot drop box or by mail. Be sure to follow the instructions and don’t forget to sign the return envelope.

You can also return your completed absentee ballot to an early voting site by checking in with election workers, then inserting your ballot into the tabulator.

I want to serve with integrity and a skillset that adds value to the responsibility of responding to each challenge. Broadband continues to be an issue across rural areas. Funding has been secured for a large portion in need. However, a stronger project management approach is necessary for the successful implementation of these funds. 2) Emergency services face rising costs and workforce shortages. Very few people are pursuing these careers. Rural communities suffer from small population densities and large distances, adding to the growing burden on tax payers. It is time to rethink how we structure, fund, and operate EMS, fire, and police. Michigan’s elections are carried out at the local level by 1,520 city and township clerks across the state.

- 83 Michigan county clerks support and supplement the work of local clerks by coordinating election materials, managing county-level contracts with election vendors, programming the election equipment, and providing information to voters.
- Michigan Bureau of Elections is a non-partisan office within the Michigan Department of State (MDOS), providing guidance and standards to all clerks to ensure elections are carried out uniformly and in accordance with state and federal laws.
- Secretary of State is the state’s chief election officer. The SOS has broad authority over elections but does not directly administer them.

For the purposes of expanding and improving the quality of housing available to low- and moderate-income families, to prevent and reduce homelessness, to provide services to unhoused persons in Ingham County, including the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance, operation, improvement, extension, or repair of housing facilities and the elimination of detrimental housing conditions, and funding other housing programs, shall the Constitutional limitation upon the total amount of taxes which may be assessed in one (1) year upon all property within the County of Ingham, Michigan be increased by up to 0.5000 of one (1) mill, (50 cents per thousand dollars of taxable value), for a period of four (4) years (2024-2027) inclusive? If approved and levied in full, this Millage will raise an estimated \$5,618,512 in the first calendar year of the levy, based on state taxable valuation.

EAST LANSING CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT PROPOSAL 1**

The proposed Charter amendment below was initiated by a citizen initiated petition and not by the East Lansing City Council.

“The Amendment states the City shall not restrict relationships of persons living together as a household or residing in homes, or interfere with rights of owners to live with persons of their choice, so long as they are not rent-paying tenants. The City will make zoning and rental records public. The City must give advance notice of housing penalties. Repeat violations of zoning and rental laws can be a misdemeanor if knowing and intentional. Persons in federal service get a house-sitting exemption from rental laws. The City shall use state law to define “renter,” “rental unit,” ”lease,” ”tenant” and “occupancy.”
