**City Council Discusses Sewer Plant Employee**

Although at least two items on the action agenda of the Hillsboro City Council could have been controversial, harmony reigned at their meeting on Tuesday evening, June 26, 2018. In a potential personnel issue, the council agreed to stay in-house (with a contingency) to replace Waste Water Superintendent Brett Reynolds whose retirement date is in late September.

The alternative to an in-house promotion would be to hire a firm like Woodard & Curran, the company now managing the water system, to run the sewer system. Mayor Brian Sullivan said no one currently on staff has passed all the classification tests for the state-mandated certification. Commissioner Don Downs then introduced current plant employee Bill Christian, who has worked with Reynolds for the past seven years.

Christian has his Class Four operator's license because of classroom work and testing he successfully passed in Edwardsville, and he reported he's currently working on a Class I certification, needed to be the lead operator, in Springfield. He anticipates passing that test well before Reynolds retires.

Because the item was on the agenda as discussion only, no vote would be taken, but a handshake consensus agreement was reached to vote after Christian meets the requirements.

Uniformed Boy Scouts and a few scouting parents were in attendance; when the discussion public safety issue. turned to selling Camp Wechetoowin, Mayor Sullivan offered the floor to them. The young man who responded (his name isn't available because it wasn't part of his response) acknowledged the camp isn't used much because fewer young people are involved in scouting. Mayor Sullivan assured the attendees that they can use

other city grounds to camp. "Our intent is not to shut scouts out, he said.

Public Properties Commissioner Danny Robbins said of the citizens who had contacted him since the idea of selling the camp was floated, only one said it ought not be sold, probably for a higherend subdivision. Attorney Kit Hantla said the first step would be to have the property appraised; the council voted 4-0 to move forward with appraisals.

The Natural Resources Committee sent three recommendations affecting recreation in Hillsboro. One involves tent camping in the campground. The previous resolution didn't limit the amount of time one could occupy one spot; according to Robbins, if a camper set up his tent in a grassy area for an extended length of time, it killed the grass and made mowing around the area impossible. Most campgrounds in the area say sites can be used for no more than three days. The newly updated resolution limits campers to two weeks on the same grassy spot.

Another recommendation was to distinguish between short-term and long-term use of non-motorized watercraft (paddle boards, for example) for fee purposes. Before the resolution change, a seasonal permit for non-motorized craft was \$20; now a weekend use permit will cost \$5 while seasonal remains at \$20. Members say a fee is necessary because the permit makes identification of the user easier if the craft is floating freely on the water; that situation can be a

Lastly, the NRC recommended

keeping items for the upcoming school year, including repairs on the HVAC unit in the Lincolnwood High School office.

Superintendent Aaron Hopper said that Lebeck Refrigeration and Heating had given a quote of \$11,000 to repair the system in February, but the project was put on the back burner when heating the office was no longer an issue.

### **Pavilion Is Latest Addition To Donnellson Landscape**

The citizens of Donnellson will have a new place to congregate thanks to the generosity of their community as the new Donnellson Pavilion was dedicated during a ceremony on Monday, June 25.

'We think we have a beautiful pavilion here," said Village Trustee Fran Jett of the new addition, which is located behind the old school, the current village hall and community center. "The goal is to do it without using taxpayer money. Everything was done by donation by the trustees, by friends and by families.'

The pavilion itself was built in the fall, but the concrete slab was poured this spring to move the project closer to completion. Mayor Darrell Jett coordinated the work and said that other details will be completed soon, including the placement of rock around the concrete to make it easier to enter the pavilion.

Mayor Jett said that the village also plans to run electricity and water to the facility and hopes to have bands and other community events there.

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Village employees and members of the Donnellson community came together for the dedication of the village's new pavilion, located behind the current village hall and community center. ### **UMWA Donation Helps Theriac Raise Money For The MCCA**



### **Local Dialysis Center Gives** Hillsboro's Bell Gift Of Life

Three years ago, Hillsboro native Bruce Bell would have never guessed what the next few years would hold, but he thanks the DaVita Dialysis Center in Hillsboro for playing a part in keeping him alive.

After losing some senses and feeling in his lower extremities for over 24 hours, his doctor confirmed that his liver and one kidney was failing and he would need a transplant.

"At first it was too much and I felt terrible so I wanted to go," said Bell.

Bell was instructed to report to the local dialysis center in April 2017 to undergo treatment three times a week until he could receive his transplant. The treatments typically last three to four hours, and help remove waste, keep a safe level of chemicals in one's blood and helps to control blood pressure.

"I will never forget the day the doctor told him he had ESRD(endstage renal failure)," said DaVita Dialysis Facility Administrator Vickie Oller. "We all cried with him, but he stuck it out and we are so glad he did.'

Bell added, "They helped save my life. Every time I would doze off, the girls would wiggle my toes and ask me if I'm awake.'

Bell waited nearly seven

months before receiving his liver and kidney transplant from a 16 to 17-year-old child at Barnes-Jewish Hospital in St. Louis, MO. Once the liver and kidney arrived, the team of doctors advised him to be there within two hours to receive the transplant.

"If I didn't get a donor I probably wouldn't be here today," said Bell. While the loss of life is saddening, Bell is grateful for his new chance at life and opportunity to spend more time with his family and friends.

The maintenance work after a transplant is minimal compared to what he endured through dialysis treatments, the surgery and therapy post operation, and includes taking rejection medications and regular check-ups with his doctors.

In addition to the dialysis center, he is grateful for the team of doctors and his family and special friend who frequently extended a helping hand and drove him to his appointments.

"It's sure amazing," said Bell. "I can't believe how the doctors and dialysis center do what they do to keep a person alive.

He looks forward to spending more time on the family farm that he took over in 2009 and tending his vegetable garden, a pastime he was certain he'd never be able enjoy again.

Poggenpohl asked the board if it could establish a set fee for the annual liquor license, which seemed to vary each year. Upon a review of the records, it was determined that the fee had been unchanged in the last two years.

Poggenpohl also asked the board if the village would like to be reimbursed for any expenses it incurs from the celebration, such as advertising, utilities, police protection, garbage disposal or portable toilet rentals. All board members agreed that the village had no problem with providing assistance with such expenses.

In other business, Mayor Denny Held presented the board with an intergovernmental agreement regarding the borrowing of equipment from the city of Taylorville, which is good until April 30, 2021. The trustees discussed liability issues, insurance requirements and advantages of the agreement, with all members agreeing to enter into the measure after the discussion. Mayor Held signed the agreement and directed Village Clerk Susan Greenwalt to return it to Taylorville.

The board also approved the annual budget ordinance for 2018-19 in the amount of \$1,379,442.86. The budget includes the costs for the new pickup truck for the street department and for the new well according to Mayor Held. also said that motor fuel Held tax funds had been transferred to the general fund for expenses incurred in 2017 in the amount of \$24,412.64. The aforementioned truck was also discussed, with the trustees working on letting for the new vehicle and questions on whether or not a new radio and antenna needed to be installed. Trustee Bruce Poggenpohl also mentioned that it may be worthwhile to check into the purchase of a suitcase

size generator that would fit in the back of the truck, adding that he would call around for prices.

In other street department business, Poggenpohl stated that he looked at the ditch problem on East Shirley Street after a recent rain and everything looked good from the front end of the ditch. Once the crops are out of the adjacent field, the rear of the property can be inspected again, but Mayor Held stated that there is not much downward slope to that section of the property.

Work on the fence downtown near the railroad crossing is also progressing, with the installation of the bench the only remaining item.

In water and sewer business, Water Superintendent Rick Broaddus stated that the report from Preferred Tank & Tower had come in on the water tower inspection, with only a few improvements needed to be made. Preferred Tank & Tower will provide the village with an estimate to make those improvements.

In other news, the village is continuing to look into hiring additional part-time police officers for more coverage, the golf course has had several outings that have been well attended recently and a tree at the intersection of Short Street, South McGown Street and Lewis Street could be a problem in the near future.

The board would adjourn at 8:15 p.m. with no further business. They are scheduled to meet next on Monday, July 2, at the village hall in downtown Raymond.

### Line Break Leaves Nokomis **Residents Dry On Monday**

A water main break in Nokomis caused residents of Nokomis and Coalton to be without water for about 16 hours on Monday, June 25, before crews scrambled to fix the problem.

A break in the main line between the water treatment facility and the water tower occurred around 4:15 a.m. near the intersection of South Vine and Illinois Route 16 according to Nokomis **Commissioner of Public Utilities** Tim Brookshire.

The day before, a water main had broken at the end of South Pine Street, but had been fixed a few hours later before the main line break occurred. Nokomis has had at least two other water line breaks in the month of June.

Public works officials and workers from Kinney Contractors worked to repair the water main, with water service restored around 8 p.m. on June 25.

Earlier in the day, the Nokomis Area Fire Protection District

distributed water to residents at the Nokomis City Hall parking lot for sanitation and hand washing purposes according to **Emergency Services and Disaster** Agency Coordinator Joe Gasparich. Members of Nokomis Fire Explorer's Post 0799 assisted in the distribution of water.

While Monday's water line break is no longer an issue, Gasparich encouraged residents to keep the situation in mind for the future.

"The Nokomis water system is aging, as are most water systems in small towns in Illinois,' Gasparich said. "Keeping a few gallons of water around is a good idea to prepare for any emergency, not just a water line break. I was surprised at how many people had purchased drinking water prior to today, but the water for sanitation was not something people thought about. So it was a great lesson that was learned today about preparedness."

## **Local Ham Radio Club Hosts Annual Field Day**

Members from the Montgomery County Amateur Radio Emergency Corp held a Field Day Saturday, June 23, at the residence of Brad and Janice Grimes on the Walshville Trail in Hillsboro.

The group contacted other ham radio operators in North and South America for a 24 hour period. The Field Day offers operators the time to practice their skills in emergency response capabilities.

Despite the development of very complex, modern communications systems, ham radio has been called into action again and again to provide communications in crises when it really matters.

Amateur radio people are well known for their communications support in real disaster and post disaster situations.

The local group was incorporated in 1955 and Rich Hewitt is the only surviving charter member. He got his license when he was 14 years old.

A group of students from Pana High School who have been working on their radio license arrived at the Field Day with their Solar Car.

The car was built by students as part of the National Solar Car Challenge, and will compete in the challenge next month along with 16 other high schools from around the country.

Lucas Duduit, a senior at Pana, explained the challenge allows students to design and build solar powered vehicles. It will begin in Fort Worth, TX, with four days of engineers scrutinizing the mechanical and electrical diagrams of each project.

"They want to relate the diagrams to each actual vehicle and ensure that the vehicles match up

with the plans," he said.

The competition will start from the Marriott at Fort Worth/Dallas and over seven days will continue to Palmdale, CA. Each team will have three vehicles following each solar car. One is a trailer, followed by two chase cars. The chase cars will be in touch with the solar cars via radio. The teams will monitor voltage, amperage, GPS speed and position and motor heat.

The team plans on achieving 200 miles per day and camping at night along the way.

The Pana Solar Car Team started building their vehicle last November and finished the project on May 23. They credit vocational instructor Steve Bonser with helping them achieve their desired goal. The project was completely organized as an extracurricular activity.

The race team consists of five members, but 12 members have contributed to seeing the vehicle completed. Jessica Pollman, sophomore; Trinity Carlyle, freshman; Connor Hildebrad, senior; Lucas Duduit, senior; and Katelyn Townsend, sophomore, came to the AREC event in Hillsboro. Alex Murray, a junior, will go to the national challenge in place of Trinity.

Each car can cost up to \$15,000 to build. The Pana team raised money from sponsors and also held two fundraisers.

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### **Panhandle School Board**

To open the meeting the board approved the Title I district plan, with Hopper stating that parents had requested that math assistance be added to the program. He said that in order to apply for the grant, the plan needed to be redone and that the district will be able to carry over \$25,000 from this past year.

Board member Dana Pitchford asked why the district carries over money from the previous year. Hopper said that districts are allowed to carry over 15 percent of their Title I total, which they use to begin the following year as they wait for funds from that year to become available.

Continued from page 1A ultimately, the money will be used to expand how Panhandle helps its students, with the focus being on the math curriculum.

In other old business on the agenda, the board voted to close some dormant activity accounts and transfer money from others so it may be used for its intended purpose, approved amendments to the 2018-19 student handbook and approved the final amended budget for the 2018 fiscal year. A budget meeting was held prior to the regular meeting, with little public participation.

In new business, the high school schedule was approved for the 2018-19 school year. Principal Kendal Elvidge said that there had been a few changes, with Spanish II expanding to two sections, Spanish I dropping down to one section and the addition of a credit recovery hour.

Hopper said that the credit recovery hour would be used in

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conjunction with after-school tutoring that the high school offers and will help students recover from credits that they did not obtain the previous year.

The board also approved the first reading of several board policies (a policy meeting was held at 6:15 p.m.) and the meeting dates for the school board for fiscal year 2018. Hopper said that most of the meetings will be held on the third Monday of the month, with September, January, February and June being exceptions to the rule due to holidays and extra time needed to satisfy public notification requirements.

Hopper also spoke to the board about Mid-State Special Education, saying that it is Panhandle's turn to be president of the organization's board. He added that he is serving on the steering committee and that there are some changes coming, which he will keep the board informed on.

Hopper added that the district had been pre-approved for its early childhood grant in the amount of \$130,681, which is more than what was granted the previous year.

The board would enter into closed session at 7:31 p.m. and would reconvene into open session at 7:46 p.m. They would approve four personnel items, including the employment of Jessica Deardorff as a paraprofessional for Farmersville Grade School and James Whalen as a junior high assistant baseball coach, the resignation of Landon Hayes as junior high assistant baseball coach and a one year contract for Farmersville Grade School Principal Chris Paproth for the 2018-19 school year.

The meeting would adjourn at 7:49 p.m. They will meet again on July 16, at 7 p.m. in the Lincolnwood High School library.

Commissioner Downs brought an ordinance to the table which would amend water connection requirements in the city (he refers to the connections and pipes from the main (controlled by the city) to the residence or business). Currently the ordinance calls for a copper line, but copper has had problems in newer residential areas--pinholes appear when water pressure hits the pipe. Downs proposed PVC rather than copper with a copper trace wire to allow the pipes to be located once they are buried.

Attorney Hantla suggested the proposed amendment language be tightened, made more specific, in order to protect the superintendent who has to okay the connections. After discussion, the council voted to table the changes until more research can be done.

The council agreed to vacate an alley that runs east-west between Fairmont Place and a north-south alley west of the properties. A sewer main is buried in the alley, according to Downs, so an easement has to be granted to the city if the alley is vacated. Neighbors who maintain the alley (by mowing it as they mow their yards) want it vacated so that others can't drive on it as has happened recently.

A motion was made to move forward with vacating the space, with the adjoining property owners each receiving half. An easement for the sewer line will be part of the agreement, and no structures may be built on it. That motion passed 4-0.

Only one bid - from Litchfield Bituminous Corp for \$67,222.94 - was received for material to be used in the 2018 Motor Fuel Tax street maintenance program for seal coat aggregate. Hurst-Rosche Engineers' proposal (\$4,500 to inspect Shoal Creek Structure #5 and the Glenn Shoals Lake Dam) was accepted by the council. Public Safety Commissioner Mike Murphy asked the group to approve demolition proceedings at 691 Virginia Street; he said the city has been more than patient with the property owner, who moved a dumpster onto his property a month ago but who has done nothing else. The next step will be a court order allowing the city to clean the property at the owner's cost.

Because four parcels of the once-trailer court in East Hillsboro were zoned commercial, it was necessary for the council to rezone those parcels to residential as the county's Housing Authoritybegins construction there. session, the council ratified a new labor contract with Local 773; the contract governs all but FOP (Fraternal Order of Police) employees. They also approved writing a comfort letter to the USEPA indicating a willingness to assume ownership of the Eagle-Zinc Superfund Cleanup Site once the cleanup is finished.

As the meeting opened, Robbins gave his Public Properties report. Highlights included work done on the overflow structure at the Irving Silt Basin and grading work done by camper Barry Kelley in the valley east of the fire pit. Robbins offered thanks to Kelley who seems always willing to donate time to help at the campground. Robbins' crew has begun arrangements necessary for the upcoming Fourth of July Celebration.

Also volunteering labor for the city were Danny Robinson, Sr., Sid Blankenship, and Tom Light, who helped pour the final slab of the pool deck; the pool opened on June 13. Robbins also said site preparation and dirt work for the North Marina Pavilion will begin the week of July 9.

Public Safety Commissioner Murphy thanked Jim May, Parks Superintendent, for lending workers to help Rich Stewart and Steven Fenske with brush cutting activities around town. Murphy also hinted at future good news about dangerous properties within city limits.

Finance Commissioner Katie Duncan said forthcoming budgetary news wouldn't be so good, implying that this hasn't been a good year for self-insured groups as the city is currently. She said, "Self-insurance is killing us (the budget).'

Streets Commissioner Downs reported a city storm drain south of McDonald's keeps backing up, probably because the clay tile used years ago has collapsed in places. Two hundred and fifty feet of sidewalk on West Summer is scheduled for replacement this summer, and Downs feels the storm drain that runs under that sidewalk needs to be replaced first.

He reported two lightning strikes on Fairmont Place in recent weeks; one caused a water leak and the other a house fire, to which the fire department quickly responded to keep damage to a minimum.

Mayor Sullivan reminded residents of the Fourth of July festivities on the Old Lake - the cardboard boat regatta and concert provided by Imagine Hillsboro and the fireworks provided by the city.




