One Airlifted Following Route 16 Crash Tuesday

Surprisingly slick conditions resulted in a serious accident on the Route 16 bridge just west of Hillsboro on Tuesday morning,

One victim was extricated from a vehicle by the Hillsboro Fire Department and airlifted from the scene by a medical helicopter. Another victim was taken by Hillsboro Area Ambulance Service to Hillsboro Area Hospital.

The accident occurred at about 6:30 a.m. Tuesday after a tow truck, already on scene, had pulled until 7:18 a.m.

a vehicle out of the ditch after it had slid off the road on the slick bridge. Just as that problem was being remedied, another pickup truck on Route 16 spun out of control and flipped up on the tow truck. The driver of the first vehicle was hit by a guardrail and taken by ambulance to Hillsboro Area Hospital. The pickup driver had to be extricated and airlifted.

The accident closed Route 16 until the scene was cleared. Nineteen firefighters were there

Sketchy Note Results In Police On HHS Campus

pus at Hillsboro High School this week after a student found a threatening note Tuesday morning, March 6, in a restroom.

According to Superintendent David Powell, the note was found by a student in a bathroom stall, and referenced a first name who 'has a gun for Friday 3/9/18.'

The Hillsboro Police Department is investigating the note, and Macoupin/Montgomery County Crimestoppers is seeking anonymous information.

'We do plan to have classes as normal on Friday," Powell said. "However, we have partnered with the Hillsboro Police Department and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office to secure a heightened police presence at our schools."

Police were on campus on Wednesday and will be on Thursday as well as Friday.

> A Crimestoppers tip has already led to the discovery of an unloaded shotgun in a case under the seat of a vehicle parked in the student lot on Wednesday, but school administration and law enforcement determined the firearm was not related to the threatening note found Tuesday in the school bathroom.

> "Rather, it is believed that the shotgun had been used for hunting last weekend and was left in the truck unintentionally," according to the superintendent. "This is still a serious violation of school policy and is being handled

The investigation into the note found on Tuesday continues.

'We thank the student who said something when he saw something," Powell said of the student who reported the note. "This type of diligence is one of the cornerstones of the continued implementation of our safety policies and procedures. Please know that our number one priority continues to be the safety of all of our students.'

City Hires Firm To Manage Water System

By a 3-2 vote, with Mayor Brian Sullivan casting the deciding vote, Hillsboro's city council authorized a letter of intent to sign a contract with Woodward & Curran, a water system management service located in St. Charles, MO, during a special council meeting held Tuesday evening, March 6.

Also voting yes on the motion to hire the consultants were Commissioner Michael Murphy, who made the motion, and Commissioner Danny Robbins, who seconded it. Voting against the motion were Commissioners Don Downs and Katie Duncan.

The council discussed the issue for an hour before the vote was taken; present were 25 or so city workers, spouses, and residents and three representatives of Woodward & Curran.

Mayor Sullivan pointed out the need for outside help with the local systems as the discussion began, describing water distribution problems that persist at least partially because a master plan for maintenance and development has never existed.

The (relatively) new plant has technological features that the city hasn't fully utilized, and the water mains are problematic with no one sure of which valves are open, half-open, or stuck. "We depend on the memory of past workers, but they won't always be available; if we can hire someone to do a hydrologic study, to implement a GIS system that will permanently record the features of the system, it would be beneficial. As it is, we're not sure which direction the water flows in certain locations around town.'

The mayor introduced Marc Thomas of Woodward & Curran to answer the specific questions of Water Commissioner Downs, who seems to be the opposition leader on the council.

Thomas told those assembled that he couldn't give specific answers until his firm has studied the system, but he cited successes

they've had across the bi-state area, including in nearby Carlinville.

Finance Commissioner Duncan asked if a GIS mapping was necessary before the system could be mapped; Thomas said no -- but it's a service his firm could help implement through the use of summer interns.

Downs asked about booster pumps that city engineers Hurst-Rosche had recommended (Scott Hunt was there to represent Hurst-Rosche); the city hadn't acted because of the expense involved. The plant, with technology designed to not need 24-hours-a-day operation, is currently producing water for 20-hours-perday, according to employee Clark Cameron, in order to provide adequate pressure to the Kinkead Hill area, and booster pumps would reduce hours of operation of the plant.

Hunt said flow tests were definitely needed, but costs for that can be prohibitive too if done independently.

Local Pork Producer Provides Input On Checkoff Programs

Pig farmer Dale Weitekamp, from Raymond, served as a delegate to the Pork Act Delegate Assembly Wednesday through Friday, Feb. 28-March 2 in Kansas City, MO. Weitekamp was appointed as a delegate by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

"It was important to me to represent pork producers from across the United States as a Pork Act delegate," Weitekamp said. "As an industry, we are committed to 'elevate U.S. pork as the global protein of choice by continuously and collaboratively working to do what's right for people, pigs and the planet.' This was reinforced throughout the Pork Act Delegate meeting.

Weitekamp was one of 163 appointed delegates who traveled from 47 states across the country to represent pork producers and importers who sell pork products in the United States. The duties of the delegate body include nominating members to serve on the National Pork Board, establishing how much of the Pork Checkoff is returned to state pork organizations and providing direction on pork promotion, research and consumer and producer education priorities funded by the checkoff.

To fund programs, America's pork producers contribute 40 cents

of every \$100 of sales to the checkoff. Importers use a sales formula to contribute a similar amount. The role of the Pork Checkoff is to promote and enhance consumer pork demand on a global basis, as well as to invest in research designed to improve production practices and safeguard the pork supply, the environment and animal well-being. Building consumer confidence and educating America's pig farmers about livestock production practices through training and certification programs also are key priorities.

The National Park Board approved a 2018 budget for national spending of \$63.2 million for promotion, research and education programs. The strategic direction of the Pork Checkoff is centered on building consumer trust, driving sustainable production and growing consumer demand in the United States and globally.

"It has never been more critical that we work together as producers, processors and food-chain partners to provide high-quality pork products to consumers, Weitekamp said.

After discussing at previous meetings the need for a new truck for the street department, the trustees received the bids during Monday's meeting. The lowest bid would come from Victory Lane Ford in Litchfield for a 2018 Ford F-250 4x4 priced at \$28,183, with a possible \$500 reduction.

After a brief discussion, the trustees would approve the purchase by a 4-1 margin, with Robert Pennock voting no.

The board also approved two other motions. One was to hire Hurst-Rosche, Inc. for engineering work for the village's new well, including bidding for, building and designing the project, which

was presented by Scott Hunt of the Hillsboro-based engineering and design firm.

The other motion was to move forward with ordinance codification, which had been mentioned at last month's meetings.

The trustees also agreed to work with former Raymond resident Jan Pinkston on the celebration of Raymond's Sesquicentennial. Pinkston said in a letter that the milestone would be in 2021 and she was interested in volunteering to update and publicize the history of her hometown. The board unanimously agreed to support and advise Pinkston to proceed with the project.

The board meeting would end at 7:55 p.m.

Cameron added, in response to a question from the mayor, that a valve study hadn't been done for 35 to 40 years. Thomas again emphasized he couldn't provide cost estimates until his company had access to the system, but GIS, valve studies, and water flow/ pressure studies are within the scope of service his company can provide.

Sullivan said the city needs the expertise the company has to provide a structured approach to the infrastructure problems -- what has to be done within one year? five years? ten years? -- with a cost analysis provided. "We just can't realistically do that locally," he argued.

Downs said money for more than stop gap repairs wouldn't be available until the water tower construction bill is paid; Thomas and Brian Bzdawka of Woodward & Curran said they prefer to be proactive to problems, to stop them before more extensive repairs are necessary, which happens if one is reactive.

pens if one is reactive.

Mayor Sullivan asked how the employees would be affected; by law, they would become employees of the management firm rather than the city. The mayor stated, "We want the employees to be compensated equally if not better than before if we make the

transition." Councilman Murphy echoed those concerns.

Greg Frieden, the assistant area manager, said most instances where they have taken over, the employees were happier after the transition was complete. He said that always fear of change exists in the beginning, but they have a Human Resources Department that will sit individually with each employee to answer questions and to make the transition as painless as possible. Union affiliation can remain the same.

Bzdawka said the company views employees as their customers/clients too. "If the labor force isn't happy, our management job becomes much more difficult."

Cameron pointed out a major concern of his. "This is personal to me (and to any other employee well-vested in the IMRF system).

"I've worked for the city for quite a while; if I change employers now, my anticipated retirement income will be about \$1,000 less per month when I retire in six years."

The mayor admitted that was one of the problems with the transition; the other is the additional cost for the expertise the city needs. A company rep. said they began services to Carlinville on August 1, and that the department budget is considerably less for the coming year, citing savings in chemical costs and sludge

removal as contributing factors. "We emphasize worker safety, regulatory compliance, and a capital plan. Those are the reasons to outsource public works."

As moderator of the discussion, Mayor Sullivan re-opened the format for questions from employees, but none responded at that time. Commissioner Downs commended the water department employees for their work over the last 40 years. "We've had people who have been quick to help whenever problems arise," he said.

The mayor agreed, but said in his opinion they had reached that point in time when the city needs help from a service that can prioritize capital investments, bring more resources to the table, and develop and use a computerized maintenance program. He hopes a management group would help pursue grants, particularly USDA funds of which the city may not be aware.

Commissioner Murphy commented that when an outside management team was suggested as a possibility that he had two criteria: that employees not be harmed, and that the city be insulated from the changes in the department. He and Parks Superintendent Jim May had discussed the need to no longer depend upon "tribal memory" when an emergency occurs; he

feels contracting with Woodward & Curran would help the city in the long run.

Commissioner Robbins asked what the negatives would be; the mayor's immediate response was, "Cost; it'll be more expensive than now."

Frieden said the team would look closely at the department's budget, suggesting that current chemical costs seem high in comparison to money spent in other towns. The mayor thought more water sales might be in the future, so revenue improvement is a possibility. "Besides, we need to collect good data and then have someone who can help us base our decisions on that data. We need a company with the expertise to do what we need done."

Before the vote was taken, Commissioner Downs asked if the city needed to put the proposal out for bids; the answer was no, because the company is offering services and not material.

The meeting was adjourned immediately after the vote. Despite some obvious tensions in the room during discussion, no open animosity was expressed in the aftermath as pledges of working together and handshakes were prevalent.

The council meets in regular session next Tuesday, March 13, at 7 p.m. in city hall. The public is welcome to attend.

People who use tobacco or consume alcohol regularly are at higher risk for an oral cancer. Warning signs for head and neck cancers include persistent earache or sore throat, difficulty or pain with swallowing, hoarseness lasting more than one month, an ulcer in the mouth or throat that does not heal, or a lump in the neck or thyroid gland.

Home test kits for colorectal cancer, better known as FIT kits

(Fecal Immunochemical Tests), can detect blood in the stool, an indicator of several different medical conditions.

The home screening is recommended for individuals age 50 and older, people who have a history of colorectal polyps, inflammatory bowel disease, a diet high in processed food and/or red meat, or those who smoke, are obese or abuse alcohol.

FIT kits do not substitute for a colonoscopy, which is the best method to detect colorectal cancer.

Regularly scheduled screenings in the form of colonoscopies can prevent cancer from developing if precancerous polyps are detected and removed before they become cancer. Regular screenings can also find cancer in its earliest stages when it can be treated.

A short consent form is required to pick up the home screening kit. After completing the kit at home, individuals will mail it back in a provided pre-addressed envelope. Individuals will receive a letter notifying them of their results.

Season In Jacksonville

After being Class 1A last year, the Hillsboro boys and girls track teams have moved up a level for the 2018 track season. With an IHSA enrollment of 499 students, the Toppers are 28 over the threshold for the smallest of the three classes in Illinois high school track. South Central Conference schools Greenville, Staunton, Southwestern and Roxana are also all Class 2A this season, with Staunton and Mt. Olive co-oping for track this season.

The Toppers would get their first look at Class 2A on Saturday, March 3, as they participated in the Jacksonville High School Indoor Meet, held at King Field House on the campus of Illinois College in Jacksonville.

The Hillsboro girls would finish in a tie for 14th in the 23 team meet, while the Hillsboro boys would be tied for 18th out of 21

The Lady Toppers would have two top-five finishes, plus two more entries that wound up in the top eight to score points.

Junior Kyra Huber picked up where she left off last season, when she qualified for state in the 100, 200 and as part of the 4x100 and 4x200 relay teams. Huber would place fourth in the 200 with a time of 27.52, .25 seconds faster than her time at the same event last season.

She would also run faster in the 60 meters in the prelims, posting a time of 8.16, compared to 8.24 a year ago. Huber would finish seventh in the 60 meter final with a time of 8.38 seconds.

Huber was also part of the Lady Toppers' other top five, a fourth place finish in the 4x200. The junior sprinter joined teammates Kylie Meier, Deanna Jackson and Ashlyn Papin for the relay, with Meier and Jackson having also been on last year's state qualifying relay teams.

"Ashlyn Papin, with her speed, will have a huge impact on the 4x100 and 4x200 relays this season," Hillsboro Coach Son Clayton said of Papin, who replaces 2017 grads Nicole Miller and Phoebe Wilson in the relays. "I believe this

season will be the fastest 4x100 and 4x200 relays we've ever had!'

Papin is also part of Hillsboro's two-headed monster in the high jump, along with two-time state qualifier Haley McCaslin, who finish fifth in the event as a freshman.

While Clayton said they struggled some at Jacksonville, finishing in a tie for ninth with marks of 4'10", McCaslin and Papin, who won the IESA state title last year as an eighth grader, could do some big things in 2018.

Hillsboro's other top eight finisher was Meier, who went 31'0" on her third attempt at the triple jump to place eighth overall. Huber also competed in the triple jump and took ninth with a mark of 30'1", while Meier took 17th in the 200 with a time of 29.50.

In the other field events, Layla May was 38th with a mark of 11'3.75" in the long jump, while Deanna Jackson just missed a top-eight finish with a mark of 7'2" in the pole vault, good enough for ninth overall. Freshman Emma Miller also made her debut, placing 35th in the shot put with a mark of 26'0".

On the track, Jackson would finish 14th in the 400 with a time of 1:10.21, while Maddy Rupert was 11th in the 800 (2:44.12) and 15th in the 1600 (6:06.73). Kyla Kuhl would finish 32nd in the 800 (3:04.03), while Mercedes Kuhl was 28th in the 1600 (6:45.83).



Seniors Step Up For Lincolnwood In 2017-18

In terms of wins and losses, the 2017-18 season was a slight downturn from the previous year for the Lincolnwood boys basketball team.

With six seniors, four of whom played critical minutes all 29 games, the 2016-17 Lancers won 17 games and lost 12. This year's Lancers won 15 and lost 17, rebounding from a 2-9 start to finish the season with wins in 13 of their last 21 games.

The comeback from the slow opening was just some of what went right for Coach Matt Millburg's club. While they had two fewer wins, this year's Lancers shot better from inside the arc (50.4 percent to 48.7 percent) and outside it (32.5 percent to 32.2 percent). They also improved their free-throw shooting by 12 percent, going from 59.3 percent in 2016-17 to 71.3 percent in 2017-18.

Lincolnwood also averaged more points per game (50.0 to 48.5) and had fewer turnovers (360 to 498) despite playing three more games.

The growth as a team can be partly attributed to the growth of the four seniors on this year's roster. While Tanner Millburg, Ryan Poggenpohl, Matthew Mizera and Adam Deal all played significant minutes as juniors, the quartet saw great strides in their play in their final year in the orange

Mizera was able to finally show

healthy, having been limited to only tell part of the story though just 12 games in his junior season. The 6'8" center led Lincolnwood in scoring with 14.7 points per game, shooting a team-best 64 percent from the field.

One of just two unanimous picks for the MSM all-conference first team, Mizera was second on the team in rebounds with 169 and averaged more than a block a game with 48 blocks for the season.

Mizera was joined on the allconference list by Poggenpohl, who was the other half of Lincolnwood's post presence. He was second in scoring with 12.1 points per game, while leading the Lancers in rebounding, with 171, and free-throw percentage, at 79.4 percent.

Poggenpohl's dedication and tenacity on the court showed why he is on to bigger and better things after high school, where he will be attending the U.S. Naval Academy.

While Mizera and Poggenpohl earned recognition from the other MSM coaches, no one upped their game more for Lincolnwood than Millburg. The Lancers' point guard more than doubled his scoring average (3.2 to 7.3 points per game) while becoming a genuine scoring threat from behind the three-point line.

Millburg would hit 51 threes in his senior season after making just 15 as a junior. More impressively, he would do so without falling off in accuracy as he led the team in 2018-19. in three-point percentage (25 attempts or more) with a 37.2 Shawn Goebel also saw time in the percent clip. His offensive stats starting line-up. The two could be

as Millburg often guarded the opponents top scorer for the Lancers.

Deal, a Morrisonville senior who will play baseball after high school for John A. Logan Community College, was hampered by injuries and was only able to play in 17 games.

When he did get on the floor, his athleticism and versatility made a difference as he averaged 8.2 points and 4.8 rebounds per game. Even with missing 15 games, Deal was still third on the team in three-pointers with 22 and second in total rebounds with 81.

For the Lancers to improve next year, this year's varsity underclassmen will have to take similar strides to those shown by the class of 2018.

Three juniors saw varsity time, Dade Pitchford, Austin Krager and Braden Lush. Pitchford was a frequent starter and was second on the team in three-pointers with 23. He averaged 4.8 points per game and showed he was able to step into a varsity role, despite having just three games of varsity experience prior to the start of the season.

Krager was a defensive spark plug off the bench for Coach Millburg and had the innate ability to frustrate opposing offenses, both in varsity and JV. Lush would play mostly on the JV side, but could be called upon to play a bigger role

Sophomores Evan Hopper and

the most likely to have a breakout season after earning some valuable varsity experience this year. Freshman Jhadyn Walker, who had a fearless quality that made up for being slightly undersized in the post, could also be in that conversation.

Freshman Braxton Schmedeke and sophomore Tucker Lemon also got their first tastes of varsity action in 2017-18 and may see more playing time next year.

While it will take some work next year, Coach Millburg's squads haven't been short on effort during his six years at Lincolnwood. Whether or not that effort can deliver the Lancers' first regional title since 2007, only time will tell.

> Austin Niehaus would place seventh in the 800 for the Panthers to score points as well, running a 2:12.89 to win his heat.


