Bremer Sanctuary Celebrates First 40 Years

Bremer Sanctuary in Hillsboro celebrated its 40th anniversary with an open house on the Illinois Audubon Society grounds on Saturday, Sept. 23.

The sanctuary was born on July 9, 1977,

when sisters Helen and Betty Bremer donated their family's farm ground to the Illinois Audubon Society.

Mayor Shares Optimism, Pessimism On Economy

Eight members of the Hillsboro Planning Commission met at 12:30 Thursday, Sept. 21, in city hall to both make and listen to reports from their various committees.

Mayor Brian Sullivan combined hopefulness (he said indications are the Deer Run Mine will again produce coal, though nothing is certain, including a time line) and remorse (again based on indications—not certainty—he feels the Dynegy power plant west of Coffeen will shutter). One of those indications is the lack of spending on maintenance. He commented, "In an ideal world for the local economy, the mine would reopen and the power plant would stay open," but he feels that's not realistic, so planners need to be aware of the possibilities.

The mayor also reported that the EPA's Superfund cleanup of the Eagle Zinc site is entering

another phase. Contamination was found east of the fenced site (across Industrial Park Drive) but south of Litchfield Bituminous property. That material has to be trucked across the road to the under-construction containment cell, which in turn means the road will have to be washed down after each trip—which means the road will be closed for at least three days in the future.

The holding cell size changes as more contamination is located; EPA regulations are in flux too. On the hopeful side of that coin is the interest shown on the site once it's cleaned.

Mayor Sullivan also said the cleaning of the coal tar site (behind the Old Ice Plant building, now owned by Marcolini Construction on East Seward Street) is moving forward. Ameren said the project had been delayed because of concerns about the Indiana bat.

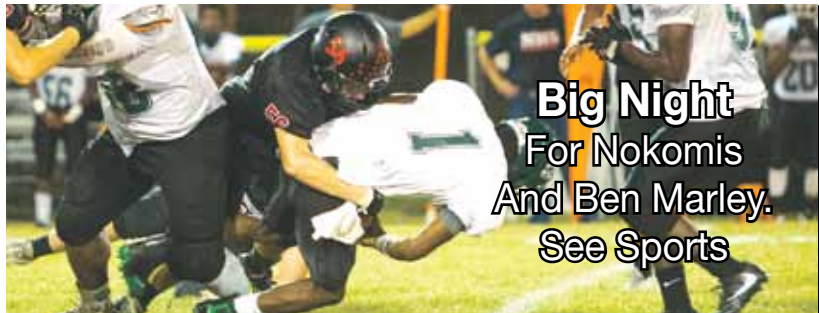



Fields Of Faith Will Be At Sawyer Field On Oct. 11

Hillsboro students are hosting a Fields of Faith event on Wednesday, Oct. 11, from 6 to 8 p.m. on Sawyer Field at the Hillsboro High School.

Students from Hillsboro will be joining thousands of other youth on athletic fields all across the nation to share their Christian faith with fellow students during the 11th annual national Fields of Faith event.

This rapidly-growing, interdenominational outreach event will be held at more than 500 locations throughout the nation on this same date. It is for everyone!!

Brian Warth, the speaker for Fields of Faith, was sentenced to life in prison for being a part of a gang murder. He said, "Jesus changed my life."

Warth now leads one of the fastest growing Free Methodist churches in the nation. Don't miss the opportunity to hear his story!! Also, *Pursuit* a band from Greenville University will perform.

While many Christian rallies are anchored to an entertainer or professional speaker that creates a spectator event, Fields of Faith is structured as a student-to-student ministry. Peers invite their own classmates and teammates to meet on their school's athletic field to hear fellow students share their testimonies, challenge them to read the Bible and to come to faith in Jesus Christ.

This will be the third Fields of Faith event for Hillsboro. The national growth of Fields of Faith has been remarkable. Since the beginning of Fields of Faith in 2004, over a million people have joined in the movement.

In 2014 alone, more than 192,000 students gathered on 519 fields to participate in the event

It's not just those numbers that have FCA organizers excited about Fields of Faith. It's the real-life impact that these gatherings are having on young people.

Last year's series of events saw 7,414 students make first-time faith commitments to follow Jesus Christ, 8,612 recommitted their

life to Christ and 8,781 committed to reading the Bible daily.

"The impact of Fields of Faith has been incredible in just these past few years," said Les Steckel, FCA president and former veteran NFL coach. "It's all about young people in these communities coming together on their school's athletic field and challenging each other to go back to the fundamentals of reading God's Word and coming to faith in Jesus Christ."

The impetus for Fields of Faith began with Jeff Martin, an FCA staff person, who conceived the idea from an Old Testament reference in 2 Chronicles 34 after searching how to help today's generation of students face spiritual battles and temptations. In the scripture, King Josiah, an influential teenager very similar to Fields of Faith attendees today, gathered his people and challenged them to read the Bible. As a result, they changed their culture.

In 2004, Martin saw his dream come true when 6,000 students gathered on school athletic fields throughout three states for the first Fields of Faith event. That was the beginning of what has become one of the most significant faith-related gathering of students in a single day.

"Fields of Faith challenges this generation to be committed to reading the Bible and living a transformed life for Jesus Christ," said Martin. "It's students challenging students, peers challenging peers and that's the heart and soul of Fields of Faith."

While Fields of Faith has its roots with FCA leadership, the event is designed to include multiple national Christian organizations, local churches and ministries. This event isn't just for the students, it's for the whole family, so come out and support it.

Seniors Of The IEC Family Will Be Awarded Scholarships

Laura Cutler, president and CEO, has announced that MJM and the Illinois electric cooperatives, will award academic scholarships to high school seniors in 2018.

The MJM Scholarship Program and the Thomas H. Moore Illinois Electric Cooperatives (IEC) Memorial Scholarship Program, are designed to financially assist deserving students in the "electric cooperative family."

In addition, a scholarship will be offered to assist with costs in attending an electric lineworker school.

MJM will award two \$1,000 scholarships to sons and daughters of MJM members. Three additional scholarships are reserved for students enrolling full-time at a two-year Illi-

nois community college who are the sons or daughters of Illinois Electric Cooperative members, employees or directors.

The tenth annual scholarship, the "LaVern and Nola McEntire Lineworker's Scholarship," is a \$2,000 scholarship that will help pay for costs to attend the lineworker's school conducted by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College in Springfield. Sons and daughters of co-op members, relatives of co-op employees or directors, and individuals who have served or are serving in the armed forces or National Guard, are all eligible to apply for the lineworker's scholarship.

"We hope to assist electric cooperative youth while honoring past rural electric leaders with these scholarships," said Cutler. "MJM and the other Illinois electric cooperatives are always seeking ways to make a difference in our communities. One of the best ways we can do that is by helping our youth through programs like this one. In addition we are pleased to offer the electric lineworker's scholarship which will benefit not only electric cooperative youth, but also those fine men and women who have served their country through their military service and may now want to become a trained lineworker."

Making Little Moments 'Wonderful'



It was nearly ten years ago that Kyle and I took our first spin on the dance floor together, swaying to Eric Clapton's famous "Wonderful Tonight," at the Litchfield Sports Boosters first \$10,000 dance fundraiser. Kyle and I had only been dating a few weeks, when our friend Denise talked me into buying tickets for the dinner, which was nearly two months later. I didn't have any idea if Kyle and I would even still be dating when the dinner rolled around, but Denise was very persuasive, and I bought the tickets anyway. My friend, Amy, bought tickets too, so we figured if we didn't have dates, we would just go and enjoy ourselves.

But, Kyle and I were still together, and that night was such a fun one. I got a new dress, and had my hair and make-up done. Kyle showed up at Amy's to pick the two of us up and had a rose for each of us. Talk about brownie points!

And although neither of us is much into dancing, when the first slow song came on, I took Kyle out to the dance floor, for what has now sort of become our song.

I admit it seems a bit odd, when there are other songs that may tell our story better, like Blake Shelton's "God Gave Me You" (for the ups and downs) or Rascal Flatt's "God Bless the Broken Road." But we've sort of always stuck with "Wonderful Tonight."

*I feel wonderful because I see
The love light in your eyes
And the wonder of it all
Is that you just don't realize
how much I love you*

As the chorus refrain plays in my head, I stop and think about what the words mean to us. I think it's sometimes easy to be "hopelessly devoted" in the beginning of any relationship. Both partners are on their best behavior, trying to impress the other, and show how much they really do feel for each other.

But as life takes over, some of those simple gestures seem to fall by the wayside, and it's easy to take that other person for granted, just expect-

ing they will always be there. It's easy to lose that "wonderful" sort of feeling.

One of our favorite Christmas gifts each year is a devotional book my mom gets us that we read daily together. There's one that always sticks out in my mind. Someone had gone to their pastor and said he just didn't love his spouse anymore. And the pastor said that love was not a noun, but rather an action verb, and that if he wanted to feel those loving feelings, then he needed to act lovingly to his spouse. It's kind of in line with the Kirk Cameron movie, "Fireproof."

And though that sounds simple enough, I'm here to tell you that marriage is hard, every single day. Add in the stresses of work and raising children, and it's easy to see how one can feel taken for granted.

But in our house, most nights before bed, we take a few moments to write in our "Blessings Book." Each of us has to write at least five things we were grateful for that day. Some days it's harder than others, but we can always find small things, like getting to have lunch together or take a walk as a family. It sort of helps the two of us refocus on what really matters, and finding "wonderful" moments to spend together.

Some days, it's easy to find my way into a pity party, because raising a child with a terminal illness is hard. I find myself angry that our family can't do things many consider "normal." Even just taking both girls to a ball game is a big job, especially trying to work around Grace's eating schedule. Some days, it's almost more than I can bear, wishing for things to be different.

But on those days, it's more important than ever to remember that life can be wonderful. I have to work hard at that every single day, and Kyle and I still fight more than either of us would probably care to admit. And even though life is hard, and that it's easy to take the ones you love the most for granted, really good things happen when we remember that life will always be full of "wonderful" moments. Sometimes you just have to look harder to find them and remember

I would like to record this for history. I have a book that is available.

Recently I found in a book that was given to me by Mike Hartman—a planner book—a picture of our national flag on national Pearl Harbor Day.

I was in the Navy on the destroyer USS Selfridge at 18 years old. We were operating outside of Pearl Harbor and were called in from the rest of the ships. They loaded us up with all they could get on our ship.

We went back out and then our

captain called us together and told us where we were going. We were going south to a small island as an escort back to Pearl Harbor. On the way there we crossed the equator. I had not done this before so when we crossed they had rigged the ship to initiate us "pollywogs" into the Royal Order of King Neptune. You can get what they did out of my book.

But we got there to Canton Island. They were not finished unloading and we had to wait there for seven days. Finally we got going and got back to Pearl

Harbor on Dec. 6, 1941.

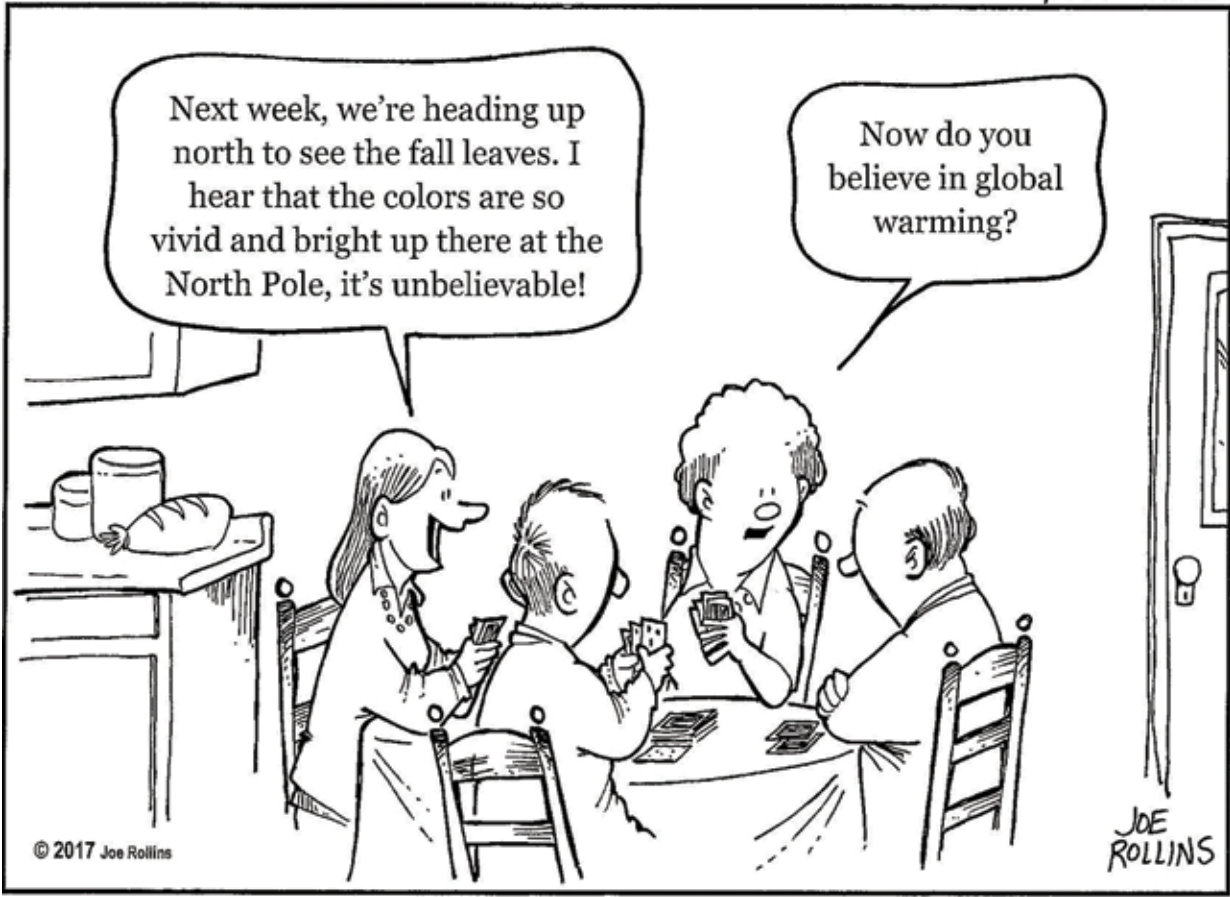
The next morning I woke up, ate, and started up a ladder to the radio shack and heard, "they are torpedoing the hell out of the Detroit!"

I did not go on up there but instead went to our emergency radio shack farther back on the ship.

We were at war.

Cutting \$200,000 From Sheriff's Office Is Dangerous

As a former telecommunicator, a county citizen and a local first responder, I would strongly urge you to ask the county board to reconsider proposed budget cuts.

Cutting \$200,000 from public safety is a huge threat to our community. Without that money, Montgomery County Sheriff's Office will continue running short staffed. In most county offices, that would mean stacked paperwork and slight delays in services. In a law enforcement agency, it could literally create a life or death situation.

As Undersheriff Robbins stated during the meeting, there are many shifts with only one on-duty deputy. As is Murphy's Law, it's definitely not unheard of to receive back to back calls in opposite corners of our 700 square mile county. While those calls are prioritized for response, the problem comes when multiple calls require immediate response. Although they are willing to help when able, other local law enforcement is sometimes unable to assist due to their own call volume. A wide variety of calls come into the sheriff's office—anything from a cat in a tree to domestic violence to robberies to murder. Living in a small community does not exempt us from these larger crimes.

Sending one lone responder into a violent situation is always a terrible idea. Additionally, assaults and ambushes on law enforcement are occurring at an astonishingly high rate. It is simply no longer safe for law enforcement to not have readily available backup. The deputies are not the only group at the Sheriff's office affected by budgets cuts and staff shortages. The correctional officers are subject to many of the same safety issues as the deputies. They are responsible for overseeing over 40 detainees at any given time—some violent, some ill, some who would be served better by mental health services. There are times that one C/O is responsible for booking, feeding, passing medication, and accounting for and ensuring the safety of each detainee. Similar to the deputies, they are argued with and assaulted on a regular basis. When the last jail inspection report was published in *The Journal-News*, it was reported that even the state inspector recommended a minimum of two correctional officers at all times.

Last but not least are the struggles that the telecommunicators face due to lack of funding. Many people don't realize that there are often only two people answering both phones and radio traffic for many agencies. With the exception of Hillsboro police and fire and Illinois State Police, all other county dispatching (including 9-1-1 services) is done by Montgomery County Sheriff's Office telecommunicators. Additionally, they assist members of the public coming into the lobby, answer intercom calls from the jail detainees, and control door movement for both the jail and the sheriff's office. There are 3 different radio channels and many phone lines. At any given time, there is traffic on all of the above concurrently, making it physically impossible to hear all traffic and provide the best, and safest, service.

Possibly one of the biggest problems with being short staffed is that you never know what the day will bring. While some things can be planned for, such as inclement weather, others are completely spontaneous. There may only be very minimal staff trying to handle a very large incident. When that occurs, there is no time to call in additional staff. This isn't a normal office where work overflow can be stacked on a desk until later. Most issues must be handled immediately. When employees are ill or on vacation, the work doesn't wait for them to return. It must be done and shifts must be covered. This results in employees working up to 16-hour shifts or longer. At the end of such a long shift, exhaustion is a big problem and puts not only the employees at risk, but also members of the community.

General Fund's expenses." While I'm not disputing the importance of other county offices, I believe public safety should have more consideration to budget cuts than solely based on proportion. It is logical that the sheriff's office would utilize the largest percentage of the budget. They are one of few, if not the only, office that runs 24/7/365 requiring additional payroll hours and almost four times more electricity and office equipment use. Additionally, it is one of few offices requiring a fleet of vehicles. Within the appropriated funds for the sheriff's office are also expenses for operating the county jail. Clothing, medical and dental care, and food are a few of many jail expenses. None of those things can be proportionately reduced.

Please encourage the Montgomery County Board members to be informed before they choose to implement these drastic cuts. Speak to employees, ask to visit the office, speak to the citizens who have to wait for service, and consider how your family would be affected if, on one of the worst days of your life, you had to wait 45 minutes for help, or if you called 9-1-1 and there were too many other calls to give you CPR instructions for your loved one.

As far as increasing revenue, a lack of public services will not encourage any new businesses in our area. Perhaps reintroducing the Public Service tax with more transparency would be beneficial. I, along with many others, chose to vote no as we could not be assured that it would be used as a supplement to, rather than as a replacement for, General Revenue funds. I would gladly change my vote on this tax with the right guidelines.

As far as voting goes, I personally will not be voting for any board member who supports these cuts based solely on proportion and will encourage others to do the same. Their duty to constituents is to act within the constituent's best interests. A \$200,000 budget cut to the sheriff's office would do otherwise. While on paper \$200,000 is only a number, in this instance it is lives. It's dangerous to their employees. It's dangerous to me as a responder. It's dangerous to me and my family as citizens.

Mayor Dougherty said that Spaur would be able to take his police vehicle home, in spite of living outside the city limits, so he would be able to take the dog home, but noted that this was a special condition. The total cost of adding a new canine to the police department, which would replace the current canine that is nearing retirement age, is \$16,500, with grants covering \$5,500 of the cost, plus \$7,140 in the anti-crime fund that may be used toward the

dog. The purchase was also in the budget and other grants have been applied for.

The aldermen delayed approval of the Lake Lou Yaeger intake structure repair until further information could be received for the cost of the project. According to Ted LaBelle of Crawford, Murphy and Tilly, there is still the possibility that a warranty will cover a portion of the broken intake gate. The aldermen are expected to vote on the project, which may cost between \$56,000 to \$62,000, at the first October meeting.

The council would enter closed session at 7:15 p.m. Upon going back into open session, the council approved an offer for 515 East Hauser for the amount of \$5,500 from Brian Hollo and approved an agreement with the Litchfield Community Development Association for the costs associated with the demolition of the property at 111 West Ryder, the Amvets building, for an amount not to exceed \$100,000 and to be reimbursed \$15,000 for the value of the land contingent upon legal counsel's final review.

It is now set to begin in November when the colder weather will help the steaming process used to extract the coal tar.

Commissioner Barbara Hewitt reported that Imagine Hillsboro's Harvest Fest is set for Oct. 7 and that a three person scramble golf tournament fundraiser will be at the country club course on Oct. 21. The Christmas Fair will be the first weekend of December. The HUD grant for housing improve-

ment purposes is in a holding pattern until the grant specialists tell the committee about the next step; the deadline has been moved to Dec. 15.

Mayor Sullivan told of activity downtown regarding rehabbing of properties and new businesses opening store fronts. He also praised the work of Ordinance Compliance Officer Gary Satterlee; several derelict properties around town have been demolished since that position was established.

City Clerk Cory Davidson said Step One of the zoning ordinance and procedure review has been completed; an expert in that field has his recommendations ready for the Zoning Board to review. After that board meets, the recommendations will come to the city council.

Chairman Tom Gooding adjourned the meeting at 1:22 p.m.; the commission's next meeting is Thursday, Oct. 19, at 12:30 p.m.

Marley Makes History In Redskins Homecoming Win

With homecoming festivities taking place all week at Nokomis High School, the Redskins took the field inspired Friday night, Sept. 22, and came away with a 7-6 win over the Madison Trojans.

The Redskin offense got the ball to start the game, starting in good field position at their own 37 yard line. A 29 run by Drew Watson and a 15 yard run by Adam Lyons on back to back plays put the Skins inside the 20 and rolling.

They couldn't get anything going inside the redzone though, so Madison took over. Each team would then suffer a three and out, and Madison would then punt again as time expired in the first quarter.

The Madison tailback found a hole and took it 72 yards to the house. The Trojans tried to go for two and couldn't convert, which would ultimately prove crucial.

After half, each team got two possessions. Neither of them could convert on anything and the score remained 7-6. In the fourth quarter, Madison tried to take advantage of their quarterbacks big arm. A few punts later, Madison was still trying to air it out.

And after starting in good field

position and a couple pass interference calls, the Trojans were in business. But the Redskin defense stepped up. Watson got an interception deep in their own territory.

Madison forced Nokomis into a three and out, but Watson booted away a good punt, putting Madison at their own 33.

Time was ticking down, so Madison had to work fast. With the Trojan quarterback trying to escape pressure in the pocket, Hayden Brown put a big hit on him, forcing a fumble. The Redskins jumped on it, sealing the win.

For the second straight week, Nokomis ends the game in victory formation. Adam Lyons had another monster game, rushing for 148 yards on 25 carries.

Defensively, Hayden Brown was everywhere, picking up three sacks on the night. Not only was the Nokomis defense great in this game, but there was also history made.

Hillsboro Routs Miners By 47

An old-school football coach once claimed, "statistics are for losers," but the first quarter stats from Hillsboro's Homecoming 55-8 victory over Gillespie were very revealing. The Toppers accumulated 12 first downs, 139 yards rushing, and 73 yards passing; the Miners' corresponding numbers in those first 12 minutes were 2, 59 and 52, even though their only touchdown, a 57 yard run, came late in the quarter. The Toppers seemed determined to erase any doubt about the outcome early, and it was a running clock in the second half.

Gunner Lentz enjoyed a stellar first quarter from his fullback spot, rushing for 89 yards on 9 carries, scoring one touchdown, and passing for another as the Toppers tallied 28 points. He wasn't alone, though. Christian Hernandez ran through tackles for a 33 yard gain to spark the fourth touchdown drive, scored the first touchdown, and made Miner teeth rattle with

aggressive tackles from his line-backer slot. Drake Paden caught 2 passes for 54 yards, including Lentz' touchdown heave, for an offense that didn't require much passing.

Dillon Civitate couldn't have been more efficient as a passer, though, as he completed his only three attempts for 139 yards--one to Hernandez for 19 and the other two to Paden.

Defensively, junior linebackers Liam Dugan (9 tackles) and Jordan Gregg (8 tackles) plus Hernandez extinguished the Miners' running game; when Joe Carter tried to pass, the Toppers gave up 88 yards but those came on only six completions (of 25 attempts), and he was intercepted three times--by Kaden Lemon, Josh Jackson and Dalton Deming. Lemon also had the first Topper return touchdown this year when he returned a punt for 70 yards, the only abbreviated second half score.

Hillsboro scored first; as a hint of runs to come, Lentz swept his

right side and danced down the sideline from his 44 to the Miner 27 on the first play from scrimmage; his toe hit the white paint there, but he wasn't tackled until he was on the 12. Four plays later, Hernandez scored from the 4, and Grant Hamby added the PAT--two minutes had passed.

Gillespie also threatened on their first possession; Lemon saved a touchdown by tackling junior Dan Taylor after he carried a Carter pass for 52 yards, to the Topper 17. A Hernandez shirt-tail tackle of Carter cost Gillespie four yards on the next play before an incomplete pass on a fourth and eight stopped the threat, but it had given Hillsboro pause for thought.

The offense reacted despite a penalty of commission; Hernandez' helmet popped off as he was hit, but he kept barging forward. IHSA rules require a runner who loses his helmet to stop immediately or be flagged for illegal participation.

Toppers Take First At Invite

After a 7-0 win Monday over the Gillespie Miners left them with a maximum ten tournament points and a 7-3 victory over the Litchfield Purple Panthers got them nine more, the Hillsboro High School boys soccer team entered Saturday's title game against the host Lincolnwood Lancers, one point shy of the most they could expect to have after two games.

That should have put them very much in the driver's seat in terms of a positive tournament outcome. For the Toppers, however, the Lancers had earned just as many tournament points as they had, setting up the winner take all scenario in the third and final tilt of the ninth and final Lincolnwood Invitational, a staple of Montgomery County soccer for nearly a decade.

But, just as they did in the first ever Invite, the Toppers used timely scoring and solid goal tending to bring home the hardware as a lone first half goal and two more tallies in the second kept Hillsboro perfect in the tourney as they brought home the 3-0 win.

With temperatures at 85 and above already at kickoff, the Toppers came in with the game plan of wearing down the Lancers with solid ball control and tight passing. They would do just that as the sophomore tandem of Josh Bauman and Dalton Greenwood controlled nearly every ball that came their way.

Then, with the ball in their possession, Hillsboro was able to spread the field and look for offense. The Toppers wouldn't have

to wait long for their first chance on net as, at just 40 seconds into the first, senior Mitchell Beck took a nice lead pass from the Hillsboro midfield and worked up the middle of the field into Lincolnwood territory. Beck, using his speed to create some space, would beat the Lancer backline and put a shot on net. Lancer keeper Austin Gwinn would be there for the save though and send it up the other way.

Just seconds later, the Toppers would test Gwinn again, this time with Beck taking a perfect lead pass from fellow senior Grant Hamby and working his way through traffic, much like on his first strike. This one would end the same way though as another shot thrown on net resulted in another Gwinn save keeping the Toppers honest.

Lincolnwood would get in on the act at the 8:50 mark of the half as timely play from senior Zack Wieland resulted in a nice lead pass up the gut, fooling the Hillsboro backline. After a short scrum in front of the Topper net, the Lancers would get the shot on, but just as his counterpart Gwinn, Hillsboro keeper Dyllan Lewey was there for the doorstep save to keep the score knotted at 0-0.

At the 10:00 mark of the half, the Toppers would have their best chance on net yet as a play deep in the Lancer end resulted in a Hillsboro corner kick. Beck would line up for the corner and let loose with a perfect cross ball in front that Hamby would get his head on for the redirect. His redirect would go just wide, however and

out of play.

A minute later, the Toppers would find themselves with another corner kick opportunity only to have the same result, this time with Bauman heading the redirect just wide.

Back and forth play would make up the middle minutes of the first half with each team keeping the other from making any real headway one way or the other until, with 9:50 left in the frame, the Toppers would nearly break through as Beck worked the ball deep into the Lincolnwood corner and threw a looping shot on net. The shot would hit the crossbar and ricochet down into the box, but Hillsboro would be unable to capitalize on the chance and the Lancers would once again gather up the ball and send it out.

Both teams would exchange near misses down the stretch in the half with nothing to show for it. With less than one minute left in the first, the hard work would pay dividends for Hillsboro as sophomore backliner Jake Holcomb came out of his zone and carried the ball up the left side and found freshman midfielder Chance Murray at midfield.

Murray would work through three separate Lancer players before breaking through and finding his line mate, junior Isaiah Atkins up front. Atkins would put the chip shot on and beat Gwinn up and over the top to give the Toppers the 1-0 lead just before the break.

Lewey, Colwell Selected As Topper Athletes Of The Week

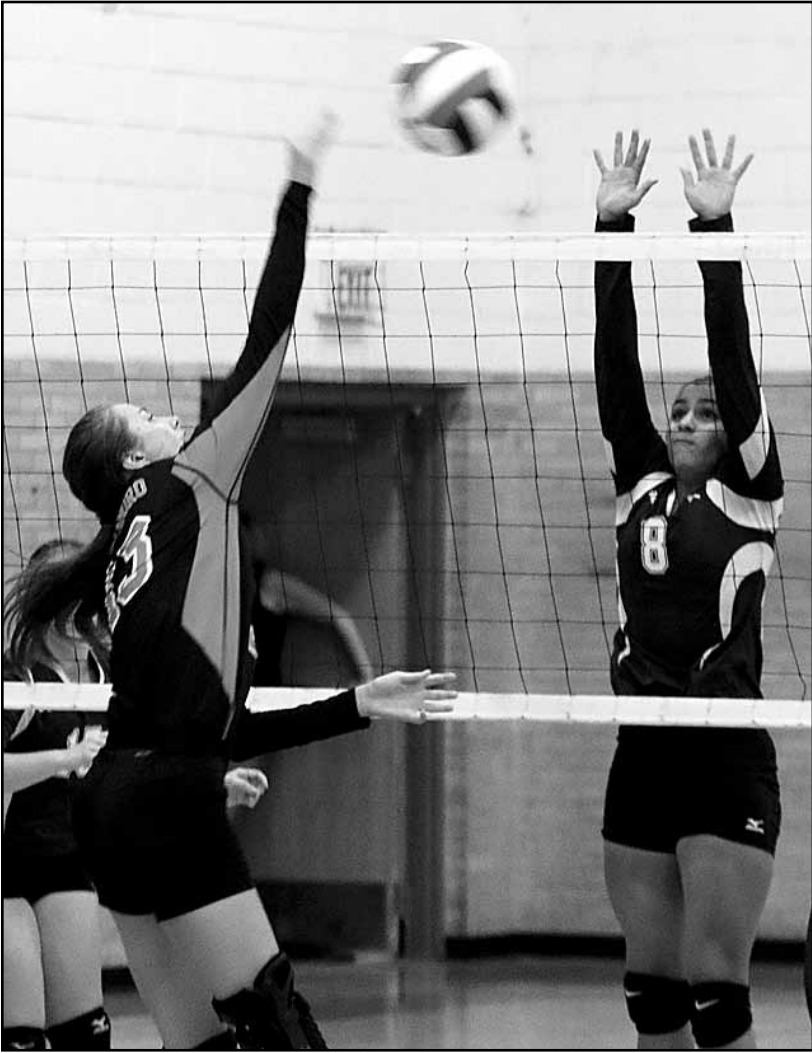
Hillsboro High School's Dyllan Lewey and Anna Colwell were selected as this week's Topper Athletes Of The Week.

During my coaching career, I have had positive relationships with nearly all of my athletes' parents. The majority of them are so helpful, kind, and supportive of the team and coaches.
This post is not meant to give the idea that coaches are perfect. Believe me; I have made more mistakes than I can count...
This is for the five percent of parents that cause 95 percent of the issues in athletics.

1) *We do play favorites (No, we don't care what your last name is).*
- That's right. We do. My personal favorites are the players that have a great work ethic, are intelligent players, will do whatever it takes to help the team and of course, display athleticism and talent.

2) *Yelling tips and instructions to your child from the stands does not help at all.*
- I know we think if we give our child that one last tip before he goes up to bat, he will surely get that big hit. Unfortunately, this only causes the player to think about something other than the task at hand. This is more detrimental than anything else.

3) *Lack of playing time does not mean that the coach does not like your kid.*
- Some of my fondest memories of coaching come from players that didn't start for me. Please realize that most coaches love all of their players. Unfortunately, in life, some people are better at certain things. This does not mean that your child is a failure. It definitely does not mean that coach loves your child less than the starters.

4) *At times, less is more.*
- In this age of select teams and travel ball, burnout has become an issue. The children play way too many games throughout their youth. By the time they get to junior high or high school, they are burned out and do not enjoy the sport.
5) *Focusing on one sport does not help your child earn scholarships.*
- Let's be honest. The chances of getting a college scholarship are slim. Not impossible, but also not likely for the majority of high school athletes.

This is the most common excuse when deciding not to play a sport. I'm going to focus on (insert sport

here)." Whatever sport your child is quitting will actually help them to become a better all-around athlete. The majority of professional and college athletes were multi-sport athletes in high school. They played more than one sport, and look where it got them.

6) *Stop living through your child, and let them enjoy their own experiences*

7) *It is ok that your child has failures.*
Failure and dealing with failure are HUGE lessons to learn in life. If you give your child the proper tools to deal with failure in sports, this will greatly benefit him or her in the future. Making excuses or always blaming the coach for your child's failures is merely setting them up for problems down the road. Everything that goes wrong or doesn't work out will be somebody else's fault.

8) *Our family members are in the stands while you are bashing "the coach."*
- This one may bother me the worst of all. As a three sport coach, I spend a lot of time away from my amazing wife and daughter. WE have made a sacrifice so that I can pursue my coaching career. That means that my time away from my family is devoted to working with your children to help them become better athletes and most of all better people. The least you can do is know who is around you while you are making these comments.

Greenville would answer with a steady diet of Moss up the middle, with Harnetiaux mixing in a few runs as well. Moss would score the first his five touchdowns on a one-yard run that made it 13-7 in Greenville's favor.

Litchfield would once again tie things up on Painter's second touchdown pass, this one going to Kyle Twitty on a five-yard strike. Painter, who was 10-of-16 for 157 yards passing in the game, would use his feet to benefit his arm as he effectively scrambled his way away from would-be Comet tacklers.

Again Greenville would answer with more of the running game, with Moss taking it in from nine yards to make the score 20-13. He would get his third touchdown less than four minutes later after the Comets forced Litchfield to punt and marched the ball down for a 13-yard touchdown run by the senior back.

The two teams would trade possessions once more, with Litchfield getting the ball back with 1:04 remaining in the half. Starting from their own 15, Painter found Twitty on a short pass that the senior turned into a 26-yard gain. The Comets would hit Twitty late out of bounds, which moved the ball up further, to the Greenville 44.

Painter scrambled for 24 yards on the next play to put the Panthers at the edge of the red zone and found Twitty on a similar pass play for the 20-yard touchdown. At the half, Litchfield trailed the Comets by just eight, a moral victory if not a victory on the scoreboard.

Despite the momentum of the late score, Litchfield found themselves down two scores again midway through the third quarter as the Comets scored on a 12-yard run by Moss with 7:32 to play.

The Panthers would work their way back into the game though, cutting the lead to eight on a one

yard run by Trevor Geggie. The drive was sparked by a solid run back on the kickoff by Deundrea Holloway, who received the ball on the Litchfield 14 and didn't stop until he was brought down at the Greenville 45.

The Comets would get the ball to the Litchfield 39, but turned over possession on the first play of the fourth quarter when Litchfield stopped Moss a yard short of a first down on a fourth down and four.

The Panthers would benefit from two pass interference calls on the Comets in their next drive, the second of which prevented a fourth down situation, and tied the game with 8:33 to play on a nine yard pass from Painter to Chase Lauderdale and a two point conversion toss to Kyle Twitty.

Despite the success on offense, Litchfield would have no answer for Moss, who had 11 runs of 10 yards or more, but didn't have a single gain over 23 yards (a run that came on his last carry of the contest).

Seven carries and 49 yards after the Panthers' kickoff, Greenville found themselves up 39-33 on Moss' fifth touchdown of the night.

As they had four times before, Litchfield tried to answer a Greenville score with one of their own. Highlighted by a 49-yard reception from Twitty, Litchfield worked its way into scoring position.

With the ball on the Greenville six, Painter dropped back on third and three and tried to find Chase Lauderdale in the back of the endzone. Just before the senior runningback could snag Painter's offering, Greenville defensive back Hunter Robinson swooped in to intercept the ball to end the Panthers' comeback attempt.

Moss would put a bow on the victory, running four more times for 59 yards to set up Harnetiaux's four-yard touchdown run that accounted for the final 49-33 result.

Painter had a career night with 115 yards rushing to go along with the 156 yards passing. Unfortunately, the junior quarterback missed the last series of the game due to injury, joining Trevor Geggie and Cam Morris on the list of

wounded stars at the end of the game for the Panthers.

In his second game back after joining the team after the start of the season, Twitty was Painter's favorite target, catching four passes for 107 yards. Twitty also had eight tackles and seven assists on the defensive end.

After playing teams that are a combined 13-2 the last three weeks, the Panthers face a slightly less menacing section of their schedule the next two weeks as they play Gillespie (1-4) and Roxana (0-5). While both games are on the road, they may represent Litchfield's best chance at ending their current 15-game losing skid.

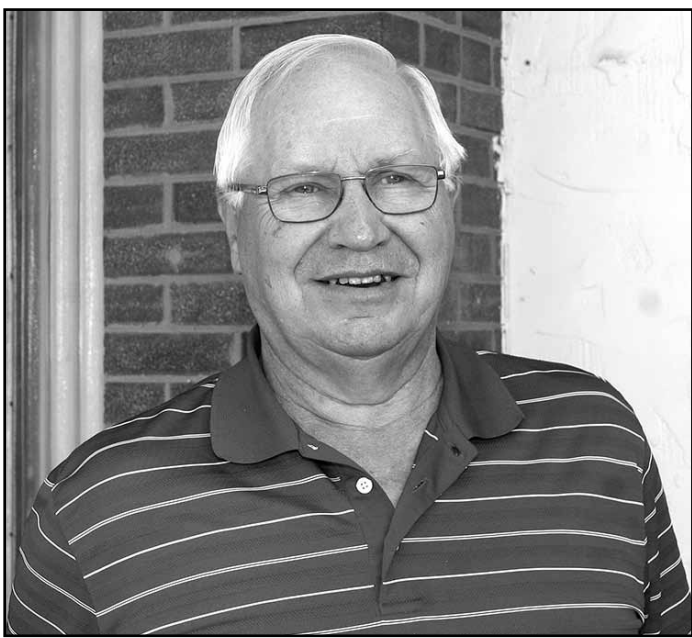

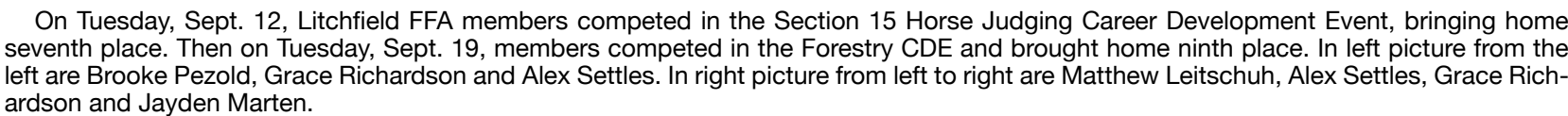

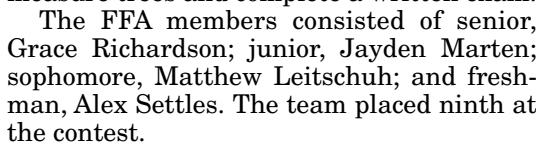

have used ones for sale. We buy, sell and trade on guns," Snoddy said.

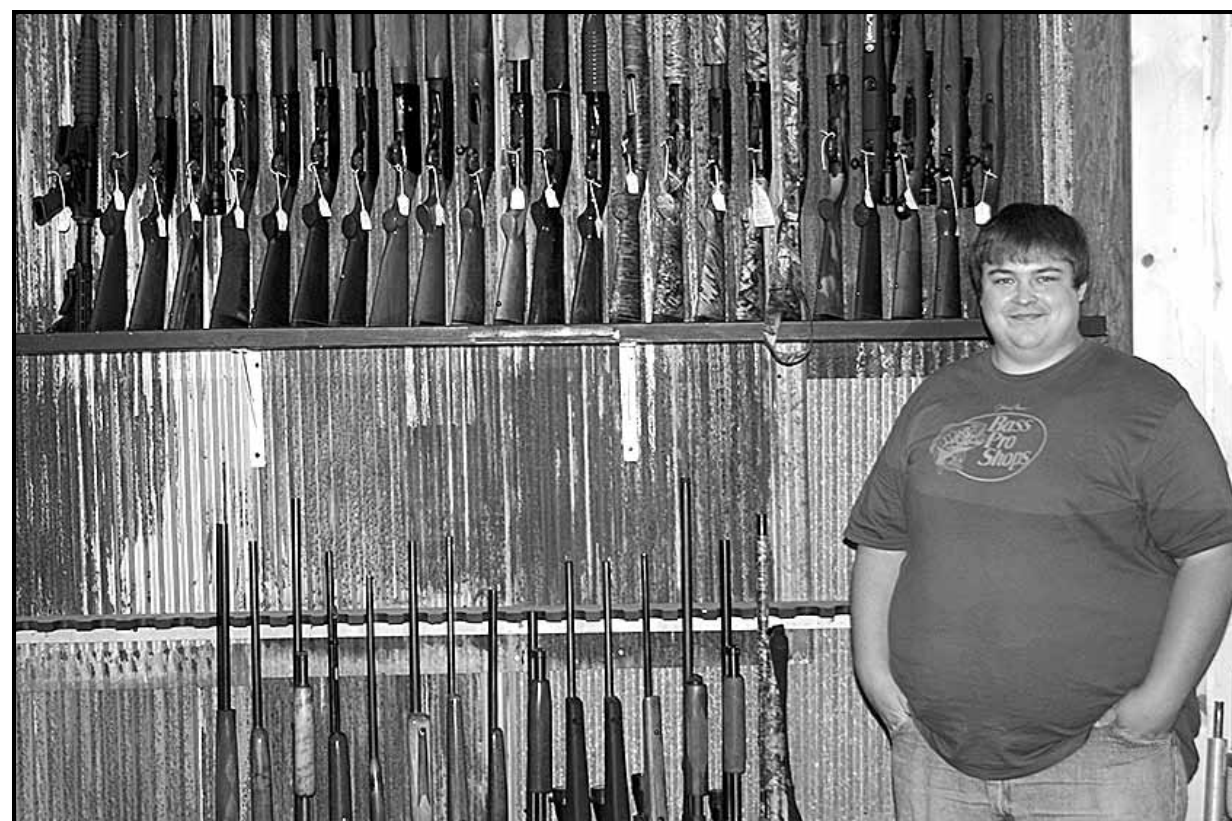

IDOI Releases Health Care Rate Filings For Next Year

The Illinois Department of Insurance (DOI) has submitted to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) health care rate filings recently received from Illinois insurers for the 2018 on-exchange marketplace.

Following CMS's adjusted timeline, DOI has given insurers the maximum amount of time to revise 2018 rates to ensure that they are actuarially sound before federal CMS finalizes them. DOI cannot reject or modify rates under the Affordable Care Act (ACA), so long as the proposed changes, including significant rate increases, are actuarially sound. These rates will not be finalized by federal CMS until October.

In addition, network and specific premium information will not be available until October. However, in the interest of helping prepare Illinois consumers to make the best choices on or off the marketplace during the upcoming 2018 Open Enrollment Period, DOI is sharing its actuarial analysis of the marketplace now. The study can be found on DOI's website under the 'latest news' tab.

Though nationwide 2018 premium rates continue to increase for consumers, in Illinois, on average, premium increases are lower in 2018 than 2017 for all metal levels. "There is no question that major structural flaws in the ACA have forced higher insurance rates and separated families from trusted physicians and hospitals," said DOI Director Jennifer Hammer. "The ACA remains the law of the land. We will continue to ensure compliance with the ACA, as we've done since its implementation. Our mission at DOI is to protect consumers as well as foster a robust insurance marketplace."

Illinois consumers in all counties will have options to purchase health insurance coverage on the marketplace. With a drastically shorter Open Enrollment Period of 6 weeks versus 12 weeks, consumers enrolling or re-enrolling in coverage should look at all options that may be available to them on or off the marketplace starting on November 1, 2017. "DOI is committed to ensuring that consumers are prevented from incurring higher health insurance costs due to uncertainty in Washington," said DOI Director Jennifer Hammer. "Insurers have been advised to apply the CSR uncertainty cost, solely to silver plans."

This change makes it important that consumers diligently shop for a plan this year. DOI reminds consumers that cost alone may not be the only factor to consider when selecting a plan. For example, consumers may want to also consider a plan's provider network.

Consumers are encouraged to visit the Get Covered Illinois website at www.getcovered.illinois.gov for further information and assistance. The Get Covered Connector lets consumers search by zip code to find local, free application help and is available in Spanish as well as English. Consumers can also use this tool to schedule in-person assistance appointments with navigators and certified application counselors.
