Dr. Walter 'Chick' Bishop, 82 _ Educator, Public Speaker



Dr. Walter L. "Chick" Bishop, 82, of Litchfield, passed away on Tuesday, Nov. 7, 2017 at 5:40 a.m. at HSHS St. Francis Hospital in Litchfield.

Born Oct. 7, 1935, he was the son of Walter Lawrence and Mary Frances (Burke) Bishop of Litchfield. He married his high school sweetheart Hester Williams of Litchfield.

Surviving are his wife; a sister, Judith (Dr. Eric) Strohmeyer of Bozeman, MT; his children, daughter Jane Bishop of Evergreen, CO; sons Charles (Tammy) Bishop of Cantrall; Dale (Becky) Bishop of Litchfield; Don (Lisa) Bishop of Mustang, OK; Glenn (Kim) Bishop of Litchfield and Ben (Cheryl) Bishop of Litchfield. He has many wonderful grandchildren, greatgrandchildren, nieces, nephews and great nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents; one brother, Colonel Thomas Bishop; and two sisters Mary Lou Pitman and Elizabeth "Betty" Robey.

He was a graduate of Litchfield Community High School Class of 1953. He received his bachelor's degree in education from SIU Carbondale in 1958; a master's degree from SIU Edwardsville in 1963; and a doctorate of education from Illinois State University in 1975. He excelled in many sports in both high school and college. He lettered in football, wrestling and track at SIU Carbondale. In the late 1950searly 1960s he served in the Army and the Illinois National Guard.

He was a teacher and administrator at every level, elementary through graduate school. His long career in education began in 1958 as an elementary teacher at Raymond Grade School. He was the principal and sixth grade teacher at Ida J. Russell School in Litchfield from 1959-1967. From 1967-1977 he served as the Montgomery

County Superintendent of Schools. He later served as superintendent of the Livingston School District. He was an associate professor at Northern Illinois University, a professor and department head at the University of Northern Iowa, the director of the Springfield Education Consortium at Sangamon

State University and served as a consultant for the Illinois State Board of Education.

He was awarded the American Educators Medal in 1973 from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. His passion for education continued throughout his life. He penned the statement, "Education is the Eternal Flame of Freedom.

He was an avid supporter of his local community, served on many committees and was sought out to be a keynote speaker throughout the years. His love of patriotism was evident as he served as the keynote speaker for 36 years for the local chapter of The Voice of Democracy, an annual nation-wide scholarship program sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He wrote the agriculture section for the Litchfield sesquicentennial book. He was well-known for his knowledge of farming, antique farm equipment and the history of the Old West. He was instrumental in organizing numerous trail rides and was called upon to judge many horse and antique farm equipment shows throughout central Illinois.

He was a member of the Christian Church of Litchfield.

SOS Veterans Breakfast Will Benefit MAST Program

This year's Veterans Breakfast at Mt. Moriah Masonic Lodge in Hillsboro will benefit the Masonic Association of Service and Therapy Dogs (MAST), according to Worshipful Master Warren Hall.

The annual SOS breakfast will be on Veterans Day, Saturday, Nov. 11, from 6-10 a.m. at Mt. Moriah.

MAST is a nonprofit that rescues trainable dogs through Orphans of the Storm Animal in Deerfield and trains them in Grayslake to be therapy or service dogs for veterans.

Therapy dogs are trained to provide affection and comfort to people in hospitals, retirement homes, nursing homes, schools, hospices and disaster areas. Service dogs are specifically trained to help people who have disabilities, such as visual impairment, hearing impairment, seizure disorder, mobility impairment or mental illness such as post traumatic

stress disorder.

Veterans who need service dogs apply with the committee board at James A. Lovell Federal Health Care Facility in Chicago. After a dog is chosen from the shelter, it must be given a clean bill of health from Lindenhurst Animal Hospital, then goes to the TOPS Kennel in Grayslake for one to two months of training. Service skill training of about two to three months begins after that, and the veteran in need is then introduced to the service dog to begin the final stages of training. Upon successful completion of that training, the dog is allowed placement in the veteran's home and overseen by MAST for the next year and a half with regular check-ups and



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



One, or at least I, didn't know what to expect when the 2017 football season began. Several kev contributors, including a very good offensive line, a quarterback who had speed as a rusher and a hard-hitting defensive crew were lost to graduation.

However, coming back were four of the five top scorers, the center of the offensive line, and a to-be senior class that seemed close to each other.

Quarterback Dillon Civitate was a question in my mind; as a sophomore, he was an offensive lineman and a linebacker. As a junior, he was a fullback with lead blocking responsibilities and a linebacker. Coaches told me he'd done a good job quarterbacking the freshman team, but at 225 lbs. he wasn't the typical HHS quarterback.

Indeed he wasn't; he threw for 1,089 yards - more than most HHS quarterbacks have in their careers - and led the offense to 30.4 points a game, throwing for 14 touchdowns with only two interceptions. To me his offensive performance was the surprise of the year; we hadn't had an over 1,000 yard performance in recent memory. Remember Rob Dirigo, the transfer in from Troy, Missouri, who had a reputation as a passer? In 2009 he compiled 637 yards. In 1999 Cody Greenwood, one of the better athletes to attend HHS in the last 20 years, had 775 yards passing; a few signal callers were well under 500 yards as a passer.

Civitate had two advantages - a pair of tight ends, Jordan Gregg and Dalton Deming - who had hands, and late addition Drake Paden, whose hands and speed made him a deep threat opposing defenses had to honor. Primary running backs Gunner Lentz and Christian Hernandez were catch

and run threats as well. Lentz was the leading return scorer and rusher (74 points and 840 yards as a junior). He surpassed both totals in 2017, scoring 100 points and 928 rushing yards - tantalizingly close to the 1.000 vard mark. As a sophomore he had 398 yards, so for his career he had a respectable 2,166 yards carrying the ball.

Hernandez recovered from a shattered leg in his freshman year to become a fearful runner, the wild bull rusher who never went down easily. In 10 games this season he gained 683 yards while losing only 9; that gave him a 7.2 yards per carry average.

Paden's appearance in a uniform after game three helped the offense, but so did Liam Dugan's shift from offensive tackle to fullback, primarily a blocking position in the Topper offense. That allowed Hernandez to move from fullback to three-back, from where he gained 90% of his yards.

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Gov. Rauner Declares Harvest Emergency For Illinois Farmers

Gov. Bruce Rauner declared on Sunday, Nov. 5, a statewide harvest emergency to assist farmers and grain handlers who are grappling with the fallout of rain-related delays.

"Illinois is home to 72,000 farms on 26.7 million acres. We are among the top three corn producers in the nation," Rauner said, while visiting Stewart Farms in Yorkville on Sunday afternoon. "Moving corn and other crops in a timely and efficient manner affects the bottom line of hard-working farmers. This declaration is an appropriate response to an urgent need."

Under a new law Rauner signed on Aug. 11, the declaration permits drivers of trucks carrying agricultural commodities over state highways to obtain a free permit to exceed gross vehicle weight limits by 10 percent. Further, local authorities may waive the permit requirement at their discretion. The emergency $declaration \, is \, in \, effect \, for \, 45 \, days$ beginning Sunday, Nov. 5.

The Illinois Department of Transportation already is mobilizing the permitting process and notifying law enforcement

agencies throughout the state. More information is available at http://truckpermits.dot.illinois.

"I would like to thank the governor for making this declaration today," said Richard Guebert Jr., president of the Illinois Farm Bureau. "This harvest season emergency declaration will improve the transportation of our

According to data from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Illinois corn harvest at the end of October was 17 percentage points behind the prior year and 11 percentage points behind the five-year average.

The corn harvests in the Northwest, Northeast and East regions are especially hard hit. Harvesters of a variety of crops made up ground toward the end of October, but early delays are still causing backups in the transportation chain.

Jeff Adkisson, executive vice president of the Grain and Feed Association of Illinois, also praised the governor's action, noting that a bumper crop combined with the harvest delays to compound the situation.

"In years when harvest is better than anticipated, crops like corn and soybeans may need to be stored in piles outside of the traditional concrete or steel bins or tanks," he said. "This declaration will allow grain elevators to transport commodities out of their facilities quicker, thus making room for grain stored on the ground to be moved to more suitable storage structures.'

Illinois Department of Agriculture Director Raymond Poe said the action will encourage the farming community.

"Illinois farmers work tirelessly year-round, even more so around harvest," he said. "The Department of Agriculture would like to thank Gov. Rauner for making this declaration and for his support of Illinois farmers."

State legislators also welcomed the harvest emergency declaration.

State Rep. Toni McCombie, R-Savanna, co-sponsored HB 2580, which amended the state vehicle code to allow for exceeding trucks' gross weight limits when a governor declares a harvest emergency.

'Mother Nature has presented

Illinois farmers with a rainy spring and fall, making this year's harvest challenging," she said. "The state of Illinois was proactive when we foresaw an emergency this year.'

"Farmers form the backbone of our state's economy," said State Senator Neil Anderson, a Republican from Andalusia who sponsored the legislation in the Senate. "Declaring a harvest emergency will reduce red tape and allow those farmers who are still in the field to focus on getting their crops in before winter really takes hold.'

The sooner farmers can get their commodities to market, the more stable the market will be for the consumer.

State Rep. Dan Swanson, R-Alpha, a member of the House Agriculture and Conservation Committee, said the rainy planting season caused corn and beans to mature later this fall.

"As a result, many farmers are behind in getting their crops harvested," he said. "With this declaration of a harvest emergency, we will allow farmers the ability to get more grain to the storage sites quicker.'
