
County EMA Awarded \$20,000 By Energy Transfer

Panhandle Board Approves Annual Audit

The members of the Panhandle Board of Education met on Monday, Oct. 16, for their regular meeting. The board would approve five items, plus the consent agenda for the meeting.

The items passing by a 7-0 margin included the FY2017 district audit, which was presented to the board, approval of Specialized Data Systems Financial Accounting and Management Software,

approval of the school library per-capita grant and a motion to keep closed session minutes from Feb. 27 to Aug. 9 closed, a vote that took place after the board went into closed session and reconvened at 9:05 p.m.

The only motion not to pass unanimously was the approval of the 2018 senior class one day trip, which passed 5-2, with Terri Payne and Dana Pitchford voting no.

Items on the consent agenda included the October 2017 bills, the September 2017 disbursements, the treasurer's report and activity account reports, plus informational items pertaining to the district dashboard, overtime and other financial matters.

The board adjourned the meeting at 9:06 p.m. They will meet next month on Monday, Nov. 20,

Raymond Receives DAR Tree Donation

The village of Raymond will be the recipient of a new red maple tree at the end of the month courtesy of a generous donation from the Christiana Tillson Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

According to Mayor Denny Held at the village board meeting on Monday, Oct. 16, Raymond was selected for the donation and planting of the tree at the Raymond Gun Club in honor of Raymond being one of the first 13 villages established in Montgomery County. The tree planting will take place at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28, at the Raymond Gun Club, with a short ceremony

Mayor Held also stated that trustee Bob Pennock will be representing the Raymond Village Board at the county-wide Tornado Table Top Exercise at the Grand Magnuson on Saturday, Oct. 21. Water Superintendent Rick Broaddus, Street Superintendent Mike Masten and Ben Pope will also be in attendance from the village.

The board would also hear from Devin Bedinger, who has been contracted to clean and paint the village's fire hydrants and clean the city's water tower. Bedinger said that he had started on the fire hydrant cleaning and painting and asked about the proposed date for cleaning the water tower. Trustee Bruce Poggenpohl stated that he could contact the rental company and schedule the lift for

the weekend of Oct. 27. In streets business, Mayor Held said that the street sweeper had broken down one day the previous week but was easily fixed by the following day. The mechanical issue prompted a salesman to stop by with a sale sheet for a newer model, a 2003, which would cost

the village around \$15,000. The board discussed the sweeper in some detail and the matter was tabled for discussion at a later

In water and sewer business, Well 6 has been cleaned, but required a new pump, motor and intake. Broaddus showed the board pictures of the old pump and the wear and tear to it. While the well was cleaned a couple years ago, the pump is eight to nine years old.

In golf course business, trustee Joe Martin stated that he had received reports from the pro shop that all is running well, while Mayor Held said that the LED lights for the pro shop were in. One light will be replaced in the village hall, while the rest will go in the pro shop at Shoal Creek Golf Course, followed by the board room.

EPA Announces Revisions to Cleanup Plan

for the Eagle Zinc Site

Hillsboro, Illinois

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has changed the Eagle Zinc Superfund site cleanup plan. The revised plan calls for cleanup of lead-contaminated soil in a residential area that was discovered during remedial design sampling. Residential soil cleanup will conform with the current national lead policy. U.S. EPA is also establishing a third operable unit for the site because further studies have determined that affected sediment in off-site streams and Lake Hillsboro will require additional evaluation.

Illinois Environmental Protection Agency agrees with these changes, which are summarized in a document called an "Explanation of Significant Differences." The ESD is available at http://www.epa.gov/superfund/eagle-zinc. Additional site-related documents are available on the web and at Hillsboro Public Library, 214 School St.





St. Paul's Plans 185th, Reformation Services

St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Hillsboro has planned special services and events in October and November to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the reformation and the church's 185th anniversary

On Sunday, Oct. 29, St. Paul's will celebrate the 500th anniversary of the protestant reformation with a special service at 10:15 a.m. followed by a meal. The service will celebrate the 500th anniversary of the day German monk Martin Luther nailed 95 theses on the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenburg on Oct. 31, 1517. The church has planned a

Harvest Home Service set for 10:15 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 11, and on Sunday evening, Nov. 19, the church will celebrate its 185th anniversary with a candlelight vespers historical play, beginning at 6:30 p.m., followed by desserts.

Established on April 12, 1832, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Hillsboro was the second Lutheran congregation formed in

the state and remains the oldest active Lutheran church in Illinois.

The Rev. Daniel Scherer, a circuit-riding minister who had traveled 1,700 miles on horseback to preach to pioneer Lutherans in Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois, was the founding father. He visited Hillsboro in 1830 and found several families of Lutherans from Carrabus, NC, his home state. They persuaded him to form a church in the county seat and he became the first pastor. The Rev. Scherer returned to his home in North Carolina, sold his property there, and returned to Hillsboro in early 1832.

For two years, services were held at the courthouse and in 1834 the first frame Lutheran church in Illinois was built on the lot just north of the present house of worship.

In 1846, the 10-year-old Hillsboro Academy was transferred to the church and became the first Lutheran college in the state. The school is still in existence, albeit now called Carthage College in Kenosha, WI. Music students from Carthage College periodically perform at St. Paul's in Hillsboro in recognition of their school's roots.

The first frame church was replaced with a brick structure in 1856 at a cost of \$7,000 and the present church was dedicated on April 4, 1897, built and furnished for about \$15,000. The current education wing was built in 1978 at a cost of \$400,000.

A central figure in St. Paul's long history is Dr. Ezra Keller, who was invited to serve as a supply pastor before completing his last year at seminary. He was extended a call to become the regular pastor of the church as soon as he completed his theological training and was officially installed on Oct. 20, 1895. He remained pastor of the church for 60 years before retiring in 1955, a year before his death. From 1945 to 1950, Dr. Hugh Paton, a son of the church, served as assistant pastor.



Armed And Ready: Engelman Makes Long Journey Back

After months of rehabilitation, four surgeries and enough doctors, visits to earn employee parking, Nokomis senior Connor Engelman completed his long journey back from injury when he took the field for the Redskins against East Alton-Wood River. The game was the three-sport standout's first game back since suffering a gruesome arm injury on March 19, 2017.

Baltasar Gracián, who was either a Spanish writer and philosopher or a character on Game of Thrones, said that, "A single lie destroys a whole reputation of integrity."

That pretty much says it all. With all of this in mind, I'm going to give Connor Engelman a free pass for the fib he told me on Aug. 1. The day before I asked Nokomis' first team all-conference running back and defensive back on the gridiron for the Redskins for the 2017 season.

"No. Football is a definite no and basketball is a maybe," Connor said via a Twitter message. "That's what the doctor says. I'm guessing I'll be fine for basketball season."

Two and a half months later, Engelman sent me another message, this one a little more upbeat. "Well I lied lol. I'll be playing

tonight!'

I knew that Connor had injured his right arm during baseball season and that the injury was serious enough to sideline the Redskins starting centerfielder and pitcher from seeing the field for much of the year, but that was about the extent of it.

What I didn't know was all that Connor and his parents, Brent and Tanya, had been going through since the initial injury occurred when Connor fractured his arm late in the 2016 baseball season.

The fracture affected his throwing, but he still played in the regionals his sophomore year, running the ball to a corner outfielder after making a catch. According to doctors the injury was supposed to heal in about eight weeks, but almost a year later, it hadn't.

Connor, who played football and basketball with the fracture with few ill affects, said that his doctor had scheduled surgery for May 30, right after the 2017 baseball season would be complete, but fate had other plans.

"On March 19, I dove back into a base at Morrisonville," Connor explained. "There is a little bone that is connected to your triceps and my triceps pulled that bone off."

That sped up the timetable for surgery, with a plate and screws inserted into his arm. It would take 12 weeks to recover from. After about eight weeks, the doctor told Connor that he could begin to swim and lift weights, but to take it easy.

"That night I went home and I stumbled and put my hand on my bed and the same thing happened again," Connor said. "The next day, I had another surgery where he put in a bigger plate and eight screws. It was two days before prom... and I still went to prom."

Two weeks later, the doctors found another problem. The skin around the area where the plate was had died, which required a skin graft to fix. After the first skin graft didn't do the trick, Connor had another one done, this time with doctors taking a tendon from his wrist to cover up part of the area.

The second graft took, but left

behind a gruesome reminder.

"If you get a chance, have him show you his arm," Brent Engelman told me before I met with his son. "Looks like he survived a shark attack."

And it does. Connor said he's used the line a few times. It should make for some great stories down

the road.

The road map of scars and reminders of the surgery is nothing compared to the two months that Connor had to wait until he was able to put his reconstructed arm through its paces, an eternity for a sports crazed 17-year-old. All he could do was sit in bed, go to school and do physical therapy at home, including some torture device in the form of a brace that allowed him to turn a dial and force his arm to bed.

"It was so tight, after about 30 seconds, I couldn't feel my hand," Connor said.

Despite the setbacks, Connor didn't let the injury get him down.

"Yeah it hurt, but my whole thought process was to not let it define me," he explained. "I love football, I love baseball and I want to be able to do those things my senior year. What happened sucks, but I can still do those things if I work hard."





After two months, Connor got the ok to get back to the weight room, where he started off with a PVC pipe, followed by a 15 pound bar, a 45 pound bar, then eventually more weight. Within about two weeks, he was already up to 135 pounds once. The next week, he was able to do 155 once.

The whole time he was rehabilitating, Connor was also on the sidelines with his team, pushing them, encouraging them, trying to be the leader that he was when he was on the field, but it wasn't the same.

"Standing on the sidelines, whenever I say stuff, they listen, but it doesn't mean as much," Connor said. "I try to be a leader but it doesn't work from the sidelines."

His progress and his drive to return to the field led Connor to take a chance when he visited his doctor last week.

"He was saying how I should be able to play basketball and I should be able to play baseball. And I was kind of scared of his answer, because I knew he would think I was crazy, but I said 'We have two football games left, can I play?" Connor remembered. "He kind of looked around the room for a couple seconds and said yup. He didn't even argue with me. I was prepared to argue, I was ready to go. As he walked out of the room he told the nurse practitioner that I needed my head examined. I think he's going to be at the game Friday. He told me he just got rid of the stomach ulcer I gave him.'

Just stepping foot on the field would be enough for most people, but Connor did more than that. In the Redskins' loss to East Alton-Wood River, Connor caught five passes for 104 yards and a touchdown, a bittersweet moment due to his competitive nature.

' I caught it and immediately I was excited and I turned to jump up as some of my teammates were coming to congratulate me," he said of Nokomis' lone score with a grin. "When I turned, I saw the scoreboard and realized that we were still losing 41-6 and I wasn't as excited anymore."

Despite the final score, the game was a memorable one for Connor, who had to shake off the shock of just being on the field once again.

'It was kind of surreal standing there. I think on the first play, I didn't totally take off right away. I couldn't believe that I'd actually done it," he said. "I flashed back through everything. Two months ago, I was in a sling not doing anything and now I'm here. It felt awesome."

Crossbows Back In For Archery



As I sit here and write this column this morning, I'm drinking a nice cup of coffee with the windows open while Maynard Hartke shells corn in the field next door. This is one of those mornings when

you feel glad to be alive. I love this time of year. This is when you see good ole' fashion American made labor hard at work.

It's one of the few instances where we get to appreciate something that has stayed in our country for hundreds of years due to the hard work of families who have carried the farming torch from generation to generation. I've always said if I wasn't a cop I'd be farmer, though I'm not sure my tomato growing skills could support a family.

With the harvest season comes a few more exciting things this time of year. Illinois archery bow season started Oct. 1 and is in full swing. The unusually warm October temperatures have kept a lot of guys out of the woods thus far though we are supposed to see some cooling next week.

One thing I should add is that hunters in Illinois may now use crossbows any time during archery hunting seasons, including the Illinois archery deer season and the Illinois fall turkey archery season, which began on Oct. 1.

Illinois law previously allowed the use of crossbows for archery hunting by persons age 62 or older and those persons with disabilities who qualified for a crossbow permit issued by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

In addition, the previous law allowed certain youth hunters to use crossbows and allowed all archery hunters to use crossbows beginning the Monday after the second firearm deer season.

The 2017-18 season dates for archery deer and fall turkey archery hunting in Illinois are Oct. 1, through Jan. 14, 2018. Archery seasons will be closed Nov. 17 through 19 and Nov. 30 through Dec. 3 during the firearm deer season in those counties open to firearm deer hunting.

The youth firearm deer season was Oct. 7 through Oct. 9. As seen in the pictures, a lot of young guns were successful. I saw a lot of pictures on social media of moms, dads and grandparents sharing a seat alongside in the deer stand. Take that time and keep those pictures coming. It seems our youth are getting outside less and less and spending their time on electronic gadgets. Remember the old saying, "If your kid is out hunting, you won't be hunting for your kid."

Shotgun deer season is scheduled for Nov. 17 through Nov. 19 and second season is scheduled for Nov. 30 through Dec. 3. Seasons for rabbit, quail, pheasant and other game animals come in on Nov. 4 as well.

Reports show the numbers are up on small game but the hunters are down. Coyotes are definitely on the increase. So are armadillos. Wait....Armadillos? In Montgomery County? Yes, they are. But that's a story for the next

My friend Devin Jenkins and some of the Raymond crew shared a story with me about the "hot pursuit" they had of an armadillo in the Raymond area, right in the middle of town. They were able to catch the critter and release it in a safer place. I was able to see it as well, ugly little critter, long black chest hair, tiny little feet and a pig shaped snout. Stay tuned.

Crop Condition

Cooler temperatures across the state last week. There were 3.7 days suitable for fieldwork during the week ending October 15. Statewide, the average temperature was 61.8 degrees, 5.9 degrees above normal. Precipitation averaged 2.61 inches, 2.14 inches above normal.

Topsoil moisture supply was rated at 12 percent very short, 19 percent short, 56 percent adequate, and 13 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supply was rated at 11 percent very short, 30 percent short, 55 percent adequate, and 4 percent surplus.

Corn mature was at 95 percent, compared to 100 percent last year.

Corn harvest was 47 percent complete, compared to 64 percent for the 5-year average. Corn condition was rated 4 percent very poor, 7 percent poor, 26 percent fair, 48 percent good and 15 percent excellent.

Soybeans dropping leaves was at 94 percent, compared to 96 percent last year. Soybean harvest was 63 percent complete, compared to 55 percent last year.

Winter wheat planted was at 51 percent, compared to 40 percent last year. Winter wheat emerged was at 13 percent, compared to 15 percent for the 5-year average.

Pasture and range condition was rated 12 percent very poor, 26 percent poor, 40 percent fair, 21 percent good and 1 percent excellent.

Machine Evaluates Soybean At Harvest For Quality

to harvest, speed is of the essence. But harvesting grinds to a halt every time the combine operator has to climb down out of the cab to manually check for quality, whole, un-split beans without stray husk material.

Researchers from Kyoto University and University of Illinois recently developed a machine to automate the process, evaluating bean quality on the fly, so harvesting can go on uninterrupted.

"The main objective was to develop an efficient, compact, onboard quality-monitoring system to evaluate soybeans as they are harvested, providing the combine operator with real-time grain quality information," said Md Abdul Momin, lead scientist on the project.

Momin explains that when the threshing speed is too high, the soybeans split or break as they are harvested. This is undesirable because whole beans are considered to be higher quality and bring a higher price.

"Without this machine, operators need to periodically stop

When a field of soybeans is ready threshing and manually check the tank to evaluate the quality and make adjustments," Momin said. "With this machine, operators can look at a screen and make adjustments as they go, without stopping.'

The machine, which includes a high-speed camera, is mounted inside the tank of the harvester. It takes images of the beans as they pass by and a computer program analyzes the beans in real time. One key is that it is a double-imaging system. It uses a combination of both front and back lighting so the camera can see the complete shape of the beans, making it possible to identify those that are truly split.

Momin tested the system first in the laboratory and then in field conditions. The prototype is currently in the hands of a Japanese company that is working to develop a higher-speed camera and ultimately to produce the machine.

The same system can be used in the processing industry with a \$100 web camera, making it very affordable," Momin said. "Mounting it inside of the combine is more ambitious because it needs a super high-speed camera to evaluate the soybeans as they pass rapidly by."

Momin said soybean growers in Japan are eager to use this new technology to evaluate beans during the harvest. They believe it will improve the process by doing much of the sorting and cleaning of the soybeans before they reach

the processing plant.

The study, "Machine Vision
Based Soybean Quality Evaluation," is published in Computers and Electronics in Agriculture. The research was conducted by Md Abdul Momin, Kazuya Yamamoto, Munenori Miyamoto, Naoshi Kondo and Tony Grift.

Financial support and field experiment facilities were provided by Yanmar Co. Ltd. in Okayama, Japan. A patent has been awarded

Fillmore Woman Publishes Children's Book


A Fillmore woman has published her first children's book, about turning negative thoughts into positives.
