September Raymond Meeting Pushed Back Due To Labor Day

With the Labor Day holiday interrupting the regular schedule, the members of the Raymond Village Board met on Thursday, Sept. 7, for their first meeting of the month.

Mayor Dennis Held would inform the board that he had attended the mayors meeting in Hillsboro on Sept. 6, with a number of topics discussed. Among the discussion items were preparation for the 2020 census, emergency planning and public works. There is a table top planning meeting scheduled in October and it was highly recommended that someone representing the village attend.

In streets and alleys business, Trustee Bruce Poggenpohl stated that the sidewalks had been poured and others fixed at Prairie and Shirley streets by Don Moore. Poggenpohl also noted that the new tires had been installed on the backhoe and that he had possibly found an alternative site to burn debris, a discussion item from the last meeting. He added that he is waiting to hear from the landowner.

Related to the burning issue, Officer Tony Telford told the board that he had made more patrols out around the burn pile to monitor unwanted dumping since the issue was brought up at the previous meeting.

In water and sewer business, the cleaning of Well #6 is scheduled for the end of the month. It has been recommended that the test well be treated to alleviate any potential problems and to continue to monitor it for additional clean up.

In golf course business, Trustee Scott Pinkston mentioned that there were several bad lights in the pro shop. Mayor Held said that new LED lights carry a longer life, eliminate the need of a ballast and may be more cost effective for the building.

In economic development news, several board members commented on how nice the recycling trailer looked and Trustee Bob Pennock mentioned that the recycling is now only being done by two groups, the Boy Scouts and the Baptist Church Youth Group.

Mayor Held told the board that he had aerated, seeded and watered the former Carrier property on East and North streets and asked if it was time to offer it for sale. The board agreed to publish the sale of the property by sealed bids, with bids to be due and opened at the Oct. 16 board meeting.

In other business, Mayor Held stated that the classes Police Chief Valerie Sheldon will be taking were moved from September to October. Also the board discussed other issues with ordinance violations and with dilapidated buildings. Trustee Greg Bernhardt said that he had spoken with an owner of one such property and that repairs are ongoing and installation of a new roof is forthcoming.

Bernhardt also said that Village Clerk Susan Greenwalt had received complaints about tall grass at a property along Route 48.

The meeting would adjourn at 7:57 p.m. They will meet again on Monday, Sept. 18, at 7 p.m.

Those restrictions include the denial of requests to have objects in the park named for individuals in order to protect the integrity of the park and to honor the veterans only. O'Malley said that one such person, Dorothy Archibald, who was in the audience, had requested to put a bronze plaque honoring her late husband in the park, but was not allowed to. O'Malley also produced a letter from the American Legion from 1949 that said no certain organization or individual should place their name on the park.

Jan O'Malley said that she felt that the committee/individuals who are seeking to create the memorial jumped the gun and tried to do things too quickly. She also expressed concern that this would open up a Pandora's box if the board started allowing non-veteran memorials in the park.

Janssen asked Michael O'Malley if the signature fundraising bricks were O'Malley's main concern. O'Malley said that he didn't feel like those who weren't veterans should have their names in the Memorial Park. He added that several of the veterans on the memorial in the park have a star next to their name, meaning that they were killed in action, and that nothing is named after them.

O'Malley also mentioned that the board decided not to sell similar bricks or put names on the walking path at the park when fundraising was going on for that project.

Park board commissioner Bob Batty asked if O'Malley thought that the first responders memorial would dishonor the veterans by its placement in Memorial Park. O'Malley said that he was all for a first responders memorial, but thought that it should be located somewhere else.

Batty also asked why other organizations were allowed to have their names or signs on the pavilions in the park and the difference between those situations and the first responders memorial.

O'Malley said that those organizations had paid completely for those pavilions and no individual name was on them. He added that he felt that individual plaques and recognition cheapen the park and cater to those who can afford to honor their loved ones.

Nokomis resident Clarann Hulbert said that she believed part of the issue people had with the memorial was that there had been no public discussion of the memorial and where it should go and that there was no mention of it in the minutes of the park district meeting. Janssen said that was one of the reasons the board wanted to discuss the item on Monday, to prevent any misinformation.

Several opponents of placing the memorial in Memorial Park asked about placing it in another park in the city. Hassebrock said that the committee's first inclination was to place the memorial in Memorial Park, but they would be looking at other options as well.

Michael Smalley, a Nokomis firefighter, said that he felt like the memorial should be in Memorial Park due to the higher visibility of the area, in particular during Nokomis Homecoming. He said that he did not feel that the first responders memorial should be "shipped to the boonies" and that he hoped that the memorial could be a place where he could take his children and grandchildren someday to see the contributions his family had made over the last three generations.

Smalley also said that once the not-for-profit disbanded and turned over control to the park district, the park ceased to become War Memorial Park and simply became Memorial Park.

The possibility of putting the memorial at the fire house or EMT shed was also brought up, but opponents of that idea said that any additional traffic or visitors to that area could hinder first responder response.

Another speaker commented that the committee should have first designed the memorial and figured out the costs. Park board commissioner Tyler Batty said that the committee had done those things, but he didn't feel like it was appropriate to discuss those issues since they do not directly involve the park board.

O'Malley asked Batty if the price tag of \$125,000 was correct. Batty said it wasn't and that number was higher than the projected cost.

Several others would speak out for the first responders memorial, with Bob Batty clarifying that no spot for the memorial had been picked out and that it would not be directly next to the veterans memorial if it is placed in the park.

Glenn said regardless of what the board decides to do, he felt that they should have something firm in place, an ordinance, that either restricts or allows such projects. He said this would prevent future boards from having to make decisions on a case by case basis.

Glenn also said that he would be glad to look at any historical documents that may contradict his findings that there was nothing legally binding against putting other memorials in the park.

After approximately an hour, the board would vote to table the discussion of where the memorial might be placed until more research could be done. They will discuss the matter again at their next meeting on Monday, Oct. 9, at 6:30 p.m.

Benefits? "All we do is mow it," Powell said. It would also be a spot for a potential new residence and put the parcel back on the tax roll.

Board member Earl Meier asked for time to think about the proposal. It will return to next month's agenda.

The board approved a request from high school FFA advisor Kate Niemeier for five students to travel to the national FFA convention in Indianapolis in October.

As part of the consent agenda, Board member Bryce Rupert pointed out the substantial

\$12,000 check to the attorneys representing the school district in two ongoing lawsuits regarding the solar project at Beckemeyer and a performance contract.

Also during the consent agenda, the board approved its agreement for participation in OKAW Area Vocational Center, which not only allows students to attend the center, it also reimburses the district \$101,000 for salaries for instructors teaching vocational classes in Hillsboro.

The school board applauded the efforts of Hillsboro Junior High School staff who will be presented awards at the Illinois

State Board of Education annual meeting in October in Bloomington. Art teacher Brooke Butler will be presented the Early Career Educator, Patty Holshouser will be presented a Student Support Award for her work in the library, Janet Carlyle will be presented a Community Volunteer Award for her daily volunteer work in the school, Tracy Klump will be presented a Meritorious Service award for curriculum work, and the entire eighth grade team will be presented a Meritorious Service award for their fundraising efforts to provide a Chromebook for each eighth grade student.

In addition to informing the board about those awards, junior high principal Dr. Mark Fenske also congratulated Dominic Haggard and Josh Ray, each of whom competed at the Illinois Elementary School Association golf sectional on Sept. 5 in Jacksonville.

After a closed session, the board accepted the resignation of Tonya Hubbard as a food service employee, and approved Shonda Ronen as post-season high school cross country coach for students participating in the Illinois High School Association state series.

Board member Matt Lentz was not present at the meeting.

At the suggestion of Moran Development (the city's adviser for Business District matters), a payment of \$2,000 can be issued after the business has been open one year, with the two other \$2,000 checks to be issued after each subsequent anniversary.

Streets Commissioner Don Downs had a second round of bids to open for East Street work; the project was rebid with specifications (primarily no traffic control-the street will be closed to traffic during construction) because the original bids were higher than allocated MFT financing would cover.

The lowest bid, that of Stutz Excavating from Alton, for \$59,482 was accepted although it was still over the \$57,500 amount previously allocated for the project. Kenney Construction's bid was \$59,000; Kelley's bid was \$65,000. City Engineer Scott Hunt, Hurst-Rosche's representative, recommended accepting the lower bid so the project can be completed before weather turns bad; the over-estimate funding (\$1,982) will come from non-MFT sources. Hunt said it will take 7-14 days for Stutz to acquire required bonding, but he expects work to begin shortly thereafter.

Kenney's did win the bidding process for sidewalk work at 114 E. Wood Street in front of Dr. Pam Kotschevar's office. Once the site of city hall, the building needs an ADA compliant door (it will be the western one) and sidewalk. According to Commissioner Downs, curbing will be involved in the project. Kenney's bid was \$9,960 (\$1,240 less than a bid from a Nokomis firm).

Commissioner Robbins brought three of the remaining items to the table; the least, in terms of time,

was an amendment to the bow hunting on city property ordinance which eliminated language saying does were to be the target of choice. The council also agreed to pay Hurst-Rosche \$2,000 for engineering services for work the city will do in-house at the city pool complex. The Illinois Department of Public Health required the work be done on the drain system, which had previously been changed because of prior compliance issues.

The third item dealt with purchasing playground equipment for the campgrounds in a cooperative manner. The campers who produce Haunted Forest at Halloween have \$8,000 to contribute; the city had budgeted \$7,500, and Mayor Sullivan will pick up the equipment to save shipping costs. Finance Commissioner Katie Duncan pointed out it would create an over-budget look for Robbins' line item for playground equipment-the \$8,000 contribution will be entered as income; the \$15,500 will be an expense-with no simple way to account for the difference. The council consensus was to proceed with the purchase.

Commissioner Downs brought forward two other items; he was given permission to advertise for bids for a 200kw generator for the waste water plant to replace "... one we have which is a dinosaur." His other request was to approve a service agreement with HACH to cover the water plant; the agreement will cost \$2,246.

The mayor asked the council to approve a lease re-assignment for 204 Lands End Road from Arlene Gillis to a revocable living trust; city attorney Kit Hantla said he'd reviewed the agreement, and it seemed beneficial to the needs of both parties.

Public Safety Commissioner Mike Murphy asked the council to hire Rich Stewart on a part-time

basis to continue duties as an ombudsman for all departments. "He was a good ambassador for the city this summer," Murphy stated. Stewart's time to work will be limited (he still teaches building trades at the high school every morning and coaches defense for Greenville College in late afternoons and evenings), but he'll report to Code Enforcer Gary Satterlee when he has time to work; his salary is \$15.00 per hour.

City Clerk Cory Davidson and David Beal were administered perhaps the longest oaths of loyalty ever taken when Mayor Sullivan swore them in as the city emergency management coordinator and deputy emergency management coordinator early in the meeting. Sullivan said local government units have been asked to assume management positions during emergencies (tornadoes, floods), and he felt Davidson knows where resources are located in the city while Beal knows the processes well.

Two citizens spoke during the public comment section. Midge Baker asked for help; a neighbor (she lives on Summit Street near the Dairy Queen) has amassed a brush pile on his property after cleaning his back yard, and the pile hinders traffic in an alley and would be a danger to property if it were to catch on fire. Murphy said he'd have Satterlee check it out Wednesday morning.

Sharon Bayliff, who lives on Hillside Avenue, said a ditch bordering her property is unsightly and she'd like help from the city. Downs said he was aware of the problem, that he agreed with her, and that a remedy would be forthcoming.

In the opening commissioner/mayor reports, Robbins said another derelict house (at 123 South Douglas) has been torn down. A

new grease trap was installed at the Marina Restaurant, and the summer concert series at the campground is now over. A water leak at the campground was repaired, and the new stump grinder saw action again.

Murphy shared Police Chief Randy Leetham's report for July and August. August had brought a major increase in activity; 18 new cases were opened in July, 30 in August. August had five ordinance citations (four involved either possession of synthetic cannabis or drug paraphernalia-the other was a \$250 citation for blowing grass into the street).

Leetham thanked his department for covering shifts while one officer was on medical leave; no overtime was used. He also thanked the auxiliary police for their help, especially with the seemingly weekly weekend events.

Murphy also expressed frustration with the condition of a pond on Parkside Street.

Duncan said she's now working on the tax levy.

Downs reported that IDOT had done a great job while ditching just west of Ace Hardware. His crews dealt with the sunken sewer line problems, especially on Bell Street, and they continue to clean ditches to prevent future problems.

Mayor Sullivan thanked the volunteers around town who were collecting for the hurricane victims in Florida and Texas.

The council went into closed session at 8:10 p.m.; they returned at 8:35 with no action as a result of the closed session.

The council next meets on Tuesday, Sept. 26, at 7 p.m. in city hall. The public is encouraged to attend.

She added that another \$900,000 revenue stream could dry up soon as well, meaning they would have to have some funding in reserves to shore up operations.

"The money is there," Bishop said. "I think we are making a knee jerk reaction. There's a good chance that the mine will start again."

"We've all heard that, but I have to work with today's numbers," she said.

Bishop said he hated to see public safety take a hit when the money was there, and Beeler said the budget has to be sustainable.

Jones added that with a cut that big, they were most likely talking about employee jobs, and Beeler agreed that it would likely impact employees, but the board only allocated the money. It would be the sheriff who decides how it would be spent.

"No one enjoys being the bad guy," Beeler said. "No one wants to make these cuts that we know will impact people's lives. We cannot continue to operate on a deficit. The money will run out."

Board member Jay Martin asked if they could amend the budget if the coal mine did in fact reopen, and Beeler said that was a possibility. Martin added that it would be impossible to prepare a budget on heresay.

"We have spent coal money on operating costs every year I have been on the board," Beeler said. "We are finally to the point where we have to make a hard decision."

She said that general fund revenues this year are expected to be \$5.7 million, which is the same as they were in 2010, and expenditures continue to rise.

"We have fantastic employees and elected officials," Beeler said. "It's not like there are excess office supplies just lying around. But we cannot control insurance costs, and salaries continue to go up as well."

Board member Mark Hughes asked about the possibility of new revenues to help fund public safety. Board member Kirby Furness suggested revisiting the public safety sales tax, which failed in the April election. He said it could generate \$1 million, and could be placed on the March ballot.

Undersheriff Rick Robbins also addressed the board and encouraged board members to visit the sheriff's department to learn more about its operations.

"This is a very important decision on all your parts," Robbins said. "The Montgomery County citizens are looking to you for leadership. If we have to make cuts, make cuts, but please be informed about them."

Beeler said that any cuts the board makes will have consequences, but they are at the point now where they are just going to have to accept some of the consequences.

"I'm prejudiced for public safety," said board member Chuck Graden. "I think we should leave it alone, but I know it's a problem financially."

Beeler asked for his ideas in solving the problem, and Graden suggested using coal funds. Beeler asked him what would happen when it's gone.

Currently, the county has \$5.4 million in coal royalty money in reserve accounts. They spend roughly 10 percent of that each year on day-to-day operations costs, and the funding is not being replenished, as the mine is not in operation at this time.

"We are just talking about \$173,000," Jones said. "It will buy us time until the mine is in operation again."

Board member Gene Miles said the board has been discussing this problem for years.

Schram City Residents Encouraged To Submit Surveys By October

Meetings, surveys, updates and agreements were among the agenda items discussed by the Schram City Village Board during their monthly meeting on Monday evening, Sept. 11, at Schram City Village Hall.

Village President Albert Oberle updated the village board and members of the public about the mayor's meeting that was held on Wednesday, Sept. 6. He said Undersheriff Rick Robbins and the Montgomery County Emergency Management Director Greg Nimmo were on hand to inform local leadership on their roles during emergencies.

Tornado table top exercises will be held Saturday, Oct. 21, at the Magnuson Grand Hotel in Carlinville. Oberle said he plans to attend.

Montgomery County Coordinator Chris Daniels gave an update on the Enterprise Zone application that will be filed in 2018. Municipalities will review and

sign off on their maps starting in January and February. A goal was set to have the application filed by December 2018.

The board continues to advise residents to submit the low income and sewer infiltration surveys, and reported only 65% have been turned in. Once Water Clerk Marsha Eller returns, trustees will be asked to go door-to-door in hopes that will help. The information will be needed by October.

In agreement news, Oberle spoke with the lawyer concerning the CCI agreement, and learned the state granted CCI and other providers approval to operate in the area. As a result, CCI and New Wave will not be required to have franchise agreements.

The village currently submits audits to the comptrollers office on a cash basis, but according to the office, the audits will need to be submitted on an accrual basis beginning in 2019. Oberle said this change will be more costly, and they will continue to fight the change.

In addition to the CCI agreement, the board will continue with the lease agreement on the land across from the village hall.

Treasurer Lois Guinn provided the board with the treasurer's report, with board members Pat Rhoades and Jerry Woods agreeing it looks favorable.

Oberle mentioned the flow meter was calibrated, and the calibration report was sent to the Hillsboro Sewer Department.

The village will begin oiling and rocking roads Wednesday, Sept. 20.

Trustee Kevin Tuetken asked Hillsboro Police Chief Randy Leetham how much easement is on Route 16, and that he's heard complaints that cars are parked alongside the road. Leetham said it depends.

Oberle inquired about large containers that once held chemicals or paint that are now being used for water. Leetham said some bins for purchase are tagged with information regarding what they previously stored. If they are not

make sure they continue to meet requirements.

The motion to approve the advisory, non-binding recommendation was approved 14-6. Voting in favor of it were Jim Moore, Plunkett, Savage, Bob Sneed, Richard Wendel, Chairman Evan Young, Beeler, Bishop, Clark, Deabenderfer, Furness, Hughes, Martin and Miles. Voting against it were Robinson, Connie Beck, Bill Bergen, Graden, Johnson and Jones.

In other economic development news, Savage said the committee, with help from the Planning Commission, finished the solar farm ordinance, which was being reviewed by the state's attorney's office.

In Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation news, Executive Director Valerie Belusko said she continues to work with Illinois South Tourism on adding photos to their website which highlight Montgomery County.

She said this year's class of CEO (Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities) students is off to a great start, and has begun touring local businesses.

In broadband news, Belusko reported that the community of Nokomis reached its 20 percent with CTI, and is scheduled for a build-out after Hillsboro. Belusko added that she's working hard to find facts and figures about the economic impact of rural communities with broadband fiber, and plans to attend a meeting in Highland.

Savage reported that the Eagle Zinc clean-up project was halted for three weeks while workers dug a bigger hole, but that it was up and running again.

He said the committee also received a memo from the governor's office about plans for the upcoming Illinois bicentennial.

Young reported that the recent mayors' meeting was well attended, with a lot of good information provided by Robbins and Nimmo. He said 12 of the county's municipalities were represented. The next mayors' meeting will be the third Wednesday in February.

In West Central Development Council news, Savage reported that board member Richard Wendel had been elected chairman of that board. Jones said their last meeting included a meeting with Republic about grant funding, and the potential for additional grant money for the Job Center in Litchfield.

Road and Bridge

Road and Bridge Committee Chairman Gene Miles said they had several things to address at their meeting, including an update to the Walshville Trail project, just outside Hillsboro.

Miles said it was a project of the late chairman, Roy Hertel, who wanted to straighten that road for safety concerns. An engineering firm estimated it would cost an additional \$1 million to straighten the road. The project was slated to cost around \$1.5 million to start with. Miles said they may not be considered for matching funding either because the bridge didn't cause any safety concerns at this time.

The committee decided instead to change the slope on the side of the bridge, and change the curve at the bottom of the hill to make it safer for vehicles.

Funding for the project will be split between the state and the county, who will be responsible for 20 percent.

Miles said the project is expected to take place in 2021, and the bridge will be closed for several months.

"We don't like to close roads, but sometimes we have to," he said.

HWE

In election news, County Clerk and Recorder Sandy Leitheiser said election packets are ready to pick up for those wanting to run for county board.

HWE Committee Chairman Connie Beck said there will be an electronics recycling drive on Sept. 30 in Hillsboro from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

In Animal Control news, they will have an open house on Sept. 30 from noon to 3 p.m., and a rabies clinic on Oct. 21, from 1 to 5 p.m., by appointment only.

Building and Grounds

Building and Grounds Committee Chairman Bob Sneed said he had no new information to report. He thanked Leitheiser and her staff for working with the Illinois Local Government Conservation Energy Act, by providing them with utility invoices for the past year.

EMA

Bill Bergen, who is the new chairman of the EMA Committee, said he was grateful that their budget got pulled away from the sheriff's department.

He reported that the active shooter drill went well, and they are looking to install a few new cameras.

In a final note, he thanked County Coordinator Chris Daniels for helping to secure a safety grant for risk management.

Young asked if Bergen had anything to report on the ambulance contracts, and he said not at this time.

Personnel

Personnel Committee Chairman Jay Martin said their committee got the insurance renewal rates from Blue Cross Blue Shield, which went up 12 percent. They are still looking at other carriers.

Martin said the committee will have negotiations with the Highway Department, and will need to move the Sept. 18 meeting.

He reported that flu shots will be offered to all county employees in October, and that the committee will begin looking at the holiday schedule as they open up union contracts.

Appointments

With the resignation of Tim Hopper, Bill Bergen has been named chairman of the EMA Committee, with Chuck Graden as vice chairman. Glenn Savage has been named as the chairman of the Economic Development Committee with Megan Beeler as the vice chairman.

Young said there may be shake ups in other committees as well, with a new board member. Graden asked when the board would replace Hopper, and Young said at the October meeting.

Young also announced the board would move its Rules Committee meeting, that was originally scheduled for Sept. 18.

In other appointments, the board unanimously appointed Daniel Tester to a three-year term on the Mutual Drainage District #1 of Irving, Witt, Nokomis and Rountree townships and Terry Toberman to a three-year term to the Coffeen Fire Protection District.

During the public comment portion of the meeting, Bill Schroeder commended Beeler and the Finance Committee chairman on their hard work.

"I commend them for their diligence," he said. "I'm for public safety as much as anyone, but look at the mess the state is in. You have to be very diligent in how you spend your reserve money."

The meeting adjourned at 10:40. Board members will meet again on Tuesday morning, Oct. 10 at the Historic Courthouse in downtown Hillsboro, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

St. Francis Wants Kids To Play It Safe In School Sports

As the new school year begins, and student athletes spend their time practicing for games and competitions, HSHS St. Francis Hospital encourages athletes and parents to avoid sports-related injuries.

"Student athletes should consider adequately preparing for

their sports activity and respond appropriately if an injury or suspected injury occurs," said Blake McAfee, physical therapist at HSHS St. Francis Hospital. "The worst thing you can do is to try and push through an injury. It is best to address your concerns with a medical professional to keep you in the

game and prevent a small problem from becoming a big issue."

HSHS St. Francis Hospital offers these tips to help youth athletes stay on the field, court or track:

- Make sure to hydrate long before practice. Drink enough water to compensate for fluid loss during physical activity. Pay attention to the weather to avoid heat-related injuries.

- Always eat a healthy balance of carbohydrates, fat and protein. Speak with a dietician about the best eating plan and sports activity.
- Always warm-up by stretching and take time to warm-up and cool down.

- Train for the sport. Ahead of the game or any competition, practice to reduce chances of injury on the big day.
- Stay safe in all sports by wear-

ing the recommended safety equipment any time there is practice or on game day.

- Know the limits. Pushing a body too hard may result in over-use injuries.

- Heads need to be in the game by maintaining mental health. This is just as important as physical health. Parents should watch for signs of stress and depression, encourage student athletes to speak up and don't pressure them if they are not ready to compete.

- Get help if an injury has occurred and seek help.

## MCHD Announces Flu Shot Information To Residents

The Montgomery County Health Department would like to remind everyone that as fall begins, the flu season approaches.

Influenza occurs from October through May. In recent seasons, however, most infections have occurred in January and February. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, a person should get the vaccine as soon as it is available. It takes up to two weeks for protection to develop after the shot and protection lasts about a year. By getting the shot early, one should be protected if the flu season comes early.

The CDC recommends that all people six months of age and older should get the flu vaccine. By getting the vaccine, people can protect themselves from influenza and may also avoid spreading influenza to others.

The Montgomery County Health Department currently has the flu vaccine and can administer the shot at the Hillsboro office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Mondays and Fridays, and on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and at the Litchfield office Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Call 217-532-2001 or 217-324-3430 to ensure that a nurse is available

to avoid a longer wait time.

The health department will soon hold vaccination clinics in the communities of Litchfield, Nokomis, Hillsboro, Coffeen, Witt, Irving, Fillmore, Panama, Donnellson, Taylor Springs, Raymond and Farmersville. The clinic schedule will be published as soon as it is available. The cost of the vaccine is \$30.

The Montgomery County Health Department would also like to invite any business that is interested in providing immunizations to its employees, minimum of five, to contact the Hillsboro office to make arrangements for a nurse to come to the business and administer these shots.

The health department accepts cash and check and is also able to bill insurance companies, Medicare and Medicaid for the vaccination.

A reminder to individuals that Medicare Part D open enrollment dates are Sunday, Oct. 15 through Thursday Dec. 7. Montgomery County Health Department staff will once again be assisting individuals in comparing plans. Call 217-532-2001 beginning Monday, Sept. 25 to schedule an appointment.

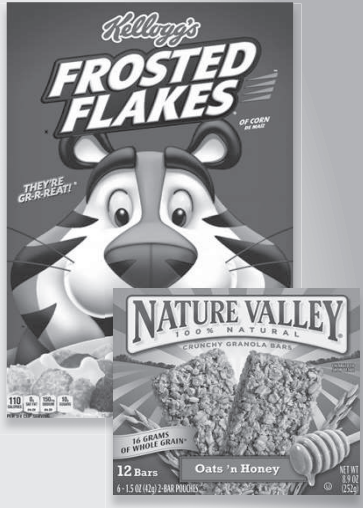

## BRS Museum Honors Six Saturday

Saturday evening, Sept. 9, the Bottomley-Ruffing-Schalk Baseball Museum in Nokomis inducted six new honorees. The ceremony was held at the Nokomis Memorial Park House with approximately 60 people in attendance and prior to the induction they enjoyed a wonderful meal catered by Milanos Catering of Hillsboro.

Steve Johnson, treasurer of the B-R-S Museum, welcomed everyone in attendance and then turned the festivities over to the emcee for the evening, Tim Mize, sportscaster for WSMI radio.

The first honoree of the evening was former minor league pitcher Mick Fieldbinder. Fieldbinder was born in Springfield, but spent part of his childhood in Nokomis before his family moved to Rochester.

He spent five years in the minors, reaching as high as AA with El Paso, and finished with an impressive 37-24 record. He expressed his amazement in how much the museum has grown from its early days.

Fieldbinder talked about how everyone loves a five-tool player but the most important tool a player can have is the 6th tool – heart & soul, and how he de-

veloped a passion for the game at an early age, which was instilled by his coaches. He said he would never forget the town of Nokomis and the people and felt “extremely humbled and honored” by this recognition.

Mize then recognized two current honorees that were in attendance, Robert “Ish” Smith and Jim Staff.

Twenty year major leaguer, Gary Gaetti, was recognized as the second honoree of the evening. The Centralia native unfortunately was unable to attend because he manages the independent Sugar Land Skeeters of the Atlantic League and they have about a week left on their schedule.

Gaetti has the second highest home run total in the major leagues for Illinois-born players.

The next honoree was Mt. Olive native, Roger Kratochvil. Kratochvil starred in four sports at Mt. Olive High School and went on to excel in baseball at Eastern Illinois University before teaching and coaching for 23 years at Mt. Olive.

He began by thanking his family and friends that were in attendance. He stated that “baseball is the greatest game and it’s been very good to me.”

Kratochvil also spoke of being a scout for the St. Louis Cardinals from 1979 through 2002, remembering fondly the Whitey Herzog years. He laughingly remembered getting special permission to wear a Cardinals uniform while conducting youth baseball camps and having the kids line up for his autograph afterwards. He also directed some special comments and thoughts toward fellow honoree Terry Todt.

Brighton native, Jason Isringhausen was the next honoree. Jason also was unable to attend due to a prior commitment. He played his high school ball for Piasa Southwestern and went on to a 16-year career in the major leagues, becoming the careersaves leader for the St. Louis Cardinals.

The fifth honoree of the evening, WSMI Sports Director Terry Todt was unable to attend due to illness. Mize spoke primarily of the passion that Terry has brought to his job of being the voice of area high school sports for almost four decades. Terry is the first media honoree of the B-R-S Museum. We all hope and pray that Terry and his friendly voice returns to the airwaves soon. Keep battling T. Todt!

## Hillsboro Top Class 1A Team At Mattoon

After winning three tournaments and their first nine matches, someone finally knocked the Hillsboro boys golf team off the top of the podium. And it only took some of the best teams in the state to do so.

The Toppers would take 12th at the Craig Dixon Mattoon Invite, which was played on Sept. 8 and 9 at Meadowview Golf Course, a 6,100-plus yard 18-hole course with a par of 72. It wasn’t just where Hillsboro finished though, but how they became the top Class 1A team in the tournament.

Hillsboro would shoot a 338 in the opening round of the tournament, a solid score that left them 18th after the first day, but not the score they were hoping to put up

in Mattoon. The Toppers would rebound with a round under their belt though, shooting a stellar 317 on the second day to become just one of two Class 1A teams to finish in the top 20 (Mt. Carmel, tying for 17th with a 664, was the other).

To achieve that jump, the Toppers got a big performance from an unexpected source. Hillsboro’s seventh man, Wilson Hamby, was called upon to play for senior Tony Perfetti, who shot an 88 on the first day, but had to miss day two to take the ACT. In the call-up, Hamby simply turned in one of the best performances of his young career with a 4-over-par 76.

“What Wilson Hamby did was amazing! His 76 is a career best by far,” said Hillsboro boys golf

coach Jeff Eickhoff. “It saved us 11 shots and umpteen places. On top of it, Kaiden had to withdraw so we were very short handed.”

Alex Eickhoff would also be a big part of the resurgence as the sophomore shot a 2-over-par 74 on day two to finish in a tie for 24th overall in the field of more than 200 golfers. The day two score would be nine better than the 83 Eickhoff put up on Friday afternoon.

Alex White would also finish in the top 50 for Hillsboro, shooting rounds of 83 and 80 to finish with a 163 on the day, which put him in a tie for 50th.

## Lake Lou Feels The Triath-Love

It was a beautiful day for a swim. Or a bike ride. Or a run. But for 400 intrepid individuals, it was a perfect day for all three on Saturday, Sept. 9, as a record

number of entrants competed in this year’s eighth annual Litchfield Triathlon Triathlons.

“We’re up well over 100 from our biggest race before, so I’m pretty stoked about that,” Race Director Lee O’Connor of Race-

maker Productions said.

The race offered three distances for competitors to attempt to complete: a sprint triathlon featuring a .3 mile swim, a 13 mile bike ride and a 3.1 mile run; an Olympic triathlon featuring a .9 mile swim, a 24.8 mile bike ride and a 6.2 mile run; and the new addition, a half triathlon featuring a 1.2 mile swim, a 56 mile bike ride and a 13.1 mile run. The courses utilized the bucolic atmosphere of Lake Lou Yaeger, with the lake and landscape providing the perfect backdrop for the event.

About 80 percent of the field competed in either the sprint or Olympic triathlons, with the other 20 percent opting for the half. Participants drove in from all over Illinois, plus Missouri, Iowa, Indiana, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

The first person to cross the finish line on Sunday came from a little further away. Levente Lukacs, a 24-year-old from Hungary, finished the sprint triathlon in 43:15.40, almost two minutes faster than the next closest competitor.

“I’m training with Sally Drake in St. Louis, MO. I did the modern pentathlon in Hungary, that’s swimming, running, fencing, shooting and horse riding, and this year I started a triathlon, this March,” Lukacs said of how he wound up in Litchfield for the Triathlons.

“It’s my first year in triathlon. It’s really good. In pentathlon I did swimming and running, so the bike is my weakness,” Lukacs added. “The swim was good. The bike course was flat, but with a little gravel, so that was good. The run, I like running, so that was good. I was first, so I’m so happy.”

Experts Provide Helpful Tips To Alleviate Back To School Stress

Have you noticed any new behaviors in your children since you sent them back to school? Sleep disturbances, acting out or mood swings? These behaviors and others may be signs of stress, according to experts at the University of Illinois.

"Often you're not going to hear a kid say, 'I'm stressed out', so as parents we need to look for signs they are communicating to us through their behaviors," says Chelsey Byers Gerstenecker, family life educator at U of I Extension.

Once they are aware of their kids' stress, parents can help them manage it by introducing effective coping skills early in life. According to Gerstenecker, stress management starts with getting kids into healthy routines with plenty of exercise and sleep. And she says parents should encourage kids to talk to them early and often about things that are worrying them.

"We're teaching our kids it's better to come tell us about it and not sit on it, so together we can brainstorm how to overcome whatever's troubling them. It's just being a family and helping them learn coping strategies that will serve them well throughout life."

Back-to-school isn't just hard on kids. Most teachers experience stress on a daily basis, whether it's from managing troublesome behavior in the classroom or from meeting expectations of administrators.

Erica Thieman, assistant professor in the Agricultural Education Program at U of I, is a teacher educator whose research focuses on stress management. She says the high attrition rate in the first five years of teaching can be attributed in large part to stress. But teacher stress doesn't just contribute to attrition; it can affect the stress levels of students.

"You can quickly watch a stressed-out teacher turn an entire classroom into a bunch of stress balls just by walking around the room," Thieman says, due to something called communicative stress. Thieman explains that when the human heart beats, it emits an electromagnetic signal that can be felt by others within a 3 to 4 foot radius. "When we're stressed, our heart emits a very erratic signal versus when we're calm, it's very regular. That erratic signal can be picked up by other people."

The good news is that there are plenty of strategies for teachers to manage stress. One that Thieman endorses is both free and easy: breathing. "It's really powerful to take three deep breaths. Cortisol lowers instantly; there's an instant response in the body to those three deep breaths." She also strongly recommends a good night's sleep.

"Ensuring proper sleep – 8 hours for adults – is one of the best stress-management techniques I can offer, especially during the back-to-school time when people are adjusting to new routines and typically more difficult work is required of their brains," Thieman says.

Not going back to school? Fortunately, Gerstenecker and Thieman say these stress-management tips apply to everyone.
