One Killed, Two Injured In I-55 Collision Monday

One person was killed and two were injured in a threevehicle accident on Interstate 55 about seven miles north of Litchfield on Monday afternoon, March 2.

Robin L. Francis, 82, of Fond Du Lac, WI, was pronounced dead at the scene by the Montgomery County Coroner's Office.

According to Illinois State Police, a 2005 Porsche Carrera driven by Jorian Clarke, 62, of St. Louis, MO, was northbound and stopped in the left lane to avoid striking a wheel that was in the lane from a prior incident, when a 2018 Chevrolet Equinox, driven by Richard S. Jaeger, 74, of Fond Du Lac, WI, struck the Porsche from behind, then struck a 2019 Kenworth semi, driven by Richard Dowlarr, 49, of Springfield, that was parked on the right shoulder. Francis was a passenger in Jaeger's

Litchfield Fire Chief Joe Holomy said the Litchfield Fire Department was paged at 4 p.m. to respond to an unconscious patient and another patient with possible entrapment.

According to Holomy, the first arriving unit found Jaeger's vehicle pinned under the semi-trailer. Bystanders removed Francis from the vehicle and initiated CPR but $was\,unsuccessful.\,Jaeger\,was$ extricated and transported to HSHS St. John's Hospital Trauma Center by ARCH Helicopter. Dowlarr was uninjured and refused medical treatment.

Clarke's vehicle was located in the median, just north of the scene, and Clarke was evaluated and transported to HSHS St. Francis Hospital in Litchfield. The crash remains under investigation by the Illinois State Police accident reconstruction unit.

level. He added that the Supreme Court has ruled in the past that school mascots may be named for American Indians.

"Our board of education is elected by our community," he said. "I feel that if our $community felt \, the \, nick name$ was inappropriate, we would change it."

Lunch is included, but Hearts needs clergy members to RSVP by Thursday, March 12, to 217-324-2876 or hearts@ consolidated.net.








Madison Park Students Honored By Principal



St. Francis Helps Voters Cast Ballots

The HSHS hospitals in central Illinois are working with their respective county clerks' offices to help hospitalized voters get information on how to cast their ballots in the upcoming primary election at HSHS St. Francis Hospital in Litchfield, HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield, HSHS St. Mary's Hospital in Decatur and HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital in Shelbyville.

According to Illinois law, a qualified voter who has been admitted to a hospital not more than 14 days before an election is entitled to delivery of a voteby-mail ballot in the hospital by a legal family member or someone who is registered to vote in the patient's precinct.

The process the hospitals will help to facilitate includes

the following steps:

• The patient, family member or registered voter who lives in the same precinct as the patient and patient's physician, advanced practice registered nurse or physician assistant must fill out a form attesting to the patient's reason for being in the hospital and that he or she will not be able to go to the polling place on election day, March 17.

• The family member or registered voter who lives in the same precinct as the patient must take the form to the county clerk's office for review, to be notarized and to receive the patient's ballot.

• The family member or registered voter who lives in the same precinct as the patient will bring the ballot back to

the hospital to be filled out by the patient.

• The family member or registered voter who lives in the same precinct as the patient will then return the ballot to the county clerk's office by 7 p.m. on election day.

"We thank HSHS St. Francis Hospital on working with us to educate hospitalized voters on this process," said Montgomery County Clerk Sandy Leitheiser. "If a patient or their family member has any questions about the process, please call the local county clerk's office at 217-532-9530."

According to HSHS policy, employees will not be not making statements during this process that supports or opposes any candidate for public office.

He writes music for "the kind of people that come to my shows. Whether in Chicago or Delavan, everyone has a story, and everyone puts in a long day and works hard the same way."

"My generation may have been labeled as slackers, but I don't know anyone who doesn't work hard," he said. "Many people I know put in 50-60 hours a week and 12hour days. That's what keeps me playing. I don't like anyone to be left out; my music is for everyone in big and very small towns."

He listened to punk rock and grunge as a kid before discovering a friend's dad playing Hank Williams, and it was a revelation. Prine and Guthrie quickly followed.

The name Chicago Farmer was originally for a band, but the utilitarian life of driving alone from bar to bar, city to city, to make a direct connection to his audience and listener, took a deeper hold.

According to the poem, "From the full moon fell Nokomis/Fell the beautiful Nokomis." In the poem, Nokomis would bear a daughter, Wenonah, who was seduced by the West-Wind Mudjekeewis and was mother to Hiawatha.

The bill to change all Illinois mascots with Native American logos was started return to committee.

by students at Hononegah High School in Rockton, who led a protest over the use of Princess Hononegah, as well as other Native American imagery and iconography.

If signed into law, the bill would prohibit schools from using Native American mascots unless they complied with certain rules, including getting written consent from a tribe based within 500 miles $and\,offering\,Native\,American$ culture programs and courses within the schools.

The bill was read in the Education Committee on Wednesday, March 3, and was approved. Representative West is working on an amendment to change the process at this time, and then the bill will

Representative Avery Bourne serves on the Education Committee and voted against the bill.

"I support more education in schools around the issue, but the process to comply would be difficult for districts," she said. "For example, it would be difficult to get permission from a tribe within a 500-mile radius. And the cost to change if schools don't comply will be high."

Dr. Doerr also mentioned the high cost of changing mascots.

"I don't think they know the financial impact of this," he said. "This is how our gym floors are painted. This gives us our culture. It's an absolute shame the state would try to mandate this."

"At this point I had just written off the whole thing," said Leefers with a chuckle. "I thought I'd never see those cards again. Then they show

up!" While baseball is Leefers' passion, he remembers dropping a few cards in the mail around 2002 to Earnhardt and fellow racer Kevin Harvick, who was Earnhardt's teammate at Dale Earnhardt. Inc. at the time.

"Normally I don't send a whole lot of stuff through the mail. I like to get them in person if I can, but I thought I would take a chance because I never get to a NASCAR race," Leefers explained.

The Harvick card came back a few short weeks later, now bearing the driver's signature, but the Earnhardt cards never followed suit and Leefers assumed they were gone for good, especially with the changes that occurred with Earnhardt and DEI over the vears.

After driving for his late father's team since coming to the Winston Cup Series in 1999, Earnhardt moved to Hendrick Motorsports for the 2008 season, a team he remained with until he retired. DEI continued racing in 2008, but merged with Chip Ganassi Racing in 2009 and shutdown their shop in Mooresville, NC.

Whether Leefers' letter got lost in the shuffle or has just been in a box somewhere at Earnhardt's home is anyone's guess, but the self-described autograph hound is glad that the NASCAR legend got around to signing the card.

"I'm glad he signed the one he did and not the other one. That was a race he won and he had a baseball paint scheme on his car," said Leefers, who added that he had been drawn to Earnhardt after the superstar had several different baseball-themed

paint schemes over the year. "On the card he's wearing a pin-striped fire suit, which I think was for the All-Star Game that year. I've got the die cast car from that race too, so I'll set the card beside that car to display it."

The Earnhardt combo isn't Leefers' only NASCAR/MLB collaboration in his collection though. He also has a Bobby Labonte die cast featuring a paint scheme honoring Cal Ripken, Jr.'s retirement, and the legendary Orioles shortstop's signature across the hood.

"He asked me, 'So where do you sign these things?" Leefers remembers from when he asked Ripken to sign the car. That made me think that he hadn't signed one before so I had a one-of-one at the time."

As odd as it seems to receive an autograph back after 17 years, Leefers isn't the only one in that boat.

After receiving the card, he mentioned his new addition in a Facebook group called Autographs 101 and learned that a few other collectors had also recently received Earnhardt autographs from letters sent out around the same time frame.

It was in that group that Leefers realized just how lucky he was to have the card back, as a friend pointed out that had he moved, the envelope would have likely been returned to Earnhardt or be floating out there in the postal unknown.

Instead, it's safely tucked away in the Leefers' home in Coffeen, another treasured keepsake for the long-time autograph aficionado. While the chances are pretty slim that Leefers may actually get to thank Earnhardt in person someday, if he does, he might owe the racer a little more than just a thank you.

When I sent it, I just put one stamp on the return envelope and it had been so long, the postage had changed," Leefers explained, before adding with a laugh, "He had to add like 21 cents worth of stamps just to get it to me."

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
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

Litchfield High School senior Austin DeWitt, the son of Michelle and Archie DeWitt, Jr., joined 56 of other young lifters in Jerseyville on Saturday, Feb. 29, for the second annual Panther Power Meet at Jersey Community High

The event was open to all high school students, with a coach responsible for each team, and drew competitors from eight schools, from as far north as Springfield to as far south as Fairfield. The competition consisted of three lifts, the squat, bench press and dead lift, with three lifts in each event, plus a bonus lift in one event of the participant's choice.

my slow start at the beginning of the year," said Cameron. "I started the year really slowly because I had mono. Also I was playing to make the Midwest Conference Tournament."

That did not happen for Illinois College. They won four of their last five games, splitting their last two. They finished 13-12 overall and 9-9 in the MWC.

In the 59-56 loss to Knox College, Cameron scored 18 points, missing only three shots from the field. She drained 8-of-11 from the field and both free throw opportunities. She would complete the double-double with 12 rebounds, six assists and four

"I think I was more fired up against Knox," said Cameron. "I knew if we won that game, we could be included in the tournament. It was also good because I was able to set up my teammates. I felt very confident against Knox."

While they could not overcome Knox, the Lady Blues did win their final game of the year, beating Lawrence University 61-40. Cameron was once again money from the field, missing only three shots to hit 66 percent of her field goals in the contest. She nailed 6-of-9 from the field, which included 2-of-4 from beyond the arc. In addition to her 14 points, the starter had 11 rebounds, two blocked shots and two steals in 30 minutes of court time.

"I don't think it has hit me that it is over," said Cameron "I am thankful for all the support I have been given all these years. I learned you can't take your time on the court for granted. The injuries made it tough, but I would do it all

Abby Brockmeyer, a Southern Illinois University-Carbondale junior, scored 12 points in SIÚC's 61-57 loss to Bradley University. Brockmeyer, who hit five field goals and two free throws, also had seven rebounds and three steals.

In SIUC's 66-56 loss to Illinois State University, Brockmeyer finished with a doubledouble. She nailed 4-of-9 from the field and 3-of-4 from the free throw line to finish with 11 points, 12 rebounds and two steals. She started both games, playing 33 minutes against Bradley and 29 minutes against Illinois State. SIU-Carbondale is 15-12 overall and 7-9 in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Reid Detmers (Glenwood) worked the first five innings of University of Louisville's 4-2 triumph over Western Michigan University. The Louisville pitcher allowed two earned runs on on six hits. He fanned 10 and walked two, but did not get a decision. Louisville, currently the second ranked team among NCAA Division I teams, is 9-3.

Sammi Matoush (Hillsboro) scored seven points for Washington University in their 76-72 loss to University of Chicago. Matoush, who started and played 30 minutes, also had six assists and two rebounds. At the time of the contest, Chicago was ranked 19th among NCAA Division III teams. The Washington Lady Bears are 14-11 overall and 7-7 in the University Athletic Association.

 $\boldsymbol{Kendra\ Jacob\ (Hillsboro)}$ was 2-for-2 as her college team, Hannibal-LaGrange University, lost a 10-2 decision to Culver-Stockton College. In the 13-5 loss to Culver-Stockton, Jacob crossed the plate once. HLG is 0-2.

Maurice Radtke (Litchfield), a Greenville University thrower, finished ninth in the shot put at the National Christian Collegiate Athletic Association Finals. They were hosted by Cedarville University and held at the Doden Fieldhouse in Cedarville, Ohio. Radtke recorded a throw of 44 feet, 9 inches. Greenville took fourth as a team with 54 points. Cedarville won with 185.5 points.

Kyra Huber (Hillsboro) took eighth in the 60-meter dash at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh hosted Titan Challenge. It was held at the Kolf Sports Center in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The Wisconsin-

Oshkosh sprinter recorded a time of :07.98. She was also 12th in the 200-meter dash with a time of :26.78. Wisconsin-Oshkosh finished second, scoring 91 points. University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire took first with 112 points.

Reese Snyder (Lincolnwood) was 1-for-1 with a double, but it was not enough to power Maryville University bevond Davenport University, who won a 19-1 decision. It was Snyder's first hit of the year. Maryville is 5-8.

Lexi Throne (Litchfield) competed in two events for the University of Illinois-Springfield at the Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships. University of Indianapolis served as the host. Individually, she was 14th in the 5,000-meter run, crossing the finish line at 19:00.29. She was also a member of the UIS 1,600-meter relay team, which took 13th in 4:25.52. UIS finished eighth out of 14 teams, scoring 25 points. Lewis University won the conference title with 141 points.

Jade Scroggins (Hillsboro), a Hannibal-LaGrange women's basketball player, had three points and three rebounds in their 75-61 loss to Park University. Scroggins played 12 minutes. Hannibal-LaGrange is 5-24 overall and 3-21 in the American Midwest Conference.

Litchfield Girls Improve In 2019-2020 Campaign

"At the start of the season, our team goals were to finish the season playing .500 ball, play better defense and be more consistent on offense,' Coach Rob Corso said of his Litchfield Lady Panther varsity basketball team. "We were fortunate to accomplish the .500 record, which was nice after posting consecutive 7-22 seasons, and although we did struggle from time to time on offense, our defense was improved and we were able to play less zone which helped make us more aggressive."

During regular season play, the Panthers won 15 games against 14 losses. Their loss to Pittsfield in game one of regional tournament play at Carlinville evened their record to 15-15 and brought their 2019-20 campaign to an end. The Pittsfield Saukees bested Porta AC Central in the semi-finals but lost to the host school Cavaliers on Feb. 14 in the regional title game.

After posting a 40-point win at Bunker Hill on Nov. 18 in their season opener, a game in which they would lose their promising freshman, Blair Johnson, for the remainder of the season, they followed up with a six-point squeaker over Nokomis in their home opener on Nov. 19.

"We had some key injuries with sophomore Carly Guinn and Johnson missing almost the entire season," Corso said. "Freshman Laura Boston and sophomore Lily Braasch had to step up and play some varsity games and they did a nice job.'

In their annual Thanksgiving tournament in late November, the Lady Panthers cruised to a perfect 3-0 record before losing by 30 to Southwestern in the championship game. They would get another crack at the Lady Birds on Jan. 30 at Southwestern and the purple and white gave them all they wanted before losing by eight

"In my opinion, the game at Southwestern was the best

game we played all season," Coach Corso said.

Trailing by three points at the end of the third quarter, junior Becky Painter spearheaded a fourth quarter surge that led to a 36-36 tie at the end of the fourth before falling in overtime.

"The girls played a solid 32 minutes and beyond and even though it was a loss, the team left the locker room that night feeling good about themselves," Corso added.

The Panthers finished their tournament with a 3-1 record having defeated Carlyle, Staunton and Nokomis.

Their only other tournament appearance was at the Carlinville Christmas Holiday Classic where they finished 2-2 with wins over Nokomis and Staunton and losses to Carlinville and Greenfield-Northwestern.

Litchfield will forego the Carlinville Holiday Classic next year and compete in the highly competitive Riverton Lady Hawks Christmas Tournament, which featured 16 teams last year.

Excluding tournament games, the Lady Panthers were 7-3 on their home floor and 3-9 on the road. They won ten games by ten points or more and lost four games by ten points or less. They finished 3-6 in South Central Conference play, having posted wins over Staunton, Vandalia and Roxana.

The least amount of points scored in a game by the Panthers was 19 against Pana, which resulted in a lopsided 27-point loss, while the 19 points they scored against East Alton-Wood River on Jan. 23 was enough to gain a two-point road win.

They averaged 38 points per game with their highest point total coming at home against Riverton on Jan. 27, when they put up 58 and won by 22 over the Hawks. They scored 1,138 points in 30 games. Their opponents averaged 38.3 points

per game, having scored 1,148 points against them.

The Lady Panthers started three seniors, Carly Boden, Carson Jackson and Emily Senian and their leadership is evidenced in the end-of-season statistics.

"Our three seniors provided the team with a lot of leadership this season," Coach Corso said.

Consistency and durability were also a given as all three seniors played in all 30 games.

Carly Boden scored 227 points to lead the team in scoring and points per game with a 7.6 ppg average. She was 105of-197 from the floor (.533) and 17-of-32 from the free-throw line (.531). She pulled down 111 rebounds for an average of 3.7 per game and had seven blocks, eight assists and seven steals. The 5'10' post player exploded for 21 points against Lincolnwood and scored in double figures nine different times throughout the season.

Carson Jackson scored 174 points and averaged 5.8 points per game. She pulled down 81 caroms and dished out 64 assists. She made 30-of-74 twopoint shots (.405) and netted 32-of-121 from beyond the arc (.264). She converted 18-of-29 free throws for an average of .621. Defensively, she recorded 38 steals.

Jackson dropped in four three-point baskets against Staunton during the Carlinville Holiday Tournament and finished the game with 14 points. On Feb. 3, against North Mac, she scored 18 points, including three trevs. She recently had another fourpeat against Calhoun on Feb. 8, and finished as the team's scoring leader with 17 points.

Emily Senjan scored 173 points in 30 games for a 5.8 per game average. She attempted 107 two-point shots and converted 43 (.402). She made 18-of-71 triples (.254) and was 33-of-62 from the charity stripe (.532). Senjan grabbed 125 rebounds, dished out 58 assists and had 42 defensive steals.

She too was a threat from deep. Against Springfield Lutheran on Dec. 7 and again on Dec. 12 against Carlinville, she dropped in three three-point field goals and finished the games with 13 and 14 points respectively.

Junior Becky Painter appeared in 29 games and led the team in three point baskets with 38 (38-of-120 for .317 average) and was second behind Boden in points scored with 200 (6.9 ppg). Painter attempted 104 two-point baskets and sank 32 (.308). She went 22-of-48 from the free-throw line (.458). She was second behind Cara Pence in rebounds with 157 and also second behind Pence in assists and steals with 74 and 64 respectively. She had four defensive blocks. Becky scored in double figures eight different times and in five of the eight, her point total included three three-point field goals.

Junior Cara Pence finished the season leading the Panthers in rebounds with 258 in 30 games for an average of 8.6 per game. She also established herself as the team leader in assists (75), steals (75) and blocks (14). Pence appeared in all 30 games and scored 172 points for a 5.7 per game average. She was 50-of-148 in two-point shots (.338) and 19-of-73 from beyond the arc (.260). She converted just under half of her free throw attempts (15-of-31 for .484).

Maddie Diamond appeared in 25 games. The junior speedster scored 135 points, many of which were layups that were a direct result of her 31 steals. She shot .407 from the floor (57-of-140 from two-point) and was 4-of-35 from three-point range (.114). She sank 9-of-18 free throws and averaged 5.4 points per game. She had 43 assists. Against Pittsfield in the Carlnville regional, Diamond led the Panthers with

13 points. Sophomore Lily Braasch appeared in 17 games and scored six points. She attempted ten shots from the floor and made three for six points. She had 21 rebounds. five assists and a defensive steal. Sophomore Carly Guinn played in nine varsity games and scored three points, including a three-point basket against Southwestern.

Freshman Laura Boston appeared in 22 games and sank 9-of-28 two-point baskets (.321) and converted 7-of-16 free throws (.438). Playing in the post position, she scored 25 points, grabbed 29 rebounds and had nine assists and six steals. Freshman teammate Hailey Rentz played in nine varsity games and scored three points.

Next year's cast of players will include seven varsity letter winners, including this year's MVP, Becky Painter, one of four seniors who should provide an element of leadership for Coach Rob Corso's Lady


