Local Vax Clinic Will Offer All Three Options

Monday, May 31, 10 a.m.....Nokomis Memorial Park

The Montgomery County Health Department is planning a drive-through COVID-19 vaccination clinic for 5-7 p.m. Tuesday, June 1, in Nokomis in which all three vaccines will be available.

The clinic will be on South Spruce Street in Nokomis next to Fred. B. Johnson Park (Turn south off Route 16 onto South Spruce from the four-way stop.) Pre-registration is not required, and the Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines will be available. Those with insurance cards should bring them, but they are not required. Call the health department at $2\overline{17}$ -532-2001 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday with

The health department hosted a similar drive-through vaccination clinic Tuesday evening, May 25, at Coffeen School in which all three vaccines were

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), 8,683 Montgomery County residents are fully vaccinated as of Wednesday, May 26; that's 30.36 percent of the county population.

The local health department reported three new positive tests on Saturday, four on Sunday, one on Monday, and five on Tuesday for a total of 2,985 over the course of the pandemic.

Hillsboro Superintendent David Powell announced that a positive case in the junior high school on Tuesday, May 25, resulted in 21 new quarantines, bringing the quarantine count to 35.

"I would like to offer my sincerest gratitude for all you have done to keep this historic school year going as well as it has," the superintendent wrote in a message to faculty staff students and parents. "Despite all of the setbacks and frustrations, we have continued to work together and have managed to keep our kids in school when many other communities were unable to do so. I wish you all a fun-filled and safe summer break!"

Hillsboro Council Okays Sale Of Land

 $Bev\,McCoy, former\,treasur$ er of the city, spoke first during the public comment segment of the Hillsboro City Council agenda when the council met Tuesday evening, May 25, in city hall; she spoke about a decision the council would make later that evening.

McCoy pleaded with the council not to sell public land (two lots on the east side of the road where the old swing sets are located in City Lake Park) for housing development; bids on the lots were opened later in the meeting. McCoy asked the council instead to build cabins and rent them as a source of revenue. Earlier she had posted remarks about her position on Facebook and received 76 responses that agreed with her stance. Parks and Public Properties Com-

missioner Daniel Robbins said he'd also received 50 or so responses with 48 asking him to vote no in any motion to sell. Mayor Downs said he too had received public input.

McCoy closed by saying, Remember, if you sell it, you can't get it back. The citizens of Hillsboro have a right to that kind of property. Don't sell it out from under us without a good, hard think."

Dave Strowmatt was at the council meeting in person to talk about Glenn Shoals Lake problems after using the Zoom platform the last two meetings. He thanked Commissioner Robbins for sending him copies of 13 studies done on the lake, but also said none of the 13 referenced Greenville College's study about sedimentation rather than erosion as a big problem. Property Tax Bills Will Hit Mail By June 11

Property tax bills will be in Courthouse Square, Room the mail by Friday, June 11, according to the Montgomery County Treasurer's office.

Due dates for 2020 real estate taxes, payable in 2021, are July 16 for the first installment and Sept. 3 for the

second installment. Taxes may be paid in person at the treasurer's office on the first floor of the Historic Courthouse in Hillsboro; by depositing in the gray drop Historic Courthouse; online at montgomeryco.com through the Montgomery County Treasurer's link; by mail to Montgomery County Treasurer and Collector, 1

101, Hillsboro, IL 62049; or at most local banks.

The penalty for delinquent payments is one-and-a-half percent per month, beginning on July 17 for the first installment.

Treasurer Nikki Lohman thanked Supervisor of Assessments Ray Durston and his staff, along with County Clerk Sandy Leitheiser and her staff "for their diligence in getting the 2020 tax informa tion to the treasurer's office for processing.

Hillsboro Man Faces Three Child Porn Counts

A Hillsboro man was arrested last week on three federal child pornography charges, according to information provided by the Hillsboro Police Department.

Andrew Collins, 31, was arrested on Thursday morning, May 13, at his Hillsboro residence and charged on Friday, May 14, with production of child pornography, distribution of child pornography, and possession of child pornography.

According to Hillsboro Police Chief Randy Leetham, the arrest was made on a warrant by Illinois Attorney General's Office Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force in conjunction with the U.S. Attorney's Office, U.S. Secret Service, Hillsboro Police Department, and the Southern Illinois University at Ed-

wardsville Police Department.

when SIUE police department, working as members of the ICAC task force, were assigned a cyper-tip lead regarding a possible crime committed online by a Hillsboro suspect.

"After a lengthy investigation, probable cause was established to support a residential search warrant, and the subsequent arrest of Mr. Collins," according to Detective Sergeant Mark Ferrell of the SIUE police department. "The investigation also led to the identification of a child being exploited in the Montgomery County area. The victim's family has been notified and has been informed of the resources available to them."

The ICAC task force is a national network of 61 coordinated task forces representing over 4,500 federal, state, and local law enforcement and prosecuting agencies across the country.

Mary Lou Knisley, 100, of Hillsboro, died on Monday, May 24, 2021, at 6:37 a.m. at Hillsboro Area Hospital.

Visitation will be held Monday, May 31, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. at Bass Patton Dean Funeral Home in Hillsboro. Funeral services will follow, beginning at 12 p.m. at the funeral home with Father Daniel Willenborg, pastor of St. Agnes Catholic Church, officiating. Burial will be held at St. Agnes Cemetery in Hillsboro.

Mrs. Knisley was born on Jan. 14, 1921, to Olin and Violet (Buzan) Kesinger, who owned a farm and small grocery store in Wrights in the early 1920s and 1930s. She married Charles Andrew Knisley in 1938, and he preceded her in death.

She and her husband moved to Hillsboro in 1942, when Charles got a job at the Montgomery County newspaper to earn an extra \$5 per week. They had their first child, Ronald Knisley, in 1939, followed by Carolyn Sue Ginos in 1940 and Charles Gene Knisley in 1950.

Mrs. Knisley and her husband purchased the bowling alley in 1948 and operated it until 1974. They bought a shoe store on Main Street in Hillsboro in the 1950s and ran it for a couple of years simultaneously with the bowling alley. In the mid 1970s, they established and operated Knisley's Produce until 1997.

In 1994, her youngest son Gene purchased back the bowling alley known to this day as Knisley Hillsboro Bowl. She worked there from 1994 to March 2020. Oftentimes, she was seen at the front counter of the bowling alley or driving in her bright red Ford mustang. She rarely spent a day away from the bowling alley. A career of more than 80 years.

Mr. Boehler was born Aug. 11, 1945, to Ralph Marten and Cathryn (Irwin) Boehler. His stepmother was Mildred Estelle Mayfield Nelson Boehler. He married Donna Lee Philcrantz on Dec. 3, 1967, in Newbury Post, MA, and they later divorced in May 1992. He then married Catherine Kay on Dec. 31, 1995, in Shelbyville.

He attended St. Isidore School and Farmersville High School, and graduated from Girard High School with the class of 1963. He obtained a B grade upon completion of an "AG" short course (a semester course shortened to six weeks) at University of Illinois-Champaign/Urbana. He also took a number of classes at Lincoln Land Community College in Springfield.

Mr. Boehler taught welding classes at Lincoln Land Community College and Capital Area Vocational School in Springfield for a short time. He also worked at Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Co. in Springfield before he entered the U.S. Army in 1965.

During his service time, he served in Vietnam as a radio direction finding technician with top secret security clearance. He then served in Rothweston, Germany, where he was released from service in August 1969.

Mr. Boehler went on to work as a farm hand for Marion Watson and John Stieren. He began farming in 1970, and also worked at Fiat-Allis (formerly Allis-Chalmers) in Springfield until 1972. He continued farming until 2004. He raised and sold hogs, as well as fainting goats, during the 70s and into the early 90s. In addition, he worked for Melvin Rovey Farm and Sales, repairing and erecting grain bins in the late 70s to early 80s.

He established Boehler Welding and Repair in 1975, repairing farm machinery, building trailers and many other things. Although he became disabled, he continued to work on small projects until his death.

Mr. Boehler served as caretaker of St. Isidore School for many years, and was a member of the St. Isidore School Board, St. Mary's Parish Counsel and St. Mary's Diocese Council. He was an original member of nine citizens who began the Farmersville-Waggoner Ambulance Service in 1978. He served as an EMT-B and held various offices, including Squad Captain until 1998.

He built a children's pulling tractor/sled and operated it at the annual Irish Days Celebration in Farmersville, as well as other local celebrations. He also built several combine demolition machines and participated in the Combine Demolition Derby contests for several years, winning top honors at times.

Mr. Boehler enjoyed spending time with family and friends. He was always thinking of things to create and figuring out how things worked. He enjoyed all kinds of music and was most fond of older country. Until his death, he was an active member of the Waggoner American Legion Post 701 and the Honor Squad.

In the 1980s, he was the winning bidder for Crown III Coal Mine in Farmersville to do repair work, build cable sleds, hitch pins and other jobs until the mine closed in December 2013.

Mr. Boehler's siblings include Mary Blanche (Norman D.) Bourland, Thomas Eldon (Joan) Boehler, Dorothy Teresa (Harry S.) Campbell, Alice Marie (Donald Lee) Davis, Jessie Wayne (Michele) Boehler, Bonnie Caroline (Henry James) Sidles, Dale Nicholas Boehler and Joan Boehler, who died in infancy. divorced. She then married Kenneth B. Mercer in 1975, and he preceded her in death on Nov. 3, 1988.






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Uganda Pastor Visits Watters Family In Hillsboro

Pastor Robert, a missionary from Uganda, visited with Teresa and Mike Watters of Hillsboro the week of May 10.

Pastor Robert became a family friend after their daughter Bailey went on a mission trip to Uganda in 2015. Two years later, Teresa met him during a mission trip, and the family has stayed in touch with him ever since.

"This is actually Robert's mission trip to the U.S.," said

Pastor Robert grew up in Uganda on one of the islands on Lake Victoria. "I came to Christ at ten years old in Sunday school," he said. "I got my bachelor's degree in economics, and I wanted to help people. After school, I had a burden to go to the islands to help people."

He went on to say that the mainland is a hard journey from the islands.

"I used to walk ten miles to get food for people. After arriving, I would take a break before going back home," said Pastor Robert.

After becoming a Christian, Pastor Robert had a feeling he could give back, to help people think about others, so he went back to the islands, where he walked through the churches to see how he could help.

'We started a helping school, not a business school,' said Pastor Robert. "I wanted to see more kids become like me-to help themselves and their communities. Many don't have clean water or toilet facilities. They are uneducated. I was looking at education for people to help them because many get diseases from the drinking water and cannot help themselves."

In 2007, Pastor Robert helped to start a program called Shepherd's Heart International Ministry to assist with the sanitation issue and encourage pastors and others to develop better sanitation, including clean water.

Since citizens are so far from the mainland, it takes anywhere from two to five hours by boat to reach medical care, depending on the island.

"They risk their health because they have no access to the mainlands," said Pastor Robert

Because of a lack of education in Uganda, Pastor Robert began to disciple local pastors. "Many have no education, including pastors. I teach them to tell a story because they don't read. I teach them

to observe, then how to apply what they learned to their lives," he said. "We call it the Pastor's Empowerment Network, which is the training of pastors."

As with many places in the world, Uganda faced another challenge when COVID-19 hit last year.

"ČOVID made things difficult. How does it sound when you are locked down and can't find food? Then on top of COVID, some of the islands flooded, and many houses washed away because they are made of mud," said Pastor Robert. "We can't just go to the grocery store to get food. And, to make matters worse, the fish died from the flood."

The government shut down Uganda after the pandemic hit other parts of the world.

"Although there were no cases, COVID still affected people. Many died due to starvation," said Pastor Robert. "And many moms were killed or beaten for defying orders because they were trying to get food for their kids. They would be shot while riding on the back of motorcycles. Motorcycles are used as taxis.

The Watters have learned lot about Pastor Robert over the years, and they are still learning about him.

"We learned an interesting story about Pastor Robert, said Teresa. "He was bitten by a cobra at the age of 14, while standing in the water fishing, but he survived without receiving any anti-venom."

While Pastor Robert was in the hospital after the cobra attack, he had a special visitor. "I was bitten on the ankle and a pastor friend came to visit me. The doctors wanted to cut off my leg where I was bitten, but my friend said no. He took me to his home and treated me. It took a full year for me to recover."

As the Watters learn more about Pastor Robert, he learns more about them as well. The family had a few experiences planned for Pastor Robert while he was in the U.S.


'We visited with Dr. Ryan Stice of Stice Chiropractic Clinic in Litchfield, who was also on the mission trip when I went to Uganda," said Teresa. "Dr. Stice gave Robert his first lesson in chiropractic care and Robert received his first adjustment."

Before leaving on Monday,

May 17, they toured the Lincoln sights in Springfield, the family hosted a Thanksgiving dinner for him, and held an open house, inviting those who wanted to visit with the pastor before his return to Uganda.

Pastor Robert had a few other places to visit before returning home, but he was looking forward to returning to his family in Uganda. "My wife Caroline and I have a two-and-a-half year old boy and we are expecting a girl in June," he said with a smile.

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
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

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a vernal pond is and use a microscope to view what is alive in the water.



That report had been referenced orally before. He also expressed disappointment that the agenda didn't call for discussion about returning a portion of the proceeds of water sales to Deer Run Mine to the Lake Reclamation Fund.

Commissioner Michael Murphy thanked the two who spoke to the council, saying that commissioners too often hear of opposition after a vote has been taken. "We appreciate it," he said. "We want people to come to the meetings to see what we're doing."

Only one bid for \$5,000 was submitted per lot; also included were project plans for each lot, which was a requirement for submission. The discussion following the motion to sell was never about the amount of the offer, but rather about whether the lots should be sold. Commissioner Robbins said he could not in good conscience vote to sell since the calls he had received were so opposed to the idea. Commissioner Katie Duncan said that the city needs new affordable housing, and those lots were suitable for that. She said it was her suggestion that made the land a possibility after the once-Girl Scout Camp seemed more suitable for higher-end development. Mayor Don Downs said he had met with the bidders (Capstone Development) that afternoon; two representatives were in the audience.

"They are a good, moral company," Downs said. "We need them involved in our community. They'll be good to do business with." Downs also pointed out a problem with the properties that will need to be overcome; the water mains to the mine were supposed to be towards the front of the lot, but instead are "...right smack dab in the middle of it."

The notes accompanying the bids had pointed out two other problems that held down the offer: septic fields will have to be developed, since sewer mains aren't close, and neither lot has a view of the lake.

Community planner Jonathan Weyer said the city is landlocked as far as possible expansion for housing developments are concerned, so the council faces what he termed "a wicked problem." No matter how the vote would go, not everyone was going to be happy.

The vote to accept Capstone Development's bids was 2-1 to sell, with Robbins voting "no" and Duncan and Murphy voting "yes." Murphy assured those who had called or spoken against the sale that their concerns would be met.

The first vote on the agenda come with a potentially bigger price tag. By a 3-0 vote the council authorized issuance of "not-to-exceed \$3 million" in general obligation bonds. The effect will be fund availability to begin the design phase of the state-mandated new sewer plant; bond proceeds will be drawn down over an 18-month period. Finance Commissioner Duncan, who made the motion, said it was the first step to the new plant; city attorney Kit Hantla said it was necessary, and the vote was 3-0.

was 3-0.

The Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) contracts for the 2021 project were approved. Litchfield Bituminous bid \$108,304.51 for the required oil, and Louis Marsch' bid was \$58.50 per ton for rock mix. City engineers in charge of the bid letting said the bids were "a bit under budget."

Both the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) and the Local Labor Union contracts were approved for the next three years. New policemen received \$22.40 per hour beginning in May of this year with Laborers receiving \$20.89, also beginning in May. Each hourly amount rises 35 cents next May and 40 cents in May of 2023.

Five lifeguards were hired for Central Park Pool duty this summer: Joe Mattson, Chloe Beck, Jacen King, Trevor Hartman and Kyle Butler. Two others, Adyson McCammack and Adison Pollard, were hired pending completion of certification. Guerino Bartell was hired to work in the concession stand. Commissioner Robbins said if more applications aren't

received, then pool hours will have to be limited.

Robbins was also given approval to advertise for umpires for youth softball and baseball for the summer (seasons start in three weeks). In a related matter, he was authorized to spend not more than \$4,000 on youth hats and T-shirts in preparation for the seasons. He hopes that amount will be less because of business sponsorships.

 $A\,motion\,to\,amend\,the\,boat$ slip lease agreement at the South Marina was withdrawn after discussion between Robbins, Downs, and Natural Resources Committee member Kendra Wright. Those who lease the slips are experiencing problems with swallows building nests near and above boats there. Wright says the best solution is to remove the nests daily, but the city can't employ someone to do that daily, and those who lease ought not risk their safety by climbing a ladder to remove the nests. Wasps and spiders are another similar issue.

On happier notes, the council approved a request from Zach Wygal and Imagine Hillsboro to use Fourth of July Point for summer concerts. Too, the council will close Wood Street to Berry on July 17 for a three-band festival.

An existing contract for development at 102 South Main was extended per request from new owner Brian Sullivan; the work was delayed because the real estate closing couldn't happen until May 20 because of legal description difficulties. Work is to begin within 30 days.

Brian Limbaugh, a member of Imagine Hillsboro's Parks and Recreations Committee, was granted permission to erect the giant H (symbolizing Hillsboro) that Hiller's Sheet Metal has made and donated for Central Park and to begin the refurbishing of the ball diamond to be used for kickball, Wiffle ball, and t-ball games. That refurbishment will be covered primarily by a donation from the Bank of Hillsboro. Mayor Downs said he will donate \$120 to the Central Park Reinvention Fund and asked his council members to do the same. Limbaugh says the plans, with splashpad and playground equipment, are a big financial undertaking and will need much individual and community support.

Finance Commissioner Duncan chided the departments for not yet turning budget paper work in; without them, she can't prepare the budget, so now it won't be ready until the end of June

ready until the end of June. Downs, still serving as utilities commissioner until that vacancy is filled by appointment, said the IEPA water testing inspection is complete and that Woodard & Curran is bringing into service a new compound meter to use when selling water to other municipalities. It will help find leaks in those areas. The water tower inspection is scheduled for next week. Sewer pumps are still "seizing up" because wipes that aren't disposable are still being flushed. Downs also sent condolences to the Herschelman and Galer families because of the passing of their beloved Gracie.

Public Safety Commissioner Murphy said Code Officer Mike Lee has refined the way of dealing with derelict properties. Murphy also said the city is within a month of taking action at the house on Lakeview and School Streets and another on Water Street, which has a collapsed roof. Murphy says the goal is to make our town look pretty.

Robbins said final preparations are in process to open the pool and the chain link fence has been removed at Central Park. At Glenn Shoals buoys are back in position and a pontoon boat that had broken loose from the marina was recovered.

The Street Department poured a new sidewalk on Park Street, sprayed weeds on brick streets, continued brush and leaf pickup and disposed of the opossum that didn't make it through the traffic on Tremont Street.

The council next meets, this time in person, on Tuesday, June 8, in city hall. The public is welcome to attend.

All seven board members participated in the meeting, which was led by Vice President Ron Anglin. Board President Julie Abel participated by phone.

After calling the meeting to order, Anglin asked for any public comments. Litchfield High School junior Spencer Hoehl read a prepared speech to the board that was written by himself and fellow student Caleb Jurgena. About 30 LHS students attended the meeting, but waited outside due to COVID guidelines.

On behalf of many LHS students, Hoehl asked the board not to transfer LHS social studies teacher Josh Hughes back to the middle school. He presented a petition to the board signed by more than 130 students, which represents about one-third of the student body.

At last month's special board meeting, the board hired Lance Boldt from Mt. Vernon as high school social studies teacher and head boys basketball coach, which paved the way for an involuntary transfer of Josh Hughes from high school social studies teacher to middle school social studies teacher.

Hughes was initially hired by the district as a middle school social studies teacher, but was involuntarily transferred to the high school three years ago.

In speaking to the board, Hoehl talked about Hughes' passion and knowledge in teaching social studies.

"In a high school social studies course, you are expected to learn not only about history, economics and civics, but about how to be an upstanding citizen when you leave high school," Hoehl said. "This puts high school social studies teachers in a position where they are not only educators, but keepers of the nation's conscience. Mr. Hughes rises to this challenge with excellence."

Hoehl also talked about the mission statement of the Litchfield School District about providing effective educational experiences for all learners through relevant learning environments and opportunities.

"Do you wish for the students to believe that you prioritize athletics above academics as a result of this decision, or rather imply to us that hard work and dedication mean nothing when it comes to the adult world?" Hoehl asked.

In closing, he asked the board to reconsider its position to transfer Hughes back to the middle school and find an alternative solution. "Mr. Hughes maintain-

ing his position could have a profound impact on hundreds, even thousands of future students," Hoehl said.

Following closed session, the board voted 4-3 to uphold the involuntary transfer of Hughes back to the middle school. Voting against the transfer were board members David Belusko, Mark Bloome and Mike Fleming.

Citizens Agenda

In addition to the recognition of retirees, resident Dan Napier asked to address the board. He talked to the board briefly about his time in the service and passed out an article from Hillsdale College on critical race theory. Napier asked each board member to read the article as there is

discussion nationwide about introducing it into school curriculum.

Other Business

During the consent agenda, Dr. Fuerstenau said district expenses are tracking for this time of year. He said the state is paying categorical grants, noting the state is discussing an additional \$350 million in school funding as part of the evidence-based funding legislation.

Curriculum coordinator Jennifer Thompson said the district completed the ESSER 2 (emergency relief funding) and has started working to apply for \$3.4 million in funding from ESSER 3, due July 1. Dr. Fuerstenau added they have started working on next year's budget, including ESSER funding, which can be used the next three years.

The board unanimously approved the consent agenda, including payment of bills and the treasurer's report, as well as minutes from previous meetings. In May, the district spent \$175,622 from the education fund, \$48,262 from operations and maintenance, \$32,320 from transportation, \$31,725 from capital projects and \$1,596 from tort.

In his treasurer's report, Dr. Fuerstenau noted the district has a balance of \$30 million in all funds as of April 30. That includes \$7.7 million in operating funds, \$13.5 million in capital projects and \$7.6 million in health life safety funds.

Under new business, the board unanimously approved Christy Holliday, Chris Kuntzman and Jennifer Thompson as the district's SOPPA (Student Online Personal Protection Act) officers. Dr. Fuerstenau said it's a new law that takes effect July 1.

Kuntzman said the law is designed to help protect student data through different online vendors. The district is building a website that will be up by mid-June as part of the new law.

Board member Mike Fleming asked if the vendors were required to submit audits, and Kuntzman said not yet, but he feels like that will be coming in the near future. He added that the next step will be implementing things to protect staff data as well. Dr. Fuerstenau said everything would be up and running by July 1.

Board members unanimously approved an intergovernmental agreement between the school districts of Hillsboro,

Litchfield, Nokomis, Panhandle, Bunker Hill, Carlinville, Gillespie, Mt. Olive, Southwestern and Staunton to create the Montgomery and Macoupin Counties Consortium for Innovation and Career Pathways. Dr. Fuerstenau said this is just the next step in the project, and having ten school districts commit to it will be vital to making it happen.

The board also approved an athletic co-op with the Gillespie School District for high school boys soccer for the next two years. Dr. Fuerstenau said the only change to the current arrangement is that Litchfield will now be hosting the co-op. He added that Litchfield currently has more numbers in boys soccer than Gillespie, which is why they will host. But said they will likely host a game in Gillespie as well.

Board member Mark Bloome said he was glad to hear that, and inquired about where the team would practice. Dr. Fuerstenau said Athletic Director Mark Elvers is addressing that issue.

Information Items

Dr. Fuerstenau presented the monthly enrollment reports to the board.

Elementary school principals Jeremy Heigert and Adam Favre gave a report on Camp Panther with 116 kids registered for the June program. They have more than 15 donors who have contributed \$1,600 for incentive prizes, like bikes and technology. Board member Ron Anglin asked if the program would be expanded next year, and Dr. Fuerstenau said that's in the plans.

Favre added they continue in-person screenings for the pre-K program, and interest has been great this year. He said they may have a waiting list for the first time in many years.

In other summer school news, they have 24 registered for summer school at the middle school level and 70 at the high school level.

Hoster said the district had hosted a senior parade, Prom, senior trip and was planning graduation (which was held May 21).

"It hasn't been ideal, but we have been able to do some events for our students," he said.

During his report, Dr. Fuerstenau had high praise for district staff for making it through the entire school year with in-person learning.

"That's quite a reflection on

our staff, parents, board and community," said Dr. Fuerstenau. "It takes a village to raise a child, and we should be extremely proud of that."

He also told the board that the Illinois State Board of Education recommends full school days for five days a week in the fall with no remote learning (with a few exceptions).

Dr. Fuerstenau told the board there would be a special meeting on Wednesday, June 2, with FGM Architects to discuss the elementary school building project. The meeting begins at 6 p.m. at Sihler School.

There will also be a public

hearing to amend this year's budget at the next regular board meeting on Thursday evening, June 17. That meeting also begins at 6 p.m. at Sihler School.

As a final note, Dr. Fuerstenau said they received a FOIA (Freedom of Information Act) request for a list of vendors they do business with and the district complied.

Personnel

Following just over 45 minutes in closed session, the board approved the personnel report.

They accepted the retirement letter from cafeteria worker Debbie Horrocks, effective the end of the school year.

They also unanimously approved the resignations of high school head cheer coach Victoria Knoche, high school National Honor Society sponsor Hilary Wagenblast and high school art teacher and Rembrandt Society sponsor Scott Durbin. All are effective at the end of the school year.


The board approved family medical leave for elementary special education teacher Megan Becker.

They hired Shayla Ortega and Sara Anderson as substitute teacher's aides for the summer Make-It program, Patricia Goforth as high school Spanish teacher and Drew Logan as eighth grade girls basketball coach.

The board approved the transfer of Mitch Hughes to junior varsity volleyball coach and Abby Carlson to varsity volleyball coach and also added the position of freshman volleyball coach.

In a final motion, the board recognized the declaration of collective bargaining negotiations and established board team members including Board President Julie Abel and Dr. Fuerstenau.

The meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m.





Funeral Home Serves For Eight Decades

"I was 24 and still green behind the ears when I bought the funeral home, but I had a willingness to learn," Terry Plummer, owner and funeral director of Plummer Funeral Home in Litchfield stated. "There were people that snickered, but there were also people willing to take a risk to financially back me and give me needed advice."

The risk paid off as Plummer celebrated his 35th year of ownership in December 2020. Last year was a big year for both Plummer and the funeral home which quietly marked its 80th anniversary in August 2020, overshadowed by the COVID-19 pandemic. In 1940, (former) Mt. Olive residents Wilbert E. Ross and Maynard C. Becker purchased the home of the Herbert Hood family and modified it to open the Ross-Becker Funeral Home. By 1950, Ross had bought out Becker's interest in the business and the funeral home became Ross Funeral Home, which it remained until Plummer took ownership and renamed the firm the Ross-Plummer Funeral Home in 1985. Mr. Becker returned to Mt. Olive to take over his family's business, Becker and Son Funeral Home. He was succeeded by his son, Ed (Shelly), and later by his grandson Doug Becker - a fourth generation funeral director.

"When I purchased the funeral home from Wilbert and Esther Ross, he was in his 80's, so the home was in need of a lot of freshening up and repairs. The first year we added personal touches, like new carpeting and furniture in place of the folding chairs the home had been using, to make the facility feel warmer and more inviting. Then in 1995, we took on a major renovation and added a new preparation room, rest rooms, a lounge, a nice L-shaped chapel and desperately needed office space, as well as updating the original part of the home. We also remodeled the facility to make it handicap accessible and expanded the parking area. A lot of elbow grease has gone into the place over the years," Plummer said with a laugh. "A neat, clean facility is important to me."

The funeral home dropped the "Ross" surname and became Plummer Funeral Home during his early years of ownership. In 2005, he purchased the real estate and intellectual property of Meinschein Funeral Home and the two operations were merged together.

While Plummer is a first generation funeral director, his family has long been tied to Litchfield's business community. His grandparents Robert and Frances Plummer were owners of a neighborhood grocery store from 1926 to 1951, and his father, John Plummer, Sr., owned and operated Plummer Lumber Company. His brother, Robert, owns R.P. Lumber Co., based in Edwardsville with stores in Litchfield and Hillsboro. Plummer's interest in the funeral services industry was sparked when he attended his first funeral.

"When I was in the sixth grade the woman who babysat me passed away. My father was a pallbearer and he asked me if I wanted to go and pay my respects," Plummer explained. "I remember taking in all the various aspects of the service and thinking that it was something I could do."

After graduating from Litchfield High School in 1980, Plummer attended Lincoln Land College in Springfield and later transferred to Southern Illinois University-Carbondale where he graduated with a degree in mortuary science and funeral service. After completing his apprenticeship and working at various funeral homes around the state he opted to return to Litchfield where he ended up working for Meinschein, Bass and McCracken Funeral Homes after a brief stint in

Plummer asserts that whether it is a large corporate conglomerate or a family owned funeral service, all good funeral homes are ruled by

attention to the details. "It is all about the little details. The things that people don't see behind the scenes. It is a double-edged sword because if a funeral home is doing their job well the grieving families never think about the work it takes to fluidly organize a funeral service. If they saw they would realize what goes into the cost of a funeral," Plummer stated. They just see the big building, nice furniture and some pretty expensive ceremonial cars in the parking lot. But like any business we have to pay for things like property taxes, utilities, workman's compensation, insurance and salaries for our employees."

Plummer attributes the funeral home's success over the last 35 years to his staff members.

"No successful business can operate without a good staff and we run like a well oiled machine," Plummer stated emphatically. "I have wonderful employees and have been lucky to have had a wonderful staff over the years."

Current staff members include Licensed Funeral Director Gerry Griffiths who as been with the firm for 20 years and is now semi-retired; Administrative Support Jennifer Epps; Administrative Assistant Stella Turner; Funeral Assistant Brandon Dooley; Funeral Assistant Paul Frerichs and Funeral Assistant Gary Schwab. Plummer's wife, Diane, also works alongside him as a funeral home assistant and licensed pre-planning consultant, in addition to managing the funeral home's social media presence and community outreach.

Plummer estimates that they oversee between 90 to 100 services each year, as well as assisting families with preliminary funeral planning. He describes the funeral home's role as reactionary, stating that they respond to the call that someone has died which takes them to one of the area hospitals, nursing homes or the individual's home. State law stipulates that only a licensed funeral director or coroner may remove a body. The next step in the process is to meet with the family to discuss arrangements, including service details and collect-

ing biographical information to write a death certificate, nullify the social security card and compile an obituary. Then the funeral home gets to work making phone calls, laying out the deceased and pulling the service details together behind the scenes. As the son of a WWII veteran, Plummer takes great pride in planning services for veterans and their

Plummer has seen many changes within the industry over his three plus decades as a funeral director. One of the biggest came with the rise of technology.

"I can still remember giving obituaries to Nancy Galer on Sunday and Wednesday nights to run in *The Hillsboro* Journal. You could almost set your watch by her calls," Plummer said reminiscently. "I would be on the phone for hours giving obituaries to the various newspapers. Fax machines were a huge time saver and then we started emailing obituaries to the papers around 2002, at the encouragement of Richard Slepicka. The internet made it so much more efficient to get obituaries out to the public and to make corrections."


Another positive change came when the area funeral directors rallied together and petitioned the Montgomery County Board to provide the county coroner with a vehicle to transport the deceased, a responsibility that was previously tasked to the funeral directors. This change decreased the amount of scenes the directors were called out to. Plummer also sees more women entering into the funeral service industry, bringing new ideas and perspectives to the once male-dominated field. He has found that some changes have been more difficult than

"Now I am at the point in my career where I am starting to bury the parents of my friends and former classmates, so it is getting really personal," Plummer explained, with a somber tone. "It feels good to know that they trust me to take care of the service but it comes with a different, more vested weight of responsibility. It is a continual educational process of not just how you deal with your business but how you deal with people."

For Plummer, dealing with

people is at the heart of why the funeral home has been a fixture in the community of Litchfield for the last 80 years. Both he, and the funeral service's former founders, Ross and (briefly) Becker, understood that their primary job was to provide comfort by delivering their best to each of the grieving families that walked through their door.

"My dad had one rule that he reiterated throughout our childhood. He always said, boys, keep your word when you make a promise. Your word is your bond.' That is something that I have stuck to throughout my career," said Plummer. "Don't promise something that you cannot deliver. Have I made every family that I have served happy? No. There have been times that I have mis-stepped and families have felt I wasn't personable enough, but I have always tried to implement best practices and develop relationships. At the end of the day, I am proud of my funeral home and the quality of service that my staff and I deliver. I like to think that Mr. Ross and Mr. Becker would be proud of it too."
