Shop Hillsboro For The Holidays, Punch Cards

Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, Imagine Hillsboro and *The Journal-News* are teaming up to host their last #ShopHillsboro event of the year on the nationally recognized Shop Small Business Saturday, Nov. 27.

The #ShopHillsboro Shop Small event aims to discourage shoppers from spending their money at large retail chains on Black Friday in lieu of heading to downtown Hillsboro to make holiday purchases from local retailers.

Starting Thursday, Nov. 11, shoppers can pick up a #ShopHillsboro punch card at any of the local banks, Hillsboro City Hall or *The Journal-News* office.

The #ShopHillsboro punch cards may be used at Hillsboro businesses throughout the Christmas season and returned to Hillsboro City Hall or *The Journal-News* office by Thursday, Dec. 25, for a chance to win \$50 in chamber bucks. Shoppers will receive double punches on Shop Small Saturday.

Those that will be out of town for the Thanksgiving holiday will have plenty of

chances to use the punch cards, as Imagine Hillsboro will once again hold Friday Night Lights and Saturdays on The Square promotional events on the weekends leading up to Christmas. Winners will be announced on Monday, Jan. 3.

Local business owners are encouraged to get in on the holiday fun by participating in the annual window decorating contest.



The cheery displays will be kept hidden from the public and unveiled as part of the #ShopHillsboro Small Saturday festivities. Displays must be completed and windows covered (to hide the holiday displays) prior to the #ShopHillsboro event. Paper to cover windows may be purchased at *The Journal-News*.

To participate, businesses located in Hillsboro, Schram City or Taylor Springs must submit a photo of their display, business name and phone number to contact@hillsborochamber.net by Saturday, Nov. 27. Trophies will be awarded for first, second and third place.

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New Cases Trending Up Again So Far This Month

After trending downward in October, the number of daily new COVID-19 positive tests is trending back up in November, according to numbers furnished by the Montgomery County Health Department.

In October, the county averaged 7.3 new cases per day, but that number is

up to 12.8 new cases per day through the first eight days of November. Driving the average up were three days in which there were 20 or more new cases: 22 on Thursday, Nov. 4; 20 on Friday, Nov. 5; and 25 on Monday, Nov. 8.

The local health department maintains walk-in COVID-19 vaccination

clinics every Monday and Thursday at its Hillsboro office, located at 11191 Illinois Route 185, between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Contact the Montgomery County Health Department Monday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at 217-532-2001 with any questions.

With a crispness in the air, frost in the fields and the sun shining, various folks with rakes carefully stacked in their cars, trucks and minivans arrived at Central Park, the gathering place for this year's Rake and Run service project on Saturday morning,

The areas we are ministering out of tend to be incredibly impoverished. Our two biggest goals are to share the gospel of Jesus Christ and to help develop the community and aid the people who live in it," said John Reynolds, a missionary who co-founded Cross Commission with his wife Donna.

"Our youth center, Zona Extrema, is our primary focus. It gives us a way to engage and build relationships and trust with the children that come in and as they begin to open up and share with us we have the opportunity to pray with them and help lead them to gospel. The Zone enables us to reach the community on a deeper level."

John and Donna Reynolds founded Cross Commission in 1993 as a mime troupe that traveled throughout the United States and around the globe spreading the Gospel.

"I am actually a professional mime," John stated, with a laugh. "We had a couple of teams and would go to churches and perform in the streets, pretty much anywhere we were welcome, for about eight years before we started to feel the calling toward world-missions.

After a lot of prayers, we felt that Guatemala was the right fit. Once we were there (San Cristóbal Verapaz, Alta Verapaz, Guatemala) and saw the number of children out on the streets we felt compelled to open a youth center. The Zona Extrema started in a small, one-car

garage and before the place was even open we had about 40 kids coming by each day. The numbers have continued to increase causing the mission to grow along with them."

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Local Moose Lodge To Hear From Chairman

Paul W. Curtis, Chairman of the Board for the Moose Fraternity, will speak at Hillsboro Moose Lodge No. 1377, 411 S. Main St., at 8:30 a.m. on Monday Nov. 29, as part of his travels across the state of Illinois.

Curtis rose to become the Moose Fraternity's Chief Presiding Officer on July 4, elected by vote of the Moose delegates to a one-year term at the Fraternity's 133rd International Convention held in Cincinnati, OH. The Moose

organization, headquartered at Mooseheart, IL, consists of nearly 900,000 men and women in approximately 1,300 lodges and 1,200 chapters throughout the U.S., Canada and Great Britain.

The organization owns and operates Mooseheart, a 1,000 acre community and school for children in need, located 40 miles west of Chicago; and Moosehaven, a 63-acre retirement community near Jacksonville, FL. Additionally, Moose lodges and chapters

conduct between 40 and 60 million dollars worth of community service annually. Such community service can be tailored to local needs, but also takes the form of organization-wide programs.

One of these programs includes Tommy Moose, where lodges and chapters have provided over 200,000 plush Moose figures since 2003, free of charge, to emergency workers and hospitals to give to children in stressful situations. Also, the Moose Youth

Awareness Program annually brings together hundreds of bright teenagers for Youth Congresses to discuss the most effective ways to conduct "KidsTalks," communicating positive life choice messages to children ages 4-9. Moose-trained teens have given KidsTalks to more than 700,000 youngsters across North America since 1990.

One of the 200-some at the dedication was former Hillsboro mayor and fourth generation coal miner Bill Baran, who said his grandfather, Mike Baran, was an interpreter for Lewis in his communication with Slovak miners.

State Board Releases School Report Card Data

The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in significant drops in enrollment, academic performance and the likelihood of graduating high school on time, according to the latest school report card released recently by the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE).

The report card is an annual report that tracks how the state, and each school and district, are progressing on a wide range of educational goals.

But the report also showed that more Illinois students than ever are preparing for college and careers by taking dual credit, Advanced Placement and career and technical education, or CTE courses, while schools themselves are doing a better job of retaining veteran teachers.

According to the report, which covers the 2020-2021 academic year, total enrollment in Pre-K-12 schools fell 3.6 percent from the prior year, or by about 70,000 students, to just under 1.89 million. State officials said recent trends would have predicted a 1.1 percent decline, meaning the additional 2.5 percent may be attributed to the pandemic.

The biggest enrollment declines were in Pre-K and kindergarten, with pre-K enrollment dropping 17 percent and kindergarten enrollment dropping 8 percent.

The report also shows a disturbing increase in chronic absenteeism since the pandemic began. More than one in five students, or 22.8 percent, missed 10 percent or more of all school days in the year. That's up from 13.4 percent in 2019, the most recent full pre-pandemic year.

Officials cautioned, however, that the 2021 figures might not be reliable because of the number of students who were engaged in remote learning, where taking accurate attendance counts can be

more challenging.

The report card also showed declines in student performance on standardized tests, although those numbers are still preliminary because schools were given the option of administering those tests this fall due to the number of buildings that were still not fully open in the spring. Full results will be published next spring.

All students in grades 3-8 take what's called the Illinois Assessment of Readiness, or IAR, which covers English language arts and math proficiency. High school students are tested in 11th grade by taking the SAT exam.

The preliminary results showed fewer students meeting grade-level standards compared to 2019, especially among younger students who may have struggled more to engage in remote learning.

The number of students meeting grade-level standards dropped 17.8 percent in math and 16.6 percent in English language arts, with the biggest declines seen among English language learners and low-income students.

One area of academic performance that did improve was in college and career preparation. The report card showed the number of students taking courses for both high school and college credit grew 12 percent from the prior year, to 72,490. Advanced Placement enrollment grew 1.6 percent, to 129,574, and CTE enrollment inched up a fraction of a percentage point to 287,191.

The state's overall teacher retention rate—the three-year average of the percentage of full-time teachers returning to the same school from the previous year—also rose more than a percentage point, to 87.1 percent, although retention rate was lower among Black teachers.

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The Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln administers over 250 charitable funds totaling approximately \$55 million in assets. We try to schedule it around Veterans Day, but this year not all the leaves are down. We considered rescheduling, but whatever we can do today will be helpful,” concluded Van Giesen as she

began explaining the morning’s plan.

The HAH Junior Board members, ages nine to 16 and all of whom have had the recommendation of an adult to serve on the board, learn leadership skills and the benefits of community service, said Van Giesen.

“We’re greatly outnumbered today by the junior board and youth group turnout. That’s wonderful,” Huber offered. In fact, approximately 30 volunteers showed up, and the vast majority were

school-aged youth.

This year, about seven houses signed up for the free service, a lower number than usual, most likely due to the pandemic. The homeowners must be either senior citizens or armed service veterans.

Youth volunteer raker Rylie Jones commented, “I’m just trying to help my community. I like volunteer work.” Hillsboro’s mayor agreed. “It’s a chance to bring people together in the neighborhoods and to just do a good deed,” Mayor Don Downs said, as he

powered up his leaf blower.

The service is free, but some choose to give a donation. That money is then given to Imagine Hillsboro to use for volunteer maintenance projects such as painting a community member’s house that’s in need.

Back in 2012, the HAH Junior Board started a Hillsboro beautification day that took place around Veterans Day each year, and that project developed into the current Rake and Run service project.

The Zona Extrema is similar to youth centers in the United States, filled with games and activities, including a small gym, where area youth are free to come and go as they please.

“The ping-pong and pool tables are the things that catch the kids’ attention, but we also have a computer room where youth can come in and study, because many of them do not have internet access in their homes,” John explained. “We have had so many mothers come to us and thank us, because they don’t feel that their kids would have been able to complete school if they hadn’t had access to the Zone.”

In addition to John and Donna, Cross Commission employs a full-time staff of five to work with local youth at the zone. This both enables the local missionaries to return to their home church, Hillsboro Free Methodist Church, for brief periods, as well as provides familiar, consistent adults for the children that use the Zona Extrema to build relationships with.

“Our staff are working on the front lines, planting seeds of the gospel through the relationships they develop at the Zone. We also hold a youth church, and a Bible study for those that are interested in delving deeper into their walk with God.”

The couple is currently in Hillsboro, preparing to host one of the ministry’s larger

fundraising benefits. The annual Cross Commission dinner will begin at 6 p.m. this Saturday, Nov. 13, at the Hillsboro Free Methodist Church, located at 1400 Seymour Avenue. Attendees will be treated to a lasagna dinner while they hear about the work Cross Commissions is doing in Guatemala. While the dinner is free, the evening will include a silent auction, raffle drawings and door prizes, as well as the chance to purchase some handmade Guatemalan gifts. A select number of take out dinners, including a 7 x 10 pan of unbaked lasagna, family size salad and 8 x 8 pan of brownies or blondies are also available for purchase, and can be picked up the night of the event. Locked and Loaded Ltd, Outdoor and Sporting Goods Company, is offering a chance to win a \$500 gift card in support of the mission’s work. A limited number of tickets are being sold for \$10 apiece with all proceeds benefiting Cross Commission.

Reynolds went on to explain that the funds raised during the annual benefit dinner are used for general overhead including helping to pay the salaries of their staff members. In addition to the Cross Commission employees that work in the youth center, the ministry employs a full time nurse and part time doctor who travel to local villages that lack access to health care.

“Cross Commission goes out into remote villages and

tries to aid the people that live in them,” Reynolds said. “Most of the people living in these remote areas only have an open campfire in their homes and don’t have water readily available to them the way we do. Our mission teams go in and install wood-burning stoves and water infiltration systems to help improve the quality of health in these areas. It’s a practical way for us to share our faith and mission to spread the love of God to areas that have been neglected by the outside world.”

While individual missions teams raise funds for the stoves and water infiltration systems, Cross Commission will gratefully accept donations towards those projects. However, their biggest needs remain ways to fund the general overhead costs of the mission, primarily the youth center.

Application To Illinois Colleges Easier

Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE), in partnership with the Illinois General Assembly, are utilizing \$1 million in funding to add all of the state's public universities onto the Common App platform. First-year students applying to college will now be able to apply to any of Illinois' 12 public universities, plus dozens of the state's private institutions, with only one form.

For students and families concerned about the cost of applying for college, waivers

are available for low-income Common App applicants. In 2019-2020, more than 470,000 Common App applicants across the nation were granted a fee waiver. Some colleges and universities either have no application fees or will waive fees if needed.

Three public universities, the University of Illinois Chicago, Northern Illinois University, and Chicago State University, were previously available on the Common App. The \$1 million investment allowed the remaining public universities to join the

program. The last outstanding university, Northeastern Illinois University, will be implemented later this fall.

The Common App website (www.commonapp.org) has several resources for students and families who want to know more about the application process, such as a first-year application guide, resources called "What Is Common App?" and "How the First Year Common App Works," YouTube videos, and the list of institutions that use the application.

Quarton Makes His Mark At State Finals

The rallying cry for the Litchfield High School cross country program this year has been, "Do Not Be Content." While that may be true for the Panthers, they can definitely be proud of how they did at the IHSA Class 1A Cross Country State Finals at Detweiller Park in Peoria on Saturday, Nov. 6.

In the Litchfield boys' first ever trip to state in cross country, the Panthers finished 29th in the 30-team field, with four of the seven runners setting personal bests. If that wasn't enough, Litchfield sophomore Camden Quarton cemented his place as one of the top Class 1A runners in the state as he finished in the top 25 and became the first LHS boys runner to earn all-state honors.

Quarton ran a personal best time of 15:33.2 at the three-mile course, beating his previous best from the East Alton-Wood River Invitational by more than 12 seconds. That time would be good enough to put Quarton in 23rd place, eight-tenths of a second ahead of Riverdale's Landis Musser and one second ahead of DePaul College Prep's Charlie Richardson, who rounded out the top 25 for all-state honors.

In addition to their all-stater, three other Litchfield runners also set personal records at Detweiller Park. Sam Horn ran a 17:29.07 to finish 202nd and cut 11 seconds off his season best time, which came two weeks before at the Althoff Regional.

Gavin Thimsen finished 228th with a time of 17:57.89, the first time he has broken 18 minutes this season. Thimsen, whose previous best was 18:02.7 at the EAWR Invite, cut 51 seconds off his time at sectionals during his state run.

Peyton Baugher, a junior who didn't run at regionals or sectionals, also had a big improvement in his personal best, cutting more than a minute and a half off his time from the EAWR Invite. Baugher, who ran a 22:53.1 at EAWR, ran a 21:34.8 to finish 260th overall.

The three aforementioned runners



For the first time on the boys' side and just the fourth time ever, Litchfield left the IHSA Cross Country State Finals with an all-stater. Camden Quarton finished 23rd overall to earn Litchfield's first boys' medal, joining Kelli Stratmeyer (10th in 1997) and his older sister Victoria Quarton (21st in 2010 and ninth in 2011) as the only Panther medalists in the sport.

Dan Chamness/College Report

will all join Quarton again next year as they compete in their senior seasons, but for three others, Saturday's meet was their last as Purple Panthers.

Kevin Pollard finished 240th with a time of 18:16.5, after two standout performances at regionals and sectionals the two weeks before to help Litchfield get to state.

Alex DeLaCruz was just off his pace from sectionals, when he finished 60th, running an 18:31.5 to finish 247th overall.

Brayden Davis also ran better than he had during the regular season, clocking in at 18:42.9 to finish 251st, two weeks after setting a personal best at the Althoff Regional.

All three runners will be missed next year as Litchfield looks to continue the

momentum they gained in 2021.

Quarton's 23rd place finish supplanted Litchfield's previous best boys finish, 58th by Ryan Bishop in 2005. That was Bishop's second straight trip to state and was the last time Litchfield had a runner compete in the meet, with 2008 grad Anthony Robinson also joining Bishop in Peoria that year.

Coach Jeremy Palmer is hopeful that it won't be another 16 years until the Panthers are back at state and with Quarton, Horn, Thimsen and Baugher returning (along with freshman Kenny Traylor and sophomore Cy Cress), odds are good that won't be the case.

Litchfield's success this season will hopefully help their numbers as well as both the boys and girls teams could use a few more runners to pad their rosters.

Regardless of who and how many don the Panther uniform next year, 2021 was a special season for those who did, especially the ones who were part of the boys' state run. No, Litchfield wasn't content, but they should definitely be proud.

Having to learn their third system (both offensively and defensively) in as many years complicated matters. Then it took a while to buy in – to see its strengths for a team. Finally, they had to develop confidence in each other; it’s hard to be an effective quarterback or running back if one fears the line isn’t capable of doing its job. Because the coaching staff came here relatively late in the summer, the time to learn was compacted.

It’s also hard to develop needed confidence while playing the elite of the conference; in the first four games, Hillsboro was outscored 145 to 49. The offense moved the ball, but turnovers at crucial times derailed drives. Still, the Toppers kept faith that better days were coming.

Coach Reed points to a minor change that had far-reaching effects. Leading rusher (and also top tackler) Blaze Helton began the season with a stand-up stance; the coaches changed that into a three-point stance that kept him lower as a runner. His most productive rushing games (Staunton 139 yards, Piasa 221, and Litchfield

184) came after the change, and the attention he drew helped free the wingbacks (Blaine Stewart, Joe Keiser, and Jaben Compton) to have more success.

Coach Reed also said that as his offensive linemen became familiar with the blocking schemes, they would suggest plays they felt might work in given situations based on what they were experiencing on the field. To have players knowledgeable enough to do that is better than relying on tapes of past games.

Statistically the number of passes thrown went down, but the numbers in the “Yards Gained Passing” category rose. Yards gained rushing? The low was 101 against Paris (game five); the high (415) came in the “Best of the Rest Bowl” in the rain at Piasa. The runners, including the quarterback, rushed for over 300 yards in each of the last four games as the line came together.

The seniors will be missed next season, particularly two-way performers Magnus Wells, Ian Malloy, and Maddex Scott. Lost from the backfield are Joe Keiser and Blaine Stewart; the receiving corps loses Bryce Connor (second

Funding Open For ACEP-ALE Easement Program

On Friday, Nov. 5, NRCS State Conservationist Ivan Dozier announced funding is now available for the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program - Agricultural Land Easements (ACEP-ALE). Dozier explained the ALE program can help address development and population pressures that pose a threat to Illinois farmland acres currently used for agricultural production.

Through conservation easements, NRCS provides financial assistance to eligible partners or entities to assist landowners with the purchase of Agricultural Land Easements (ALE). These easements help farmers/landowners keep working croplands and grasslands in active, profitable agriculture production. The ALE sign-up is continuous.

However, a funding cut-off date is established to allow eligible applications to compete for funding. The first funding cutoff for fiscal year (FY) 2022 is Friday, Dec. 10, 2021. All eligible applications on file with NRCS by this cut off date will be considered for funding.

The NRCS has \$423,000 available for funding for fiscal year 2022. Eligible entities include state and local governments and non-governmental organizations that have farmland or grassland protection programs.

"What is special about agricultural easements is that they can protect the long-term viability of our nation's food supply, something that is more important than ever before. Easements are a

powerful way to actually prevent conversion of productive working lands across Illinois to non-agricultural uses and conserve vital grazing land and pastures," Dozier added.

Agricultural Land Easements can also help keep agriculture lands in the hands of family members, while providing an enhanced opportunity to keep productive land available for secure crop production. Easements can also offer farming opportunities for new farmers to agriculture. To date, producers and partners nationwide have successfully protected more than 1.8 million acres of farmland and grassland through ACEP's predecessor programs like the Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program and the Grassland Reserve Program.

Interested entities may sign up for ALE at their local NRCS office before the first funding cutoff of Friday, Dec. 10. Interested landowners need to find an entity who is willing to assist in the purchase of the easement. Contact your local NRCS office to get more information about the type of entity that would hold an Agriculture Land Easement. Applications received by Friday, Dec. 10, will be ranked in January and funding decisions will be made by NRCS after January 28, 2022.

iDream Program Fosters Student Imagination

On Wednesday, Sept. 22, second graders at J.D. Colt Elementary School in Litchfield received their first lesson from the iDREAM program, a University of Illinois Extension program that encourages students to navigate the world of dreaming, goal setting, and creativity. The curriculum is being facilitated by Valerie Belusko, community and economic development program coordinator for University of Illinois Extension.

Belusko asked the students to share some of their dreams and then she helped them narrow their focus by giving them specific prompts such as, "What dream do you have for your school? Litchfield Beans Grow Over A Foot Long

Lots of people around Litchfield grow soybeans. Lots and lots and lots of soybeans.

But only one family grew sword beans this past summer. The difference? Where a typical soybean pod is about three-quarters of an inch long, the typical sword bean pod grown by Edward Buske and Sara Severtson of Litchfield was about a foot long.

Seriously.

A sword bean is a domesticated legume plant that is used as a vegetable in central and south central India, although not commercially farmed.

"I just like trying interesting and unusual things," Buske said about buying three sword bean seeds off the internet this spring. "A squirrel ate one, but the other two plants did great."

Buske, Severtson, and two children, 13-year-old Mathew

Severtson and nine-year-old Mollie Severtson, spent the summer watching the beans grow and grow and grow and grow.

The largest measured about 13 inches long. The widest was about two inches.

The family shared their harvest around town. Severtson took some of the beans to Evergreen Place supported living in Litchfield where residents got a kick out of them, and Mollie took some to Russell School in Litchfield for teachers and students to see and learn about.

How are they to eat?

"Kind of iffy," Buske said. The preparation process includes boiling the beans twice.

But the goal in growing the sword beans wasn't about making a meal. It was about making an interesting memory.

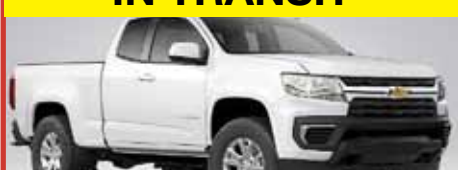
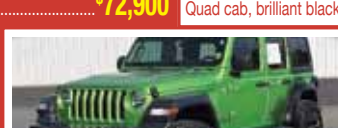
