Local Couple Takes On Corner Block Building

"If you had told us six months ago that we were going to purchase the Corner Block Building, we would have just laughed," said Terri (Miller) Casey, a Montgomery County native who, alongside her husband Chris Casey, became the newest owners of the historic building that has long sat unused on the corner of Wood and Main Streets in downtown Hillsboro, in June 2022. "Of all the historic buildings located downtown I always thought that the Corner Block Building would be the first to be restored but it has continued to languish while the buildings surrounding it are one-by-one returning to their former glory."

A relic of ages past, the historic building has been falling into disrepair for decades and many community members had resigned themselves to the belief that the structure would crumble before a new owner was found. A travesty as the building is considered a rare landmark, with its seamless mixture of architectural types. Dutch Colonial, Gothic and Queen Anne elements blend together to create a space that commanded admiration in its heyday and continues to exude a sense of awe even in its derelict condition. Originally built in 1894 by John M.

Whitehead and Amos Miller, the Corner Block Building served as Hillsboro's first library and reading room. It later housed the Knights of Pythias lodge, as well as a combination of commercial ventures (department stores, hardware stores, an undertaking office and dental office) and residential living spaces throughout its more than a century of existence. Most recently it has housed little more than pigeons and bats, but despite the monumental commitment that came with signing the contract, The Corner Block Group, LLC, operated by Chris and Terri Casey, took a leap of faith to purchase the building with the goal of saving and restoring it for future generations.

Originally from the Hardin area, Chris moved to Hillsboro from Chatham when he and Terri married in August 2021. Like his wife, he fell in love with Hillsboro's small town charm and wanted to be a part of the city's revitalization

"Terri and I were walking down Main Street one evening, shortly before we were married, when I told her that I really wanted to purchase a building downtown," Chris admitted. "Little did I know that 30 days later the old Hamilton Hotel, the current home of Century 21 and Bre's Beehive, would be up for sale.

I was lucky enough to purchase the building shortly after it was listed. Terri and I were happy working on updating the building and really thought that the Hamilton Hotel would be it for us."

"We had no intention of taking on another project," Terri interjected, with a laugh. "Chris and I were sitting at our favorite spot, near the glass garage doors, at The Opera House Brewing Company one evening, looking over at the Corner Block Building and having our regular discussion that 'someone needed to do something to save the building before it was too late.' Tony Marcolini, the owner of the Opera House, came over and joined the conversation. He looked at us and said, 'Why don't you and Chris just do it?' We both started laughing and gave a laundry list of reasons why we weren't the ideal buyers: We aren't wealthy people; we don't have the kind of trade skills needed to take on a renovation of that scale.... We kept listing all of the reasons we shouldn't take on a project of this scale to each other over the next $few\,weeks.\,I\,spent\,15\,years\,thinking\,that$ someone was going to fix up the Corner Block Building and it is a surreal, and sobering feeling to realize that it is us."

Hillsboro Council **Hires New Attorney**

Hillsboro has a city attorney again after the contract with Giffin, Winning, Cohen & Bodewes, PC was ratified by a 3-0 vote Tuesday evening, July 26; Finance Commissioner Katie Duncan abstained and Utilities Commissioner Kendra Wright was absent. The law firm is represented locally by Hillsboro native Chris Sherer whose office is on South Main near city hall.

The fee structure calls for the city to pay a flat fee of \$1,100 per month; in return Sherer will be at the two regular council meetings per month (no matter how long they last), will be available for 30-minute conferences with city officials before and/ or after those meetings and will participate in ten-minute phone calls with a designated list of officials.

If a service isn't covered by the aforesaid conditions (examples are special meetings, committee meetings, preparation of ordinances, court appearances, negotiations, and defense of the city if legal claims are brought against it), then the fee is \$180 per hour.

The other agenda items were covered quickly. A backto-school 5K fun run/walk was approved by a 4-0 vote; a Business District grant of \$3,000 to Barb Jackson, the owner of the building which once housed Tunes, was approved unanimously after the Moran Development Company gave its approval; and the council agreed to post internally (to see if anyone wants to switch departments) a soon-to-be vacancy in the Parks and Public Properties/Street Department because a current

employee has accepted a job elsewhere.

Hurst-Rosche's Jeremy Connor discussed a Request for Proposals (RFP) and the bidding process needed to initiate a drawdown of the older city lake. The advantages to lowering the water level (it's necessary before state-mandated repairs to the spillway can occur, will help control erosion, will help access to the antiquated system already there, and may help with intentions to remove silt from parts of the lake), are four fold. The old, in-place piping system can't be used because of fears the valve won't close once it's opened; if so, the drawdown would be more dramatic than wanted. The vote to proceed was 4-0.

Tabatha Hamilton, with four years of experience as a police dispatcher in Gillespie, was recommended by the Police and Fire Board to fill the next vacancy of a dispatcher's position in the Hillsboro Fire Station.

The last vote on the agenda was to cancel the August 9 meeting because access to city hall will be limited due to street closure as the city prepares for the Old Settlers celebration.

Kevin Brink, the county employee who produces maps for various purposes, has prepared a proposal for a municipal flag for Hillsboro which he is willing to share. He also suggested the city have a map on hand to outline where residents could go in case of a natural disaster.

Parks and Public Properties Commissioner Fred Butler detailed activities of that department.


Action was taken to approve business district funds for heating and air conditioning work for two local businesses, the Town Pump Bowl and the New 2 You shop at 114 West State Street.

for over 30 years. He then worked at ALCO in Hillsboro as a group manager.



Besides the routine, and issues at the pool seem to be routine, they started work on the Firemen's Clubhouse in City Lake Park, but the rainy weather this week has postponed those efforts. Page Tree Service was called to remove a limb that had fallen on a camper in Sherwood Forest; they also removed a few other limbs that were deemed to be dangerous. The Irving Silt Basin was mowed.

The Streets Department removed an abandoned lead water line on West Wood, did blacktopping, brick replacement (on Broad Street), milled spots on Oak Street, and used the duropatcher as needed. They installed a meter pit on Center Street. As mechanics, they repaired a squad car and a Parks' Department dump truck, and as a carcassremoval service, they picked up the raccoon that didn't make it safely while crossing Shelbyville Road.

Public Safety Commissioner Jerry Gregory reported the Police Department received 224 calls between July 12 and July 26; 18% (40) of those calls concerned traffic stops. Thirty-seven were requests for property checks. Wednesday and Saturday were the days with the most calls (37 each). Gregory also provided a sheet showing how much money firefighters have donated back to their cause from their per-call checks since 2000 through 2021; the total is \$270,236.

Mayor Downs gave Utilities Commissioner Wright's report. The Illinois EPA sampled Glenn Shoals Lake water for cyanotoxins on July 21 (cyanotoxins can be produced by algae bloom); traces of two toxins were found, but a sampling of tested water showed the treatments had removed the toxins. One more test will be conducted in mid-August; after that the threat will be passed.

Lead and copper samples were collected last week. The bids for the Huber Drive project were opened the morning of the council meeting. Hurst-Rosche will review the bids.

She (and Mayor Downs) praised the Street Department for work completed under trying climatic conditions as they installed an underground pipe at the Waste Water Treatment Plant. The USDA will be in town on Tuesday, Aug. 2, to examine the current sewer plant. The USDA has to approve the need for a new plant before any grant money can come Hillsboro's way.

The mayor noted in his report that tuck pointing has started on the Corner Block Building; he cautioned other building owners that their needed work needs to be done before cold weather arrives. He also said that Petersburg Plumbing was to be in town the day of the meeting for further work on the Hamilton Street/West Wood Street intersection, but the rain caused another postponement. He hopes they will reschedule for this week.

City planner Sarah Mc-Connell said the Town Hall meeting set for this Friday had to be postponed because the main speaker, Cory Jobe, had a scheduling conflict; hopefully it'll be rescheduled for the first half of September. She is working with a team to relaunch the "Head to Hillsboro" website.

 $Because the Aug. 9\,meeting$ was cancelled, the council will meet next on Tuesday, Aug. 23, at 7 p.m. in city hall.

Where the Hamilton Building had been well maintained over the years, the Corner Block Building was not and the couple knew going in that taking on the massive renovation project would propel them out of their comfort zone. Both are good at project management and knowing where their individual levels of expertise and skill sets end, and are approaching the restoration with a sense of realism and armory of advice from professional tradesmen. The couple also has additional priorities that take precedence over the large-scale restoration, including their growing family and careers, and they anticipate that their project will take longer to complete as a result. The Caseys are not acting with a finished project in mind, and have a simple answer for those clamoring to know what they plan to do with the building. Terri explained. "The overall goal is to save the building, which means our top priority is making sure it is structurally secure." "Our first goal is to make the building safe enough that we can take the fence down. That will require some structural fixes, so the first sign of progress anyone will likely see is someone on

more than they can do all by themselves and plan to utilize skilled tradesmen and work closely alongside them.

Phase one is to address safety issues and to make the building structurally secure and sealed-up from the elements so that it will last another hundred years. Phase two includes laving groundwork for plumbing and electricity and looking at where to place internal walls and windows. Phase three is the finishing phase, and while they are not yet allowing themselves to envision the building in that stage, they do think the Corner Block will once again be a mixed space with retail shops and

residential apartments. "Honestly, at this point our vision for what the building will become is completely wide open. Chris sent me a link to a gorgeous hanging chandelier with a text that said, 'Wouldn't this be beautiful in a big shop.' And I said, 'Yes, but I can't think about that right now because I am watching a pigeon knock a brick out of the building as we speak," said Terri, with a self-deprecating laugh. "The light fixture is as far as we are going to dream about a finished space at this stage because each of the phases is expensive and it is going to take a lot of prayer, hope, and hard work to get us to stage three."

W nile they have a network of family and friends to help them manage the day-to-day aspects of the project, the local couple welcomes support from the community to assist them in saving the history-laden piece of Hillsboro.

"We really weren't prepared for just how supportive the community would be. People have been coming up to thank us and we don't feel like we deserve that yet," Terri stated. "Integrity and ethics are values that are very important to both Chris and myself and it means a lot that people have put their faith in us.'

She went on to explain that while many people have volunteered to come in and help the couple, the building is not safe enough for the general public yet. While The Corner Block Group, LLC is not a non-profit, they can accept gifts, monetary contributions and in-kind donations, such as use of equipment, tools, materials, professional services, building trade services and waste removal.

'We know that it takes a lot of trust to send someone money and we want to make sure that people know we will use any donations to further our goal of saving the building," said Terri. "We want to make sure that we are good stewards of any funds entrusted to us by adhering to income/ sales tax rules, as well as being transparent with those who do contribute that gifts to Corner Block Group, LLC, are not tax-deductible. Chris and I both know that handling other people's money requires a lot of trust and we will make sure that any gifts are used wisely and honestly."

"Chris and I aren't living in a fantasy world. We knew the scope of the obstacles we would face when taking on the Corner Block Building before we bought it, and we walked away from the signing with a deep sense of sobriety about the project that lay ahead of us. We know that there will be times when things don't go as planned and that we are going to get knocked down, probably multiple times, before the building is finished," said Terri. "However, we are the kind of people who like to take on a challenge and there is no reason for the Corner Block Building to fall down. Chris and I are both optimistic because the building is in local control now and if we get in over our heads we are going to make sure that it gets into the hands of someone who will continue to restore it. The Corner Block Building is a huge part of Hillsboro's history and we want to make sure it is a part of its future too."

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

Sec. Of State **Expiration For Driver's License**

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses, ID cards and learner's permits are being extended until Thursday, Dec. 1, 2022. The previous extension was set to end on Sunday, July 31.

As a result, expired driver's licenses, ID cards and learner's permits will remain valid until Dec. 1, so customers do not need to rush into Driver Services facilities. This extension does not apply to commercial driver's licenses (CDL) and CDL learner's permits.

White's office expanded online renewals for expired driver's licenses and ID cards and continues to mail letters to eligible customers. The letter provides driver's license and ID card holders with a unique PIN needed to renew online instead of visiting a facility and waiting in line. Customers may call 217-785-1424 to confirm their eligibility for online renewal or to obtain their PIN. They may also visit https:// apps.ilsos.gov/renewaldlid/ eligible.jsp to look up their eligibility status.

Customers who must visit a facility include first-time driver's license or ID card applicants, first-time REAL ID applicants and drivers ages 75 and older who are required by state law to visit a facility when renewing their license.

White continues to encourage people to conduct other business online at ilsos.gov. In addition to driver's license and ID card renewals for those who qualify, online services include obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, ordering a driver record and purchasing license plate stickers.

White noted his office is also extending the expiration dates of Restricted Driving Permits (RDPs) to December 1, 2022 for those that expired on or after Dec. 1, 2021 through December 1, 2022.

As a reminder, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security has extended the federal REAL ID deadline to May 3, 2023.



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

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Dragoo Ready To Lead Purple Panthers

After a ground-breaking figure out that I really liked know what they can expect season in 2021, a swell of anticipation is building among players and fans as the 2022 Litchfield Lady Panthers return to the volleyball court on Thursday, Aug. 25, at Nokomis. This year's varsity lineup returns three senior standouts who hope to lead the team to a regional championship title, an accolade that eluded them last year as they finished runner-up to the Pana Panthers in the Carlinville Class 2A Regional Tournament.

While the nucleus of last years starting varsity roster will contain familiar player names, there has been a change in leadership as both head coach Abby Carlson and junior varsity coach Mitchell Hughes resigned their positions from last year while freshman coach Kari (Walch) Dragoo assumed the role of head coach. Dragoo anticipates adding two additional coaches pending board ap-

A 2013 Litchfield High School grad, Dragoo distinguished herself as a multitalented athlete having lettered in volleyball, softball and basketball. In addition to her new position as a head coach, she has coached the LMS seventh grade volleyball team for the past six years and will continue in that role. Under the tutelage of Coach Carlson, Dragoo served as an assistant coach for one year.

"I learned so many things from Coach Carlson and I am so thankful that I had the opportunity to benefit from her knowledge of the game," Dragoo said. "But it is a new season and as head coach of the volleyball program I am prepared to give it everything I have with positive energy within a positive atmosphere."

Dragoo's love of the game began immediately after she started playing at a young age. "It did not take me long to to hit the volleyball. I am a bigger girl so I found that going up for a block and putting it back down was exciting for me as well."

Although she shares her team's dream of winning a regional championship, she is focus on putting together a winning season. Last year's Lady Panthers finished the year with 13 wins and 13 losses and placed fifth in the South Central Conference with a 4-4 mark.

"I think it is realistic for this team to have a winning season and also achieve their personal goal as regional champions but I am leery of saying that and jinxing it," the young coach said. "I truly believe if they stay consistent and don't allow anything to stand in their way, they can have it all."

Dragoo pointed out that often times one of the biggest distractions with girls is discord among team members, which directly affects their chemistry. She believes that $team\, harmony\, is\, a\, must\, if\, you$ are going to work together as a successful unit.

"I tell my players they may not be friends away from the court but as a player, they can be a very good teammate on the court and the definition of a good teammate is someone who will sacrifice their body on the court for their teammate and the team."

 $When \, speaking \, of \, good \, will \,$ and harmony as it relates to team chemistry, Dragoo credits former LHS volleyball coach Gena Elliott as having the biggest influence on her coaching career.

"Gena was the type of coach who meant business but she also knew how to joke around. She knew who respected her and she returned that same admiration to her players. I learned so much from her," Dragoo said. "She was consistent. I want my players to

from their coach. I will consistently show up for them and it is my hope they will do the same for me."

Dragoo also praised her former coach for being influential in building team involvement and team bonding.

Dragoo holds very high expectations for this team and she has made the girls aware of that.

"We are coming off a hot season and I know that every team in the surrounding area was pretty shocked last year to see Litchfield High School competing at a much higher level than had been in previous years. While I am excited by the upcoming season, I am a little bit overwhelmed in the sense that I don't want to let them down. I want them to know that I am here for them and I also want parents to know that I will be here for their daughter," she added.

Her expectations are soundly based on the belief that when any player takes the court, they need to be both mentally and physically prepared.

"I want the girls to know we are not in an extracurricular activity; we are here and we are committed," she said. "If you show up and you don't want to give me your time then more than likely I will not be inclined to give you my time."

The first-year coach said she is very thankful for her seniors, each of whom she describes as very strong players.

"We also have strength in our juniors," she said. "I am very conscience of the fact that we will lose those seniors at the end of the season so we are constantly coaching to prepare our younger players for the next level. However, our focus is this year. I come to this position ready to coach and the girls know that."

Dragoo cited herself as the team's biggest cheerleader. "I want the girls to know what I expect from them and in turn I want them to know what they can consistently expect from me. I pride myself in being a big communicator and we talk about communication both on and off the court," she added.

Dragoo said she has averaged between 18-20 players who have attended summer weight training, conditioning and open gym time.

"A player is not going to become their best by practicing two hours a day every day," Dragoo said. "If you want to see the difference then you have to be the difference. The girls who voluntarily showed up this summer demonstrated a genuine commitment to improving and they were willing to make that sacrifice in order attain their goal.

"They have really demonstrated great determination and as a first-time head coach and coach it is gratifying to see," she added.

In addition, she had several girls who attended summer camps and a handful of players who played club volleyball, each of which add to the development of player skills and game knowledge.

"In club ball a player may have five or six coaches who work on a specific skill and I'll take all the help I can get because I know there is always room for improvement," she said.

When asked about her coaching philosophy, she said it begins with mental toughness.

"I instill in my players that they cannot be totally successful without mental toughness so we start with building resilience. As their coach, it is my duty to remind them of the little things that matter and can make a difference, such as going up and faking a ball hit. Volleyball is not just bump, set and spike. It can be an offset screen, spiking, hyping up your team or help-

chemistry," she said.

Dragoo also believes the team will have to mix it up.

"In the past we have gone to one particular player and I just think we need to move away from that mentality," she said. "That is why we brought in a former LHS volleyball player, Cara Pence, who is working with our players on hitter/setter connections. We know Carlee Harmon is going to hit one way while Gina Painter is going to hit differently."

That same scenario carries over for Blair Johnson who is taller than Annika Rhodes," she went on to say. "One is going to want shoots and the other prefers lobs. It is all a matter of the setter and the setter runs the show. Emma Walch is a pretty good hitter also, but I want her setting. Of course that doesn't

ing to ensure there is team mean we won't mix it up a bit."

Dragoo said the varsity will run a 5-1 offense (five hitters and one setter) while the junior varsity will operate in a 6-2 offense (six hitters and two different setters) for more reps.

And so it begins on August 25, the inaugural season for a young head coach who promises positive energy, consistency from her position, communication, belief, encouragement and anticipation of success for a goal-oriented team that has the potential to set the standard for future LHS volleyball teams.

ed warriors and veterans you are a surviving spouse or unmarried child of the deceased veteran and your countable income falls below a yearly income under a \$14,000 limit (they can only count out-of-pocket expenses such as healthcare and medications), you are eligible.

There is an automatic pension if the spouse passes and was a veteran through the Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC). His office has all the records. The National Record Center personnel from St. Louis has records you can obtain for yourself.

His department will assist any veteran in obtaining their discharge papers (DD214), service records, medical records, medals, ribbons and awards. He said that the State of Illinois offers a onetime bonus for veterans who served honorably during a time of war.

Certain medals are needed to qualify. Veterans or their survivors may apply at their nearest service office on the website. There is a form to fill out and a one-time check for \$100.

He spoke with regard to VA healthcare and stated they would check your income; single, married, disabled for services available to veterans such as primary care, specialty care, and mental health care. Your medication would be mailed to you the same time every month.

Regarding education, English related that his office doesn't handle the GI Bill. You would need to go to the website or hotline. However, you can apply for college or graduate degree programs, career-training certificate courses, apprenticeships and

His office helps with employment for state and federal jobs. First, they would have to certify the DD214. For example, if you were

on-the-job training benefits.

getting out of the guard or reserves you could apply for employment. However, they do handle education for child or spouse of a deceased veteran. There are many scholarships available to apply for.

For burial benefits (including cremation) you need to communicate with the funeral service and the cemetery official. Certain benefits are available to assist with the burial expenses of deceased veterans. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs will furnish a headstone or marker, upon request, without charge for the unmarked grave of a veteran.

They also provide bereavement counseling to all family members of service members. For reimbursement you would need a statement to apply and fill out for benefits whoever's name is on payment for burial.

English stated that the VA home loan guaranties are designed to help veterans, reservists and unmarried surviving spouses obtain homes and refinance loans and the spouse can apply for such benefits. Illinois is one out of only seven states that has property tax exemptions. You must fill out the tax exemption form yearly in case your percentage changes.

He went on to say that for the disabled veteran there is a standard Homestead Exemption that provides a reduction in a property's EAV to a qualifying property owner. A \$2.500 homestead exemption is available to a veteran

with a service-connected disability of at least 30 percent, but less than 50 percent; a \$5,000 homestead exemption is available to a veteran with a service-connected disability of at least 50 percent but less than 70 percent.

The Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs office provides one card for hunting, fishing and camping. Eligible veterans, all former Prisoners of War, and immediate family when accompanied by the veteran, are exempt from camping admission fees at parks under the control of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

English told the group that fishing and hunting licenses are issued for disabled veterans who are receiving 10 percent or greater serviceconnected compensation, or total disability pension benefits. The veteran may obtain this license from the IDVA by providing disability documentation.

To conclude his presenta-

tion, English handed out his business card, a Vet Center card, a brochure from the Vet Center and a brand new booklet from the State of Illinois (only printed for Illinois State Fair) outlining all Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs benefits.


