Flannery Termination Tabled Until Next Litchfield Meeting

After meeting in closed session for an hour and 22 minutes on Thursday, April 4, the members of the Litchfield City Council determined that more time was needed to act on the four motions that were listed after executive session.

The motions included approval of executive session minutes from the

March 15 and March 21 meetings, a motion to act on alderpersons' request to rescind a severance offer, a motion to act on alderpersons' request to direct the city administrator to recommend termination of an employee with cause and a motion to act on the city administrator's recommendation to terminate an employee without cause and authorize payment of severance

pursuant to 5 ILCS 415/1, *et seq.* The employee mentioned above is Economic Development Director Tonya Flannery, who said during the March 15 special meeting that the council was considering the termination of her employment contract. She added that she had not been interviewed or apprised of the investigation and that the city was creating false accusations that

she bashed the council and lied in regard to the soccer complex project that was voted down as a pretext to terminate her employment.

Since then, several individuals have spoken in support of Flannery, with more speaking during Thursday's meeting.

A letter from Jim Timpe, president and CEO of HSHS St. Francis Hospital, was read to start the

public comment portion, saying that Flannery was always receptive of any information the hospital shared while providing ideas to improve the community. He added that the hospital valued her expertise on all matters and respectfully requested her dedicated service to the community be respected.

Electronic Recycling Will Be Available In Litchfield

BLH Computers will host their annual electronics recycling drive from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, April 27, at the former recycling building in Litchfield, located on the corner of Illinois and Ryder streets.

Items that can be recycled for free include answering machines, battery backups and uninterruptable power supplies (UPS), camcorders, cameras, cellular/mobile phones, Christmas tree lights, computer peripherals (keyboards, mice, etc.), desktop computers, DVD/CD players, fax machines, ink cartridges, laptops, mailroom equipment, networking equipment and cables, papers, point of sale equipment, power and accessory cables, power tools (including batteries), printers (those with large office printers should contact their local store), projectors, radios, receivers, sat-

ellite and cable equipment, speakers, smart phones, surge suppressors and power strips, tablets, telephones (including PBX equipment), toner, VCRs, video game consoles and walkie talkies. Certain items require a fee to be recycled: CRT and LCD monitors (\$10), all televisions (\$20), projection TVs (\$40), and console TVs (\$40). Broken TVs in a bag are double their listed charge.

Businesses and large drop offs are welcome. However those with more than 20 items are asked to wait until after 11 a.m. No receipts will be given.

Information on the destruction of hard drives will be handed out during the drive.

A Simple Message, 'Waste Not' Inspires Global Ministry

In March, eleven 20-foot containers loaded to the gills left Love Packages in Butler.

The cargo: boxes of Christian literature in English.

From Butler the containers went to the rail yard in St Louis, then on to major ports in the U.S. with final destinations in the Philippines, Jamaica, India, Liberia, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia and Malawi.

March was a normal month for Love Packages, a faith ministry founded in 1975 by Steve Schmidt. It started in the basement of his home in Litchfield, moved to the former Redemption Center in Hillsboro, and relocated in 1995 to the former Butler elementary school and an adjacent warehouse building. Every week, tons of ma-

terials arrive there by mail and other delivery services, packed in boxes or in shrink-wrapped skids. The contents are sorted by hand and color coded into six categories: Bibles; reference materials; Sunday school literature; books and paperbacks; magazines and daily devotionals; CDs and DVDs.

The literature comes from churches, publishing companies, religious organizations and individuals nationwide. After sorting, Schmidt determines where the various materials will be sent, based on need and requests.

On average, Love Packages currently sends 20-60 tons of literature per week in 20-foot ocean going containers bound for port cities around the world. Those locations eventually distribute the literature to thousands

of churches and missionaries. The shipping cost for these ocean containers ranges from \$3,800 to \$7,900.

Love Packages is entirely supported by free will offerings from churches and individuals, plus in-kind donations. Schmidt employs three full-time workers, Aaron Dokken, Vern Everett and Jonathan White, and a part-time secretary, Viola West. They're joined by dozens of volunteers who show up regularly to help repack and load boxes. Dormitory beds and a kitchen in the former school building are available for overnight stays by volunteers from throughout Illinois and other states.

Waste Not

The genesis of Love Packages came from God to Schmidt nearly 50 years ago.

"In the summer of 1975,

God showed me the abundance of Christian literature that I had at my disposal and the tremendous lack of literature that so many others in the world had," Schmidt said. "Not realizing that everyone was as wasteful as me, I began sending my excess literature overseas. That first year, my wife and I shipped 60 boxes of literature to missionaries in four countries."

The message, "You are wasting that," reached others, and materials started arriving at Schmidt's doorstep from all over the United States.

Growth was exponential. The second year, the couple shipped 3-1/2 tons, the third year 7 tons, and so on. In the years 2017-2022, Love Packages shipped 1,900 tons annually.

Paula Endress, director of philanthropy at St. Francis Hospital, said she was distressed to read of the multiple attempts to discredit and diminish Flannery's reputation and that it is sheer ignorance that she is being considered for dismissal because "someone is intimidated by the fact that she has two master's degrees and countless other credentials as a city administrator and economic development director."

Endress added that the "backroom gossip" that Flannery did not provide enough information for the council to make an informed decision on the soccer complex was equally ignorant.

"While you seek to avenge some of your guilt for voting this project down by trying to oust Tonya, such a course of action will only continue the ignorance and dysfunction," Endress said in closing.

Carl Kasten, a retired lawyer from Carlinville and Flannery's uncle, said that Litchfield has experienced significant growth over the last two decades, and while Flannery's work is not the sole reason for that growth, her efforts were not insignificant toward that growth.

"My open urging in this matter is merely Tonya be treated honorably and compassionately and fairly in a manner commensurate with her own tireless efforts and her long time and devoted public service to this city," Kasten said.

Litchfield School Board President Julie Abel and Litchfield Superintendent Dr. Gregg Fuerstenau both spoke about the school district's relationship with city.

Abel said that relationship has been strong and positive, with Flannery having a lot to do with that from the economic development perspective.

"We've had a shared vision of being progressive and forward thinking, which has benefited our kids greatly. Economic development is vital to the health and growth of our district," said Abel, who also questioned the city's plans for economic development if Flannery is terminated. Abel also encouraged the city to live stream its meetings to keep the citizens informed and improve transparency.

Fuerstenau said that he doesn't think that people realize how great Litchfield is and part of the reason for that is that the city has a proactive economic development director. He also spoke about Flannery's support of the South Central Illinois Regional Training and Innovation Center, which has drawn interest from superintendents from all over the state.

Like Abel, he also ques-

tioned who was going to take over Flannery's duties if she was terminated.

"It's economic development that drives the communities," Fuerstenau said. "Who's going to do that work? If you don't do that work, it's not gonna happen. I'm speaking on behalf of every child in Litchfield."

Ed Wernsing, who had previously spoken to the council, encouraged the council to think about its constituency, which he said was in support of the soccer park project, and the children in the community.

The four agenda items were tabled until the next meeting, which will be on April 18.

Other Business

In addition to the support of Flannery, the city also heard from Amanda Majors, who grew up in Kansas, but moved to Litchfield recently. Majors said she began her career as a tattoo artist in 2019 and was hoping to open a business in Litchfield.

With the closest tattoo shop 45 minutes away, Majors said that she believed the business would be a boost for economic development and detailed that information in a business plan for the council.

She added that she spoke with the city administrator and knew that there was an ordinance against tattoo shops, but she was willing to apply for a special use permit.

Majors added her business would be by appointment only, not an open door street shop, and would have regulated hours. City Administrator Breann Vazquez said they would continue to work with Majors and if the council had any questions, they could contact either herself or Mayor Steve Dougherty.

After the public participation, the council approved the minutes from the March 15 and March 21 meetings and the motion to transfer funds and pay bills, while also opening a bid for the property at 1524 North Madison, where the now demolished sleeping rooms were located.

Mayor Dougherty said the bid was for \$8,000 from Lindell and Vernetta Hardt, who own the adjacent property and run Almost Home Child Care. The letter from the Hardt's said that they would like to turn the property into a place for a small garden for the children that attend the child care center, plus room for other activities and parking.

Mayor Dougherty said that the bid will be voted on at the next meeting and that he felt like this is what the city hoped would happen with the property.

In new business, the council approved an ordinance adopting the annual budget for the fiscal year running from May 1, 2024 to April 30, 2025, approved an ordinance renewing Jereme Zook

of KEB as the city's budget officer and approved a motion amending the budget for 2023-2024 fiscal year. A public hearing for the budget was held before the regular council meeting with no comments from the public.

The council also approved the renewal of health insurance for city employees through Dimond Brothers Insurance. Shannon Hall of Dimond Brothers spoke about the renewal, saying that there was a significant increase from Blue Cross, Blue Shield due to the company paying out more in claims than it received in premiums from the city.

Hall said that claims from four employees cost Blue Cross, Blue Shield more than the total amount that the city was putting in.

She added that she had some employees question whether the health insurance should go out for bid, but other providers came in higher or declined to bid. Hall also said that she has seen providers match a bid, then increase premiums by 40 to 60 percent the following year.

Alderman Jake Fleming asked about the Wellness Committee the city is establishing and its benefits. Hall said that it's hard to quantify cost savings for the project, but if a group of employees spearheads the community and works to make changes, it could have positive effects for the environment and the culture for city employees.

Hall said that another program, Healthiest You, did have more quantifiable savings. The program allows employees and their families telehealth opportunities, which could reduce the amount of claims for the city.

The motion to renew was approved 6-0, with Alderman Sara Zumwalt abstaining.

In other business, motions were approved to authorize re-cabling of city facilities for a phone system upgrade with Third Wave/Sangamon Connect, for a sub-recipient agreement for a DCEO Energy Transition Community grant and for a grant agreement between the state, the Department of Natural Resources and the city for the Bicentennial Campground expansion project.

Alderman Ray Kellenberger asked about the grant, which Vazquez said is a 50/50 matching grant, with the city providing \$300,000 and the state providing the other \$300,000. With the additional revenue from the expansion, the project is expected to pay for itself in less than ten years.

The council also awarded a bid to Metro Ag to remove sludge from the Lake Lou Yaeger wastewater lagoon and approved a contract with First Due Consulting Services for work on a 2023 SAFER Grant for the fire department that would allow them to fund the salaries of two more firefighters.

Fire Chief Adam Pennock said that the additions would help eliminate overtime and would allow the department to do more transfers.

In building and zoning business, the council approved two motions regarding a special use permit for a short-term rental at 1116 North State Street, plus an ordinance installing stop signs at the intersection of Edwards Street and Chestnut Street during police business.

The council went into closed session at 7:15 p.m. and returned to open session at 8:37 p.m. to table the four items listed on the agenda. They will meet again two weeks from Thursday's meeting, April 18, at 6:30 p.m. at Corwin Hall.

Four fundraising teams kicked off their efforts six weeks ago, hosting a variety of fundraising events throughout Montgomery County. This year, teams included Team Rock, Paper, Sisters (Amber Kalaher and Paula Bartz of Hillsboro), Team Um-Believable (Denny and Tina Umberger of Nokomis), Team Hitch-Up (Bryant "Butch" and Samantha Hitchings of Hillsboro) and Team Gudgel Ranch Saloon (Cody and Jennifer Gudgel of Litchfield).

And the team that raised the most money for the MCCA was crowned the winner.

Although this year's event had a special twist. Instead of the Dancing with the Stars and celebrity lip sync challenge from year's past, this year's event featured a game show style format, where the teams had a chance to earn additional funds toward their total.

"Our goal this year is 2,220 tons of usable Christian literature to missionaries and Christian workers. This will reach 60 million first-time readers," Schmidt said.

A world map in Schmidt's office is marked with pins showing that to date, Love Packages have been sent to 154 nations with an estimated 1,000 million recipients.

What I Learned

On March 28, I worked at Love Packages alongside my friend, Linda Zimmer, who volunteers there on Thursday mornings. For more than three hours, we moved, filled, taped and loaded heavy boxes containing new paperback Bibles.

The warehouse was a buzz of activity as incoming materials were sorted and moved for repacking, and pallets of outgoing boxes were moved by forklift.

It's a joyful work environment. Against a background of Christian music, the paid staff and volunteers obviously enjoy working together and being part of this unique ministry. The Love Packages operation – from receiving to warehousing to shipping – is complicated, but the mission is not.

"Our vision is simple," Schmidt said. "We want to see all of our excess, the materials that are being wasted, placed on the mission fields of the world. Won't you help?"

Redskin Trio Tosses One-Hitter In Win Over Bunker Hill

Three Nokomis pitchers combined for a one-hitter against Bunker Hill on Friday, April 5, as the Lady Redskins improved to 5-5 on the season with a 7-1 win over the Minutemaids.

Reaghan Jonas pitched the first three innings, striking out two and allowing a one-out first inning walk. Only two batters reached base against Jonas, with an error in the third resulting in the other baserunner.

Cloey Dirks pitched the next three innings for Nokomis, giving up a two-out walk in the bottom of the fourth, with an error in the fifth Bunker Hill's only other base runner.

Before Dirks could take the mound, Nokomis added four insurance runs to the board. The first three batters reached base as Ella Huelson doubled, Grace DeWerff singled and Presley Mehochko reached on an infield hit. Reaghan Jonas popped up for an out via the infield fly rule, but an error by the Bunker Hill second baseman allowed both Huelson and DeWerff to score.

Dirks helped her own cause with a single and a steal of second, which put her in scoring position with Jayde Gonet at the plate. Gonet latched on to the third pitch she saw from Bunker Hill starter Grace Burris and drove in both Dirks and Mehochko with a single to center field. Bunker Hill got the final two outs of the inning after Gonet's hit, but Nokomis now led 6-0.

After a scoreless fifth, Nokomis added another run on a two-out homer by Gonet, then got a 1-2-3 inning from Dirks, who struck out three batters in her three innings on the mound.



A pitching duel seemed looming when Piasa Southwestern came to Hillsboro on a windy Friday afternoon, April 5, to open the South Central Conference season; the Birds came to town with a 7-2 record and sent right-handed Adam Hale to the mound, while the Toppers (3-10) countered with leftie Nathan Matoush.

Though Matoush gave up three runs in the four innings he worked, the three were unearned after a third-inning error opened the gate; those runs were all Hale would need as his offerings seemed more of a mystery to the Topper batters as the game moved on. Matoush struck out eight of the 20 batters he faced, but his only 1-2-3 inning was the first when he overpowered the first three batters sent to the plate.

Though he only walked one and hit no one (a problem that has plagued Topper hurlers this season), Matoush's pitch count had reached 87, after four innings, so senior Ketch Mills took his place on the mound.

Hale, meanwhile, used only 98 pitches in his complete game effort. He walked two, gave up four hits (singles to Mills, Elliot Lentz, Drake McSperritt, and Jackson Tuetken) and had no errors committed behind him (the Toppers were charged with four).

The Toppers best chance to score came in the bottom of the second when Lentz and McSperritt singled leading off. The next batter fouled out to the catcher trying to sacrifice, though, and the next fanned for the second out before Clayton Rufus walked to load the bases. Hale fanned the next Topper, though, leaving three men on base and the score 0-0. Only two other Toppers would be stranded (Eli Zaidi, who walked in the fourth with two out in front of Tuetken's hit) as Hale settled in to retire the last ten Toppers he faced, four by strikeout, including the last two. Four of the seven innings he threw were 1-2-3 affairs; statistically, at least, Hale was the most effective pitcher the Toppers have faced.

Offensively, Piasa was most effective when the ninth slot hitter, Logan Crane, batted in front of leadoff man Rocky Darr. Crane had the first hit off Matoush when he singled with one out in the bottom of the third and Darr followed with the second hit. After a strikeout for the second out, Colen Lemarr drew a walk. Ryan Lewis then reached on an error, making all three runs that scored in the inning unearned; that miscue gave Hunter Newell a chance to hit, and he responded with a two RBI single.

Crane scored the first (and winning) run of the game; Darr scored the second. The other four runs came off Mills, who's still in the process of conditioning his arm. Lemarr walked and scored in the fourth; Crane reached on an error with one out in the fifth and scored on a Darr single; Darr scored on a scratch hit by Marcus Payne in the sixth; and Lewis scored run seven after singling to lead off the top of the seventh as Hale singled.

The coming week will be a busy one. Tomorrow, April 9, the Toppers will have a conference game at North Mac (in Virden); Wednesday the challenge will be in Breese against Mater Dei; Friday Carlinville will be here; and next Saturday, April 13, the County Tournament will bring fans and teams from Lincolnwood, Litchfield, and Nokomis to Hillsboro.

So. IL Series Kicks Off In Belleville

Weather in February can be questionable at best in Illinois, but that wasn't the case for the first round of the So. IL Off-Road Racing Series in Belleville on Sunday, Feb. 25. With a quick track at the Belleville Enduro Team grounds and temperatures in the low 70s, nearly 160 racers from across south-central Illinois and the midwest competed in the opening event of the seven-round racing series.

About a third of those racers were from Montgomery and Macoupin County or connected to White City's Cahokia Creek Dirt Riders, who will host round three and six of the series. That includes four of the top five riders in the the overall standings. Gillespie's Collin Johnson took the top spot in a time of 2:10:24 for eight laps, 24 seconds ahead of Columbia's Chad Phelps. Litchfield's Drake Lineback (2:11:47), Morrisonville's Jhadyn Walker (2:15:28) and Carlinville's Rylan Frankford (2:15:46) rounded out the top five, both overall and in the AA class.

Donnellson's Cooper Duff placed ninth overall and was first in the Open B Class, while Taylorville's Blake Copeland was 10th and first in the 30+ A class. Duff ran six laps in 2:02:51, with Copland coming in a half minute later at the 2:03:23 mark. Carlinville's Riley Brueggeman also competed in 30+ A, finishing third in the class and 21st overall, while Litchfield's Ryan Komor was 17th overall and third in the Open A class.

In the other A classes, Derek Birkenkamp of Litchfield was second in the 40+ A class and 26th overall, while Blake Young of Pawnee and Derek Toberman of Waterloo, formerly of Hillsboro, were third and sixth in the class and 32nd and 86th overall. Martavious Jones and Keenan Powell continued their strong seasons and picked up wins in the long jump and triple jump. Jones posted a best jump of 5.93 meters, beating Maroa-Forsyth's

Aiden Williams and Colfax Ridgeview's Kaleb Elliott, who both jumped 5.76 meters to finish second and third. As has been the case all season, Powell dominated in the triple jump, going 13.08 meters to beat Dominic Martin of Colfax Ridgeview, who jumped 12.48 meters and finished second. Litchfield's Zach Leitschuh also competed in the long jump, finishing 13th with a mark of 5.26 meters.

The Panthers also placed in the high jump with Alec Roach taking fourth, and nearly added another as Kenny Taylor finished ninth. Both set new personal bests, with Roach clearing 1.67 meters and Taylor going over at 1.57 meters.

Some of those same athletes played a part in Litchfield's success in the relays, where they finished fourth in both the 4x200 and 4x400 and sixth in the 4x100. Powell, Jones and Roach all ran the 4x200, with senior Easton Grammer finishing out the team, which ran a 1:35.55. Powell and Roach also ran the 4x400, joining Tucker Maguire and Camden Quarton to run a 3:40.99. In the 4x100, it was Jones, Powell and Grammer, with senior Zach Leitschuh running a leg as well for a 45.13 second time.

Individually, Quarton and Mitchell Floyd both medalled in the 800 meters. Quarton took third with a time of 2:05.93, while Floyd ran a personal best of 2:13.92 to finish eighth. Draven Jones ran a personal best in the 800 as well, finishing 21st in 2:40.25. Jonathan Bowles also

scored points for Litchfield in the 110 meter hurdles, running a personal best 18.81 to finish seventh. Bowles and teammate Kale Dexheimer both ran PRs in the 300 meter hurdles, with Dexheimer finishing 11th with a 47.08 and Bowles finished 13th with a 48.06. Kenny Taylor (12th) and Chris McGee (13th) ran personal records in the 3200 meters with times of 12:06.79 and 12:23.16, while James Vaughn ran a 7:14.12 for his personal best in the 1600. Litchfield also had three personal records in the 400 with Victor McGill (9th at 57.61), Garrett Hale (16th at 1:02.30) and Garrison Cleaver (17th at 1:04.81). McGill also set a personal best in the 200 meters (19th at 25.64), as did Braxton Kieffer (26th at 26.52) and Devon Chew (27th at 26.84). The final two PRs came in the 100 with John Scurlock (48th at 14.12) and Hudson Walker (52nd at 14.52) setting their season bests.

Weather permitting, Litchfield will be in Vandalia on Tuesday, April 9, with Greenville and Shelbyville also in attendance. On Saturday, April 13, the team will be in Pana for the other South Central Conference Panthers' invite.

Nokomis Girls Compete At Carlinville, EAWR

The Nokomis girls track team collected points in six different events at the Carlinville Girls Invitational on Friday, April 5, as the Lady Redskins placed ninth in the 14 team event.

Senior Irene Vanden Bergh snagged points in four different events, including the triple jump, the event she finished eighth in last year at the IHSA Class 1A State Finals. Vanden Bergh went 9.23 meters to finish third in the event, one of just three athletes to jump over nine meters on Friday. North Mac's Emma Crawford (9.55 meters) and Cadyn Bounds (9.46 meters) were the only competitors ahead of Vanden Bergh.

On the track, Vanden Bergh was fifth in the 200 meters with a time of 29.98 and fourth in the 100 meters with a time of 13.73. She also placed third in the 400 meters running a time of 1:07.81, as she collected 21 points for her team on the day.

Fallon Knodle also medalled in the 400, taking eighth with a personal-best time of 1:17.72, but the rest of Nokomis' points came in the throws and jumps.

Sophomore Remi Tester matched

Vanden Bergh for the team's best finish on the day as she took third in the discus with a personal-best throw of 27.65 meters. That smashed Tester's previous best of 24.29 meters, set at last year's sectional in Carlinville.

Nokomis' other podium finish came in the high jump, with Marcie Carroll clearing 1.32 meters to finish seventh at the event. Knodle also competed in the high jump, finishing 11th, but setting a new personal best with a clearance of 1.22 meters. Abigail O'Malley also set a new personal record in Carlinville and narrowly missed the podium in the 1600, finishing ninth with a time of 7:50.16.

East Alton-Wood River Invite

The Lady Redskins followed that performance up with a tenth place finish at the East Alton-Wood River Invitational. The Nokomis girls scored 20 points at the 18-team meet, three points ahead of New Athens in 11th and four behind Christ Our Rock Lutheran in ninth...

A familiar face made her 2024 debut at the meet and came up big for Nokomis. With the Nokomis softball team's cancellation, Camryn Engelman was available to compete in the triple jump and the multi-sport standout jumped 9.29 meters to finish first in the event. Her mark was just under half a meter short of her personal best of 9.76 meters.

Marcie Carroll and Fallon Knodle claimed points in the high jump as they finished seventh and eighth respectively, both clearing 1.22 meters. Carroll was also part of the Redskins' 4x100 and 4x200 meter relay teams, which finished seventh and eighth. In the 4x100, Carroll, Kennley Kirk, Libby Watson and Irene Vanden Bergh ran a 57.90 to finish seventh, while Carroll, Kirk, Chloe Smoot and Abigail O'Malley finished eighth in the 4x200 with a time of 2:10.86.

O'Malley also picked up a point individually as she ran a 16:40.95 in the 3200, a personal-best time that was good enough for eighth overall. She also set a personal best in the 1600 meters, running a 7:48.48 to finish 18th.

Freshman Leigha Smith, another softball player available for double duty on Saturday, ran a 1:30.65 to set a personal record in the 400 as she finished 12th. Chloe Smoot also set a personal best on the track, running a 35.58 in the 200 to finish 20th. Remi Tester and Rilee Waterman set personal records in the shot put, throwing 8.06 and 7.57 meters to finish 12th and 14th, respectively.

Nokomis' best finish in the relays came in the last race of the day as the team of Kennley Kirk, Libby Watson, Fallon Knodle and Irene Vanden Bergh ran a 4:59.92 to finish sixth in the 4x400. That was enough to give the Redskins three more points and boost them ahead of New Athens for sole possession of tenth place.

Next up for Nokomis is the MSM Conference Meet on Tuesday, April 9, in Pawnee, followed by the Bulldogs Vs. Cancer Invitational in Staunton on Friday, April 12.

Redskins Beat Raiders, Fall To South Central Foes

The Nokomis baseball team won't have to see a South Central Conference team again until this Saturday, April 13, when they play Hillsboro in the Montgomery County Tournament, but even that may be too soon for the Redskins.

In their final three games of the first week of April, Nokomis went 1-2 to even their record to 6-6 on the season. The win? A 12-0 victory over Central A&M in Vandalia. The losses? A 16-2 defeat at Greenville and a 6-3 loss to Vandalia, both of whom play in the South Central Conference.

The win over Central A&M was an odd one, literally, as the Redskins scored all of their runs in odd numbered innings in the first game of a doubleheader with the Raiders and Vandalia on Saturday, April 13.

Nokomis plated two runs in the first, six runs in the second and four runs in the fifth to short-game the Raiders in five innings. While the offense produced 12 runs on 10 hits, the pitching was even better.

Conner Wilson got the start and allowed just one hit, a one-out single in the bottom of the fourth, while striking out four and walking one. Bryce Gillock came in to get the last out of the fourth inning for Wilson and threw a scoreless fifth, striking out one batter in the process.

At the plate, Kannon Jonas went 3-for-3 with a double, two runs scored and three RBIs, while Brenton

Lyons was 2-for-3 with three runs scored and one RBI. The game was Lyons' first back since he and Jonas collided during the Taylorville game, but the senior made up for lost time with a solid performance against the Raiders.

While Jonas and Lyons were the only two players with multiple hits, Drake Taylor also had a big day at the plate as he went 1-for-3 with a walk, two runs scored and four runs driven in.

The victory temporarily gave Nokomis a record over .500, but Vandalia spoiled that in the second game of the doubleheader, when they held on for the three-run win.

Nokomis took the first lead of the game with a run in the second, when Kannon Jonas walked with the bases loaded and one out. Vandalia starter Kale Konrad worked his way out of the jam, though, getting the next two batters to fly out to end the inning.

Nokomis starter Drake Taylor cruised through the first two innings, but ran into trouble in the third. Vandalia scored four runs on three hits and three walks before Nokomis could stop the bleeding.

It looked as if the Redskins might get those runs back in the top of the fourth as Garrett Engelman and Ian Keller started the inning with a pair of singles, but Konrad stopped the rally in its tracks and Vandalia kept its 4-1 lead.

Izaak Doyen came on to pitch in the fourth for Nokomis and had a 1-2-3 fourth inning for the Redskins. A

single, a double and a two-out error gave the Vandals another run in the fifth, with another two-out error in the sixth leading to Vandalia's sixth run of the game when coupled with a pair of singles.

With a 6-1 lead, Twentynt Stombaugh came on to finish out the game for Vandalia. Nokomis needed runners and after a fly ball for out number one, they got their wish as Nolan Herbstreith walked and Drake Taylor doubled. Izaak Doyen then doubled to drive in both Herbstreith and Taylor as Nokomis suddenly had new life.

But as soon as hope appeared, Stombaugh was there to snuff it out. He got the next batter on a fielder's choice, then coaxed a ground-er to second that ended the game with the Vandals still ahead 6-3.

Both Drake Taylor and Ian Keller had two hits for the Redskins, while Izaak Doyen and Garrett Engelman also reached base twice each with a hit and a walk.

Greenville

The doubleheader split came two days after a tough loss to Greenville on Thursday, April 4. The Comets had snapped a four-game losing streak two days before and were looking to keep up their winning ways as they scored four runs in each of the first four innings for the 16-2 win.

Of the 16 runs, only three were earned as Nokomis committed nine errors on the day. The Redskins were also held to just four hits, with Drake striking out eight and

walking four in the win.

Three of those four walks came in the first inning and resulted in Nokomis' first run. With the bases loaded and one out, Drake Taylor grounded to short, allowing Saint Newman to come home and make it 1-0.

Nokomis wouldn't score again until the top of the fourth, when Greenville had already increased their lead to 12-1. Taylor played a part in that run as well as he singled, moved to second on an error on a ball hit by Levi German and scored after a wild pitch and an error by the Greenville third baseman.

The additional run may have been a case of "don't shoot him, you'll only make him angry," as the Comets scored four more in the bottom of the fourth, then faced just three batters in the top of the fifth after a single, a double play and a strikeout to end the game.

Saint Newman had two of Nokomis' four hits and also walked once. Izaak Doyen and Drake Taylor had the other two hits for the Redskins.

Nokomis' next opponent has had the opposite result against SCC competition. Shelbyville is 6-5 on the season, but is riding a two-game win streak with victories over Hillsboro and Greenville. After the home game against the Rams, Nokomis will play Windsor-Stew-Stras on the Hatchets' home field.

It's 2013. The beginning of my track career. I'm running the 4 x 200 relay at the Gillespie Invitational on a blustery and chilly birthday morning. It was cold and rainy, with strong winds. At the wise age of 12, I'm not the biggest fan of the sport, which requires a hard effort that I'm not very interested in giving. I can't stop thinking about my new bike, sitting at home in the garage. Home is much more appealing to me as I sit in the bleachers waiting for my race. Anywhere might be more appealing.

It's 2014. I'm on a church retreat with the youth group at Durley Camp. I see the clock inch towards 12:20, the minute I was born. I think to myself, "This is it, you're officially a teenager. You'll never be 12 again."

Thank goodness.

It's 2020. I've just turned 19 years old, and my family is celebrating with Casey's Pizza on the deck. I celebrated the big day with a five-mile run, something that I wouldn't have even considered doing just a few months earlier. But coronavirus has shut down the world, and now the only excuse to get out of the house is to go for a run. So that is what I started doing, just ten months after I committed to run cross country and track at Greenville University. A turning point in my life, just ten months later than scheduled. I never looked back.

It's 2022. I'm living in a cabin on the edge of the woods with three of my best friends, all teammates on the distance team. After cross-country practice, we celebrate the big day by eating Joe's Pizza and playing the new Lego Star Wars on the big TV in our living room.

Maybe I am still 12.

It's 2023. I'm watching the premiere of "Air," a movie directed by Ben Affleck and starring Matt Damon, telling the story of how Nike signed Michael Jordan to a shoe deal and continuing the narrative of Shoe Dog, Phil Knight's memoir, my favorite book. Knight ran track at the

University of Oregon, an experience that deeply shaped his life. I notice an odd and unintentional tie has been made between my birthday and Michael Jordan. The swooshes on my track spikes almost seems to glow.

It's 2024. The end of my track career. I'm running the 800-meter run at the Illinois College Invite. It's my 23rd birthday. The beginning of my Jordan Year.

I haven't run a 4x200 since junior high, being guided to the distance side by accident as a freshman in high school. My brother was a distance runner, and Coach Haston assumed I was too. He was right. I just didn't know it yet. Maybe I did, but didn't want it to be true.

It's still windy, but the weather is much better. There's nowhere else I would rather be, I realize. There will be more birthdays, but not many more meets. My track career is nearly perfectly bookended by my twelfth and 23rd birthdays. How odd it is, that a sport I once dreaded is such an important piece of my life now! At age 23, track and running are my favorite things in the world. At age 12, they were nearly the opposite.

There's a thrill with it now that I wasn't aware of in sixth grade. The cathartic moment after a good race when all is well in the world. And after the bad races too, because it's finally over. Though I enjoy the former much more than the latter.

It's 2024. My legs are finally feeling loose as I wrap up my final strides before the gun. I'm nervous to race, somehow afraid that the same two-lap race I have run 31 times in the past few years has changed, that maybe it's 805 meters instead of 800 or there will be hurdles this time.

It hasn't.

The 800 is still two laps. Michael Jordan still has his hoop earring in. I'm still Isaiah. I still love April 6.

I just love the days spent at the track now, too. I didn't when I was 12.

I wonder if I will at 34. I like to think so.
