Browns River concerns acknowledged

DEC talks of removing spoil 12 years after the dredge

The Browns River estuary has been no stranger to dredge spoil deposits, and the Town of Islip has acknowledged that addressing the issues here is “a top priority.”

“We are working closely with the New York State [Department of Environmental Conservation] to identify appropriate dredge material disposal sites,” a Town of Islip spokesperson said.

The DEC works with municipalities and contractors to determine where dredge spoil can be disposed of to be protective of human health and the environment. Several samples must be taken to determine the appropriate disposal of this material.

Chemical and physical components are tested to determine if the material can be reused as aggregate or for other secondary uses. Otherwise, material must be taken to an appropriate on-island or off-island disposal site, dependent on any contaminant levels, according to a spokesperson from the regional DEC.

“[The] DEC is working with the Town of Islip regarding sampling and future locations of the material,” the spokesperson continued.

The spoil has caused concerns at marinas, as several boat slips have been compromised because of the spoil deposits. This draws an economic concern atop the environmental one.

In addition to the spoil concern, several in the community are calling for a dredge in the estuary, the meeting point with the Great South Bay. The last dredge done here was 12 years ago. There is increasing concern that ferries traversing the estuary are nearing scraping the bottom.

Jamie Atkinson of Sayville Community Ambulance Company pointed out that Fire Island is reliant on mainland fire-fighting and ambulance services. Atkinson said the hamlet of Cherry Grove has actually utilized the SCAC the last eight years.

“From the safety aspect, [dredging] gets the ferry over more during

Could your child benefit from a trades career?

Local chamber and school district rally together to offer opportunity in trade professions for students

As the cost of a college education continues to skyrocket and many degree-holders find themselves debt-ridden without jobs to cover the debilitating loan payments, a resurgence of interest in blue-collar professions, which can be obtained without university degrees, has sparked out of necessity and interest.

BAYPORT-BLUE POINT

Current Bayport-Blue Point Chamber of Commerce president, Carol Seitz, helps run her family’s company, Therm-a-Trol, which has historically employed local BBP students since its inception in 1967. Chris Cavanaugh, owner of the hometown pub Cavanaugh’s in Blue Point, actually apprenticed for Seitz’s father before taking over his family’s restaurant.

In recent years, Seitz has noticed a scarcity of students applying for a trade position with her family’s company and was perplexed as HVAC technicians enjoy high salaries (some as high as six figures) and in-demand employment opportunities. Upon taking leadership this past year, Seitz outlined a three-point focus plan for the chamber; one was to shore up the trades program within the community, particularly the high school, where young adults were

beginning to carve out their future careers.

“In speaking with older people who went to BBP High School, there was a lot of value in having shop class because it helped students who were more tactile find their passion,” Seitz said of why she wanted to introduce a youth-oriented goal to the chamber. “We have to do better in offering our students more exposure to all the different types of careers they can have.”

Nationally, there also is recognition of this lack of workers with the proper skill set for trades professions. In a popular NPR article in 2018, it was stated that “high school graduates have been so effectively encouraged to get a bachelor’s that high-paid jobs requiring shorter and less expensive training are going unfilled. This affects those students and also poses a real threat to

the year,” Atkinson said, adding that a dredge would increase the accessibility for evacuations, if need be.

James Bertsch, a Sayville resident and an active member of Save the Great South Bay, commented on the vein of tourism and economy.

“Fire Island is a vital commercial corridor,” Bertsch said. “The Fire Island Pines is the biggest community on Fire Island. Five thousand seasonal residents live in the Pines and Cherry Grove. All pass through Browns River, spending money, creating jobs and giving our local economy a real boost. Just as tourism is Long Island’s largest industry, the largest industry in the Greater Sayville area is Fire Island.

“Browns River is now almost too shallow for the ferries,” he added. “We really need to dredge now. Are tourists willing to put up with only traveling at certain times of day? Or will they simply leave and take their money with them to the Hamptons? That is a very real and a very scary possibility. The Pines and Grove bring so much money into the greater Sayville area.” ■

Upcoming Island Hills informational meeting

The Greater Islip Association will host a meeting at Sayville Library on Saturday, Feb. 29, at noon, regarding the Island Hills Golf Course and the proposed zone change.

The developer, Rechler Equity Partners, filed the application with the Town of Islip Planning Board for a zone

change here almost three years ago, March 8, 2017. The proposed change of zone from Residential AAA to a Planned Development District would allow for the developer to construct 1,365 apartments across 27 structures.

A letter disseminated by the association indicates that the present zoning

would allow for 84 single-family homes on 0.9-acre lots.

“Together we can make the change that we want to see in preserving and maintaining the integrity of our community,” the letter reads.

Keeping Islip litter-free

KIC organizes highway cleanups on service roads and entrance and exit ramps

Addressing the litter on the major roadways in the Town of Islip is an integral aspect of the mission Keep Islip Clean's membership not only preaches but practices, too. The Long Island Expressway and Sunrise Highway — as well as their applicable service roads and entrance and exit ramps — were discussed at KIC's meeting last Thursday at Brookwood Hall.

KIC's director Nancy Cochran said that the group's treasurer and the commissioner for Central Islip, Susan Pellegrino, is experienced at navigating various levels of government to get things done in this regard.

"[Pellegrino's] superpower is figuring out who is responsible for what," Cochran said.

Pellegrino explained that, through her conversations with county officials, an entity's ownership of a roadway does not necessarily entail the responsibility of various aspects of upkeep like litter cleanup, as well as snow plowing and applying road markings.

"The challenging thing about the litter along roadways is [which] level of government's responsibility it is. It is very dicey, and that is part of the frustration," said Pellegrino, adding that there is at least

one particular section of the LIE in which its service roads are owned by New York but maintained by Suffolk County.

Although the service roads are the responsibility of the county, the state takes the reins on exit and entrance ramps, according to the county Department of Public Works. It is also notable that the underpasses below the LIE and Sunrise Highway on county-owned roads are maintained by the state.

Pellegrino recalls recently driving on the north service road between exits 58 and 57 on the LIE, a stretch that she often traverses. Here, she saw a group of individuals cleaning up litter on the side of the road. Although she initially thought they were county workers, it turns out they were a group of volunteers.

"We do not really care who is doing it, as long as someone is doing it," said Pellegrino, adding that she encourages persistence toward the responsible entity of any given spot. "It has been a huge improvement."

In addition to the discussion of the LIE and Sunrise Highway, it was pointed out that the Oakdale Merge marks the parallel Montauk Highway's change of ownership from state (to the west) and county (to the east). Cochran pointed out that this is notable when considering which entity is responsible for a cleanup.

"It is the Main Street of all these little towns," she said. ■

the economy."

President Trump has outlined initiatives for more emphasis and funding to trades programs and schools, most recently in his signing the renewal of a bipartisan federal workforce development program, spending \$1.2 billion to aid over 11 million students in receiving more specialized training.

"When we invest in our workers, we are investing in our people," said the President when he signed the bill into law in July 2018.

Locally, superintendent Tim Hearney of BBP Schools has worked with former Legis. Bill Lindsay (D-8th District) to make connections with unions and learn about their apprenticeship programs.

"During the last recession, we had to make a reduction in the number of students we sent to BOCES

programs, but we have been taking measures to provide students with more opportunity in the technology field," he said of the current low enrollment of BBP High School students in trades programs. "Recently, through a community-approved bond, we were able to build STEAM labs in the high school, which have opened the doors for students in terms of building and computer science."

Through the School to Business program, a joint venture of the BBP Chamber of Commerce and BBP High School, students have been given the opportunity to shadow professionals in both white- and blue-collar fields. The shadow days, which have been held for over 10 years, allow students to experience real-life exposure to gain an understanding of what profession they are interested in.

"In School to Business, we want to show kids it's viable to bring them into a technician's career," said Seitz of the program.

"We want to provide pathways and exposure to our students for college, trades in the automotive industry — everything," added Hearney, as he described a new

project where he has been working closely with unions, such as the IBEW, to develop fact sheet resources for students about each trade, including apprenticeship opportunities, average training time, average salary, and other integral factors to selecting a career path.

"It's important for parents and students to know that if college isn't your fit, there are plenty of other fields — well-paying fields — for tactile workmanship," continued Seitz of her overall goal as chamber president and the trade initiative. ■

Arboretum hosts Symposium on the future of horticulture

On Monday, March 2, the Bayard Cutting Arboretum will be hosting a symposium on the “Evolution of the American Landscape: Gardening in the 21st Century,” where leaders in the horticulture field from acclaimed backgrounds such as Cornell and Columbia University will be educating event attendees on the latest technology and sweeping trends in the industry.

Mainstays of the Arboretum, Dr. Doreen Monteleone, past president of the Bayard Cutting Arboretum Horticultural Society; Nelson Sterner, director; and Joy Arden, Geographic Information System (GIS) specialist, will be making presentations at the symposium, along with representations from the Wildlife Conservation Society, USDA Forest Service, Cornell Cooperative Extension, and the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratory and Arboretum.

“The Symposium is really about utilizing technology to maximize the horticultural projects, in both scope and health,” said Sterner about the overall theme of the event.

One of the most exciting features of the Symposium is a discussion on the tree-mapping capabilities available for both amateur and professional horticulturalists. Contemporary imaging made possible by drones can map and monitor



the health of your trees against weather and entomological conditions. iTree, developed by researchers with the U.S. Forest Service and software engineers at the Davey Institute, is user-friendly for residents, decision makers, and practitioners. The mobile application can help communities with overall planning of new trees to maximize benefits as trees have shown to help reduce air conditioning costs and reduce crime.

For history buffs, a portion of the Symposium will be dedicated to the history of horticulture in New York City. Discussed from the perspective of a landscape ecologist, event attendees can learn about the Manhattan of nature before becoming the concrete jungle of today. Contemporary computational methods were used to reconstruct New York’s past and to determine meaningful urban sustainability measures. ■

10 things to know about the 2020 census

How to participate, and why you should get counted

The 2020 U.S. census will begin soon and is already underway in some remote parts of the country. Communities across the U.S. are coming together to get “complete counts” in order to have accurate results in this year’s survey, which will then be used for the next decade. The following 10 facts come from a public session at the Pat-chogue-Medford Library and from the U.S. Census Bureau website:

Everyone needs to be counted.

It is in the Constitution that a nationwide census be performed every 10 years. Every person living in the United States must be counted, and counted only once. This includes service members; infants born after April 1; those experiencing homelessness; and those living in Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

There are four ways to take the survey.

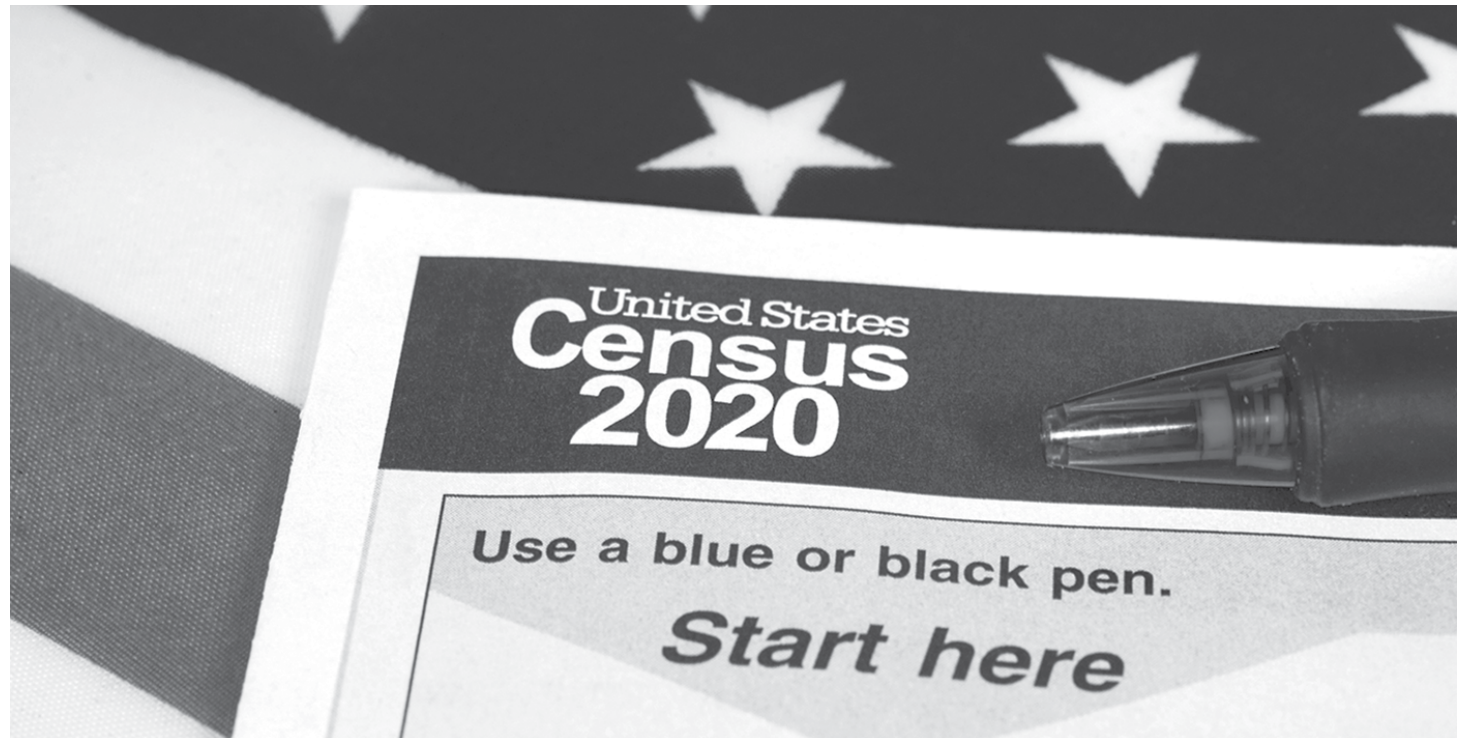
For the first time, the U.S. census can be taken online and over the phone. You will get an invitation between March 12 and 20, with a code directing you to the online portal. It is also possible to take the survey by phone, by mailing in the form or in person.

You can prevent someone from knocking at your door.

If you don’t want a visit from a Census Bureau worker, you should plan to take the census online, by phone or by mail. According to a timeline from the Census Bureau, reminders will be sent out several times by mail between March 12 and April 30. If you still haven’t responded, you could be called on by census takers, who will begin visiting homes to try and get complete counts.

The questions are simple.

The census survey asks only 10 ques-

tions. It will ask your name, age and sex and the number of people living in your home. It also will ask your race and Hispanic origin and whether you own the home you’re in. A sample version of the survey can be found at www.2020census.gov.

The data directly applies to hundreds of billions in federal money.

The census results will direct federal agencies and Congress how to spend billions in federal projects. These include the school lunch program, highway construction, Head Start, childcare and more. The census results will impact these programs for a decade, until another count is performed.

The results could change your representation in Congress.

The data is used to establish congressional districts in every area of the country. Getting everyone counted ensures adequate representation in Congress, which also impacts the number of electoral votes a state has in a

presidential election. Redistricting will begin around March 2021 and will not apply to the 2020 election cycle.

The data is also used by local governments and private businesses.

Aside from direct spending at the federal level, census data is used to decide how state governments spend money. It also can be used by private businesses to do market research in a prospective interest area.

All of your information is confidential and secure.

Census workers are bound by law not to share your private information. Title 13 of the U.S. Code prevents the Census Bureau from releasing any identifiable information about you, your home or your business, even to law enforcement agencies. The law ensures that your answers cannot be used against you by any government agency or court. You are also anonymous: The Bureau cannot release your responses in any way that would identify you. Offense

of Title 13 is punishable by a hefty fine or jail time, or both. The online survey is designed to protect against cyber threats; the Census Bureau has a top IT infrastructure to protect your information.

There are questions it will never ask.

The Census Bureau will never ask for your social security number, money or donations and bank or credit card information. If someone comes to your home, check to make sure that the person has a valid ID badge with a photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date. If you are still unsure, call 800-923-8282 to speak with a local Census Bureau representative.

You can get a job with the Census Bureau.

The Census Bureau is hiring census takers right now, and you can apply online. Jobs have flexible hours, weekly pay and paid training. Visit the job site for more information or to apply: www.2020census.gov/jobs. ■

County’s septic improvement program expands

More than a thousand residents have applied thus far

Suffolk County Executive Steve Bellone recently announced that more than 1,350 residents had applied to participate in the Septic Improvement Program, including 111 people submitting applications in January 2020 — the second highest monthly total since the program’s inception.

The county also released a video on Reclaim Our Water’s website, which features homeowners who have participated in the program and were satisfied with the process when installing a new nitrogen-reducing Innovative and Alternative (I/A) system.

“When we created the Septic Improvement Program, we modeled it off of other overwhelmingly successful and nationally recognized programs, understanding this could be the solution to our region’s water quality crisis,” said Bellone. “After three successful years, our program has now been expanded statewide because it not only works, it makes it affordable for the average homeowners to play their part protecting the environment. With enthusiasm and participation at an all-time high, we are committed to moving full steam ahead with this critical water-quality program because our future depends on it.”

Although Long Island has seen a decline in local water quality over the last several decades, studies show that the Septic Improvement Pro-

gram can restore water quality during this generation, reducing and potentially eliminating problems that have plagued the area for decades.

To date, 333 advanced systems have been installed across the county, with another 180 installations pending under the grant program. In addition, more than 520 state-of-the-art nitrogen-reducing septic systems have been installed outside of the grant program throughout Suffolk County. On average, the program receives approximately 96 applicants per month, and residents are encouraged to apply while funding is still available.

Homeowners who decide to replace their cesspool or septic system with the new technologies will be eligible for a grant of up to \$30,000 from Suffolk County and New York State. With the ability to apply for both county and

state grant funding, installing one of the new systems becomes increasingly more affordable for middle- and working-class homeowners who want to play their part in protecting the environment. In addition to the grant, homeowners can qualify to finance the remaining cost of the systems through a loan, payable over 15 years at a 3 percent fixed interest rate. The purpose of the loan is to provide “gap” funds to finance the difference between the grant to be provided by Suffolk County and the contract amount needed to install the replacement septic system.

No more plastic bags, at all

Not even for 5 cents. As of March 1, the entirety of New York State is completely banning plastic carry-out bags. It's estimated that more than 23 billion plastic bags are used statewide each year. Plastic bags can be found littered on our streets, stuck in trees, spread across beaches and floating in the waterways. There is even documented evidence of harm to wildlife and habitats.

Consumers in Suffolk County were (rightfully) forced to consider Bring Your Own Bags, a movement toward reusable bag usage, after a local law required stores to charge customers a minimum fee of 5 cents back in January 2018.

But now, as of next week, plastic bags will be banned from distribution by anyone required to collect New York State sales tax — which leads us to just one major question: What will be done with all the surplus?

A local soup kitchen suggested it could use the plastic bag donations for the homeless to carry out food items. We think it's a great idea to reuse something that is already produced, and soup kitchens can use any help they can get. What else would they do with the no-longer-usable bags? Throwing them out would be a bigger waste and larger harm to the environment than the intention of the law would be solving, at least in the short term.

About the law

The law applies to more than just grocery stores and includes retailers. If you forget to bring bags, most retailers will sell reusable bags. Paper might also be available, though some stores might not switch to paper and require the customer to bring a reusable bag or to purchase one.

However, cities and counties are authorized to adopt the 5-cent fee and apply it to the paper carry-out bags. (However, it does not apply to SNAP and WIC recipients.) Also, stores are still required to collect plastic bags for recycling.

The reusable bags not only look better but also work better. We suggest buying cotton or cloth bags, so they can be washed and repurposed for many uses around the house.

The Medicaid budget shortfall in 2021

Suffolk County could be heading off a fiscal cliff as state lawmakers look to close a huge budget shortfall in our Medicaid spending in the 2021 budget.

Medicaid was established in 1966 by the federal government, and it has helped millions of poor and disabled receive health care. Each state is responsible for paying a portion of the cost of the Medicaid program, and Albany has passed on some of that cost to each county. Six million New Yorkers — more than 326,000 people in Suffolk County alone — receive health coverage through Medicaid. The program is lifesaving for many and an important tool in New York State's arsenal for taking care of its residents. But proposals from some in Albany would be disastrous for Suffolk County and force our residents to pay more.

In 2011, as a response to exorbitant and unpredictable increases in property tax bills, Gov. Cuomo implemented a yearly 2-percent cap on property tax increases. At the same time, Albany implemented a cap on the amount of money that counties would pay to the state to help pay for Medicaid. This cap helped to cushion the financial blow that many municipalities would have faced due to the property tax cap.

These two laws have been hugely successful at reducing the tax burden for our residents.

Some lawmakers are exploring the idea of eliminating the Medicaid cap in order to extract more money out of local governments. Eliminating the Medicaid cap will create a substantial burden that many counties will not be able to shoulder. This solution to a growing budget shortfall does not address the root cause of the problem and will only provide temporary relief for the cash-strapped state government at the cost of local taxpayers.

Suffolk County is already paying an enormous amount of money to Albany to help fund the program. In 2019 we paid \$279,749,596 in Medicaid assistance. Although the state provides some relief to this burden, we still had a net payout of \$243,757,451 from the county coffers. Counties across New York State sent \$8 billion combined to Albany last year. By lifting the cap, we could be liable for tens of millions more at an ever-increasing amount year after year. This is a cost that will ultimately be borne by Suffolk County taxpayers.

In 2011 Gov. Cuomo convened a Medicaid Redesign Team to look into ways to reduce the enormous tax burden caused by Medicaid. One of the ideas that came out of that team was the

Medicaid cap. Our own county executive, Steve Bellone, has been tapped to join the new Medicaid Redesign Team. However, before they even have a chance to thoughtfully examine the issue, some in Albany are trying to scrap the cap altogether.

The Medicaid budget shortfall is being driven by the ever-growing cost of health care in this county. It's a problem we are seeing in every sector and for every payer. Furthermore, the federal government has underfunded New York's Medicaid program for years, and that deficit has grown under the Trump administration. The Medicaid cap is not to blame, and shifting the burden onto local governments rather than examining the root causes of the problem is irresponsible. At the end of the day, unless we do something to reduce the cost, it will be taxpayers to whom the bill comes due.

The Medicaid Redesign Team needs time to work out a better plan, and the Medicaid cap needs to stay in place.

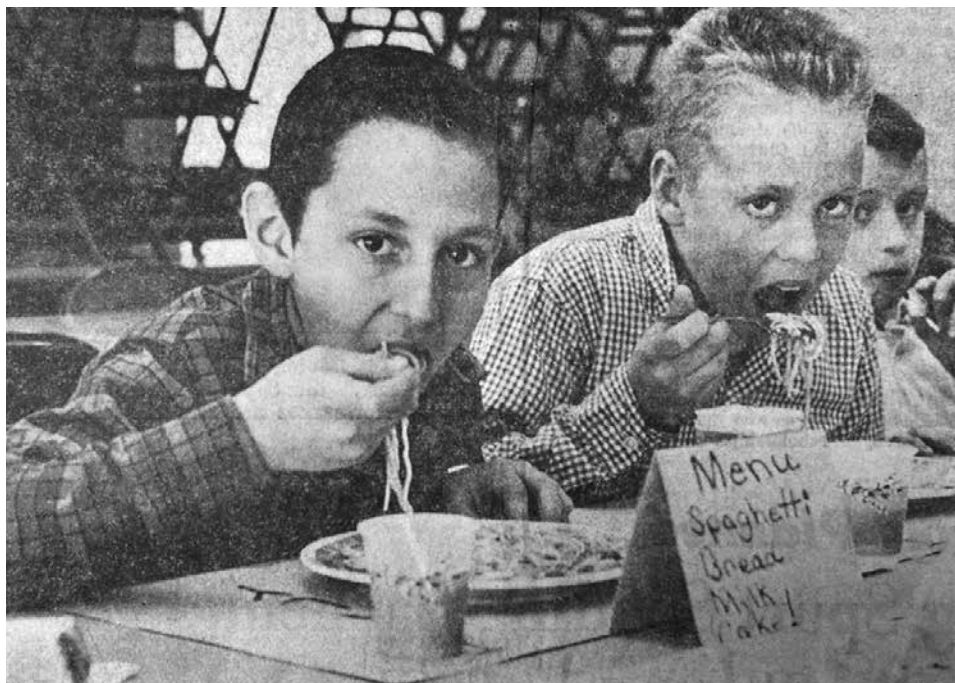

Piccirillo slams proposed Smoking Ban

Suffolk County proposes ban in multifamily dwellings

Suffolk County Legis. Anthony A. Piccirillo has been a vocal opponent to a newly proposed law that he claims "is a broad overreach of basic government function."

Resolution No. 1015-2020, if adopted, will ban smoking within multiple dwelling units. This includes apartments, townhouses, condos, co-ops and other multifamily dwelling units in Suffolk County. The bill does not distinguish between renting and owning a dwelling, forcing people who own their own home to comply with this law if it is passed.

Piccirillo voiced his concerns with this

proposed law at the public hearing before the Legislative body at the general meeting on Feb. 11, questioning how the government would enforce this law.

"The government has no right to infringe on the rights of using a legal substance in the privacy of our own homes," Piccirillo said. "This law is looking to regulate the behavior of Suffolk County residents within their own homes, including dwellings residents own. This is a slippery slope we are heading down."

This is one of two bills being heard before the Legislature regarding smoking in or near multifamily dwellings.

The Shed: a brunch to remember

West Sayville's newest brunch spot offers great food in a great space

Everyone values a home-cooked meal. It was made with love, it was made for you (probably with a unique recipe, too). And it's hard for restaurants to recreate this—a space with a homey ambience and personal cooking that puts you in comfort mode. West Sayville's new brunch spot, The Shed (the second iteration of the Huntington brunch staple), accomplishes this—and you get those feelings when you walk in the door.

Entering a historic space, once known as the Blue Stone Tavern, it feels like you're walking into a friend's home. You get the cozy fireplace, modern windows with plenty of light, and casual, modern furniture that you'd certainly find at home. The open space near the foyer is a symbol of welcoming, giving you time to take it all in and relax. The decor, down to the books layered in between the bar's liquor bottles, gives a comfortable vibe that compliments the brunch you came expecting.

The food

We tried a few signature dishes at The Shed. We started with the brioche

French toast, which is at least an inch thick and as fluffy as can be. It comes with your own bottle (yes a full bottle that you can use at your leisure) of maple syrup and is topped with bananas and brown sugar. The French toast was cooked perfectly and not at all "eggy." The brown sugar and banana mixture gives a great texture and depth to the dish, bringing out that thick sweetness that compliments the French toast.

We then moved on to eggs benedict, a brunch staple on its own, elevated with maple sausage and a biscuit. The biscuit was a standout — one of the best we've had — as soft and buttery. The maple sausage brings new rich flavors to the table, and it's topped with a perfectly poached egg. Those in the kitchen deserve credit — as any amateur will tell you, poaching an egg is no easy feat — but here the consumer gets a thick white wall and perfectly runny yolk. The dish comes with a rich hollandaise and well-seasoned home fries.

And to satisfy our lunch palate, we went with the popular chicken sandwich. Crispy fried chicken tossed in honey and topped with a buttermilk dressing is a great combination. The chicken oozed juice, and the honey-butter milk combo was new and well received.

For dessert, we went with The Shed's box of homemade cookies, brought fresh and warm to the table. They have a homemade feeling to them as well, soft with good chunks of chocolate. ■
