

# 'Now's the time to hunker down and win this battle'

Current numbers could reflect the possible apex with a plateau

The number of positive cases has risen in Suffolk County to over 1,553; with a total of 30,000 tests having been conducted. Of those, a total of 1,463 patients are hospitalized with 506 in the ICU.

According to Suffolk County executive Steve Bellone, those numbers reflect an increase rate by about 100 a day with a jump of about 150 a day over last weekend. However, hospitalizations have seen a smaller increase in the past few days, possibly indicating that the county has reached its apex with a potential plateau.

"If that is where we are at, that is great news, but we need more time to see more data to see if that is the case," Bellone said during a Zoom press conference held earlier this week. "If that is [true] the next question is, will it be a plateau for a while or will we see a decline relatively quickly?"

If the county has, in fact, reached its apex, then Bellone said that means the social distancing, economy shutdown and isolation measures are working.

"These sacrifices will and have saved lives," he added. "This does not mean we take our foot off the pedal. We don't know and we need more time and more data to confirm that everything we have been doing is working."

With that being said, Bellone noted that there is still a lawful order in place enforcing social distancing.

"Now is the time to hunker down and

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# Alexis Weik sets eyes on Senate seat

## Islip Town's receiver of taxes campaigns for Monica Martinez's seat

Alexis Weik describes herself as a fighter and an engaged member of the community. Serving as the Town of Islip's receiver of taxes since 2011, Weik said she has opened the door to ensuring that anyone who needs to meet with her and discuss urgent matters can easily do so.

"[I have] streamlined the operations of the Receiver's Office, making it more accessible, more efficient, and more accountable to taxpayers," Weik said.

On the Republican ticket with the Conservative endorsement, Weik is running for the New York Senate District 3 seat.

"Right now, government is lacking in two things: common sense and a commitment to improving our communities," Weik said, adding that she has proven time and again that she possesses both of these qualities.

Weik noted that Democrats hold the majority in Suffolk County, the state Assembly, and the state Senate.

"It is an important race, especially right now. We are on the precipice of something big happening to Long Island. We are about to change. Long Island will never be the same after this next campaign cycle," Weik said, continuing on to say that the COVID-19 pandemic is relevant to all of this, too.

Announcing her campaign in December, Weik, a Sayville resident, said she is continuously listening to the constituent-

cy's concerns, including the continually rising taxes and the substandard quality of services received.

"There are so many pieces of legislation that are not favoring Long Islanders," she said. "Unfortunately, we pay an unfair share of taxes to New York State. In exchange, we should be getting better representation and getting our fair share of state aid. I do not think that is happening right now, and that is important to me. I want to make sure that the constituents that I represent have their fair share coming from New York State."

While listening to the constituency, Weik has garnered a multifaceted platform that includes state aid for education, sewerage, women's concerns, and rethinking bail reform. Regarding education, Weik has listened to concerns of affordability for middle-class Long Islanders and sending their children to college.

"Long Islanders have to work hard. It is usually a two-income family. Most of the time, those individuals do not fall into the category of making \$100,000 or less and qualifying for free college education. Those individuals should not be punished for working hard," Weik said. "The middle class of Long Island never seems to see the benefits or the payouts coming from New York State. It is important that people who are working hard are not punished for working hard."

Referencing back to the coronavirus pandemic, which is hard-hitting on Long Island, Weik incorporated the topic of bail reform, a state-administered law passed in 2019 that eliminates cash-bail for most misdemeanor and non-violent

felony charges.

"More than 3,000 inmates were released due to bail reform under the guise of COVID-19, and making sure that these individuals did not get sick. This was a plan already in place because of bail reform. Now, we have people being released to make room in our correctional facilities because they seem to be closing Rikers [Island]," Weik said, continuing on to discuss catch and release.

"It is not good for Long Island. It threatens [constituents'] safety and security," she said. "Law enforcement on Long Island, in any sector, is not in favor of bail reform. And they can tell you their job seems to be the same: over and over, catch and release."

Going back to the topic of the pandemic, Weik said her campaign will resume.

"I am passionate about running for this seat. Despite everything that is going on, it has not killed my enthusiasm. It has not crushed my goal. I still want desperately to represent this district who so desperately needs good representation."

New York State Senate District 3 covers areas within several Islip and Brookhaven Town hamlets: East Islip, Great River, Oakdale, Fire Island, West Sayville, Sayville, Bayport, Blue Point, Patchogue, North Patchogue, East Patchogue, Medford, Bellport, North Bellport, Yaphank, Brookhaven Hamlet, Shirley, Mastic, Mastic Beach, Holtsville, Farmingville, Centereach, Holbrook, Bohemia, Ronkonkoma, Lake Ronkonkoma, Islandia, Hauppauge, Central Islip and Brentwood.

Weik, who is currently a Sayville resident, grew up in Ronkonkoma and Oakdale. ■

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# Signs of optimism

'One Day at a Time' promotes mental health maintenance

"A phrase can trigger a good mindset," said Lori D'Andrea, a West Islip resident and mother who has been erecting signs around her community that plainly read, "One Day at a Time."

Through a Facebook page she created in 2018, titled "One Day at a Time," D'Andrea has not only become recognized as an advocate of positive thought in the community, but as an inspiration to

spread others' eagerness to erect these signs in their own hyperlocal communities and hamlets in recent weeks. The simplistic, black-text sign with a plain, white background aims for calmness and present-moment thinking.

"I think of [the phrase] as a mental reminder," D'Andrea said. "You know how when you are driving and you are not really thinking of anything? I have gotten a lot of messages from people that [say] 'I needed to see that. It was perfect timing.'"

D'Andrea began putting up these signs five or six weeks ago, and that phrase emphasizes the mental reminder to not dwell in the past and definitely not worry about the future, especially considering the ubiquitous effects of the coronavirus pandemic.

"There are so many things out of your control, and how that name came out — which is a blanket thing for anything that is hard in your life or just in general — it is really just like taking baby bites out of something," she said. "All you can do is make the best of what is in front of you

and learn what you can from that day, and you do that one day at a time."

Government officials across the U.S., practically in unison, reiterate that "we are all in this together" when speaking to their constituents regarding the coronavirus outbreak, lockdown, social distancing, and several other relevant topics each individual is enduring. Although this is the first time the nation has faced a viral outbreak of this magnitude and concern, D'Andrea pointed out that this is not the first time "we are all in this together" has been forced centerstage to the public's eyes and ears.

"You think about 9/11. Everybody came together, and you find this new sense of community and this new sense of wanting to help people and realizing that helping people makes you feel better and gets you through the bad stuff," D'Andrea said. "When attacking something like this, this is something we have never seen before, and people rise to the top. I find this whole situation to be so interesting because I think people are going to dig deep and realize what they are made of. And that is really what happens in life when you are handed these really hard things."

In 2018, D'Andrea's teenage daughter was facing the brunt of mental health concerns in the forms of depression and anxiety. At this point in time, D'Andrea put the phrase "we are all in this together" to the test on a livestream on social media.

"It was out of character for me," she said. "I basically just poured my heart out to the community, saying, 'I do not know if anyone else is going through this, but I am. And if you need me to talk to...' That is really what is going to be what helps people in the end: to feel comfortable enough to say, 'We have this happening. Look for help. You are not by yourself. This is more normal than you

think it is."

D'Andrea went on to discuss the stigma of asking for help, alongside the illusion of perfection portrayed on a given individual's social media page.

"A couple years ago when this started going on with my daughter — and it was really scary — I knew [of] nobody going through the same thing. That was kind of how that page came about because I said, 'There has to be someone else. There has to be someone out there who has a kid who is struggling with depression.' But nobody is talking about it," she said.

About five or six weeks ago, D'Andrea and her daughter began driving around and putting up signs that read, "One Day at a Time" around West Islip and Brightwaters — a modest radius around their home. She is originally from Sayville and has had plans to put them on the road by the high school and in that general vicinity. She had also donated signs and informed others of where to buy additional signs on the Facebook page.

Since then, these signs have popped

up in other areas, including East Islip and Babylon. Pandemonium Boutique in Babylon has joined the cause. D'Andrea said other businesses have contacted her, too, in discussion of how and where to acquire these signs.

"It was starting to get traction because when I first put up the post that I had some and telling people they can put them up, because I bought a whole bunch, a lot of people were asking directly how they can purchase these, saying they want to bring them to their school districts," D'Andrea said, adding that she is unsure how wide the net was cast.

D'Andrea pointed out a movement sprung by an organization originating in Oregon in 2017 with these signs for the betterment of mental health and assisting one another are the source: Dontgiveupsigns.com. Yard signs are for sale as well as much more, including car stickers, wristbands, pins, and several other items with various messages, including "One Day at a Time" and "We are All in This Together." ■

across Long Island (and eventually around the world) posted their rainbow artwork, often made with chalk on driveways, to help brighten each other's days in isolation.

"We're so blown away. It's amazing. We've had people as far as the Philippines post to our Long Island group," said Lauren Dunn, a founder and current administrator of the group.

Curating the most spectacular displays, Dunn and other members have started an Instagram offshoot of the group where they show the boldest and most unconventional rainbows.

"Most people are trying to keep busy, and this gives people a way to channel that energy to gain comfort from it," said Dunn.

Overnight, the group went from 10,000 to over 25,000 members, with rainbows being posted from Hawaii, London and Portugal. It is fitting, since the inception of the group was inspired by the camaraderie and friendship shown by Italy in the past few weeks.

The rainbow parameter, providing families with a good kernel to start an art project, has become a personalized vision of happiness through tough times, a type of "rainbows of their life," according to Dunn.

Expanding from personal projects, the group has been planning to do giveaways, raffles, and donations to hospitals to funnel the bright spirit of the rainbow movement into tangible efforts to fight the pandemic. ■

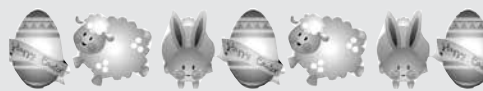

# Apply now: loans for small businesses

U.S. SBA encourages those affected by the pandemic to apply

The U.S. Small Business Administration is accepting applications for loans for economic injury disaster with interest loans capping at 3.75 percent. Nonprofits are capped at 2.75 percent.

“The SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan program provides low interest disaster loans to small businesses and nonprofit organizations,” said Debra Freeland, a public affairs specialist at SBA. “These loans are used to pay fixed debts, payroll, account[s] payable, and other bills that could have been paid had the coronavirus not occurred.”

Although the fund allows up to \$2 million for a loan to a small business, the amount granted is based on a given entity’s financial loss, Freeland said. Moreover, it is a case-by-case basis.

“SBA’s Economic Injury Disaster Loans are Working Capital Loans, and these loans help them continue to pay their ongoing monthly expenses,” Freeland said.

In regard to how long it would take to receive a loan, Freeland expressed that SBA is processing incoming applications as quickly as possible.

“Some are even processed as fast as

within a few days,” she said. “The first disbursement is generally made within three to five days after receiving the signed loan closing documents.”

Small businesses in New York became eligible for economic injury disaster loans through SBA on March 19. Additionally, the declaration for the loan indicates that the funds are tappable through

Dec. 21, 2020, which was stressed by Delvonnie Burgess, another public affairs specialist for SBA.

Burgess also emphasized that SBA’s definition of a small business is in reference to North American Industry Classification system. Upon asking about what might disqualify a small business from receiving a loan, Freeland said eligibility

cannot be determined until an application has been submitted, further stressing the necessity for all small businesses to apply.

SBA did not relay how many small businesses have thus far applied, but again, stressed that all small businesses are encouraged to submit applications.

“This is something new that has never happened in our country before,” Burgess said. “Things are still slowly trying to get a handle of this horrific disaster in our country. We are trying to address every need as far as the economy is concerned because we do understand that small businesses are the driving force of the economy here in the U.S.”

Calls and applications from small businesses in states east of the Mississippi River — as well as two territories and Washington, D.C. — are processed at Disaster Field Operations Center East in Atlanta. ■

## Five questions for leaving the house answered

What should we do when we have to leave the house for essentials?

Aside from doing the obvious—washing your hands, not touching your face, staying home and cleaning and disinfecting all surfaces in your home—what do we do when we must leave our house to get essentials like groceries, takeout meals or medicines?

**When should we leave the house?**

According to Suffolk County legislature presiding Officer Rob Calarco, you should, of course, not go to the store unless you absolutely need to. Also, there

is no need to over-shop. The county has spoken with all the major grocery store chains and they have all ensured that there is plenty of food and essential household items in the supply chain. Their difficulty in keeping shelves stocked has been a direct result of demand. They recommend just doing your normal weekly shopping.

**Should we disinfect our groceries and takeout meals?**

According to medical professionals, the disease spreads from respiratory droplets, meaning having someone cough or sneeze in close proximity. Calarco said while there is a possibility for the virus to stay on the surface of an item in one of those droplets, once the droplet dries up, the virus cannot last long. Transmission through this process is extremely rare and not considered to be a major health

risk.

**Is it a good idea to leave things in the car for a day or two before bringing into the home?**

Calarco simply said, no. The chance of one item from the store having a droplet on it is extremely rare and not considered a health risk.

**Should we shower every time we leave? Or is handwashing good enough?**

Calarco did not recommend showering every time someone leaves the house. Instead, he said, simply washing your hands and practicing normal good hygiene is sufficient. The virus typically enters the body by someone touching their face, he added, after coming in contact with an infected person.

**When to shop?**

Most retailers and grocers have pro-

win this battle,” he continued, hoping to save as many lives as possible.

Hospital bed capacity has also reached over 3,292. Currently, 631 hospital beds are available and 96 ICU beds. Seventy-three COVID-19 patients were discharged within the last 24 hours and deaths have reached 263. Personal protective equipment has also been sent to the county, with a total of 150,000 surgical masks and 200,000 N95 masks. ■

# Animals need your help, too

## Islip Animal Shelter still offering adoptions

Animal shelters across the country are shifting their operations to adhere to guidelines around the coronavirus. The Islip Animal Shelter is no different, but the town shelter is still home to many animals in need of homes.

For the past couple of weeks, the shelter has been closed to the public, only allowing for previous business and scheduled adoptions to take place in careful conditions. The shelter will now operate by doing transactions through the front window, with adoptions available by appointment only. According to shelter supervisor Teri Gialcone, there have still been adoption inquiries while the shelter has been closed, about the same amount as normal. The shelter has still been taking in and releasing stray cats, and performed some transfers with local rescue organizations. And though volunteers have not been allowed in the building, the staff has been walking dogs and getting animals out and about during the day.

If you're interested in adopting, visit the shelter website at [www.islipny.gov/community-and-services/animal-shelter](http://www.islipny.gov/community-and-services/animal-shelter) to see the adoptable pets through PetFinder. You can then email the staff at the shelter to

request an application and express interest in a particular animal. You'll be able to make an appointment to come in and meet the animal and if all goes well, the staff will aim to set up take-home for that day, in an effort to limit the number of visits to the office.

If you're interested in fostering animals during this time, the Islip shelter is not able to fulfill those requests, as they do not have a fostering program. Gialcone suggests residents reach out to rescue shelters with fostering programs. This still helps the Islip shelter, as they are able to then transfer animals to rescue shelters with open space when needed.

"Just be patient, this is new to all of us," Gialcone said of the new procedures. ■

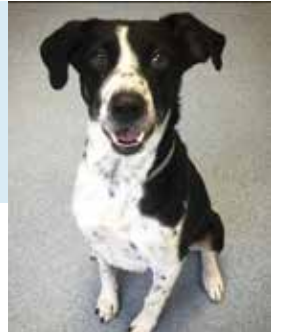

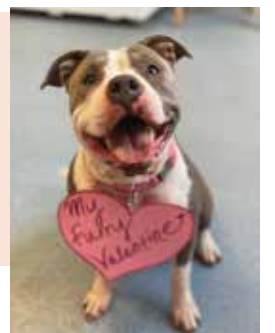

# Gov. Cuomo, Main Street needs a hand from Albany

**C**OVID-19 has completely changed the way we all live.

But along with worrying about keeping themselves and their families healthy, thousands of small business owners across New York State are losing sleep over how to keep this virus from killing the businesses they have worked so hard to build.

At the same time, lawmakers in Albany are trying to craft a budget in the face of plunging revenues. Sales taxes — much of them generated by small business — brought in a whopping \$73.6 billion last year. Our schools, as well as other vital government services, rely on these funds. When a business fails — and too many are on the precipice of failure right now — that sales tax revenue goes, too.

We believe a simple proposal could help restart local business and bolster sales tax revenues, but swift action is required by Gov. Andrew Cuomo and the state Legislature.

Small businesses are the backbone of our communities. Everyone wants a thriving downtown where they can shop, eat or go to a movie. The good news is that small businesses have always been engines of innovation and entrepreneurship, and we are seeing that again today as they adapt to the new reality. Local gyms are streaming personal training sessions. Restaurants offer free delivery and online happy hours. Medical practices are expanding their telemedicine capabilities. Car mechanics are making house calls that require no personal contact at all.

Of course, it's vital that these businesses let potential customers know about their services. That's the role of advertising in all its myriad forms. But advertising costs money, and the sad truth is that advertising is one of the first things small businesses cut when times are tough.

Put yourself in the shoes of a local restaurateur with a stack of bills and very little money coming in. By the time she finishes paying the most urgent bills — rent, food suppliers, payroll — there's not much left for advertising. Whatever stimulus money she gets from Washington or Albany will most likely be needed to keep the door open and the lights on. Yet studies show that how well businesses survive a downturn is in large part determined by whether they continue to market and advertise during the hard times.

Fortunately, there is a way for Albany to prime the sales-tax pump to keep revenue flowing to both small businesses and state coffers. Let businesses use some of the money they would have sent to Albany, as sales taxes, to market their new offerings. The formula would be simple: every dollar a

As the vice chair of medicine and the director of the intensive care units at Southside Hospital, working during COVID-19 has been challenging. I think that's the best way to put it. We keep getting more patients and since so many patients are very sick, they are having longer hospital stays. Given the number of patients we're seeing with the virus, we have opened the neuro ICU, surgical ICU and cardiothoracic ICU to care for these patients. Each has a separate staff/team, although we are all working to care for COVID-19 patients together.

Even given the large number of very sick patients that we're caring for, I am inspired by our staff every day and am seeing examples of us being "truly together" (one of our values) on a daily basis. They are willing to help any way they can, often "running into the fire" very willingly. Cardiologists and



nephrologists, for instance, are helping me and my team care for our COVID-19 patients. I'm working with them in a capacity that makes the best use of their skills, supports the team and ultimately helps our patients.

Every day is different for me. There are days when I'm able to see patients and then there are other days that it's more important for my team that I do more leadership-related tasks to support the staff and operations. Sometimes that feels like making organization out of chaos, but we always manage to do it, and I'm so proud of our team for doing that.

Southside Hospital is committed to making sure that our employees, especially those caring for COVID-19 patients are taking the necessary time to rest and recharge. I make sure to not bother people on their off time whenever possible. I am also "calling in the cavalry" by obtaining resources from

other Northwell locations or from the outside to relieve our staff whenever possible. Overall, our staff is resilient and I know that we will get through this.

When I come home from the hospital, I have stopped our family's usual practice of having the kids come hug me at the door, which is getting hard for them as time goes on. So we'll have to figure out how to manage that going forward. To prevent spreading germs to them, I make sure to change and take a shower before I speak to my family. I have also been trying to have playtime with my kids to help mentally keep myself going, although it has been hard to find the time with the number of emails and things that need to be addressed after work hours. When I get home, sometimes I feel like part human and part android, thanks to all the work emails.

I have been running for a while and meditating, both of which are coming in handy lately. The other day I ran on my treadmill with a monitor that made it look like I was running in Patagonia. That really helps to center me. ■

small business spends on advertising (up to some reasonable limit) would be a dollar saved off that business's sales tax bill.

It would be a win-win-win. Local businesses would be healthier because the increased advertising would jump-start sales. The state would get more sales tax revenue because local businesses would be selling more. And media companies (like ours) would benefit from the additional ad revenue. We'd like to think that we, too, are vital to the character and strength of our communities, not to mention

our democracy. Think for a moment of the critical role that journalists have played in getting vital local information out to your community during this unprecedented crisis.

The Legislature has a lot on its plate right now, and the temptation will be to bury this idea, or to take the short-sighted view that we can't afford to do it right now. But right now is when it's needed. We've been impressed with Gov. Cuomo's levelheaded leadership in this crisis, and we call on him to back this innovative yet simple policy. ■
