A real dreamboat

South Shore boating launches private events, charters on **Great South Bay**

In the Prohibition era, many vessels were used to smuggle alcohol from overseas to the United States. A sign of the times, one of those rumrunners was nicknamed the Running Wild.

Today, it's the namesake of a 52-foot renovated yacht owned by Shoreline Trading Company, a new cruising business that will encourage locals to legally booze and cruise along the Great South

"We wanted to pay homage to the past," Fire Island Ferries Inc. vice president Brendan Mooney said of the name.

Bay Shore-based Shoreline Trading Company is the joint partnership of Fire Island Ferries Inc. and Anthony Tartaglia of Coastal Kitchen & Daiquiri Bar in Bay Shore. The 40-passenger boat will offer daytime, nighttime and sunset excursions with various cocktails, beer and wine options, as well as light snacks and cold appetizers for travelers.

"We do the food and beverage side of things, do the nautical, coastguard side of things," Bay Shore resident Tartaglia said.

The vessel, constructed by the Scarano Boat Building company in Albany, N.Y., was transported to Long Island after the Shoreline team purchased it in Philadelphia in March 2021 and sailed it home on a daylong trip, Tartaglia said.

Mooney said the charter service has been in the works for several years. This summer served as the perfect opportunity to launch the program, he said.

"I think people are eager to get out on the water after a difficult year," Mooney

Youth week to highlight young residents

A job fair, awards ceremony and community service day is on the agenda this year

Suffolk County officials aim to celebrate young Suffolk residents in the next few days during its inaugural "Youth Week.'

The week of events from May 16 to 23 includes a job fair, an awards ceremony and a day of community

SUFFOLK service.

COUNTY Suffolk County Youth Week is the result of legislation sponsored by Legis. Jason Richberg and approved by the county legislature last year to designate the third week of May as "Youth Week" beginning in 2021.

The series is co-sponsored by county legislature presiding officer Rob Calarco, county executive Steve Bellone, County Legis. Richberg, and the county's Youth Bureau and Department of Labor, Licensing and Consumer Affairs.

"Our young people have sacrificed a great deal over the last year, but they have not let that stop them from making incredible contributions to our countv." Calarco said. "We have seen and felt their energy in significant ways, whether they were generously helping seniors secure vaccine appointments or making their voices heard on issues that are important to them... It will be our honor to recognize their efforts, help prepare them for the workforce, and recognize their commitment to their communities.

The weeklong celebration kicked off with a virtual job fair on Monday, May 17. The program heledp Suffolk teens find summer jobs by connecting job-seekers with local employers who will be virtually present to handle applications and interviews. Bellone said that Youth Week is designed to provide youth with the tools they need to continue to succeed and recognize and honor them.

"Every day, whether it is through community service, recreational sports. various forms of art, or school clubs, our young people contribute to the vibrancy of our communities in innumerable ways," Bellone said in a press release.

On Wednesday, May 19, the county hosted its inaugural Youth Awards, which will recognize young county residents who have gone above and beyond in helping their community during the COVID-19 pandemic. Youths who performed community service during the pandemic will be honored in a virtual award presentation.

Youth Week will conclude with A "Day of Service" on May 22. Young people and youth groups may sign up to tie a ribbon on the Suffolk County COVID-19 Memorial located outside the William H. Rogers Legislature Building in Hauppauge to honor individuals who lost their fight to COVID-19. 'Green' buses to be rolled out in Bay Shore, CI and Brentwood

Bay Shore School District and Suffolk Transportation Services Inc. have been

awarded a \$1.1 million grant from the United States Environmental Protection Agency for

electric buses to transport school children, district officials announced.

STS and Bay Shore schools secured the \$1,152,687 Diesel Emissions Reduction

Act National Grant this year, which will be used to purchase seven new model electric buses to be utilized in the Bay Shore, Brentwood and Central Islip

According to the EPA, the DERA program "funds grants and rebates that protect human health and improve air quality by reducing harmful emissions from diesel engines.

Bay Shore superintendent Joseph Bond said that the duo had secured an EPA grant two years ago to roll out four electric school buses in the district. Since Brentwood, CI and Bay Shore are all part of Suffolk Transportation Services' fleet, district representatives decided to piggyback on the effort again this year.

"It's a win-win, and we're all moving in the direction of making our town a cleaner and better place," Bond said. "Our mantra in Bay Shore has always been to 'dream, lead and achieve.' With this accomplishment, we are one step closer to that mission."

The new "green" fleet is free to taxpayers, Bond said, and will save at least 8,000 gallons of diesel fuel and well over 54 metric tons of CO2 emissions.

The EPA Region 2 office awarded the grant based on a "demonstrated ongoing commitment to achieving significant reductions in diesel emissions by employing cleaner, more efficient vehicles and equipment."

But this is only the beginning, Bond said: "This is only going to grow. I know that's [Suffolk [Transportation Services'] intention." Once the vessels are mass-produced, he said, the electric buses will become more cost effective for districts across the area and will result in savings.

The EPA's rebate program has funded vehicle replacements or retrofits for over 2,000 vehicles. Typically, the rebate application period opens in the fall and projects are completed in less than one year. In the 2020 fiscal year, approximately \$10.5 million has been distributed thus

Planning Board gives green light to minor restaurant

The Islip Town Planning Board, on May 12, approved a parking relaxation with established convenience and restrictions for a church located at County Road 17 in Islip Terrace.

The application for the roughly 19,000-square-foot site, located on the southeast corner of Carleton Avenue and Fisher Avenue, had two requests: one for a special permit to create a minor takeout restaurant on the site, and another for the parking for the church, also on the parcel. The board had previously voted to approve a takeout restaurant but reserved a decision on the church.

Joseph Buzzell, of Buzzell, Blanda & Visconti, LLP, appeared before the planning board on May 12 to review the plan by applicant and property owner Ammal Pingling.

Since the prior approval, Buzzell said he's worked with the planning department and applicant to establish conditions.

The applicant and planning board staff drafted site-plan modification conditions to address the planning board's parking concerns related to the church, planning department representative Kellie Woznick said. Some of the conditions include: limiting the number of seats within the church to 30 and requiring the basement to remain an unfinished storage space. The conditions also require any change of use for the church that requires a parking relaxation be brought back before the

At the March 24 planning board meeting, Buzzell said the application first came before the board in 2019. Following a hearing, the applicant had submitted a traffic study completed pre-pandemic.

The first floor of the building has four commercial units. There will be no seats in the roughly 670-square-foot restaurant space. The main occupant will be the business owner with one additional worker on staff, Buzzell said at the March meeting. It's unclear at this time what the restaurant space will offer. ■

All local school budget votes pass

Board of Education candidates elected

ISLIP UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Islip School District's \$88.7 million budget passed on May 18, with residents casting 796 'yes' votes to 448 'no' votes.

The budget carries a tax levy increase of 2 percent. Although that tax levy increase represents a decrease from last year's 2.65 percent levy, it's still above the district's allowable tax cap of -2.33 percent. As such, the district needed at least 60 percent of voters to approve this override of the tax levy limitation.

For the Board of Education, voters reelected incumbent vice president Tom Leggio with 942 votes, and trustees Paul Austin (873 votes) and Eric Buehler (927 votes). All candidates ran unopposed this

EAST ISLIP UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The \$121 million budget in the East Islip School District passed on May 18 after residents casted 1,617 'yes' votes and 777 'no' votes. The budget is at the allowable tax levy cap, with a tax levy increase of 1.50 percent, the same as the cap.

Voters elected Joann Walsh to Christopher Nicolia's open seat with 1,405 votes; Walsh was running unopposed after being appointed to this seat last November when Nicolia resigned.

Candidate Charles Kalinowski will take the open seat held by board president Jessica Carney, who did not seek reelection. Kalinowski received 745 votes, while other candidates Michael Dorgan and Laurie Gapinski-Gould got 675 votes and 429 votes, respectively.

For the open seat held by trustee Philip Montuori Sr., who did not run for reelection, Stephen Ruland received 851 votes, Dominick Barbato received 728 votes, Timothy Sassone received 446 votes and Joshua Zusmer received 226 votes.

WEST ISLIP UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The West Islip School District's \$127.5 million fiscal budget strongly passed by a margin of 1,234 votes to 521. The proposition to use the district's capital reserves also passed, with 1,347 'yes' votes and 392 'no' votes.

Current trustee Richard Antoniello will take a seat on the board after receiving 922 votes. The other at-large seat went to Deborah Brown, who received 1,007 votes, while candidate Roy Tarantola received 888 votes.

BAY SHORE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Bay Shore's \$171 million budget for the 2021-2022 academic year overwhelmingly passed, with 1,154 'YES' votes and 798 'NO'

Board of Education president Susan Gargan was re-elected with 798 votes. Candidate Jennifer Brownyard, a 16-year-resident of Bay Shore, will join the board after receiving 853 votes, and candidate Tuere Morton beat out candidate Philip Carpenter Jr. for the remaining seat with her 681 votes.







Unruptured Brain Aneurysms: What You Wanted to Know

What is It? Weakened Vessel Wall. A weakened spot on the arterial wall allows an aneurysm to form and to grow. On imaging, a bulge can be seen on a brain artery.


When the vessel wall is intact, it is called unruptured. When the aneurysm bursts or ruptures, it will cause a brain bleed, so-called subarachnoid hemorrhage or SAH.

The Cause? Inflammation, genetic factors, smoking, illicit drug and alcohol abuse, and untreated hypertension are know risk factors. More women have brain aneurysms.

Tests. Vascular imaging with MRA is a non-invasive way to detect and monitor brain aneurysms. CTA and angiograms are additional imaging modalities.

Dental implants... a solution?

Whether you have full or partial dentures, or recently lost a tooth, dental implants may be an option for you. Most implants are endosteal root form. It is placed in the jaw bone and acts as an artificial root that can be used to attach a tooth or help hold a denture in place. Implants are not an option for everyone. Your health and the adequate amount of bone available to support the implant are major factors that determine if you are a candidate for dental implants.

First, the dental implant is placed and allowed to heal for 4-6 months. During this time, the bone actually grows and attaches to the implant. This process is called osseointegration. While osseointegration is occurring during those 4-6 months, temporary replacement teeth can be made so you won't have to go without teeth. In select cases you can have a tooth on the implant at the time it is placed. It is referred to immediate loading the implant.

After 4-6 months and healing has taken place, the top of the implant is uncovered and a post is placed

into the implant. The artificial tooth is then attached to the post. It is also possible to have the post and the crown (artificial tooth) as one piece that is screwed into the implant. Of course, if one tooth is being replaced, then one implant is needed. If multiple teeth are being replaced, you not need an implant for each tooth. Rather, 3 – 4 teeth may only need 2 implants. For dentures, a minimum of 2 implants are required to hold the denture in place. More implants may be placed for added security of the denture, if adequate bone is available.

Most implants, when properly placed, enjoy a success rate of better than 90 percent. With proper oral hygiene at home and proper professional maintenance visits, dental implants have last over 20



River otters confirmed in South Shore waters

Seatuck creates 'stairway' to protect mammals from roadways

Seatuck Environmental Association in Islip has discovered that the population

of the North American river otter—a mammal once near extinction on Long Island-could be on the

uptick.

Well over a century ago, Long Island's river otters' population had depleted due to trapping, water pollution and habitat loss. Luckily, conservation laws enabled remnant otters to expand and recolonize their former habitat. Reintroduction programs for the creatures helped to accelerate that process. By the 1990s, a breeding population of otters became established on Long Island.

These critters have been present along the Island's North Shore in creeks, bays and ponds. Seatuck's wildlife biologist Mike Bottini, who has studied river otters in the area since 2008, said it's believed that the otters came to Long Island's North Shore from Connecticut and Westchester County. As they bred and had young, their territory expanded across the North Shore over the last decade, he

Further, a 2018 Seatuck survey found that "they basically have colonized all the available habitat between roughly Glen Cove east to Orient Point." Bottini said.

However, these critters only showed up on the South Shore two years ago, Bottini said. They've also established homes in the Peconic River and some of the South Fork of Long Island.

Seatuck now has evidence that otters have shown up in three watersheds: the Connetquot River in Islip Town, the Carmans River in Brookhaven Town, and Little Seatuck Creek in Eastport.

Bottini said Long Island is a "very fragmented landscape with many major roads running east to west," which serve as barriers to the otters' movement. Somehow, they made a connection between the Nissequogue River in Smithtown and the headwaters of the Connetquot.

A culvert, or man-made steel or concrete pipe that works as a drainage funnel, also exists under the Long Island Expressway and the eastbound and westbound service roads. The river otters may have made their way to the South Shore through the culvert, Bottini said.

Seatuck executive director Enrico Nardone said that while river otters are often hard to spot, biologists are able to track their whereabouts from other non-visual indicators, such as their excretions.

"The resurgence of our native river otter population is great news for our environment, and speaks to the power of effective conservation strategies," Nardone said.

The Islip-based environmental group has also documented a number of river otter deaths on roadways. While the roads may slow them down, "it's not preventing them from recolonizing other areas of Long Island," he said.

After an otter was killed by a motor vehicle in Eastport last March, Seatuck staff and a Brookhaven Town staffer constructed a simple concrete-block "stairway" at Little Seatuck Creek for river otters. The roughly 4.5-foot-high structure allows the otters to travel over the dam at the creek and under East Moriches Boulevard in Eastport.

"It's just one small solution in one area but as their population increases, we will need to find better and longer-lasting strategies to mitigate these occurrences, Bottini said.

The next phase of Seatuck's work could improve the dam and work on mitigation measures, Bottini said, to reduce the number of otter injuries caused by motor vehicles.

Seatuck is also partnering with Long Island Sound Study, New York Sea Grant, South Shore Estuary Reserve, and Peconic Estuary Partnership to train "community science volunteers" to locate and monitor river otter populations. Visit Waterdrinker Family Farm in Manorville

Last weekend, my family and I visited Waterdrinker Family Farm to pick our own tulip bulbs. The tulips had been in full bloom Mother's Day weekend but had died due to higher temperatures. Still, the bulb-picking was even more fun.

The farm has about 15 acres open to the public but sits on a larger 70 acres, including 30 of flower fields. According to owner Mark Weiss, the farm is currently growing sweet corn for late-summer and fall roasting.

A Super Beach Cleanup

Cape Cod-based Willie's Superbrew pledges to serve the planet

Hard seltzer and beach cleanups? At first, the two seem completely

unrelated, but for Willie's SUFFOLK Superbrew, a company based out of Cape Cod, COUNTY business and environmen-

talism are inseparable. The reason lies in how the company was founded. A decade ago, friends Nico Enriquez and Willie, a surfer and goat farmer, respectively, met and decided to start their enterprise together. On their journey from selling their brew at farmers markets to expanding their markets to nine states, the partners never forgot their pledge to serve their customers and the planet.

Every year the company allows their customers to nominate a nonprofit. Whichever organization is selected receives 3 percent of the seltzer company's profits. Their most recent endeavor is organizing beach cleanups throughout 500 miles of coastline in New Jersey, Long Island and Cape Cod.

How it works

Organizing a beach cleanup across three states had to be adapted to COVID-19 safety guidelines and suitable for the small team behind Willie's Superbrew. The company decided to allow its participants to pick from a list of beaches across 20 Long Island towns. Volunteers then form a team of 10 per

beach to collect debris. Participants were also asked to record the amount and type of waste they retrieve, data which helps contribute to pollution research.

Partnerships

Organizing cleanups over a wide expanse of land is no easy feat. Willie's Superbrew CEO Enriquez cites the help the company received from "incredible local nonprofits like Clean Ocean Action, [the] Surfrider Foundation, and the Center for Coastal Studies," each of which is actively contributing to healthier oceans and dedicated to improving research and

The data collected from cleanups will go to the Surfrider organization, a grassroots nonprofit organization that was born in 1984, and for the past 37 years has been dedicated to fighting plastic pollution, ocean protection, increasing beach access, coastal preservation, and protecting clean and sustainable water sources. The foundation currently has 24 active campaigns in the Northeast and 25 in the mid-Atlantic to combat aquatic pollution.

The company is also partnering with the Center for Coastal Studies, a nonprofit that conducts research and supports "education and public policy initiatives"— visit <u>coastalstudies.org</u> to learn more - as well as Clean Ocean Action, which is a diverse coalition that works to protect waterways by prioritizing public health at beaches as well as aquatic life.

The numbers

At the core of the cleanups is the community effort put forth by volunteers from Cape Cod, New Jersey and Long Island. The cleanups drew 540 volunteers across 190 miles in Cape Cod in 2020, who collected over 1,400 pounds of trash. In New Jersey, on April 17, 2021, the company organized 5,500 volunteers with the help of the nonprofit Clean Ocean Action. This totaled over 6,000 volunteers in the past year.

Why Long Island?

Enriquez saw a connection between Long Island and the company's home base, Cape Cod.

"Long Island, to me, is a lot like Cape Cod. It's a spit-of-land thrust out there, built around the seasons, flipping from calm, somber, spectacular, and quiet to a beautiful and sometimes hilarious mix of locals, wash-ashores, and tourists," he said. "The thing that unifies all of us who visit is the sea and the beach. We want to help everyone take care of that resource now and in the future."

Willie's legacy

To others, the company's choice to prioritize the earth may be inspiring, but for Enriquez, his inspiration came from his friend and former co-CEO Willie, the business' namesake.

"We started these cleanups last year on Cape Cod as a way to honor Willie, our late founder, and give back to the beaches where our drink was born," he said. "We want to help people feel like they can make change, build a more sustainable planet, take care of their home, and have fun. The dream is one day we build a movement to clean every beach in the U.S in Willie's name."

Looking ahead

In the future, the company wants to



expand its reach every year to encompass more coastal areas. The current cleanups will restore over 500 miles of coastline, help analyze the source of plastic waste on beaches, and prevent any damage to aquatic life that has been negatively impacted by improper plastic disposal.

said. "There's nothing that's so intimate like this on the bay. I think many people aren't comfortable in a large crowd, so this offers them to host a small gathering of friends and family with more control.

The recently renovated ship will depart from the Bay Shore Marina on South Clinton Avenue, but individuals can be picked up and dropped off at any location along the bay, Tartaglia said. The vessel's first maiden voyage took place in mid-May.

Private events and charters range in price from \$1,300 for a Monday-Thursday daytime or brunch sailing, or up to \$2,500 for a weekend sunset outing. All bookings come with two certified deckhands and a captain.

Bayside travelers also have plenty of light snacks and cold appetizer options,

including crudite platters, heroes, fruit platters and more. While full meal capa-

bilities are not currently offered, the business hopes to expand its onboard kitchen and develop a full menu in the future, Tartaglia said.

"The main focus here, right now, is the reat South Bay, the scenery, and the craft cocktails," Tartaglia said.

"We envision this as expanding to something suitable for larger events, like full-scale events like weddings, in the future," he said.


Mooney also said he foresees Shoreline expanding to host events like weddings or galas down the line.
