Local artist to direct art gallery

Jewelry designer will scout artists for exhibitions

A sanctuary and stage for fine arts, the Bay Area Friends of the Fine Arts (BAFFA) Gallery at the Gillette House in downtown Sayville is a mainstay and focal point for the artistic community of the South Shore.

Jeanette Leonard, a Blue Point artist, will now serve as BAFFA gallery's manager, a position she was uniquely qualified for as a graduate of FIT and jewelry designer.

"I have been part of a number of local arts organizations in Suffolk County and through those memberships, plus my participation in craft fairs, I have cultivated a long list of artists whose work would be perfect for an exhibition at BAFFA," said Leonard.

Leonard became a member of the BAFFA family in the fall of 2021 when she joined the BAFFA chorus.

"She immediately impressed everyone with her willingness to help with any-

thing that needed to be done, as well as her sunny disposition and outgoing personality," said Donna Smosky, vice president of BAFFA, adding, "When she helped with BAFFA's student art shows this spring, we also discovered that she is a highly organized person who readily grasps what needs to be done and then figures out a way to make it happen. All of these fine attributes, combined with her degree in fine arts from FIT, made her a perfect fit as our new gallery manager."

Leonard, who owns Blue Harbor Jewelry, which features up-scale, up-cycled beach glass, known for intricate wire wrapping, recently began making clay-infused/encapsulated necklaces that mimic a cross between Byzantine decadence in structure and Mediterranean earthiness in presentation.

Upon being appointed to manager, Leonard modernized the distinctive BAFFA logo with cleaner lines and contemporary font.

"As someone who makes art, I feel more connected to living artists and their creative process," said Leonard.

While it has been less than a month since Leonard has been installed in her

The second-oldest church in Suffolk County, dating back to colonial times, St. John's in Oakdale has inspired art and ardor for over 250 years of

its history. On Wednesday, July 20, it provided itself as a muse for both the Patchogue Arts Council sketch club and photography club.

With over two-dozen artists in attendance, St. John's was a centerpiece for contemporary art

expression. The Oakdale Historical Society is one of a number of caretakers of the building and the surrounding land, especially the cemetery that has Revolutionary War-era graves.

With most statues on the grounds being gifted to St. John's,

Long Island music ensemble to make New York City debut



Strings Attached, a unique Long Island music ensemble based in Great River, will be making their New York City debut on Friday, Aug. 12, at the "Kolstein Performance Showcase" at the landmark prestigious Essex House. The performance is free and open to the public, as a community service sponsored by The Kolstein Center.

"The mission of our performance showcase is featuring emerging artists... string musicians who deserve a recognized venue to present their talents," said Manny Alvarez, the president of Kolstein. "When I discovered Strings Attached, these musicians have earned this opportunity because of their demonstrated consistent study of their instruments, which includes practice, rehearsals, and many public service performances throughout Suffolk County."

Strings Attached is led by Barbara Llobell, a retired educator from Great River who has studied violin for many years. Llobell had been an instructor of competitive marching bands and winter guards. Llobell also plays guitar and has been studying the cel-

lo over the past year. According to Llobell, "Strings Attached is a serendipitous product of the pandemic. It began as a group of four violinists planning to play a garden tour canceled by the lockdown. It morphed into an ensemble of players sharing music and friendship."

Today, the ensemble welcomes players of all ages and abilities and has grown to 11 musicians. Over the past two years, the ensemble has performed locally and is one of the groups that has recorded music for "The BAFFA Beat Goes On," an online series of videos created during the pandemic to keep BAFFA (Bay Area Friends of the Fine Arts, Sayville, N.Y.) alive.

Local bar honors one of its own

Charity event to raise money for scholarship

On Saturday, Aug. 6, Momo's Too, in Bayport, will be hosting a fundraiser in honor of one of the pub's most beloved bartenders, Billy Schulz, who died.

Funds collected will go to benefit the Kortright Cares Foundation.

"Billy started going to Momo's when he turned 21 and loved the atmosphere. He enjoyed sports and it was the local bar, so he always loved hanging out with friends at the Holbrook location," said Sam Beccaris, a veteran bartender at both Momo's locations, adding, "Fast-forward a few years and he started bartending at Momo's and quickly became part of the Momo's family. We are all very close and he fit in instantly."

Rich Comunale, owner of Momo's and Momo's Too, along with his team, decided to host the fundraiser at the pub because it was Schulz's favorite place and he had "become family" as part of the crew.

Beccaris said, "Billy was a great friend." She had met him at the age of 13 and remained friends until his death two months before turning 27.

"He was a firecracker of a human; he was loud, and he always had the room laughing. He would do anything to make you smile if you were having a bad day, and he would have given the shirt off his back to help whoever, whenever.



Billy Schulz was a beloved bartender and friend of the Momo's family. His death was painful for the Momo's crew and the fundraiser held in his honor on August 6 is seen as a way to pay tribute to Schulz for his beautiful spirit and warm soul.

He loved sports, and he loved kids—I'm pretty sure his favorite job ever was Saf-T-Swim."

Others describe Schulz as incredibly good-humored and caring of all, noting that the fundraiser in his honor would

have made him proud.

The day will feature Chinese auctions, a 50/50 raffle, and T-shirts for purchase.

Those who cannot attend the fundraiser and want to donate are encouraged to come to either location and leave the donation for Beccaris or Comunale.

In addition, donations can be made directly to Kortrightkares.org and with a note that the donation is for the "Billy Schulz memorial."

"We are hoping to do this fundraiser annually to honor Billy and to bring all of his friends and family together," said Comunale.

The Kortright Kares Foundation is a Section 501(c) charitable organization that supports youth in discovering their unique strengths and passions to create a positive springboard for exploration and growth.

A scholarship program was established for candidates desiring to participate in travel and after-school athletic programs.

"The scholarships will assist young men and women who pursue athletic excellence, academic success, character development and prepare them to become leaders," according to Kortright Foundation's mission statement.

Scholarships may provide up to \$2500 tuition assistance for students participating in these programs.

Eligible students may apply for the scholarship by completing an application on at Kortrightkares.org website.

Momo's hopes to make the fundraising event an annual one to honor Schulz with a scholarship in his name. ■

photography club leader Holly Hunt was particularly moved to be in attendance, as her "family has dedicated a fountain and bench to grounds in memory of my late mother, who would visit the property often to walk the ivy labyrinth."

Dating back to 1689, when it was known as Charlotte Church, St. John's was the "mother church" to many of the Town of Islip's surrounding churches that still function today.

St. John's was the name bestowed to the church in 1764 when it served as a hospital for the Revolutionary War.

Running mostly on volunteerism and funds raised from the attached thrift store, St. John's most recently had a 5K fundraiser in its honor that had over 500 runners. The money raised from the Firecracker Run will go towards new windows for the church.

"We wanted to help in those efforts and will be doing so by selling the sketches and photographs captured at the St. John's field trip at the March of the Scarecrow event at St John's on Oct. 23 from 9 a.m. to noon," said Hunt.

The event was held between to 6 to 8 p.m. and Hunt said, "Honestly, the best light to photograph in is at dusk. This is no different for St John's."

The architecture of the church, its history, and beauty drew PAC organizers to host a field trip to the over 250-year-old church. With the stained-glass windows and details of woodwork serving as highlights for the artists, many perspectives were covered by the attendees.

"The upstairs of the church, where the servants gathered, offered a sky view that was perfect for sketching," said Mark Propper, the leader of the sketch club.

The front windows, donated to St. John's by another house of worship in Brooklyn, are originally from a medieval church in France. ■

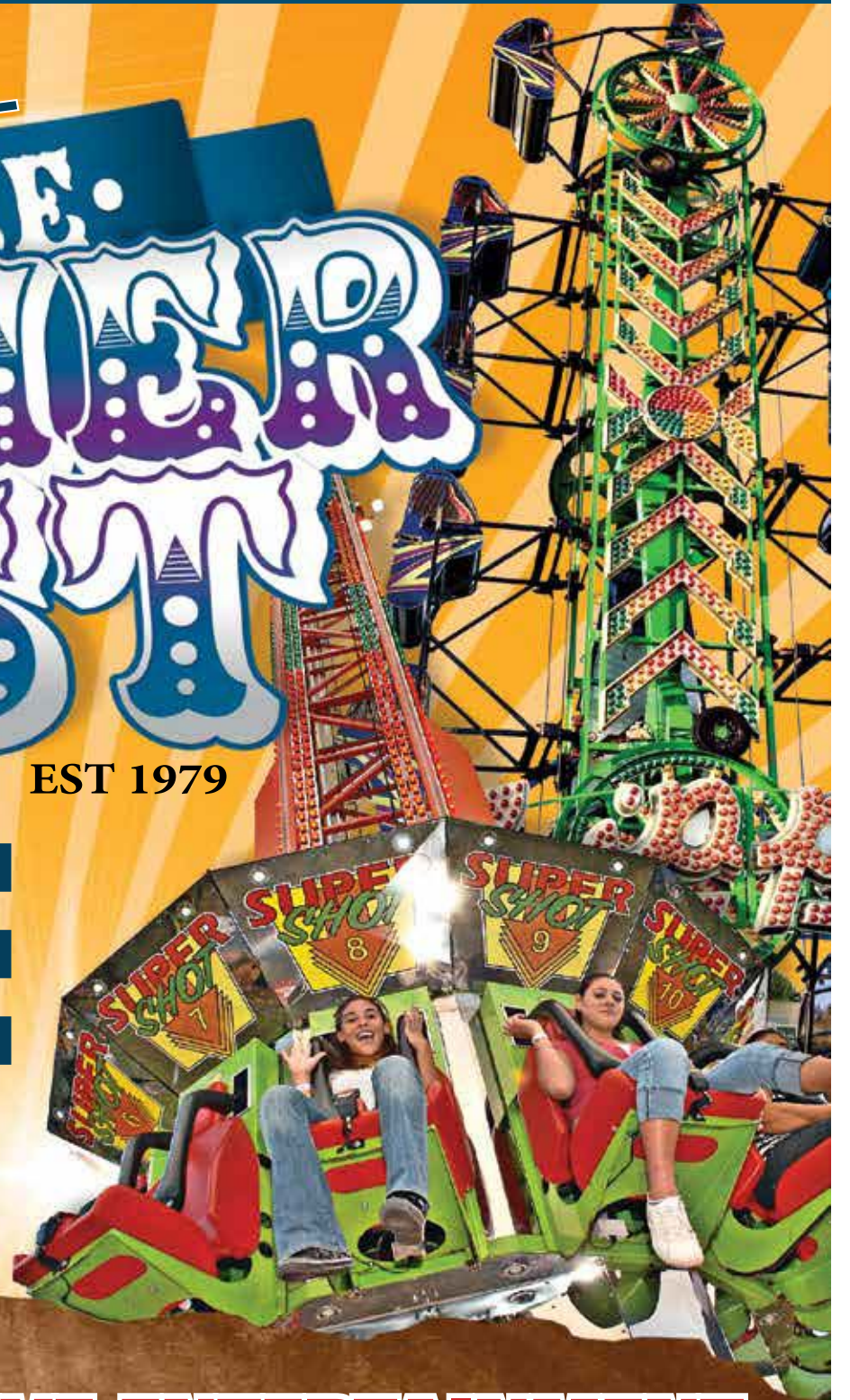

Beat the heat with these summer tips

Summer can bring many happy memories—family vacations, summer camp, days at the shore, staying up late and watching the sun set. No matter what your summer traditions include, be sure to keep in mind your heart and brain health throughout the longer daylight hours.

According to the American Heart Association, heart disease and stroke remain the No. 1 and No. 5 causes of death in the U.S., yet a majority of these diseases are preventable with simple lifestyle modifications, such as healthy eating and regular exercise.

Here are the American Heart Association's top 10 tips for a heart-healthy summer:

1. Learn Hands-Only CPR. Days by the pool and ocean can be fun, but always be prepared for the unthinkable. Hands-Only CPR has only two steps: If you see a teen or adult suddenly collapse, 1) Call 9-1-1, and 2) Press hard and fast in the center of the chest. View a short video by visiting www.heart.org/handsonlycpr.
2. Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of fluids (preferably water) throughout the day and before, during and after working out to maintain salt-water balance. Avoid caffeine and alcoholic beverages.
3. Exercise smarter, not harder. Plan your workout for the cooler parts of the day – either early morning or early evening when the sun's radiation is at its least. If you must exercise during the hottest part of the day or in high humidity, decrease exercise intensity and duration. And remember, you can get a great workout indoors by going to a gym or walking at the mall.
4. Dress the part. Wear minimal amounts of clothing that allow for quick evaporation of sweat. Choose lightweight, light-colored and breathable fabrics, such as cotton.
5. Choose fresh veggies. Take advantage of fresh seasonal veggies. Load up skewers with mushrooms, peppers, cherry tomatoes, zucchini, yellow squash or other veggies. Spray lightly with olive oil cooking spray and grill until lightly blackened.
6. Pack to play. When taking a family road trip, plan to incorporate regular physical activity into your daily routine. Pack a football, soccer ball, Frisbee or paddle ball so that you can be physically active while away.
7. Enjoy fruit pops. Homemade freezer pops are an easy, fun treat for kids to make and enjoy. Mash up fruit like peaches, grapes, berries or watermelon and put into paper cups, insert a popsicle stick and freeze overnight.
8. Protect yourself from the sun.

Wear wide-brimmed hats, always apply water-resistant sunscreen with at least SPF 15 and reapply sunscreen every 2 hours.

9. Head indoors. When the heat gets unbearable, try indoor activities at your local YMCA or rec center like basketball, swimming, yoga or racquetball.
10. Know the signs of heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion:

- headaches
- heavy sweating
- cold, moist skin, chills
- dizziness or fainting
- a weak and rapid pulse
- muscle cramps
- fast, shallow breathing
- nausea, vomiting or both

If you experience these symptoms, move to a cooler place, stop exercising and cool down immediately by dousing yourself with cold water and rehydrating. You may need to seek medical attention.

Symptoms of heat stroke:

- warm, dry skin with no sweating
- strong and rapid pulse
- confusion and/or unconsciousness
- high fever
- throbbing headaches
- nausea, vomiting or both

If you experience these symptoms, seek medical attention right away.

1,800 additional vaccine doses allotted to the county

On Wednesday, July 20, Suffolk county executive Steve Bellone held a press conference where he discussed the state of the monkeypox virus in Suffolk County and announced that the county was receiving an additional 1,800 doses of the vaccine from New York State, the county's largest allotment to date.

Two weeks ago, the county began administering the monkeypox vaccine on Fire Island and last week the county began administering vaccines on the mainland. On Wednesday, July 27, the county offered 250 vaccines at the Northwell Health Community Center in the Westfield Mall in Bay Shore.

Stony Brook University Hospital will be hosting clinics in Hampton Bays at the Edie Windsor Healthcare Clinic on Monday, July 25, Wednesday July 27 and Friday, July 29. On Monday, Aug. 1 and Wednesday, Aug. 3, there will be additional appointments available as well. Vaccines are offered by appointment only. More information and appointments can be found at suffolkcountyny.gov/monkeypox. According to the New York State Department of Health, as of July 25, Suffolk County had reported 16 confirmed monkeypox cases.

Bellone noted that the county is keeping a small number of vaccines for high-risk contacts for any new cases that may come up. The vaccine is a two-dose vaccination administered

28 days apart. Immunity and the high antibody response is not achieved until two weeks after the second vaccination.

Matthew McMorrow, Gov. Kathy Hochul's deputy director of constituency affairs, was also on hand at Bellone's press conference, and reiterated what Hochul had recently stated: that New York continues to face a disproportionate number of monkeypox cases.

Morrow also noted that "while anyone can get or spread monkeypox, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, we really owe it to the affected communities to be honest about what the data is telling us, and that is that the LGBTQ community is experiencing the highest rate of infection right now, and we need to share that information with people so that they can protect themselves.

"In the current outbreak of monkeypox, it's primarily spreading among social networks of gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men through close, prolonged physical contact, including sex or other intimate activity," Morrow said.

According to Suffolk County, the symptoms of monkeypox are rashes, bumps, or blisters that may appear on or around the genitals or in other areas such as hands, feet, chest, or face. They may be similar in appearance to common sexual transmitted infections (STIs) and other common skin ailments such as poison ivy. Other symptoms include flu-like symptoms such as fever, headache, muscle aches, chills and fatigue. These symptoms may occur before or after the rash appears or not at all. ■

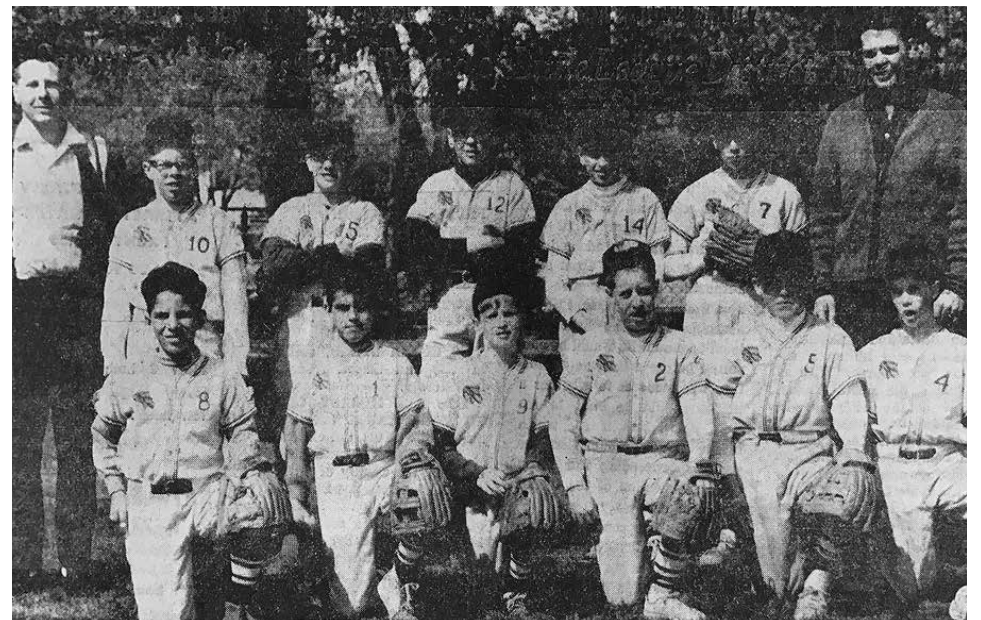

Helping health care workers stay whole

SSUH opens new employee wellness center

The past few years have been extraordinarily difficult for workers in the health care field. The COVID-19 pandemic and long work hours have driven many health workers to burnout.

According to the Association of Medical Colleges, physician demand will continue to grow faster than supply, leading to a shortage of between 54,100 and 139,000 physicians by 2033. The most alarming gaps are expected in primary and rural communities.

To help combat burnout and focus on the entire well-being of its employees, South Shore University Hospital in Bay Shore recently opened a wellness center. Part gym, part yoga studio and part emotional wellness center, the space is designed as a place of respite for its employees.

Dr. Heidi Levine, emergency room physician and wellness center leader at SSUH, said the idea for the wellness center was presented right before the pandemic, but due to COVID-19, the idea was placed on pause. The conversation about the center was picked back up again in the early fall of 2021, which led to the center's creation.

The center features workout machines, including the popular Peloton bike, as well as a room for yoga, with mats and blocks provided.

During the opening week of the center, some trial classes were offered to employees, but Andrew Adrian, senior

finance and operations management associate, said that they are currently working on setting up a class schedule and a way for employees to register for classes.

Dr. Levine noted that the wellness center is one of the many ways SSUH has been stepping up their commitment to employee wellness in the last few years.

During COVID, the hospital set up a

little pseudo-grocery store for employees to pick up fresh food and essentials.

"The grocery store was amazing," Dr. Levine said. "Honestly, where I live, I couldn't even get things like toilet paper, and I have a family of five, so you can imagine. It was really great being able to get beautiful, fresh produce, which was off the shelves."

Last September, the hospital had a Wellness Week. September is National Suicide Awareness Month and National Physician Suicide Awareness Day is on Sept. 17. The week featured a farmers' market, raffles, chair yoga, and even financial advisors that employees could speak to about financial wellness.

"Everybody has something different that's their priority, so we wanted to try and cover as many bases as we could," Dr. Levine said.

In June, for Pride Month, and in the aftermath of the mass shootings in Uvalde, Texas, and Buffalo, the hospital held a Day of Embrace. Town of Islip supervi-

sor Angie Carpenter came and spoke at the hospital to show support to the staff.

In addition, there is a wellness cart that comes to each floor that has little self-care items that employees can take, such as water, granola bars, or hand lotion. Dr. Levine said that Chapstick is the cart's biggest hit, even over chocolate.

"It's just something to say, 'It's okay to stop in the middle of the day and take care of yourself,'" Dr. Levine said. "Traditionally, medicine, whether it's nursing or if you're a physician, it's always just 'go.' You're hardcore, you're going to push through. It doesn't matter if you're hungry, tired, or need the facilities. You just push through. That's kind of how it's been. And that also includes pushing down emotions, and that's not what we want. That's not what keeps people whole. That does, unfortunately, lead to emotional exhaustion and burnout."

In August, SSUH will be tabling about drug abuse awareness, not only in the hospital, but in the emergency department.

"We want to be able to inform our community," Dr. Levine said. "We want to get Narcan kits out there. We will be tabling outside the main entrance of the ER. That way, we're not only educating our staff, but we're educating our community as well."

"Now we have a physical structure to be the sort of vision and symbol for all of these different initiatives," Adrian said. "We used to have all of these different events that happen outside, but now we have them outside the wellness or even in the wellness center, and now you have this sort of symbol to be like, this is wellness. It just gives it an actual space to kind of live and breathe and evolve. It's not only just a gym. It can have all these different educational purposes, too."

The new wellness center is open from 5 a.m. to midnight every day and is located right by the employee entrance, making it convenient for workers to stop by before or after a shift.

For Dr. Levine, the new center is the "cherry on top of the sundae" for all the hard work she and Adrian have put into helping employees as a whole, and she hopes to continue growing the center and what it offers. ■

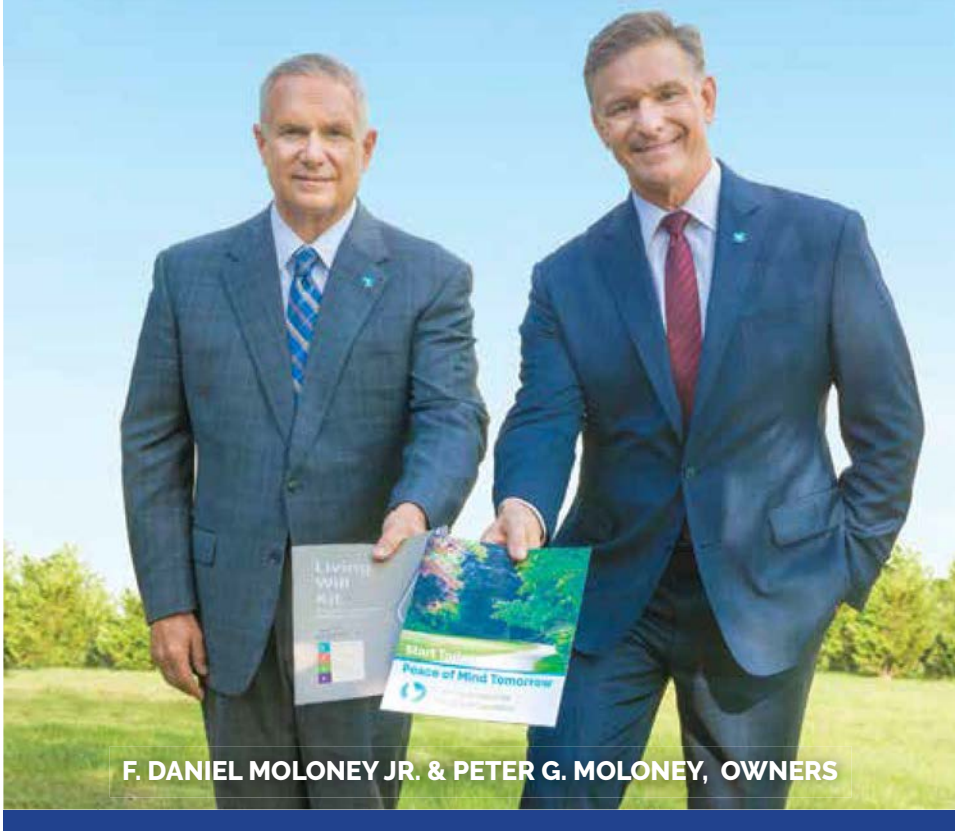

On Thursday, July 21, The Bayport-Blue Point Heritage Association hosted the second of its summer series of concerts at Memorial Park in Bayport.

With no available spots for parking in the immediate and surrounding streets and a full lawn, the event was well attended by both locals and those looking for a beautiful summer night out with live music.

Albums We Love played classics that many grooved to in lawn chairs or standing, as the favorite tunes emanated from the gazebo.

Albums We Love is a fine fixture of the vibrant Long Island music scene, often featuring guest appearances from members of other local bands.

Despite an unplanned hiatus in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19, the band was able to present its 2022 selection: "Déjà Vu" by Crosby, Stills, Nash, and Young.

Aside from the Bayport concert, the band has also played their set at Oakdale Yacht Club and will be playing at JT's Farmhouse on July 31 and at Bradstock on Sept. 3.

Albums We Love was formed in 2013 as an offshoot of the Dowling College World Music Ensemble.

It began as a suggestion among members of that group to "deviate from its ordinary selection of traditional and contemporary global folk music and to experiment with something more accessible and grounded in their varied individual musical tastes," according to the

band's website.

The plan was to collaborate with members of other local bands for a one-off performance of Peter Gabriel's "So" album. With the performance incredibly well received and after several encore performances, the group became official.

"The formula was simple, yet elusive: Pick a different classic album each year and re-create it as authentically as possible. Every year, traditionally in November, the band gets together to decide," said the band.

The name Albums We Love reflects the notion that each member needs to be emotionally invested in an album for the group to select a project.

The Bayport-Blue Point Heritage Association sponsors two free concerts every



summer to "...give back to the community for supporting us in our fundraising efforts throughout the year," said Mary Bailey, president of the association, adding, "The events feature local bands, and everyone comes from Bayport and Blue Point and beyond to support us and them. It's a great night for everyone."

Earlier this summer, in June, the BBP Heritage Association had Soundswell, with over 200 people in attendance.

"We're very lucky to have these bands and the Bayport Memorial Park to share a summer evening with our community," said Bailey.

In addition to the concert, the BBP Heritage Association has other events this summer, including its historic boat cruise on Aug. 10, a local history bike tour Sept 17, and Christmas at Meadow Croft on Dec. 3-4.

The BBP Heritage Association is also working with local Bayport-Blue Point families to put together the autumn house tour on Oct. 23. ■

new position, Smosky said, "We have already had positive changes in the furnishing at the gallery as well as increased publicity for our shows, as she [Leonard] has attracted new artists whose work will be shown throughout the year."

One of Leonard's first redecorating moves was to eject an old particle board desk that cramped the back room of the gallery.

With some shows, especially the elementary art show, featuring over 100 pieces of work, it was important to Leonard to maximize the viewing potential of the gallery for the crowds anticipated for student shows based on the throngs of attendees this past year.

While certain months are blocked off for returning artist groups such as Women Sharing Art, Bell Street Artists, and Plein Air Limner Society, the calendar is mostly open for Leonard's scheduling, with most exhibitions likely to be two weekends each.

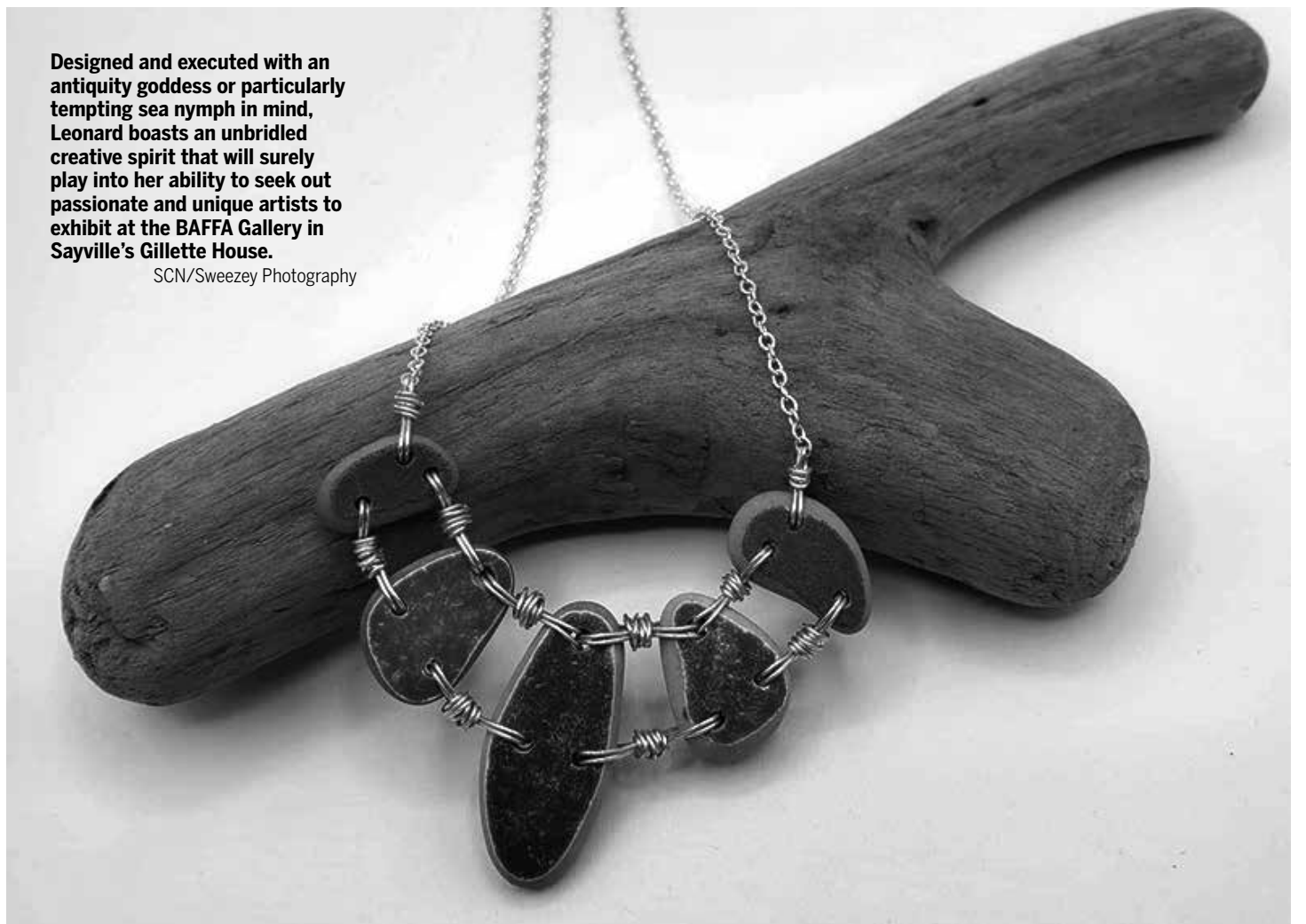
Founded in 1968, BAFFA began with community members in Bayport and Blue Point fundraising for a piano for the local high school after a member's daughter was unable to give a recital.

A library with a lot of firsts

The Innovative/Alternative Onsite Sewage Disposal Systems at the Bayport-Blue Point Library were quietly working away Thursday morning, reducing nitrogen discharge into groundwater, and ultimately into the Great South Bay. All you saw were nice grassy mounds, one on the east and one on the west sides of the building, that fit into the landscape; the systems were underneath.

BLUE POINT Library officials and their board aimed at being innovative, and the BBP Library is the first library in Suffolk County to have these systems. So, a thank-you ceremony took place honoring the people who helped, especially Suffolk County, which awarded a \$250,000 Water Quality Protection and Restoration Program and Land Stewardship Initiative grant for the \$522,056 project.

The application was filed in October 2019, library director Mike Firestone said, via then-Legis. Rob Calarco's office, who supported it. The grant application required support from the community, and that was key. "We got letters from the Bayport and Blue Point civics, Save the Great South Bay, The Nature Conservancy, also from [then-] Legis. Anthony Piccirillo and councilman Neil Foley," said Firestone. "It's good to be a role model."

"Chris Clapp, who was at The Nature Conservancy at the time, helped me a lot with output and what we were saving," Firestone said. Clapp is now executive director of The Ocean Sewage Alliance.

The project upgraded two existing sanitary systems that will reduce nitrogen discharge by approximately 247 pounds per year. "The water table is high here," Firestone pointed out. And the library is a short distance from the Great South Bay.

Board president Ron Devine led the thank-yous inside; they included Gary Gonzalez, vice president and project-executive of Park East Construction.

Deputy county executive Peter Scully, known as the water-quality czar, was asked if any other libraries were reaching out to emulate Bayport-Blue Point's initiative. "The Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Library," he answered.

"They've been looking to go in this direction."

The Nature Conservancy Long Island policy advisor Kevin McDonald added that the Springs School District in East Hampton implemented an I/A Sewage Disposal System, just after the BBP Library.

"We didn't turn the systems on until a couple of weeks before the grand opening," said Firestone of the December opening, which turned into a lovefest; 1,000 people turned out for it.

Outside the library, glamping equipment had been

erected, and the library was readying for a Beatles concert that night. "We have over 10,000 who come here a month," he said, a 35 to 40 percent increase. There were 200 programs a month and 400 organizations and groups book their rooms for meetings.

Scully said the BBP Library installation was part of a broader initiative. "We now have a 50-year plan," he said of the county. "IA systems are the answer. It takes a willingness from the community, and I want to thank the board for taking the lead." ■

Planning board meeting recap

On Wednesday, July 13, the Town of Islip planning board held their monthly meeting.

ISLIP TOWN The board held a public hearing and granted a site plan modification to Augusto Malandrucolo and 950 Johnson Avenue, LLC. The applicant requested a buffer relaxation in connection with the expansion of an existing office/industrial building in order to change the use to a mini storage building. The site located at 950 Johnson Avenue in Ronkonkoma is on the south side of Johnson Avenue, 100 feet east of Chestnut Avenue. Joseph Clemens of German and Clemens Architecture, P.C., presented to the board for his client. The presently occupied office/industrial building is 29,100 square feet and the new expansion would add a second-story addition and an addition off the rear of the building in order to convert that use to a mini storage facility. The new addi-

tion would make the building approximately 67,000 square feet. The buffer relaxation would also allow for landscaping.

The board voted to grant the application from Kenneth Lautsch for a planning board certificate of appropriateness for the installation of skylights and other in-kind replacements in the planned landmark preservation district. The site is located at 17 Quality Street in Oakdale. ■

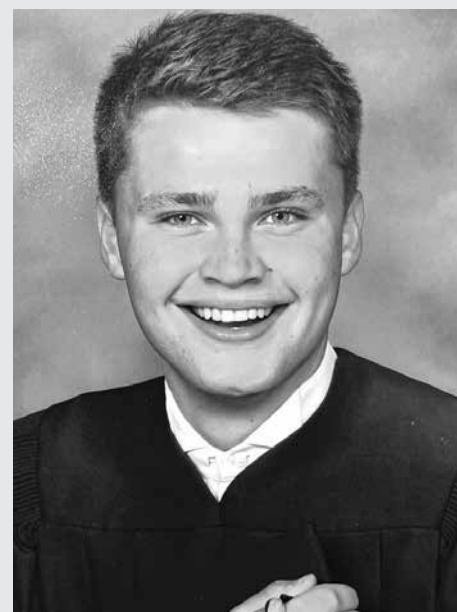
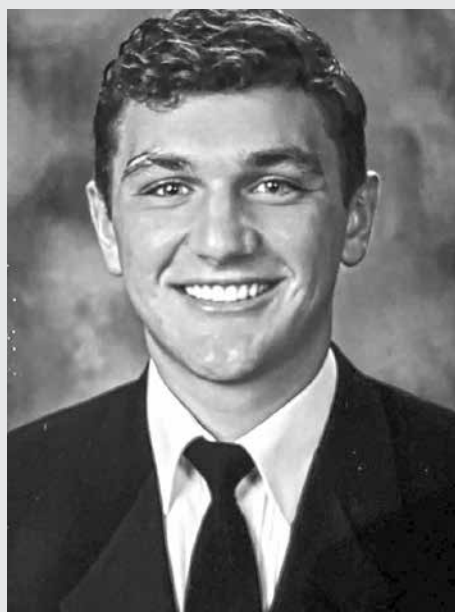
Sayville Garden Club announces scholarship award winners
