Medford Fire Department celebrates centennial anniversary

Parade and iconic commemorative challenge coin

In 1922, the Tomb of Tutankhamen was discovered by explorers in the Valley of the Kings in Egypt, unleashing a wave of Egyptomania that influenced the decadent Art Deco movement, synonymous with the Roaring '20s streamlined aesthetic, evoking the ancient past on one hand while mirroring the mechanized future of the Industrial Revolution on the other. Meanwhile, Prohibition laws were strengthened in the United States to make homebrewing (or bathtub gin) illegal. That same year, the Lincoln Memorial was dedicated in Washington, D.C., and Irish writer James Joyce published his groundbreaking modernist novel "Ulysses." The year 1922 was also when the nascent Medford Fire Department was established. It was then that it began its surprising trajectory, complete with a

Patchogue plans for first-ever Hispanic heritage parade!

Date set for Oct. 2 at noon

After years in the planning, COVID-19 shutdowns, and the appointment of Patchogue's first Latina trustee, Patchogue Village is finally ready to host its first-ever Hispanic heritage parade, set for this fall.

The event, scheduled to take place at noon on Sunday, Oct. 2, will feature a bilingual mix of Hispanic parade dancers from the Greater Patchogue Foundation's Cultural Heritage committee, and more.

David Kennedy, executive director of the Greater Patchogue Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber is happy to co-sponsor the parade with the village.

"This is something very important to our very vibrant Hispanic community, and it has been a priority for us for years," he said, happy to finally set a date. "We are looking forward to adding it to our many culturally diverse events."

According to trustee Lizbeth Carrillo, organizer of the event, the idea of the parade was to not only showcase the Hispanic community with their differences, but to also show all their similarities through bilingual expression.

"We are different, these are our beautiful colors, look at our culture and dance, but at the same time we are the same, just like you," Carrillo explained of her thought process. "We're inviting the community to come celebrate."

She chose "bilingual" as the theme so that no one feels out of place and the English-speaking community can feel more inclusive, as a learning and educational experience about the Hispanic culture.

However, since the event is the first of its kind, the budget for the parade is virtually zero, she said, explaining they are currently seeking business sponsors. Thus far, one of their first

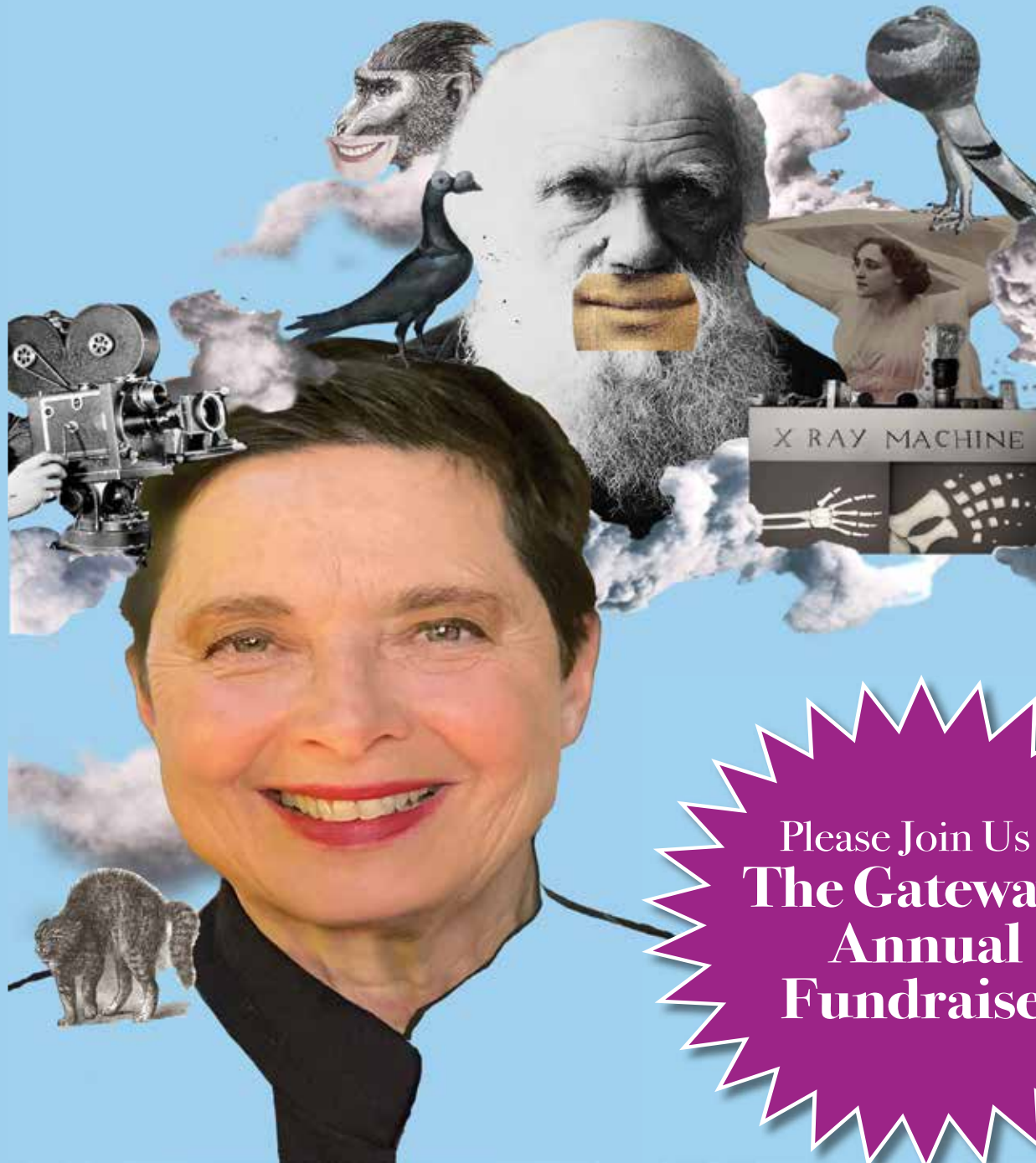

Final scope ready for proposed AIREF Station Road Logistics Center

Area to be cleared once EMS safety egress concerns are addressed

The Town of Brookhaven Planning Board, as lead agency, has completed what was believed to be the final scope for the proposed AIREF Station Road Logistics Center. The plan, which has not yet been approved, is available to be viewed from the Town of Brookhaven Department of Planning, Environmental, and Land Management and can be seen online at brookhavenny.gov.

This action involves the construction of a warehousing and distribution facility and trucking terminal, which consists of three buildings totaling approximately 523,100 square feet of gross floor area on a plot of 51.95 acres of L-Industrial-1-zoned properties in Bellport. The trio of buildings will house an aggregate total of about

496,630 square feet of warehouse storage space and 26,470 square feet of facility office space. This proposed project is set to be located on the south side of Woodside Avenue, east of Station Road in Bellport.

"They filed a site plan, and that site plan took criticism, apparently from the emergency medical service community because of the fact that the curb cut to go in and out of this facility, was on Station Road," said Suffolk County Legis. Jim Mazzarella.

Mazzarella, of District 3, is the county legislator of the area that this currently uncleared area falls under. He explained why the emergency fire and ambulance community reached out to him to voice their vehement concern over the proposed plan as it was originally presented.

"Their resistance was basically because they felt it was unsafe to add the additional traffic onto Station Road because of the fact that there are only two lanes," explained the Republican Moriches legislator. "They also cited some traffic history issues on that stretch of roadway, within a mile, or a half of a mile, in each direction,

of where that curb cut would be on Station Road."

It was this concern, from a community who understands the intricacies and potential pitfalls of this stretch of land well, that was the impetus for the developer to have to come back with a new rendition of a site plan, which would allow access of egress (a path of coming in or going out, especially in an emergency) both to and from the facility, to be on Woodside Avenue, rather than on Station Road.

"So that satisfied the EMS," said Mazzarella. This has not been approved yet.

The developer still has to do a traffic study and provide documentation to the Suffolk County Department of Public Works and their traffic division, to be granted permission to make the necessary curb cut on Woodside Road.

While Mazzarella pointed out that his expertise does not lie in traffic engineering, he agreed that this seemed like a "much safer" way for the project to be undertaken in this already densely trafficked area.

"I'm not really in favor of them having the egress on Station Road because, honestly, it's a roadway that has one lane in each direction, so to add trucking and traffic, I don't believe that road is equipped for that," said Mazzarella, who believes it would be a detriment to the area, where residents come in and out of the Bellport community and use Station Road regularly. "I'm not in favor of the Station Road egress, but that's what's on the site plan, so they have to go back and again apply for permission to go back and again apply for permission to switch that over to Woodside."

Mazzarella is supportive of the project, if the changes strongly urged for by the local EMS community are heeded. If anyone has any questions or concerns about the upcoming AIREF Station Road Logistics Center, they should contact their local elected official to find out about any upcoming meetings taking place, as the project goes back to the drawing board with community safety and traffic control in mind. ■

40th annual World Peace Vigil

Event supports Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons

There is a quote attributed to Albert Einstein which states, "I do not know with what weapons World War III will be fought, but World War IV will be fought with sticks and stones." This is a stark sentiment, which echoes the message sent by the South Country Peace Group in alliance with the North Country Peace Group, who co-sponsored the solemn event held on Saturday, Aug. 6 at 5 p.m. beginning at the aptly named peace pole at South Country Library in Bellport.

The peace seekers joined there for a silent procession to the Bellport Village Marina for the 40th annual World Peace Vigil and Community Dedication to Peace, commemorating the 77th anniversary of the nuclear destruction of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The Japanese city of Hiroshima also paused to reflect this year, as they do annually, on the anniversary of that mournful day, joined in solidarity by countless people around the world, in remembrance of the U.S. attack in which

140,000 people perished in the final throes of World War II.

Representatives from 99 nations and the European Union gathered for the annual ceremony at Peace Memorial Park, where the mourners joined for a moment of silence at 8:15 a.m., the precise moment the U.S. uranium bomb detonated over the city on Aug. 6, 1945. Three days later, a second bomb would take the lives of another 70,000 men, women, and children in Nagasaki.

This much larger gathering, where the unthinkable incident took place, telegraphed to the world a similar message that those gathered at the peace vigil in Bellport want to broadcast to the community and to the planet: a plea for the elimination of all nuclear weapons. This year's remembrances took on a new urgency, in the uncertain aftermath of the invasion of Ukraine by Russia, with looming fears of a new nuclear arms race, with weapons available that are even deadlier than the ones used in 1945.

Susan Perretti was at the event in Bellport, representing the North Country Peace Group based in Setauket. Perretti was originally a part of the SCPG when she lived in this area. She stressed the importance of informing the younger generations about this dark moment in history, because many are not even aware of it.

"I think it's important to remember," she said simply. "This has been a very faithful annual vigil and march."

Michelle Santantonio, the longtime, dedicated chairperson of the SCPG, officiated the event, where attendees were encouraged to don white, the traditional Japanese color of mourning. Special guest speakers and performers included Jason Neal, giving his poetic invocation and reflections. He opened with a call for open discourse to help find peace in these polarizing times:

"In order for us to realize peace, we must expand our circles of peace," said Neal.

Catherine Green sung a capella, including a heartrending rendition of the poem, "Little Girl of Hiroshima." It was about a 7-year-old girl who lost her life that fateful day and who would have been 84 today had she lived.

In addition, the program included a poetry reading by Diane Atkinson and special guest professor Karl Grossman, journalist, nuclear industry historian, and author of several books, including one he co-authored with professor Christopher Verga called "Cold War Long Island," who was there for a Q&A session.

The pièce de résistance of the program was an emphasis on the existential threat of another nuclear attack, which the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear

Weapons seeks to abolish. Most people are unaware this treaty even exists due to a lack of media coverage, according to Grossman, who is doing everything he can to rectify this glaring omission.

The professor informed that *The Bulletin of Atomic Scientists*, in 2020, moved the infamous Doomsday Clock forward to 100 seconds to midnight, with midnight symbolizing "nuclear annihilation."

The aim of this ambitious nuclear arms embargo is to ban the development, testing, production, stockpiling, stationing, transfer, use and threat of the use of nuclear weapons by all nations. However, as the renowned author and journalist noted, the major impediment to implementing the treaty's objective is that the U.S., Russia, China, France, and the United Kingdom, the five leading "nuclear weapons states," have not signed on to the peace treaty. However, the U.N. treaty, since its inception in 2021, has garnered 88 signatories in 66 state parties globally.

A small-town story with big heart

Fiction debut for local writer

When the world gets bleak, readers always turn to their favorite stories to bring them comfort. “My Year With The Italian Girl,” a new novel by Sayville resident Linda Leuzzi, is sure to become a comfort read for many.

“Girl” is Leuzzi’s fictional debut, as she has eight non-fiction books published. She was previously an editor for the *Long Island Advance* and is a weekly contributing writer. Her novel takes place in Bellport in 1985 and follows three main characters: Vivian, Francesca and Keisha. Vivian is the editor of *The Bellport Evening Star* and hosts Francesca, a teenage exchange student from Catania, for a year. While at school, Francesca befriends Keisha, a Black student at the local high school, and the two team up to compete in the upcoming step competition.

Leuzzi, who herself has hosted multiple international exchange students, said that her mentorship of a Rotary exchange student from Catania, Sicily, helped inspire her story. A few years later, Leuzzi wrote a story on a step program at Bellport High School with Black and white teens. After that, Leuzzi said the story really got off the ground.

Keisha and her family, especially her Aunt Lea, a Broadway dancer, were inspired by several successful Black women Leuzzi has interviewed over the years, including fashion designer Tracy Reese, Dance Theater of Harlem costume designer Zelda Wynn, founder and creator of Sylvia’s Restaurant Sylvia

Woods, actress Charlayne Woodard, and CBS wardrobe head Andrea Ross. Leuzzi also noted that a classmate of hers from Jamaica High School, Tonda, was a big inspiration for Keisha’s character.

A shorter version of the story was serialized weekly in the *Long Island Advance* in the 2000s. Leuzzi put the story aside until her retirement as editor of the *Advance*, in 2016.

A large plot point in the book is Vivian working on an environmental story. The fictionalized Wiley Estate is threatened to be taken over by a developer, and Vivian makes it her mission to get the story. Leuzzi said that that aspect of the book was inspired by one of her heroines, Hathaway Scully of the Scully Estate, in Islip, and the work she did touring people around her estate and taking in injured and sick wildlife.

Making Vivian an editor was fun for Leuzzi, who was able to imbed some stories from her time as a reporter and an editor. She wanted people to see the work that goes into journalism and the industry. Vivian’s love interest is her new neighbor, Ian, from England, who she surprisingly has a lot in common with, if she would only open her heart up.

Leuzzi calls her novel “a love letter to Bellport, if nothing else.”

“This book is uplifting and if it can inspire other people, it’s good,” Leuzzi said.

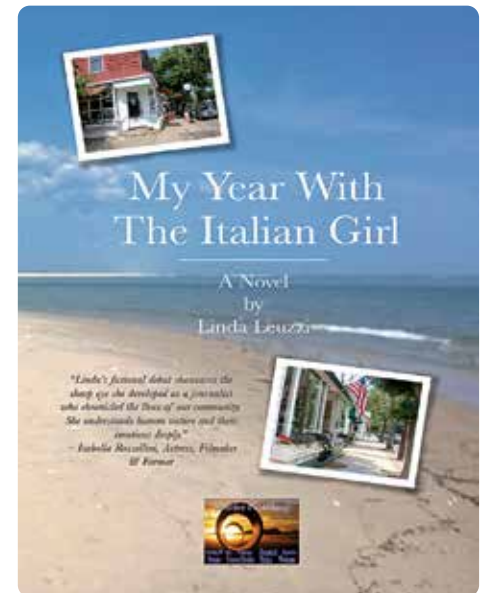
So curl up with a cup of tea and enjoy a small-town story with a big heart.

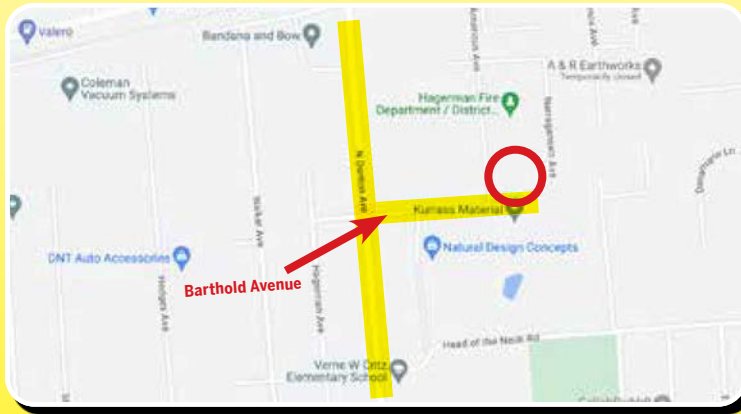

Carport installed and waiting for PSEG hookup

The solar carport now located behind the Patchogue Theatre for the Performing Arts, on Oak Street in Patchogue Village, is officially completed, providing shelter and shade for parked vehicles, lighting at night, and soon enough, power to the grid. The village is currently waiting for the PSEG hookup to start generating power but is ready to go, said BID executive director Dennis Smith, who helped forefront the project.

The Johnson Controls dollar-neutral energy savings project featured a total of 14 energy conservation measures, beginning with work at the Patchogue Theatre for the Performing Arts and ending with the solar carport.

The goals of the project, Christopher Fitzsimmons, Johnson Controls account executive, said during the approval of the project last year, are to overall improve the safety, security and comfort of environments; reduce utility and operational costs; address deferred maintenance costs; leverage utility incentives and

rebates; modernize systems; and define and support renewable energy.

The solar carport, which broke ground earlier in March, is similar to the one installed in Lindenhurst as part of a Johnson Controls project. Patchogue's carport is located in the two eastern-most parking spot areas to the rear of the theatre. The project is expected to generate about 250,000 kilowatts per year, which will be sold back to the grid for about \$32,000, supporting roughly 40 homes.

"It's exciting; we are going to start saving money and it's a good thing," Smith said, also happy with the progress of the project.

He also said four electric vehicle charging stations will be installed at the location utilizing energy directly from the carport. ■

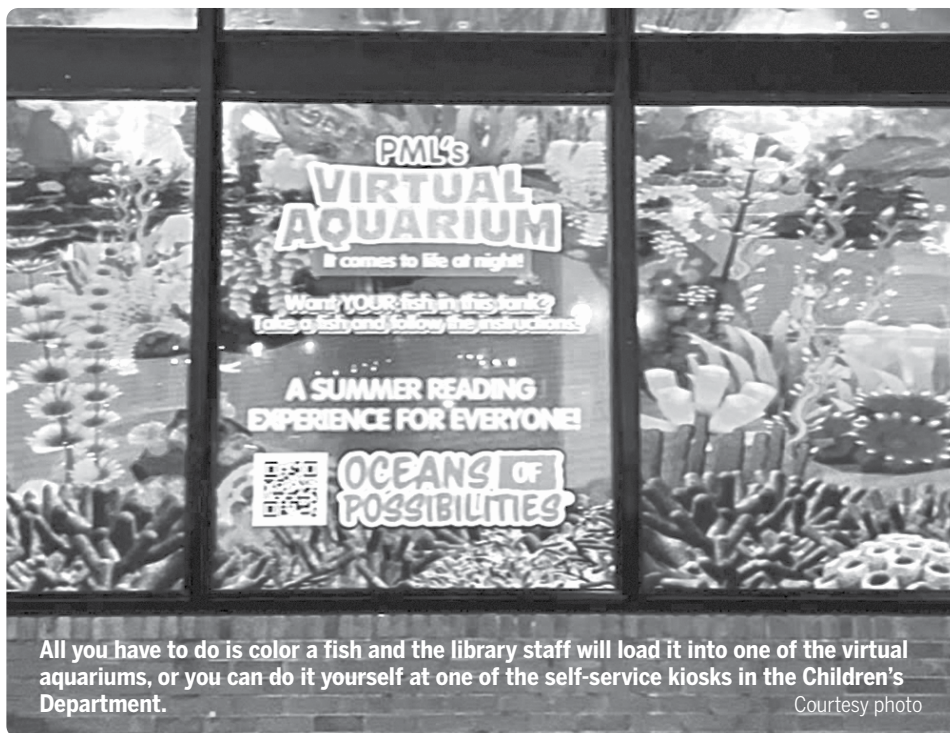
Virtual aquarium now live at the library

Have you caught a glimpse of the Patchogue-Medford Library at night lately? If not, you certainly should, as the window front now features the opportunity to immerse yourself in a 30-foot aquarium with fish, coral reef, and even sharks!

In addition to the "Ocean of Possibilities" virtual reality, the library is also providing the space for children and those children at heart to create their own unique design on one of eight different sea creatures, which will then be augmented and brought to life in an experience known as "augmented reality": an enhanced version of the real physical world that is achieved through the use of digital visual elements, sound, or other sensory stimuli delivered via technology. "While working on the MoCA Lights project last year and learning from our friends at Patchogue Arts Council and North Stream, I could see how the projection process could open up the possibilities to bring this augmented reality experience to our front windows. Their talents and our library's enthusiasm have been the perfect partnership! With this project, we were able to achieve science, technology, engineering, art, and math (also known as S.T.E.A.M.), while still promoting summer reading!" ■

years since its establishment, the Greater Patchogue Foundation has played an important role in improving Patchogue.

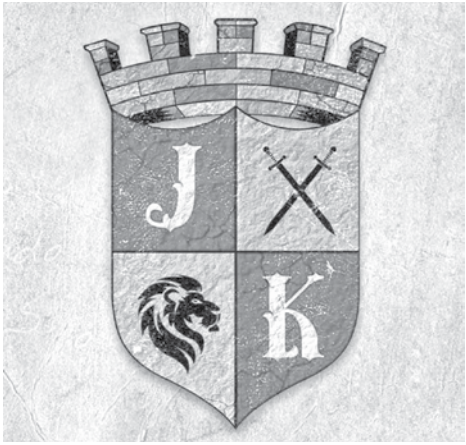

Know your congressional district

Many zip codes are now CD 2

Due to the new New York State congressional maps, many local residents are now in District 2 rather than District 1.

Communities that were formerly in CD 1 and are now in CD 2 include Medford, East Moriches, Center Moriches, Moriches, Mastic, Mastic Beach, Shirley, North Bellport, Brookhaven Hamlet, North Patchogue, East Patchogue, Patchogue, Hagerman and Blue Point.

On May 20, a New York State court approved a new congressional map drawn by the court-appointed neutral expert, Jonathan Cervas. Cervas is a postdoctoral fellow at the Institute for Politics and Strategy at Carnegie Mellon University.

Cervas was appointed after the New York Court of Appeals found a map passed by Democratic legislators to have "Democratic gerrymandering." Before that, New York's bipartisan redistricting commission could not agree on one set of maps and submitted one favoring Republicans and another favoring Democrats. After the bipartisan commission failed to come to an agreement after two proposals, the Democratic-leaning legislature drew its own map. According to state law,

if the legislature rejects two rounds of maps, they may draw their own.

Primary election day is on Tuesday, Aug. 23. The Democratic congressional candidates have no primary opponents and will therefore not be on the ballot until November. Jackie Gordon is the

Democratic candidate in CD 2 and Bridget Fleming is the Democratic candidate in CD 1. On the Republican side for CD 1, Anthony Figliola, Nicholas LaLota and Michelle Bond are running against each other in the primary. For CD 2, incumbent Andrew Garbarino is running

against Robert Cornicelli and Mike Rakebrandt in the August primary.

Increase for retired volunteers; taxpayers expect relief

Town passes seven ambulance district referendums

Town of Brookhaven residents voted to pass seven referendums on Aug. 9 for the special-use districts that fund the not-for-profit ambulance companies in the Town of Brookhaven to modify the existing Volunteer Benefit program known as LOSAP that has not been changed since 1995. However, the Tri-Harbor district received zero votes possibly resulting in a revote or automatic passage.

The modification will now increase the amount of credit a volunteer receives for a year of service from \$20 to \$30, while dropping the eligibility age from 65 to 60. The program is also now being coupled with the recently adopted Revenue Recovery program, agreed to between the eight volunteer ambulance companies and the Town of Brookhaven.

The amendment is applicable to only

those who earn at least one year of service credit for calendar years beginning on Jan. 1, 2023. The monthly payment increases will be effective as of Jan. 1 the following year in the additional service credit was earned.

Local amendments include the South Country Ambulance District, Medford Ambulance District, Mastic Ambulance District, Mastic Beach Ambulance District, and the Shirley Ambulance District.

The current annual cost of funding the South Country's volunteer service award program is \$29,000. The new cost of the program, according to the town, will increase in 2023 to \$118,500 for current volunteers. The current annual cost of funding the Medford Ambulance District Volunteer Service Award Program is \$54,000. The increase will be as much as \$134,000 for current volunteers. The Mastic Beach Ambulance District Volunteer Service Award Program is \$26,500 to \$87,000; Shirley is \$29,000 to \$90,000; and Mastic is \$5,000 to \$43,000. However, the cost per town taxpayer depends on the individual district.

According to South Country Ambulance chief and district manager Greg Migli-

no, the vote is to modernize the volunteer retirement system known as LOSAP in the Town of Brookhaven ambulance districts. The current system, he said, has not been modified in 27 years and lags behind that of other volunteer fire and EMS agencies a New York State.

"The program will now be totally funded out of money that would be generated by the implementation of the EMS Cost Recovery Act, passed in New York last year," he explained, noting it will also result in taxpayer savings. In the South Country Ambulance District, if approved, the increased cost for the modified program (if there was no Revenue Recovery Program) would be less the .2 cents a day or about \$6.27 increase for an entire year for the average taxpayer. Currently, South Country Ambulance volunteers are the busiest EMS agency in the Town of Brookhaven, handling almost 4,000 9-11 calls a year.

"They deserve what they are asking for, between the pandemic and the service they give," added vice chair of the Long Island Fire Fighters Legislative Committee, Bill Theis. ■

Proposed Dunkin' now developing community features

Civic meeting overview

The Blue Point Civic Association held its monthly meeting on Aug. 1 at the Bayport-Blue Point Library.

Legis. Dominick Thorne (R-8th District) was in attendance and spoke of his ongoing efforts to have stop signs installed on the eastern and western sides of the intersection of Corey Avenue and Middle Road.

The intersection, which has increased traffic during the summer months with popular neighborhood restaurants open for patronage, has long been a point of contention with community members requesting more safety measures.

Crosswalks and signage were installed earlier this spring, and a traffic study has been authorized by the county to reexamine the foot and vehicular traffic load that the intersection bears.

In addition, the following items were discussed:

1. Future Dunkin' on the former Capital One Bank site on Montauk Highway and Blue Point Avenue

BPCA president Jason Borowski said there was some delay after the initial rush of activity, but after meeting with councilman Foley (R-5th District) and the owners of the future Dunkin', activity has resumed. "To the owner's credit, they have been very transparent and cooperative throughout the entire process, involving us from the very early stages," said Borowski.

- The Pine Barren credit (all development and redevelopment requires the purchase of a Pine Barren credit to offset the added use intensity brought about by the development) is being determined.

- Utility easement is needed because the overhead electric for the adjacent houses cross through the corner of the future Dunkin' property.

2. Suffolk County Main Street Grant

- A field meeting was scheduled for July 28 to finalize light locations

- Suffolk County approved the plans submitted in May 2021 in October 2021.

3. Five Mile Look Restoration

- An initial submission was made to the Department of Environmental Conservation following community comments.

- The BPCA anticipates a resubmission to the DEC later this month.

4. Blue Point Dock Renovation

- The gazebo roof has been completed by the Town of Brookhaven.

5. Roe Park

- The park entrance will be relocated and provided with a four-way stop.

- Purgatory Creek will be opened up to the site.

- Skate park input has been made by the community and is being considered.

- Construction is set for a September time frame.

6. McGill Pond

- A meeting took place on Aug. 3 between Thorne and councilman Neil Foley (R-5th District)

- Two years ago, the pond underwent a drainage project, which dealt with the flooding issues.

- According to Foley, "The pond is stagnant and in need of a lot of attention."

- Later this year, a plan is in place for a solar powered pump that will bring more oxygen to the pond.

- The Town of Brookhaven Highway Department will now be more attentive to removing phragmites, a common reed, and other invasive species along the pond.

- The DEC will be planting native plants that will thrive in the surrounding area of the pond

7. Felice's Auto Repair

- Currently, there are no open permits on the property.

The next BPCA meeting will be at the BBP Library on Sept. 12.

A library with a lot of firsts

The Innovative/Alternative Onsite Sewage Disposal Systems at the Bayport-Blue Point Library were quietly working away Thursday morning, reducing nitrogen discharge into groundwater, and ultimately into the Great South Bay.

All you saw were nice grassy mounds, one on the east and one on the west sides of the building, that fit into the landscape; the systems were underneath.

Library officials and their board aimed at being innovative, and the BBP Library is the first library in Suffolk County to have these systems. So, a thank-you ceremony took place honoring the people who helped, especially Suffolk County, which awarded a \$250,000 Water Quality Protection and Restoration Program and Land Stewardship Initiative grant for the \$522,056 project.

The application was filed in October 2019, library director Mike Firestone said, via then-Legis. Rob Calarco's office, who supported it. The grant application required support from the community, and that was key. "We got letters from the Bayport and Blue Point civics, Save the Great South Bay, The Nature Conservancy, also from [then-] Legis. Anthony Piccirillo and councilman Neil Foley," said Firestone. "It's good to be a role model."

"Chris Clapp, who was at The Nature Conservancy at the time, helped me a lot with output and what we were saving," Firestone said. Clapp is now executive director of The Ocean Sewage Alliance.

The project upgraded two existing sanitary systems that will reduce nitrogen

discharge by approximately 247 pounds per year. "The water table is high here," Firestone pointed out. And the library is a short distance from the Great South Bay.

Board president Ron Devine led the thank-yous inside; they included Gary Gonzalez, vice president and project-executive of Park East Construction.

Deputy county executive Peter Scully, known as the water-quality czar, was asked if any other libraries were reaching out to emulate Bayport-Blue Point's initiative. "The Mastics-Moriches-Shir-

ley Library," he answered. "They've been looking to go in this direction."

The Nature Conservancy Long Island policy advisor Kevin McDonald added that the Springs School District in East Hampton implemented an I/A Sewage Disposal System, just after the BBP Library.

"We didn't turn the systems on until a couple of weeks before the grand opening," said Firestone of the December opening, which turned into a lovefest; 1,000 people turned out for it.

Outside the library, glamping equip-

ment had been erected, and the library was readying for a Beatles concert that night. "We have over 10,000 who come here a month," he said, a 35 to 40 percent increase. There were 200 programs a month and 400 organizations and groups book their rooms for meetings.

Scully said the BBP Library installation was part of a broader initiative. "We now have a 50-year plan," he said of the county. "IA systems are the answer. It takes a willingness from the community, and I want to thank the board for taking the lead." ■

“He has the coolest house and built it himself,” Wellinger recalled. “He has a spiral staircase and an anatomical heart in the center of his home by one of the artists we’re featuring, Rocio Snyder. Plus, there are sculptures on his grounds.”

Dazzled, it was a kind of Disneyland of art. “Everywhere you looked, there was something fabulous,” Wellinger said.

They talked, and a couple of weeks later, Welden got back to Wellinger.

Voila! Community sculpture on CEED’s nature trail took form. “We’re co-sponsoring the event with him,” said Wellinger, noting board member Jennifer Vorbach’s role. Mindy Kronenberg, who sits on the Inspiration Plus board, is curating the poetry.

Besides Welden’s sculpture, the half-mile trail will display works by well-known locals as well as others. The artists are Scott Bluedorn, Pam Brown, John Cino, Gregory Corn, John DiNaro, David Elze, Justin Greenwald, Michael Ince, Eliot Lable, Elyzabeth Meade, Katia Read, Cindy Roe, Rocio Snyder, Jay Sylvester, Tonito Valderrama, and John Wittenberg.

Participating poets are Nancy Keating, Daniel Kerr, Mindy Kronenberg, Mankh (Walter Harris III), Tom Stock, and Pramila Venkateswaran.

When the call went out for all the artists, Wellinger said that the response was overwhelmingly enthusiastic. “The only people not able to make it, didn’t have enough lead time,” Wellinger said. “Mindy got a great response from the poets.”

“Sculpture on the Trail” is a free event, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at CEED, located at 287 South Country Road in Brookhaven hamlet. (The exhibit will remain on view at CEED through Sept. 18.) At 3:30 p.m., the band Natural Causes will play.

“It’s Carl Safina’s band,” said Wellinger of the well-known ecologist and author of several books about the human relationship with the natural world, in keeping with the environmental beauty of the day. ■

MEDFORD FD: Department to celebrate 100 years with a parade

makeshift start and the rivalry of neighboring firehouses, which could only be ended in one way, culminating in the organization as we know it today.

On Saturday, Aug. 13, in honor of the Medford Fire Department’s 100 years of dedication to the community in supplying quality volunteer fire and rescue services, a parade will be held, beginning at 6 p.m. at the intersection of Route 112 and Tremont Avenue. The procession will end at Route 112 and Peconic Avenue, with a celebration in Firemen’s Park starting at 7 p.m. Come enjoy the eclectic music of Drop Dead Sexy and party like it’s 1922, with all food and drink just \$1 per item to help support the fire department. Incidentally, according to dollartimes.com, \$1 a century ago is equivalent to \$16.12 in 2022.

While nobody who was there to witness the inception of the Medford Fire Department, a century ago, was available for comment, perhaps no one embodies the legacy of the Medford Fire Department more wholeheartedly than John Masem, who comes from a long lineage of firefighters in the community, and is past president of the Brookhaven Town Fire Chiefs 5th Division and ex-chief in the Medford Fire Department.

“My family’s been involved in the fire service in Medford from the beginning, since 1922. My uncles and cousins were involved in it. My father was also a member and a past chief; he passed in 2001, but he was also an ex-chief and a fire commissioner,” explained Masem, adding, “so I’m following behind him.”

The tradition of service to the local fire department hasn’t ended with Masem

either. He said, “My daughter is also a member. She’s an ex-captain of the fire department and she’s a paramedic. She’s been in it for over 20 years.”

His wife is also a past president of the Ladies Auxiliary. So, it’s safe to say that fire safety is a family affair, with roots that run deep to the foundation of the Medford Fire Department. This has made him something of a local historian and a keeper of little-known facts, such as the following anecdote shared with the L.I. Advance, upon looking back to mark this milestone.

“What is kind of cool that people may not know about the Medford Fire Department, is we did have two fire departments for quite a while. There was the Independent Hose Company of South Medford, and that’s

really where most of our records start with.” Masem chronicled the tale of two firehouses: “We had two fire departments [with one being where the Medford Fire Department sign stands today on Peconic and Route 112], those guys and the Medford Fire Department Company 1, and the story has it there was a lot of infighting, kind of like ‘Gangs of

New York,’” he explained of this forgotten legend of Medford’s lore. “One organization would, kind of, thrive for a while and die out, and the other would kind of pick up for a while,” the 48-year member of the Medford F.D. mused.

Finally, the two firefighting factions realized that they were stronger united than they could ever

be apart, and joined forces

for good—and for the good of the community—in 1949.

This is when they formed the

Medford Fire Department and the

Medford Fire District.

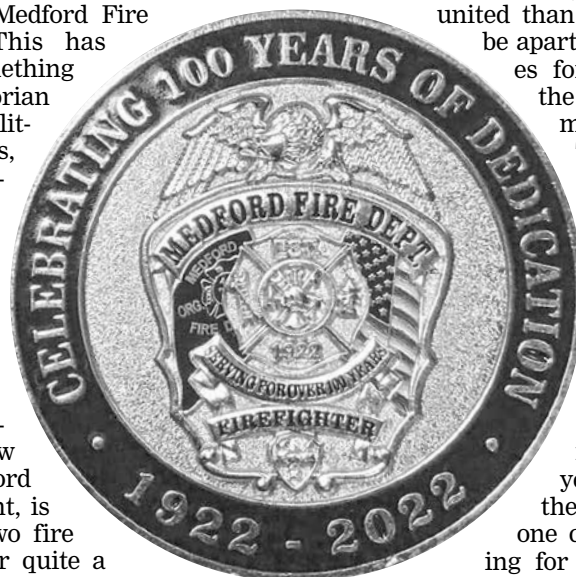
Another piece of lost local history is that back in 1922, and for years after that, there was not just one centralized building for the fire department.

“There were trucks stored in someone’s

garage,” said Masem,

explaining that they were finally able to buy a building on Jamaica Avenue. “Of course, we’d have trucks scattered all over, anywhere that anyone had a vacant garage, or some kind of shed to put their trucks in. They didn’t have many.”

Even more astonishing, to someone living today is how fires were put out in the Medford of 1922. If you could travel

back in time, 100 years, you would see firefighters carrying jugs of water to heroically extinguish fires by hand.

“The older members would tell me they would carry water in big metal milk jugs, and they said, ‘When we ran out, we would go down to where there was a hydrant or a well. We would fill it up and then we’d come back to the fire,’” he added.

If you’re interested in possibly becoming a part of the historic record of your local fire department and, perhaps, be reported on in another 100 years, then contact the Medford Fire Department at 631-475-0413 to inquire about how you can become a volunteer. No water jugs required! ■

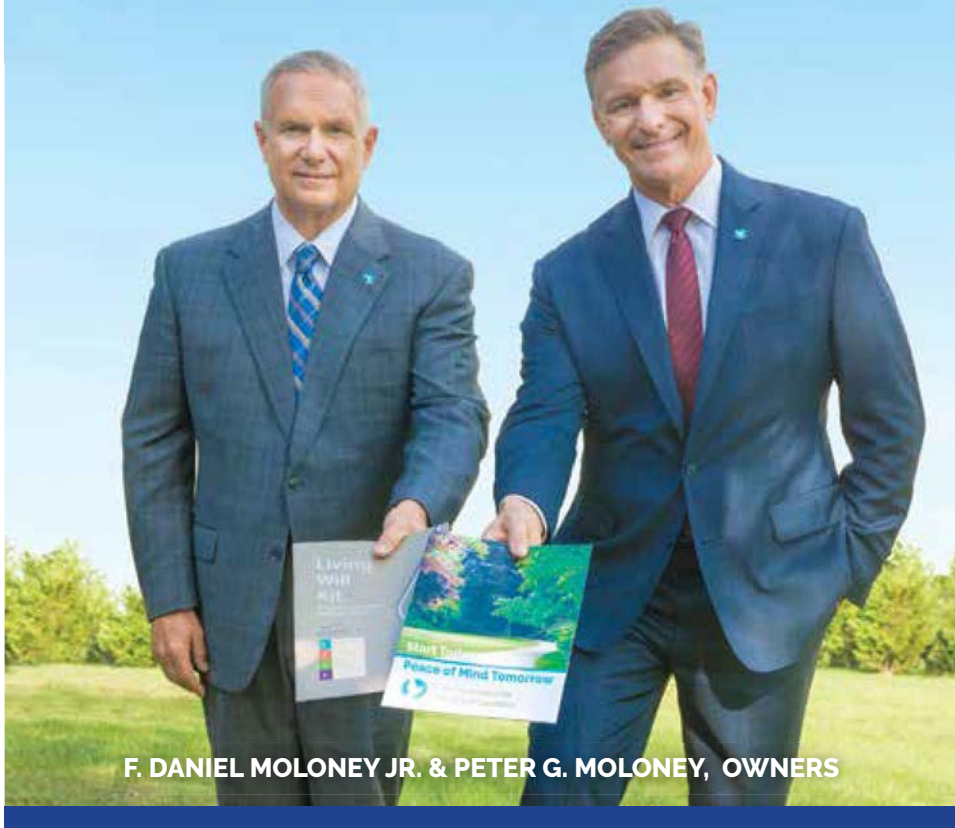

Janet E. Rate

Janet Eleanor Rate, 87, of Patchogue, died July 25. She was a longtime volunteer at the Medford Elementary School library.

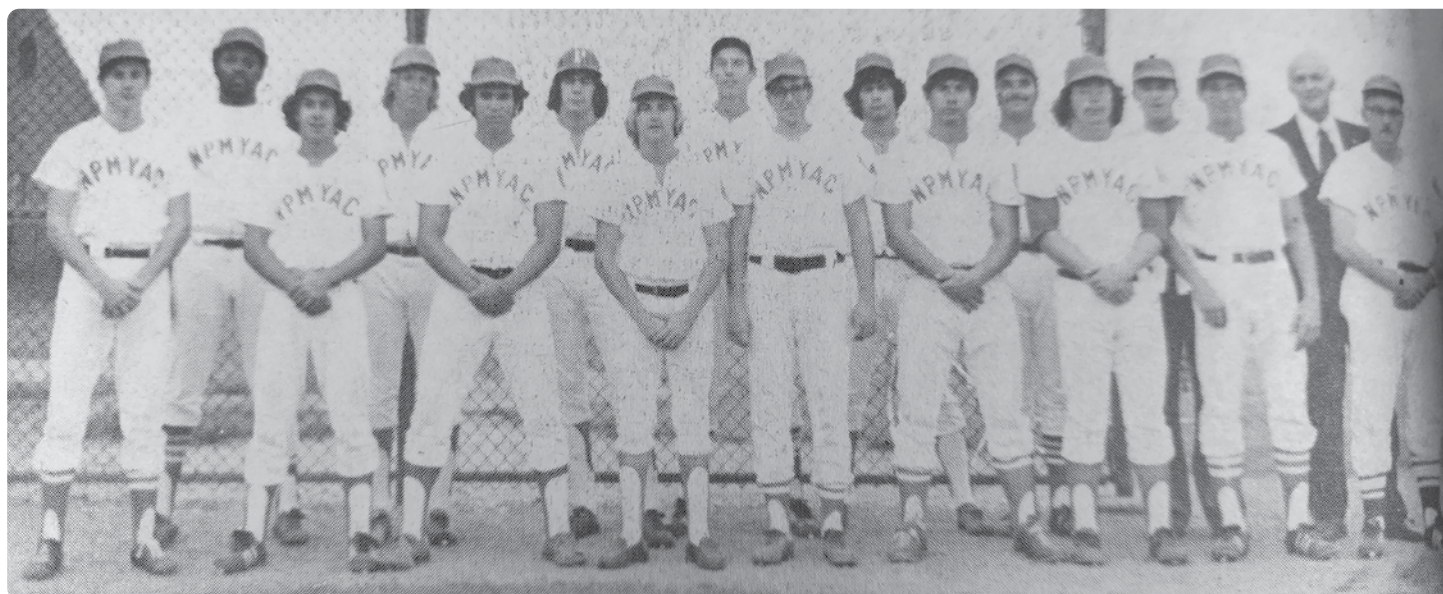

Lock it or lose it!

The Suffolk County Police Department estimates items are stolen from an average of 192 cars each month in Suffolk County. However, these crimes can be easily prevented by locking our vehicles and taking our keys with us.

The most common items stolen from vehicles are stereos, iPads, cell phones, gaming systems, GPS systems and money. In most cases, even if your car had been locked, your auto coverage won't cover theft of personal property from your car.

Most of these car thefts happen to unlocked vehicles. Suffolk County police tell the public, "You hold the 'key' to protecting your belongings," urging residents to simply lock up.

Tips for preventing car theft:

1. Always lock your vehicle and take your keys.
2. Make sure your windows are closed.
3. Keep electronics, valuables and packages out of sight.
4. Report any suspicious activity by calling 9-1-1.

Fifth Precinct C.O. John Sumwalt, who was recently promoted to the rank of inspector and assigned as the commanding officer, said he is excited to work to enhance public safety. "The partnerships between the police and the community are essential in achieving this goal," he said. "We will be focusing our future messages on crime prevention tips and other information that we would like to get out to the community."

The maps are not representative of the community

The fix is in, folks! Buckle up Latinos, Blacks and Asian residents—the town board is trying to lock us out of having a representative that looks like us and understands our needs in Brookhaven. Marginalized people are 30 percent of the population according to the Federal Census, yet the town board is all white.

The article written about the Town of Brookhaven proposing redistricting maps comes nine public meetings into sham of a notorious history of gerrymandering and false information.

Maps that are on the town website came from an anonymous source through a law firm named Messina Perillo and Hill, and are being disputed by the same commission created by the town board. This same law firm is being used for the Suffolk County legislative maps.

Vincent J. Messina of Messina, Perillo and Hill, located in Sayville, apparently hired the demographer David Schaefer and his company, Skyline Demographics Consultant LLC, located in Schenectady, N.Y., and never got permission or consulted with the redistricting committee.

Mr. Messina stated in several public meetings that the demographer David Schaefer was not available for the commission to meet with because he was on vacation. That may have been to deceive the public and the redistricting committee. But why?

At recent Town Hall meeting with the redistricting committee, it was uncovered by one of the citizens of Brookhaven, William Ferraro, who called Skyline Demographic consultants' office, and David Schaefer answered at the public hearing.

Running the redistricting committee is

an ambitious young man named Brendan Sweeney, who ran against Legis. Sarah Anker and who is an intern at Messina, Perillo and Hill, who moonlights as legislative aide to the Suffolk County presiding officer, Kevin McCaffrey, and driver to town of Brookhaven supervisor Ed Romaine.

The entire process looks to be a sham at the cost of Brookhaven residents. As a Latina in the Town of Brookhaven, it's maddening that we still don't have a representation when we are over one-third of the population in Brookhaven.

The legislature must return to Albany for a special session

Stop crime wave, repeal the bail reform

I'm writing to assure everyone concerned about the illegal drugs and crime wave sweeping through our communities that my Republican colleagues and I will never give up, nor will we ever waver, in our commitment to repeal the dangerous Democrat bail laws and return sensible criminal justice to our state.

Every day we hear of another overdose death, shooting, or other act of violence taking place across New York. It cannot be disputed — crime is surging to record levels. To help overcome these atrocities, Republicans in both the Assembly and

Senate are urging Gov. Kathy Hochul to convene a special session of the Legislature to finally address the crime issue once and for all.

The dangerous criminal justice policies enacted under one-party Democrat rule put the public and law-enforcement community at risk. And for all their talk of reversing their half-hearted attempts to fix the monster they created in 2019, New Yorkers aren't safer. In fact, during a recent 24-hour period, two Rochester police officers were shot, one fatally, and congressman Lee Zeldin, campaigning as a criminal justice reform candidate for Governor, was attacked by an assailant who was released the same day. Former mayor Rudy Giuliani, campaigning for his pro-law enforcement soon, was attacked by an assailant who was also immediately set free.

It's not just Republicans who realize the state's criminal justice policies are a disaster. Last week, mayor Eric Adams, a Democrat, agreed with our call for a special session of the Legislature to prevent New York from becoming "a laughing-

stock of the country."

Unfortunately, until Gov. Hochul and her progressive colleagues join us in repealing their dysfunctional bail laws and protecting law-abiding citizens, New York will continue down this dangerous path. It will also take the cooperation of other elected officials, such as Manhattan district attorney Alvin Bragg, to hold violent, menacing criminals responsible. If he doesn't retract his policy of not prosecuting crime, Hochul must remove him.

As elected officials, we have a responsibility to safeguard the interests of every resident of this state and enact meaningful legislation that improves their quality of life. The only way to do this is to fix our criminal justice system, and for many months we have been advocating for measures that would:

- Restore judicial discretion in setting bail for dangerous offenders
- Move all gun crimes from the no-bail list of offenses
- Require a unanimous vote of at least three parole commissioners to grant a prisoner early release

- Authorize life in prison without parole for persistent violent felony offenders

- Make it a Class B violent felony for firing a gun into a crowd with intent to harm

- Make hate crime a qualified offense for purposes of bail issuance

Finally, we must classify methamphetamine as a narcotic, so that the Mexican cartel drug smugglers caught with 165 pounds of the deadly poison would not have been immediately set free without bail.

We aren't going to move the needle on this horrific surge in crime without commitment, collaboration, and a collective understanding that something must change. The Democrats have to join us to curtail this unprecedented wave of violence and depraved indifference to human life sweeping across our state. We hope they finally wake up to this fact and call a special session of the Legislature. If not, they must be replaced by the voters in November with representatives that have our best interests at heart. ■

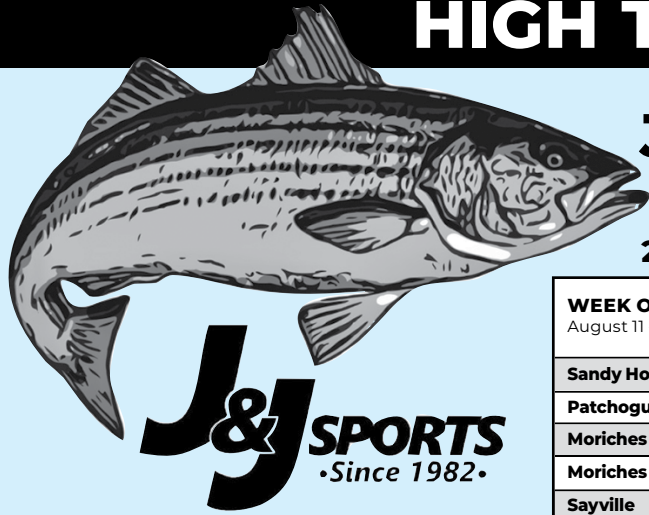

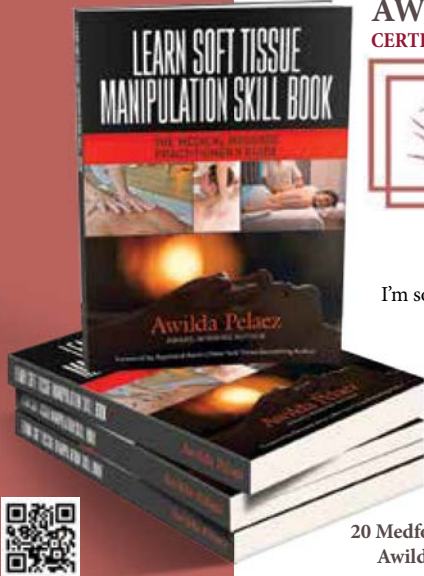

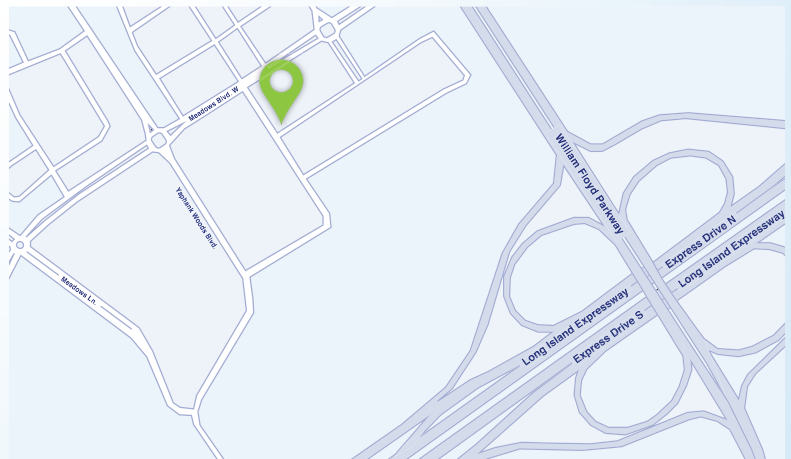
