Hochul makes historic win as first female voted Governor

County data breach delays local results

Tuesday turned out to be a long but rewarding night for Democrats as Kathy Hochul was victorious for the New York State Governor seat, in the most antic-

ipated race of the evening, with 52.73 percent (3,022,429 votes) beating out Republican opponent Lee Zeldin, who received 47.27 percent (2,709,903 votes).

About 300 attendees including IBEW union members, candidates, and other prominent members of the Suffolk County Democratic Party gathered at an upbeat election night event at the IBEW hall located at 100 Corporate

Drive in Holtsville.

Other big wins for Democrats included incumbent Letitia James taking the seat for New York State attorney general with 54.15 percent (3,054,542 votes) against Republican candidate Michael Henry who got 45.85 percent (2,586,224 votes). Democratic candidate Monica Martinez won for New York State Sena-

Zeldin loses governor seat

The Suffolk County Republicans held their election night celebration at Stereo Garden in Patchogue. Primed for a night of big wins, the venue displayed bold, graphic signs of Republican candidates and featured parades of red, white, and blue balloon towers.

Former Republican assemblyman Dean Murray crushed newcomer Farzeen Bham for a seat in the New York State Senate in the Third District. Murray received nearly 65 percent of the vote with 62,094 votes to Bham's 35 percent or 33,827 votes.

"I am thrilled and honored to have the

Clean Water, Air and Jobs Act passes

The 2022 Statewide Ballot Proposal, proposition No. 1, passed with overwhelming numbers with 69.1 percent of the vote or over 2.9 million yes votes to the 1.2 million no votes on Tuesday, Nov. 8. As of press time, on the morning of Nov. 9, about 69 percent of the vote for the proposition was in. The proposition will allow the Clean Water, Clean Air, and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022 to address

and combat the impact of climate change and damage to the environment by authorizing the sale of state bonds up to four billion two hundred million dollars to fund environmental protection, natural restoration, resiliency, and clean energy projects.

Now that the proposition has passed, the act will allow the state to borrow up to \$4,200,000,000 to provide funding for capital projects for restoration and flood risk reduction (at least \$1,100,000,000), open space land conservation and recre-

ation (up to \$650,000,000), climate change mitigation (up to \$1,500,000,000), and water quality improvement and resilient infrastructure (at least \$650,000,000).

The proposal also will allow the state to refund the debt to take advantage of lower interest by allowing the controller to issue additional state bonds in sums up to or exceeding the amount of the bonds initially issued to refund, to advance refund, or otherwise to repay part or all of such bonds prior to the scheduled dates of their maturity.

The local environmental group, Citizens Campaign, called the proposition "a historic opportunity to protect our drinking water, beaches, and bays, preserve open space, and improve air quality." Their group, and several others, led a ballot flip movement encouraging the public to vote in favor of the proposition, including the Peconic Land trust and Students for Climate Action, who attended a last-minute meeting to discuss the opportunity at the Snapper Inn on Oct. 31 in Sayville.

What is Veterans Day?

As a young lad, I could remember Veterans Day parades in NYC. We would stand on the sidewalk, hoping someone taller would not stand in front of us. Though I had no understanding of what the parade was about, it was this joy of watching soldiers and former soldiers walking down the street, waving their hands and saluting to the kids. As a veteran myself now, Veterans Day has grown a whole new meaning, and not just because I went from the kid being saluted to the one doing the saluting. It has come to be probably the most important holiday I hold dear to my heart.

While there are several other holidays that celebrate those that served—Memorial Day, Armed Forces Day, Women Veterans Day, and of course the branch of service birthdays—Veterans Day differs, as it is not about a particular group of veterans, but honoring all those that have put on the uniform, past and present.

It started as Armistice Day, or in some parts of the world, Remembrance Day, as a way to honor the signing of the armistice between the Allies of World War I and Germany, and remember those that paid the ultimate sacrifice of such an event. 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Holiday boat parade will once again light up the riverfront

This year it will be on Sunday, Nov. 20. The theme for the illuminated nautical spectacle will be the aptly titled "A Winter Wonderland." The unique event was started 27 years ago by Richard Blakeslee, owner of the Oar Steak and Seafood Grill. He was inspired by a similar event held in Ft. Lauderdale. Each year since bringing this Florida tradition to Long Island, thousands of families have come out to begin the holiday season. Free public viewings are at Sandspit Park (Davis Park ferry terminal) and FINS (Watch Hill terminal) as well as

excellent viewing available from all the waterfront restaurants.

On Saturday, Nov. 19, there is a sneak-peek preview night at multiple riverfront restaurants (check with individual restaurants to make sure they have boats on-site). The preview is from 5 to 9 p.m. and is fun for the whole family. Those in attendance will also get the chance to vote for their favorite festooned boat. The main event of the 27th annual Christmas/Holiday parade on the majestic Patchogue River starts at 6 p.m. on Sunday.

Lindsey Chalifoux, co-owner of the Oar and Blakeslee's daughter, recalled the event's humble beginnings.

"My dad and a good friend, they went down to the river. They kind of brought it down for a little holiday cheer. They started it because it was very big in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., so they brought it back up to Patchogue," she said. "It lifts morale when it's dreary down by the water and kind of gives us a little boost for the holidays."

The Oar has been in Patchogue since 1986 and was one of the first venues on the riverfront, which is now a thriving hub of seaside restaurants.

"He grew up on the river, so the river is very important to him. They told us this year that they are going to honor him as the overall trophy. He is very excited for that," said Chalifoux, who expressed

gratitude on behalf of herself and her father for all his dedication to the boat parade over the years finally being formally recognized at this year's event.

The boat parade is a great way to bring the community together at the start of the holiday season, while also reminding patrons that the waterfront restaurants are not just open for the warmer months.

"The waterfront—not only during the summer season but in the winter season—all the restaurants have a lot to offer, and I know for what we're doing we have an outside heated deck. We're doing hot chocolate and pretzels, chili, and New England clam chowder. We make it more of a family festival," said Chalifoux.

Mike Bruemmer, owner of Off Key Tikki Bar in Patchogue, added, "All the restaurants on the river are a part of the Boat Parade committee. We're definitely looking for more sponsors. We have the preview on Saturday night and that will be at Harbor Crab and Off Key Tikki, mainly Off Key Tikki."

Bruemmer reminded that Sunday will be a very busy night at all the waterfront restaurants, so be sure to make reservations if you plan on attending one of the establishments along the river to have a cozy front-row seat to watch this singular start to the holiday season.

"It's thousands and thousands of people who come out," Bruemmer said. ■

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Village considers sustainability project

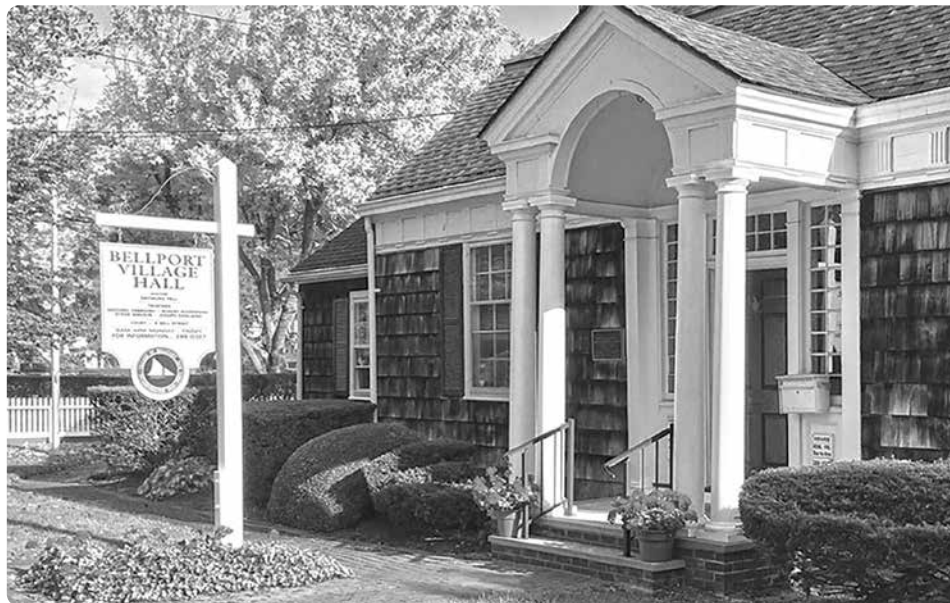
Marina dock fees increase by \$3 per foot

The Village of Bellport approved a project development agreement with Johnson Controls during the board of trustees meeting held on Oct. 24. The project will allow the village to consider sustainability, energy cost savings solutions (along with grants), and improved infrastructure options, including solar.

According to Chris Fitzsimmons, account executive for Johnson Controls, similar to what was already done in neighboring Patchogue Village, the project will focus on sustainability, energy reduction and infrastructure updates, also including updating the solar power infrastructure at Ho Hum Beach for resiliency.

“The Village of Bellport and mayor



Ray Fell are incredible to work with; John Kocay, the village clerk, is just amazing. The partnership is going to be

very similar with Patchogue and something we’re looking [forward] to,” said Fitzsimmons.

The recent agreement will allow the company to develop a project plan with details on project options for consideration by the board. According to mayor Ray Fell, their analysis of the village will take about two months with a plan to commence sometime in the beginning of 2023. At that time, village officials, with the help of the Bellport Environmental Committee, will prioritize and decide what portion of the project, if any at all, will be initiated.

“We’re considering it; they will go through the village and look at all our energy usage and come up with a plan to save money,” said Fell, noting that the project is very important for the sustainability and future of the village.

During the meeting, the board of trustees also approved a lease agreement with Toro Master for the golf course and raised the Bellport Marina dock rates from \$67 to \$70 per foot, at the recommendations of the Waterfront Commission. ■

Pump-out station to be installed at Sandspit Marina

Town dedicates street in honor of Gene Horton

The Town of Brookhaven awarded a revised contract for the pump-out station at Sandspit Marina in Patchogue. The revised contract was made, during the town meeting held at the end of October, from the original contract amount of \$403,000 to the new \$235,216.06.

The change in price, according to councilman Neil Foley, was due to the project not yet being completed. Currently, the town and village are in negotiations for the installation of the pump, which is expected to be completed and installed at the marina sometime before the 2023 season.

Marine pump-out stations remove stored effluents from the holding tanks on boats.

Over the last few years, the Town of Brookhaven has invested about \$1.5 million into the revitalization of Sandspit Marina with the addition of a new bulkhead, pavement, and a renovated ferry building and bathrooms. The funding for the projects came from the town budget as part of their capital improvement budget.

This year, the town also completed the paving project for the remainder of the lot, at a cost of about \$400,000. Phase 2 of the project also included new drainage as well as additions including picnic tables and a pergola.

Also, during the Oct. 20 meeting, the town authored a street renaming in honor of local historian Gene Horton, on Blue Point Avenue in Blue Point.

Horton was the Bayport-Blue Point area’s historian, a teacher, author, world

traveler, speaker, volunteer, and friend. He loved his community and loved sharing his knowledge of Bayport and Blue Point. He died in 2019.

The next Brookhaven Town Board Meeting will be held on Thursday, Nov. 17 at 5 p.m. The Work Session will be held on Monday, Nov. 14 at 2 p.m. ■

45 million pounds of recyclables collected

Recently, supervisor Ed Romaine announced that the Town of Brookhaven’s Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) has received more than 45 million pounds of recycling material in 2022. It is projected that the town’s 2022 recycling collection should reach as high as 56 million pounds by the end of the year.

The Brookhaven Town MRF, which is operated by Winters Bros. Recycling of Long Island, is the largest curbside recycling processing center on Long Island. The facility was upgraded in 2020 and 2021 when Winters Bros. invested \$7.5 million to enhance the facility including the design, construction and installation of a new processing line complete with optical sorting equipment and new mechanical sorting for plastic and metal containers. Additional optical sorting equipment was added in 2021 to increase the recovery of polypropylene plastics, typically used for yogurt, cottage cheese and other dairy products.

“The success of our recycling effort is a direct result of the town’s extensive program to educate residents about the

importance of recycling and its positive effect on the environment,” said Romaine. “I am proud of our efforts to increase recycling and I encourage our residents to make recycling a priority in every household.”

Neighborhood Road Redevelopment plan unveiled

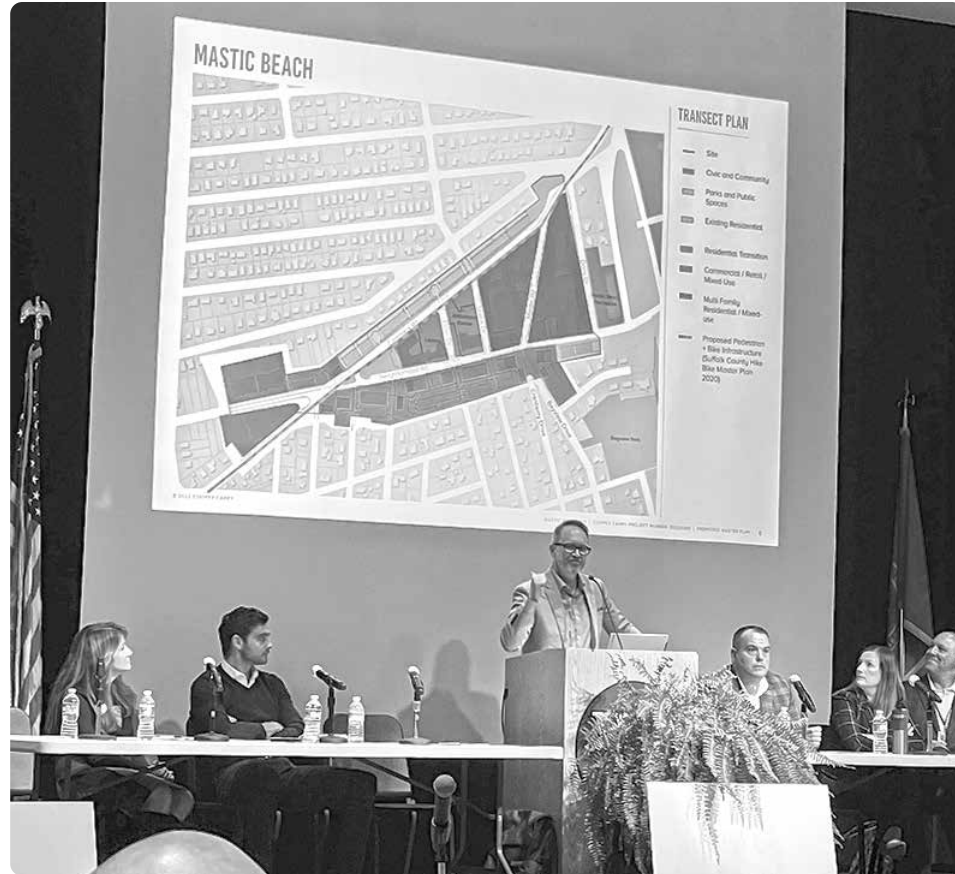
Community outreach meeting held at William Floyd High School

What gives a town a sense of place? Familiar landmarks, schools that evoke memories and remind us of rites of passage, venues that echo of milestones celebrated as well as the little moments shared along the way that comprise our lives. All this is true; however, the cornerstone of every thriving community is the presence of a distinct Main Street, with a unique flair and flavor which is quintessential to that village. Patchogue has one, Bellport has one, many villages across Long Island do, and now Mastic Beach is seeking to reify this vision for its own area.

On Wednesday, Nov. 2 at 6:30 p.m. at William Floyd High School, the initial steps along this ambitious journey, which many surrounding villages have provided inspiration for, began to take shape as the first community outreach meeting to unveil the proposed Neighborhood Road redevelopment concept plan was held to a large attendance. This introductory session was presented by the Beechwood Organization in cooperation with The Town of Brookhaven. It was through a request for qualifications that the Town selected the Beechwood Organization as the master developer for Neighborhood Road in Mastic Beach, in October 2021. As the developer for the community, Beechwood wants residents' opinions about what makes a community, their community, and an ideal place to live. It was with this in mind that the detailed presentation was held with a Q&A period at the end where all in attendance, most of whom were longtime residents of Mastic Beach, had a chance to voice their support, ask questions, raise concerns, and share ideas.

Those on the panel for the Power-Point presentation and subsequent Q&A included Colin Greene, Elysa Goldman, Steven Dubb, and Cooper Carry on behalf of Beechwood Homes, Brookhaven Town councilman Dan Panico, Leigh Rate, assistant Brookhaven town attorney, and James Tullo, Brookhaven com-

missioner of planning, environment, and land management. Beechwood has worked toward providing quality housing and retail communities and has been developing throughout Long Island since 1985.

The redevelopment area in Mastic Beach includes approximately 37 acres and encompasses 140 parcels, generally bounded by Commack Road and the intersection of Mastic Road and Doris Drive to the north; Doris Drive to the east; and Victoria Place, Linden Place, and Commack Road to the south.

The Beechwood Homes Mastic Beach proposed master plan includes the following: eliminate blighted properties identified by their blight study, redevelop with the goal of implementing a diverse mix of uses for residents, visitors, and workers; create infrastructure improvements;

create a pedestrian-centered downtown; improve public safety; stimulate the local economy by attracting new investments; provide high-quality architecture and landscaping; produce form-based Code to create high quality design for buildings and the public forum; create additional housing types, including for those with special needs; improvement of streetscapes; and creation of public recreation opportunities which connect the community to the waterfront and the ocean beaches.

"The goal is to have a place that you're proud to call Main Street, and to raise property values, and to create a Main Street, a downtown on Neighborhood Road with retail storefronts, mom and pop shops, amenities, pubs, and to build houses to complement these," said Dubb. He was quick to dispel any misconceptions

about what Beechwood's objective is. "It will be luxury housing, not low-income or Section 8. It is not what we're going to do. It is not what Beechwood Homes does. Of the 10,000 homes in 70 communities, we have never once built Section 8." This statement was met with enthusiastic applause, but conversely it also raised concerns of the opposite polarity about gentrification, which is the restoration, upgrading, and changing the character of a neighborhood through the influx of more affluent businesses and residents often resulting in the displacement of lower-income people. Many of the questions and concerns raised at this preliminary meeting echoed a similar sentiment of worries about lifelong, working-class members of the community being priced out of the area due to higher taxes and other increases in cost of living associated with the word "luxury."

"We are not looking to build the Hamptons here," assured Greene. "We want to give this community a Main Street it can be proud of, somewhere to gather." This was also met with enthusiastic applause from many attendees.

Those on the panel also drew attention to the fact that new housing can benefit not only incoming community members, but older, lifelong residents as well. New housing can be a boon to older residents who are at a stage in their life as empty-nesters ready to move from a single-family home to a more low-maintenance condo or townhouse. "It will allow residents of Mastic who are aging to stay in Mastic and allow new families to buy those homes," remarked Greene, rendering it a win-win proposition for all involved. Despite this reassurance, there was still reticence from some in attendance who are excited about the prospect of Neighborhood Road as a bustling Main Street but have traffic and cost-of-living concerns.

This project is still in its incipient and brainstorming stage, which is why it's a critical time to receive input from the community as plans are being envisioned. "We would love to hear what you do want. Help us get closer to the goal," requested Greene. Floyd social worker paired with service pup

One of William Floyd School District's social workers, Wendie Der, who has been working for the district for 16 years, suffers from a spinal cord injury she received six years ago, which has also led to severe rheumatoid arthritis. Last week, to help her with her disability, just as she helps school children every day, she was paired with a service dog from Canine Companions in Medford. Onyx VI, who graduated with Der on Friday, Nov. 4, from The Genesis Center in Medford, will now accompany her to school and help at home every day.

When asked how the new companion will help her with everyday life, she explained that both due to her spinal cord injury and her arthritis, she tends to drop things and knock things over a lot. One of the most basic and helpful things the dog will do, she said, is pick



things up for her like a pencil, paper, or even a fork. She also noted that her dog will help her do her job more comfortably.

"The whole idea is for him to help me live my life and do my job more comfortably by reducing the impact act of my disability," said Der, a Ridge resident,

also noting the dog can pull things like a laundry basket and help open and close doors. "These are all life-changing things, things that people take for granted," she added, noting how grateful she is to Canine Companions.

During the graduation, Der and her dog were one of six in the graduating class. They celebrated by dressing up Onyx VI with a bow tie and, later, a visit to the park. Also, during the ceremony, about 30 puppy raisers turned in their dogs to begin training.

The organization is known for training service dogs for adults, children, and veterans with a variety of disabilities, free of charge to clients. The highly skilled service dogs can retrieve dropped items, alert to important sounds in the environment, interrupt flashbacks, participate in therapies and more.

'The Sweet Delilah Swim Club'

"The Sweet Delilah Swim Club," written by Jessie Jones, Nicholas Hope and Samie Wooten, tells the story of five Southern women whose friendships began many years ago on their college swim team. They set aside a long weekend every August to recharge those relationships. Free from husbands, kids and jobs, they meet at the same beach cottage on North Carolina's Outer Banks to catch up, laugh, and meddle in each other's lives. "The Sweet Delilah Swim Club" focuses on four of those weekends and spans a period of 33 years.

Sheree (Lisa Meckes), the spunky team captain, desperately tries to maintain her organized and "perfect" life, and continues to be the group leader. Dinah (Claire Lowell), the wise-cracking, no-nonsense lawyer, is a career dynamo. Lexie (Jacqueline Muro) is determined to hold on to her looks and youth as long as possible. The acerbic Vernadette (Linda Pentz) has a dark cloud that hovers over her life, and Jeri Neal (Claire-Parrella-Curran) is sweet and eager to please as she experiences a late entry into motherhood. As their lives unfold, and the years pass, these

women increasingly rely on one another, proving the power of teamwork.

Meckes has the more difficult role to play, as the somewhat uptight and procedural leader of the group, Sheree, but she is able to capture the tenderness necessary to create empathy for the role. Pentz gets the best lines as the beleaguered Vernadette. She is at her best when she taps into Vernadette's razor-sharp wit. Muro is on the mark as the vain and sexually liberated Lexie, but also adds a touch of inner conflict as she skillfully brings great believability to her character. Lowell wonderfully captures her character's firmness and sense of duty and delivers a strong performance as Dinah. Parrella-Curran comfortably plays the flighty, cute, and sweet elements of Jeri Neal, while exhibiting great ability to convince the audience of her character's naivety.

The set, by the St. Joseph's University Play Production class, is great, with its classic, clean, white-and-blue nautical color and design, with a sense of depth and cool vacation-home feel.

The Clare Rose Playhouse cast does a very good job of ensuring the headstrong women they portray never come across as stereotypical individuals or caricatures. There isn't a weak link in

the cast, with each—under Sister Grace Edna Rowland's clear direction—beautifully depicting both the strengths and weaknesses of these identifiable women in portrayals that never falter and are entirely credible.

"The Sweet Delilah Swim Club" is a hilarious and touching comedy about friendships that last forever.

Where is Rechler's traffic study?

Since the article entitled "Rechler submits self-conducted traffic study, neither the county nor the town have record of it" appeared in the Sept. 29, 2022 edition of the Long Island Advance, there are still no answers from the town or the county. Way back in May of 2018, I attended a community meeting sponsored by FOCUS East Patchogue regarding the revitalization of East Patchogue. The meeting was held at the Mediterranean Manor and was attended by councilman Neil Foley, former Legis. Rob Calarco, and members of the community. At the meeting, I, along with several others, raised concerns about the traffic along East Main Street in East Patchogue, and we were advised that a traffic study would be done prior to approval of any projects.

Now four years later, and with the prospects of three separate apartment complexes being approved along a half-mile section of East Main Street in East Patchogue, between Grove Avenue and Bay Avenue, no one in the town or county acknowledges receipt of any traffic study. Additionally, representatives of the town have stated that since East Main Street is a county road, a traffic study is not required.

More importantly, neither Foley nor Legis. Dominick Thorne has responded

to my questions concerning this issue. Even Brookhaven Planning Board has not responded to a question about the statement made by the Rechler representative at the July 11th, 2022 planning board meeting. The Rechler representative stated for the record that the traffic study had been submitted and approved by the Suffolk County Department of Public Works. But, how can that be when the SCDPW has stated they haven't received the traffic study and they do not have authority to approve a traffic study?

Currently, there are three apartment complexes being considered. This will add close to 200 apartment units and retail space along the congested area of East Main Street, and yet both Brookhaven Town or Suffolk County will not address the issue of a traffic study. Many people who live in the area will be affected by the increased traffic. Already, residential streets in the area have become heavily trafficked by drivers trying to avoid East Main Street.

While FOCUS East Patchogue has come out in favor of this development, I have yet to find out who are the members of FOCUS East Patchogue and who they represent. Because I know they do not represent me or many of my neighbors and residents of East Patchogue.

All I am requesting is that the town or county do their due diligence and conduct

an honest traffic study that considers the impact of developing East Main Street.

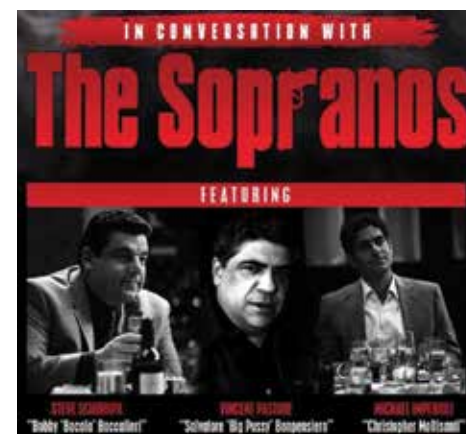

Bellport's breach closes after 10 years

The breach at Bellport's Old/New Inlet, opened during Superstorm Sandy nearly 10 years ago to the day, **BELLPORT** has completely closed, meaning there is no longer exchange of tidal waters between the Atlantic Ocean and Bellport Bay. While recently, water clarity has been exceptionally good in Bellport Bay, it stands to be greatly impacted by reduced salinity and increased concentrations of nitrogen and phosphorous, which lead to harmful algal blooms. Mechanical opening is not an option due to Fire Island National Seashore regulations, and so it is to remain closed until Mother Nature takes her next step.

The breach in 2019

A big question arose, with advocates on one side demanding to keep the breach open and let nature take its course, while others requested it be closed manually to prevent impacts of possible tidal rise and storm surges, which could cause further damage in the area. There was great controversy that surrounded this issue, with both sides of the argument vehement in their position.

After much public discourse, sometimes quite heated, the decision was made to leave the inlet open in large part due to regulations applying to the Fire

Island National Seashore that forbid any manual manipulation of the island.

Positive impacts of the breach

What we have learned since is that the

breach in Fire Island across from Bellport helped to revitalize Bellport Bay. We saw the return of a multitude of marine life, blossoming seagrasses, and

an environment conducive to shellfish restoration. What we didn't see were significant tidal changes or excessive storm-surge damage.

View of breach in September 2022

We are now in danger of all those benefits evaporating as the Inlet continues to close. Less exchange with the ocean will lead to higher concentrations of nitrogen in the bay from cesspool wastewaters as well as stormwater runoff. Thanks to that, we are likely to see a more frequent appearance of harmful algal blooms such as brown, red, and mahogany tides. These, in turn, affect all marine life, from finfish and shellfish to seagrasses and birds. Rest assured, we will be closely monitoring the impacts of this natural occurrence on the water quality in Bellport Bay and the surrounding areas and will keep supporters of our group updated.

Brown trout find a new home

One Thursday, Nov. 3, The Department of Environmental Conservation Freshwater Fisheries staff headed out and re-stocked the fall yearling and brown trout in West Lake, Patchogue, and the Upper Yaphank Lake. Some of the fish were distributed via a bucket system as well as a chute from the hatchery truck, which helped put the fish in the water more quickly.

West Lake

DEC Region One Freshwater Fisheries environmental education assistant Francis McParland placed about 260 brown trout in Patchogue's West Lake. This was the second stocking this fall of brown trout at West Lake, which previously received 550 fish in September.

The September stocking yielded trout that were on average 14 inches in length while this most recent had smaller brown trout because they are some of the new,

more wild strain of brown trout. This new strain was obtained by the hatchery a few months later than the typical brown trout, which is why they are smaller. Anglers fishing stocked ponds and lakes have a daily limit of five fish total with two fish over 12 inches. This regulation is intended to stretch out the available larger fish. Much of the funding for the raising of trout at the DEC hatcheries comes from the Conservation Fund and the fee associated with purchasing your fishing and hunting licenses. Anglers are reminded to check their local rules and regulations that may differ from water body to water body.

Upper Yaphank Lake

About 260 brown trout were stocked by DEC Freshwater Fisheries staff in Upper Yaphank Lake. This was the second stocking this fall of brown trout at Upper Yaphank Lake, which previously received 470 fish in September.

tor in the 4th district in a tight race with 50.81 percent (35,534 votes) beating out Republican Wendy Rodriguez who got 49.19 percent (34,398 votes).

An upset for Democrats was Jackie Gordon losing the U.S. Congress race with only 39.45 percent (90,665 votes) to Republican candidate, incumbent Andrew Garbarino who received 60.55 percent (139,166 votes).

Martinez was optimistic at the event even after just finding out along with the

rest of the attendees that election results for most races were not expected to come in until after 2 a.m.

"The emotions are still running high. We don't know what we have. As for the preliminary numbers, we were doing well, and hopefully at the end of the night, at three in the morning, we'll know who won, and hopefully I can get back to Albany and continue the work I started," said Martinez.

Locally, the recent cyberattack to the Suffolk County website affected the timing of results from the county. Around 11 p.m. Suffolk County Democratic Committee chairman Rich Schaffer spoke to the crowd gathered at the Democratic watch party.

"The Board of Elections just informed

me that we probably won't know any results for Suffolk County until at least two or two thirty in the morning," Schaffer said. "And this is because they have to drive everything back from every polling place in the county and download it at the board of elections in Yaphank."

"They have some results but they're not releasing them. They have the early voting results and the absentee ballot results but they made a decision not to release anything until they have a substantial amount of results back into the building and then they'll start posting them on the public website."

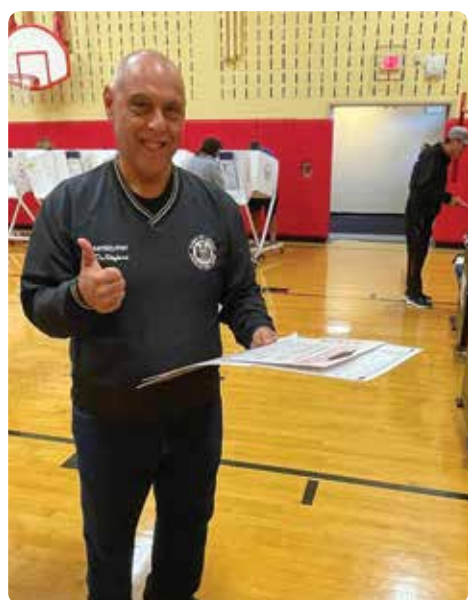

support and confidence of the people of the Third Senate District and I look forward to getting up to Albany, rolling up my sleeves and getting to work," he said after hearing of his win.

Murray will now return to a political seat after several years off. In 2018, after seven years representing the Third District in the state Assembly, Murray sought and lost the open seat in the Third State Senate District vacated by former Sen. Tom Croci.

Murray said he is excited to get to Albany to put a stop to the pro-crimi-

nal agenda as well as the tax-and-spend policies of the current leadership. He also hopes to focus on making New York a more "business-friendly" state, where businesses and entrepreneurs are encouraged to succeed. Additionally, he said, he would like to help provide more career training through BOCES, CTE programs, and apprenticeship programs.

Additionally, in the New York State Senate District 8, Alexis Weik won reelection to a new seat, due to the redistricting, with 69 percent of the vote or 85,662 votes to the Democratic paper candidate John Alberts, with 30 percent of the vote, or 38,469 votes, who did not actively campaign.

Then, in the New York State Assembly Third District, incumbent assemblyman Joseph DeStefano took over 63 percent of the vote with 21,625 votes against Trina Miles with 36.29 percent, or 12,316 votes, who also did not actively campaign. DeStefano said he is dedicated to making his community a better, safer place, and has devoted his life to serving his neighbors by running for another term.

"Thank you to the voters of the Third Assembly District for your faith and confidence in reelecting me," he said Wednesday morning. "I'll continue the fight on the issues important to you in a bipartisan manor: crime, taxes and government spending, inflation, and delivering government service in the most effective manner. I ran on my record of constituent services and I will keep my door open to everyone in any political party who needs my help."

A little farther east in the New York State Assembly First District, incumbent Fred Thiele Jr. had a tight race, with 55 percent of the vote against Peter Ganley, who had 44 percent of the vote. About 62 percent of that vote was reported as of press time.

Republican congressman Lee Zeldin lost with 47 percent of the vote, or over 2.7 million votes, to incumbent Kathy Hochul's 52 percent of the vote, or 3.02 million votes, in their race for New York State Governor. Hochul claimed victory Tuesday night, while Zeldin declined to concede the race.

"Tonight, a glass ceiling was shattered in the State of New York," she wrote on her Twitter account. "Thank you to

everyone who made it happen—this victory is yours."

In his current seat, Republican Nicholas LaLota took the win with over 55 percent of the vote, or 165,261 votes, to Democratic contender Bridget Fleming, who had 44 percent of the vote, or 131,618 votes, while the neighboring Second Congressional District Republican incumbent Andrew Garbarino maintained his seat with 60 percent of the vote to Democratic contender Jackie Gordon's 39 percent.

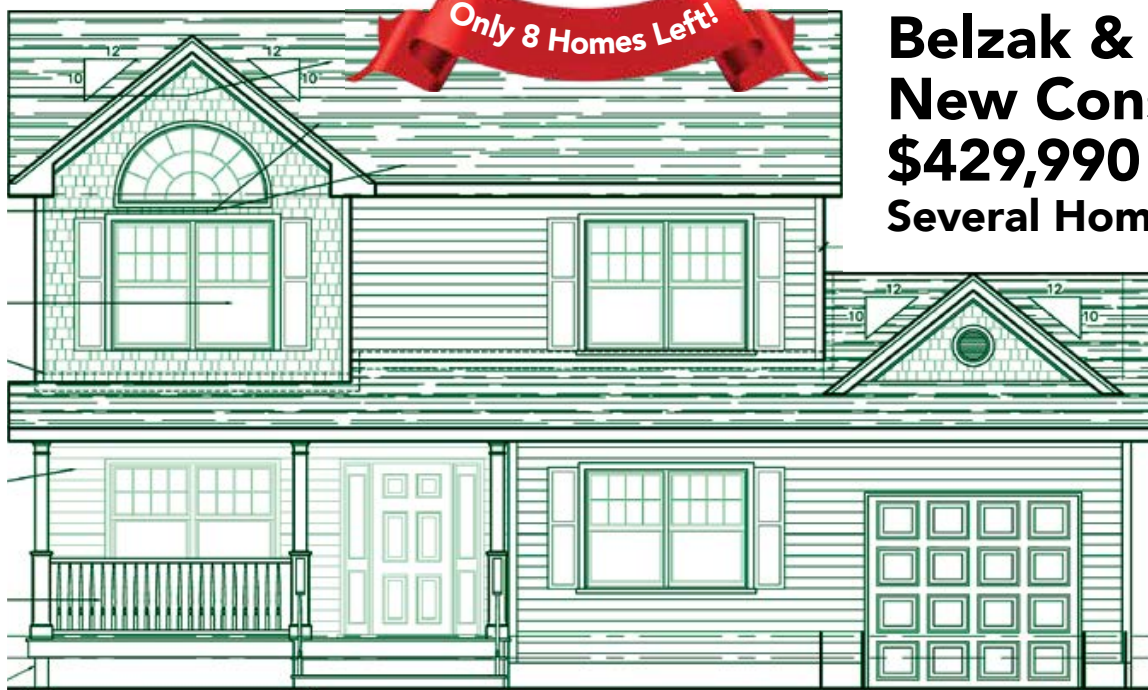

Rosemarie Mccarthy is the founder and president of the Harmony Café, and their website states: "Our mission is to empower our guests by providing wellness, education, and access to affordable nutritious foods, in a socially engaging environment that creates a healthy life." It goes on to list some startling statistics about the lack of access to affordable healthy food.

It states that there are alarmingly more than 38 million Americans (11.8 percent) living in households that struggle against food insecurity or lack access to an affordable and nutritious diet. This is a 9 percent increase since 2019, amid the backdrop of widespread financial hardship in the aftermath of the worst of the pandemic and other economic factors.

In addition, the site informs that according to a report conducted by a panel of national nutrition experts, a dearth of knowledge on nutrition can have a deleterious effect on long-term health. It even posits that poor nutrition is the leading cause of illness in the United States. Furthermore, social support groups can have a positive impact on attitudes and behaviors. A study from Brigham Young University found that people with social relationships live a whopping 50 percent longer than those who are more socially isolated.

Mccarthy decided to combine the salubrious benefits of healthy, nutritious food with a supportive community for her community café model. She was initially inspired by rocker Jon Bon Jovi's Soul Kitchen, which currently has three locations that all have a priceless menu where a professionally trained chef prepares the restaurants' three-course meals, and customers have the choice to donate or not, with the option of eating for free always available. While Mccarthy doesn't currently have her own donation-based restaurant yet, that is the goal. For now, she hosts events at places such as Toast and has an office location at 20 Medford Avenue, Suite 108 in Patchogue, where she hosts events such as 12-week wellness programs, which are free and offer nutritional education, access to healthy food, food demos, and more in the plant-based program. "There are already 120 people registered," said Mccarthy of the upcoming dinner. She expects there to be about 400 people in attendance this Thanksgiving, which is 100 more than last year due to the economic downturn, which has affected so many in the community. "There will be live music to make it a nice dining experience. Everyone volunteers their time. Come sit down and have a nice meal, and we'll also be serving drinks and desserts. Have a nice meal. Listen to music with friends and family and you don't have to worry if you can afford the meal," said Mccarthy, whose favorite holiday is Thanksgiving. "I love other holidays, but there is something so special about it. You don't have to worry about gifts."

This event isn't just for the homeless.

Mccarthy asserts that many individuals and families in the area are needing extra assistance this year.

"A lot of people were getting more help last year with the stimulus and unemployment," she said, adding that people who never needed assistance before are suddenly finding themselves having financial hardships this holiday season due to a variety of societal issues and economic factors. "People across the whole middle class have been cut down on hours, there's inflation. It's a whole different situation."

While guests are encouraged to nourish not only their bodies but their spirits with good food and good company at this event, it's understood that due to illness, caring for loved ones, or other personal issues that takeout may be the best option for some people who may even want to save some of the food for the actual Thanksgiving holiday, which will be on Nov. 24. There will be traditional Thanksgiving fare such as turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, vegetables, and baked ziti for a vegetarian option.

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Rotoscoping makes debut at MoCA Lights event

Famed local artist wanted to do something 'different' and 'fun'

The Patchogue Arts Council/Museum of Contemporary Art hosted an extra jewel in their MoCA **PATCHOGUE** Lights crowning glory this weekend with a special exhibit at the United Methodist Church off of Terry Street.

Celebrated South Shore artist Amanda Reilly's ever-inquisitive, bubbly, maddening, and darkly seductive artwork was featured on the front façade of the building.

"The intoxicating colors of 1960s art certainly has a strong presence in my current body of work. I'm mostly drawn to it out of admiration because the usage of color in that decade was used to make strong and powerful statements, whether it was in fine art or design. It set the stage on how loose and experimental artists could be with color," said Reilly of the genesis of her creation.

The concept for her MoCA Lights animation design stemmed from Reilly's current work, whose subject matter revolves around predators, prey and pests.

"The major focus of this work was the butterfly, a symbol that denotes change and transformation," said Reilly, adding, "generally a rather mundane symbol, especially in female artists' work, but I wanted to approach the concept under a more unique lens."

When asked to animate a piece onto an entire building in Patchogue for the first time since the inception of MoCA Lights, Reilly said she "knew this would be the perfect canvas to really push the limits of my animation abilities."

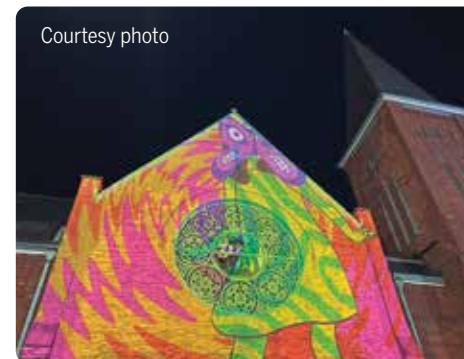
With this being her third year as a featured artist in MoCA Lights, the seasoned artist wanted to create something fun and technically different than what she usually does. She had observed that there had not been any animated rotoscope pieces for the festival and decided to make the first one.

"The team at North Stream had given me the heads-up that there were a few logistical concerns artists need to take into account while projecting on this particular building, such as the piece had to be really bright to show well on the church structure—especially the large round central stained-glass window. They were so helpful every step of the way during the development of this project," said Reilly.

Rotoscoping requires the animator to draw over actual video footage frame by frame, and Reilly said the most challenging part of this project was recording herself on camera dancing to music in her studio and "not trying to fall over laughing the entire time."

It took over 10 takes and over an hour of Reilly stifling her whimsical approach to the practice to have enough usable footage for a minute of show time to animate over.

"I wanted to create something that I could really just have fun with, and that's exactly what I did," said Reilly.

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FROM THE ARCHIVES OF THE LONG ISLAND ADVANCE

75 Years Ago

NOVEMBER 1947
