Get ready for school—by reading!

CM Library promotes 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program

The Center Moriches Free Public Library wholeheartedly believes in the power of reading. With this in mind, they have been promoting their 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program.

"The 1KBK program is so special. It is amazing to see our newest of readers emerge before your eyes," said library director Marcie Litjens. "Reading to your children opens up a whole new world of possibilities, including imagination and opportunities to learn. These experiences will carry them throughout childhood and into their adulthood.

The program promotes early literacy allowing children to know about reading and writing before they can read or write. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, by simply reading to children, reading aloud with young children is one of the most effective ways to expose them to enriched language and promote school readiness. Also, reading regularly with young children stimulates optimal patterns of brain development and strengthens parent-child relationships at a critical time in child development, which, in turn, builds language, literacy,

and social-emotional skills that last a lifetime.

Head children's librarian, Margie DeCaro, has been running the Center Moriches Library program since its inception in 2013. The program, she said, has exponentially grown with just a few participants to dozens of patrons participating, varying month to month.

"1,000 books is the magic number to be more ready for school," said DeCaro of the program. "They will be all ready to learn—it gives them a leg up."

The program, she said, can start any time after birth—and rereading the same books over and over again is encouraged, as it creates repetition and counts as another book read. DeCaro said parents can read whatever they want!

"I think a lot of parents of infants don't realize the importance of reading. There are so many reasons to read, and that also includes just sitting down and focusing on your child," she added. "It's just great for everyone in the family."

Library visitor Sara Gross and her three girls, aged 11, 9, and 5, who are part of the Eastport-South Manor School District, have been participating in the program since her youngest was a baby. The 1KBK is her favorite library offering.

"We just finished up last summer," she said of the program for her youngest daughter, who entered kindergarten this year. "It is so beneficial—and it is easy to do.'

This January, her daughter read her first book aloud.

"It was just a special moment," Gross

Library visitor and Manorville resident Stephanie Tam-Plank said her children also did the 1KBK program and loved it.

'We always read at bedtime every night, so it was nice for the kids to be rewarded for doing so," she said. "They loved getting the prizes at each 100 mark and especially the medal and taking the picture with the frame at the end."

She said her children also enjoyed seeing their picture in the library newsletter after finishing the program.

"I think it's a great program to encourage families to read at home," she added.

Children's librarian Dominique Nason also participated in the program herself with both her son and daughter.

"We were always reading and once they were old enough to understand, they loved to keep track. It's a nice incentive to keep them reading, and it keeps them excited about books and picking out the books and coming to the library," she

Participants receive sheets to mark off for every book read with 100 stickers. Those who participate will work toward submitting one sheet 10 times. For every 100 books read, participants get a sticker and a book for their home library! Once completed, each finisher gets a medal and a photo taken.

Visit the library to get one of their 1KBK book packs with choices of over 100 thematic book packs for your family to read and enjoy. Each pack includes 10 books and counts as one checkout and are available only to Center Moriches Library card holders. ■

The seeds are back!

All you need is your library card to start planting a variety of seeds, provided by your very own local Center Moriches Library. "The mission of our seed library is to provide information, instruction, and education on sustainable gardening," explained library director Marcie Litjens.

The CM Library's seed program began in 2016, and since the inception over 10,000 patrons have "checked out" seeds for free with their library card. The program is funded in part by the Friends of the Library group.

All of the seeds are non-GMO and organic. Throughout the years, Litjens said that they have curated a selection of over 75 different types of vegetables, herbs, fruits, and flowers to choose from.

Also, if you are interested in learning how to grow a garden but don't know how to begin, the library has many books to help you get started.

"Whether you have a yard for a garden or a small container to plant in, this fun and exciting program is a great way to engage all members of the community and a great family activity," she said. excited for another year of planting.

Also, the library does not require that harvested seeds be brought back to the library, but they do encourage patrons to send in photos to show them what they have grown.

"Since the program has begun, people are very interested in coming in and taking advantage of it and growing their own garden," said library clerk Donna Evans. "And they love it!"

WHAT IS A SEED LIBRARY?

It is a collection of seeds that you can "borrow" for planting at home or community garden. All of the seeds are organic and are purchased through Seed Savers or High Mowing Organic Seeds.

HOW TO GET STARTED?

Simply fill out the form on the library's website and choose up to five packets of seeds. Then, you will receive a mailing from the library with seeds to plant in your garden. Slips are also available at the library. And, no, you don't need to return the seeds! However, they do love to see photos from local library members' success.

WHAT KIND OF SEEDS **ARE THERE?**

As for herbs, there are basil, mint and thyme, to name just a few. For veggies, there are options for cauliflower, zucchini, and squash, and for flowers there are options for marigolds and sunflowers. Varsity team looking forward to great season

This year's Eastport-South Manor team features one of the league's strong pitching staffs and an offense that coach Jim McGowan hopes will show improvement from last season.

"The goal for us offensively is to be better than we were," said McGowan, whose team hit a combined .211 and lost one of its top offensive players, all-county first-baseman Tristan Gatchalian, to

Gatchalian, who's now playing at Marywood University in Pennsylvania, led the Sharks in batting average (.365) and home runs (five) while hitting 15 RBIs.

He helped lead the Sharks to an 11-9 regular-season record and the team's seventh playoff appearance in McGowan's nine seasons.

With Gatchalian gone, the Sharks will look to their 16 returning players, including third-baseman Logan Walsh, outfielder Landon Davis and McGowan's sons Drew and Brady, to lead the offense.

Drew McGowan, a two-time all-county catcher, led the team with 20 hits. He batted .345 last season with 10 RBIs and 15 stolen bases. A senior, he's committed to playing Division I baseball at Marist College next season.

Brady McGowan, a shortstop, made all-league last season as a freshman. He knocked in 11 RBIs and swiped nine stolen bases.

The Sharks return all seven pitchers from last season on a staff that posted a combined ERA of 3.22.

"They kept us in every game last year," McGowan said.

The pitchers include senior John Coffey, who went 4-1 with a 2.31 ERA and was named to the all-league team, and Cole Johnson, a left hander who posted a 3.68 ERA and has committed to play at SUNY Purchase next season.

Hard-throwing senior Luca Occhiogrosso and Noah Kirwin, a junior who posted a 0.87 ERA and 21 strikeouts in 16 innings, round out a staff that will be among the best in what McGowan calls "a very, very competitive league."

Some of the other teams in the league

The Sharks' home field is getting a \$2 million makeover with a new turf field, new dugouts, lights, a padded outfield

The renovated ballpark is slated to be ready in time for the Sharks' home opener on March 25 when they take on Half Hollow Hills West. ■

CM hosts Section XI Division 2 wrestling tournament

Center Moriches High School hosted New York State Public High School Athletic Association's Section XI Division 2 wrestling tournament on Friday, Feb. 9.

'We have hosted the Section XI Division 2 tournament a few years back on a few occasions. They asked us to host it again because our venue is ideal," Center Moriches School District associate principal Jeremy Thode said.

Ten teams from various Suffolk County schools grappled with each other in the high school's gym from 9 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. Teenaged athletes competed in matches in order to qualify for the tournament's finals. Victorious finalists were entered into a statewide championship competition.

"I wrestled for Center Moriches in high school and it brings me a lot of pride to [help coach]," Center Moriches wrestling team assistant coach John Fey

In order to be eligible for the tournament, athletes needed to have already competed in at least six matches during the sports season. Competitors in the tournament were divided into 13 weight classes based on their weight. The weight classes used for the tournament were 101, 108, 116, 124, 131, 138, 145, 152, 160, 170, 190, 215 and 285 pounds. Wrestlers had to weigh the same as or less than the weight class they were sorted into.

"This standardized weight range for wrestlers ensures that there isn't a massive size difference between athletes," Center Moriches wrestling team head coach John O'Neill explained.

During each match, wrestlers competed to earn the most points by executing certain physical moves against each other. Points could be won by knocking the opponent down to the ground while remaining on top of the opponent (also known as a takedown), escaping from the opponent, or exposing the opponent's back on the mat. A match could automatically end if one of the wrestlers is able to execute a pin against the other.

"A pin, also known as a 'fall,' occurs after a wrestler is able to expose his opponent's back for a count of five seconds, and is then able to secure the shoulders of his opponent to the mat for another two seconds," O'Neill explained.

The winners of the semifinal matches faced each other during the final matches. Only the finals were broadcast online, and the livestream can currently be viewed by subscribers to the National Federation of State High School Association's website.

The wrestlers that won the finals came from the school districts of Port Jefferson, Mount Sinai, Elwood, Bayport-Blue Point, Shoreham-Wading River, Mattituck and Babylon. The participants were honored at an awards ceremony after the last match of the finals. Attendees were invited to circle around the athletes to take photographs.

"They now place wrestlers at each weight class up to [sixth] place," Fey added. "[A] trophy was [given to] the team score champions, which was John Glenn [from Elwood].

John H. Glenn High School's team won 306 points, making them the highest-scoring team that participated in the tournament.

[The Section XI Division 2 wrestling] tournament has been ongoing for many years. It will continue yearly moving forward," Thode continued. ■

Bull's eye: 'Newsies' at CMHS is a hit!

From Jack (T. J. LaClair) and Crutchie's (Victoria Pendzick) poignant but hopeful duet "Santa Fe" in its prologue, to its finale featuring the entire company, Center Moriches High School's Drama Club production of "Newsies" delivered, playing to a full house for all three performances Feb. 9, 10 and 11. An enthusiastic audience, some of whom were seen rocking to the score in their seats, was engaged and entertained by the exuberant cast directed by Nancy Harkin and Patrick Campbell, jazzy choreography by Katie Lemmen and Anna Moceri, and the superb pit band directed by Sara Greene that made it a truly special evening's entertainment.

Jack Kelly, a 17-year-old newspaper hustler on a gritty patch of the Lower East Side of Manhattan, dreams of a better life in Santa Fe, but his moral compass keeps him anchored in place. Such is the plight of this turn-of-thelast-century David, who chafes against the inequities imposed by one of the Goliaths of the newspaper publishing establishment, Joseph Pulitzer, when he's compelled to forgo his own dreams to take up the cause of his newsie peers.

While set in a world long past, it is a world not unlike our own. It confronts issues of poverty, disenfranchisement, betrayal, bullying labor tactics to suppress unions and workers, immigrants scraping to get a toe-hold in a new city, dreams vaporized by harsh realities.

Originally a Disney production with a book by Harvey Fierstein, music by Alan Menken and lyrics by Jack Feldman, its characters are based on real people who stood up against reigning yellow



journalists, Joseph Pulitzer and William Randolph Hearst, and organized the Newsboy Strike of 1899 that drew over 7,000 newsies—street hawkers, often kids from poor immigrant families working for pennies after school—together for a rally at Irving Hall in Manhattan. Led by 18-year-old Louis "Kid Blink" Balotti and 20-year-old David Simmons, it garnered support from prominent local politicians and union leaders and raised awareness of the newsies' plight.

The issue was fair compensation. The industry relied on street sellers for distribution of afternoon and evening editions of its papers. Prior to the Spanish-American War, a newsie would pay 50 cents for each 100 papers they hoped to sell; there was no refund for unsold papers. The war increased public appetite for papers, and publishers were able to capitalize on the increased demand, raising the cost to 60 cents per 100. Most reduced the price at war's end; Hearst and Pulitzer did not.

The actual strike was effective and resulted in a compromise: while not lowering the cost of the papers, it gave newsies compensation for unsold papers. Its success helped promote other efforts to organize and achieve better working conditions for labor and set in motion reforms in child labor laws.

The balance in the plot draws on an ensemble of hopeful young people. There's Medda's (Grace Marrin) boisterous burlesque to "That's Rich," an ironic take on wealth and broken promises; Katherine (Alexandria Gilroy), a young reporter hoping to break out of the social pages to which her writing is assigned; and street kids hoping their voices reach the powerful invisible publishers who exploit them. The serious themes are buoyed by the lofty, hopeful anthems against the power of the press.

"Newsies Stop the World" and "A Little Hyperbole Never Hurt Anybody" both mock and define their struggle against towering forces: Pulitzer published *The* World; hyperbole was yellow journalism's stock in trade. Later, when Katherine intones how, by telling the story

behind the story—"watch what happens when that story gets told"—she exhorts Jack to keep his resolve.

There's strength in numbers and the power of the press works in both directions. Or, as Jack declares in his decision to strike, it's "what stop the presses really means."

In a larger sense, the play addresses a quandary: how to organize, and maintain the morale of a group uncertain of its goals, its strength, or its power to affect change. The plaintive lyrics and dialogue—"courage cannot erase fear," "stare down the odds and seize the day"-remind us that commitment isn't always constant and change creates risk.

The issues "Newsies" raises are old but still relevant today: child labor; exploitation of immigrants and the disadvantaged; the power of strength in numbers when workers unite against unfair labor practices.

"Newsies" is still news. And Center Moriches' Drama Club production hit its

Bond revote to take place March 19

CM Schools presents \$13.9M proposal

The Center Moriches School District presented a modified and scaled-back \$13.9 million proposal last month. The revote will take place on March 19 at the Clayton Huey Main Street Gym from 7

Projects will now include sidewalks, asphalt, American Disabilities Act compliance, security upgrades, boiler replacement, and crawlspace abatement at Clayton Huey; and sidewalks, asphalt, auditorium renovation, roof replacement, boiler and storage tank replacement, security upgrades, interior renovations relating to health and safety, window/wall replacement, and outdoor track replacement at the middle school/ high school.



According to the district, with smaller projects the proposal is expected to be completed within two to three years, depending on state permitting. However,

the project start date was pushed back to winter 2025 due to the revote.

The district also noted that all included projects are aidable at the 78 percent building aid rate. The cost equates to \$0.22 cents on the dollar to get all projects completed. Taxpayer impact analysis will be updated and provided in future presentations. The current estimate is about \$200/average taxpayer in total at conclusion of all work.

The Center Moriches School District hosted their original \$45 million bond vote on Oct. 24, 2023, for two phases of projects, including major building upgrades as well as a turf football field. The vote ultimately failed, with 341 yes votes to 610 no votes for Proposition 1, and 258 yes votes to 690 no votes for Proposition 2.



A book talk with author Lauren Rico

Friends of the Library hosts event

You may have heard her show on WSHU FM, where she's a 34-year veteran classical music host.

Or maybe you're more familiar with her Whiskey Sisters novels, which she coyly refers to as "romantasy," or "Solo," "the one with the hot guy on the cover."

In town to promote "Familia," her new novel, and sign copies, the proceeds of which she donated to the library scholarship fund, Lauren Rico entertained her audience with stories about writing and her love of storytelling, which she likened to "distilling little bits of information into nutshells" to share between music selections programmed for her

Her self-effacing presentation further engaged the audience with details of personal setbacks that led her to begin writing fiction after training for years as a French horn player and a career on the radio.

A "bad patch" that included her mother's death, her own breast cancer diagnosis four months later and the ensuing depression, coupled with the need to clean out her mother's home, brought her to the point of despair. On the advice of her therapist, she began to write, generating the beginning of "Reverie," her first novel; within 18 months, there were three more books, all in the romance

Learning how to incorporate fiction's elements—conflict, character and plot development, dialogue—through writing these romance novels, she eventually found her way to write women's fiction, where the emphasis is on a woman's journey that, while it may include men, is focused on the woman's transition to a new point in her life.

"Familia," set in beautiful and exotic Puerto Rico, draws from her own experience. Having visited the island many times, she saw it only as a tourist, never realizing until recently how strong were her family's connections to the place. In fact, as she discovered, there were 25 generations going back to the indigenous inhabitants of the island. It made her wonder what else we miss when we don't look closely. The premise of the novel sets up a DNA mystery, a quest for identity, and the consequences of one day and its effect on a family.

Asked about the source of inspiration for her novels, she alluded to a kind of serendipity.

"These things just kind of fall from the sky and hit me on the head sometimes! A snippet of conversation, or some tiny, poignant detail in a news story will stick with me. Advice columns, true crime shows, and social media platforms. I'm like a little magpie—I see something and I want it for my nest."

The nest, of course, includes a process, as personal for a writer as his or her "voice" on the page.

Here again she draws upon a kind of happy accident. "I like to know where I'm starting, where I'm ending, and what a 'few points of interest' will be along the way. Everything in between, I just figure out as I go along.'

"I find that music is a great way to get



into the right frame of mind when I need to write emotional scenes," she continued, "and over the years, I've created several playlists with titles like 'Meltdown,' 'Girl Power,' and 'When I need to make myself cry.' Music just gets my head in the right space to create... both music and writing are like pops of color in my world—bright and brilliant moments that illuminate the rest of my life."

And, without doubt, she favors Bach. "He shows up quite a bit on my writing playlists. His music is so calming and centering. I feel like Bach balances my left and right brains. Aside from Bach, Philip Glass, Ludovico Einaudi and Max Richter are my go-to guys to set a creative writing atmosphere.'

But with so many other choices available, is classical music still relevant? "It's hard not to be affected by our historically turbulent times. Classical music is one of the last refuges from all of it. It's soothing, calming, centering, and it can work on our subconscious, playing in the background, filling some of those spaces in the mind that are vulnerable to negativity, fear, and fretting. It's also one of the few spaces where everyone is welcome. When it seems as if there's no common ground between 'us' and 'them,' we can all lean into music."

"Classical music is like a balm that washes over you, body and soul. It finds all the cracks and fills them, it smooths out the rough edges, then firms up the foundation. Music prepares us to take on the start of each day and the thing that refortifies us at its end so we can do it all again tomorrow." ■







GRAND MARSHAL GEORGE KELLER



The Grand Marshal of the Moriches St. Patrick's Day Parade for 2024 is George F. Keller Jr. George has been a pillar of the community of Center Moriches for the better part of 50 years. He grew up in Brentwood, Long Island where he met his wife, Terry. They were married in 1975 and settled in Center Moriches in 1976. They raised their two sons, Frederick and Patrick, in this small community and have made it their home.

George is an active man who has always had a commitment to service to his local community. He has been involved in many organizations, both faith and community based, with the goal of providing support and enhancing the lives of others. As his sons grew, George started to contribute to the community volunteering as a coach for Catholic Youth Organization soccer at St. John the Evangelist, for several years in the early eighties. In 1988, George became involved with the Center Moriches Lynvets Dolphins youth football team. He noted that there were no opportunities for players to continue to participate in the sport as they grew older. In response, he founded the Moriches Seahawks PAL Football organization along with John DiBella in 1990, with Christopher Vigliotta contributing as the first head coach. He managed the organization until 2015, contributing a full 25 years to supporting youth football in Center Moriches. The Seahawks later became known as the Red Devils.

George also became involved in scouting, motivated by a desire to assist his sons in developing into well rounded and adept young men. He was a leader in Cub Scout Pack 23 from 1985 to 1989. George then moved to Boy Scouts Troop 414 and acted as an Assistant Scoutmaster until 1997. At that time, he moved to the Troop 414 Committee and became the Committee Chairman in 2001, a position he still holds today. During his over 35 years in scouting, George has assisted many boys on their path to adulthood, helping at least 98 boys achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. This included his two sons Frederick and Patrick. Recently, his Grandson Riley also achieved the rank of Eagle Scout.

George became a member of the Queen of All Hearts Knights of Columbus, Council 4126, in 1992. The organization focuses on donating their time and efforts to raising funds to support St John the Evangelist Church, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, East End Hospice, Catholic Charities, and OLQA. They also provide support to American Legion, VFW, Wounded Warrior Project, and other organizations that assist those in need. In his 30 years of services, he has held many positions including Grand Knight from 2012-2014. He is the current Financial Secretary.

George is solid in his faith and is very involved with his parish, St. John The Evangelist in Center Moriches. He is a weekly lector and volunteers



for many functions and activities. He recently sat on the 125-anniversary committee and was able to help make all events celebrating this milestone successful and engaging for the community and parish members.
