As the days and leaves from trees grow longer, it's easy to see spring as a season of new light or awakening. For the Bayport-based arts organization, Women Sharing Art, the energy of awakening comes to life through the

group's latest exhibition of the same name, now on display at the BAFFA Art Gallery on Gillette Avenue in Sayville through the end of the month.

Pieces on display showcase the range of styles, mediums, and interpretations each member of the art collective brings to the public, with paintings and pictures of flowers and landscapes joined at the show with depictions of animals, and metaphorical stances on what "awakening" means to an artist.

Women Sharing Art has been busy at galleries across Suffolk County, with an

ongoing show, "Visions of Freedom," on display at the Suffolk County Historical Society Museum in Riverhead through Aug. 22, having taken up many members' time and energy.

In creating the group's annual May show at BAFFA, Sue Miller, Women Sharing Art president, said the theme of "awakening" fit the lingering mood after presenting a show as immense as "Visions of Freedom," which reflects on America's 250th anniversary through the lens of liberty and justice.

Biking for Laney McGowan

Father, sister, ride for Dravet syndrome awareness

Those who knew and loved 9-year-old Laney McGowan of Sayville often describe the young girl, who died last December after a lifelong battle with Dravet syndrome, with one word: fighter.

McGowan's fighting spirit, which guided her through life, was felt by her father, Jason McGowan, and one of her sisters, Jayde, as they peddled across New York City during the 40-mile-long Five Boro Bike Tour on May 3 to raise awareness for Dravet syndrome, the genetic epileptic syndrome Laney battled.

"It was good to do something so hard for my sister because she was such a strong little girl," Jayde McGowan, who hadn't ridden such a long course before, said.

The bike tour looped the McGowans around New York City, from Battery Park in Lower Manhattan, straight through Central Park, before quickly stopping in The Bronx and riding along the East River in Upper Manhattan, then Queens and Brooklyn. The pair finished their ride in about 4 hours after exerting their last bit of energy climbing the Verazano-Narrows Bridge, which they said was made more difficult by gusty winds.

Despite the challenges, including cold weather and soreness, Jason, an avid biker who completed the Five Boro Bike Tour two years ago, said he persevered with Jayde, knowing they were doing it for Laney.

"Laney was as resilient as they come," Jason McGowan said. "She handled it for nine years in and out of the hospital... that gave us inspiration to finish this ride."

Throughout her life, Laney McGowan's resiliency inspired those in her community, especially when she returned home in March 2023 after a two-and-a-half-month hospitalization following complications from the flu and COVID-19, followed by a stroke.

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A picture pawfect day

Pet organizations host fair

When photographer Briggs Houston and his girlfriend, Kristin DaSilva, had to suddenly cancel a pet portrait and marketplace event at their studio Guided Productions, the couple was left scrambling to find a replacement event for the over a dozen vendors and countless interested attendees.

With less than two weeks to revamp, Houston and DaSilva pulled off a celebratory day all about dogs that exceeded their imaginations outside the Connetquot Masonic Lodge 838 on Main Street in Sayville on May 3.

The “Paws and Portraits Spring Pup Market” brought together good canine boys and girls from across Long Island, with vendors offering pet products like specialty foods and toys, as well as foster, adoption, and health services.

“We just really wanted to get a bunch of community people together... to do an event that could benefit everybody,” DaSilva, who owns two Australian shepherds, Ozzy and Gibby, with Houston, said.

Along with professional portraits shot by Houston, a number of organizations and businesses offered their services, including Last Chance Animal Rescue, which offered around a dozen dogs up for adoption—four of whom found their forever home at the event.

“[It’s] a lot of great publicity for the dogs,” said Courtney Skahill of Last Chance Animal Rescue.

The rescue service is always in need of people to foster animals, Skahill said,

and those interested in learning more can visit www.lcarescue.org.

“All of these dogs come from shelters, many of them are coming from the kill lists, unfortunately, just because of overpopulation,” Skahill said. “We’re looking for fosters and volunteers to help us save as many as we can.”

Haki Rowe and his girlfriend, Akilah Wooten, arrived at the pup market somewhat interested in adopting a dog, but when they found a strongly bonded pair of mixed-breed pups, they instantly fell in love, adopted the sisters, and cared for them throughout the event.

Other vendors and partners at the market included Chris Striano of All Island K9 Services, a dog training and behavior specialist, Park Hills Animal Hospital and a number of small businesses catering to dogs’ tastes.

Suzanne Wagner runs the company MelinyLLC, which specializes in comfortable dog accessories like collar covers and neck warmers for owners, while Lauren Prochera runs her own wood-burning portraiture business, creating detailed designs of any pet or scene on a slice of wood.

Other independent businesses included Stephanie Elefante’s dog-friendly travel-planning company, where she creates itineraries that incorporate businesses, accommodations, and travel destinations that welcome pets.

Some vendors offered specialty dog treats and toys, but Kidshell Naturals, run by 11-year-old entrepreneur Lukas Guenther, offers locally sourced eggshell powder supplements that claim to support bone, teeth, digestion, and kidney function, among other benefits.

Guenther created his business after learning his 13-year-old cat Zinc was suffering from kidney disease, and he wanted to provide her with a healthy treatment.

“You can give [your pets] the gift of wellness,” Guenther said. ■

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Sayville School District adopts 2026-27 budget

Voters to decide on May 19

The Sayville School District recently adopted a \$107.7 million budget for the 2026-27 school year, a roughly \$2.1 million, or 1.94 percent increase from the current year. The proposed budget, if passed, would maintain all programs and staff positions and seek to expand some programming areas.

To fund the budget, the district is seeking a 2.79 percent, or approximately \$1.9 million tax levy increase, which is below the district's allowable limit, meaning that the budget only needs a simple majority of votes to pass.

Administrators said they felt good about the budget, noting that the district has been trending toward bridging the gap between expenses and revenue in recent years, with Robert Bartels, interim assistant superintendent for business and personnel at the Sayville School District, saying he hopes revenues will surpass expenses in the next budget process.

According to data from the Sayville School District, expenses have remained mostly stable over the last three school years, while revenues have increased by millions of dollars each year, leading to a revenue vs. expense gap of \$370,000, down from roughly \$4.9 million during the 2023-24 school year.

"We have a really good budget this

year," said Marc Ferris, superintendent of Sayville School District. "We see the outcome in terms of revenue and our expenses, and we're looking forward to this budget vote hopefully succeeding."

Along with closing the multi-year budget gap, the Sayville School District has been focusing on reducing reliance on reserve funds to balance the budget as revenue increases through the district's long-term planning process.

If passed, the 2026-27 budget would also expand some program areas. These include implementing a new pre-k through grade 5 literacy program, providing professional development to support middle school academic teams, issuing new Chromebooks to fifth through ninth graders, and adding three middle school sports teams.

The budget also allocates funding for the restoration of the district's summer school program, curriculum writing and professional development activities.

Numerous facility improvements are listed in the budget, with some of the higher-cost items including \$350,000 to upgrade the high school wrestling room to the fitness center, \$240,000 for district-wide repairs, including lighting and masonry, along with \$200,000 for HVAC repairs and \$230,000 for upgrades to the weight room to a bike and dance studio.

Sayville School District is also asking voters to approve a proposition to use \$1.1 million in already-allocated tax reserve funds to improve the high school audi-

torium's sound and lighting, along with the weight room upgrade, and upgrades to math classroom whiteboards and security cameras districtwide.

The district is also seeing a 4.48 percent increase in state aid, which includes an increase for pre-K. Since the state budget hasn't passed, exact numbers aren't known, but they're expected to be near the estimated figures.

Residents can learn more about the

proposed 2026-27 school year budget, along with the proposed Sayville Public Library and historical society budgets, at the Sayville School District's public budget hearing on May 12 at the district administrative building on Greeley Avenue at 7:30 p.m.

The deadline to register to vote for the upcoming school budget and board elections is May 14. The school vote takes place on Tuesday, May 19. ■

Meet the candidates for Sayville Board of Education

Friendly challengers seek open trustee position

Two candidates are running for one open seat on the Sayville Board of Education, while incumbent trustee Thomas Cooley is running for re-election to his seat unopposed.

Kyle Valentine and Jason Rowland are each running for the open three-year trustee seat which was vacated when former trustee James Bertsch left the board last summer. Both candidates have run for the school board previously and each believe their backgrounds and skills set them apart from the other, while respecting their challenger at the same time.

Kyle Valentine

Kyle Valentine is a father of two young children and has been a Sayville resident for over a decade. Valentine works as an assistant principal at a special education school in Suffolk County and has previously worked as a special education teacher. According to Valentine, one of his proudest professional achievements was launching a life-skills program for students with disabilities to return to their home district and interact with neurotypical teens.

When asked why he's running for a spot on the Sayville Board of Education, Valentine said he's always wanted to give back to his community, and has done so throughout his life, whether it be as a volunteer firefighter in his hometown, working at his parent's small business, or later coaching his child's Little League team and serving on the board of a nonprofit special education preschool

in Sayville.

"Ever since I was young, I always had a desire to give back to my community," Valentine said.

If elected, Valentine said he would "create a shared vision with all stakeholders" to create "effective academic programs with safe and secure schools."

Valentine added that his background working in schools and in volunteerism each give him communication skills that he will use to bring members of the community together when making decisions on the school board.

Another priority Valentine identified is balancing the school budget, and said he wants to avoid moments like last year when the district faced a multi-million-dollar budget gap that resulted in excessing of staff. Valentine said he'd avoid this through long-term planning with fellow board members so that they can create budgets that upgrade the district's programs and facilities instead.

Jason Rowland

Jason Rowland is a longtime Sayville resident and father of two children. Rowland ran for Sayville School Board last year and said if elected, he'd bring his over decade of legal and regulatory experience as a risk and compliance officer to the Sayville Board of Education.

Rowland worked for the Department of Homeland Security, and then in the private sector as a risk and compliance officer, holds a law degree, recently passed the Connecticut Bar Exam, and will soon become a licensed attorney. Along with his professional background, Rowland coaches Sayville Little League and has served as a parent representative on the Cherry Avenue Elementary Site-Based Team.

"I have a different perspective on a lot of things than your typical school board candidate," Rowland said.

Rowland added that he believes the Sayville School Board needs someone with an outside perspective of regulatory compliance and accountability to ensure the district is transparent and follows mandated rules and regulations. To Rowland, the school board struggles sometimes with complying with its own internal and state policies, with examples including the board in some instances not informing the community about certain issues in a timely manner ahead of meetings, or approving security policies that he felt were "unfinished."

"There's a lot of sentiment in the community that there are things that the board can do better in terms of complying with state and internal rules," Rowland said.

Along with prioritizing compliance and regulations, Rowland said he would like to take a look at how to improve the district's special education programs

and make improvements to the district's security system, which he acknowledged is being worked on, but he'd like to see expanded. ■

The Sayville School District budget and board elections, along with votes for the Sayville Public Library, historical society, and use of capital reserves, will take place on Tuesday, May 19. Voting is available from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. at the Old Junior High School's renovated gym at 30 Greene Avenue.

Bayport-Blue Point Board of Education candidates run unopposed

Incumbents seek new terms

There are two uncontested seats on the Bayport-Blue Point School District's Board of Education in the upcoming school board election.

Incumbent trustees Jessica Pignataro and Michael Miller are each running for one of the two, three-year trustee terms during the school board election on Tuesday, May 19.

While each candidate is running unopposed, *The Suffolk County News* reached out to the trustees seeking re-election about why they want to continue serving on the Bayport-Blue Point School District Board of Education. Here are their responses:

What have been your proudest accomplishments while serving on the board?

Pignataro: I am extremely proud of the expansion of mental health services for our students. We were able to make our Social Worker positions permanent in every building, and expand our Elementary School Counselor position from part-time to full-time. We have supported the addition of new clubs and extracurricular activities for our students, and recently opened the new Wellness Center, a welcoming indoor/outdoor space at Bayport-Blue Point High School. I am also proud of the enhancements we have made to district security, including camera upgrades, facility upgrades, and extended hours for our security guards.

Miller: I have come to appreciate that every accomplishment is truly a team effort. Nothing is done alone—it is, and always will be, the result of collaboration among the board, administration, faculty, staff, and community.

I am proud to have played a small role in continuing to strengthen and expand our academic programs. This includes ensuring that all juniors and seniors who wish to attend BOCES are able to do so, providing universal access to pre-K for families who want a seat, and expanding special education opportunities, including increased co-teaching across grade levels. We have also enhanced our academic offerings by adding more electives and rigorous coursework, such as the AP Capstone program.

In addition, we reduced transportation mileage requirements, allowing more students to access safe and reliable bus-

ing to and from school each day.

I am especially proud of the strong, respectful relationships we have built with all of our bargaining units over these 12 years. That mutual respect has helped foster a positive working environment where morale can thrive, ultimately benefiting our students and the entire school community.

What are your top priorities for the district as a trustee? How have you delivered in those areas?

Pignataro: I have always had a focus on social-emotional wellness and Special Education, as well as district security. As mentioned above, I believe the district has made (and continues to make) great strides in these areas. In addition to the aforementioned enhancements to security and additions to wellness services, we've expanded our course offerings in Special Education at the secondary level, and streamlined student placements at the elementary level, to keep students placed in one building throughout their elementary years. It is exciting and gratifying to have these initiatives come to life, and see the positive impacts on our students and families.

Miller: My top priority has always been to provide the most robust and well-rounded educational experience possible for all students. That includes not only strong academic programs, but also meaningful extracurricular opportunities that support student growth, engagement, and achievement.

A key part of delivering on that priority is ensuring we attract and retain the highest-quality educators and staff. I strongly believe that hiring experienced, dedicated professionals—and compensating them well for the important work they do—is essential to maintaining a high-performing school district.

Over the years, working collaboratively as a board, we have delivered on these priorities by supporting comprehensive academic programming, expanding student opportunities, and fostering an environment where both students and staff can succeed. At the same time, we have remained mindful of our responsibility to the community by maintaining fiscal responsibility.

We will continue to partner with our bargaining units to ensure competitive and fair compensation across the board. Sustaining excellence as a top-performing district requires a continued commitment to investing in our staff.

A dynamic “West Side Story” debuts at Gateway with new seats

As Vince Ortega, Gateway’s director/choreographer for Gateway’s “West Side Story” says, “The choreography is definitely a scene in itself.”

Ortega is utilizing Jerome Robbins original iconic choreography, but he does punch it up in the rivaling dance scene. “Bernardo and Anita are Sharks and are champion ballroom dancers so we made their steps harder,” he said of the characters. “When the Riff and Velma actors of the Jets got wind of it, they wanted their dance scene pumped up too.”

Get ready for explosive dancing. “You don’t know where to look, added Gateway’s executive artistic director Paul Allan. “It’s eye catching on stage right and left,” he said. The Gateway show in Bellport debuts May 8.

There are seven major numbers, but lots of dancing throughout.

The iconic musical that premiered on Broadway in 1957 about teenage gangs in New York’s Lincoln Square, their violent turf battle front and center, had never been done before and was the start of a new more realistic Broadway era. Riff leads the Jets, locally born white kids. Bernardo leads the Sharks, Puerto Rican immigrants. The young couple in love, one from each rivaling gang trying to break away, is the poignant centerpiece in this reimagined Romeo and Juliet theme. There are 30 in the cast.

Ortega, who directed and choreographed Gateway’s sensational “In the Heights,” as well as “Head Over Heels,” choreographed “Elf, the Musical,” “Flashdance,” and was also the choreographer with Maria Torres for “On Your Feet,” where dancers tapped audience members. His impressive dancing/acting resume includes working with Beyonce’.

Ortega commented he did a lot of research into the musical’s formation (it was originally an opera). The musical’s concept started taking shape in 1949 with a Jewish-Catholic conflict.

“We talked a lot with the cast regarding the gangs,” Ortega said. “We managed to discover that the Sharks come from immigrant families. They are respectful and the parents in that era always like to look good. The Jets have really horrible upbringings. Audiences felt the current state of New York was on stage.” Gangs were a norm in Manhattan but the rise of teen gangs at the time was frightening.

Leonard Bernstein was at the top of his form at the time and you’ll hear his soaring scores full tilt with songs like “Somewhere,” “Maria,” and the upbeat “I Feel Pretty,” and “America.” Besides energetic dancing, there are also ballet numbers. Original Broadway reviewers noted the musical as thrilling dance-driven storytelling.

Beautiful Ashley Klinger, assistant choreographer and a fourth-generation ballet dancer who has danced to many of Jerome Robbins ballets commented, “It is the most challenging score vocally and we have some of the best dancers. That ballet in Act 2 with Tony and Maria is 10 minutes of pure story telling.”

Besides a riveting story, cast and orchestra, the audience will take their seats on plush garnet cushions, (new seats being installed during the inter-

view), 482 of them set in oak frames. A component of the renovation grant the Gateway received, there are even cup holders. Make sure you catch the aisle seat design, a gorgeous “G” for Gateway. “It’s the only one with that design in the

world,” said owner Brandon Harvieux of Davis Furniture from Black River Falls, Wisconsin, who spoke to the Advance.

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MY TURN

My mother and my piano

On a recent walk at Bayard Cutting Arboretum, I relished in the glory of spring. Yellow daffodils, red rhododendrons and, my favorite, tulips of all colors, are in full bloom. While admiring the fresh new leaves sprouting on a Japanese Katsura tree, it dawned on me how appropriate that we celebrate Mother's Day this time of year as mother nature delivers new life all around us.

In the Philippines, where I grew up, flowers bloom year-round due to its tropical climate, particularly perennials like Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, and the fragrant Jasmine or *Sampaguita*—the national flower.

My mother is a Filipina named Remedios, or as I call her, Mama Medy. The eldest of six children, my mom has always been a strict disciplinarian who practiced tough love.

Spankings were common in our house in Manila and one stern look from Mama was all it took for me to stop misbehaving or else... My three siblings and I were scared of mama, who was definitely not the "fun" parent. Mama did not subscribe to the notion of being "friends with your children" (that would come later), but she was an excellent provider. My parents both worked hard at a graduate school to give us the best. Mama worked in research and Papa was head of the Communications department. When I was 9, mama bought a brand-new mahogany piano with curved front legs and shiny brass pedals. It was a beautiful upright that nobly took center stage in our living room. The TV was banished to the kitchen and was never to be in the same room as the piano. It was a proud moment for mama, who said it was her own mother's, my grandmother Victoria's dream, to have a piano in the house and have one of her children play. But it was always a financial stretch on grandma's meager teacher's salary to own one. At the time, it was customary for most Filipinos to have at least one member of the family be able to play a musical instrument. We already had a guitar, but a piano cemented our middle-class status.

Our piano was a shiny thing of beauty kept dust-free by a cloth cover, and a can of Pledge wood cleaner had it positively polished with that trademark scent.

Mama gave strict instructions that we could only touch, nay approach the instrument, only if we went for piano lessons. My two older brothers were more into basketball and barely gave the piano a second glance, but for me it was the beginning of a lifelong love for music and entertainment.

For the next five years, I would walk a mile to my piano teacher's house, three times a week for one-hour lessons. I carried my piano books and sheet music, all painstakingly wrapped in clear plastic by mama, in a soft brief case. My piano teacher was a widow named Mrs. Collado who worked as an accountant at a veterinary clinic (succinctly named Dog and Cat Hospital) by day, and gave lessons from her living room at night. She lived with a maid and two fluffy white miniature poodles. My older cousin Edwin was her part-time driver and he made the introductions. Always elegantly dressed, Mrs. Collado was a terrifying woman when I made mistakes. She would hit my fingers and shift them onto the right keys using one of those foot-long pens which left ink marks on the back of my hands. After lessons, I was forbidden to

get my hands wet—to preserve my nimble fingers—this, of course, exempted me from a lot of dishwashing chores at home, where a dishwasher most certainly did not exist.

There were days I detested piano lessons and bemoaned having to miss playing with my friends after school or watching my favorite cartoons on TV.

But mama always knew better, and playing the piano was an excellent outlet for my theatrical sensibilities. My music was a mix of ballads, religious and traditional Filipino music. Eventually, my younger sister Priya also took lessons and it was fun when we would play four-hands on the keys. Hearing us on the piano was the one thing I knew that would always bring joy to mama.

Our family frequently hosted dinner parties and I would usually be the main entertainment for guests and visiting relatives. On those evenings, there was a lot of preparations and we all helped out. The good dishes from the China glass cabinet had to be hand washed, white lace curtains were put up, and our hardwood floors were waxed and scrubbed with dried coconut husks until they gleamed. We had an excellent full-time cook named Amy who would serve me my dinner early so that when the guests arrived, I would be ready. In the same vein as Nina Simone, I could be a little diva sometimes. In the middle of a song, I would abruptly stop playing and walk away from the piano if I felt no one was paying proper attention. With the audience chastised, mama would coax me from the kitchen and only then would I resume.

In the '90s, before the internet, mama would record my piano playing on cassette tapes and send them to her parents who had immigrated to Seattle, Wash. Those were tough recording sessions that demanded precision, and I was required to fill both sides of the tape with my grandparent's favorite Philippine folk songs and my grandma Victoria's favorite song, "Sampaguita." To ensure the best sound quality, mama would have Amy alternately hold the microphone behind the piano and under the keyboard while working the portable recorder. My brothers were stationed at the door and front gate the whole time during recordings. No one in the house was allowed to make any unnecessary noise and I had to restart a song every time I made a mistake. Mama was a taskmaster and she always got us to deliver. Many years later, I learned from my cousins in Seattle that my grandparents cherished those tapes and played them incessantly, much to their chagrin.

When I was 17, my family moved to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, and one of the first things mama insisted on was

another piano. This time it was a shiny black upright from Japan and again, it was the focal point of our living room. We still hosted dinner parties and I continued to entertain guests. Playing the piano and singing familiar songs from my childhood was a real comfort to us in our new home.

Today, a baby grand piano takes pride in our living room in Sayville. No TV anywhere near it. During the pandemic, I performed and recorded 100 songs on the piano and shared them with friends and family on social media. My husband Mark acted as my videographer and was responsible for all the beautiful flower

arrangements in every music video. The piano has always been my most treasured connection to my mother. Music is my gift to share with the world, all thanks to mama.

Mama Medy is 82 now; she has mellowed a bit and I am not scared of her anymore. I am blessed that she and my dad are here on their annual pilgrimage to the United States. We still host dinner parties and just like old times, I continue to play the piano using the lovingly preserved music sheets of my childhood. I am honored to sing her praises of gratitude and gladness with every song. *Mahal kita* Mama. Happy Mother's Day.

Dravet syndrome, the genetic epileptic condition Laney McGowan had, is characterized by frequent and prolonged seizures triggered often by high body temperature, and causes developmental delays, speech impairment, sleep disturbances, and other health problems.

Despite all of this, loved ones said Laney McGowan never gave up living her life to the best of her ability and was deemed by some classmates “the queen of Lincoln Elementary School,” where

she attended.

Before the bike ride, Jason and Jayde McGowan sold purple T-shirts reading “Ride for Laney” to family and friends, some of whom wore them along the route in support of the cause.

“We want to spread the word,” Jason McGowan, who ended up raising around \$900 for Dravet syndrome awareness with his daughter, said. “You never know, it could save somebody else’s life.” ■

WTC beam stops at Navy SEAL Museum on national tour

Families, service members gather in remembrance

Hundreds of Long Islanders gathered around a 26-foot steel beam from the former World Trade Center at the LT Michael P. Murphy Navy SEAL Museum in West Sayville on Monday to honor and remember the thousands of lives lost on 9/11 during a ceremony hosted by the Tunnels to Towers Foundation.

The gathering was part of the non-profit organization's Steel Across America tour, in which Tunnels to Towers will visit 35 cities across the country over four months to educate Americans about

the Sept. 11 attacks while displaying the 16,000 lb. steel beam recovered from the World Trade Center's South Tower in the months after 9/11.

"This piece of steel recovered from the rubble of the World Trade Center will go across this country for one reason and one reason only, to make sure Americans never forget," said Frank Siller, chairman and CEO of the Tunnels to Towers Foundation.

Siller's younger brother, Stephen Siller, was a New York City Fire Department firefighter who died on Sept. 11 after trekking on foot through the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel with full gear on his back towards the burning Twin Towers to meet with members of his squad who arrived earlier.

The Tunnels to Towers Foundation is named in honor of the journey Siller

made to save people in his final moments, and the organization hosts an annual run that retraces the steps he took that day.

The Steel Across America Tour started on May 2 and made its first stop outside New York City at the LT Michael P. Murphy Museum on May 4.

Chris Wyllie, executive director of the LT Michael P. Murphy Navy SEAL Museum, said thousands of young people like Michael Murphy, who was in Navy SEAL training at the time, saw the attacks unfold and became inspired to serve their country, and that their sacrifices should also never be forgotten.

"That generation answered our nation's call," Wyllie said. "We owe them more than gratitude. We owe them remembrance, understanding and a commitment to carry forward the values they defended."

Stephen Siller's son, Stephen Siller Jr., presented Michael Murphy's family with

a custom-built steel American Flag featuring a depiction of the Twin Towers in the New York City skyline, created from World Trade Center steel.

As the 25th anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks approaches, Stephen Siller Jr., who was only nine months old when his father was killed, said that along with remembering those who died, he wants Americans to remember the feelings of unity and looking out for one another that followed the tragedy.

Since its creation, the Tunnels to Towers Foundation has provided mortgage-free homes to Gold Star and fallen first responder families, as well as smart homes to injured veterans and first responders.

"A terrible thing happened to us that day, but it's been turned into something beautiful that enabled us to give back to families that are just like [mine] that were left behind," Stephen Siller Jr. said. ■

"Everybody takes that word 'Awakenings' and interprets what they want," Miller said.

Many artists displayed floral depictions, like Karen Miller-O'Keefe's bright yellow and pink photograph on canvas, "Awakening Dahlia," Diana Aliberti's watercolor "Apple Blossoms," and Patricia Lind-Gonzalez' "First Bloom," featuring a field of crocuses beginning to bloom toward winter's end.

Others showcased more landscape-focused scenes, such as Mireille Belajonas's "Miracles," a finely brushed watercolor depicting a mossy grove with purple and yellow flowers, which stands front and center as visitors walk into the gallery. Judith Caseley's "Jungle" is a mixed-media nature scene, layered with vibrantly colored birds popping out

and singing high above the canopy, while a curious leopard, spotted with gems, stalks from below.

Kathy Brown's "Fallen Leaves Still Dance in The Wind" also showcases a natural scene, but instead transports the viewer into an illusory oil-painted autumn forest, with gold leaves blowing in the wind.

The gold leaves represent the life and spirit of Brown's sister Janet, who died suddenly last November. Brown created her painting a little at a time over two to three weeks in honor of Janet.

"Even though their [the leaves'] time on the tree is done, it's still beautiful to watch them drifting in the wind," Brown said.

Along with plant pieces, other selections at the show depict animals. Bernice

Corbin's "Let's Catch a Falling Star" is an acrylic painting of a white owl grabbing hold of a falling star, which Corbin said is a statement on hope and on realizing it's never too late to grasp one's dreams. Trove Hasselriis Abrams also shows an owl in her series of photographs, "Eastern Screech Owl Wakens!"

Nearby the owl depictions, Lisa Scrima-Castelli's photograph "New Birth" features a sea lion and her pup resting peacefully on the California shoreline, with the baby gently looking up at her mother.

Along with artwork from the group's members, Women Sharing Art also showcased its three high school scholarship winners, Wanying Yu of Patchogue-Medford, Mia Drewis of Longwood, and Isabella Rodriguez of Sagem East.

Rodriguez's piece, a multimedia work her AP Art teacher refers to as "The Angel," shows a dark blue woman, based on herself, who is shrouded in paper feathers that move along wires atop the canvas. Picking the feathers out reveals the angelic figure has crawled into a ball on a pedestal she can't come down from. The falling feathers represent Rodriguez's condition, trichotillomania, which involves frequent hair pulling.

"All of my [AP Art portfolio] pieces are depicting how [trichotillomania] affects me in my everyday life," Rodriguez said. "So this piece is about self-sabotage."

Women Sharing Art's "Awakenings" is on display at the Gillette House in Sayville, Thursdays through Sundays from noon to 4 p.m. throughout May. To learn more, visit womensharingart.org. ■



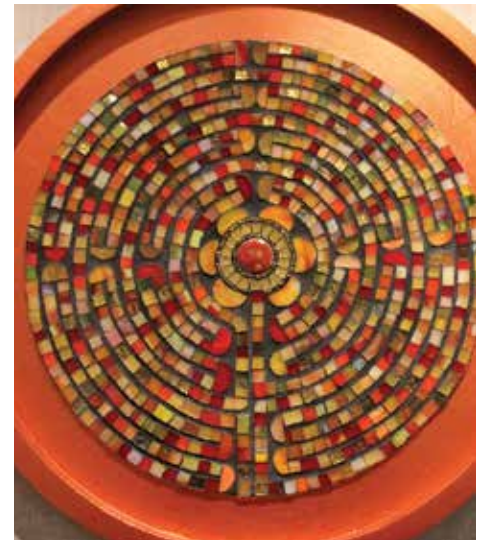

William R. Lehmann



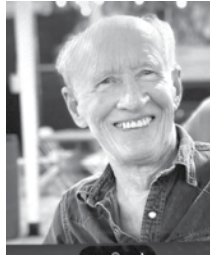

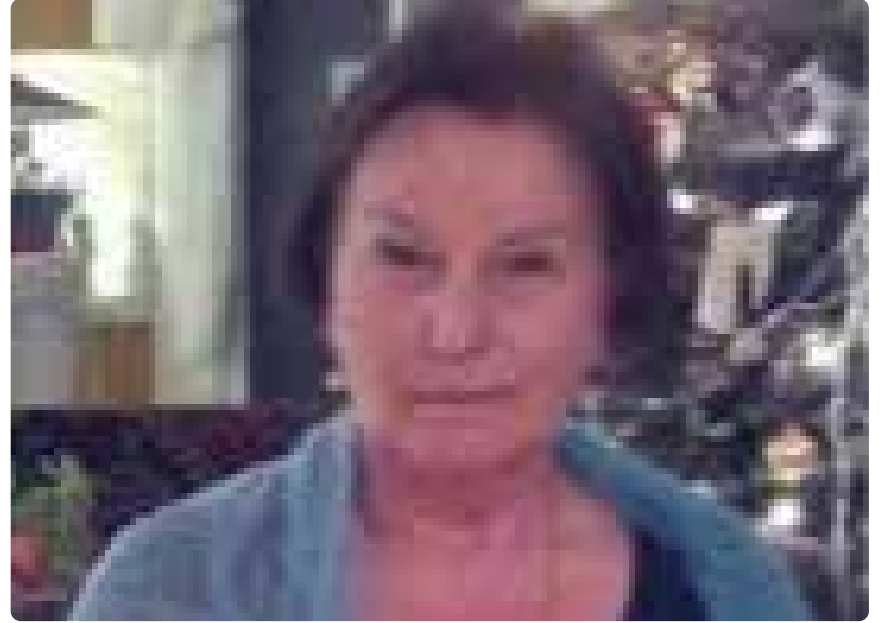

A LIFE OF QUIET RADIANCE
(DEC. 2ND, 1946 - MARCH 31ST, 2026)



Alexandra Kinkaide or "Sasha" to those privileged by familiarity, passed away at home in St. Albert, Alberta, Canada this past Tuesday March 31st. She was the spouse of Perry Kinkaide, son of Edwin and Lenore Kinkaide, raised in Sayville. Sasha's two and a-half year journey was peaceful, painless, and anticipated; a passage approached with clarity rather than fear.

Her life traced a remarkable arc across continents and political systems. Having escaped Communism in Czechoslovakia in 1965, she pursued her undergraduate education at UCLA and later earned her PhD in Clinical Psychology from the University of Alberta in 1979. Her thesis explored the development of the concept of time in children, later precipitating into a professional life focusing on enduring acts of care.

Through her work with children and families, Sasha cultivated resilience in others with the same patience she brought to gardens: attentive, steady and hopeful. Her practice, Kinkaide Psychological Services, became widely respected throughout western Canada, and her subsequent 23 years as Registrar for the Alberta College of Psychologists helped shape the ethical foundations of her profession for a generation.

Marrying in 1972 and raising two sons whose lives portray her steady influence. Paul, with his wife Christie, founded and operated Success 2000, a local tutoring agency devoted to unlocking human potential. Peter leads Raintree Financial, a Canada-wide wealth management firm. He and his wife Kristin, gifted Sasha two grandchildren, Cohen and Sofia who have become continuities of Sasha's curiosity and warmth.

Sasha brought a disciplined grace to every arena she entered. She loved poetry, from Emily Dickinson to Ogden Nash, and her musical tastes ranged just as widely, from Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky to Leon-

ard Cohen, from Luciano Pavarotti to Julio Iglesias, and from Waylon Jennings to Nana Mouskouri.

Her reading spanned equally rich territory, from John le Carré to Margaret Drabble, with a particular affection for Canadian writers and the enduring allure of Everest's quests. On her first date with her to be husband, Perry, she introduced him to *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry.

And lest it be forgotten—she could more than hold her own in any political argument.

An Edmonton city tennis champion, an avid gardener, and a devoted practitioner of Czech cuisine, Sasha sought solace through family and nature. Her kitchen was a theatre of heritage: roast duck, dumplings, caraway sauerkraut, and red cabbage, paired with Perry's contribution in baking the bread and the apple strudel.

Retirement and later her illness brought Sasha and her husband, Perry, together after two demanding careers. Together they baked and gardened, took long walks and short trips, grand-parented and rediscovered the quiet companionship that had been present all along, living patiently, waiting for time to widen. Sasha's life reminds us that departure is not erasure. Rather, it refracts presence into memory, influence, and a continuation. In this sense, death does not end colour — it reveals the many shades that were always there.

The Kinkaide family is honoured to thank all those who played a part in shaping what was a remarkable life for Sasha and those she cared for and who cared for her. Allowing the County to Quickly Respond to the Potential Arrival of Asylum Seekers

I, Edward P. Romaine, Suffolk County Executive, in accordance with a Proclamation of a Local State of Emergency issued on January 1, 2026, January 30, 2026, February 27, 2026, March 27, 2026 and April 24, 2026 do hereby find and order as follows:

Whereas, on August 2, 2021 the Federal Government issued an Order pursuant to 42 U.S.C. secs. 362 and 365 (the “Title 42 Order”) prohibiting migration into the United States by “covered noncitizens” traveling from Canada or Mexico; and Whereas, the Title 42 Order expired on May 11, 2023 and upon its expiration, an anticipated surge of migration into the United States commenced resulting with the imminent arrival of individuals into New York State at an increased rate; and Whereas, Suffolk County recognizes that the anticipated uncoordinated moving of people into the County of Suffolk will result in a severe housing crisis as a result of the limited number of temporary and permanent housing available in the County.

Now, therefore, I, Edward P. Romaine, Suffolk County Executive by the power vested in me by the Suffolk County Charter and the Laws of the State of New York and pursuant to Section 24 of Article 2-B of the New York State Executive Law, do hereby temporarily suspend or modify any statute, local law, resolution, order, rule or regulation or parts thereof, if compliance with such statute, local law, resolution, order, rule or regulation would prevent, hinder or delay action necessary to assist, aid or cope with the aforementioned State of Emergency, and I hereby order the following:
A. The formation of an intergovernmental team (the “intergovernmental team”) that includes the Chief Deputy County Executive, which shall coordinate to assist in meeting the needs of the County as a result of any potential housing crisis in the County.

B. All County Departments are required to work with the County Executive's office to effectuate any emergency measures that need to be addressed as a result of this Order.
C. No hotel, motel, owner of a multiple dwelling, or shelter in Suffolk County is permitted to contract or otherwise engage in business with any other municipality (an “external municipality”) for the purpose of providing housing or accommodations for asylum seekers without the permission or coordination of Suffolk County. This prohibition extends to any person or entity participating in an external municipality's government program, or a contract or service funded by an external municipality or acting on behalf of any external municipality or the State of New York.

D. In order to effectuate Suffolk County's role in this emergency, all procurement policies for the purchase of equipment, supplies or contracts, relating to this emergency, are suspended, specifically: Suffolk County Code Chapters 1065 and 189; Article IV sections A 4-13 and 14; Article V section A5-1; Charter section C5-2 (C) and (L); and Section A5-8, Chap. 575, Chap. 803, Chap. 353 and Local Law 41-2013 to the extent that they require execution of documentation of compliance; and all related procurement laws, rules, and regulations required to comply with this Emergency Order.
E. Regardless of any other remedy

or relief brought by the County for any violation, the County Executive is authorized to direct the County Attorney to commence actions or proceedings in the name of the County, in a court of competent jurisdiction, to abate any violation of, or to enforce any provision of this Emergency Order.
F. Remedies Not Exclusive.

- No remedy or penalty specified in this Emergency Order shall be the exclusive remedy or remedy available to address any violation described in this Executive Order.
- Each remedy or penalty specified in the Emergency Order shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for or limitation of, the other remedies or penalties specified in this Emergency Order or in any other applicable law.
- Any remedy or penalty specified in this section may be pursued at any time, whether prior to, simultaneously with, or after the pursuit of any other remedy or penalty specified in the Emergency Order or in any other applicable law.
- In particular, but not by way of limitation, each remedy and penalty specified in this section shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for or limitation of, the penalties specified in New York Executive Law Section 24, and any remedy or penalty specified in this section may be pursued at any time, whether prior to, simultaneously with, or after the pursuit of any penalty specified in New York Executive Law Section 24.

G. Effective Date
