City’s 1-cent sales tax to expire June 30

Mayor: Extension of tax could have provided millions more in revenue

Huntsville’s 1-cent sales tax will expire on June 30, said Mayor Travis Dotson. “Everything that tax was intended to do has been accomplished,” he said.

In August 2013, the Huntsville City Council asked voters to raise the tax rate from 1% to 2%, with the bulk of the money used to repay \$4.65 million in bonds to extend water and sewer lines along Highway 412. City leaders passed an ordinance saying that some of the increased tax revenue would be used to issue bonds for \$1.1 million in street improvements, \$635,000 for a new fire station on the north side of the

city, \$695,000 for improvements at Mitchusson Park and \$580,000 for a museum project. The ordinance stated that if any of the projects were approved, the city would levy a 1% sales tax to repay bonds sold to finance the projects. The sales tax would expire when the bonds were repaid.

Dotson said the bonds will be paid off as of May 30, with the tax expiring a month later.

He said the museum was the only project left unapproved by voters, but ongoing improvements to the Basham Building, where some Model-T Fords are displayed in a replica of a Ford Motor Co. dealership, will fill that need.

“I thought that when it was brought to the public [in 2013], it was explained well and that’s why the tax was passed,” Dotson said. However, by deciding not to extend the tax beyond June 30, as recommended by Stephens, Inc., the city has eliminated as much as \$7 million in potential revenue from its coffers.

Dotson said this decision was made in light of the passage by voters of a 0.5% sales and use tax to build a 148-bed jail. This tax, which is estimated to generate approximately \$17 million, would sunset after the jail is paid for, which is estimated to take 20 to 25 years. The Madison County Quorum Court also asked voters to approve a permanent 1.25% sales and use tax for maintenance and operations of the proposed jail. The tax was estimated to generate \$2.4 million per year, of which \$2 million is estimated to be needed yearly. Voters denied this tax.

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Challengers sought for broadband map

The Second Annual Broadband County Road Show came to Huntsville last week for a meeting at the Arvest Annex Building. Latasha Born, representing County Judge Larry Garrett’s office, and Huntsville Fire Chief Kevin Shinn attended the meeting, which was hosted by Glen E. Howie, state broadband director.

Howie gave a presentation on the state’s efforts to improve broadband access across the state utilizing a \$1 billion federal grant Arkansas will be awarded by a program administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA). “We have been preparing for this process for well over a year,” said Howie. “As a result of intensive stake-

holder outreach and engaged residents across the state, our counties are organized and ready to go. We look forward to launching this historic process.”

The Madison County visit was the 14th stop for Howie and Kamelle Gomez, the state’s digital opportunity manager.

The Arkansas State Broadband Office launched its Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) mapping challenge process on March 20, beginning a months-long process that will enable stakeholders in Arkansas to challenge the accuracy of the Federal Communications Commission’s National Broadband Map and the levels of internet service reported at homes and businesses throughout the state.

City makes repairs to streets

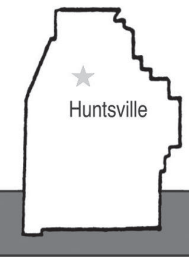
Huntsville Street Department Director Scott Phillips said the city has been working to repair potholes in streets over the past week, mostly due to water line leaks.

“We finished up Friday,”

Phillips said, referring to March 29, when two crews repaired damage at the intersection of Hughes and Church streets. The department also repaired some potholes at the entrance to Fire Station 1 on Church Street.

Crews also hit “the worst spots” on Polk, Cain and College streets last week. “Those are the spots where we’d had some water leaks and were just in the worst need of repair,” Phillips said. The city repaired the entire intersec-

Circuit court cases resolved in March

The following felony cases were resolved in Madison County Circuit Court during the month of March.

- Virginia Lynn Guinn, 43, was found guilty of possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), possession of drug paraphernalia, non-support, and two counts of failure to appear. She was given 48 months in the Arkansas Department of Correction (ADC) plus 72 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence and credit for 14 days already served in jail. She was also ordered to pay at least \$300 toward child support. Violation of her suspension could result in a sentence of 42 years in the ADC, less time already served.
- Jordan Makayla Doshier, 25, was found guilty of delivery of methamphetamine, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), tampering with physical evidence, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), possession of drug paraphernalia, and hindering apprehension. She was placed on probation for 10 years and ordered to serve 12 months in a Community Correction Center as a condition of her probation. If she violates the terms of her probation, she could face up to 44 years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$55,000.
- Talisa Jane Lewis, 39, was found guilty of theft of property. She was given 12 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of her suspension could result in a sentence of one year in the ADC, less time already served.
- William Joe Yates, 43, was found guilty of possession of firearms by certain persons. He was given 12 months in the ADC plus 60 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence and credit for 90 days

- already served in jail. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of six years in the ADC, less time already served.
- Justin Ray Criss, 37, was found guilty of leaving the scene of an accident involving personal injury. He was placed on probation for three years and given credit for 24 days already served in jail. If he violates the terms of his probation, he could face up to six years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$10,000.
 - Clayton Farrell Knoles, 36, was found guilty of terrorist threatening (second degree). He was given 12 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of one year in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Jay Michael Rowan, 38, was found guilty of possession of drug paraphernalia, fleeing, and possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine). He was given 72 months in the ADC plus 48 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence and credit for 60 days already served in jail. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of 100 years in the Arkansas Department of Correction, less time already served.
 - Lecile Gene Lynch, 48, was found guilty of second degree battery. He was placed on probation for two years. Violation of the terms of his probation could result in a sentence of six years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$10,000.
 - Tamara Michelle Patrick, 36, was found guilty of second-degree forgery. She was placed on probation for three years. Violation of the terms of her probation could result in a sentence of 10 years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$10,000.
 - Noelle Theresa Marquis, 25, was found guilty of theft

- of property, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), possession of drug paraphernalia, and failure to appear. She was given 72 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of her suspension could result in a sentence of 18 years in the ADC, less time already served.
- Susan Lee Extein, 57, was found guilty of possession of methamphetamine with the purpose to deliver, possession of a Sch. II controlled substance with the purpose to deliver, possession of a Sch. VI with the purpose to deliver, and possession of drug paraphernalia. She was given 36 months in the ADC plus 36 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of her suspension could result in a sentence of 70 years in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Stanley Extein, 65, was found guilty of possession of methamphetamine with the purpose to deliver, possession of a Sch. II controlled substance with the purpose to deliver, possession of drug paraphernalia. He was given 36 months in the ADC plus 36 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of 70 years in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Larry Gene Stuthers, Jr., 43, was found guilty of criminal mischief (first degree). He was given 72 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of six years in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Jordan Makayla Doshier, 25, was found guilty of delivery of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance, tampering with

- physical evidence, possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia, and hindering apprehension. She was placed on probation for 10 years. Violation of the terms of her probation could result in a sentence of 54 years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$55,000.
- Bobby Joe Baxter, 43, was found guilty of DWI (fourth offense) and failure to appear. He was given 24 months in the ADC plus 48 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence and credit for 102 days already served in jail. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of 16 years in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Harold J. Keller, 50, was found guilty of possession of a controlled substance and two counts of failure to appear. He was placed on probation for five years and given credit for 75 days already served in jail. If he violates the terms of his probation, he could face a sentence of 36 years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$40,000.
 - Cameron Cordell Riddle, 28, was found guilty of possession of firearms by certain persons, possession of a Sch. II controlled substance, and possession of drug paraphernalia. He was given 72 months Suspended Imposition of Sentence and 12 months for fleeing. He received credit for 89 days already served in jail. Violation of his suspension could result in a sentence of 32 years in the ADC, less time already served.
 - Johnathan James Tietjens, 58, was found guilty of theft by receiving. He was placed on probation for five years. Violation of the terms of his probation could result in a sentence of five years in the ADC and/or a fine of up to \$15,000.

The path of uncertainty

By the time you read this, the Total Solar Eclipse will only be only a few days away on Monday, April 8. As of this moment, the forecast for Monday calls for partly cloudy conditions and a chance of showers. Who knows how accurate this will be come Sunday, but it's looking like our view of the eclipse will be ... dark and cloudy?

Total eclipse merchandising appears to have reached its apex. I've seen T-shirts, travel mugs and, of course, eclipse-viewing shades on sale at virtually every store in Huntsville. I haven't heard of any parking areas in local farms that are going for high-dollar amounts, but there probably are some. Are Madison County folks positioning themselves to make big money charging "eclipse tourists" for parking, bathrooms, lodging, etc.? Maybe, but I kind of doubt it. I just wonder how disappointed everyone will be if Monday turns out rainy?

Emergency planners have been prepping for the worst, including communications shortages, food shortages, fuel shortages, etc. South of here, along the I-40 corridor, major traffic jams are predicted, some of which could send re-routed tourists our direction. Or, maybe not. It is useful to remember that events such as Y2K came and went without much of a stir. (Actually, Y2K came and went unnoticed, after more than two years of buildup.) The fact is, we won't know what's going to happen until the moment the eclipse passes and everyone tries getting out of here at once.

As we have reported, Madison County will mostly be in the 99-percent zone, not the path of totality, the center of which will most likely be Russellville. Only the far southeastern corner will see the totality. According to greatamerican-eclipse.com, the time of totality on Monday will be 1:51 p.m. Its duration will be 4 minutes and 16 seconds. The width of the totality will be 117 miles. The eclipse will enter the North American continent in the Mexican state of Sinaloa at 11:10 a.m. Mountain time and exit at Newfoundland at 5:15 p.m. NDT (Newfoundland Time). Things should return to normal here by around 3:30 p.m. Let's hope so.

Withrow Springs State Park is a great place for a walk or hike, as I'm discovering. The Dogwood and Forest trails haven't quite fully blossomed out yet, but it's still early in spring. It's always a good idea to take an allergy pill (or two) before striking out.

The public area at Withrow is undergoing some major work. Concrete trucks and other pieces of construction equipment have been set up near the springs. I can't tell what they're doing, but it looks like they are shoring up the creek beds and reconstructing the parking lot, among other things.

If anybody knows what is going on out at Withrow regarding the work, please let me know.

Of even greater interest than the total eclipse, of course, is the weather, which changed yet again overnight Monday. A line of severe storms allegedly skipped across northern Madison County in the early morning hours Tuesday (I say "allegedly" because I slept right through them) and brought noticeably cooler temperatures by dawn. It was actually cold as I walked through opening day of the Farmers Market, where the farmers who had gathered to sell their products seemed slightly miffed by the light rain and chilly temps.

Ah, well, it'll be July and 4,000 degrees outside before you know it.

My question is, why is it that a taxpayer, one of several thousand in this county who pay property taxes, of which 70% of goes to the school district, should have to step up and donate \$20,000 of his hard-earned money in order to get our district to install the better seating that was promised by the district when the Activity Center was voted on to begin with? million building fund that is funded with your tax dollars.

Secondly, if anyone is curious as to why the District has lost so many classified employees in the past few years, and why they continue to do so, it is because they refuse to give them a decent raise. Not to mention the state of Arkansas recommended a 3% raise for all classified staff on a yearly ba-

sis every year since 2003.

There are many great people who work for our school district, both certified and classified, and this is in no way a reflection upon them. Only upon the Administration and the board that continues to allow these actions and policies to happen.

Expecting a 'significant' impact from eclipse

Several state agencies are preparing for increased traffic from out-of-state tourists who will drive to Arkansas on Monday, April 8, to view the solar eclipse.

They're planning for traffic disruptions even in parts of the state that will not experience the full effect of the eclipse.

For example, southeast Arkansas is not in the path of totality but highway officials expect the impact on traffic to be "significant" on Highways 65, 165, 82 and 425 because so many visitors will be headed to Pine Bluff, Little Rock and locations along the path of totality in central Arkansas.

west Arkansas will have at least a "significant" amount of higher traffic volumes.

Along Interstate 40 from Alma to Mulberry there will be "extreme traffic" increases. Also, along Highway 65 from Conway to Greenbriar will see "extreme traffic" increases.

taining traffic flows, because state resources will be prioritized in routes where traffic is very high or extreme.

A long routes with "very high" volumes traffic will be well above exceed capacity for several hours, so any wreck or incident will quickly make conditions much worse. Roads with "extreme" traffic increases will be bottlenecks that may require authorities to detour traffic.

Based on data collected during past eclipses, the Department anticipates that 80 percent of visitors will leave immediately after the eclipse passes over. This further strains the smooth flow of traffic.

The eclipse will create a shadow almost 118 miles wide that will enter southwest Arkansas, near DeQueen, at 1:46 p.m. on Monday, April 8. The center of the shadow will leave Arkansas about 2 p.m. in the northeast corner, near Pochontas.

Likewise, in the extreme corner of northwest Arkansas there will be significant impacts on traffic on Highways 412, 59, 62 and the Pig Trail, Highway 23.

Highway 65 from the Missouri border to Conway will have "very high" traffic levels, according to a Transportation Department analysis. So will Interstate 49 from Fayetteville to Alma, and Interstate 40 from Alma to Little Rock.

All the major highways in central, northeast and south-

The Transportation Department is working with the Arkansas Truckers Association to encourage 18-wheelers and oversize loads to stay off the highways before, during and after the eclipse. However, staying off the roads will be a voluntary decision and there will be no penalties for truckers who operate during the eclipse.

The Department will encourage contractors to limit lane closings from April 5

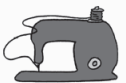

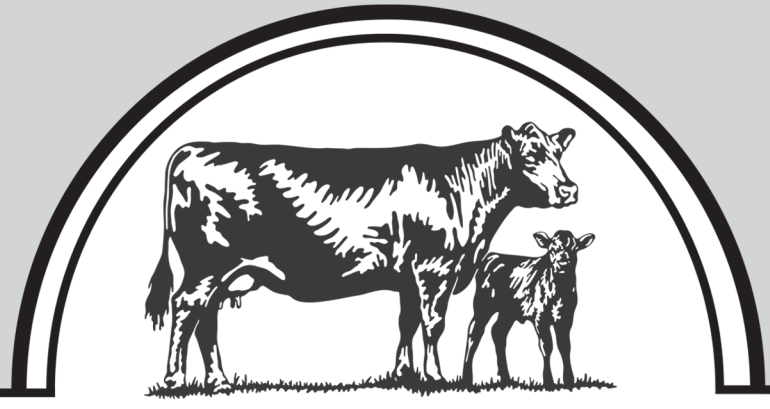

Stakeholders will be able to challenge data provided by the map but must submit evidence of the inaccuracies.

Howie told Shinn and Born that for the first time “ordinary citizens” will be able to challenge the accuracy of the map. This input is needed, but the county can only have “official” challengers such as city council members or justices of the peace.

He said the county needs to decide on who those challengers will be before April 18 in order to have a say in the final map.

He said there are 9,738 houses, businesses and “anchor locations” in Madison

County and 47 grant-eligible locations. There are approximately 1,200 households in Madison County that have an affordability issue with internet access, and 1,300 residents, aged 18-64, who may lack basic digital skills.

He said the goal of the Arkansas State Broadband Office is to ensure all Arkansans have access to affordable, high-speed internet service by 2030, as well as the opportunity to enroll in basic computer skills training and a computer, tablet or mobile device.

He said challengers “have an opportunity to challenge the accuracy of the new state broadband map — prior to the broadband infrastructure grant application process.” Howie said this means cor-

rections can be made to the map “before we go out and award grants.”

Map inaccuracies can include availability, speed, and technology.

Only units of local government, nonprofits and broadband providers can challenge the map. The ongoing challenge phase will last 30 days, followed by a 30-day rebuttal period beginning April 19. The process should be completed by June, Howie said.

The county needs to solidify its broadband committee by April 18 and execute its challenge process, Howie said. Visit the Arkansas State Broadband Office at broadband.arkansas.gov or send email to broadband@arkansas.gov or ARConnectASBO.

city felt strongly” that one was needed, Dotson said. “The city council voted a year and a half ago to suspend [the city’s 1-cent tax] to allow this new tax for the jail to go into effect.”

He said Stephens recommended the city extend the

tax to 2030 not long after he took office as mayor “and that would add \$7 million to the coffers of the city.” However, he said the city’s tax will be allowed to expire and the council “has not discussed” extending it.

“Right now, and for the very foreseeable future, it’s not something that will be brought up,” Dotson said. The city is “doing good right now,

our sales tax revenue has seen record highs, and the tax base has grown. It’s more diverse in the fact that the city has seen a 26.4% growth in population.”

Earlier this year, the city council learned the city had grown by that amount since the 2020 Census, increasing the number of residents within the city limits from 2,879 to 3,663.

"We left too many runners on in the first four innings

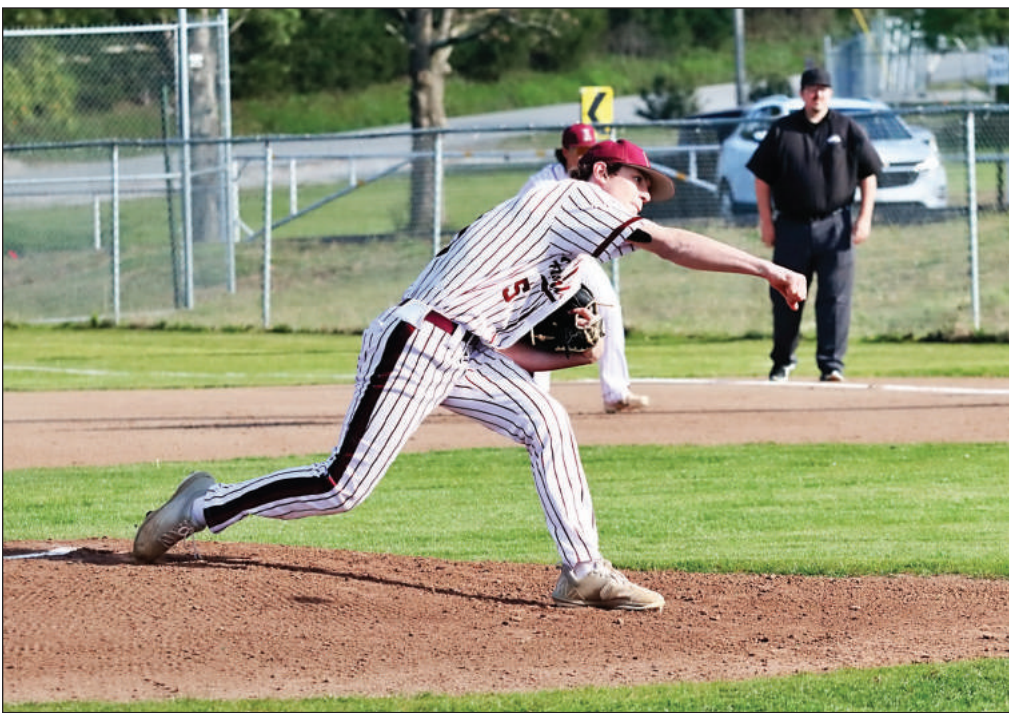

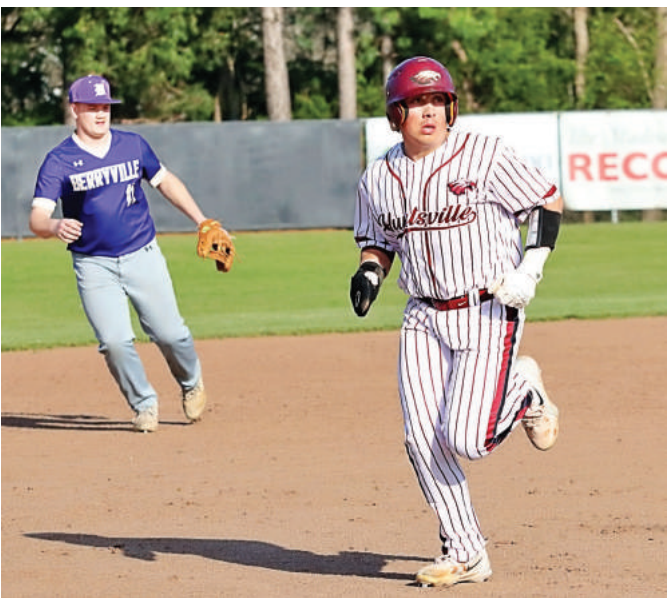

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Huntsville student aims for success with shooting career

Gracie Dinh, a Huntsville resident and senior at Arkansas Virtual Academy, has signed on to compete on the University of Mississippi rifle team.

Dinh, 18, said her career goal is to become a chemical engineer, but even after college she plans to pursue her real passion, which is shooting smallbore and air rifles — on a national and international level.

Dinh is the reigning 2023 National Junior Air Rifle Women's Champion and a four-time Junior Olympian who led the gun club in Starkville, Miss., to two state championships in 2021. In 2022, she became a member of the USA Shooting Junior World Championship Team, and she was one of Ole Miss' top recruits for its shooting program. Since 2019, when she began shooting nationally, her resume is a list of accomplishments. Dinh placed first, second or third regularly in the air rifle or small-bore categories of the Junior Olympic championships. In 2022, Dinh competed on the USAS Junior World Championship Team in Cairo, Egypt, ranking 30th internationally in the 50m Rifle Prone Women (junior division) and 40th in the 50m Rifle 3 Positions Women (junior position). In 2023, Dinh was the second place junior in Part 2 of the USA Shooting Winter Air Gun and Olympic Trials (Air Rifle). She is frequently the only person her age shooting or ranking in national or international competitions. Dinh and her father, Thu, attribute her success not necessarily to natural ability, but hard work and discipline.

"I wouldn't say that I'm a natural," Dinh said from Colorado Springs, Colo. "I actually train for two to three hours every day. During the summer of 2019, I spent five hours a day on the range, every day. It's a lot of hard work. I think it's just because I am very individualistic, very responsible, that I enjoy shooting. It's not that I don't like teamwork, but I'd rather rely on myself. If something goes wrong, it's on me and I can take just as much credit for

my success. I'm a perfectionist, and you don't get closer to perfection than shooting right in the center. That's perfect."

Dinh was introduced to sport shooting when her parents attended a concealed carry class.

"I sort of got into it by accident," she said. "In 2017, my parents wanted to get their concealed carry license in Mississippi, where we lived. They took me to the classes, and I learned about gun safety, that a gun is not a toy, it's a weapon — basic stuff. When it got to the actual practical shooting, the instructor handed me a rifle and not a handgun. Dad took pictures and posted them on Facebook. A family friend told us about a local gun club that offered sport shooting, and recommended we go there and get to know the coaches. So I fell into the sport."

"I shoot an air rifle and a .22 rifle, which is known as a smallbore rifle," Dinh said. "Air rifle is just 60 shots standing, a small bore shoots 20 shots in three positions over a span of an hour and a half. The positions are kneeling, prone and standing."

Dinh moved to Huntsville with her family in August 2022 when Thu, a former professor at Mississippi State University, got a new job at Tyson. To accommodate her increasingly busy travel schedule to various competitions across the U.S. and

world, Dinh said she chose to switch from a "brick-and-mortar" school to a virtual one. She and her parents began shopping in 2022 for the best option. They chose Arkansas Virtual Academy, a full-time public charter school serving students K-12. The school has more than 4,000 students.

Dinh attended Huntsville schools for two years but "I started making international teams and going to bigger matches and we decided it would be in my best academic interest to switch to an online school," Dinh said.

"It's helped me a lot in my career," she said. "I get to travel and bring my school with me. It was difficult at first, I had to be self-disciplined enough to make myself get up in the morning and not say, 'Oh, well, this class is optional.' Yeah, it's been amazing. My teachers are supportive, and I've been able to make friends, though I usually see them only during class."

When she's traveling, Dinh can catch up on her coursework by watching recordings and put in the extra work on weekends. According to information supplied by Arkansas Virtual Academy, Dinh has the highest GPA in her senior class, though she has not attended the school all four of her high school years.

Dinh travels as often as twice a month, to Colorado Springs most of the time, but

also to compete in Georgia, Alabama, W. Virginia, Texas, "wherever there are matches," Thu said. Internationally, she has traveled to Egypt and Estonia, which provided some interesting memories.

"On my way to Egypt to shoot a world championship, we had a five-hour layover in Germany," she said. "A group of four or five of us went out to eat at a German restaurant. They had really good sausage. I had joined the Junior World Championship Team, so this was my first time shooting overseas. It was pretty harsh. Half our team got food poisoning. It was cool seeing all the other teams. China brought their own chef. My match didn't go very well. It was my first, so I give myself some grace, but I could have handled it better."

"It was a really fun journey and learning curve," she said. International teams are "the best of the best, they don't send just anyone to represent their country. They are very, very nice and polite. I guess it puts it in perspective, that I'm not the center of the world. I live here in Arkansas and don't think about other parts of the world. I get to learn about their experiences, their shooting journey, what school is like for them. It's cool to hear their stories."

Dinh is in Colorado this week shooting in a Junior Olympics competition, the first of a two-part selection process for the Junior World

Olympics team. Part two will be held in June. Shooters with the top five combined scores will form the world championship team. Dinh said she believes the world championship event will be held in Peru.

She's excited to go to Ole Miss to shoot on its team, which her father called "elite."

"I decided I wanted to shoot in college and also pursue an academic career as a chemical engineer," Dinh said. "I had this gut feeling that [Ole Miss' coaches] would make me a better shooter. And, Ole Miss offers amazing academic scholarships, which came into play."

"My wife and I are absolutely proud of what Gracie has achieved," Thu, a former professor at Mississippi State University, said. "It really takes grit and determination. A lot of people have helped along the way, and now, when she goes to college, she will have amazing coaches, as well. It's hard to take credit

as a parent, but the credit belongs to a lot of people. This sport is about mental conditioning and strength, how you make decisions."

Dinh works and focuses so hard on her shooting that she has set up a practice range in a most unusual location: the hallway in her home.

"It was really the only option, because not a lot of gun ranges offer the distance and facilities I need for my type of shooting," she said. "We set this up in our hallway. We have this electronic laser training system that will track your barrel and the vibrations of the gun."

She noted that she dry fires her weapon in the house, with no projectile leaving the gun.

As for college, she's "going to attempt something no one has done, have a professional career and a shooting career," Dinh said. "I want to keep my rankings up, go overseas. I see shooting in my future."

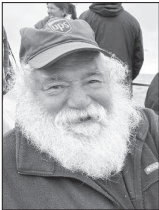

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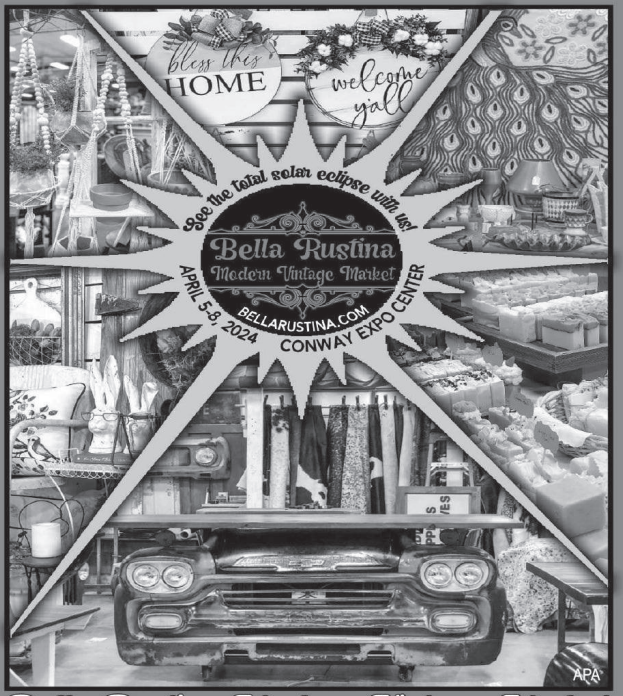
