## Commission stands ground on need for local control

Moody County Commissioners know that a new resolution they passed last week likely won't stop Senate Bill 201 from making its way to the Governor's desk.

But if it helps to send a message, that's the intent.

Moody County Resolution 202402202 passed locally this past Tuesday morning after quite a bit of discussion between Commissioners and a few citizens there to weigh in, including former Moody County Commissioner Rick Veldkamp.

"It might not do any good," Veldkamp said, speaking specifically to Commissioner Randy Hemmer.

Hemmer pressed everyone in the room for why the Commission would consider the Resolution when it already had such a strict setback ordinance in place.

"But it doesn't hurt, and I think it sends a message. The more counties that

pass these resolutions, I think the stronger the case Representatives can make to keep local control," Veldkamp replied.

Veldkamp had never been a fan of such resolutions when he was serving Moody County. His change of heart on this one, he told former colleagues, wasn't about the pipeline.

It was entirely about the loss of local control.

Dozens of other counties and townships have already drafted and approved similar resolutions.

SB 201, for those who perhaps haven't been following, is the bill that would "provide new statutory requirements for regulating linear transmission facilities, to allow counties to impose a surcharge on certain pipeline companies."

In other words, it is the bill that sponsor Casey Crabtree of Brookings, Kingsbury, Lake and Miner Counties believes needs to pass to essentially green light the construction of controversial carbon capture pipe-

line networks across South Dakota.

The controversy, for the opposition anyway, is on any number of levels — but where SB 201 is concerned, a primary concern is over the use of eminent domain to get the pipelines built.

Eminent domain legally refers to the power of the government to take private property and convert it into public use. The Fifth Amendment provides that the government may only exercise this power if they provide just compensation to the property owners.

SB 201 would now give a private company or companies in South Dakota that right.

Hundreds of South Dakota landowners, including many from Moody County, have been fighting the pipelines coming across their land.

The bill will also strip counties and townships of the right to establish setback rules for carbon pipelines

## Hitting pause on a new Egan Bridge

The decision to move forward with the replacement of an historic bridge in Egan is for now, on hold.

Concerns were raised at the most recent Egan City Council Meeting that no one knew about any plans for a replacement, despite formal Council paperwork filed on the matter last June and plans for the Bridge Improvement Grant and/or Local Federal Bridge Programs application listed on the agenda with the engineering firm IMEG this past July.

A few there to speak on the matter want more time and discussion on what the future of the bridge should be given how closely the town is perhaps tied to it.

Concerned residents and at least one neighboring property owner also felt that a replacement should not happen given the bridge is listed on the National Park Service's National Register of Historic Places.

The bridge is one that many know well, it's the beautiful old one-lane that crosses the Big Sioux River east of town off of 2nd Street, countless family and

senior photo sessions have been taken there over the years while locals routinely walk, bike, and cruise the quiet, serene route along the river.

More on the bridge itself, how plans to replace it came about, and what the options might otherwise be for the future of the aging structure if a fully-funded replacement is declined, in an upcoming edition.

Representatives from IMEG currently plan to be at the March 20th council meeting to help city officials address questions, concerns, and next steps.



business owners in their own right, out of the Watertown area.

Ethan, Heather said, has all the knowledge in the mechanicals of the plant, Gary and Michelle bring expertise in financial planning and retail. The young couples are also working with Rob Deslauriers from Rob's Locker in Gary, South Dakota. Deslauriers has owned and operated his locker for 43 years and has "been a huge blessing to us in business planning, production protocols, and day to day advice," Heather said.

The partners have a couple of staff hired right now but they are still looking for team members. Their formal state inspection is scheduled for early this week, and they plan to open as quickly as possible after certification.

Matt will be one of the friendly faces when you walk in the door and help bring that small town feeling into the plant. Robert is also willing to dig in and get whatever tasks need to be completed, said Ethan.

The likelihood their four (soon-to-be five) kiddos will be there to greet you as well — 8-year-old Josias, 7-year-old Autumn, 5-year-old Chancey, and 1-year-old R.J., is pretty high. They're already loving, along with the Wadsworth's children, the family and office space above the main lobby area and have taken it over as their own.

"We are here for the community, if there is ever an issue please come to us and we will do our best to correct it. We want to be the place you can stop into on the way home from work, grab some fresh cuts and take home to enjoy with friends and family through-

## Faith Reflections

*The Rescue Church Relationships Are Messy*

A pastor friend recently asked me, "how do you get people to deal with their conflict?" Conflict isn't a new issue.

In the latter part of the book of Colossians, as Paul is wrapping up his letter, he mentions a variety of people who are a part of his ministry. Among them is a guy named Mark. This is interesting, because earlier on in Paul's ministry this very same person (John Mark) caused significant conflict, and he does it more than once.

If you look in the book of Acts and chapter 13, you will see John Mark has been serving with Paul and then ditches him. They are busy getting things done and Mark takes off.

Then, in Acts 15, another of the people Paul serves with, Barnabas (who also happens to be John Mark's cousin), argues they should give Mark another chance. A disagreement ensues. In the end, Paul goes one way while Barnabas and Mark go another. This guy Mark is good at stirring conflict.

Fast forward to Paul's letter to the Colossians and Mark is listed as one of Paul's allies sending greetings. The Bible doesn't give any clear insight to how Paul resolved his conflict with John Mark. It simply indicates he has.

Relationships are messy. People can be messy. Since the church is made up of people, the local church can be messy.

While Paul doesn't give insight as to how he resolved his conflict, Jesus tells us as his followers what we are supposed to do about it. My guess is Paul followed Jesus' advice. There are two major pieces to Jesus' advice. You can find them in Matthew 5:23-24 and Matthew 18:15. I'll save you the time of looking them up.

The first answer to conflict is what to do when you know someone else has an issue with you. Jesus says, "go and be reconciled to them." He certainly doesn't say that if they have a problem with me, it's their issue. Instead, he says that if they have an issue with me it is my issue to address.

Jesus' second piece of instruction is that if you have an issue, go to them. Address it with them. Just the two of you. He continues with what to do if they don't listen, which includes going back to them with a trusted impartial person to help resolve it.

Here is the point. If you have an issue, it is your responsibility to take steps to resolve it, regardless of who started it.

At the risk of stating the obvious, we don't always see things the same way. Difference of perspective and opinions is often extremely valuable to any relationship or organization, even though it may not be easy. Healthy relationships and healthy churches aren't built on an absence of disagreements or conflicts. It's often quite the opposite. They are often built on how the disagreements and differences are dealt with.

"Local Control" is a term used in a variety of circumstances. Just what is local control? When the Federal Government passes laws or makes rules, states often claim that local control is being ignored. This may be a valid point as the 10th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution says, "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people". Counties, towns, townships, school districts and other organizations sometimes express similar local control concerns when laws or rules are considered that do not "sit well" with their view. This is often the case when funding is approved with accountability or other requirements.

With local control comes local responsibility. States want federal funding for a

variety of purposes. Federal funding comes with federally imposed requirements (reduced local control). Medicaid funding and its numerous associated eligibility, accountability and monitoring requirements are an example. Counties, towns, townships, and school districts want or need state funding for projects. State funding comes with requirements (reduced local control). Any level of organization desiring to claim local control must be willing to assume complete responsibility (funding) for their efforts.

I believe the individual or family unit is the ultimate local control situation and that all levels of government exist to serve citizens who want to participate in a system "equally open to all" as our South Dakota Constitution says. Families cannot operate, regulate or tax outside of their own family unit and as such demonstrate the ultimate example of "local control" over their destiny.

Many bills relating to CO2 pipelines have significant local control implications. SB201, provides new statutory requirements for regulating linear transmission facilities and allows counties to impose a surcharge on certain pipeline companies. In exchange for allowing counties to receive a tax on pipelines, counties would not be allowed to have or enforce pipeline setbacks.

SB201 states "This Act preempts any local law, ordinance, or regulation that conflicts with any provision of this chapter or any policy of the state implemented in accordance with this chapter and, notwithstanding any other provision of law, a governmental unit of this state may not enact or enforce an ordinance, local law, or regulation conflicting with or preempted by this chapter." While this language references local governments, individuals are also negatively impacted as use of eminent domain will be much easier, further

eroding your ability to enjoy and manage your own property in exchange for your county receiving some of your tax dollars! This has not been a positive legislative session regarding individual property rights (local control). Stay tuned!

Week 6 Report  
Week 6 of the 2024 Legislative Session ended on February 15th. All of our committees in both chambers have been busy working through the 478 bills that were introduced this year. In South Dakota, every introduced bill gets a hearing in a committee.

For some reason, legislators tend to get evaluated on how effective they are by how many bills they get passed. While I do understand that passing legislation is an aspect of the job and part of the reason that the good people of District 25 voted for me to represent them in Pierre, it's only part of the job. In fact, I would argue that it's equally important to vote correctly and help kill poor legislation. Legislation that violates our United States Constitution or our South Dakota Constitution needs to be defeated and never seen again.

As a Conservative Republican, I think that Government closest to the people best serves the people of that area. We don't want the Federal Government telling the City Council of Dell Rapids, Garretson, or Flandreau on what ordinances they can or can't enforce, just like we don't want the State of South Dakota enacting laws that restrict counties or townships from passing laws that are best for the people in those counties or townships. But unfortunately, that's exactly what we have with SB 201 this year. SB 201 preemptively voids any county

or township safety standards or setbacks when it comes to the CO2 pipeline. SB 201 says that the Federal Government knows what's best for your county or your township and the safety of your neighbors when it comes to CO2 pipelines and how far they should be away from your house, or your friends, or your family. Quite honestly, it's Government overreach and it's not how we do business here in South Dakota. At the time of this writing, SB 201 has passed a Senate committee and will be debated on the Senate Floor on February 20th or 21st.

## 24/7 drug monitoring patch fee increase

The first of the five legislative bills introduced this session by the South Dakota Attorney General's Office has been signed into law by Governor Kristi Noem.

Senate Bill 24 would increase the maximum user fee for a participant voluntarily agreeing to wear a drug patch under the 24/7 sobriety program.

The new patches cost more than the current fee of \$50 due to the increased cost of fentanyl testing. This proposal would raise the fee to no more than \$70 for each drug patch that is

attached, to be paid for by the participant. The bill had previously passed both the Senate and House.

"The increase in the user fee is to cover the increased cost of fentanyl testing," said Attorney General Jackley. "In 2023, more than 10 pounds of fentanyl was seized in South Dakota resulting in 284 arrests. Testing of fentanyl will better protect the public, and the increased fee will be paid by the participants, not the taxpayers."

Four other bills out of the A.G.'s office have also passed both chambers and

House Bill 1028 classifies Xylazine as a Schedule III controlled substance.

Senate Bill 26 clarifies the membership of the five-member Open Meeting Commission to include Deputy State's Attorneys as well.

Senate Bill 79 revises various levels of child pornography crimes and in-

cludes the Attorney General's Office's Senate Bill 25, which would make Artificial Intelligence-generated child pornography a crime.

SB 201 passed the Senate in a 23-11 vote last Wednesday.

Senator Tom Pischke, who represents the 25th District and Moody County, was among the 11 to vote nay.

The proposed legislation went before the House Commerce and Energy committee early Monday, around the same time this issue went to print.

A clause in the bill to "declare an emergency" means it would go into effect immediately

if Governor Noem signs it.

HB 1185 and HB 1186 are two other related bills locals are closely watching.

Ethanol and corn industry leaders, silent this past year on the matter, are now largely responsible for and out in front of multiple bills addressing eminent domain and pipeline-related legislation this year. And they continue to face off in hearings with state and local residents concerned about how and where the pipelines will be built and wary of the technology.

Residents, concerned about potential ruptures, fear what adjacent pipelines will do to the health and safety of their families and livestock along with property values.

Farmers especially want to know how the lines will

be buried and at what depth given the explosive and potentially deadly danger should a carbon capture pipeline rupture or experience a leak.

"I understand it might feel fruitless to approve a resolution because there are so many heavy hitters in the opposition," local resident Gwen Reker told Commissioners this past Tuesday. Her husband, Dave, among them.

"But I also believe that if Moody County doesn't stand up to this issue in some open way, it might seem like we are agreeable to the position of the proposed legislation. So I respectfully ask that this Commission approve a clear and unquestionable resolution to support local control," she added.

### FLANDREAU CITY ORDINANCE NO. 619 AN ORDINANCE ENACTING A CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF FLANDREAU, SOUTH DAKOTA, AMENDING, RESTATING, CODIFYING, AND COMPILING CERTAIN EXISTING GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE POLITICAL SUBDIVISION DEALING WITH SUBJECT EMBRACED IN SUCH CODE OF ORDINANCES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the present general and permanent ordinances of the political subdivision are inadequately arranged and classified and are insufficient in form and substance for the complete preservation of the public peace, health safety, and general welfare of the municipality and for proper conduct of its affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Acts of the Legislature of the State of South Dakota empower and authorize the political subdivision to revise, amend, restate, codify, and compile any existing ordinances and all new ordinances not heretofore adopted or published and to incorporate such ordinance in book form; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to provide for the usual daily operation of the municipality and for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the municipality that this ordinance take effect at an early date.

#### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY OF THE POLITICAL SUBDIVISION OF FLANDREAU:

**Section 1.** The general ordinances of the Political Subdivision as revised, amended, restated, codified, and compiled in book form are hereby adopted as and shall constitute the "Code of Ordinances of the City of Flandreau, South Dakota".

**Section 2.** Such Code of Ordinances as adopted in Section 1 shall consist of the following Titles:

- Title I: General Provisions
- Title XI: Business Regulations
- Title III: Administration
- Title XIII: General Offenses
- Title V: Public Works
- Title XV: Land Usage
- Title VII: Traffic Code
- Table of Special Ordinances
- Title IX: General Regulations
- Parallel References

**Section 3.** All ordinances passed prior to June 6, 2023, pertaining to the subjects treated in such Code of Ordinances shall be deemed repealed from and after the effective date of this ordinance except as they are included and reordained in whole or in part in such Code; provided, such repeal shall not affect any offense committed or penalty incurred or any right established prior to the effective date of this ordinance, nor shall such repeal affect the provisions of ordinances levying taxes, appropriating money, annexing or detaching territory, establishing franchises, or granting special rights to certain persons, authorizing public improvements, authorizing the issuance of bonds or borrowing money, authorizing the purchase or sale of real or personal property, granting or accepting easements, plat or dedication of land to public use, vacating or setting the boundaries of streets or other public places; nor shall such repeal affect any other ordinance of a temporary or special nature or pertaining to subjects not contained in or covered by the Code.

**Section 4.** Such Code shall be deemed published as of the day of its adoption and approval by the Legislative Authority and the Clerk of the Political Subdivision is hereby authorized and ordered to file a copy of such Code of Ordinances in the Office of the Finance Officer.

**Section 5.** Such Code shall be in full force and effect as provided in Section 6, and such Code shall be presumptive evidence in all courts and places of the ordinance and all provisions, sections, penalties, and regulations therein contained and of the date of passage, and that the same is properly signed, attested, recorded, and approved and that any public hearings and notices thereof as required by law have been given.

**Section 6.** This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the people of this municipality, and shall take effect at the earliest date provided by law.

## Fliers sent four to Class A mat meet Flier boys win last regular season game

Flandreau's six regionals wrestlers scored 66 teams points to place eighth in the South Dakota High School Activities Association's Region 1A tournament and three of those wrestlers qualified for the State A Championships held last weekend.

**State Meet**  
SIOUX FALLS – The Flandreau Fliers failed to make the podium brackets at the SDSHAA Class A Championships but gained some valuable experience.

Teague Bergjord and Karter Headrick both recorded one win and two losses at the state meet while seniors Julie Pitsenberger and Brayden Wiese both went 0-2.

Bergjord was defeated by the fourth seed, Kayden Tehida of Sisseton in the 113 pound weight class. The Flier sophomore won over Aden Candelaria pinning the Rapid City Central wrestler in 4:02. In his final match, he lost to Max Schoenhard of Rapid City Stevens in a 16-5 major decision. Bergjord closed the year with a record of 30-19.

At 132, Julie Pitsenberger was matched with Alexa Swaney of Belle Fourche and was pinned in 54 seconds in the first round. In the second round, she lost to Kyla Loga of Doland by fall, 1:47. She finished the year with an 11-12 record.
