Bobcats hope to come of age with eyes on State Tournament

BROOKINGS – For years, Brookings girls basketball coach Mitch McLagan has been excited about what his team could become. After a couple of years under their belt, the Bobcats have battled through the ESD but couldn't get over the hump.

But entering this year, the Bobcats' core of underclassmen has turned into juniors and seniors who are trying to turn the lessons they learned into a spot in the State Tournament this winter. "It's pretty exciting," McLagan said of the Bobcats coming into the year. "When we look at the returning minutes that we'll be putting on the court, we have a very experienced varsity basketball team."

The Bobcats will return guard Logan Smidt and forwards Kymber Buys and Tess Burns as their seniors this year but they'll be flanked by key junior forward Macy Even and guards Amari Ward and Sloan McLagan.

But while there's still a good portion of youth on the team, Mitch McLagan believes that his juniors are ready for the challenge thanks to the minutes their received as freshmen and sophomores.

"We're going to see quite a few juniors out there, but those juniors that are going to get minutes have played a lot of varsity basketball before," McLagan said. "When you look at the other teams around the state, they just don't have the experience that we do. You hope that leads to success." The Bobcats' path to success has been built over the past year. Brookings went 7-14 a year ago and lost to Brandon Valley in the SoDak 16 but there were multiple games that McLagan felt got away from them.

Of all the lessons the Bobcats have learned, McLagan believes that the Bobcats learned how to put in the work and hopes that success will get them where they need to go.

"The joke we made was that this group never really knew how to work hard," McLagan said. "...I think in the past, we weren't very consistent with that hard work. I think with some of that maturity, we started to understand why it's important to work, show up every day and work hard."

The dedication has shown up on the defensive end, where McLagan feels his team will thrive. But the Bobcats have other areas where they would like to improve upon such as their rebounding.

"We want to have rebounding be our thing," McLagan said. "Our goal is to outrebound the opposing team every night not just on the defensive glass but on the offensive glass, too. Because when you look at it, we feel like we can steal some possessions."

McLagan also wants to cut down on turnovers but an advantage on the glass can help make up for some of their mistakes. "We've had some turnovers in the past and I think when you start getting some offensive rebounds, it will make up for some of those turnovers," McLagan said.

It's rebounding and turnovers

that could be the difference in what could be a wild year in Class AA. With plenty of talent graduating including South Dakota State commits Mahli Abdouch (O'Gorman) and Jaidyn Dunn (Sioux Falls Jefferson), McLagan believes the class could be unpredictable even with Harrisburg and Brandon Valley as favorites to open the year.

"We lost a lot of talent as a state this past year, so you're going to see a lot of newcomers," McLagan said. "It's going to be interesting to see where we're going to stack up. You've got to put Harrisburg and Brandon Valley toward the top of the list because they're going to be really good. But then I think it's just everyone else. It's not just coachspeak this year. If you don't show up, you're going to get beat because there's so many teams that are so similar."

The Bobcats hope that their newfound experience will give them a leg up and a fast start could be the key that leads to a home SoDak 16 game and a potential berth in the State Tournament.

"We've tried to stress as a coaching staff, our goals need to be [a State Tournament appearance] first," McLagan said. "With the SoDak 16 format, the regular season games are so important and we haven't gotten off to the greatest of starts the last couple of years. I think getting off to a good start, putting yourself in a position where you're hosting a SoDak 16 game...and I think when you start doing those things, you start reaching those ultimate goals."





Young Bobcats seek to flip the script in 2024-25

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats boys basketball team will have a young roster this year but head coach Mike McCarty hopes that it won't stop them from being competitive in the Eastern South Dakota Conference this season.

The Bobcats are coming off a 2-18 record where they missed the SoDak 16 in McCarty's first year as head coach in Brookings but he believes some new faces could help inject life into a team that lost plenty of close games a year ago.

"I'm optimistic," McCarty said. "It's year two, we've got some guys coming back but we are going to be pretty young and inexperienced but I think we've got some guys that are ready to step up. ...They didn't see much time last year, but they all played quite a bit on [the JV team.] They've all played together for a number of games and we're just looking to have that translate onto the varsity level."

Brookings lost a lot from last season including their guards Austin Clark, Nathan Smith, Cole Skyberg, Ian Webster, Ben Moret and Sam Johnson as well as forwards Owen Burns, Keech Bior and Cale Jones. But McCarty's optimism stems from some of the returners including guard Brodie McCarty and forward Bergan Tetzlaff.

Tetlaff and fellow forward Drew Johnson represent one of the Bobcats's strengths presenting an inside presence for the Bobcats. But Brodie McCarty joins fellow guards Jon Kahler, Jones Huntimer and Jase Bauer to give the Bobcats enough shooting as well.

"We'll have an inside presence with Bergan being able to score down low, but we'll have some shooters around him," Mike McCarty explained. "We're pretty guard-oriented, so I think we'll have some quickness that we can take advantage of on some nights."

McCarty is also optimistic about his team's defense that he believes can help his team stay in games.

"We need to create an identity on defense because that's where I think we will find some success,' Mike McCarty said. "If we're able to just get after it on the defensive end and pressure the basketball and mix things up, I think we'll have to be a little creative with the things we do on the defensive end. We're not going to do just one thing all season."

Inventing an identity on defense will be just one of the things that Brookings will try to work on. Taking care of the ball will be one way to help out the defense and creating some takeaways could energize the Bobcats to add additional effort on both ends of the floor.

"We had a lot of turnovers last year, so just [want to be] able to execute and take care of the basketball on the offensive end

and to get good, quality shots on every possession we can," Mike McCarty said. "Then, we can play a full 35 seconds defensively, get up and defend each shot and finish the possession with a good, solid rebound."


It's a strategy that will try to help the Bobcats stand out in the ESD conference. Defending Class AA champion Mitchell returns most of its roster from a year ago while Watertown, Aberdeen Central, Brandon Valley and Harrisburg are all teams that will have a chance at the crown.

But while the Bobcats will have a challenging schedule, they can lean on some of the success they had a year ago. Six of Brookings' losses were by six points or fewer last season and if the Bobcats can flip those margins around, it could be enough to get Brookings back to the SoDak 16.

It's a modest goal for a team that hasn't been to the SoDak 16 for quite some time but it's one that can be reached if the Bobcats can flip the script.

"I just want to be competitive on a nightly basis and give ourselves a chance in the fourth quarter," Mike McCarty said. "We had a handful of games that we just weren't able to find a way to win, so this year, if we're able to get over that hurdle a big, start pulling out a few of those close games, hopefully, that'll build a little bit of confidence and we can go from there.

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a force again this winter.

"We have this saying in our organization that culture doesn't graduate," Gerstner said. "We have so many former players that are coaches in this organization so the kids know the expectation and they're pretty much taught that from the time they're 12 what our expectations are."

The Rangers will have a healthy mix of younger and older players as the season begins. Brookings lost plenty along the blue line including captain David Brink, Chase Karch and Ren Jacobsen but are looking to some of their veteran defensemen including Luke Honkomp, who finished second in the SDAHA with 42 assists and ninth with 48 points to carry the load.

"As a former defenseman, I think it's really tough to come in and play defense as a young guy," Gerstner said. "We've got a couple of freshmen and sophomores that we're going to try to get looks at, so that might be a little bit of a concern. But we preach defense. They've been hearing about it for the last four, five, six years whatever it is. So I think it might be a little tougher transition, but it's not something we're too worried about at this point."

The presence of Egan Jensen in goal will be a big help for the defense. Jensen will miss the opening portion of the year as he recovers from an injury suffered during football season, but he was a First Team All-State selection with an 11-0-0 record, a 0.91 goals against average, and a .932 save percentage while splitting time with departing senior Addison Ronning last season.

"He split time pretty evenly [with Ronning] last year but in the state tournament, Addison took over," Gerstner said. "Egan played the same number of games as Addison last year but he'll be our starter this year. We're looking forward to getting him back."

While the blue line settles in and Jensen recovers from injury, it may

be the Rangers' offense that needs to take over. Brookings lost Owen Schneider, who led the state with 33 goals and finished second with 63 points, and Jacob Kahle, who was fifth in goals a year ago. But the Rangers will also bring a large chunk of their offense back including forward Jay Harris (12 goals, 23 assists last season), Talon Hyde (11 goals, 19 assists) and Cooper Deatherage (five goals, 11 assists).

"I think even though we graduated some top scorers in the league, we're still really deep at forward," Gerstner said. "We're going to have four lines that we're going to be able to roll out at any point in the game and feel confident that they're going to be able to get the job done."


If their season opener against Sioux Center was any indication, the Rangers will not have any issues scoring goals or preventing them as they claimed a 15-0 win on Sunday morning. But leading the young players along will require captains Honkomp, Deatherage and Riley Linstad to have a more vocal role.

It's a process that takes place frequently in high school hockey but few do it as seamlessly as the Rangers. While another state title is a goal, the bigger picture is helping the young players along for a team that seems to reload more than it rebuilds.

"They're the future of this program," Gerstner said of his underclassmen. "Obviously, we're very thankful to win four state championships [in a row], but we've preached to them that it's not normal and it shouldn't be. You shouldn't expect to go in and win a state championship just because you play here. Like the kids we've had before us, they've earned everything they've had.

"We've just let them know that it's not going to come easy and for the older guys, they know we are just keeping the foundation and not get away from who we are. We're just making sure that culture is established and that's really big for those older guys."

But the benefit of having such a young team is the lessons they learned along the way. After finishing last season with wins in five of their final eight games and winning the consolation championship at the State Tournament, Rangers coach JaColby Anderson is optimistic about his team and believes they can be competitive this season.

"I think the biggest thing they learned is how to rely on each other and just trust the process," Anderson said. "Everyone is going through it, understanding that it's an uphill climb and we need everybody working together to achieve those goals that we develop as a team, knowing that it's not going to be easy."

The Rangers will rely on a trio of captains to guide them into the year. Junior Kinzey Grendler will wear the "C" for the Rangers after leading Brookings with 15 points (10 goals, five assists) last season but the Rangers will have alternate captains Miyah Foerster (five goals, five assists) and Anna Rasmussen (four goals, six assists) in a group that gained valuable experience last year.

"Just knowing that we had to get through the grind of a season where we relied a lot on seniors two years ago...when you have that leadership with upperclassmen, it's easier to ride the curtails," Anderson said. "They kind of paved the way for you and not really having that last year and just being extremely young...now they've been there. They've experienced it and you know that they're going to develop a lot more confidence. The girls know what to expect and they've done it an entire year without that senior leadership."

The experience will also help the Rangers in net. Rorii Quam returns after a 6-7 record with a 3.40 goalsagainst average and .881 save percentage in conference play last year and with a core that also includes Sawyer Triplett, who led Brookings with 12 goals.

"We're looking for her to work hard and give us the best shot to be competitive in every game," Anderson said of Quam. "With her presence in net, we know that we have a few girls on this roster that can also contribute as long as they all buy in, work hard and trust the process."

The process will be important as the Rangers look to compete in the SDAHA. The Rangers already learned what it takes do that from last year and are looking forward to building on it this year.

"We just have to put in the work," Anderson said. "We have to be prepared to put in the work every day and pay attention to the finer details of the game and just buy in and understand that hockey is a long season. We've just got to take it one day at a time and when those opportunities present themselves, we have to be ready to capitalize."



Bobcats upperclassmen look to guide newcomers in 2024-25

BROOKINGS – The Brookings boys wrestling team will look to take another step forward this winter. But the Bobcats will rely on the leadership of their upperclassmen to lead their team to success during the 2024-25 season.

The Bobcats have seen an increase in participation in their program with 30 boys in the high school program and 45 in the middle school program. But the varsity team has a youthful feel to it with 13 freshmen and four sophomores entering the season.

"I'm excited about all of them," Hanson said of his wrestlers this year. "Guys are waiting for their turn but they've been in the program for four or five years now and we're looking for them to lead. The nice part about having those juniors and seniors is we have plenty of underclassmen looking for some leadership and over the course of the first two weeks, they've done a good job of that and the freshmen are starting to figure that out."

The Bobcats leadership is filled with talent including senior Gabe Stern. After a hip injury knocked him out for the 2022-23 season, Stern made his third career State Tournament appearance, finishing in fifth place with a 30-7 record at last year's meet.

Brookings will feature fellow state qualifier Mason Mathis along with juniors Blake Kannegieter, Dylan Reynolds, James Fitzpatrick and Zach

Haggeman but will also have some questions as they build their lineup entering this season after many wrestlers played deep into the football season after the Bobcats reached the Class 11AA semifinals.

With those wrestlers still in football shape, Hanson believes it may take some time to get their ideal wrestling weight to open the season.

"We've got a lot of kids that played a lot of varsity quarters for them," Hanson said. "They're all about the same size right now, so we'll have some lineup issues at the beginning of the year. But as the year shakes out, we'll look to fill our spots once we get to January and February."

Filling a complete lineup will be important as the Bobcats look to compete in the Eastern South Dakota Conference. Watertown remains the favorite to win the Class AA championship but Pierre and Aberdeen Central also return strong teams, which creates a fun but interesting challenge for this year's team.

"The ESD is tough, but I say that every year," Hanson said. "We bust our tails to compete. ... It's fun because we get to compete against the best every week and it shows where we're at. By the end of the day, we hope to be at our best."

Overall, it will be on the Bobcats to approach this season like most years. Take things day by day and continue to learn as they look to be at their best come February.

"We've got a young team and with all of those freshmen and sophomores, we've got to get better," Hanson said. "We've wrestled a lot in practice and they're picking things up and getting better. But as a coach, you're always wondering if they're actually getting better and we've seen good signs toward that."





Bobcat girls wrestling seeks to send more wrestlers to state this season

BROOKINGS - The Brookings Bobcats had a banner year in girls wrestling last season, sending five wrestlers to the State Tournament including 145-pound champion Johanna Steinlicht and 165-pound runner-up Maizy Mathis.

But girls wrestling in South Dakota isn't about what you've done in the previous season. It's about the ability to evolve. In its third season as a sanctioned sport, the competition has continued to improve and head coach Eric Toft hopes the Bobcats can take a step of their own by sending more girls to the State Tournament this year.

"We don't have a ton of girls out this year, but the ones we have are high quality," Toft said. "We have three returning state qualifiers coming back and then a couple that were on the cusp of qualifying last year. I'm hoping they can all be qualifiers, if not placers, this year and we're feeling good about where our team is at."

Brookings will be led by Lily Toft and Bailey TeKrony, who both gualified for the State Tournament last season. Toft finished last season with a record of 14-8 while TeKrony finished 17-9 while picking up a win over Marion/Freeman's Sarah Cremer at State.

Steinlicht also returns but will begin the season rehabbing a torn ACL suffered during a tournament in the summer. While the Bobcats are hoping Steinlicht - who went 33-0 on the way to a state title last season - can return after Christmas, they'll also play it safe as she prepares to wrestle collegiately at the University of Sioux Falls next winter.

"It's going to kind of depend on how her rehab goes," Toft admitted. "That was a big loss, but hopefully we can get her back. But she's been with us every day of practice and very involved with the team while she's been rehabbing. It will be great to get her back."

Toft also has high expectations for the three wrestlers who came short of the State Tournament a year ago. Ramsey Heincher and Claire Milliron are two wrestlers that Toft expects to qualify this year as well as Kami Erickson, who is returning to Brookings as a junior after spending her sophomore year in Wisconsin.

The group contains some high-level talent but could leave the Bobcats short on depth as they go into team competition this year.

"We have a couple of new girls that will step in and fill in, but they're going to have a high learning curve," Toft said. "Other then that, our team is pretty much what it's going to look like, heavy at the bottom but open at the top."

It will be on the Bobcats to find a way to make the most of their talent as they head into State competition. With the level increasing, girls across the state have put in the work to become better wrestlers and it's added another dynamic to the action on the mat.

"The level of wrestling just keeps improving," Toft said. "We're only a few years into girls wrestling, but there's already an elite level of girls at the top and everyone is learning they need to do stuff in the offseason

if you really want to be at that elite level. You can't just walk onto the mat and expect to win like it was in the first year, where nobody really knew what they were doing and aggressive girls could just win on aggression. Technique is getting much better and there are girls that have been in this for three or four years now and they're getting

Bobcats aim for another state title, improvement in 2024-25

Bobcats bowling team is looking to build on its success from last season as the boys and girls teams hit the **BROOKINGS** - The Brookings lanes this winter.

While both teams have their strengths, it's created a juxtaposition that has kept the bowling program growing and thriving over the past

couple of seasons. "It's the largest boys squad we've ever had this year and the girls team, they just have fun," Brookings coach Rick Hieb said. "It's pretty neat. The boys are great and it's fun."

> The girls team is coming off their second state title in the past three years after completing an undefeated season at 13-0. While the Bobcats return Alexis Hieb, Peyton McBride and Kacee Rhody, they've

also looked to have fun while going on a three-year undefeated streak during the regular season.

Part of the secret for the girls

has been mixing in ways to compliment the grind such as creating and posting videos on social media. While Hieb works with the boys team and his wife and fellow coach Kasee works with the girls, Hieb says the demeanor of the girls team has set the tone for the program.

"I don't get over to them as much but they're just goofy," Hieb chuckled. "They have fun and they're just pretty neat."

The boys team is also growing and looking to build on a 5-7 record from a year ago. Holden Austreim, James Taft, Jaiden Monell and Adrian Howard are two of the key returners from last year's team but they've also developed a personality surrounded by their competitiveness which helped them knock off top-seeded Yankton and finish fifth during last year's State Tournament.

"It's hard to get them out of their shell but the State Tournament will do that to them," Hieb said. "You want to see the night and day difference between those boys. It was the second year where we had a little disappointing season - and I say that loosely - because we didn't finish where I felt we could have finished but when they get to the tournament...I was super pleased with how the year went to take fifth place."

Overall, both sides are working hard to perfect their craft and Hieb has seen their averages drop from 20 to 30 pins from where they were a year ago.

"Last year, they were about a 160 to 170 average [score] and this year, they're pushing 195 to 200 averages," Hieb explained. "They're doing the clinics over the summer and just getting out there and I think overall too, they've always been so young. The core group of juniors this year are just becoming so mature... they're just getting older now and their bowling IQ is better than it used to be."

Hieb also notes the team's overall camaraderie has helped breed more success on both sides.

"I'm starting to see it during practice where they're ribbing each other and giving each other a hard time," Hieb said. "But I'm trying to get them to hold each other accountable for things. We can't just go over there and shake our heads, we've got to talk and show them how to help each other out a bit."

The Bobcats are also are cultivating their bowlers outside of the athlete with the goal of a 3.5 grade point average as a team to earn the academic athlete award. With a strong start to the season, Brookings is hoping to reach their goals and add another successful year - and potentially another state title - to the mantle.

"I'm very excited. I love this swim club and I love that I'm getting to



"We've got some good, returning athletes but we also have a talented group of new ones," Engbrecht said. "We definitely have a lot of good girls returning and they're all winners."



"It's very hard because you've gotta stay on the thing," Engbrecht said. "Just getting their hands back in shape so they're




not gripping all the time makes a huge difference on whether they can do their skills and get those strong scores."

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




