

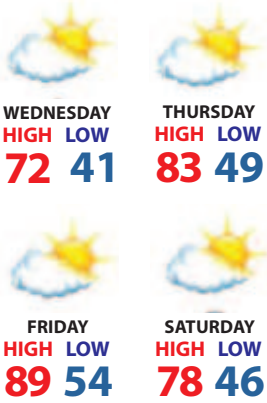

# Grady Winders resigns as Platte County undersheriff

**WHEATLAND** – Grady Winders, undersheriff for the Platte County Sheriff's Office for 14 years has tendered his resignation.

The friendly face and mild-mannered law enforcement official has seen many things through almost two decades of work in the local law enforcement agency. He has been known as a fair but firm officer and always serving the county with integrity and character.

Born in Tennessee, Grady Winders' family moved and raised him in Battle Creek, Michigan where he graduated from Harper Creek High school in 1978.

Winders comes from a musical family with a very gifted father who played nearly every instrument and a mother who had a mind to listen to good music and man-

age the family endeavors. They actually had a family band that was in high demand during the '70s and even when Winders was away for school or his job, he would also fall right into the rhythm if he came home and the band was playing. As a result, Winders is a talented guitar player that found his niche playing bass guitar.

He met and married his high school sweetheart, Leisa, and as the job situation was dire in the late '70s, Winders, looking for welding jobs for over a year and finding none, opted for the military for training and service.

He ended up doing a stint with the Air Force for over 20 years and retired as a master sergeant. "20 years, three months and nine days," Winders recalls.

"When I retired, my kids were at an age where they were in high school and this was home

to us because I bought a place here in 1986," Winders said. "Me and dad went in together and we bought a place. Essentially my kids wanted to go to a place where they knew somebody and didn't have to move anymore."

Military life moved Winders frequently from New Mexico to Alaska to Texas and all points within.

The Winders had three children, Jaime (Anderson), Holly and Clarisa. "When I got out of the military, I began work-

ing for Bob Ruwart Motors which is the only job I could find at the time, although I had a lot of resumes out for federal jobs," he said. "Then, oddly enough I had someone tell me about

# Rafter MB hosts NVRHA

Readies for Arena BBQ restaurant to open for summer

**WHEATLAND** – The National Versatility Ranch Horse Association (NVRHA) came to Wheatland to hold a training and competition May 13-14 at the Rafter MB Quarter Horses Arena and Event Center.

The NVRHA runs five competitions per year according to Heather Hart who is an organizer and clinician for the competitors.

"I had a lot of people requesting me to come to Wheatland," she said. "We are very beginner friendly and we love to have beginners. We had 30 all total this weekend and some were just newbies."

The competitions are all based upon actual jobs that people will do on the ranch.

"It's a little more practical than just a western pleasure," she said. "We have five classes. We have cutting, ranch riding, working cow horse, trails and confirmation."

Jonathan Vrabc, Erin Mullane, Karen Weagraff and Hart were all trainers and taught at the one-day clinic before the competition began.

"We are heading to Glenrock next," Hart said. "We hold competitions mainly on the eastern side of the state."

According to Myrle Ingle, co-owner of Rafter MB Quarter Horses Arena and Event Center, this is one of two major organizations in the state that run this kind of competition.

"This was a competition today," Ingle said. "They won awards such

# Platte County Agriplex had plenty of firepower at the annual gun show

**WHEATLAND** – The Wyoming Sportsman's Gun Show Circuit (WSGS) visited the Platte County Agriplex May 21-22 and hosted a gun show that boasted 21 vendors, wall-to-wall guns and ammunition and hundreds of gun enthusiasts.

The Agriplex opened the doors to exhibitors who came in May 20 and began to set up for the Saturday show.

"I've been running this show for five years," said John Taylor who organized the gun show and is a former resident of Lusk. "The Wyoming Sportsmen have been running the show since 2008. Before that, under a different name it's been going on since the early '90s."

There were rifles, pistols, antique guns and boxes and boxes of ammunition.

"See all those boxes over there?" said local gunsmith Al Teel who had a massive display of guns set up and pointed to 12 Rubbermaid bins of ammunition. "We just don't have enough room to set it all out."

This was the first time that this particular gun show was at the Agriplex in three years due to COVID in 2020 and the building still under construction in 2021. Prior to 2020, the show was held in the old 4-H building.

"It's really nice in the new venue," Taylor said. "As of right now I live in my RV and travel around with

this gun show. The biggest challenge with a show of this size is getting the vendors in here. We have to find the vendors to fill the venue. We have to abide by all federal, state and local laws for the guns."

The question was brought up as to how fast people could get handguns.

"You can get handguns here," Taylor said. "The way the federal statute is written, in Wyoming, a private sale is a private sale, so you can buy guns here. But if it's a new gun, you have to go through the 4473 and do the federal background check and all that."

Taylor runs 11 gun shows per year and gun shows run all year long.

Each vendor not only sold guns, but were also advertising and helping other events get their information out.

Teel had fliers at his booth that helped the Laramie Peak Fire Zone Foundation promote their Buffalo Hunt Raffle with the chance to win a buffalo hunt at Twin Pines Ranch. The drawing for this raffle is set for September 21 and people can call (307) 322-5650 to purchase tickets and garner more information.

# Research grant recipients announced

**WHEATLAND** – Vickie Zimmer, chair of the Wyoming State Historical Society's Homsher Committee, announced the three recipients of research grants for 2022. They are:

Chad Seifried, a professor at Louisiana State University and Associate Editor of Journal of Management History, and Editor Emeritus for the Journal of Issues in Intercollegiate Athletics, received a grant for his project titled The Modernization of College Football Stadia at the University of Wyoming.

Lea Schoenewald, an author and historian from Thermopolis, received a grant for her project titled The Story of Coal in

Gebo, Crosby, and Kirby, Wyoming.

Cate Loetscher, an author and historian from Recluse, received a grant for her project titled Ranch Women of the Powder River Breaks.

The committee recognizes amateur and professional historians through these grants that support the society's mission to make Wyoming's past accessible to present and future generations. Zimmer said, "Creating opportunities for original research is a mainstay of the Homsher Grant program."

Grant monies are drawn from a fund established by the late Lola Homsher, a noted historian and state archivist. One of Homshers most significant contributions to preserve Wyoming history came

when she spearheaded establishing the Wyoming State Historical Society in 1953. After her retirement Miss Homsher made a major donation to the society that has been used as an endowment to help fund society programs.

Some of the students that I first met when I came to Wyoming were only sophomores and I came at a time when we were all fighting the pandemic and the disappointment that many spring activities were canceled.

After over two years, the kids and people in the community have become family.

Although this year's graduation left a lump in my throat, partially because I remember my youngest son's graduation in 2017, and the ensuing path that took him to college away from home. It's funny, when they are young and squabbling and fussing and needing money for nearly everything, a parent sometimes will say "I can't wait until they graduate."

That statement is the biggest statement regret that we make as parents. Oh, the house is no longer chaotic, there are no dirty dishes

in the sink or in their bedrooms, there are no half-eaten pizzas under the beds and I actually have a few dollars left over every week to treat myself to Arby's... but the house didn't become quiet, it became lonely.

I miss telling the dad jokes that made my kids say, "Dad... stop." I miss embarrassing them in front of their friends. I even miss their friends. Well... some of them. I miss hearing their laughter on movie night and being the shoulder for adolescent tears when that first tragic breakup comes. I miss being able to ask, "when are you going to come home?" every time they would leave for a date. I miss the hugs at the award ceremonies and making their highlight videos as their graduation present.

Ah, but here at an older age, I still ask the question, "when are you going to come home?" Certainly not out loud or to their faces anymore, but it's OK to think it. And what did I learn?

That I didn't live in or savor and appreciate enough moments. If I had it to do over again, I'd watch them a little longer as they slept. I'd hug them a little longer before they left. I'd listen more intently as they

spoke. I'd not "harsh their mellow" with a curt word in criticism.

I wouldn't be able to create more time, but I'd be able to create more quality. I'd make better choices. I'd make better memories.

This weekend we all witnessed a miracle moment. At the flip of a tassel and the toss of a cap, these kids went from seniors to graduates. And they finished this chapter of their biography.

As the kids walked across the stage this past weekend from Platte County I thought about the incredible memories these kids have given to our community, whether it was a touchdown pass from Kade Preuit to Jake Hicks or a line spoken in a play by Bradley Rittel or a song that gave us all goosebumps sang by Grace Hanni or a thumbs-up by Gracen Mount for pictures or Rodee Brow flying around a high bar or a new picture taken by Caleb Haase that he just had to show me, or that "hell yeah" roar of Rawland Isabell – or the determined drive of Warrior Princess Libby Logan, and the infectious smiles of McCrea Call, Devin Weber and Hyannie Fausto.

So many kids have made me feel like I have my kids back again and for that, I can never say thank-you

enough. And to the teachers and coaches who are departing, how proud I am of those who have given their time to mentor and shape the kids of this generation.

One in particular that is a tough one to see go is varsity basketball coach Taylor Dick from Guernsey. After coaching kids and other coaches for over 40 years, I know quality in the coaching ranks. This coach was in it for the passion of the game and for the love of the kids. "Coach D is leaving to coach in Shoshoni – and we all know that he will always have the heart of a Viking. We scrimmaged together, we coached together, we laughed together and we weathered some tough losses together.

He is a quality young coach who resembles many of my own sons who began their careers with tough decisions to make. It will be a sad day to see him walk out of GHS for that final time.

And to all those kids who have so touched the heart of our communities and to the educators who have been called to plough new fields, I will miss you already. Goodbye, farewell, so long, Godspeed and oh yeah, when are you going to come home?

## Advice to grads: Follow your dreams but keep your day job

Holy cow, where do I start?

I have been writing these "advice to graduate" columns for almost four decades and each year some of the main points remain constant.

For example, go find some mentors. Also, if you fail, move on. You are young – that can be your advantage. And so on.

But this year? It has taken me a few weeks to put this message together. We are living in the strangest times.

At my current age, I could never have imagined living through a worldwide pandemic that killed 1 million Americans. Or watch as Russia pounds a perfectly innocent country into submission while threatening the rest of the world with nuclear annihilation. Or watch our federal government fumble and bumble on every conceivable serious issue.

Yes, these are strange times, indeed.

I worry a lot about this generation of graduates, that is, until I spend

some time with them. The ones I hang around with are just wonderful. But these young people are way different from their parents and grandparents. They are among the first of the digital generation to graduate from high school and college.

It has been widely speculated that because of social media, these human beings are wired differently from previous generations. Their attention spans are smaller compared to the rest of us. Their faces are buried in their phones for countless hours of the day. A great many of them are paranoid because they have spent their whole lives barely avoiding being ruined socially by social media.

All of us, when we were in junior high and high school, walked through our days worried that someone would start some awful gossip about us. But that was child's play compared to what the internet can do to a reputation of this generation.

My advice to grads today is to do what you love. I have long promised to write a booklet of advice to my grandkids called: "Follow Your Dreams – but keep your day job." It is a work in progress.

In 1964 when I graduated from high school, the last thing we worried about was finding a job. Good-paying

jobs were everywhere. It has taken 58 years for a similar time to come along.

A young Cowboy State Daily reporter Leo Wolfson begged to differ with my above conclusion about the easy job market today. "When I graduated college, it took me four months to get my foot in the door in journalism and another four months after that to find a halfway decent full-time job.

"There are lots of jobs out there no doubt, but due to the skyrocketing inflation and housing shortages, there are many jobs people aren't taking because they simply don't pay enough," he concluded.

Up in Sheridan, Pat Henderson, who manages the fabulous Whitney Benefits, offers this advice for grads: "Don't take 'no' for an answer. If you believe in your idea – stick it out. Exhaust every opportunity to finish what you have dreamed. Remember your words always matter.

"These students should hold close the things that count – Family, God, Country, Friends, and Community. Be gracious and grateful. Have courage," he says.

Retired Military Leader Bob Tipton of Lander still advises young military men and women. "I am afraid we have young people who lack the

skills or tools to deal with failure. They fail to understand that through failure you have the opportunity to get stronger.

"Failures we can't protect them from and failures that will happen are a part of life. I believe that when a failure occurs there is an opportunity to not only learn from that failure but it makes us stronger and more resilient to handle future adversity. I believe there is a connection here to our increased suicide rates," he says.

Thanks Leo, Pat, and Bob for that additional advice.

To wrap up, my last piece of advice concerns seeking a job. It is important to follow the latest trends – will this job be necessary in the next 10 years? Today's employers know that these young people have strong social values and they will cater to them. Many of today's young people are not willing to put in the extra time like most of my generation. I loved my work and couldn't get enough of it.

Just remember this when you go to an interview. Look your future employer in the eye. Be prepared. Answer questions truthfully. Dress appropriately. And for God's sake, leave that cell phone in your pocket.

as ribbons and buckles. Although today was the competition, yesterday, all day long, the NVRHA requires a clinic the day before the show. This show, when you pay your entry fee which is a lot, it pays for all events and training.”

Arena BBQ, the renowned summertime barbecue restaurant in Wheatland, will be opening its doors once again for weekends beginning the first weekend in June. (June 3-5) As per last year, the restaurant will be open from 11 a.m. - 6 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and 11 a.m. - 4 p.m. on Sundays. With Arena BBQ, the food is so popular that many times, it sells out early. The best thing to do is call ahead and order by phone so it is waiting for you when you get there.

“This year we are going to do smoked beef ribs as our special,” Ingle said. “We will also have our regular pork belly special, pork loin, brisket along with our original sides.”

The team of Birgit Ingle who runs the kitchen and Myrle Ingle who does the cooking has been a winning combination since the restaurant opened two years ago.

Two years ago Myrle Ingle created a combination steamer/smoker that produces sausage, brisket and chicken that has a flavor and tenderness not seen in many barbecue restaurants.

Last year, he has invented a new grill which adds a southwest flair to the already popular eating establishment.

For some people who have found the quirky, out-of-the-way weekend barbecue restaurant that is just five minutes from the I-25 corridor, the comment most used is “addicting.”

People stand in line and usually cause the restaurant to sell out long before business hours are over leaving hungry patrons only

the satisfaction of smelling the delicious “what we missed,” and the immediate scheduling to call in their orders for the next time.

“The grill I am creating is a combination of an Argentine grill and a Santa Maria grill, but with a twist,” Ingle said. “For thick trips, the grill will drop the meat really close to the coals so you get your sear. It’s a big flat cut of meat. The grill then raises the meat up so it finishes cooking at a lower temperature so it’s tender.”

Ingle, who realizes that competition is heating up in the local

epicurean market, has just added something that nobody else has and remains ahead of the barbecue game as to innovate cooking of the meat.

The base of the grill is perlite cement so that the metal base of the grill will not rust out. The grill has the wood fire box on one side and as the oak Ingle uses breaks down into the coals, the hot coal is shoveled to the actual cooking box under the metal grates.

“It’s going to be live fire,” he said. “So whether it’s fish, hamburgers or whatever I cook, it will be on an

open fire. This is the combination as I’ve said, but instead of having the entire grill enclosed, it is open, so you can easily shovel the coals into the cooking area from the fire box.”

Ingles said that in the event a new barbecue place should open up, he feels he can still beat them on flavor due to his steamer/smoker, but he is five miles out of town.

“With the Santa Maria along with the barbecue smoker, I now have an advantage and can cook T-bones, fish, lobster, ribeye, and even vegetables on the open fire.”

an opening in the detention center. I got kind of curious and I applied, but the pay was just way below anything I could have taken to support my family.”

On a fateful Saturday morning, Winders was woken up at 5 a.m. and it just so happened that he had a chance to do a physical competition with the police department.

“Sheriff (Steve) Kegley called me at the time and said he’d like to talk to me,” Winders said. “He made me an offer and I’ve been here ever since. I took one year off when they fired up the youth challenge program and I went over there because I loved working with kids.”

In 2002 Sheriff Kegley got a police grant and wanted to create a new position of “school resource officer” and placed Winders in that position to help initiate and establish the program. Essentially Winders would go from school to school in Platte County. He was a “D.A.R.E.” officer.

“During the summers I would work the roads like everyone else, but during the school year I was at the schools,” Winders said. “I would teach security to the teachers, deal with law enforcement issues if I had to and even taught some constitutional law in some of the social studies classes.”

Until his resignation last week, he still maintained his title of “school resource officer.”

“I had a D.A.R.E. graduation at three of the high schools this year,” Winders said. “I also have been teaching a k-4 program in Glendo.”

Winders was asked by Sheriff Kegley if there would be any interest in him becoming the undersheriff and he was willing to take the position, but wouldn’t give up the kids, so there was special contract so that he could be undersheriff and teach the kids.

When the changing of the guard came between Sheriff Kegley and Sheriff Clyde Harris, Winders seemed to be the heir apparent to be the Platte County Sheriff, but due to having to take care of

his dad who was very ill, Winders opted not to run for the position.

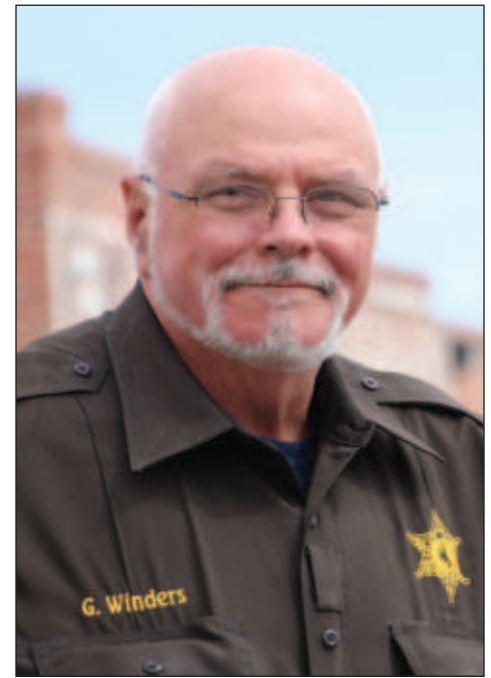
“It shocked me that Clyde picked me as his undersheriff, because he has a right to pick whoever he wants,” Winders said. “He just decided that he wanted me and offered me the position.”

As undersheriff for the past seven years, Winders has had a responsibility to be the acting sheriff in the sheriff’s absence, he has supervised patrol, detention, dispatch.

With Sheriff Harris not electing to run again this year, Winders again would have been the heir apparent with his history and his experience, but his resignation now makes the sheriff’s race in Platte County between David Russell, Randy Chesser and Shane Clevenger.

Winders who had what he called a “job offer he couldn’t refuse” is going to be a security lead for a Colorado Company that is operating here in Wyoming. He will be training in Colorado June 11-19 for his new position.

A new undersheriff has yet to be named.

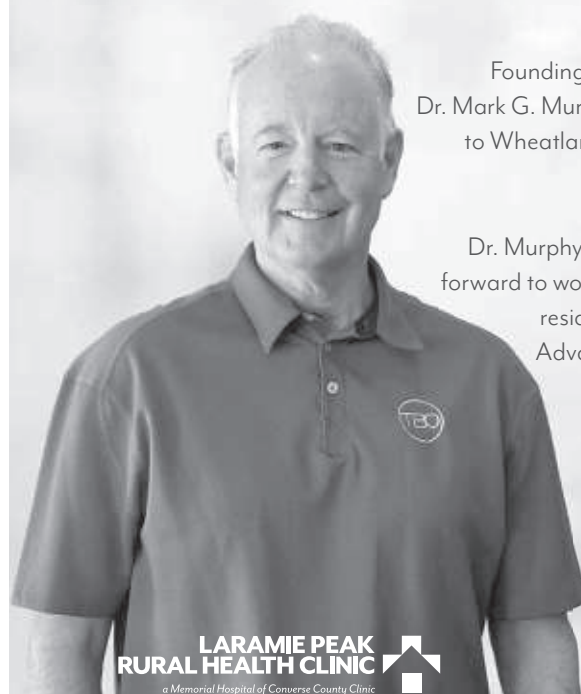

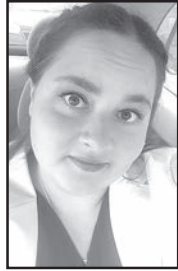

## WYDOT releases statement about sign placement

**PLATTE COUNTY** – The Wyoming Department of Transportation reminds everyone that the placement of signs, whether for political campaigns, advertisements, real estate or garage sales, is not allowed inside state highway rights of way.

Wyoming Statute (W.S. 24-10-104) states that outdoor advertising must meet certain conditions for placement. No signs of any kind are allowed at any WYDOT office site, parking area, maintenance yard or on any other WYDOT property. Signs are not allowed to be taped, stapled or otherwise hung on traf-

fic signals or other highway poles; fences, or signs within the right of way. Also prohibited are boxes or sandwich boards placed on sidewalks at intersections.

Any signs found improperly located on WYDOT right of way or property will be removed and taken to the local WYDOT office. In Casper,

it is located at 900 Bryan Stock Trail.

Signs will be available for pickup for five days after removal. Signs not picked up after five days will be discarded.

Any forage or hay certified as weed-free will now be marked with blue and orange twine or will be accompanied by either a certification form or a transit certificate.

The weed-free twine program helps limit the spread of noxious weeds through the movement of forage or hay. Many federal and state lands require certified weed-free forage to prevent the spread of invasive weeds. The new bright blue and orange colors will make it easier to identify weed-free hay.

Noxious weeds are increasingly damaging to the landscape and livestock in Wyoming. Invasive weeds are usually unpalatable and sometimes poisonous to livestock. Additionally, the management of invasive weeds in the United States costs upward of \$130 billion each year. Certifying hay or buying certified weed-free hay prevents the spread and can lower the cost of prevention.

Previously, weed-free hay was identified with purple and yellow twine. It may still be common to see the old twine color as it is phased out. The new orange and blue twine can only be purchased by the WWPC to provide to certified hay producers.

## Mountain West announces 2022 football TV schedules and game times

FOR THE RECORD-TIMES

LARAMIE – The 2022 Mountain West Conference Football television schedules were released on Thursday in connection with Mountain West television partners CBS Sports Network (CBSSN) and FOX Sports Networks.

The Wyoming Cowboys will have at least 10 of their 12 games televised this fall, including five games on CBSSN, two on FS1, a third game on one of the FOX Sports Networks, one game on one of the ESPN Networks and one on the Big Ten Network.

Wyoming's home schedule will feature three home games in September, including two early afternoon kickoffs: versus Tulsa on Sept. 3 at 1:30 p.m., and televised on FS1 and versus Northern Colorado at 2 p.m.; and a nationally-televised Friday night game against longtime rival Air Force at 6 p.m. on CBS Sports Network.

The months of October and November will see the Cowboys host the last three Mountain West Conference champions in San Jose State on Oct. 1 (2020 MW champion), Utah State on Oct. 22 (2021 MW champ) and Boise State on Nov. 19 (2019 MW champion).

Thursday's announcement came at the same time several other FBS conferences were releasing their television packages for the upcoming season.

Of Wyoming's six home games, the first two will feature early afternoon kickoffs. The home opener on Saturday, Sept. 3 vs. Tulsa will kick off at 1:30 p.m., Mountain Time from Jonah Field at War Memorial Stadium and will be televised nationally on FS1. Wyoming and Tulsa have played each other six previous times with the series tied at 3-3. Tulsa won the most recent meeting in 2019 in Tulsa by a 24-21 margin. The last time the two teams met in Laramie was 1994, with the Cowboys winning 17-7.

Wyoming's second home game of the 2022 season will be on Saturday, Sept. 10 when UW will host Northern Colorado in a 2 p.m. kick. Television or streaming coverage of that game will be announced at a later date. The series vs. UNC dates all the way back to 1895. Wyoming holds an 18-5 advantage in the series with three ties. The two teams have not met since 2013 when UW won 35-7 in Laramie.

A nationally-televised Friday night game on Sept. 16 will highlight the 60th meeting in the Wyoming-Air Force rivalry when the Falcons travel to Laramie to face the Cowboys.

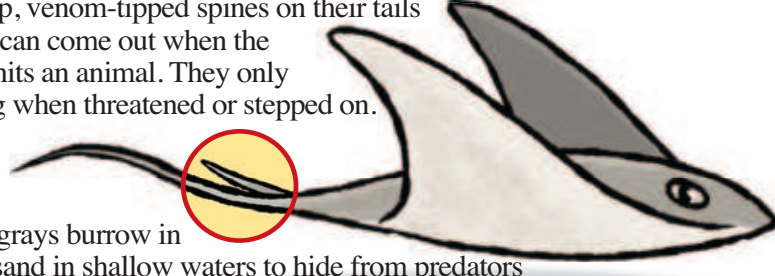

# Stingrays

Stingrays are flat fishes that seem to fly underwater. Stingrays and other rays are sometimes called *batoids* because they look a bit like bats when they are swimming.



Stingrays got their name from the sharp, venom-tipped spines on their tails that can come out when the tail hits an animal. They only sting when threatened or stepped on.



Stingrays burrow in the sand in shallow waters to hide from predators or wait for prey to swim by. Their colors often match the sand or mud where they hide. This is called **camouflage**.

ed to Colorado.

“I told Candy (Wright) that if we got the grant that I would come back and help them because I didn’t want to leave them hanging,” Schindler said. “But anyway, we did get the grant and that grant was for \$28K which is actually pretty significant.”

The AARP grant is usually for somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1-30K, but only award two or three in that \$30K range according to Schindler.

“I attribute that amount we got to Candy Wright and her grant writing abilities,” Schindler said. “We gave her raw material and she put it all together and made it professional, so kudos goes to Candy for that.”

Schindler doesn’t know the total price tag for the new pickleball courts, but estimates that the figure will be somewhere around \$50K. The additional monies will come from the city budget and from fundraisers such as the tournaments that were held in 2021.

There is nothing official about the pickleball group in Platte County, according to Schindler. It’s just a grassroots gang of pickleball enthusiasts who are excited about having fun and staying healthy.
