



Summer reading activities set to start

Activities will soon be added to the summer reading program already in progress at the West Plains Public Library, with advance registration and a 20-person limit per session.

The program runs through Aug. 1, with children and teens age 2 through 16 and adults age 17 and older keeping reading logs on books either checked out

through the library or through e-book apps including Libby, OverDrive and Tumblebooks.

Reading logs are available at the library, 750 W. Broadway. Hours are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays.

Programs for children and teens will be held July 7 through 31, with a few changes this year to encourage social distancing practices. Those wanting to attend will be required to register in advance by calling 256-4775.

Thayer teen killed in crash

from Thayer died as a result of injuries suffered in a car crash that injured two other teens at 8 p.m. Sunday on County Road 326, 3 miles north of Thayer in Oregon County, according to the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

Tpr. D.A. Huffman with Troop G of patrol, Willow Springs, reported the girl was a passenger in a westbound 2005 Pontiac Grand Prix, driven by a 16-year-old boy from Thayer, that failed to negotiate a curve, ran off the left side of the road and overturned, striking a tree.

The girl was taken by ambulance to Ozarks Medical Center in West Plains where she was pronounced dead at 9:54 p.m. by Dr. Jere-

my Reed. A 16 year-old boy

A 16-year-old girl and Bobby A. Dale, 17, both passengers and from Thayer, suffered moderate injuries. The unnamed teen was transported by Air Evac to OMC and Dale was taken to the same hospital by ground ambulance.

According to the report, all three injured were not wearing seatbelts.

No injuries were reported for the 16 yearold driver and a fifth unidentified passenger.

Tpr. Huffman was assisted at the scene by Cpl. M.T. Weakley.

The girl's death marks the 17th traffic fatality in the ninecounty Troop G area for 2020 compared to 11 during the same

time frame last year. The names of the 16-year-old youths are withheld in the report due to their status as minors.

Section 28-77 of the municipal code states, "No person shall construct, use, discharge, fire, launch or explode rockets, missiles or other similar projectiles within the city unless a written permit for such specific purpose has been obtained from city council."

Section 20-44, regarding discharge of fireworks, states, "No individual or organization may discharge fireworks as herein defined without a permit. Discharging of display fireworks will need

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State Fire Marshal Bean urges caution for those who use fireworks July 4th

As with much of American life, COVID-19 is altering July 4th festivities and the public fireworks displays that are central to them.

Some Missouri communities are going ahead with displays and urging social distancing and mask-wearing, while others are canceling displays this year.

"Each year, we remind people that the best sights and safest experiences are at public fireworks displays because of the dangers posed by using consumer fireworks," said State Fire Marshal Tim Bean. "This year, we are concerned if more people choose to turn to consumer fireworks, it could lead to additional injuries and fires. We urge everyone to be extremely cautious, and to review safety guidelines for using consumer fireworks."

Across the nation, July 4th is not only the busiest day of the year for fireworks, it's the busiest day of the year for fires. About 40% of Independence Day structure fires are the result of fireworks, according to the National Fire Protection Association. Fireworks start an average of 18,500 fires a year. About 250 people go to emergency rooms each day with fireworks-related injuries in the 30 days around July 4th.

Missourians who choose to use consumer fireworks should follow these safety

- Confirm fireworks are legal where you live; purchase fireworks only from licensed retailers.

- Only use fireworks in a large open space that has been cleared of flammable materials.

- Always keep young children away from fireworks; if teens are permitted to handle fireworks, they should be closely supervised by an adult; always wear eye pro-

- Make sure to have a garden hose or a bucket of water nearby in case of a fire.

- Only light fireworks one

- Dispose of fireworks by soaking them in water and leaving them in a trash can.

Never shoot fireworks off from a glass jar or contain-

- Never use fireworks while consuming alcohol.

- Never store fireworks from season to season.

Sparklers are a good example of how people underestimate the danger of fireworks. Sparklers burn at about 2,000 degrees – hot enough to melt some metals. They can quickly ignite clothing and leave young children with severe burns. According to the National Fire Protection Association, sparklers account for more than 25% of emergency room visits for fireworks injuries.

Bean said that, in addition to normal safety concerns, people using loose-fitting cloth face coverings to protect against COVID-19 should remember these cov-

at a time; never try to re-light erings pose a hazard when using open-flame devices to light fireworks or when using sparklers. Many of these coverings can easily ignite and cause serious facial burns to the victim.

> Fireworks sales at licensed seasonal retailers are legal in Missouri through July 10. As of June 19, the Division of Fire Safety issued 1,099 permits to seasonal retailers. DFS conducts safety inspections at fireworks retailers, including checking to make sure they sell only legallypermitted consumer fireworks, that they have at least two exits, are equipped with fire extinguishers, and that fireworks tents have been treated with fire retardant chemicals.

Virus cases jump in **Branson area after** tourists return

BRANSON (AP) — A jump in coronavirus cases after many businesses in the Branson area reopened to tourists has health officials con-

The Taney County Health Department urged people to wear masks in public after reporting 11 new cases of COVID-19 Saturday, according to the Kansas City Star. The county's virus cases jumped to 54 from 15 over the past two weeks, and that total doesn't include visitors to the area who test positive but are counted in their home coun-

The case numbers remain small compared to urban areas of the state, but Branson is a community of less than 12,000 residents.

Health officials have worried that once the state opened back up they would see more cases.

Many of Branson's businesses have reopened for tourism, including miniature golf courses, shops and restaurants. Many entertainers have returned to their stages around Branson as well.

The second of the two new cases is a West Plains resident, and contact tracing indicates the infection is relaced to recent travel out of the area, officials said.

Both patients are said to be in isolation and following public health guidance, and their employers have been notified and are working with the health department to contain the virus' spread, said officials.

According to officials, the eighth case, a man in his 60s has no known contact to any previous positive cases; the ninth case, a woman in her 60s, is believed to have been in contact with a known case in Shannon County. At the time of the announcments, neither required hospitalization, and both are in home isolation, offi-

Readers may browse West Plains Public Library's digital collection, instantly borrow titles and start reading or listening for free. Those living outside city limits may pay a \$25 yearly fee for a library card that covers all members of a household

Virtual books checked out through the West Plains Public Library also count toward statistics used to apply for grant funding.

The service is compatible with all major computers and devices including iPhone, iPad, Android phones and tablets and Chromebooks, and can be used without waitlists or holds.

Through Libby, readers can also choose to send books to Kindle. All titles will automatically expire at the end of the lending period and there are no late fees.



Cabbage rolls: Easy twist on an old favorite

Since the gardens are starting to produce and the farmers market supply is stocked, I thought we'd go oldschool this week.

I love that cooking is still trending online and in most kitchens. One thing being quarantined has shown us is that we don't have to eat out so often. Don't get me wrong, I do enjoy a night off from cooking, but it's heating up and I don't want a big, heavy meal. I also love all the fresh produce available to us now, and one of the first crops to cook with is cabbage.

There is more to cabbage than cole slaw, which is a nice, cool summer salad, but going back to an old recipe might tempt your tastebuds like it did mine. Cabbage rolls have been around for centuries and are an old-fashioned comfort food from many origins.

I found a recipe for am easy, flavorful roll from a German kitchen, and it's going on my menu this week just for my husband, whose family came from Germa-

If you find yourself with plenty of cabbage and you're needing a new twist on a old favorite, try these easy cabbage rolls for a win!

EASY CABBAGE ROLLS

- 1 head green cabbage



- 1 pound ground pork or turkey
- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 2 small onions diced - 3 cloves garlic minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dill weed
- 3 tablespoons fresh parsley
- 1 can diced tomatoes (14 ounces) undrained
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups plus 1/3 cup tomato sauce or pasta sauce divided
 - 1 can tomato soup 10.5 ounces

- Boil cabbage leaves about 2 minutes or until soft. (See note below for removing leaves). Set aside to cool.

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- Cook rice according to package directions but reduce cooking time by 5 minutes so the rice is slightly underdone. Set aside.
- Cook beef, pork or turkey, onions, garlic and seasonings until no pink remains. Drain any fat. Add in rice, diced tomatoes, 1/3 cup of tomato/pasta sauce, salt and pepper. Stir in egg.
- Mix tomato sauce and tomato soup in a bowl. Spread a very thin layer of the tomato sauce mixture in a 9x13
- Remove or thin any thick stem on cabbage leaves. Lay the cabbage leaf flat and add 1/3 cup filling to the center of the leaf. Fold in the sides and roll the cabbage up. Place seam side down in the pan. (See note for small leaves). Repeat with remaining cabbage.
- Pour sauce over the cabbage and cover tightly with foil. Bake 75-90 minutes. Let cool 15 minutes before

RECIPE NOTES

To remove leaves from head of cabbage, cut about a quarter inch off the bottom of the head and place the whole head of cabbage in boiling water. Boil about 2 minutes. Peel off the softened leaves. Place remaining head back in the boiling water and repeat until all of the leaves are removed. Remove any tough stems from cooked leaves.

Note, if you have some smaller leaves and still have filling left over, just overlap the leaves as needed. The rolls will still cook up perfectly.

A New Orleans Black-owned bakery wants to nourish the nation

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Kathryn Conyers is not a baker, but she tried. And she failed. When she sought advice from her friend Carla Briggs, a trained pastry chef, Conyers was too embarrassed to send photos of the lackluster loaves. In the end, Briggs decided that she needed to come over and bake the bread herself.

A month later, as the coronavirus pandemic ramped up, the friends saw shelves in New Orleans barren of bread and thought, 'maybe baking bread could be a business.' Soon after that, Viola's Heritage Breads was born.

"Viola just sounds nice ıd homey, like somebody's grandmother that maybe would have a recipe that exists today but didn't really get the recognition," Conyers said.

Conyers and Briggs said they didn't see many Blackowned bakeries and wanted to bring a business to New Orleans that celebrates both Black entrepreneurship and heritage. The recipes draw on their roots, using local Southern ingredients like Louisiana sweet potatoes.

The breads, which the pair deliver themselves around New Orleans or ship nationwide, are generous sandwich loaves like whole wheat brioche, sweet potato rosemary and white einkorn wheat. They're about goodness, not being gourmet. The fanciest thing that Viola's sells are tea cakes

"This is an untapped market of providing quality sandwich bread," Briggs said. "So, we jumped right in and it has been fun."

Conyers and Briggs have a larger mission: they want to celebrate the too often overlooked Black cooks and chefs in the South.

"I've worked at Emeril's and I've worked at the Ritz

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time cooking in New Orleans, "and the people making the stocks and things that make these chefs great are mostly African Americans. They are creating the basis of this food, but their names aren't on it.'

For now, Viola's Heritage Breads is run from Brigg's kitchen. Louisiana's cottage food law allows businesses with less than \$20,000 in sales to operate from a home with some limitations. The two still have their day jobs. Conyers, who has degrees in finance and law, works for a New Orleans non-profit organization that builds playgrounds around the country. Briggs, who left restaurant work due to a carpal tunnel syndrome, founded Eat Your Words, which teaches literacy through food.

Though the small, the women have big aspirations for Viola's.

"It's not something that's a hustle. Can it grow and

He said in making the decision to stay open, "My No. 1 concern was keeping everybody safe. My employees wanted to continue to work. Our vendors and the community were counting on us. So, we stayed open."

Woodward said, "Business was up substantially. We went from four picnic tables outside to 16 tables. And I want to continue to expand that area."














A Long-Overdue 'Tip of the Cap' to baseball's Black pioneers

Barack Obama tipped his cap. So did three other former presidents and a host of prominent civil rights leaders, entertainers and sports greats in a virtual salute to the 100-year anniversary of the founding of baseball's Negro Leagues.

The campaign launched Monday with photos and videos from, among others, Hank Aaron, Rachel Robinson Derek Jeter, Colin Powell, Michael Jordan, Obama and former Presidents George W. Bush, Bill Clinton and Jimmy Carter at tippingyourcap.com.

On the receiving end of those tributes are many of the Negro Leagues' greatest alumni: Satchel Paige, Josh Gibson, "Cool Papa" Bell and Jackie Robinson, who began with the Kansas City Monarchs and went on to break the color barrier in the major leagues with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947. Not long after, with many of its best players gradually following Robinson's path, the Negro Leagues ceased operations.

But, Clinton added, "This cap is for Hillary, too, when finally, the Cubs won the championship. Long before that, the Negro Leagues made baseball better and America better."

The celebration was moved online after a major league-wide tribute to baseball's Black pioneers scheduled for June 27 was shelved — along with the games — because of the coronavirus pandemic. At first, Negro Leagues Baseball Museum president Bob Kendrick worried that his longstanding plan to honor the men and women who battled long odds for a game of their own would have to be postponed, at best.

"In our game, there's nothing more honorable than tipping your cap," Kendrick said. "And once I realized that national day of recognition was going to fall by the wayside, I thought, 'OK, maybe we can do it next year.' But that didn't really do it.

"So then I thought, 'How about a virtual tip of the cap?" Kendrick paused, then chuckled. "And let me say here and now, there is no way I could have done this myself. I could not be more proud of the response."

Kendrick got the lift he was looking for from communications specialist Dan Mc-Ginn and longtime NLBM supporter Joe Posnanski, a sportswriter for The Athletic and author of "The Soul of Baseball," chronicling his year-long road trip promoting the Kansas City-based museum and the stories behind it with legendary Negro League star, the late Buck O'Neil.

O'Neil was the driving force behind the museum for decades. The NLBM has expanded several times since Rube Foster, as skilled an executive as he was a baseball pitcher, founded the first Negro National League at a YMCA on the same site in 1920.

Kendrick said his personal favorite tribute came from Jackie Robinson's family.

"It's Rachel tipping her cap, but there's four generations of Robinson women in that video talking about our common cause and it evokes the kind of emotion at a time when our country really needs it" he said

"And you know," he added a moment later, "it's funny how this whole thing worked out. I always felt if there was going to be conversations about race in sports, the Negro Leagues should be at the center, because that's the story: They triumphed over adversity.

"I got to know so many of them, and not a single guy that I met ever harbored ill will, at least to the point where they let it block their path. Everybody else thought the major leagues were better, but you couldn't convince them," he concluded. "They just wanted the chance to prove they could play this game as well as anybody else."

They did, forging a rich legacy that will echo with a new generation thanks to something as simple as the virtual tip of a cap.

BOSTON (AP) — The New England Patriots have reached an agreement with free-agent quarterback Cam Newton, bringing in the 2015 NFL Most Valuable Player to help the team move on from three-time MVP Tom Brady, a person with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press.

The one-year deal is worth up to \$7.5 million with incentives, the person said, speaking on the condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss it publicly. A Patriots spokesman said the team had nothing to announce Sunday night. The signing was first reported by ESPN.

The Patriots had been heading to training camp with 2019 fourth-round draft choice Jarrett Stidham as the heir apparent to Brady, who led the team to six Super Bowl championships since 2001 but signed with Tampa Bay this offseason. PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh Pirates reliever Edgar Santana will miss all of the abbreviated 2020 season after being suspended 80 games for violating Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program.

MLB announced Sunday that Santana tested positive for Boldenone, a performance-enhancing substance.

The 28-year-old Santana is in the process of a comeback after missing all of the 2019 season following reconstructive surgery on his right elbow in September 2018. S

The U.S. Open is returning to NBC starting this year at Winged Foot after Fox Sports has asked to end its 12-year contract with the USGA, multiple people told The Associated Press on Sunday night.

Three people with direct knowledge of the change say it came together in the last two weeks. They spoke on condition of anonymity because the deal has not been announced.

An announcement was expected Monday.

The U.S. Open, originally scheduled to be played last week, was postponed to Sept. 17-20 at Winged Foot in New York when the CO-VID-19 pandemic shut down golf for three months.
