"If you start exercising, even a little, it will make a big difference," said Miller.

# Stay engaged

Like exercise, staying mentally and socially active can have a slew of long-term brain benefits, as well.

Alzheimer's is the fifthleading cause of death in Americans over the age of 65. It is the most common form of dementia, accounting for 60-80 percent of all cases, according

"Scientists increasingly believe it is wise to read, work puzzles, play games and socialize to help improve memory," said OMRFAging and Metabolism Research Program Chair Holly Van Remmen, Ph.D. "It keeps the brain healthy and perhaps delays the onset of Alzheimer's and other forms

# **Stay moderate**

When it comes to diet, moderation is key. Eating too your body maintain muscle much can have negative health implications from heart disease to type 2 diabetes and arthritis. But as people age, many find they eat too little.

said Van Remmen.



Although Powell retired as superintendent after 34 years last year, he was still on the microphone at football games.


It won't be the same without him calling the games.

The charter school movement began as a reaction to the one-size-fits-all model of traditional public schools, a model that has clearly failed some – though certainly not all – students and families. In our state of Oklahoma,

there are currently 41 charter schools serving more than 24,000 students; two are in the Fourth District.

In addition to charter and

their children in the ways best magnet schools, families might decide to send their children to private or religious schools or to educate at home.

If relevant or accessible for families, these options can also cater to the curriculum preferences and learning needs of students that might not be addressed in traditional publicschool settings.

There are a number of reasons why parents might go this route for the education of their children, including the desire for a different approach to classroom curriculum or to incorporate religious viewpoints excluded in public schools.

And due to smaller class size, these options typically offer more individualized attention toward students as well. During my tenure as Chair-

man of the House Appropriations subcommittee that funds the Department of Education, I advocated for and oversaw

is the story isn't just about the kids eventually outsmarting and escaping the witch. It's more about Gretel growing up into womanhood, and maybe even unlocking her own supernatural In that way the movie kind

of reminds me a little of Robert Eggers's "The Witch." Only faintly though. And a half of that may be because the characters have a similar old timey way of speaking. Also slightly reminiscent of

Eggers, this movie has a very distinct visual style that's impossible to miss.

Many if not most of the scenes are filmed with the character's faces right smack dab in the middle of the frame. Even in conversations, instead of having one person on the left of a frame and one on the right to show a natural eyeline, everyone is always exactly in the center of the shot.

All in all, it makes for quite a striking looking movie. One that kept my interest for the visuals alone if nothing else.

Sadly though, this movie does market itself as a horror film. And though it might serve up a bit of uneasiness and a flash of disturbing images here and there, there's nothing really here that I'd call scary.

Though the witch is clearly up

to something sinister, she never really felt all that threatening. Even in the movie's climax. Plus, there's basically no jump scares to speak of, which I know will make this movie a nonstarter to viewers just looking to jump in their seats. And to top it all off, this movie

is just kind of weird. And not in a way that most people will enjoy I think.

Personally, I like that this film was a bit more than a cheap cash grab featuring a well known property. A filmmaker could have easily taken this story and made something soulless, yet more palatable to general horror movie audiences.



# Keep your Valentine flowers looking their best

Nothing says Happy Valentine's Day like a fresh bouquet of flowers.

Make sure your gift provides many days of enjoyment by selecting the freshest flowers and providing the best possible care.

Take some time to evaluate the quality of the cut flowers you plan to purchase. Select fresh flowers with upright and perky flowers and lots of firm buds that are just starting to open. Avoid flowers sitting in foul smelling water with drooping leaves and discolored slimy stems.

Consider color and fragrance as well as freshness. Many people love the sweet and lilies. Some varieties are more fragrant than others, so you'll need to do the nose test.

Other individuals prefer to them, select non-fragrant varieties and other flowers like hydrangea, alstroemeria, gerbera daisies and lisianthus that lack a strong fragrance.

Select their favorite color or perhaps one that sends a message. Red is often used to represent love and passion, pink for happiness and sometimes love, yellow for friendship and Cole received the Pledge cheer, and peach for gratitude. the message and sentiments are received.

ite, but a dozen may be out of in a prominent spot during reach for your budget. A single the day. rose in a bud vase or large bloom floating in a shallow vase can bring a bit of beauty and lots of enjoyment to you or the recipient. Or add a few roses to your bouquet of other colorful flowers.

Once you make your selection, ask the florist to include to revive roses. Remove the a packet of floral preservative and wrap your flowers. This protects them from extreme rose – stem, leaves, flowers brighten your home and lift temperatures and jostling and all – in a sink or tub of your spirits. during the ride home.

Extend the life of your floral gift with a few key steps before placing the flowers in a vase.

Remove the lower leaves, so just the leafless stems are sitting in the water. This minimizes bacterial growth that can shorten the vase life of cut flowers.

Recut the stems and arrange your blossoms in a clean vase filled with fresh water and floral preservative. Cutting the stems on an angle increases the amount of exposed surface area to absorb water.

Change the water, clean the vase if needed, recut the stems and add floral preservative every two to three days. Remove any flowers that have faded to keep your arrangement looking its best. Doing this can double the life of your cut flowers.

Further extend the vase life of cut flowers by displaying them in a cool, draft-free location. Or move them to a cooler spot at night and back

Even if you do everything right, roses sometimes bend or droop at the neck and disappoint. This can happen if they have not received enough water at some point between harvest and your vase.

Fortunately, there is a way roses from the vase. Recut the

warm water. Leave the roses submerged for 30 minutes.

Clean and refill the vase with fresh water and a bit of floral preservative. Recut the stems on a slant, underwater if possible, and place the roses back in the vase. You will have perky fresh roses to enjoy for a week or more.

And pick up an additional bouquet for yourself. Fresh stems and submerge the whole flowers are a great way to

The types of trees available are Loblolly Pines and Sawtooth Oaks.

Loblolly Pines are one of the most common pine trees. This North American native has dark green needles with narrow, red-brown pinecones about three to six inches long. These trees grow to be about 60' to 90' tall and have a spread of 25' to 35' wide once they reach maturity.

Sawtooth Oak is one of the fastest growing trees in its youth. It is an attractive shade tree with dark lustrous summer foliage and clear yellow to golden brown fall leaves. These trees grow to be 40' to 60' tall and have a spread of 40' to 60' wide.

The Cooperative requests members to not plant trees any closer than 30 feet of our electric power lines. This will allow the trees to mature without requiring trimming or removal in the future.

Hoping to blunt a drive to expand Medicaid coverage via a state question, Governor Kevin Stitt on Thursday announced support of a Trump administration Medicaid plan that would permit block grants to fund a healthcare plan to be called SoonerCare 2.0.

The plan would focus on capturing federal funds available under Medicaid while pursuing the maximum flexibility offered by the proposed federal Healthy Adult Opportunity plan initiative to deliver personal responsibility, innovate the rural healthcare system and deliver reform across the entire Medicaid program in the state.

Oklahoma House Speaker Charles McCall (R-Atoka) quickly endorsed support for Stitt's new plan.

"Our Caucus appreciates Governor Stitt's strong leadership working with the Trump administration to bring federal dollars back to Oklahoma," said McCall.

"Efforts to do this [ensure federal tax dollars be returned to the state and put to work] through amending our Constitution to force Medicaid expansion are wrong and will be ineffective and will fail to fix our problems," Stitt said.

Stitt said he is committed to ensuring Oklahoma is one of the first states in the nation to implement the health adult initiative.

"Our whole outcome is healthier Oklahomans and taking our population from one of the highest in uninsured populations to improve health outcomes in Oklahoma," Stitt

"Down six at Davis and down 10 at Pauls Valley and get wins puts us up two games in the conference race with four to go," he continued.


"This team never quits competing especially on the defensive end.





In fact, this is when David was exiled in the desert, one of the most difficult periods of his life. Although loved by God, David may have been feeling guilty of all the "bad" things that he

This desert is not only a physical place but also a spiritual one. In this place of contemplation, David remembers God's faithfulness in the past. Sometimes we don't remember God's faithfulness in the midst of times of trial. Here in this Psalm, David urges us to remember that, telling us to call out to God, knowing that God will lead us through the days of trial and darkness.

We sometimes call this darkness depression. Someone has said that depression turns our brain into a swirling mass of half truths and distorted perceptions. Some of us learn that 90 percent of the time, our feelings have no connection to reality. It has been estimated that what we imagine will happen only comes to pass eight percent of the time.

Reality occurs outside of our malfunctioning brain. Reality is solid. It is objective. It is unchangeable. If we try to process or evaluate anything in our lives in times of depression, it won't be successful and maybe even dangerous because it may be unreal.

Most of us want to withdraw from the world, including our closest friends, when we are depressed. We are busy listening to the voice inside telling us we are not worthy-not worthy of anything including the love of anyone in our lives,

even those friends who would walk through that lonesome valley with us. Those friends will be able to see truths that we can't. We shouldn't listen to our minds and the lies they

tell us.

The thing we need to remember: our greatest, loving friend is God. We need to tell ourselves: "I have to leave this to God for now. I can think about this later, and I can trust God to handle it until then." We aren't very trusting when we are depressed and don't believe even God loves us. Our minds deny things that our brains would know if we were feeling more rational.

We know that body, mind, and soul are connected. When our mind isn't working so well, we depend on our soul. We can also work on our body. Sometimes it can be as simple as spending 20 minutes in the sun. We don't necessarily have to exercise--just sitting in the sun can work.

But sitting in the light and being outside makes our bodies feel better, refreshing and nurturing our body and soul. Nature can help us remember grace is there for the taking. David went to the desert to reconnect to God. When we feel better, we begin to think more clearly and see things more ac-

curately. We can then believe God's promises more easily.

God loves us even when we can't feel it and can handle our lives even when we can't. Our hope when we face depression is God. God and Jesus hold onto us even when we feel like we're free-falling. even to our political leaders. This is not the first time Congress and the president have tackled this issue and as always it will probably not be the last.

First things first. Article II, Section II of the U.S. Constitution reads, "The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States." That is it. It does not go on to clarify what that means.

At the same time Article 1, Section 8, Clause 11 states, "To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water." Here the Constitution does give some clarification.

In Clauses 12-16 it reads, "To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years; To provide and maintain a Navy; To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces; To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions; To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress." From this it seems the Constitution does favor Congress when it

comes to war powers. As I have said before, the Constitution was purposely written vague. It is meant to be interpreted. From only reading the Constitution, it seems as if the Founders wanted to give Congress more authority in warfare. This idea is also supported by statements of the

Historically, war powers had always been in the hands of the monarch. The monarch could take the nation to war without any consideration for the people's welfare. When debating the power of our president, the Founders appointed many of the same functions of the monarch to the president, but one area in which the Founders felt restrained was war making. In a radical departure from Europe, the people's representatives were given the power to

declare war. Some believed the president was best served with all war powers, but too many saw too much military power in one branch as a threat to democracy and so gave the power to Congress. The compromise came

in the way it is written. Originally, the clause in Article I read Congress has the power to "make" war. That was changed to Congress has the power to "declare" war. The thinking was that the president as commander-in-chief needed the ability to use the army in self-defense if Congress was not in session. What seems to be agreed today is that the Founders'intention was to give the president power to wage a

defensive war. For most of our history, there was no reason for debate, as the wars we fought were seen as defensive, whether they were or not. James Madison received a declaration of war when the U.S. was attacked by England

James Polk claimed America was attacked by Mexican forces and hence a declaration of war was needed. Lincoln told Congress there was open rebellion. McKinley asked for a declaration of war after the believed

a war, what we see is that the presidents, each time, taking on more power for themselves. Lincoln constantly fought with Congress over the war, constantly taking more authority to himself. The Emancipation Proclamation is a great

example of a war act Lincoln

made without congressional

After WWII, presidents took even more power for war. With the Cold War it was easy for them to continue with the idea that the commander-in-chief had responsibility for defense. With beliefs such as the Domino Theory, it was believed that we must stop communism everywhere in order to stop it here.

So, wars such as Korea and Vietnam were conceived as defensive wars--which presidents took us into without an official declaration. I should say that starting in the 20th century we saw the president take on more power and responsibility in almost every aspect, not just war making. Presidents today cannot get away with half what they did in the 19th Century.

Finally, during the Vietnam War, Congress decided to take back some of their war powers and in 1973 passed the War Powers Resolution. Because of limited space, I can only summarize the effects of the resolution and have to skip important steps. Basically, the president has, in the end, 90 days to use the military until he has to pull back, unless either given permission by Congress or the U.S. is under attack.

It is suggested he confer with Congress before any actions taken, but not required. After any attack, the president is required to report to Congress within 48 hours. However, what that should look like is not spelled out. This became an issue with President Trump when Democrats and even some Republicans were not satisfied with the president's report after the recent missile

Presidents have seen the Wars Powers Resolution as unconstitutional. Nixon vetoed the Resolution on the grounds it handcuffed his ability to act as Commander-in-Chief. Other presidents have also argued against this. In 1983, the courts did agree that the president did have the right to sign or veto any war resolutions passed by Congress, making it necessary to compromise.

Historically Speaking, reading the notes from the Founders does seem to favor the Congress in the ability to make war, but also that the powers should be shared. War powers seem to follow the same track as most congressional/presidential powers. What we see is that in the 20th Century Congress allowed the president to slowly strip away congressional powers.

As I wrote in an earlier column, we saw the same things with tariffs. Maybe we are seeing a new trend of Congress trying to reclaim their power. We will not know until the majority power in Congress is the same as the party of the president to see if this is a real change or, as I guess, just a political show against a president from a different party.

We encourage veterans and surviving spouses to submit medical evidence to the VA in support of the veteran's claims for the service-connection of a disability. This can be accomplished by documentation from a medical professional who diagnoses a disability and may also provide a nexus to link an injury or a disability to an illness or event that occurred in the military or one that was presumptive to their military

Many people and organizations who help veterans do not ask for evidence to support the veteran's request for serviceconnection of a disability, or a surviving spouse's claim for service-connection of the veteran's cause of death.

When I first started as a volunteer helping veterans at the local American Legion, we would assist the local Oklahoma Department of Veterans Service Officer one morning each week. After we had been there a year or so we were helping so many veterans, the State Service Officer asked me one day why so many more of our claims were approved than his.

The only thing we did differently is we would ask the veterans we helped to obtain medical evidence to support their claims for VA benefits. As most veterans were exposed to some very loud noises while serving, we decided that a medical link from an audiologist would be the best way to help a veteran to receive service-connection of a disability.

Since that time, I along with the help of volunteers from our Foundation have helped tens of thousands of veterans receive the VA benefits for which they were eligible. As an example, when a veteran retains an attorney to assist them in obtaining VA benefits, the first thing the attorney will do is send the veteran for medical evidence.



Town Code NOW THEREFORE BE IT OR-**DAINED by the Board of Trustees** of the Town of Wayne

-Amending Section 6 6-4-5: PASTURING ANIMALS: It is unlawful for any person to pasture any form of livestock on any public property or private property stake, confine or pasture any animal on any public school ground or other public property, federal, state, city or other, on any railroad right of way, or on any property without the consent of the person owning or controlling such property.

Adding Section 6-4-15 6-4-15: MINIATURE GOATS:

a. The owner or primary occupant of any dwelling may be permitted to keep on the lot containing the dwelling no more than 3 (three) and no fewer than 2 (two) goats. Offspring shall be rehomed within 12 weeks of birth if their presence caused an excess of 3 (three) goats on a property.

 b. Male goats must be neutered/ castrated. No intact male goats (bucks) allowed in town limits.

c. Up-to-date vaccinations and de-worming records must be provided to the town upon request.

d. Goats must be provided shelter in the form of a shed or barn and proper fencing. The shelter should be at least 10 (ten) square feet per goat. The fenced area should be at least 200 (two-hundred) square feet per goat, surrounded by 4 (four) foot minimum fencing. The fencing must be sturdy and able to contain the goats. The shelter and fenced area should be at least 50 (fifty) foot from neighboring houses or building without written consent. No enclosure should be located in the front yard of a

e. Regular clean out and removal of manure and wet or soiled bedding is required. Adding Section 6-4-16

6-4-16: KEEPING OF HENS:

a. The owner or primary occupant of any dwelling may be permitted to keep on the lot containing the dwelling no more than 12 (twelve) hens (female chicken). b. No person shall keep any rooster (male chicken).

c. The hens shall be provided with a clean, covered, well-ventilated enclosure that is secure from predators and is cleaned regularly to prevent the accumulation of animal waste, feathers, and uneaten food;

d. The hens must always be kept in a covered enclosure or within a fenced area;

e. No enclosure for the hens shall be located closer than 15 feet to an occupied residential dwelling on an adjoining lot;

f. No part of the enclosure or coop for hens shall be located in the front yard of a dwelling.



# Enroll in key safety net

# programs

The clock is ticking... March 16 is the last day to make what is likely one of the most important business decisions you will make for your farming operation this year.

If you have not already visited your local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county office to make your election for either the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program and to sign your annual enrollment contract, you should call and make your appointment now.

Many of you are gearing up to head to the field for spring planting, but I cannot stress enough the importance of not letting this deadline get lost in the hectic day-to-day obligations of farm life.

If you fail to enroll for 2019 ARC or PLC, you will be ineligible to receive a payment for the 2019 crop year.

ARC and PLC provide financial protections to farmers from substantial drops in crop prices or revenues and are vital economic safety nets for most American farms. These programs cover 20 commodities produced in the U.S.

FSA anticipates more than 1.7 million producers will enroll in ARC or PLC - that's a lot of producers to assist in a short period of time.

As of February 3, FSA records in Oklahoma show 25,432 farms out of an expected 48,105 farms have completed ARC or PLC enrollment for the 2019 crop year.

Want to maximize your time visiting with FSA? Inquire about deadlines and options for also enrolling in 2020 ARC or PLC and updating PLC payment yields. Our staff will help you make the most out of your visit or set you up with a future appointment to help check FSA programs off your lengthy "to do" list.

If you're still unsure about the choice of ARC or PLC, we offer online decision tools to help you determine the best program election for your farming operation.


