







Garvin upsets Scott

Sets up all-Marlow race in general

Jessica Garvin defeated incumbent State Senator Paul Scott to earn the Republican nomination for the District 43 senate seat in Tuesday's Republican Runoff Election.

Scott won in McClain County, 1,713 to 1,292 but district-wide Garvin got the nod with 51.56 percent of the vote, knocking off Scott, 3,927 to 3,689.

The upset of the incumbent sets up an all-Marlow race in the November general election.

Garvin, a Marlow resident, will square off with Terri Reimer of Marlow, who was the only Democrat to file for the seat.

Reimer is a 1998 Purcell High School graduate.

Garvin made the runoff in the primary election June 30 when Scott failed to get the 50 percent plus one majority.

In the primary both Garvin and Scott ousted Kaity Keith in the three-person race. Scott garnered 49.9 percent of the vote in the primary while Garvin received 39.3

The general election will be November 3.

Area school enrollments down

Except at Wayne


With the exception of Wayne, area school enrollmenots are down compared to a year ago. Wayne's enrollment of

480 total students is up 11 over numbers from 2019 but Purcell, Washington and Lexington are all running a little lighter than a year ago.

Purcell is down 27 students, Washington is down 19 and Lexington is down 68 from last year.

Purcell had experienced fairly steady growth until a high of 1,446 students in 2016 and it has gone down

Early in his ministry at the church his father founded east of Lexington, the Rev. Dan Smith was troubled.

A young single mother who lost everything in a fire came to him for help.

"I had nothing to give," he recalled.

And he was struck by the need to be able to fulfill what he calls the church's mandate - the care of widows, orphans and the downtrodden.

From that was born the Joseph Project.

It was an idea, a goal, really, that took on life when church members Monty and Mistie Jensen became involved.

"They love feeding people," Smith said. "Mistie got on the horn and started bombarding food banks."

Her persistence led her eventually to Go Fresh. The company is the brain-

AG's brief defend state voting laws

Election

Responding to two Democratic Party groups challenging Oklahoma's voting laws, Attorney General Mike Hunter told a federal judge the proposed changes would lead to electoral disruption and facilitate voter

The brief is in response to a lawsuit filed in May by the Oklahoma Democratic Party and the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee.

The two entities complained about several voting procedures, claiming they severely burden Oklahomans' voting rights during the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic.

Hunter said the state has been proactive in already altering the election rules to make it safe and accessible for voters. He also pointed out that hundreds of thousands of Oklahomans voted safely and successfully in the June 30 primary election both in person and by absentee balloting.

"The plaintiffs' nonsensical demands would create a system that is a threat to the integrity of our state's electoral process and sow chaos by upending the election rules this late in the cycle," Hunter said. "During this year's legislative session, lawmakers took action to ease access to absentee voting during the pandemic as compared to the processes from previous

"During our June primary, we saw election officials implement protocols to ensure the safety of workers and voters. Further, the plaintiffs are unable to identify a single individual who will be unable

PPP surprise

As if things weren't hard enough for Oklahoma's small businesses, news comes that the Trump administration plans to claw back a chunk of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funds legitimate businesses have used as a lifeline to keep their employees on the payroll.

When Congress passed PPP, the legislation made it clear that these loans would ultimately be forgiven if businesses used them for approved purposes, mostly payroll. And, the law ensured — in writing — that any forgiven amounts would not be taxable, meaning that businesses could use all those funds to keep folks employed.

More than 66,000 Oklahoma businesses, including this one, signed up in good faith, secure in the knowledge that if they used those funds as Congress intended, they would be forgiven and not taxed. This program saved tens of thousands of jobs in our state.

Well, Congress may have said one thing, but President Trump's Treasury Secretary, Steve Mnuchin, has other ideas. According to the Treasury Department, forgiven funds may not be taxable, but the payroll businesses paid with those funds can no longer be considered a business expense. Now, we don't know Mr. Mnuchin personally, but our guess is that, as Treasury Secretary, he probably knows something about math: disallowing businesses from claiming that payroll as an expense is the same thing as taxing the forgiven loan.

Which means that Oklahoma's small businesses are going to get hit with a huge surprise tax bill, but most won't know it until — wait for it — after the November election! Surprise!

Now some members of the U.S. Senate weren't amused by this little "Lucy with the football" tomfoolery. Sens. Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) and John Cornyn (R-Texas) have led a fight in the Senate to tell the Treasury Department that they meant what they said: the forgiven loans should not be taxable, including through the back door. Other senators are worried about the "optics" of standing up for small businesses, if you can imagine.

Our own Sen. James Lankford was an early supporter of a bill Sen. Cornyn introduced (S 3612) to fix the problem. Oddly, Senator Jim Inhofe has yet to take a position, but it's never too late. Treasury cannot be allowed to override Congress' promise to our small business community.

News from Capitol Hill

A fake emergency

In recent weeks, concerns surrounding operations of the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) have frequented the news cycle and been shared widely across social media.

However, I want to caution you not to believe everything you hear or read on the subject, as there is a lot of deceiving and misleading information swirling around.

First, both Republicans and Democrats agree that having an efficient and effective postal service is vital to all Americans. Indeed, it is of critical importance to those living in rural America, which includes many areas in the Fourth District of Oklahoma.

In fact, it's worth noting that last Congress, former Congressman Mark Meadows and the late Congressman Elijah Cummings wrote and introduced bipartisan legislation with reforms and solutions to ensure the success to utilize this line of credit until and survival of USPS as an institution.

Second, while data over several years indicates that USPS understanding of these facts, faces real long-term challenges Democrats recently chose to

challenges are not of the pandemic's making nor were they created or exacerbated by this administration.

In fact, USPS has lost nearly \$80 billion since 2007, including a loss of nearly \$9 billion during fiscal year 2019.

Third, though there are longterm challenges that must be addressed sooner rather than later, USPS is far from falling off any sort of cliff in the near-term – and certainly not before or during the upcoming nationwide election.

In fact, according to USPS, it has enough cash on hand to maintain operations through August 2021. Moreover, USPS currently has \$10 billion of untouched borrowing authority, which was provided by Congress and signed into law as part of the bipartisan CARES Act back in March of this year. It's also worth mentioning that USPS has stated it has no plans next year – again, well past the November election.

Despite their knowledge and

absent serious reforms, those perpetuate the lies that there's an "emergency," creating and worsening fears that USPS is on the verge of collapse and incapable of handling the demands of election-related mail and ballots. Neither concern is valid.

In fact, USPS recently revealed that it delivers more than 433 million pieces of mail per day. Put in perspective, assuming every single registered American voter – approximately 158 million people – chose to vote by mail, the total mail volume for both requested and returned ballots would still not exceed a typical day's work for

Nevertheless, Speaker Pelosi called members of the U.S. House of Representatives back to Washington over the weekend to bring up a relief measure for this fake emergency – or, as the Wall Street Journal's editorial board described the situation, "a made-for-TV phony political crisis."

something deep within him which causes him to question his life, where he comes from and where he ultimately wants to be.

Like many films that have ended up on Disney's subscription based streaming service this year, this is yet another movie that was initially set to be released in theaters, but ultimately ended up on Disney+ due to the ongoing pandemic.

In a lot of ways, it almost feels like this was Disney's response to "Dolittle," a film which released earlier this year and also featured a wide variety of talking animals.

Funnily enough, it also feels a bit like a response to Disney's own recent reimagining of another film featuring a cute baby elephant at a circus, "Dumbo.'

And though it isn't necessarily the highest bar to surpass, I think "The One and Only Ivan" actually ended up being the best movie out of all three of these films.

Like both "Dolittle" and "Dumbo," "The One and Only Ivan" is a live action movie featuring real life actors alongside a wide variety of fully computer animated realistic looking animals.

Just like "Dolittle," this is a fully voiced cast of talking animals, including the voice talents of Rockwell, DeVito, and Prince as I mentioned before, along with Angelina Jolie as an elephant, Helen Mirren as a poodle, Chaka Khan as a chicken, Phillipa Soo as a parrot, and Mike White as a seal.

Unlike "Dolittle" though, there is no unusually gifted man who can talk to the animals. The closest we get is a little girl at the circus named Julia (Ariana Greenblatt), who seems to have a keen intuition of how Ivan is feeling at any given moment.

And I think I can answer much more than meets the eye. to both questions.

> The story here is a little less structured here than I'd like, but I don't think it's anything a child would find offensive.

Instead of a flowing nara bunch of little vignettes stitched together. All of them lead into each other, but none pandemic started. Popcorn of these moments really build on each other.

There's no consequences if something goes right or wrong. Things just happen, and when that scene is over, everything just resets as if nothing happened in the first place.

This leads to a story with almost no tension and rock bottom stakes.

Despite that, the film manages to stay fairly engaging throughout due to some fun, well acted characters, who are just enjoyable to be around.

I'd say young children around five or six would probably get the most out of this movie. There are some sad moments that may bother kids who are more sensitive, but there's nothing too traumatic here. No worse than some Disney animated classics, that's for sure.

This may not be the most thrilling movie, or a film with larger than life stakes, but it's a cute film with cute animals, solid performances, and a happy ending to boot.

If you're looking for something pleasant to put on for the kids, and you already have Disney+, you can do far worse than this movie.

are clearly misguided. Along with providing USPS with \$25 billion of funding it doesn't immediately need, the legislation would block implementation of any reforms to USPS operations

undergone or planned since the beginning of this year. It would also prohibit USPS from implementing any further changes either until Jan. 1,2021, or after the coronavirus public health emergency ends - which-

ever is later. Unfortunately, the failures with the legislation extend beyond what's in it to the backward and closed process by which it was brought up for a floor vote.

In fact, House Democrats violated their own rule requiring that legislation considered on the House floor first undergo a hearing and be reported by the committee of jurisdiction. Though the House went ahead and voted on the bill over the weekend, the required hearing occurred on Monday of this week – after the fact, two days

That is a far cry from the "regular order" Democrats promised at the start of this

Certainly, there are necessary, bipartisan reforms that Congress can and should provide to ensure USPS is on a sustainable path for the future.

But rather than calling the House back to waste time on fake emergency legislation going nowhere in the Senate and never making it to the president's desk, Speaker Pelosi should try bringing up measures negotiated in good faith across the aisle that have gone through the proper process ahead of any floor vote.

Not to mention, amid the coronavirus crisis, there are plenty of other areas of actual urgency that demand Congress' attention. We should deal with those more pressing matters immediately.



Fall garden planning should start now

With triple digit heat across the state, many Oklahomans are looking forward to fall and cooler weather. Although there will be several more weeks of intense heat, gardening enthusiasts can get a jumpstart on fall by planning their fall gardens now.

July through September is the optimal time to begin planting several vegetable varieties in order to have a bountiful fall harvest, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Extension horticulture specialist.

"A successful fall garden begins in the heat of the summer," produced and harvested during out the growing season. the fall season when warm, sunny days are followed by cool, humid nights.

"Under these climatic conditions, plan soil metabolism is low, which means more of the food manufactured by the plant becomes a high-quality vegetable product," he said.

Some tender vegetables that can be started in July and August and harvested before fall frosts include beans, cilantro, sweet corn, cucumber, pumpkin, and summer and winter

Hillock said to be sure and choose varieties that mature

early and are disease resistant. Some semi-hardy plants, those that may continue to grow and be harvested after several frosts, include beet, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, garlic, leaf lettuce, parsnip and radish.

Some plants will grow more easily if gardeners start seeds early and then transplant the seedlings later. Growing seedling plants under partial shade and with insect protection is easier than seeding directly in the garden.

The actual time of planting depends on the length of time required to produce a crop. Some crops may produce a crop in 20 to 30 days. This allows gardeners to take advan-

"A successful garden depends in part on desirable garden soil. Make sure the soil absorbs water readily and doesn't form a crust when drying," he said. "Gardeners want the soil to drain sufficiently so it doesn't become waterlogged. A porous soil contains more air, which is necessary for vigorous root growth. Remember, the soil also must contain nutrients. Additional fertilizers may be beneficial to stimulate growth and production."

The summer months of July and August involve high soil temperature, high light intensity and rapid drying of the soil, resulting in an increase in the issue of obtaining a uniform stand of plants.

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Hillock said achieving a full stand of plants in the heat of summer may require special treatments. This could include shade over rows when seeded, and supplemental watering to reduce soil temperature and aid in seed germination.

Viable seed requires a trifecta of proper temperature, adequate moisture and sufficient oxygen in order to germinate. Vegetable seeds should not be planted any deeper than three times the diameter of the seed.

"For example, a carrot seed shouldn't be planted any deeper than a quarter of an inch. However, at this depth, death of the seed would occur due to high temperatures," Hillock said. "Some of the best tage of successive planting for he said. "To achieve proper quality garden vegetables are a continuous supply through- temperature and adequate moisture, apply mulch over

the row following planting and watering. Straw, bark and wood chips are good choices."

Insects and weeds can be more prevalent this time of year so check frequently for insect activity and weed growth and use appropriate control measures. The mulch used to protect the seeds from the heat also will help keep weeds in check.

"To extend your gardening time even further, consider using cold frames and row covers," Hillock said. "Salad crops are quite successful if grown in cold frames and harvested on an as-needed basis well into the winter months."



Voter registration lags in Oklahoma amid COVID-19

Oklahoma, one of 10 states that doesn't offer online voter registration, has seen a sharp decline in new voter sign-ups this year as COVID-19 has created new challenges for inperson get-out-the-vote efforts.

State Election Board numbers requested by Oklahoma Watch show new voter registrations this year through the end of July are down nearly 22 percent, or a drop of 30,000 voters, compared to this point in the lead up to the 2016 presidential election.

What started out as a normal year quickly changed when coronavirus fears began to spread in late February and early March.

As social-distancing restrictions and lockdowns were ordered, new voter registrations plummeted throughout the spring. Just over 37,000 new voter registrations were recorded through March, April From page 3A and May. That's a 43 percent decline compared to the 65,500plus who registered during the three-month period in 2016.

The wave of civil rights protests and social justice campaigns that emerged following the death of George Floyd on Memorial Day helped spark an summer, including a 33 percent phone.



But looking at overall voter registration numbers, which inof 69,266 voters – a 3.2 percent increase between January 1 and

the end of July. During that time, Republicans grew their number of registered voters by 4.6 percent while Democrats grew by 0.7 percent. Independents grew by 4.1 percent and Libertarians grew by nine

percent. As of July 31, registered Republicans made up almost 49 percent of the state's nearly 2.2 million registered voters. About 36 percent of the registered voters are Democrats while independents made up 16 percent of the total. Even with this year's boost, less than 1 percent of the total is from registered Libertarians.

Oklahoma is not alone in experiencing troubles signing up new voters amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

TargetSmart, a Democratic political data firm, released a report earlier this month that found that there were more than 1.5 million fewer new voter registrations, a 32 percent drop, across the country in March and April compared to those two months in 2016.

But 40 states offer an option currently still not available in Oklahoma: Online voter registration.

The state launched an online tool two years ago that allows registered voters to update their information.But development of a similar platform to register new voters online has been delayed repeatedly since the 2015 authorizing legislation was passed.

In September 2018, election officials said they were hopeful

Because the state lacked online voter registration, Tulsa resident Mark Whitmire founded a nonprofit along with his wife, Mona, last year to make registering easier.

OKVOTE offers a website that allows residents to fill out the application online, which





Now is the time to collect fruit tree leaves

The most reliable indicator of fruit and pecan tree fertility line of cars waiting. There were needs is chemical analysis of the foliage, commonly called leaf analysis. This service is available through the OSU county Extension centers

throughout Oklahoma. Leaf analysis may be used to diagnose or confirm a particular nutrient problem in an orchard after symptoms are present. More importantly, leaf analysis can determine nutrient shortages or excesses before symptoms develop and yield is reduced. The church has also just

Frequently, it reveals that certain fertilizers being used are not needed, resulting in a more economical fertilizer program. Pecans, peaches, and apples are included in the OSU leaf analysis program.

Each sample will be analyzed for 1) nitrogen, 2) phosphorus, 3) potassium, 4) calcium, 5) magnesium, 6) manganese, 7) iron, and 8) zinc. If the soil pH has not been determined within the past five years, a soil test may be useful.

Otherwise, a soil sample will not be necessary unless indicated by the leaf analysis recommendation.

Taking Leaf Samples

Accuracy of diagnosis depends upon accuracy of sample collection. Each leaf sample should represent a condition rather than certain acreage. It may represent one tree or several acres.

The trees selected for each sample should be representative of the acreage or condition and the condition should be uniform as to soil and management practices.

You must judge the uniformity of your own trees to determine the number of samples necessary for accurate recommendations.

Sampling Guides for Apple, Peach, and Pecan*

1. Collect all leaf samples during July.

3. Before sampling, inspect selected trees for mechanical injury, mouse or gopher damage, winter injury, or wet feet.

These factors could influence

4. Apple and Peach—Collect 100 leaves for each sample.

5. Pecan—Collect 100 leaflets for each sample.

6. Collect leaves from shoots that are convenient from the ground and located on different sides of the trees. Do not collect leaves from suckers or water sprouts.

7. Do not collect more than two leaves from one shoot.

8. Select apple and peach leaves from the middle of current season's terminal growth.

9. Select the middle pair

of pecan leaflets located on a middle leaf of current season's terminal growth. 10. Remove leaves with a

downward or backward pull so that the leaf stem (petiole) remains attached to the leaf. 11. Avoid leaves that have

insect, disease, or mechanical damage or leaves not representative of the sample. 12. Do not use galvanized containers, rubber gloves, rub-

ber sponges, or allow leaves

13. Before the leaves wilt, wash them to remove spray

residue and dirt. This may be

done by dipping the sample in

clear tap water, not exceeding

one minute. 14. After washing, spread the leaves out to air dry until they will crumble. This will prevent molding. Do not expose the leaves to direct sun or allow them to heat in a bag while

drying.

15. Place the dried leaves in sample bag and submit with a completed information sheet to the Extension Center. One information sheet should accompany each sample.

*Simple leaves are produced on apple and peach trees while the pecan leaves are compound. Each compound leaf actually consists of several leaflets.

For simplification the term leaf is occasionally used to denote leaflet in the case of pecan.



So as we begin the downward slope of 2020 to 2021 let us be reminded of how lucky we are to see something we love make its return.





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

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
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Dragons return experience

Constant, Hayden Harp and several other inside receivers will bolster the receiving corps. "We had several guys get playing time last year due to injuries," Scott said.


Replacing Love at running back will be a challenge for the 2020 Dragons.

"We just don't have the depth at running back right now," Scott confirmed.


What he does have is a senior signal caller who has started as a sophomore and junior in Kody Kroth.







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


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"He's been a three year starter for us and has done a great job," Scott said. "We expect him to have another great year. He has the weapons to throw to and he's proven he can get it to them."

New man at the helm

Keith Bolles takes the reigns at Lexington

management" - but not really. After former 'Dawgs Head Football Coach Dale Berglan left earlier this summer to pursue a career in the pharmaceutical industry, his assistant coach Keith Bolles was immediately installed as the head coach at Lexington for an easy transition.

he Lexington Bulldogs are under "new

There's no need to worry from the Lexington faithful. Bolles has been a part of the last three Lexington teams with Berglan who had revamped the program.

"It feels really good to be a head coach again," Bolles said. "With the responsibilities and everything that go with that, I feel really excited about it. I can't wait to actually see the season started and put the pads on for Friday nights and get things into full swing."

Berglan led Lexington to an 18-14 record in three years as coach. His first team finished head 6-4 and didn't make the Class 3A playoffs. Afterstarting the season 6-0, a bevy of injuries to key players led to an 0-4 finish.

But in 2018 Berglan was skipper of a club that went 6-5 and lost to Coalgate, 57-31, in the first round of the Class 2A playoffs.

Last year, the 'Dawgs went 6-5 overall and 5-2 in district play for a second straight Class 2A playoff appearance. Lexington came up just short against Lindsay, 49-46, in the first round.

"Coach Berglan simply received a really good opportunity and decided to get out of the education field," Bolles said.

"When the opportunity came up for this job, I was fortunate to be in the position I was

in. The superintendent and the school board gave me this opportunity to lead this program to new heights. I am super excited about it."

Bolles has prior head coaching experience, most notably at Newcastle, where he led the Racers gridiron squad for 12 years from 2005 until 2016. His Newcastle teams went 68-63 during that span as Bolles led the Racers to eight playoff appearances.

The offense for Lexington this year will be what Bolles is calling a "Multi-I" formation.

"We'll be performing in the multi-I. That's what I call it," Bolles said. "We could be in a spread or in an 'I' or we could be empty.

"Our offensive line is right with the best of them and it's where we have something that we'll lean on," Bolles said.

"They're a fantastic group. Our strength is in our returning starters — such as Wyatt Webb, Dalton Matthews, Cam Conner, and some other people who have experience there. They will be leaders for us."

Webb, Matthews, and Conner are all seniors this year and will be looked at to provide protection for the Lexington backfield — which also brings back some stout athletes.

"In our backfield, we have senior Destrie Shea coming in with some experience at running back and we also have junior Heath Winterton, who had



Gone from that squad are the likes of Carson McMahon, Logan Hendrix, Devin Orr, Ethan Olson, Gavin Grimsey, Lance Spaulding, Alberto Aguirre, Conner Bruce, Justin Simmons, Logan Lile and Grant Six.

"That senior class was very successful. The standard they have set has left a blue print for upcoming classes to build upon," Beller said.

Beller and his staff intend to replace Orr at quarterback with last year's starting slot receiver in senior Emitt Wilk.

Replacing the running back skills of Lance Spaulding will prove to be a bigger task for the Warriors' staff.

"It will be by committee," Beller said.

Younger brother Layne Spaulding, Chase Allison and Jaxon Sanchez will share the all important running back duties.

Other returning starters include receivers Rhett Vaughn, Sanchez and Kobe Scott.

Luke Hendrix is a player who started as a freshman but missed his sophomore campaign due to injury, so he will help Beller and the Warriors this season.

Rope Scott and Luke Steele were the starting tackles last season. Both return but so does starting experience from

Beller believes the strength of the offense will be the passing game with so many returning receivers on the roster.



"He is going to be a big weapon especially early in the season when our offense is trying to find its legs. Maybe we can move down the field but not be able to put it into the end zone. He can put points on the board and also pin opponents deep with his punts," Beller said.

The deep snapper will be Kelton Schultz.

Beller reported the virtual off season workouts from April 6 through May 18 were strictly adhered to.

"We had accountability groups to make sure the kids were doing their work. When we started back in June we didn't have to push the reset button. We just built on where we left off in March. It shows the leadership we have when our max outs didn't drop off. That was a proud moment for me to see how the guys came in prepared like that," he said.

The key to the season for the Warriors will be building depth and how quickly they can build it to go with the returning starters.






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

Wayne returns loaded roster

Depth an issue, but talent abounds

ayne Bulldogs return one of the best rushing attacks in the state with the duo of Ethan Mullins and Brannon Lewelling. Mullins, the junior signal caller, accounted for

3,030 yards of offense and 42 touchdowns last season. He had 2,856 of those yards on the ground.

As if Mullins wasn't already a dangerous offensive weapon for the Bulldogs, a growth spurt during the offseason has made him an even more powerful force.

"He went from about 5'8" last year to 6' now and from 150 pounds to about 180," said Wayne Head Football Coach Brandon Sharp, who enters his 13th year at the helm of the Bulldogs.

The added size will be an advantage for him as the season goes on and Wayne uses him in their storied quarterback run game.

Offense

Ground and pound. Wayne will try to wear teams out by rushing the football.

"He's been in the weight room all summer and can lift a house," Sharp said. "He'll carry some of the load on offense in addition to the quarterback run game, which has been successful for us for a while now."

Wayne is looking to replace a lot of offensive line output lost to graduation.

Gone are Billy Montgomery, Bryar Norman and Austin Box. But Wayne returns Andy Lee, who started at guard, as well as Maddox Mantooth.

Ryan Redus had a good offseason according to Sharp and



the coach is counting on him for a strong senior season.

Rhett Kennedy and Kevin Bynum return as experienced receivers in the Wayne system.

Sharp and company will use the passing game to hit opponents at the right time to keep opposing defenses honest.

David McCullough moved back Wayne and will add an additional threat at receiver.

Senior Brian Ibarra is another returning starter with experience in the backfield.

"With Kevin and David McCullough we'll be big on the outside," Sharp said. "We'll be explosive offensively."

Wayne will need someone in the back end of the defense to step up and replace the graduated James Spencer, who had guys in proper alignment.

Bynum, McCullough, Redus, Braxton Smith and Cody Davis will also play heavy roles in the defense.


"Last year we were able to sub and keep guys fresh so there's a lot more experience across the board," Sharp said. "It's exciting to have a lot of guys coming back."

"They have been working out and they have put in the time and you can see the results," he said. "Hopefully it will help us get the season rolling. It's going to be a crazy year and you don't know what to expect with COVID. We'll try to be as normal as we can and be safe with these kids. They want to get back to normalcy and I'm ready to get out there with them."




