The following are their responses:

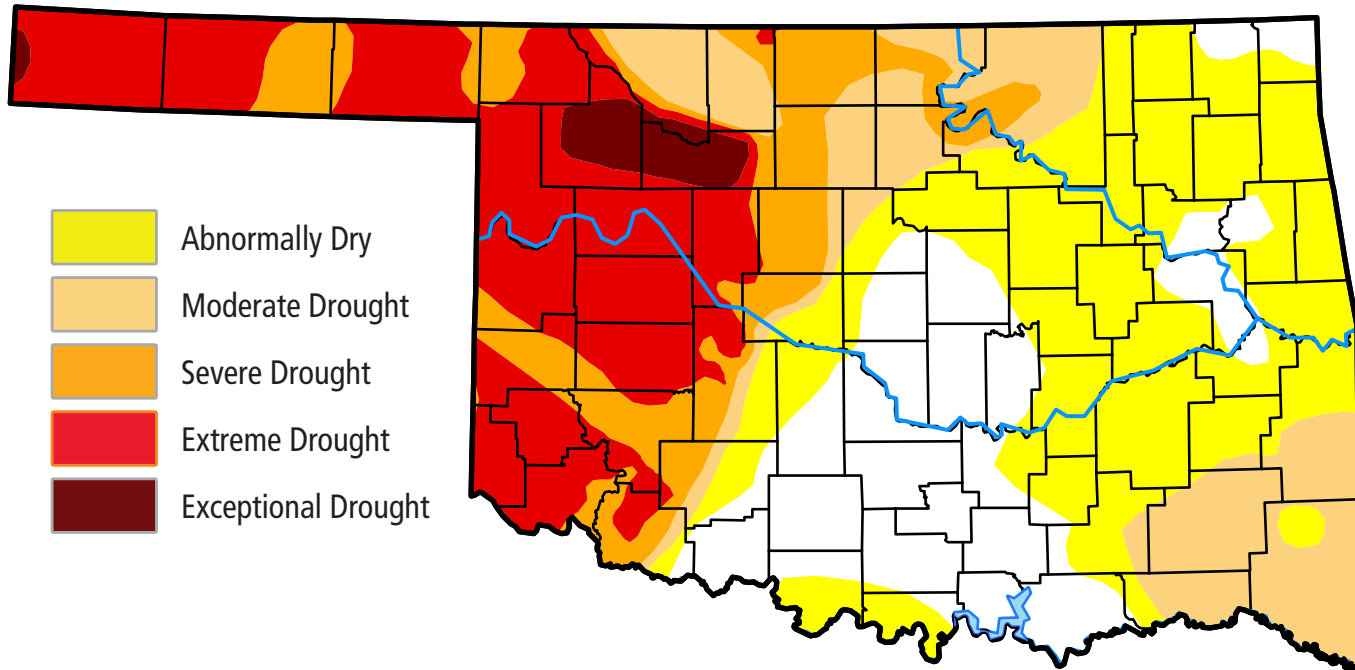
1. What skills of yours will you most lean on as County Commissioner?

Spray – As an OSU Road Scholar and combined career of 29 years as a McClain County employee, I have the experience needed to improve the safety and quality of our county's roads and bridges. As the water superintendent for the Town of Byars, I headed and assisted with grants that in turn helped the town receive a brand new water system.

Murray – I would lean on my management and business skills that I developed owning my own business for 35 years. This will be a big asset. It has also allowed me to learn about and perfect skills required for road construction, materials and equipment. I have learned in order to have a successful business and to be successful as a leader, I must be an open minded person, willing to listen to others ideas and opinions. Then, taking that information and making a plan, much can be achieved. I feel that it is important to be a good steward of the counties funding and hope to prevent any wasteful spending.

Sheehy – I believe the strongest skill that I can bring to the County Commissioners office will be my proficiency as a problem solver. While I'm a clear communicator and great with people, I've had the opportunity as a farm owner to hone in on my ability to come up with innovative ideas to solve problems. This ability and fresh perspective will allow me to serve the county proficiently and effectively.

Davis – I think my 22 years serving McClain County and the last 12 years as road foreman lay a very good foundation of experiences for me to lean on and to draw upon moving forward. Of course, there is a lot

5K Lake Run set for June 30

It's the 23rd annual Heart of Oklahoma Lake Run

The annual Purcell 5K Lake Run is set for Saturday, June 30, at the Purcell City Lake.

The run will start at the Rotary pavilion, located west of the old north pavilion.

Organizers are anticipating that this year's run will be a great event as the 23rd year of the run is celebrated.

Committee members extend an invitation to all runners to participate in this great race.

This year's race will be an out and back on a USATF certified course and it is a USATF sanctioned event. (USA Track and Field)

The run will start promptly at 7:30 a.m. Participants may register using the form in this

week's **Purcell Register**.

Race day registration will begin at 6:30 a.m. The entry fee for each runner will be \$18 for pre-registrants and \$20 on race day.

The first 100 registrants will be guaranteed a T-shirt commemorating the run. Checks should be made payable to the Purcell Lake Run. Registration forms may also be obtained from the run's website at www.purcellakerun.com.

There will be the opportunity for local businesses, churches, civic organizations, etc., to enter five person relay teams.

The cost for a corporate team is \$100 and for a non-corporate team the fee will be \$40. The 5K Relay is the championship relay for the state of Oklahoma.

Relay teams will be taken to their particular leg or kilometer marker prior to the beginning of the race. There will be one water station on the course at the half-way point. After the race, awards will be given to overall male and female runners, as well as the overall

masters runner which will be over 64.

There will also be an opportunity for all that attend the event to be entered into the door prize drawings. One of the really big things for this run is that there will be homemade ice cream for everyone to enjoy.

The Wayne Fire department will also be providing smoked sausage sandwiches to all in attendance.

Proceeds of this year's run will benefit the Purcell High School Track and Cross Country Teams. These teams receive limited funds from the school district and the proceeds from this run help make up that shortfall.

The coaches are able to purchase warmups, shorts and other needed equipment for their runners.

"Bring a friend and get some exercise and help us support this worthy cause," said organizer Dr. Rick Schmidt.

Cole applauds amendment

Assists Native Americans in land inheritance

Congressman Tom Cole released the following statement after H.R. 2606, the Stigler Act Amendment of 2017, was passed by the House Natural Resources Committee.

This legislation amends the Stigler Act of 1947, which restricts Native American allotted land to only persons of ½ degree of Native American blood.

The Dawes Act of 1887 authorized the federal government to survey tribal lands and divide them into allotted parcels for individual Native Americans.

Title to these allotment parcels was set forth in the "Stigler Act of 1947."

The Stigler Act provides that, upon probate, if the heirs and devisees of an original allottee

from the Five Tribes (Chickasaw, Choctaw, Seminole, Creek and Cherokee) have passed out of ½ degree Native American blood, the allotment loses its "restricted free" status.

Restricted land is not subject to state taxation. Federal law does not dictate a minimum Native American blood degree requirement for any other tribe.

The Stigler Act Amendment of 2017 seeks to amend the original Stigler Act, and remove the ½ degree requirement of Native American blood. In doing so, it would provide the opportunity for heirs and devisees to take title to the land, and allow the parcel to maintain its "restricted" status.

This legislation will also create parity in federal law in the

treatment of Native American-allotted land by removing minimum blood degree requirement for solely the Five Tribes.

"I am pleased that the Stigler Act was agreed to and passed through the House Natural Resources Committee," Cole said. "Amending the Stigler Act will allow for past precedent to be current with the realities of Native-owned land."

"By expanding the blood lineage degree, the amendment will support the preservation of the rights and legacies that Native Americans are entitled to, as well as their inheritance," the Congressman continued.

"I look forward to supporting the Stigler Act Amendment of 2017 on the House Floor for passage."

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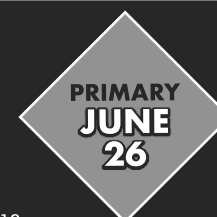

However, I spoke with a Purcell pharmacist this week and he disagreed with Lankford's assessment saying the smoking of marijuana helps with settling nerves.

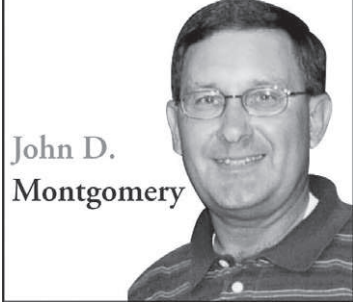
And reportedly, it helps with nausea when taking chemotherapy treatments.

A first step to peace

What seemed to be once impossible, has finally come to fruition. The President of the United States, Donald Trump, met with North Korean leader Kim Jong-un last week.

For the first time in history, a U.S. President and a North Korean leader met in an official capacity in an effort to strengthen ties and reach a peace agreement.

President Trump has achieved something previous Administrations have not been able to do. Bringing North Korea to the negotiating table is an accomplishment, but it is one that has required extraordinary measures to do so.

North Korea is a top adversary to the United States and combating its aggression over the past few years has been a fight guided by resolve.

Multiple nuclear tests, reports of human rights abuses and even the death of an American citizen were evidence that the regime of the Kim dynasty continues to be erratic and dangerous.

But with continued economic sanctions from the United

States and its allies, North Korea is feeling the strain of global pressure to end its tyrannical practices.

Additionally, South Korea has been at the forefront of improving relations with North Korea. South Korean President Moon Jae-in and Kim Jong-un had met a number of times to set the course of dialogue with North Korea.

China, North Korea's primary trading partner, has also stepped up in supporting dialogue with North Korea. In the past, China has not been reliable in exerting and implementing sanctions, but it has been essential in diplomatic engagement.

The summit would not have been possible without China's cooperation. It is reassuring to know that China has recognized the importance of putting pressure on North Korea.

The U.S.-North Korean Summit marks a new era of American foreign policy with the rogue state.

Despite reservation and doubt, the President and his administration remained resolute in establishing an effective diplomatic framework. The

summit was conducted with transparency and resolve.

In the joint statement signed by both President Trump and Kim Jong-un, a set of provisions were laid out as a diplomatic framework.

First, North Korea must commit to denuclearization. With this commitment, the U.S. agreed to suspend joint military exercise in South Korea. However, if North Korea continues with its nuclear program, the U.S. will begin full-fledged exercises again.

Sanctions from the U.S. and the U.N. will also remain in place. Any potential failures from this historic meeting will be a result from North Korea deviating from their commitments.

This meeting has been a possibility for a long time, but the final push to bring North Korea to the negotiating table was the result of President Trump's endeavors.

As a whole, it represents the hope of future diplomacy and negotiation with Kim Jong-un. Although there is still much work to be done with North Korea, the door to a path forward has been opened.

Consider your vote carefully

Almost all of the gubernatorial candidates participated in a forum as part of the Oklahoma Press Association's annual convention. Ten candidates provided introductory statements and fielded questions from the audience of Oklahoma journalists. Republicans Mick Cornett, Gary Jones, Todd Lamb, Gary Richardson, Kevin Stitt and Blake Stephens attended, as did Democrats Drew Edmondson and Connie Johnson and Libertarians Rex Lawhorn and Joe Maldonado, who goes by the pseudonym Joe Exotic.

There was, of course, plenty of attention focused on Maldonado, whose campaign materials include packets of rolling papers sporting his photo and a plea to vote for him. Speaking plainly and sometimes profanely, Joe Exotic enlivened the forum.

We applaud every Oklahoman who is willing to serve the state. There is no glamour in running for office and no pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. We applaud with even more enthusiasm the candidates who are clearly committed to government transparency. We favor honesty and accountability.

Only one candidate, Kevin Stitt, made the mistake of failing to consider his audience. When a candidate is speaking to a room full of journalists, it's a bad time to ignore the question. Yet that's just what Stitt did; when his turn came near the end, he stood up and launched into a campaign speech that had nothing to do with the question about prioritizing long-neglected state services. Moderator Mike Strain of the **Tulsa World** had to interrupt to end it.

We expect some hyperbole

in campaign materials – both Stitt and Lamb have claimed to "win" non-competitive forums such as the one held Friday, for example – but Stitt's campaign has also claimed he is going to fire poor-performing agency heads and that no one was held accountable for fiscal mismanagement at the Department of Health.

The governor cannot fire agency heads except at the Department of Health; all others answer to boards. All top leaders at the Health Department were fired or forced out, as were some of their replacements.

According to one June 13 poll, Stitt, Lamb and Cornett are in a dead heat for the Republican primary. Voters should consider carefully how each responds to questions and how genuinely transparent each is likely to be.

If he were still alive, my father would be 118. His father drove an ice wagon but before my father died he saw two world wars, the construction of the Golden Gate Bridge and Neil Armstrong's lunar stroll.

When people realize he was 61 the day I was born, "How old was your mother?" is usually the next question, so let's solve that. She was 42. They had been married three years. I was their only child and I was often mistaken for their grandchild.

There are a lot of advantages to having old parents. It is almost as those strangers assumed; it's like having grandparents for parents. They tend to go the extra mile without worrying too much about whether you're getting spoiled like a piece of old fruit.

By 61 life is settled. There isn't a lot of worry about where the career is going or whether it's time to upgrade to a larger house, fancier car, better social circle. What matters is raising the kid as well as you can before you die, so he did his best to condense it, to cram double the parenting into half the years. Play ball on Sunday? Sure. Go to that Giants-Dodgers game? You bet. Take a trip to Disneyland? Why not.

By adolescence, I knew my upbringing was going a little differently than my peers'. I removed my hat indoors, stood when a lady entered the room, walked on the street side of the sidewalk to absorb the splash. Nothing ever splashed, but there weren't many muddy streets. I was the only sixth-grader at Hillwood Academic Day School who religiously watched The Lawrence Welk Show on Saturday nights. Friends only knew of it from visiting their grandparents and considered that ritual a detriment inherent to old parents. I did not.

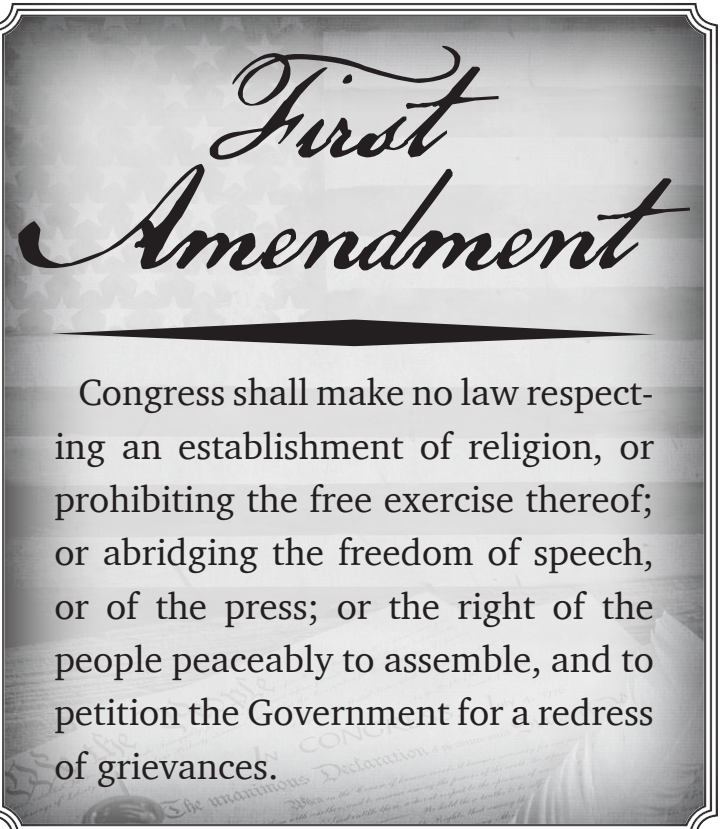
There were drawbacks, most notably his death when I was 15. I was a parent at 29, but became a father again at 45 and 48. Forty-eight is no 61, but that old man label still applies and offers a little bit of insight to my own old man. The difference is that life is settled; I'm not scrambling to pay the electric bill or mentally tabulating the total in the grocery cart. My patience is greater but my energy and endurance are less. I cannot keep up with the 11-year-old in a 5K run or at the ice rink; he passed me a couple of years ago. But I'm old enough now to know why going to his hockey game is more important than spending an extra hour at the office.

There are more old men becoming someone's old man. According to a Stanford University study, the average age of a new father in the U.S. rose from 27.4 in 1972 to 30.9 in 2015. In that time the percentage of new dads older than 40 jumped from 4.1 to 8.9 and the rate of those older than 45 doubled from 1.5 to 2.9. In Japan, the average age of fatherhood is 36.3.

I'd like to think that means we're raising children in less chaotic, more settled households with more resources. But I'd also like to think we old men are living long enough to walk our daughters down the aisle.

This old man will enjoy it while he can. On Saturday, the 8-year-old and I are going to settle in on the couch and tune in OETA for a Lawrence Welk rerun.

MOVIES WITH DAVE

It seems like Disney can't help itself but continue to break box office records lately.

This weekend their latest film "Incredibles 2" blew past all predictions, grossing the studio a whopping \$182.6M domestic 3-day total.

That not only gives Pixar's latest film the largest opening weekend for an animated movie, beating "Finding Dory" by over \$47 million, it also gives it the biggest opening weekend for a movie rated PG.

Even compared to live action films, "Incredibles 2" is no slouch. This movie earned the 8th highest opening weekend of all time domestically, putting it above the likes of heavy openers like "Captain America: Civil War" and "Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice."

For Disney this is excellent news, especially after the disappointing box office of their previous film, "Solo: A Star Wars Story."

But money isn't everything. How was the actual film itself? Let's get to the reviews, shall we?

First up is "Tag." Inspired by a true story, this film follows a group of adults (Ed Helms, Jeremy Renner,

Jon Hamm, Jake Johnson, and Hannibal Buress) who spend an entire month out of the year playing a no-holds-barred game of tag. The same game of tag they've been playing since they were all 9-years-old.

Well that's certainly a unique concept. What's even more incredible is the movie really is based on a true story.

Back in 2013 **The Wall Street Journal** ran an entire article about a group of men in their 40s who have been playing the same game tag for 23 years.

A game that's lead them to breaking into each other's houses and even flying across county. All in an attempt to not be "it."

It's a fun story. One that's well worth reading if you get the chance.

Unfortunately, the movie inspired by the article is more of a mixed bag.

For a comedy, this movie just wasn't that funny.

Sure, there's plenty of jokes to go around, but the large majority of the comedic moments barely got any laughs. Either they were poorly set up or the timing was just way off.

However, to the film's credit, the physical comedy ended up faring a little better with the audience I saw this with.

As for myself, I had a hard time enjoying watching these guys injuring each other.

Frankly, some of these stunts would have probably landed half the crew in a hospital bed.

I know slapstick like this isn't uncommon for comedies. Heck, half the traps in the original "Home Alone" would probably killed our poor would-be robbers in real life.

Believe me, I don't have an issue with physical comedy, but this movie is supposed to be based on a true story.

It's all over the posters, the trailers, and even the TV commercials. "Based on a true story" is practically the entire marketing hook of this film.

I don't know about all of you, but whenever I see a movie is based on actual events, I tend to take it a bit more seriously.

Even if the filmmakers take liberties with the story, which they definitely do here, they're still setting the movie's events in reality.

So it feels really jarring when I see Jeremy Renner busting

through glass windows without taking a scratch, Jake Johnson falling from the second story of a building without at least bruising his ribs, or the other countless injuries that would have probably lead to broken bones or severe concussions.

What's worse though, is later on the film ends up turning away from the slapstick and silliness that ruled the majority of the movie, and takes a much more somber turn during the final few scenes.

I just couldn't take it seriously. I kept thinking the sad turn of events would end up being a joke, all the way up until the credits finally appeared.

You can't have it both ways. You can't have the majority of your movie be a silly, over-the-top comedy, but then shoehorn in a solemn tearjerker ending. It just doesn't fit, or at least it didn't here.

At the very end of the movie, before the credits begin to roll, the film shows some home videos of the actual group of guys this film is based on, sneaking up on each other and playing tag.

Those clips were easily the best part of the whole movie.

Frankly I wish they would have just made a documentary about the real guys instead of this wishy-washy comedy. The few moments with the actual guys felt infinitely more genuine than anything else in this film.

It's a shame. This movie has a great concept and a very talented cast.

If you're looking for laughs though, you should definitely look elsewhere.

Next is "Incredibles 2."

Every one's favorite family of superheroes is back. Hoping to bring supers back

in the spotlight, Helen Parr aka Elastigirl (Holly Hunter) joins forces with telecommunications tycoon Winston Deavor (Bob Odenkirk) in an attempt to change people's perception on persons with powers.

This leaves her husband, Bob aka Mr. Incredible (Craig T. Nelson), at home with the kids. Not only managing the day-to-day obstacles of being a stay-at-home parent, but also dealing with their baby Jack-Jack's emerging superpowers.

Now this is a sequel that's been a long time coming.

People who saw the first film as kids have been chomping at the bit for years to see a continuation of "The Incredibles."

And after watching these films back to back, it's amazing to see how far 3D animation has come in the last 14 years.

The day before going to see "Incredibles 2" I went back to the original for a refresher, something I recommend everyone do since this movie picks up right where the first one left off.

Even back then it was pretty clear Pixar hadn't quite perfected human characters yet. It was good, but it just wasn't quite there.

Going back, the dated animation sticks out like a sore thumb now.

From the simple skin textures, to the plastic looking hair, it all looks incredibly antiquated by today's standards. Especially whenever they threw water into the mix.

It's striking to see just how far technology has come. Not only are the character models vastly improved from the first here, but the world around our heroes is completely different as well.

Go and rewatch the final battle between the Parr family

and giant Omnidroid from the first film. If you pay attention, notice that you don't see a single civilian in the entire city during that scene.

It's almost eerie when you notice it, but I'm sure it was just a limitation of the time.

One thing's for sure though, it certainly isn't a limitation anymore.

The city in "Incredibles 2" is alive and absolutely bustling with people. It's such a stark contrast and it's definitely the biggest improvement from the original.

But beyond the animation quality, this movie is still very much like the first.

The sequel still has the futuristic 1960s aesthetic from the original and the soundtrack is still bursting with a catchy, trumpet heavy music score that I just can't get enough of.

Also, for better or worse, our characters are also pretty much unchanged from the first film.

I know I'm probably in the minority here, but the Parr family itself is my least favorite aspect of these movies.

I guess I like the parents okay, though Bob aka Mr. Incredible does lose his temper a bit more than I'm comfortable with.

Helen aka Elastigirl is given a much more prominent role in this film, which is nice since she's probably my favorite of the Parrs.

But the kids. I am not a fan of the kids.

Dash (Huck Milner) is like the distillation of every annoying younger sibling on the planet. That's his entire character. Being irritating.

Perhaps I see a little too much of myself in him. I don't know, you'd have to ask my older brother and sister.

And then there's Violet (Sarah Vowell). I hate Violet.

Her whole personality in the first film is just being painfully shy and disappearing when a boy she likes looks in her general direction.

That's right. She's a literal shrinking violet. Her name is so on the nose it's insulting. Almost as insulting naming your son with superhuman speed "Dash," but at least that's supposed to be a nickname. Enough about Dash though, back to Violet.

Sure, she's gained a bunch of confidence after events from the original film, but she still has that aggravating high school crush on Tony Rydiger from the original. Something the writers basically hit the reset button on for this film.

Instead of being a painfully shy, moody teenage girl, this time she's a less shy, moody teenage girl with an anger problem. Frankly I don't think that's much of an improvement.

Both older kids don't feel like actual people, just shallow character archetypes that don't change or grow as the movie goes on. They're just there to be foils for their dad.

Even in the first film, the two of them barely had character arcs. Dash wanted to play sports and Violet wanted a boy.

This time they somehow have even less to work with. Violet still has the same dang crush, which was frustratingly reset, but at least that's more than Dash has in this film.

Dash has nothing. Not unless you count doing his math homework. The baby has more character development than Dash does.

Speaking of which, comedy wise, this film is all about Jack-Jack (Eli Fucile).

There's nothing quite like watching an uninhibited super-powered baby run amok.

Jack-Jack easily got the most laughs, from both myself and the audience, and he certainly

Guarding against tick bites

Oklahoma families are not the only ones excited about the warmer summertime temperatures. Ticks are, too.

"These important public health pests are typically active this time of year through the end of summer," said Justin Talley, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock entomologist. "Ticks are actually active year-round, but for the next few months ticks will be especially aggressive."

The pests are not picky when it comes to hosts, so everyone is a target. The most effective tick repellants are products with at least 25 percent DEET.

"If you're going to be outdoors in areas where ticks are likely to be, apply repellant especially around the ankles, up to the knees and around the waistline," Talley said. "If you'll be in heavy brush, like trimming trees or bushes, also

put repellant around the neck and all the way to the ankles because ticks will fall out of that vegetation."

Some natural, plant-based products, such as citrus oil and lemon grass oil, will work as repellants, too. Although these options are less effective than DEET, parents may prefer using natural products on children.

"When using these natural products parents should apply them where ticks will target, especially around the ankles and waistlines," Talley said. "Both adults and children will need to keep reapplying natural products to boost their effectiveness."

In Oklahoma, the American dog tick and the lone star tick are most concerning because both are linked to tick-borne pathogens.

The state is a hub for tick-borne disease, carrying some of the highest infection rates in the nation for tularemia,

ehrlichiosis and Spotted Fever Group rickettsiosis, which includes Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

The lone star tick is associated with multiple pathogens, including those connected to the Heartland and Bourbon viruses, which have been identified in patients from Oklahoma within the last five years.

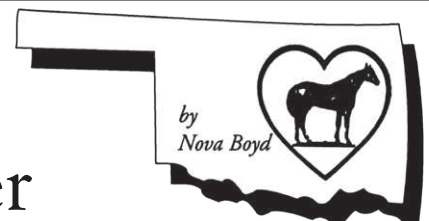

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Weekly Chickasaw language classes open to the public

The Chickasaw Nation will offer community Chickasaw language classes from 6-8 p.m. on Thursdays through September.

Classes are open to the public at no charge at the Chokka' Kilimpi' building, 3200 Marshall Ave, in Norman.

Classes are planned for June 21 and 28, July 12, 19 and 26, August 2, 9, 16, 23 and Tuesday, August 28 and September 6, 13, and 20.

Location is subject to change, and if so students will be notified weeks in advance.

Instructor Jason Eyachabbe, education coordinator for the Chickasaw Nation, will lead the class in gaining a deeper understanding of Chikashshonpompa' (the Chickasaw language). Students will bolster

their Chickasaw vocabulary and learn about the history and culture in which the language is rooted.

Classes will consist of common words and phrases, language engagement activities and also Rosetta Stone videos and lessons.

The Chickasaw language was the primary language of Chickasaw people for hundreds of years, passed on to new generations orally. It is viewed as a gift from the ancestors.

In 1994, the estimated number of fluent Chikashshonpompa' speakers was less than 1,000. Today, there are less than 75 fluent speakers, with the vast majority older than age 55.

Several programs and services have been established

by the Chickasaw Nation to revitalize the language. To learn more about available programs and services, visit www.chickasaw.net/chickasawlanguage.

A self-teaching tool called Chickasaw Basics can be found online at anumpa.chickasaw.net or downloaded as an app on the iTunes App Store. The app features hundreds of fully vocalized Chickasaw words along with phrases, songs and videos.

Oklahoma State Department of Health requests public comments on WIC Program State Plan

The Oklahoma State Department of Health is soliciting comments from individuals regarding the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).

Input is needed for the State Plan of Program Operations for the 2019 Federal Fiscal Year. These comments must be received before July 31, 2018.

WIC is a federally funded nutrition education and supplemental food program for low income pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women, infants, and children up to five years of age.

Eligibility is determined by nutritional risk and incomes that fall below 185 percent of the poverty level. There are approximately 75,200 Oklahomans participating in the WIC Program each month.

A priority for the program is to make sure pregnant women understand the importance of adequate nutrition throughout their pregnancy.

Numerous studies have shown that pregnant women

who participate in WIC have longer pregnancies leading to fewer premature births; have fewer low and very low birth-weight babies; experience fewer fetal and infant deaths; seek prenatal care earlier in pregnancy and consume more of such key nutrients as iron, protein, calcium, and vitamins A and C.

The WIC Program encourages and supports breastfeeding by providing a wide range of breastfeeding services and support activities to expectant and new mothers.

Another priority for the WIC program is to ensure that mothers and eligible families with young children have the basic nutritional knowledge necessary to assure their children's proper nutrition intake.

WIC provides a monthly prescription of nutritious foods tailored to supplement the dietary needs of participants to ensure good health, growth and development.

The foods are specifically chosen to provide consistency with the Dietary Guidelines

for Americans and established dietary recommendations for infants and children under five years of age.

The selected foods also reinforce WIC nutrition education messages, address emerging public health nutrition-related issues, and provide wide appeal to the diverse WIC population.

WIC is housed within local county health departments and operates interdependently with other public health programs. Providing referral services to health care and social services, WIC is a "gateway to the health care and social service systems," which enables more comprehensive health promotion and disease prevention in the WIC population.

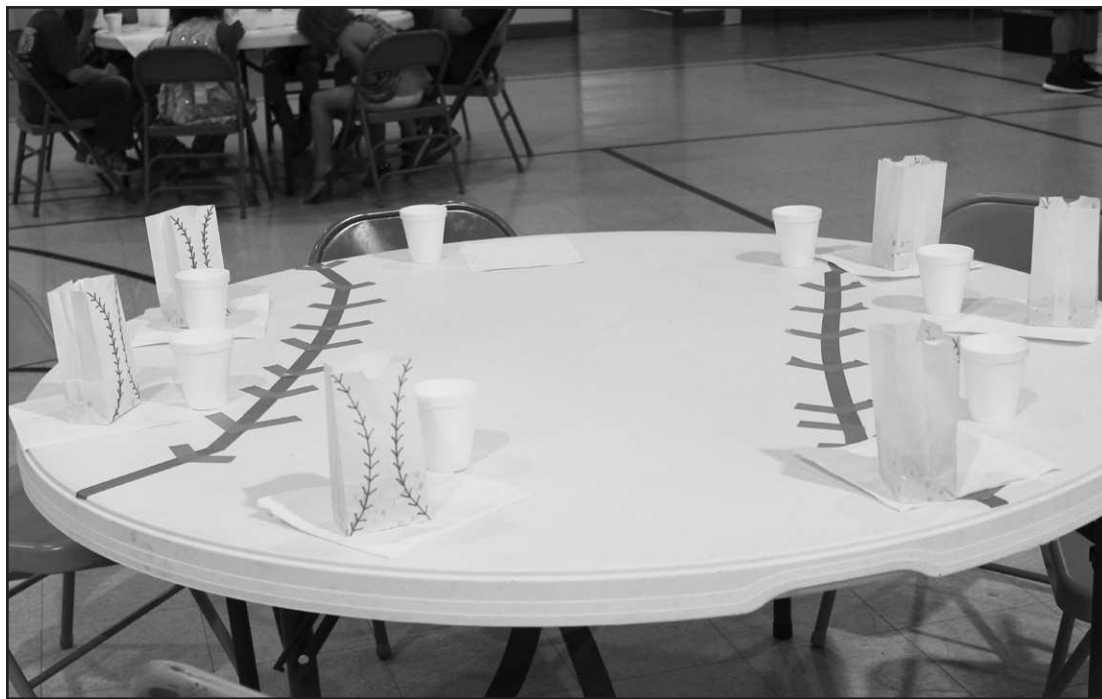

One for the History Books

In recent years, Osage County has increasingly become a part of America's collective consciousness. With the play and movie "August: Osage County," the sprawling home empire of the Pioneer Woman Ree Drummond, and the New York Times Bestseller and National Book Award Finalist "Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI," the world has focused much attention on this corner of Oklahoma.

"The history of Osage County is a microcosm of the American West, from tallgrass prairies and an underground reservation to the survival of cowboy culture and the assault on tribal sovereignty," said Dr. Bob Blackburn, executive director of the Oklahoma Historical Society. "The result is a fascinating story where facts are more dramatic than fiction."

One of the highlights of the Oklahoma Historical Society's Oklahoma History Conference this year will be a luncheon presentation by David Grann, author of "Killers of the Flower Moon. The luncheon will be held on April 26 at noon. "To celebrate the 125th anniversary of the Oklahoma Historical Society, the theme for this year's conference is 'OHS125: Collecting, Preserving, and Sharing for the Next Generation,'" said Larry O'Dell, director of membership and special projects for the OHS. "The conference will be held at the Oklahoma History Center in Oklahoma City from April 25-27, with a reception on Wednesday night at the old Historical Building, now the Judicial Center, and performances from "Green Grow the Lilacs" and "Oklahoma!" on Thursday night. There will also be paper sessions and local tours."

In the ONEOK Gallery at the Oklahoma History Center is the exhibit "We Are Who We Were" about American Indian culture and history in Oklahoma. On display in this gallery are some Osage artifacts.

"The Osage shield and gun-

stock club currently on exhibit are remarkable artifacts from the time of conflicts resolved on horseback," said Deputy Director Jeff Briley of the History Center. "The buffalo is a dominant component of this shield. The hump of the buffalo, the thickest part of the hide, is the interior of the shield and is covered by a soft hide with a buffalo skull painted on the front. The tail of a buffalo is attached to the top right of the shield.

"The portfolio highlighting the Osage Nation, within the gallery, serves to provide a glimpse into the tribe and OHS objects," continued Briley. "Among the more recent Osage objects on exhibit is a spectacular woman's wedding coat and depictions of its use."

Also within the collections of the Oklahoma Historical Society is the Osage shield that served as the model for the design on the Oklahoma state flag. That shield is not currently

on display.

Of course, the best way to understand a setting is to experience it firsthand. One place to do so is the Joseph H. Williams Tallgrass Prairie Preserve in Osage County. In 2015 the Nature Conservancy, which protects the natural wonder of the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve, acquired a piece of property on the prairie that includes the cabin of John Joseph Mathews, an Osage historian and novelist.

Harvey Payne, community relations coordinator for the preserve, was instrumental in the acquisition of this historic property. In this home, which Mathews called "The Blackjacks," the writer wove together the stories of his people, working to save the history of the Osage Nation. According to Payne, the fact that the Nature Conservancy now owns and has renovated the property opens a new realm of possibilities for the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve.

The renovation of the John

Joseph Mathews cabin on the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve complements other preservation projects that have taken place in Osage County. These projects have helped the economy of the county and revitalized the culture of the area.

According to Osage Nation Chief Geoffrey Standing Bear, there are three primary cultural influences on Osage County: Osage culture, oil culture, and cowboy culture. Sometimes these distinct traditions intersect, but all three are still so strong that they can be found individually in the land and people of Osage County.

One place to see where the Osage Nation intersects the world is at the Osage Nation Museum, located in Pawhuska. The oldest tribally owned museum in the United States, the Osage Nation Museum was founded on May 2, 1938,

Corn husk doll class Saturday, June 23

The Chickasaw Nation will host a corn husk doll class from 1-3 p.m., Saturday, June 23, at the Council House Museum, 209 N. Fisher, in Tishomingo. The class is free, open to the public and supplies will be provided.

Susan Ledford, Education Specialist for the Chickasaw Nation, will teach the history and practice of corn husk dolls.

Native Americans have crafted corn husk dolls for thousands of years, stretching back to the beginning of agriculture. They were prevalent when first contact with settlers occurred and are still produced today.

Corn husk dolls are often decorated and dressed. Hair, clothes and accessories such as bows and shawls can be made to adorn a doll, using materials like cloth, leather, twigs, sinew, yarn and horse hair.

The process and materials are

simple but allow for a range of customization. For the June 23 class, participants will be submerging dried corn husks into warm water, and with a series of stacking, folding, rolling, tying and cutting movements, form a figure resembling a man or woman.

Seating is limited to 15 people and registration is necessary.

The Council House Museum houses a large collection of Chickasaw art, artifacts and archive materials.

Hours of operations are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Friday, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

Attendees are invited to visit other nearby attractions like the Chickasaw National Capitol and Chickasaw Bank Museum.

“Without the tax that figure would have been negative \$1.2 million,” Scully said.

Scully has been working at PMH since the middle of 2012 and has been CEO since the middle of 2014.

She doesn’t have a crystal ball where federal regulations are going to go in the next 10, 20 or 30 years but she is sure the town needs the hospital and the hospital needs the town.

Feasibility studies have shown PMH needs a minimum of \$11.677 million in upgrades the next couple of years to bring the facility up to current health care coding standards.

But Scully said that really only scratches the surface.

“If we included other needed infrastructure repairs that cost goes to \$16 million,” Scully said. “And if you really wanted to completely redo the facility including exterior upgrades and upgrades to the medical office building, the number expands to \$23 million.”

Before the tax Scully said the hospital could not keep up with its expenses.

“Each week we would have to pick and choose which vendors we were going to pay on any given week,” the CEO said. “We would have to decide which vendor needed to be paid the quickest.”

That was then.

Now all of the hospital’s outstanding debt, including long term debt, is current within 30 days.

“That’s everything,” Scully said. “We only have two small outstanding loans which were for equipment. And those notes are current as well.”

The sales tax, which passed 987-142 in August 2016, has helped fund upgrades in the radiology department both with X-ray equipment and moving to digital technology.

Daily cash is no longer a deficit. In fact, the hospital averages about \$11,000 in cash on hand. Patient volume is up.

Scully reported to the Rotar-

ians last week that in all of 2017 PMH had 1,802 patients. So far through the month of May already 1,591 have been admitted. The Specialty Clinic has already had 3,220 patients through May compared to 3,645 for all of 2017.

In 2017 there were 1,151 endoscopies and surgeries. This year through the fifth month, there have been 1,116.

Lab and radiology are on an even faster pace. In 2017 there were a total of 21,395 patients. Through May of this year already 20,127 patients have come through.

But the department of the hospital with the most dramatic increase is the Urgent Care Clinic next door to CashSaver.

In all of 2017 they treated 13,745 patients.

Through May of this year they have already treated 12,841.

PMH’s future for growth and expansion depends on the extension of the sales tax, just like almost every other small town hospital.

the prospect of bringing all my experiences, both personally and professionally, to this important community position. My goal is to keep the momentum of the county, the communities within McClain County and the people moving in a positive direction.

2. What one part of county government would receive more attention if you were elected?

Spray – While all parts of the county’s government are very important, the improvement in safety and quality of the county’s roads and bridges would receive more attention. My goal is to make transportation easier for travel, work and school.

Murray – There is no one part to receive more attention. The areas that take precedence will be prioritized according to the circumstances at hand. I will give my full attention to all areas of county government and devote more time and energy to certain areas in relation to the needs of the community and urgency at which those needs must be met.

Sheehy – While it’s common knowledge that the roads, bridges and infrastructures in McClain County require an immense amount of attention, I believe that public safety deserves more attention. As the communities in McClain County grow, the need for increased funding for public safety grows as well. There are volunteer fire departments, law enforcement agencies and emergency management programs that require more resources.

Davis – I certainly do not believe any aspect of the different departments that fall under the commissioner’s duties can or should be overlooked. All agencies and officials that fall under the umbrella of county

government are important. It might sound cliché, but all our communities and departments, as well as our local businesses and citizens, depend on the county’s infrastructure daily. Roads and bridges have to be at the top of the list with the increasing population growth of McClain County. The need to prepare our communities for new business opportunities is essential. We must provide safe roads and bridges for the citizens we represent. These services not only benefit our citizens, but the communities within the county, the police, fire and sheriff’s departments, along with the utility providers we depend on and partner with.

3. What is the biggest challenge facing McClain County right now, from a commissioner standpoint, and how would you solve it?

Spray – With the never ending budget cuts within our state and counties, I feel that getting more funding for the county through grants and other resources would create more opportunities to provide services to McClain County and its citizens.

Murray – I believe the secondary road systems are in poor condition. We need to have more focus on maintaining roads and structures we already have to prevent deterioration, therefore freeing more resources for new projects and development. To achieve this I would like to increase personnel for our road maintenance. Manpower and hours are important to get more jobs done. Efficiency must be mandatory to ensure that funding and resources are not wasted. By having a solid crew and intentional planning the county will see improvement and successful development.

Sheehy – While I’m grateful

and see the many benefits of having a booming oil field that is active in our county, I do feel that it brings some challenges that can be addressed. Because of the size and quantity of the trucks that use the back roads of our county, they do experience more wear, tear, and overall deterioration than they normally would with normal traffic. I would like to take a closer look at the compensation provided to the county from the oil companies and make sure that this money is being allocated for these specific roads.

Davis – A top five list might be more fitting. However, the current activity with the oil and gas industry does jump out at me. All three districts are experiencing an increase in activity and work load. With this brings an abundance of traffic and services we must provide and deal with on a daily basis. It brings additional stress on our roads and bridges that need oversight. It also brings opportunities for us all and I feel forming relationships with these companies is the best way of maintaining a positive outcome. Solid financial decisions and a focus on McClain County must always come first.

4. What do you see as the biggest opportunities for McClain County?

Spray – Since McClain County is fast growing in population, I think there is a big opportunity for the county to positively facilitate growth and improvement of business and industry, local schools and public services and at the same time provide opportunities for county citizens to improve their livelihoods as well.

Murray – We have the opportunity to ensure safety and security to our citizens. We enjoy living simple small town

We have I-35 and I-44 which provide convenient travel and encourage economic development for us all. Our proximity to the metro is perfect for continued growth and prosperity. We have outstanding local schools and easy access to Mid-America Technology Center. McClain County has great partnerships with local business groups and chambers of commerce. It also offers opportunity for diverse groups of industries, including

farm, agribusiness, equine and retail trade. Our biggest opportunity is to take advantage of our economic opportunities and still rely on our local, rural, small town values.

5. If new resources were available, what one area of the county services would you feel most needs additional resources?

Spray – If new resources were available, I feel that with the extra resources we would be able to make the county’s roads and bridges safer, increase maintenance to our county’s roads, improve the overcrowded jail problem, provide better support to our law enforcement and provide funds to improve other county services.

Murray – First, I think that there are new resources that can be utilized. It will be my goal as commissioner to allocate these resources and apply them. It is my objective to minimize the tax burden for our citizens. As I earlier stated, I feel that there needs to be improvement in maintenance, increases in man power and efficiency, and a collaborative focus for support in our safety and quality of life. I would like to see an emergency fund and deployment plan maintained to combat against Oklahoma’s erratic weather. My purpose as commissioner will be to serve the citizens. One particular area where I would like to see improvement is communication. I would like to make myself accessible to the citizens and make their opinions heard. I would like to see more voting and polling on the needs and wishes for the residents of the county.

Sheehy – If new resources were available to our county, I would, again, devote those resources to our roads and bridges as well as public safety. Ultimately, the roads are a huge part of the daily lives of the residents of McClain County. The roads lead to our jobs, our resources and ultimately our homes and it’s my hope that I can improve them during my time in office.

Davis – Our responsibilities are vast, but in regards to county business nothing surpasses our demand for personal safety and security. Should new resources become available, I would put a priority on our sheriff’s department and county jail. The system and our jail infrastructure are stressed each month due to overcrowding. This is an issue statewide due to incarceration rates. Our task is to maintain and secure the inmates and that task requires funds and facilities. The population of the county also puts additional stress loads on our deputies and their ability to execute their duties while protecting and serving our citizens. Each week we recognize a Veteran of the Week who served in World War II or the Korean War. We are proud to name Clarence Beasley who served honorably during World War II. He was introduced to our visitors and volunteers and presented a military cap representing his wartime service. Mr. Beasley served in the United States Air Force. He makes his home in Del City.

I received a text from one of our veterans. He wrote to tell us that our volunteers are truly a godsend and that he was grateful for all of us.

The kind words made me think about how all of us are called by a higher authority to help others. We do this each day because it is right.

Some of those we help receive VA benefits are scarred both physically and mentally by the things that happened to them in the military. We believe our organization is one of the most veteran-friendly and our volunteers are helping 300 or more each week. We prepare all the paperwork needed to apply for the VA benefits. Most of those we assist are going to be approved for VA medical care, compensation or pension.

One of the things I often hear from veterans is that nothing happened to me in the military that would qualify me to receive VA benefits. My answer to that is always the same, let VA make that decision. The most common disability veterans have is hearing loss and tinnitus due to exposure to different types of acoustic trauma in the military. My suggestion is to stop by for a visit any Tuesday or Thursday morning to learn more about possible VA benefits.

Some of the secondary conditions that hearing loss and tinnitus may cause are depression, heart disease, dementia and others. The most common secondary condition to service-connected disability veterans receive VA benefits for is depression. For those of you who think you may be suffering from depression related to your service-connected condition visit with us.

Another disability we see more of is Traumatic Brain Injury and other types of head trauma caused by improvised explosive devices. If you suffered any type of head injury or were knocked out during your service, please contact us.

Last week we were visited by 291 veterans and surviving spouses. Most of them were from Oklahoma with 10 percent visiting from other states. One of the questions we get asked many times is why our group can help veterans and spouses to receive benefits and others are not. The answer to that is that we are a local group of volunteers who know that veterans and their families have been neglected too long.

We believe every veteran who served this United States

deserves the VA benefits for which they are eligible. When we file a claim for a veteran or surviving spouse the evidence to support that request is will be included. This could be a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire completed by their medical provider or we submit other medical evidence. We believe this method is needed to support claims for benefits. The one thing I do know is that most of the claims we file for veterans are going to be approved. On any Tuesday or Thursday morning, folks begin lining up at 4 a.m. to receive assistance from our volunteers. We reach our maximum allowable limit of 150 veterans and spouses by 6:30 a.m. or so each day.

I believe our reputation and "can do" attitude is the reason so many veterans are making the trip to see us. We have a veteran from Texas who for the last several years drives veterans and surviving spouses from his hometown each week. For those of you who know Walter Whitfield express your appreciation to him for his service to other veterans and their families.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I'm able to review each veterans file in the VA Computer system. This gives us the opportunity to know exactly what rational or evidence the VA evaluators used to deny a veteran claim. We can review what QTC, LHI, the VA or other evaluators have said about the veteran's medical or mental condition. This ability has enabled us to help more veterans to be approved for VA benefits.

We received the following decisions last week: Sixteen veterans were approved for a 100 percent disability rating for their service-connected disabilities. This group will receive an annual combined amount of \$675,083 per year. Thirty-four veterans both male and female received disability ratings ranging from 10-90 percent for their service-connected conditions. They will

receive a combined annual amount of \$513,529 per year. One surviving spouse was approved for DIC and will receive a yearly amount of \$15,397. It gives all of us a great feeling to know that the people who visit us are going to receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

We are beginning to receive some of the BVA decisions on the veterans and surviving spouses we recently represented in Muskogee at video conference hearings before judges in Washington, DC. As of today, in all the matters a ruling has been made in favor of the claimant.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at the 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients as soon as we reach the quota for the day, and that time varies depending on the number of visitors and the number of available volunteers, which usually occurs around 8 a.m.



Illegal tobacco sales to minors threatens children's health

Oklahoma tobacco retailers are increasingly not complying with state law regarding underage tobacco sales. Last year, Oklahoma tobacco retailers posted an overall non-compliance rate of nearly 18 percent.

That's troubling for local prevention professionals who say that the rising underage tobacco sales rate means that some retailers are placing profit ahead of young lives. It also risks federal funding that supports vital Oklahoma health initiatives.

In July 1992, Congress enacted the Alcohol, Drug Abuse,

and Mental Health Administration Reorganization Act (PL 102-321), which includes an amendment (section 1926) aimed at decreasing youth access to tobacco. This amendment, named for its sponsor, Congressman Mike Synar of Oklahoma, requires states to enact and enforce laws prohibiting the sale or distribution of tobacco products to individuals under the age of 18.

States are required to have a compliance rate of at least 80 percent (or a non-compliance rate of no more than 20 percent) regarding the sale of tobacco

products to minors, and must demonstrate compliance in order to receive their full Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) award.

"In 2012 the non-compliance rate was only 6.8 percent, the lowest ever recorded in Oklahoma, however that rate has steadily increased ever since," said Charlene Shreder, Director for the Southwest Prevention Center. "While the majority of retailers are complying with the law, there are some in our community choosing to ignore it and in turn risking the health of our

children. That is unacceptable."

Unannounced compliance checks occur annually in communities throughout Oklahoma. Shreder reminds local retailers that it is important to be aware of the law and ensure that all staff are trained to prevent underage tobacco sales.

Community-based education is available to business owners and clerks regarding youth access to tobacco. This service is free.

Good week to all: Welcome to the "front porch."

On our last day in Huntington Beach, California this week, I went for our usual, long, early morning walk on the beach, listening to the roaring of the waves and hoping, I suppose, to glean some lesson that might rise out of them as they spit and spew to the shore.

Ocean walks, as you know, are good both for the body and for the soul. On that final walk that morning, I looked out over the white, foamy waves gliding onto the shore as they always do, thinking of a story that we might churn around in our minds during the week to help inspire us in our everyday walk with the Lord.

A little story involving the ocean and a young man with a great desire came to mind immediately.

The young man goes to his teacher one day with a strange request:

"Sir," he said as soon as the teacher looked up from his desk, "I want knowledge."

"Do you really want knowledge?" the teacher asks with a smile with doubt written all it. "Oh, yes sir, I want knowledge. I want it more than anything."

The teacher considers the young man's request for a

moment, then seems to decide abruptly that the young man is ready to learn how he can get the knowledge for which he is seeking.

"I think I can help you, young man," the teacher says, "but what I need you to do for me is to meet down on at the ocean at daybreak in the morning."

The request perplexes the boy; but he obeys, because he has faith that if anyone can give him knowledge his teacher can. Early the next morning the young man makes his way to the beach well ahead of the sun. While he is still a long way from the shore he can see his teacher's tall silhouette at the water's edge looking out over the incoming tide.

As soon as the young boy gets to him, the teacher says, "Come with me."

He leads the puzzled young man out into the water against the incoming waves until he is waist high in the salty ocean.

He stops, without warning, takes the boy by the back of the neck, and dunks him in the ocean for fifteen seconds.

He pulls the boy up - just for a moment so he can get a little air - then dunks him again the second time, then the third, each time a little longer than the one before. When the boy comes up out of that water

after that third dunking, he is sputtering and gasping for air, and he cries out, "Sir, I need air! I need air!"

The teacher waits until the boy catches part of his breath, smiles a wry smile, then says to him in a voice as calm as the early-morning's waves:

"Son, you said you wanted knowledge, but knowledge doesn't come to the man who merely wants it. When you really want knowledge, you come and see me again. I mean, when you want knowledge the way you wanted air just now, that will be the time."

The teacher turns and walks back to the shore, leaving the young man standing in the middle of the churning waves, still trying to catch his breath.

I could not help but smile at the thought of that story as I turned to leave the ocean that morning for the last time of our latest ocean-side trip. But I knew we weren't leaving the ocean for good. I am sure some of you will want to meet us down at the beach early one morning soon.

Or, if not at the ocean, perhaps you will meet us at the Lord's house any Lord's Day morning at 10:30 a.m. That will do.

"Ikbi" in both the Chickasaw and Choctaw languages means "to create."


