Weather woes

Rain delays two area events

The weather definitely didn't play nice last week—especially on Saturday.

First came word that a wet week with more rain in the forecast squelched plans for a cemetery mapping project.

Organizers rescheduled Tombstones and Technology for October 26-28, said Dr. Lauren Cleeland, principal investigator and staff archaeologist at Open Range Archaeology LLC.

ORA had selected Hopping Cemetery near Wayne for the project which will include cleaning markers, making rubbings of headstones too weathered to read and using ground-penetrating radar to locate missing or unmarked graves.

Volunteers are welcome to assist the ORA staff on the project, which is in conjunction with Oklahoma Archaeology Month.

Meanwhile back in Purcell, the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce

announced the Loose Caboose Fall Fest was put off until November 3.

This is the first year for the chamber to sponsor the popular downtown festival.

It's also the first year the event hasn't been on the Saturday of Labor Day weekend.

In addition to vendors selling everything from food and fashion to antiques and goat milk products, Loose Caboose 2018 will feature two unique competitions.

The first, loosely modeled on pine-wood derbies, is sponsored by Ace Hardware and is open to kids ages 3 to 12 years.

The second major competition will be the Flip Your Find auction sponsored by Patriot Ford.

All that remains now for both events is a little cooperation from Mother Nature. Surely that's not too much to ask.

Arson case

Bench warrant issued for woman

An Oklahoma City woman is charged in McClain County District Court with fourth degree arson after she allegedly set fire to her belongings against the back wall of Rubys Inn.

A bench warrant for Angela J. Gaytan, 42, was issued October 12 after she failed to show up for her initial court appearance.

Bond was set at \$4,000.

The charge was filed after former felony convictions.

According to an affidavit, Gaytan was reported as a suspicious person in front of Hollywood Nails at 1907 S. Green Ave., shortly after 8 a.m. on the morning of October 4.

Glasgow trial set

Ex-cop could face life sentence

A former Purcell police officer was back in McClain County District Court on October 11 for a formal arraignment on six counts of child abuse by injury.

According to court records, Richard Kyle Glasgow was mute at the arraignment and a plea of not guilty was entered for him.

Each count carries a maximum life sentence and a fine ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

The case will be on the August 12, 2019 jury docket.

McClain County prosecutors first charged Glasgow with two counts of child abuse by injury in November 2017.

However, after hearing testimony in his preliminary hearing on June 19, Special District Judge Trisha Misak added four more counts and bound him over for trial.

The alleged abuses occurred between 2014 and 2016 and were directed at Glasgow's son and daughter, now 11 and 8, respectively. They would have been 8 and 4 when the incidents began.

According to the charges, at different times the boy was held aloft against the wall by his neck and kicked, had his head shoved into the side of a car, struck in the back, kicked

Rape charges

Man's bond raised to \$200,000

The bond has now doubled for a Blanchard man being held in the McClain County Detention Center.

Brandon L. Sill, 35, was jailed in September on a \$100,000 bond on felony charges of providing false/misleading registration

information and sex offender residing with a minor child.

On Friday, prosecutors added two new charges of first-degree rape. Sill's bond was set at an additional \$100,000 on those charges and a preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. October 31.

All of the charges were filed after a former felony conviction.

According to an affidavit, the McClain County Sheriff's Department was contacted September 6 to investigate a sexual

One for the History Books

Discovering a sense of place is one of the joys of travel. It can be found in landscapes, architecture and even weather, but the best place to look for sense of place is in a region's history.

A geographic region of Oklahoma where history is within the reach of the most casual traveler is the old Cherokee Outlet, located roughly from the Arkansas River in the east to the Oklahoma Panhandle in the west.

September 16, 2018, will mark the 125th anniversary of the land run into the Cherokee Outlet when more than 100,000 pioneers raced for a piece of the promised land. Although the legacy of the run permeates everything else, the stories that define the region cut across the topics of military history, farms, ranches and oil and gas.

Located in the far western part of the Cherokee Outlet is Fort Supply, established in November 1868 as Camp Supply, one of several military advance posts and a supply point for winter military campaigns on the western frontier.

Shortly after its founding, Lt. Col. George Armstrong

Custer and his troops of the 7th Cavalry rode south from Camp Supply toward the Washita River in present-day Roger Mills County. At dawn on November 27, the soldiers attacked the village of Cheyenne Peace Chief Black Kettle, killing some 60 Cheyennes and taking 53 women and children as captives.

Washita Battlefield National Historic Site, a National Park Service branch located near Cheyenne, is commemorating the 150th anniversary of this turning point in the history of the American West with a number of programs throughout 2018.

By 1879 Camp Supply had become Fort Supply. Soldiers stationed at the fort escorted cattle drives up the Western Trail and policed the Cherokee Outlet grazing lands and the Cheyenne and Arapaho Reservation. The final major assignment for the soldiers at Fort Supply was overseeing the Cherokee Outlet Land Run. Shortly after, in late 1894, the fort was abandoned.

Visitors to Fort Supply today can see five original buildings and a replica of the stockade.

"When you walk across the grounds at historic Fort Supply, you can actually feel the history that lives there," said Deena Fisher, vice president of the Oklahoma Historical Society Board of Directors and board member of the Friends of Historic Fort Supply. "Historic Fort Supply is where preservation and education come together at the actual site where the history took place."

When the Cherokee Outlet opened to non-Indians, settlers came from across the country to make the run. One of those pioneers was Marshal McCully. He had moved from Missouri to Kansas to the Pacific Northwest, but was drawn to the Cherokee Outlet because of the appeal of the land offered through the Homestead Act.

McCully, like the others who participated in the Cherokee Outlet Land Run, wanted the opportunity to own his own land and establish a home. His starting point for the run was between Wellington and Caldwell, Kansas. With his limited supplies of a two-wheeled

"It has archery, art, basketball, bicycling, BMX bikes, creative writing, dance, marine biology, horseback riding, lake sports, soccer, swimming, tennis, volleyball and there is lots of wilderness. It is not in Yosemite. It is in Wilson,

"Now before we start jumping to any conclusions, the camp costs \$1,475 per week. So we are going to make money and send notes to each other like this at the end of each week telling how much money was earned and once our money totals up to \$7,375, tell your mom our plan and she will email my mom to say the approval.

"This is how we will get there. My aunt has a RV. She will drive, pick me my, then we will drive to Illinois to pick you

then we drive to camp. My aunt will drop us off and leave, then she will come back and pick us up at the end of camp."

Easy-peasy.

The aunt mentioned lives in northeast Ohio. And the near-transcontinental route Mia proposed in her letter is roughly 2,604 miles. One way.

I have no idea what an 8-year-old intended to do to earn \$7,375 or why she thought it necessary to raise the full 5-week tuition. I guess with all those activities, just one or two weeks wouldn't do.

I suppose it doesn't matter. The letter and "plan" did what was needed by keeping two little girls best friends as they adjusted to lives apart.

Children grow up soon enough and I'm not sure Mia even remembers the time she dreamed about Camp Sky Lake Yosemite and hatched her plan to get there.

But I keep her letter on the wall near my monitor to remind me you're never too young—or too old—for dreams and planning a great adventure.

Ensuring lasting benefits from tax reform

Since the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act was passed by Congress and signed into law by the president, the country has undoubtedly been better off as a result. Wages are steadily on the rise, unemployment has reached its lowest level in nearly 50 years, jobs are being created and the economy is booming.

Trump's plan misguided

President Trump's latest move in revamping America's energy policy is generating sharp criticism from his most ardent, energy-savvy supporters. Trump's decision to allow year-round sales of gasoline with higher blends of ethanol ignores the environmental, economic and mechanical hazards long associated with the grain-based fuel.

As we see it, the decision is a shining example of how those who don't learn from the mistakes of the past are doomed to repeat it.

Study after study shows the production of ethanol burns significantly more energy than it produces as a fuel. What's more, year-round sales of E-15, a blend of 15 percent ethanol and 85 percent gasoline, will wreak havoc for boats, motorcycles, lawn equipment and ATVs, clogging fuel lines, eroding gas tanks and causing thousands of dollars in repairs for consumers. Moreover, the vast majority of cars on the road today aren't designed to withstand the corrosive nature of ethanol.

"This new anti-consumer ethanol policy is another symptom of a broken Renewable Fuel Standard," said Mike Sommers, president and chief executive officer of the American Petroleum Institute. "This decision could potentially destroy future opportunities for consensus bipartisan reform."

Proponents of ethanol say increasing its use will lower gasoline prices, reduce oil imports and cut air pollution. Ethanol's critics contend just the opposite, arguing it will raise pump prices by displacing supplies of conventional gasoline and E-10 and increase greenhouse gas emissions because the amount of energy required to make ethanol exceeds the amount of energy it produces as a fuel. Thanks to improvements in drilling and production practices, America's reliance on foreign oil is not as problematic as it was in 2005, when President Bush signed the Energy Policy Act, which doubled the use of ethanol in gasoline.

The federal ethanol subsidy was allowed to expire in 2011, but the federal Renewable Fuel Standard, created by the Energy Policy Act, remains in place, giving corn farmers and ethanol producers a mandated market for their product.

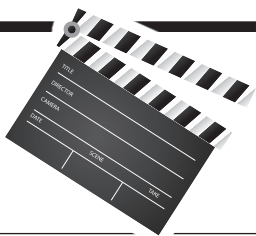
Trump's new mandate will no doubt be a boon to the incomes of corn farmers, creating more demand and higher prices for corn, the primary feedstock for ethanol production. But we think consumers and the environment would best be served by allowing the free market to determine prices for corn and transportation fuel.

It looks like I had myself yet another five movie weekend this week. And what a variety.

We have a biopic about the first man to walk on the moon, a film based on the real life story of a famous female French author, a star studded mystery set in an old motel well past its prime, a western starring John C. Reilly, and a movie based on the popular children's horror books by R.L. Stine.

Let's get to the reviews.



First up is "First Man." This film is a look at the life of the astronaut, Neil Armstrong (Ryan Gosling), and the legendary space mission that led him to become the first man to walk on the Moon on July 20, 1969.

It always seems like one studio or another is releasing a movie with a focus on space around this time of year.

It all started with "Gravity" back in October of 2013, a frantic film about a woman (Sandra Bullock) trapped in Earth's orbit fighting to survive.

Ever since that movie became a box office smash hit, fall has become the season of heady, highbrow science films.

2014 had Christopher Nolan's odyssey through the cosmos with "Interstellar," 2015 received an adaptation of a popular science fiction novel about a man trapped on Mars with "The Martian," 2016 brought an extremely thoughtful exploration into extraterrestrial communication with "Arrival," and 2017 saw the sequel to one of the most influential sci-fi films of all time with "Blade Runner 2049."

Now here we are in 2018 and this time it's Damien Chazelle's turn.

Best known for writing/directing critical darlings "Whiplash" and "La La Land," Chazelle is clearly a very talented filmmaker and it definitely shows in this latest film of his.

From the first scene, this movie puts you right in the cockpit with Neil Armstrong. The film doesn't let you just be a simple observer, you're in the thick of things whether you like it or not.

Most of the camera work in this film is very close up, giving an extremely claustrophobic feel. It's like they actually throw you in the rocket itself. You get to hear every creak of the metal and feel the force of being strapped to the tip of what is essentially a giant controlled explosion.

Frankly, it's terrifying.

It really shows the magnitude of what these men went through all for the benefit of mankind.

At a moment's notice, anything could go wrong. With the stakes so high it didn't take much. Just one mistake, one little miscalculation often ended with the loss of life.

But this isn't a movie solely focused on the Apollo 11 mission.

Like I said in the synopsis at the start of the review, this is a movie about the first man to set foot on the moon.

And unfortunately for this movie, Neil Armstrong the man makes for a pretty unengaging main character.

By the accounts I've read, Neil was a very shy and modest man who did his best to avoid the spotlight whenever he could.

With that kind of person to draw inspiration from, I thought Ryan Gosling portrayed Neil quite well. Unfortunately, from an emotional standpoint, it made for a character that I

found extremely hard to connect with.

He just wasn't all that charismatic of a person. A great man? Sure. Courageous? Without question. But personable? Not so much.

For someone like me who only really becomes invested in stories showcasing compelling characters, it made for a hard movie to truly become invested in.

Luckily Neil's wife Janet, played by Claire Foy, is a bit more relatable than her husband.

Being faced with the very real possibility of losing her husband took a massive toll on Janet, especially after seeing her friends lose their own loved ones. I couldn't imagine living with the kind of stress she did.

Beyond the Armstrongs, none of the other characters in the film are given much depth.

Buzz Aldrin (Corey Stoll) is there, but this movie just makes him seem like an unlikeable jerk who says whatever's on his mind without thinking of anyone else.

Whether that was accurate to real life I'm not sure, but they certainly don't paint the second man to ever set foot on the moon in a good light in this film.

But this doesn't seem like a movie that cares to sugarcoat history, and I can appreciate that, along with what seems like a massive attention to detail on the film's part.

Also, this is far from an inspiration feel-good movie. Don't go into this film expecting to leave swelling with patriotic pride and full of wonder at the beauty of space.

The only emotion I felt at the end of this movie was relief. Not because it's a bad film, but because it was so up close and intense. It was only after the credits started to roll that I felt like I could finally stop holding my breath.

All in all, this is a very well made film. Not my favorite of Damien Chazelle's work certainly, and definitely not an easy film to recommend to casual moviegoers, but it's quality work all the same.

If you've ever wanted to know the feeling of being blasted off into space, but like myself don't have the skills or fortitude to join NASA, this is definitely a film to check out. "First Man" is rated PG-13.



Next is "Colette."

After marrying a successful writer known as "Willy" (Dominic West), Sidonie-Gabrielle Colette (Keira Knightley) is transplanted from her childhood home in rural France to the intellectual and artistic splendor of Paris.

Soon after, Willy convinces Colette to ghostwrite for him. She pens a semi-autobiographical novel about a witty and brazen country girl named Claudine, sparking a bestseller and a cultural sensation.

I knew absolutely nothing about this film going into it. In fact I didn't even realize this was based on a true story until the movie was over.

I can't say I've read much classic French literature, heck I can't even say I've read too many American classics.

Regardless, I found the story of Colette to be an interesting one. And it's one I probably would have never heard of if it weren't for this film.

The movie pretty much only focuses on Colette's early years, with a spotlight not only on developing her writing ability, but also her relationship

with her serial philanderer of a husband, not to mention Colette discovering her blossoming sexuality.

The story is pretty straightforward with no-frills attached. No gimmicks whatsoever, but I still found the film compelling throughout.

I enjoyed the performances here as well.

Despite being a complete scumbag in the movie, Dominic West still manages to make the character of Willy charismatic and even charming.

It's a tough balancing act to portray someone who made a career out of taking advantage of others' talent and hard work, but I think West did well here. Unfortunately it's all too easy to see how someone like Colette could fall for Willy despite how exploitative he was.

And Keira Knightley, while perfectly adequate here, isn't doing anything outside her wheelhouse with her depiction of Colette. Honestly it reminded me a lot of her role in "Pirates of the Caribbean." Nothing new, but it worked just fine and Colette made for an interesting enough character.

Overall I enjoyed this movie pretty well.

No single element is going to blow your socks off, but if you're like how I was before this weekend and know absolutely nothing about Colette, a woman who was well ahead of her time in my opinion, this film would make for a great jumping off point.

Third is "Bad Times at the El Royale."

Seven strangers, each with a secret to bury (Jeff Bridges, Cynthia Erivo, Jon Hamm, Lewis Pullman, Dakota Johnson, Cailee Spaeny, and Chris Hemsworth), meet at Lake Tahoe's El Royale, a rundown hotel with a dark past.

Over the course of one fateful night, everyone will have a last shot at redemption before everything goes awry.

Now this is a movie I've been looking forward to for awhile.

It seems to have everything going for it. A talented star-studded cast, an interesting location, and it's written and directed by the same man who directed "The Cabin in the Woods," which was one of my favorite films of 2012.

Sadly, I didn't think this movie nearly lived up to its potential.

On the positive side of things though, the acting in this film is great all around.

It seems like Jeff Bridges almost never gives a bad performance, and this movie is no exception. I especially liked his interactions with Cynthia Erivo's character. In fact, dynamic between the two of them is probably my favorite aspect of the film.

Also, as a side note, Cynthia has an absolutely beautiful voice and hearing her sing in this movie was simply a treat. She broke into song often and I loved every second of it.

But unfortunately, while the performances were solid all around, what really held this movie back was the dialogue and storytelling.

This film wanted so much to be a Tarantino flick akin to "The Hateful Eight" or "Pulp Fiction," and while this movie does have some of the brutal violence Tarantino is known for, it lacks the snappy writing or compelling characters that Tarantino is truly celebrated for.

Sure, all of the characters have some kind of secret they're

hiding and it's interesting to see what that secret is, but I never felt like the story did anything all that compelling with our character's hidden truths.

With this cast, the potential for greatness was definitely there, but the execution just wasn't good enough.

I think what disappointed me the most was probably Chris Hemsworth's character.

I absolutely adore Hemsworth in other movies, especially since filmmakers have started to discover his surprisingly great comedic ability, but his skill was just wasted here.

He was just the monkey wrench to throw into the mix during the last third of the film. There was zero depth to his character. He was just a crazy man. Sure, he's still fun to watch, but he was way underutilized here.

And while the setting of a motel located square on the California-Nevada border is cool in theory, beyond a few early scenes they don't really do much with that either, and the whole thing amounts to nothing more than a gimmick for the trailers.

All in all, I wouldn't call this a bad movie. The performances are too good for that. The story and dialogue just weren't up to par, and because of that the movie definitely drags at times.

An ambitious film to be sure, but not well executed enough to live up to its potential.

Fourth is "The Sisters Brothers."

Set in the 1850s, this film follows brothers Eli (John C. Reilly) and Charlie (Joaquin Phoenix), two hitmen on the trail of a chemist (Riz Ahmed) with a unique secret formula desired by their employer.

This was not at all the movie I was expecting it'd be.

When I saw the film was starring John C. Reilly I automatically assumed this would be a comedy. And indeed that's exactly how the movie is billed, but if you're going in this expecting a laugh-a-minute gag fest, this film will leave you sorely disappointed.

If there's any comedy at all, it's from the film's often morbid and overly gruesome situations. The movie got some laughs out of me here and there just for how shocking and ridiculous it all was, but it's definitely not a traditional comedy by any means.

Honestly, I not quite sure what to make of the whole thing.

It felt like I was thrown right in the middle of the story when this movie started. The first hour or so seemed extremely unfocused and it took me a while to piece the narrative together because of it.

I'm still not all that clear on

what Jake Gyllenhaal's character was originally trying to accomplish.

Apparently he was a detective assigned to bring the chemist to our assassin brothers.

But why hire out a detective when you have a pair of hitmen who are known for tracking people down though? Or if you have the detective, why not just use him to bring the chemist in?

Maybe I missed something, but I don't see the point for the redundancy beyond to serve the plot later on in the film. I like Gyllenhaal, don't get me wrong, but his presence didn't seem very well justified in my opinion.

The brothers don't really do all that much in the first half of the film either beyond get sick. One from a spider bite and the other from an overabundance of booze.

Thankfully the second half was much more straightforward. I still wasn't quite sure what the story was building to, but at least there was some plot progression.

Turned out it wasn't building to all that much considering how anti-climatic the final few scenes were, but I'd be lying if I said I didn't at least enjoy aspects of this film.

The brothers were fun to watch interact together, despite, or maybe because, all their squabbling. Plus Reilly's and Phoenix's performances were both quite good in this movie. You'll hear no complains about the acting from me.

I'm just not sure what to make of the plot. It's definitely a movie more about the journey than the destination. I don't know if the journey is compelling enough to justify sitting through this entire film though.

I have no idea who I'd recommend this film to.

Definitely don't go see this if you're expecting a conventional comedy. Maybe if you enjoy dark comedies, but even then don't count on too many laughs.

Last this week is "Goosebumps 2: Haunted Halloween."

Based on the popular children's horror book series by R.L. Stine, this spinoff of the 2015 film sees the return of Slappy (Mick Wingert), a living ventriloquist dummy, as he seeks to wreak havoc on a small New York town by bringing Halloween to life.

My goodness this movie is such a disappointment. I wasn't expecting much based on the trailers for this new one, but this sequel managed to fall even below those low expectations.

The special effects for the monsters is shockingly bad here. I mean the previous films wasn't exactly a masterpiece as far as CGI (computer-generated imagery) goes, but it was at least competent enough to be believable.

It's strange, because it looks like they used the same character models on the returning monsters, they just made them look worse.

- 10 oz. can red enchilada sauce
- 14.5 oz. can petite diced tomatoes with green chilis
- 15 oz. can chili beans in mild chili sauce
- 15 oz. can black beans drained and rinsed
- 15 oz. corn drained
- 1 and 1/2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breasts ~2-3 large breasts
- 2 cups chicken stock or chicken broth

“Dark Money” spending hits record in Oklahoma, with surge to come

Political spending by secretive groups that are allowed to hide their donors have already spent what is likely a record amount this year to influence Oklahoma political races.

An Oklahoma Watch review of campaign finance records found so-called “dark money” groups had spent nearly \$2.7 million on Oklahoma’s legislative, statewide and congressional races by the end of August.

That is more than such groups spent on the entire 2015-16 election cycle, totaling \$1.4 million, and the 2013-14 cycle, totaling \$1.9 million. This year’s total through August is expected to climb as the campaign heats up in the final stretch before the Nov. 6 general election.

The outside spending comes from either nonprofit organizations that aren’t required to disclose their donors or political action committees that accept money from named groups whose sources of funding aren’t disclosed.

In both cases, these groups can raise unlimited amounts of money to support or oppose candidates as long as the spending is made without coordinating with the candidate. The money is often spent on advertising or mailers.

This type of political spending arose after the U.S. Supreme Court’s Citizens United ruling in early 2010, which

held that the First Amendment prohibited governments from restricting independent expenditures by companies, nonprofits and labor unions to support or oppose candidates. The amount of that spending

political spending by independent groups is allowed by the First Amendment rights to free speech. A 2015 report by the institute said disclosure mandates in some states “have diluted political dialogue, invited harassment and retaliation against speakers, and chilled speech and association.”

Advocates of more disclosure say the type and amounts of secretive spending are a “threat” to democracy.

Daniel Newman, president of MapLight, a California-based nonprofit that seeks to reveal the influence of money in politics, said this type of spending is alarming because it allows outside forces to sway the electorate by spreading potentially misleading messages without accountability.

“It’s a concern because it’s



rose sharply in national races in 2012 but didn’t see big gains in state races until 2014.

Some organizations, such as the Arizona-based Goldwater Institute, say anonymous po-

History:

cart, one horse, a shotgun, some bedding, clothing and food, he staked his claim southeast of present-day Aline.

In August of 1894 McCully built a two-room sod house from clay sod held together with buffalo grass. After a year he put in wood floors and plastered the interior walls with alkali clay. Most sod houses only lasted six to eight years, but the McCully family lived in their house for 15 years. The sod house is still standing and on view at the Sod House Museum near Aline.

“Marshal was a true pioneer—he broke the virgin soil, developed the land, drove a horse and buggy, then experienced the automobile, trains and airplanes, and even got to see astronauts go into space,” said Renee Trindle, director of the Sod House Museum. “It amazes me how soddies used to cover the plains, yet Marshal built his with quality and it still stands today as a true jewel of Oklahoma history.”

For a full overview of life in the Cherokee Outlet, plan a visit to the Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center in Enid. From September 4 through November 17, the museum will host an exhibit entitled “The 1893 Land Race: A Legacy of Community.” The exhibit will focus on early life and town-building efforts in the Cherokee Outlet just after the land run, from building houses to developing businesses.

“The Heritage Center is excited to bring this exhibit to the northwest Oklahoma com-

munity. We are always pleased to show off artifacts that are not often displayed, particularly those that give a sense of scale, authenticity and perspective to what life was like just after an event that touched as many people as the 1893 Land Run,” said Aaron Preston, archivist at the Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center.

The Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center’s exhibits tell the stories of everyday life in the Cherokee Outlet. Its oil and gas gallery features displays on energy pioneers such as E. W. Marland, Lew Ward and Harry Sinclair. Much like the pioneers who took a risk in attempting to homestead on top of the land, these oilmen took risks in drilling under the ground.

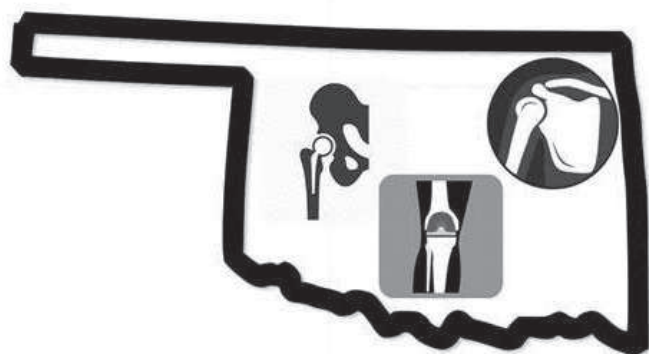
The Humphrey Heritage Village at the Heritage Center

includes the last remaining Land Office in the state, the J. W. Glidewell House, Turkey Creek School, and the Village Church. These buildings are utilized daily for children’s and adult programming to describe life in the early days of Enid and the surrounding towns.

“The legacy of those early pioneers lives on today in the many families and businesses that still populate the area. It is remarkable that those early families came with a simple dream and here we are, 125 years later, and those dreams are still holding strong,” said Robbin Davis, director of the Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center.

STATE QUESTION 793

Allow Optometrists & Opticians to Operate in Retail Stores

INITIATIVE PETITION 415
STATE QUESTION 793

This measure adds a new Section 3 to Article 20 of the Oklahoma Constitution. Under the new Section, no law shall infringe on optometrists' or opticians' ability to practice within a retail mercantile establishment, discriminate against optometrists or opticians based on the location of their practice, or require external entrances for optometric offices within retail mercantile establishments. No law shall infringe on retail mercantile establishments' ability to sell prescription optical goods and services. The Section allows the Legislature to restrict optometrists from performing surgeries within retail mercantile establishments, limit the number of locations at which an optometrist may practice, maintain optometric licensing requirements, require optometric offices to be in a separate room of a retail mercantile establishment, and impose health and safety standards. It does not prohibit optometrists and opticians from agreeing with retail mercantile establishments to limit their practice. Laws conflicting with this Section are void. The Section defines "laws," "optometrist," "optician," "optical goods and services," and "retail mercantile establishment."

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES
AGAINST THE PROPOSAL — NO

SUMMARY: This measure, which was placed on the ballot after a successful initiative petition and Supreme Court challenge, amends the state Constitution. It precludes the state from stopping an optometrist or optician's ability to practice within a retail establishment or discriminate against optometrists or opticians based on the location of their practice. External entrances for optometric offices within retail establishments would no longer be required. The Legislature could pass laws to restrict optometrists from performing surgeries within retail establishments, limit the number of locations at which an optometrist may practice and maintain optometric licensing requirements. It also requires optometric offices to be in a separate room of a retail establishment and imposes health and safety standards. Current law bans eye clinics from operating inside retail stores. **SUPPORTERS OF THE CHANGE SAY** it gives Oklahoma consumers more choices in eye care and the purchase of prescribed glasses and contact lenses. If passed, Oklahoma would join 47 other states that allow optometrists and opticians to work inside stores like Wal-Mart and Costco. **OPPONENTS SAY** it gives large retailers too much power and will eventually drive smaller, independent optometrists out of the market. That eliminates competition and could raise prices. Also, they say putting retail optometry in the Oklahoma Constitution limits the legislature's ability to make changes quickly if there are unintended consequences from the amendment.

STATE QUESTION 794

Marsy's Law Crime Victim Rights Amendment

LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 371
STATE QUESTION 794

This measure amends the provisions of the Oklahoma Constitution that guarantees certain rights for crime victims. These rights would now be protected in a manner equal to the defendant's rights. The measure would also make changes to victim's rights, including:

- (1) expanding the court proceedings at which a victim has the right to be heard;
- (2) adding a right to reasonable protection;
- (3) adding a right to proceedings free from unreasonable delay;
- (4) adding a right to talk with the prosecutor; and
- (5) allowing victims to refuse interview requests from the defendant's attorney without a subpoena.

The Oklahoma Constitution currently grants victims' rights to crime victims and their family members. This measure would instead grant these rights to crime victims and those directly harmed by the crime. Victims would no longer have a constitutional right to know the defendant's location following arrest, during prosecution, and while sentenced to confinement or probation, but would have the right to be notified of the defendant's release or escape from custody.

Under this measure, victims would have these rights in both adult and juvenile proceedings. Victims would be able to assert these rights in court, and the court would be required to act promptly.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES
AGAINST THE PROPOSAL — NO

SUMMARY: The amendment, known as Marsy's Law, requires state courts and prosecutors keep crime victims informed of proceedings on their case. It is often done informally or through victim assistance programs. It adds to several other crime victim rights added to the Constitution in 1996. Lawmakers voted to put the measure to a vote of the people. Six other states — California,

Five state questions will appear on the Nov. 6 general election ballot. Legislative Referendums are placed on the ballot by the Oklahoma Legislature. Initiative Petitions are placed on the ballot by gathering signatures from citizens. Each question is reprinted here as it will appear on the ballot followed by a brief summary.

Illinois, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana and Ohio — have similar measures although Montana's law was struck down by its Supreme Court. **SUPPORTERS OF THE CHANGE SAY** defendants should not have more rights than crime victims. Victims and their families should be heard in matters such as plea bargaining and sentencing, they argue. **OPPONENTS FEAR** overburdened courts and prosecutors will have to hire additional staff to keep up with cases. In addition, allowing victims and family members to testify at every stage of a court hearing could interfere with a defendant's right to a fair trial or parole hearing. The legal challenge in Montana involved including too many separate issues on a single ballot vote.

STATE QUESTION 798

Governor and Lieutenant Governor Joint Ticket

LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 372
STATE QUESTION 798

This measure will add a provision to the Oklahoma Constitution to change the manner in which the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are elected. Currently, voters cast one vote for their preferred candidate for Governor and a separate vote for their preferred candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

Under this measure, if approved, candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor for the same party will run together on a single ticket and voters will cast one vote for their preferred ticket.

The measure requires the Legislature to establish procedures for the joint nomination and election of candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. If passed, this new election format will be used beginning in the 2026 general election cycle.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES
AGAINST THE PROPOSAL — NO

SUMMARY: Lawmakers put this issue on the November ballot. Occasionally, the state's Governor and Lieutenant Governor belong to different political parties. That scenario could lead to officials working against each other. Oklahoma would not be alone in such an endeavor to prevent this scenario. The governor and lieutenant governor run on the same ticket in 26 states. Seventeen states have separate votes similar to Oklahoma. The other states do not have a lieutenant governor or the position is designated as a top legislator. If voters approve, it will be up to the legislature to come up with a procedure for the joint nomination and election of the candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Some states hold separate primaries and others require Governors to pick their running mates, much like a President picks a vice presidential running mate. **SUPPORTERS SAY** it gives the state's top leaders a unified vision and better coordination. Combining the two, they argue, would draw more media attention to the secondary office and better inform voters. **OPPONENTS FEAR** combining the ticket gives the Governor too much power. In addition, a governor forced out of office, they say, should be replaced by a lieutenant governor more independent of the outgoing administration.

STATE QUESTION 800

New Reserve Fund for Oil and Gas Revenue

LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 373
STATE QUESTION NO. 800

This measure would create a new fund called "The Oklahoma Vision Fund" in the Oklahoma Constitution. Money could be appropriated to the Fund. Beginning July 1, 2020, five percent (5%) of gross production taxes on both oil and gas would be deposited into the Fund. After that fiscal year, the percentage would increase by two-tenths percentage points each year. Other monies could be deposited into the Fund if provided by law. The State Treasurer would deposit four percent (4%) of the principal amount of the Fund into the State General Revenue Fund each year. The Fund would be subject to an investment standard known as the prudent investor rule. The Fund could be invested in stocks and similar securities. Not more than five percent (5%) of the monies in the Fund could be used for payment of debt obligations issued by the State of Oklahoma, state government entities or local government entities.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES
AGAINST THE PROPOSAL — NO

SUMMARY: The Oklahoma Vision Fund, put on the ballot by lawmakers, would set aside 5 percent of oil and gas gross production taxes into a trust fund beginning July 1, 2020. That percentage would increase each year by two tenths of a percent. Earnings from the fund's investments and other appropriations directed there by the leg-

islature would also remain part of the fund. Four percent of the average annual amount in the fund over the preceding five years would flow into the state's General Revenue Fund. Up to five percent of the fund's balance could be used to pay state debt or local government debt. If approved, the Oklahoma Vision Fund would be the state's third budget reserve fund, behind the Constitutional Reserve (Rainy Day) fund and the legislature-created Revenue Stabilization fund. No more than five percent of the fund could be used to pay off state or local government debts. **SUPPORTERS SAY** by creating such a trust fund, the state is preparing for anticipated declines in oil and gas production and helping to meet future budget needs. A well-invested fund will grow over time and create a revenue stream that future legislators can appropriate, they say. **OPPONENTS SAY** creating yet another trust fund diverts too much state tax money away from Oklahoma's current needs. They also argue the state should not be paying debt obligations that belong to local governments.

STATE QUESTION 801

Allow Building Fund Revenue for School Operations

LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 374
STATE QUESTION 801

This measure amends Section 10 of Article 10 of the Oklahoma Constitution. It expands the uses permitted for certain ad valorem taxes levied by a school district. Currently, tax revenue is placed in a building fund. The fund is changed to allow use for operations. The operations would be those deemed necessary by a school district.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES
AGAINST THE PROPOSAL — NO

SUMMARY: This question was placed on the ballot by lawmakers. Public school districts in Oklahoma are allowed to use five mills (\$5 for every \$1,000 of assessed value) of property tax dollars for building funds, which can include such expenses as repairs, maintenance, upkeep and construction on district property. State Question 801 removes that Constitutional restriction and gives individual school districts the authority to use more property tax dollars for day-to-day operations such as teacher salaries or additional employees. It would not increase revenue for schools since all Oklahoma school districts tax at the maximum 44 total mills allowed. **SUPPORTERS SAY** the change would create more district competition and give them greater spending flexibility. Districts with lower property values could raise teacher salaries to attract highly-qualified teachers. **OPPONENTS SAY** the proposal could lead to more disparity and inequity among rich and poor districts. They say it does not create any more tax revenue and is merely a way to shift more of the burden of teacher salaries from the state Legislature to local school boards.

GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 2018
BALLOT TITLES

In accordance with Oklahoma Statutes, Title 34, Section 17, notice is hereby given that the following proposed amendment to the Oklahoma Statutes will appear on the Ballot for the General Election to be held November 6, 2018. A "YES" vote is a vote in favor of a measure/proposal. A "NO" vote is a vote against a measure/proposal.

STATE QUESTION 793 **INITIATIVE PETITION 415**

This measure adds a new Section 3 to Article 20 of the Oklahoma Constitution. Under the new Section, no law shall infringe on optometrists' or opticians' ability to practice within a retail mercantile establishment, discriminate against optometrists or opticians based on the location of their practice, or require external entrances for optometric offices within retail mercantile establishments. No law shall infringe on retail mercantile establishments' ability to sell prescription optical goods and services. The Section allows the Legislature to restrict optometrists from performing surgeries within retail mercantile establishments, limit the number of locations at which an optometrist may practice, maintain optometric licensing requirements, require optometric offices to be in a separate room of retail mercantile establishment, and impose health and safety standards. It does not prohibit optometrists and opticians from agreeing with retail mercantile establishments to limit their practice. Laws conflicting with this Section are void. The Section defines "laws," "optometrist," "optician," "optical goods and services," and "retail mercantile establishment."

STATE QUESTION 794 **LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 371**

This measure amends the provision of the Oklahoma Constitution that guarantees certain rights for crime victims. These rights would now be protected in a manner equal to the defendant's rights. The measure would also make changes to victims' rights, including:

- expanding the court proceedings at which a victim has the right to be heard;
- adding a right to reasonable protection;
- adding a right to proceedings free from unreasonable delay;
- adding a right to talk with the prosecutor; and
- allowing victims to refuse interview requests from the defendant's attorney without a subpoena.

The Oklahoma Constitution currently grants victims' rights to crime victims and their family members. This measure would instead grant these rights to crime victims and those directly harmed by the crime. Victims would no longer have a constitutional right to know the defendant's location following arrest, during prosecution, and while sentenced to confinement or probation, but would have the right to be notified of the defendant's release or escape from custody.

Under this measure, victims would have these rights in both adult and juvenile proceedings. Victims would be able to assert these rights in court and the court would be required to act promptly.

STATE QUESTION NO. 798 **LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 372**

This measure will add a provision to the Oklahoma Constitution to change the manner in which the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are elected. Currently, voters cast one vote for their preferred candidate for Governor and a separate vote for their preferred candidate for Lieutenant Governor. Under this measure, if approved, candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor from the same party will run together on a single ticket and voters will cast one vote for their preferred ticket.

The measure requires the Legislature to establish procedures for the joint nomination and election of candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. If passed, this new election format will be used beginning in the 2026 general election cycle.

STATE QUESTION 800 **LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 373**

This measure would add a provision to the Oklahoma Constitution creating a new trust fund. This fund would consist of (i) legislative appropriations, (ii) deposits from other sources, and (iii) investment income. Beginning July 1, 2020, 5% of revenues from the gross production tax on oil and gas will be deposited into the fund as well. The percentage of gross production tax revenues deposited into the fund will then increase by 0.2% per year.

Monies in the fund will be invested by the State Treasurer. The fund is exempt from constitutional restrictions on the State owning stock. The State Treasurer is required to make prudent investment decisions and diversify the fund's investments to minimize risk.

After July 1, 2020, 4% of the fund's principal will be deposited each year into the State's General Revenue Fund. Principal will be calculated by using an average of the fund's annual principal for the five years before the deposit. No more than 5% of the Fund may be used to pay interest on bonds issued by the State or local governments. The fund will be called the Oklahoma Vision Fund.

STATE QUESTION 801 **LEGISLATIVE REFERENDUM 374**

This measure would provide a means for voters to allow school districts to expand the permissible uses of ad valorem tax revenues to include school operations.

The Oklahoma Constitution limits the rate of ad valorem taxation. However, it permits voters in a school district to approve an increase of up to five mills (\$5.00 per \$1,000.00 of the assessed value of taxable property) over this limit for the purpose of raising money for a school district building fund.

Currently, monies from this building fund may only be used to build, repair, or remodel school buildings and purchase furniture. This measure would amend the Constitution to permit voters to approve such a tax to be used for school operations deemed necessary by the school district, in addition to the purposes listed above.

Sales taxes yield mixed bag

The Oklahoma Tax Commission disbursed \$157,987,383 in sales tax collections to cities and towns in October.

That reflected an increase of \$10,480,690 from the \$147,506,693 distributed to

municipalities a year ago.

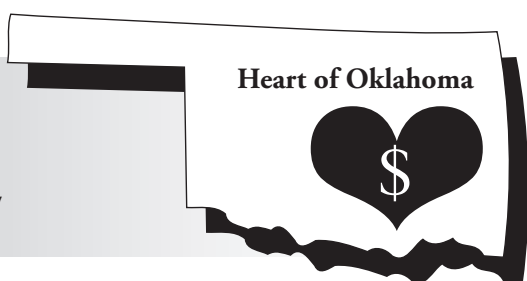
The use tax disbursement to cities and towns was \$19,039,198.

The returns are based on sales from August 16-31 and estimated sales from Septem-

ber 1-15.

In county returns, the commission returned \$29,927,380 in sales taxes and also disbursed \$3,951,894 in use tax taxes.

LIVE YOUR BEST LIFE

One for the History Books

Heritage tourism, whether it is in Virginia, California or Oklahoma, has to feature one of two attractions. It can be a place where something happened or it can be a place associated with a person.

In Oklahoma, there is no person more revered, more celebrated than Will Rogers, and we are fortunate to have two heritage tourism sites associated with his life and legacy.

One is located in Claremore, the Will Rogers Memorial Museum.

In 1911, planning to someday build their retirement home on the site, Will and Betty Rogers bought property on a high hill overlooking the town. After Will's death in 1935, Betty donated the land to the State of Oklahoma and the Oklahoma Legislature appropriated \$200,000 to build the memorial. After a successful national fund raising effort, it opened in 1938.

At first, the building was solely a place to remember the humorist. "There wasn't much in the memorial except a statue of Will and some areas to sit," said Tad Jones, executive director of the Will Rogers Memorial Museum and Birthplace Ranch. "People removed their hats, quietly came in and paid their respects to their friend."

Over time, the memorial evolved into a museum with artifacts, exhibits and dioramas. Around Will's 100th birthday in 1979, an effort was made to expand the memorial by adding

a new wing with a theater and research library.

Longtime directors Joe and Michelle Carter added film footage of Will from his movies and developed new exhibits and a children's museum.

The Oklahoma Historical Society, in league with the Will Rogers Memorial Foundation, is now in the process of reinventing the memorial for a new and expanded audience.

"We are trying to introduce Will Rogers to a new generation of visitors who did not have the advantage of seeing his movies, reading his columns, or witnessing his many acts of humanitarian kindness," said Jones. "The new vision for the future will incorporate some of the best museum ideas from around the world because Will was always on the cutting edge in everything he did. His life should truly be an inspiration to everyone."

Argus Hamilton, a native Oklahoman and comic called "the Will Rogers of the Baby Boom generation" by Robin Williams, will be the featured headliner at the OKC Comedy Fest kickoff event on October 10, 2018, at the Will Rogers Theatre Event Center in Oklahoma City. All proceeds will be dedicated to the renovation of the memorial theater in Claremore.

Three weeks later, on Nov. 1, 2018, the Will Rogers Memorial will host a second fundraising event to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Will Rogers'

first movie, "Laughing Bill Hyde" and the contributions of longtime commission member, Jim Hartz, a former host of the "Today" show. Again, all proceeds will be dedicated to renovating the 36-year-old theater.

Over the years the collections at the memorial have grown in size and diversity. The Rogers family, now in its fourth generation, has donated a wide range of original letters, journals, columns, artwork, photographs, and moving images.

The most important collection donated to the museum since the original Rogers Collection is the Kuntz Collection, said Jen Holt, curator of collections for the Will Rogers Memorial Museum and Birthplace Ranch.

Gordon Kuntz, a Will Rogers enthusiast living in Minnesota, donated the world's largest collection of Will Rogers movie posters, plus other art and artifacts, to the museum after deciding that they belonged in a place where everyone could enjoy them.

"The Kuntz Collection is truly a gem," said Holt.

Kuntz still collects posters but these days, because of a deal he made with his wife to ensure she maintains her home storage space, he has his finds shipped directly to the museum. Holt encourages anyone looking for a good home for Will Rogers material to consider donating their items to the museum.

The Will Rogers Memorial

is not the only site in the area associated with Oklahoma's Favorite Son. The Will Rogers Birthplace Ranch, located in Oologah, interprets the life of the Rogers family as successful ranchers in the Cherokee Nation before Will's move into entertainment.

"Clem Rogers, Will Rogers' father, built one of the largest cattle empires in the Cherokee Nation, was a successful business leader and an influential public servant within the Cherokee Nation," said Jacob Krumwiede, assistant director of the Will Rogers Memorial Museum and Birthplace Ranch.

Clem Rogers settled in the Cooweescoowee District of the Cherokee Nation in 1856, establishing his first cattle ranch and a small trading post along the Caney River. After the Civil War, Clem established a new ranch in the district, further to the east along the Verdigris River.

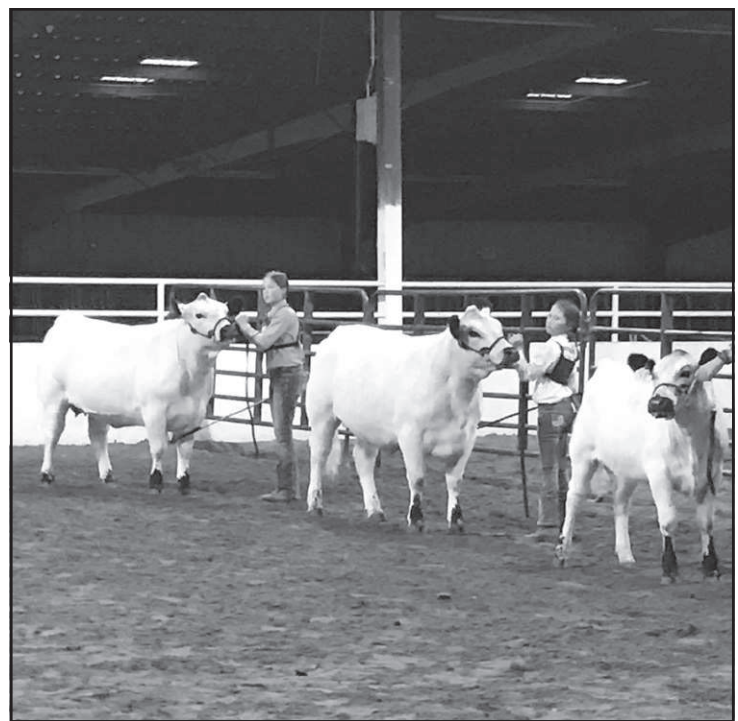
A house was completed on the land in 1875. It was here that Will was born on November 4, 1879. Eventually Will would take over operation of his father's ranch, renaming it the Dog Iron Ranch after his cattle brand.

In September 1958 the US government bought a portion of the old Rogers Ranch to create Lake Oologah. By the spring of 1961 the Rogers ranch house was moved from its original location to its current location to save the historic structure from being lost under the lake waters. A barn has since been added to the picturesque property.

"Visitors can learn about the place that shaped the character of one of the most influential humorists of the 20th century, or just soak in the nostalgic glow of days gone by," said Krumwiede.

Will Rogers once posed the question and answer: "What constitutes a life well spent, anyway? Love and admiration from your fellow men is all that anyone can ask."

The Oklahoma Historical Society's goal of introducing new generations of visitors to Will Rogers' "life well spent" continues through the evolution of the Will Rogers Memorial Museum and Birthplace Ranch.

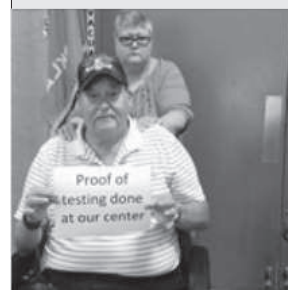

something we are increasingly seeing," Newman said. "Our democracy is based on a free exchange of ideas, but when voters don't know the source of these ads, they can't truly evaluate the message and what is being said."

Spending Picks Up

The rise in dark-money spending in Oklahoma could stem from an increased interest in political races this year. There were high-profile primary elections for top state positions, such as governor and attorney general, as well as the largest legislative candidate field in state history.

But a recent report suggests the trend also reflects a national expansion of dark-money spending.

The study by the Wesleyan Media Project and the Center for Responsive Politics found that dark money spending, as of July 29, was up in volume and percentage of ads run by outside groups in congressional races when compared with the 2014 mid-term elections.

The study also found that of the nearly 243,016 U.S. House or Senate TV ads that have run this election cycle, more than half were from groups that don't disclose their donors.

Anna Massoglia, a researcher at the Center for Responsive Politics, said many buyers of these ads don't even report their spending to the Federal Election Commission, whereas candidates and traditional political action committees must report.

The buyers avoid disclosure by running "electioneering communications" — ads that can support or oppose a specific

candidate without explicitly calling for their election or defeat — within 60 days of the general election or 30 days of a primary election.

At least one case occurred in Oklahoma when a dark money group, Foundation for Economic Prosperity, ran ads attacking Democratic gubernatorial candidate Drew Edmonson the day after Kevin Stitt beat Mick Cornett in the GOP gubernatorial runoff.

That group hasn't reported the spending with the FEC or the Oklahoma Ethics Commission. But Federal Communication Commission records show that the group booked \$190,000 worth of ads in the Oklahoma City and Tulsa markets for airing shortly after the Aug. 28 runoff.

Massoglia said there is little data on how active dark-money groups have been this year in state-level races. But in general

the groups remain a major player in politics and are becoming nearly as "efficient" in spending as candidate committees, she said.

Massoglia added that it's likely dark-money spending on congressional races and state-level politics will accelerate in the coming weeks.

"I think as you move closer to Election Day, spending will pick up," she said.

Where the Money Comes From

In Oklahoma's primary and runoff elections, dark-money groups were active in the state's legislative, statewide and congressional races.

Most of that money was spent on the attorney general race in which incumbent Mike Hunter beat challenger Gentner Drummond by fewer than 300 votes.

Each candidate received hundreds of thousands of dollars in

support from groups that don't disclose all or some of their donors.

Hunter's biggest outside supporter was a newly created PAC called Oklahomans for Constitutional Integrity, which spent about \$578,000 on voter calls and media production and ad buys supporting him. Its sole contributor was the Republican Attorney Generals Association, a so-called 527 nonprofit that has received hundreds of thousands of dollars from businesses and other organizations, such as the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, that do not disclose their donors.

Hunter also received about \$42,000 in support through independent expenditures paid by the Oklahoma State Medical Association, a 501(c)(6) trade group that also doesn't disclose its donors.

Drummond, meanwhile,

received \$285,000 in support from the American Future Fund, recently identified as one of the 15 largest dark money groups in America by a nonprofit advocacy organization called Issue One, which examines dark-money spending.

Other big dark-money players in Oklahoma races this year included Foundation for Economic Prosperity, which spent \$438,872 supporting Cornett's unsuccessful gubernatorial bid, in addition to running the ad attacking Edmonson after the runoff; American Wind Action, a so-called social welfare, or 501(c)(4), nonprofit that spent about \$200,000 on legislative races, and Catalyst Oklahoma, Inc., a 501(c)(4) group that spent about \$168,750 on races for the Legislature, superintendent of public instruction and labor commissioner.

How Money Is Spent

The bulk of dark-money spending on Oklahoma's races so far this election cycle has gone toward TV, radio or print media buys. That totals about half of the \$2.5 million spent.

But dark-money groups have also spent heavily on canvassing or voter calls (\$150,0223), direct mail (\$133,880) and digital media (327,647), campaign finance records show.

Massoglia said dark-money groups are increasingly mirroring the way candidate committees spend money, with a shift toward direct-to-voter marketing and digital ads.

"I think they are evolving," she said. "We are seeing not only TV ads, but also a lot of digital spending that we can see through Facebook's (new political advertisement) search,

Twitter and other areas."

One group with a deep web presence in Oklahoma races was the Conservative Alliance PAC, which is being sued by lawmakers in Ohio who allege the secretive group ran misleading and inaccurate ads there.

In addition to spending on direct-mail flyers sent to voters days before the election, the group created a Facebook page and registered website domains targeting specific lawmakers.

The websites have been taken down, but an archived version of one site, registered as wrongprioritiesok.com, was made solely to attack Rep. George Faught, R-Muskogee, one of the six incumbent lawmakers to lose after August's runoff races.

Newman, of MapLight, agreed with Massoglia that dark-money groups and traditional candidate committees are spending in similar ways. Although the law bars independent expenditure groups from coordinating with candidates, the two frequently share the same political consultants and advertising firms, Newman said.

The difference is that dark-money groups aren't as accountable as candidate committees, he said.

"Overwhelmingly they will run negative ads," he said. "They can tear down candidates with lies and (the candidates being targeted) can't even defend themselves." *Oklahoma Watch is a nonprofit, nonpartisan media organization that produces in-depth and investigative content on a range of public-policy issues facing the state. After a few minutes, Sill would get up and lock the bedroom door, undress the girl and himself and rape her.

He allegedly told the girl if she didn't submit, the mob would hurt her family.

Sill also reportedly took several pictures of the girl's nude body.

“They threw the ball on us and they have speedsters at receiver,” Sharp said.

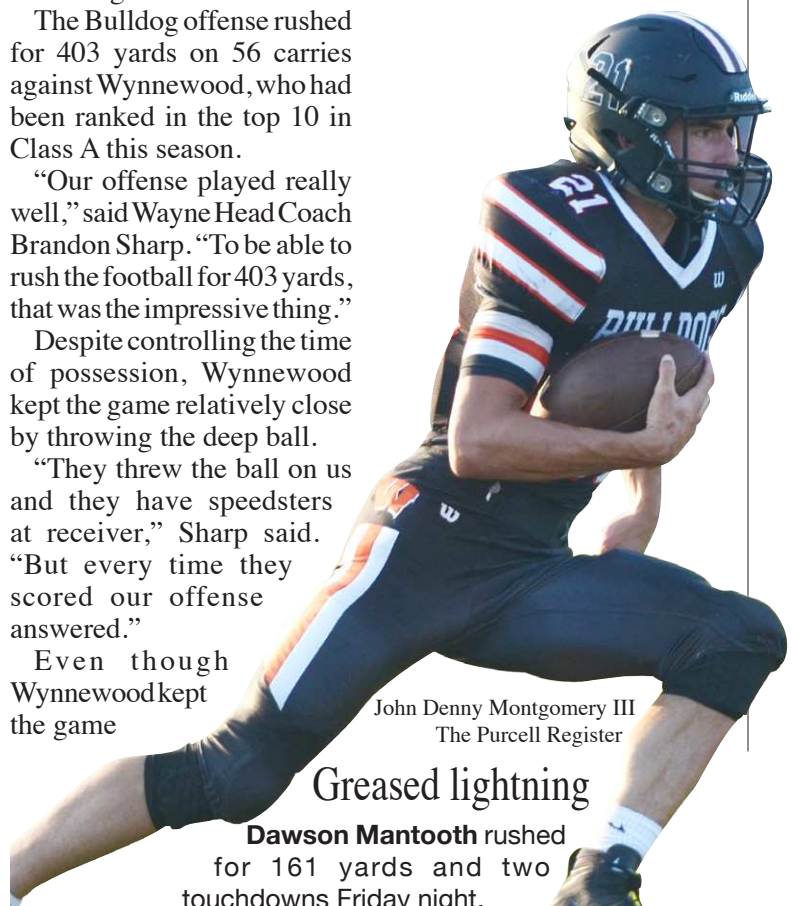
“But every time they scored our offense answered.”

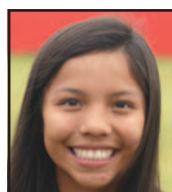

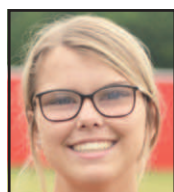

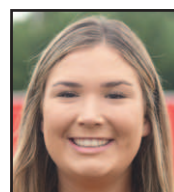

Despite a setback by No. 1 Millwood last week, Lexington remains tied for second in District 2A-7.

Lexington, 4-3 and 3-1, travels to Community Christian Thursday for a 7 p.m. kickoff.

CCS brings a 5-2, 3-1 record into the key district fracas.

"Community Christian is an outstanding team and they play very fast offensively. They are similar to us," head coach Dale Berglan said.

The Falcons, though, intercepted a long pass later in the quarter.

Marcus Major (the Falcons' senior running back who is

slated to sign with Oklahoma) then scored on a pounding 59-yard touchdown run. The two-point conversion was no good—leaving the game tied, 14-14, with 5:37 to go.

"We don't want a shootout," said Lexington head coach Dale Berglan to the sideline at that point. "But, we have one."

It certainly looked like it. However, Major immediately had a huge and powerful 30-yard burst.

Millwood quarterback Daniel Howard then ran the ball in on the next play—and scored on a two-point conversion run—to make the score 22-14.

Prevost connected with Jaylen Cottrell for another 42-yard scoring pass with 7:40 left in the first half. Drawing the Bulldogs within nine at 30-21.

Sadly for Lexington fans, that was the last time they saw the lead.

Millwood went into the locker room at halftime with a 38-21 advantage. From there, it was a track meet.

"The guys are doing a great job up front blocking," Berglan said at the end of the first half. "They are keeping seven guys in the box and they are playing hard man on us. 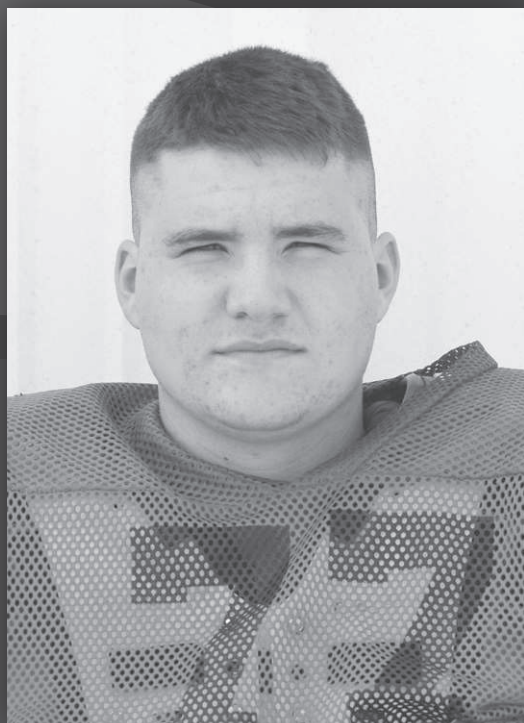

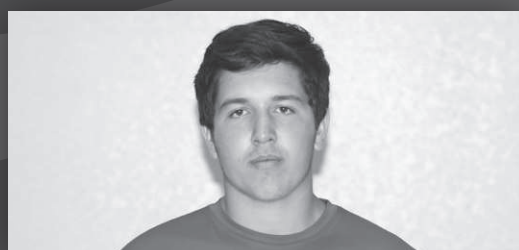

Our automobile donation program has proven to be a great way for veterans or others to receive a tax deduction. It also gives an opportunity to help a veteran with a vehicle to drive or allows us to sell the vehicle to raise funds for our organization. To all of you who have supported with a donation, we want to express our appreciation to you. We started this program after so many veterans received a VA disability and used some of their money to purchase a new car or truck. Since most of them don't receive much for their trade-in vehicle, they make more donating their old vehicle to us and taking the tax deduction.

As everyone I hope is aware, we are volunteers who are making a difference in the lives of all veterans and their families. We provide transportation services to more than 25 veterans each week that would not otherwise have a way to go to their VA appointments or to make the trip to our location. Our drivers are on the road for over 1,000 miles each week providing these services to veterans.

One of the most surprising things that I have found out during my many years of volunteering with a non-profit is the small percentage of people we help who return the gifts and kindness we gave them. Only 12 percent of those we support are willing to help the next veteran. On an average month, we spend more than \$25,000 helping veterans with many needs, as well as the many unforeseen needs we all encounter.

I don't know about you, but I'm ready for some sunshine as it has been too wet for me the past week. I attended my grandkids ball games last Saturday, and after the repeated showers I was sure glad to feel the warm sun finally. At the Foundation, even with the wet weather last week, there were more than over 300 veterans and surviving spouses who were seen. On Thursday alone, we had more than 160 visitors. We were forced to stop signing people in when we reached our maximum on both days.

It appears to me that if other organizations used our system of obtaining DBQ evidence before filing veteran's claims for service-connection of a disability we would not be so busy. I also believe that many veterans are not aware of the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires that are available on the VA website. These can be filled out by their medical provider and then used as evidence to support a claim for service-connection of a disability of for an increase of a current service-connected disability. I believe the more pro-active a veteran is with their claim for VA benefits the more likely it will be approved.

As we are getting closer to the end of 2018, it won't be long until we see if we can accomplish our goal of assisting 1,000 veterans in receiving a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities this year. We have already broken every record we have set in the past with more than 700 already approved this year. Hopefully, we will surpass 800 before the end of October which should make it possible to meet or exceed our goal of 1000 veterans receiving 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities in 2018.

Last year our total of 100 percent veterans reached 316, and we were so excited to be a part in helping so many that we pledged to do more and set our sights on 1000 for 2018.

Last week there were 27

veterans both men and women who received the 100 percent rating from VA. These veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,059,197 per year. Thirty-three veterans received a VA disability rating from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual amount of \$522,912.

We had one surviving spouse approved for benefits. Surviving spouse and pension benefits are changing the way some of the surviving spouses and veterans who we are assisting live each day each. Many times, veterans or surviving spouses we help will receive double the money that they are now living on.

I have met many veterans and surviving spouses who are living on under \$1,000 each month with many of them receiving less. It's a sad day for me when there are so many in this United States who are not receiving the VA benefits for which they are eligible. As we continue to grow, there will be a need to increase the number of volunteers we currently have helping veterans and their surviving spouses each week. Applications are available on our website, or a paper copy can be picked up at our Foundation.

If you would like to help those men and women who served in the military and their families we want to visit with you. A background check is required before anyone becomes a volunteer with our organization.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning with the doors opening at 5:30 a.m. We begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients as soon as we reach the quota for the day, and that time varies depending on the number of visitors and the number of available volunteers, which usually occurs around 7 a.m.

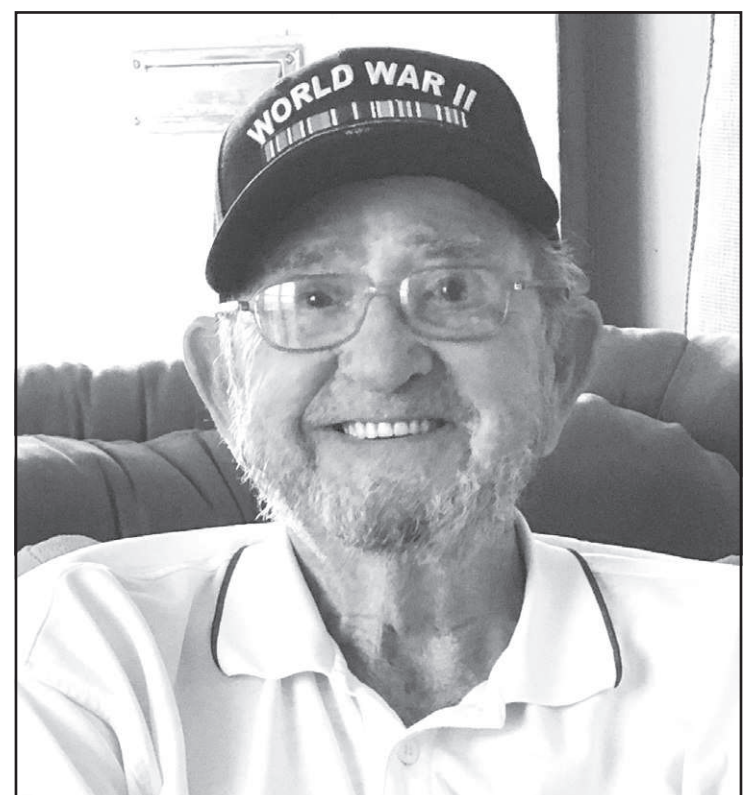

With all the rain we've received lately, I'm sure many of us have given thought to Noah and his ark. Let's look at what we can learn from Noah's story. To read about this, see Genesis chapters 9 through 12. Interestingly, the Hebrew word for flood is found only in Genesis, Chapters 6 through 9, and in Psalm 29:10.

The world had become thoroughly evil. There had been 10 generations, or about 120 years, that had passed since the introduction of sin into the world in the Garden of Eden. God allowed this much time to pass in hopes of humanity learning to treat creation rightly, but it hadn't happened.

The Lord was frustrated and regretted making human beings, becoming heartbroken once again. God decided to wipe out the human race as well as every living thing this time. But we see another example of God's love allowing a way around total human destruction.

Noah was a good man, treat-

ing his neighbors justly. Only one other man was said to have walked with God, Noah's great-grandfather Enoch. Noah wasn't perfect, but he was a man of integrity, especially in comparison to the other humans that lived around the area.

Because of God's grace, Noah was commanded to build an ark that would house his family as well as various animals. The animals included birds, livestock, and crawling creatures, and Noah was to take food for the humans and all the animals. We remember the faith that it took for Noah to do what God said in the face of the ridicule of his society.

After the flood had destroyed all of earthly creation except for the ark and its inhabitants, God provided an emblem of a new covenant that God had made with Noah and his descendants. We see the symbol even today, the arc of the (rain)bow. We see it often translated as "bow," emphasizing the shape of the object used for fighting that has been turned on its side, indicating surrender of the weapon.

The rainbow is a symbol of God's promise to never again use world destruction as punishment for sin. This new covenant applies to all life on earth, both

human and nonhuman. Just as God created the earth and its inhabitants out of the original chaos, God now pledges not to allow chaos to reclaim the created world.

We understand that human sin has appeared since the beginning of the creation and will repeatedly show up in the world. Throughout the Bible, even in what we may know as the Old Testament, we see God giving us chances to change, over and over. All of these chances are blessings, given not by anything we've done, but only by God. For Christians, this grace culminated in the coming of Jesus the Christ, who is the ultimate gift of grace for God's forgiving of human sin. By accepting this blessing, we no longer have to fear God's punishment.

We are a group of recovering sinners—you don't have to be perfect to join with us. We meet weekly to remind ourselves of God's love and forgiveness. We practice "Open Hearts... Open Minds... Open Doors..." and invite anyone who would like to be a part of a church family to visit with us. Front-Porch Gospel: 'The Old Ship of Zion'
Welcome, everyone, to the "front porch."

In our three-year voyage through the Bible, we have come to the book of Hebrews and to one of the great texts in God's Word: Hebrews 12:22. "But ye are come unto mount Zion," says the inspired writer, "and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels..."

As you read in the Old Testament, you will recognize "Zion" as one of the beautiful images splashed repeatedly throughout its pages. The magnificent temple Solomon built once rested on Zion's western slope, the highest hill in Jerusalem. From her fixed

position high above the hills, Zion served as a fortress of protection and a beacon of light to the land of Judah.

Old Testament writers honored this place called Zion and often wrote of her as they looked ahead by faith to a better Zion, the church of our Lord. The apostle, in contrasting the limitations of the old regime with the blessings in the Lord's church, reminded the Hebrews that they, indeed, had come to that better place. They had come to heavenly Zion.

We, too, have come to that place. We have come to Mount Zion, to the heavenly Jerusalem and city of the living God. Did you know that the Zion of which the writer speaks is the church of our Lord? The church is a far better Zion than anything built in the city of Jerusalem. The church is "heavenly Jerusalem."

Sometimes we take for granted the grandeur of the church of our Lord that we become a part of when we obey the gospel of Jesus Christ (Acts 2:38, 47). But the faithful prophets of old did not take Zion for granted. They loved her even as we are to love the Lord's church today.

Many song poets through the years have taken this grand imagery of Zion as a fitting representation of the Lord's church and used her in their music, one such song referring to her as an old ship. In 1977 Conrad Cook penned the beautiful words to "Is that the Old Ship of Zion,"

a song that tells the story of a man standing on a river bank, looking out and seeing the old ship of Zion sailing in the distance. As he strains his eyes to make out this ship, he realizes that "its hull was bent and battered."

He describes the scene further: "Waves were rough," he writes, "but that old ship was sailing. Is that the old Ship of Zion I see?"

What a true and poignant image of the Lord's church! Surely, through the ages, the church has been "bent and battered." She has had to endure many storms and a multitude of attacks and will do so until, says the Revelation writer, "the Lamb shall overcome them" (Revelation 17:14).

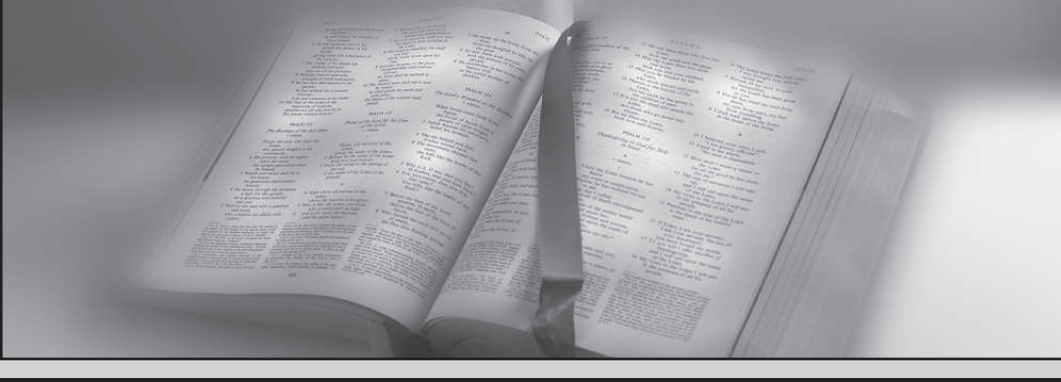
Long before John's vision, however, Daniel of old reminded us that Zion "shall never be destroyed," that she "shall stand for ever" (Daniel 2:44).

Today I am so glad to be part of that everlasting ship of Zion, to be able to sail life's sea in this old ship. I want to tell you that I love this church, and I hope that our look back at her beauty will excite you to a greater love for her, too.

Be glad today if you have come to this special place, if you have come to Zion of old. Be glad if you are sailing on that steady ship. And once you get on board, friend, stay there, and her sails will guide you safely home.

The weekly prayer meeting is a one hour time of prayer and Bible study that begins at 6 p.m.

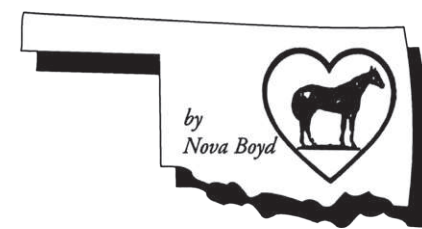

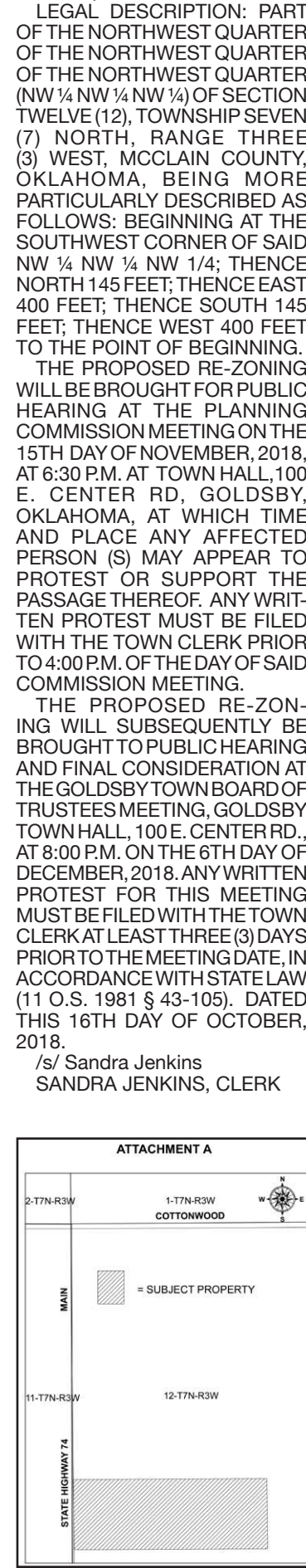

Gray had touchdowns in the first, second and fourth quarters on runs of 10, 30 and five yards.

"Rodney carried us, no doubt," Sharp said. "And also Dawson (Mantooth)."

Mantooth had 161 yards rushing on 11 touches with two touchdowns on runs of 30 and 60 yards.

"Rodney and Dawson have been playing really well lately and so we just fed them," Sharp said. "The backs ran the ball hard. Speed like Dawson and power like Rodney is a good recipe for us."

Wayne only needed to attempt three passes—all completions to Brannon Lewelling—during the game.

The freshman Lewelling also had 16 yards rushing.

The big eaters up front deserve a heaping helping of praise for the way the game went as they took control of the line of scrimmage and the game.

"The O linemen; my hat is off to them," Sharp said. "The O line played well. It was just smash-mouth, bloody your nose type football."

The line consisted of Billy Montgomery at center, guards Joseph Gutierrez and Lawrence Slawinski and tackles Bryce Stocks and Andy Lee.

Austin Box rotated in along the line as well.

Sharp said his team ran a steady dose of counter, power and outside zone plays and would mix in a couple jet sweeps.

"Our tight end AJ Sherrill had huge blocks sealing the edge," Sharp said.

The coach said Wynnewood has a very talented defensive end who went up against Sherrill much of the night.

"AJ just stoned him. Even when we were running plays to his side we got him blocked," Sharp said.

Two halves

The defensive performance was a tale of two halves.

In the first half Wayne gave up 144 yards rushing. But 120 yards of that came on just two plays. They only gave up 24 more rushing yards the rest of the half. They also only allowed eight passing yards in the half.

But in the second half they gave up 211 yards passing and 31 yards rushing.

"We know we have to get better. We need to get better in back end coverage," Sharp said. "We'll work on some things technique-wise. We knew Wynnewood would get some catches—they have athletes everywhere—but we needed to be smarter."

James Spencer led the Bulldogs in the tackling category with nine stops.

Lewelling had eight tackles and Box had four tackles and a sack.

Gray had six tackles and a forced fumble, which was returned 80 yards for a touchdown on a scoop and score by Freshman Ethan Mullins.

"Ethan is going to be a good player," Sharp said.

"We could have played better on defense but at the same time, the guys need to see we beat a top 10 team and we have a chance to be a good team. But you have to get better each

week."

Liberty

Wayne plays Liberty, 0-7, 0-4 in District Thursday night at 7 p.m.

"They are a young team and their kids play hard," Sharp said.

They run a base 4-3 defense but will slip into a 50 front and blitz to keep opposing offenses off balance.

Offensively they run a spread offense.

"Their No. 7 is athletic and they'll move him to different spots and get him the ball," Sharp said. "We'll need to be fundamentally sound and not let them pop gaps, and be stronger in the back end."

"But we responded Friday night and didn't allow it and found a way to win the game. We were more physical and the aggressor. They (Wynnewood) weren't expecting our physical play and I'm proud of the way we finished the game."

Wayne is now 5-2 on the year and 3-1 in District play.
