Judge dismisses challenge to state's voter ID law

A more than four-year legal challenge to overturn Oklahoma's voter identification law was rejected this week by a state district court judge, who upheld the constitutionality of the measure.

Oklahoma County District Court Judge Aletia Haynes Timmons dismissed the case Monday after hearing arguments from lawyers representing the Oklahoma State Election Board and Tulsa resident Delilah Christine Gentges. Gentges' attorney said he plans to appeal the decision.

Gentges sued after 74 percent of voters approved a state question in 2010 that requires every voter, before casting a ballot, to show proof of identity issued by the U.S. government, Oklahoma state government or an Oklahoma tribal government.

Like in many other states that have passed similar laws, voter-rights advocates here argued the requirement is unconstitutional because it interferes with residents' right to vote.

Tulsa attorney James Thomas, who represents Gentges, said the law also unfairly targets those who struggle to obtain or pay for a government identification, such as young voters, elderly voters, minorities and those living in poverty.

"We estimated in this case that there are more than one million people in Oklahoma

without identification," he said. "And the thing is when you make it harder to vote, people just stop voting."

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, 33 states have laws requesting or requiring voters to show some form of identification at the polls. Supporters of the measures say they are needed to prevent voter fraud and protect the integrity of elections.

The remaining states use other methods to verify voter identity, such as signing an affidavit or providing personal information.

Many laws requiring an ID have been challenged and overturned. This includes federal court judges fully or partially overturning voter ID laws in Wisconsin, Texas and North Carolina this summer.

In all of those cases, the states' laws required voters without a valid ID to request

a provisional ballot and take additional steps for their vote to be counted.

Oklahoma's law is somewhat less strict. It allows voters with an ID to request a provisional ballot and prove their identity by signing a sworn affidavit. Their ballot is required to be verified later by election workers.

Lawyers for the state argued the law allows voters to cast a ballot without placing an undue burden on those who don't have a valid ID or choose not to show one. The state also pointed out that every registered voter is given a free voter identification card that satisfies the requirements of the law.

"Thus, there is no circumstance under which a registered voter will not have the opportunity to vote," lawyers for the Attorney General's Office argued in a trial brief.

The state's court filing also argued that voter ID laws "are a reasonable way to further the legitimate interest of detecting and deterring voter fraud."

Thomas said he disagreed because the type of voter fraud that would be detected by voter ID laws hasn't been a problem in Oklahoma. He added that voter ID laws are typically a tactic used in Republican-dominated states to keep voters who traditionally vote Democratic

Town hall talk in Purcell

Tom Cole shares some D.C. insights

Few things are certain in politics.

But what is known, Fourth District Rep. Tom Cole reminded a Town Hall audience here on Tuesday, is the United States will have a new President after the November general election.

And possible a new Congress, as well.

So while this Congress has been more productive in the past 18 months than in all the preceding 6-1/2 years, there are some things it shouldn't do.

That is the reason cabinet secretaries were told "anything with the word new is not going to happen" when they went to Capital Hill with their budget requests.

The start of new programs is "really for the American

people to make that decision in November," Cole said. There are four major problems for the next President and Congress, he continued.

Those are:

- how to get the economy

moving again (Cole noted we are in the slowest economic recovery since 1949);

- how to afford Social Security

From the youngest to the not-so-young, contestants entered in this week's McClain County Heart of Oklahoma Rodeo will guarantee non-stop arena action.

The annual rodeo at the McClain County fairgrounds opens tonight (Thursday) for a three-night run.

Rodeo chairman Butch Biby said in addition to competing for \$1,000 added money in each event, contestants can opt to try for a share of the go-round purse instead.

"But if they want in for the added money, they'll compete both nights (tonight and Friday) and if they're good enough in the average, they will qualify for Saturday night," Biby said.

What that means for spectators is top flight rodeo performances every night.

The rodeo is sponsored by the Indian Territory Round-up Club. Returning this year with plenty of rank stock is Rafter D Rodeo from Sterling.

"Those folks do an excellent

job," Biby said.

The stock contractor has a good following of rodeo contestants.

Rough stock events will be ranch bronc riding and bull riding. Timed events will include team roping, steer wrestling, breakaway roping, tie-down calf roping, steer roping and barrel racing.

Another popular event, mutton busting, will begin at 7 p.m. nightly.

Pint-sized cowboys and cowgirls vying for the trophy buckle will be 5 years old and younger and not weigh more than 50 pounds.

The mutton busting entry fee is \$10 per night. The champion will be determined by whoever hangs on the longest once that chute gate opens.

Queen this year will be Katana Mincey and Hannah Hornbuckle will be junior princess.

Three girls are in the running for the princess banner - Calle Parkinson, Heaven Chesnut and Taydem Perryman.

Coronation for queen, princess and junior princess will follow the mutton busting on Saturday.

Returning this year as a special attraction will be the Ring of Fear. Rafter D is also

sponsoring a calf scramble each night.

Signed on as sponsors are McClain Bank, The Rusty Knot, Thru Tubing, Wade Higgins Chevrolet, Bravo's, Freedom Ford in McAlester, Sleep Inn, Barrett Trailers, Fowler Auto Group and Loving Care.

Obamacare is a money pit

When Obamacare was created, it was sold to the American people as a new plan to both lower health costs and expand access. Six years later, many Americans have faced and continue to face outrageous premiums and deductibles.

Instead of expanding competition and access, the recent announcement that Aetna would be withdrawing from Obamacare on the heels of United's announcement that they would also be withdrawing from the exchanges should force us to reevaluate whether, in fact, Obamacare is everything it was promised, particularly from a financial perspective.

In Oklahoma, families have faced massive rate increases, thanks to Obamacare. In 2015, the average premium increase for a policy was 12.2 percent—but that was with four carriers in the marketplace. In 2016, because of the rationing of care, the increased bureaucratic morass and additional mandates, and the outrageous costs, half of the insurers exited the marketplace, leaving two insurers, and Oklahomans with an average 31 percent increase over the previous year.

2017 is no better, as United-Health exits the market, leaving just one carrier, and leaving

families with another, average proposed premium increase of 49.2 percent. Premiums have more than doubled in just three years.

Beyond its impact on families, Obamacare has had a tremendous negative impact on the federal budget, all while health care costs continue to rise. In fact, CMS continues to project an average yearly increase of 5.8 percent on healthcare spending through 2024. Since its implementation, it has been a burden on a family's budget, as well as on the federal budget.

According to the Congressional Budget Office, the subsidies alone for Obamacare will cost the federal government more than \$853 billion in the next ten years. These strains on our families and our national economy are unsustainable.

While Obamacare continues to drain the pockets of many families, and of the federal government, it is certainly draining the pockets of health insurers. Major health insurance company Aetna is just one of the latest companies to recognize the fundamental flaws that face Obamacare.

Aetna revealed that its participation in Obamacare has cost them upwards of \$430 million since 2014. Similarly, United-Health lost nearly \$1 billion in

Cooperation and collaboration produced water rights agreement

I'm proud to be part of the recently announced water rights settlement agreement among the state of Oklahoma, the Chickasaw and Choctaw nations and Oklahoma City. By choosing cooperation and collaboration over conflict and litigation, this historic agreement strengthens governmental relationships based on the common interests of the state and the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations.

Having a sufficient, reliable supply of water is essential for life, economic development, manufacturing, recreational activities, and important industry sectors like agriculture and energy.

The settlement, which will be presented to Congress for final approval, will resolve long-standing questions over water rights ownership and regulatory authority over the waters of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations' historic treaty territories, an area that spans approximately 22 counties in south-central and southeastern Oklahoma.

Under the agreement, the state will continue to exercise its authority to manage and protect water resources in Oklahoma. This way, existing uses of water remain secure, and it provides certainty for future development.

Making Oklahoma better prepared to weather future economic slumps

The year is 2027. Saudi Arabia has ramped up production again, causing energy prices to sink around the globe. Oklahoma's economy is more diversified than it was in 2016, but energy is still at its center. The drop in energy prices is causing tax receipts to come in below projections.

Legislators creating the 2028 budget see that they'll have far less to spend than they did in 2027. However, no parent calls their child's principal to ask if their teacher will be laid off. No Medicaid recipient worries their health care needs will go unmet.

Instead, state budget makers turn to the Revenue Stabilization Fund and the Rainy Day Fund, where, cumulatively, over a billion dollars has been waiting for just such a day.

As legislators serving during the budget crisis of 2016, when a dramatic drop in energy prices caused a \$1.3 billion shortfall, we wished the fantasy above could have been our reality.

We did have the benefit of

some savings, thanks to the creation of the Rainy Day Fund in response to the 1980s oil bust. But even though energy busts are as inevitable in Oklahoma as a spring thunderstorm, the Rainy Day Fund proved inadequate.

Much of it had already been used, and even if the Fund had been full, it would have fallen half a billion dollars short of the need.

We believed strongly that 2016 was the time to enact savings reform. Even though we knew that we would be long gone from the Legislature the next time the energy cycle turned downward, we didn't want to see this crisis repeated.

So, we authored House Bill 2763 and guided it through to law, despite doubts that something this important and forward-thinking could be accomplished in the midst of this budget crisis.

HB 2763 enshrines some simple but powerful strategies to improve our state's long-term savings. It creates a new Revenue Stabilization Fund to work alongside the Rainy Day Fund.

Once tax revenues return to

2015 levels, any energy gross production tax revenue that comes in above a five-year average will go into the Fund. Additionally, three-quarters of the corporate income tax revenue that comes in above a five-year average will go into the Revenue Stabilization Fund; the remaining quarter will go to the Rainy Day Fund.

Financial models project there will ultimately be hundreds of millions of dollars placed in the Revenue Stabilization Fund through these methods.

If there is a revenue failure, as occurred twice this year, the director of the Office of Management and Enterprise Services and the Legislature could each spend a quarter of the Fund. To balance the next year's budget, the Legislature could spend up to half the Fund.

The Oklahoma Legislature is often rightfully criticized for its lack of long-term planning. However, in the case of HB 2763 and the creation of the Revenue Stabilization Fund, we feel strongly that something has been put in place that will benefit Oklahoma for the rest of its days.

Gov.:

The agreement also gives the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations a voice in specific proceedings addressing water resources within their treaty territories. They rightly will play a role in significant water allocation and management evaluations within the settlement area.

This agreement is an important first step in all Oklahomans coming together to address the wise use and protection of our shared water resources.

It also fully resolves the state's debt to the federal government for the construction of Sardis Lake, ensuring Oklahoma City has a reliable water supply while providing a standard to protect lake levels in Sardis, which we all agree is very important.

A mechanism is in place to collaboratively address any possible out-of-state water use if out-of-state water use is ever authorized by the Legislature. It will provide protections for the source basin and region while ensuring the entire state benefits.

With this agreement, the rural communities and recre-

ational and ecological values of south-central and southeastern Oklahoma are preserved and protected. And Oklahoma City has a path to obtain access to sufficient water to secure the economic posterity of central Oklahoma for generations to come.

Without this agreement, existing water rights – for urban, agricultural, industrial uses – and development for future uses and needs would remain uncertain.

When finalized, the agreement will protect existing rights and provide certainty for the development of future uses both in and outside southeastern Oklahoma.

After the agreement is signed by all parties, it must be approved by federal legislation and executed by the secretary of the U.S. Department of the Interior.

We will be asking our Congressional delegation to spearhead legislation that will:

- Approve the transfer of the state's Sardis storage to the city of Oklahoma City.

- Approve the transfer of the state's financial obligations to the city.

- Forgive and waive all future use debt associated with Sardis because Sardis storage associated with future use will remain in the lake for recreation and wildlife purposes. It will not be used directly for drinking water supply.

- Direct the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to approve an amended storage contract transfer agreement between the state and the city, transferring all of the state's rights and obligations related to Sardis, including waiver of the debt related to future use storage.

Juliet began her call just as she had prepared, exuding confidence, "Yes, Mr. Cooper. This is Juliet Stoughton."

Obviously surprised, Cooper seemed more amused than concerned by her call. "Is this the same Juliet Stoughton that is allegedly running for mayor of Lennox Valley?"

Expecting that response, Juliet was ready. "Yes it is. The very same."

"Well, how can I be of service to you today, Juliet?" Cooper said almost coyly.

"I would like to challenge you to a debate next Tuesday night."

"A debate?" Cooper chuckled. "Miss, I know that you are new to the complexities of campaigns, but there are only six days left until the election. I'm quite sure this last-ditch effort of yours couldn't even be planned in such a short period."

Juliet was ready. "Mr. Bland said you would say that."

"What do you mean by that?" asked an obviously perturbed Cooper.

"I made the same challenge to him this morning. He said he would be happy to debate, but you would be afraid to face me on stage. He said you would probably make up some excuse about it being too close to the election date."

"Listen here, missy," Raymond almost shouted into the microphone. "You name the place and time, and I will be there to show you what a real mayor looks like."

Iris and Sarah both smiled as they sat together by the radio as Juliet answered, "Tuesday night. Seven o'clock. At the Methodist Church."

For a moment, Raymond Cooper was speechless. But just for a moment.

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The new normal in funding

In this day and age, public schools must understand and deal with many complicated funding issues—that did not exist prior to the year 2000. The Oklahoma public school funding formula has always been very difficult to understand, even for the most seasoned public school officials. Now-day several more school finance issues have appeared – such as school budget cuts, fewer and fewer revenue streams, and public funding for corporate and private services. This last major funding issue, public funds for private services (as opposed to public funds for public services) could eventually spell doom for our public schools in America.

David Britten, school superintendent in Grand Rapids, Michigan and retired U.S. Army officer, has laid out a conceivable scenario for the future of our public schools – if "radical" corporately owned legislators and corporate hacks continue pushing charters and privatization on a public that chooses to remain ignorant of the problem. A "radical corporate legislator" is one that has been "bought off" by corporate entities and profiteers in public education. These corporate entities have often donated heavily to a legislator's campaign coffer and now want something in return, and the radical legislator is usually all too happy to comply. A corporate hack is an employee of a corporation who is in charge of influencing radical legislators. According to Mr. Britten, the following evolution or scenario for our public schools is very likely – especially in Oklahoma, where several radical legislators and candidates reside:

1) Traditional public schools will disappear because a dual tax-supported system is not sustainable over time. If public schools do survive, it will be because the "radical legislators" have convinced the public that tax rates MUST increase.

2) Corporations that run charters will open and close them at will, shutting them down entirely in areas where the profit margins are low ("Walmart" is an example).

3) As corporate run charters become a majority of schools, corporations will demand more public dollars to compete in the marketplace and will use political money and power to force state legislators' hands.

4) Like runaway college and university costs, the demand for entrance by the "average student" will force costs at corporate charters and private schools to skyrocket.

5) Legislation will materialize to allow corporate charters to charge a variety of fees and possibly tuition to keep up with rising costs and greater demand; by now the traditional public school system will pretty much have disappeared due to bankruptcies and apathy.

6) The percentage of children uneducated in formal school settings will skyrocket due to their local schools having closed and inability of the corporate charter system to expand to meet 100% of the non-private-school demand.

7) I'll let you fill in the consequences to our society from this point on.

I'd like to revisit the "radical legislators" and "corporate hacks" for a moment in order to appropriately identify and determine specifically just who they may be. Any factual information stated pertaining to legislators, legislative candidates, and corporate hacks can be verified through access of any internet search engine. A prime example of a corporate hack is the Ex-Assembly Speaker of the Wisconsin House of Representatives, Scott Jensen. He is the "Ex-Speaker" because he "was convicted of three misconduct in office felonies in 2006, sentenced to 15 months in prison and banished from even stepping foot in the Wisconsin Capitol for five years." In 2011, just weeks after his five year banishment expired, "Jensen registered as a lobbyist. His only client is the American Federation for Children" (AFC). The group has tremendous influence in Capitols of all 50 states. It is also well-known as a "dark money" group, because corporate donors to its cause try to remain anonymous. The AFC's only "cause" or purpose is advocating for corporate charter and private school vouchers. A school voucher is defined as public funding for corporate and private schools. Of course, we know what public funding

to corporate farms did during the late 1920's and 1930's in Oklahoma – created the Dust Bowl. The AFC is also a contributing member of the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) in which many state legislators are also members. Scott Jensen, as the AFC's lobbyist, travels the nation – lobbying state legislators and donating \$thousands to state candidates who agree to support public funding for corporate charters and private schools. Jensen was in Oklahoma during the 2015 legislative session, lobbying for school voucher legislation and supporting legislators who authored it. The AFC doesn't contribute to legislative candidates' campaigns because it would be limited to \$5,400 (the upper limit) and it could not stay anonymous. Dark money groups, such as the AFC, Catalyst Oklahoma, and Oklahoma United do spend upwards of \$20,000 on individual campaigns in order to gain access to \$millions in public funding. The candidates who are beneficiaries of this campaign funding typically distance themselves from these dark money groups by saying "my campaign is in no way associated with the AFC" or Catalyst Oklahoma, or Oklahoma United. They say "If it doesn't read 'paid for by my campaign', I don't know anything about it." What the candidate and future 'radical legislator' does not say, however, is that he or she actually had to apply for support from the AFC and other dark money groups. I've seen the applications and witnessed the interviews. All a candidate must do to gain support is to agree to support public funding for private and corporate charter schools.

If you are as upset as I am over these efforts to destroy our public schools, then legislators and candidates who support corporate and private takeover must be recognized for who they are. Some lobbyists must be run out of Oklahoma, and radical legislators should not be elected to office. Public school supporters in all our rural communities should be livid and "rise up" against the private and corporate takeover of our schools.

Crafting a budget with over 100 elected officials proves difficult

Several weeks ago, the Commissioners of the Land Office (CLO) announced that it made a record distribution of funding to education during fiscal year 2016.

The Land Office is a constitutional agency that is not controlled by the legislature. The monies they collect come from the sale, rental, disposal, and management of the school lands and other public lands of the state, not tax dollars from the general revenue.

The funds and proceeds which are derived are set forth in a trust and are then disbursed to our k-12 schools and higher education. These monies are in addition to the amount which is appropriated by the legislature.

As I noted before, PreK-12

schools received \$102.2 million, more than \$5 million above what they received for the 2015 fiscal year, and our colleges and universities received \$700,000 more for FY2016 than the previous year. Together, the CLO distributed a total of \$134.4 million to our public education system.

That distribution was welcome news, given the financial situation the state finds itself in, caused almost entirely by the collapse of the energy industry.

As everyone is aware, the budget we crafted during the 2016 legislative session was based on a massive budget decrease of \$1.3 billion from the previous year. We started with \$5.85 billion in certified revenue, down from \$7.2 bil-

lion in 2015.

Using transportation bonds, "rainy day" money and numerous other means, we reached a budget agreement of \$6.78 billion in state appropriations – a budget that, despite the financial mess, education did not receive a cut from the previous fiscal year, provided more than \$2.4 billion to common education and also protected nursing homes and hospitals, roads and bridges and our prison system.

It is true that the biggest cut in the budget went to higher education, which lost more than \$100 million in funding.

Although decisions were extremely difficult this legislative

OU School of Dance holds auditions for Saturday Youth Program

Open Door Policy - In the Arena

"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."

This is an excerpt from the speech "Citizenship In A Republic" delivered at the Sorbonne, in Paris, France on April 23, 1910 by President Teddy Roosevelt, commonly referred to as the Arena Speech. I believe it goes to the heart of the work done by Oklahomans for Health with their efforts re-

garding two petitions to change Oklahoma laws.

Their first proposal would alter the initiative process to make it easier to submit ballot questions initiated by the people. The Oklahoma Secretary of State's office concluded their count of that petition last week and it fell short of making the ballot by about 6,000 signatures.

Many were disappointed by this outcome, but I am proud of the effort achieved by the volunteers. No volunteer-driven petition has achieved making the ballot in our state's history, but this did not dissuade their dedication.

The fact this group came so close speaks volumes to their commitment to see improvements in our system of government by the people.

The Oklahomans who spent many hours and quite a bit of personal money to collect signatures are to be applauded for their work to implement a change in the law to allow more input by the general public.

The second petition, the use of marijuana as a medical treatment under the care of a doctor, was trending significantly

more on signatures. The reason it was ahead was that not all volunteers were circulating both petitions and the other was an issue not impacting people directly.

The count officially began on the second petition last week and the outcome should be determined soon.

No matter the conclusion, I am thankful for the thousands of supporters who signed the petitions to allow Oklahomans the chance to vote on these issues. I am also proud of the hundreds of signature gatherers who worked to see these changes made to our system of government.

I applaud those who are willing, as President Teddy Roosevelt said, to climb into the arena to champion an effort. If we had more fighting the good fight, the outcomes we expect of our government would be significantly better.

Payment received: a rutabaga for an appendectomy

Shortly after my wife was born, her father's check paying the hospital in full was \$86.30. The receipt showed that for the healthy delivery, the three-day hospital stay was itemized as \$30 for the delivery room, \$10 per day for her mother's room, \$5 per day for the nursery, \$3.50 for miscellaneous expenses and a whopping \$7.80 for drugs and other medications.

It was the era of country doctors who often rendered care and in lieu of cash, for years thereafter found unending supplies of fruits, vegetables, eggs and other gifts of heartfelt gratitude on their porches. That was then, this is now.

Much has changed in the health care industry. When President Reagan signed the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act in 1986, medical facilities predicted that the mandate to treat everyone without regard to their ability to pay would place an onerous burden on the financial solvency of America's emergency rooms.

Thirty years later, uncompensated care, medical services rendered to the uninsured population has literally placed hospitals on "life support."

So what is the answer? Does our country deny medical care to the growing number of Americans who cannot afford medical care and cannot afford medical insurance? There are

many voices that protest against programs like Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act, but few voices that have answers to these urgent questions. Unfortunately, our hospitals and clinics cannot survive in the current environment.

According to a 2014 report from the Kaiser Family Foundation, 45 percent of all Oklahomans receive their health insurance through an employer provided plan and 33 percent are either on Medicare, Medicaid or a similar program. Only about five percent of Oklahomans actually shop for and purchase their own individual health plans.

Consequently, Oklahoma has a higher percentage of uninsured citizens (16 percent) than any state except Texas, and those 16 percent are among the unhealthiest citizens in Oklahoma - a state that is regarded by most to be between the 46th and 50th unhealthiest state in the country.

They are the Oklahomans who visit the emergency room because they have neither insurance nor the means to pay for care. By waiting until a minor illness becomes serious, sometimes life-threatening, the cost of treatment skyrockets.

Unfortunately, Oklahoma has refused to lift one finger to improve the situation. The Oklahoma legislature failed to enact a transitional reinsurance program to help keep insurance companies solvent when the claims of unhealthy Oklahomans

become excessive. Oklahoma's Insurance Commissioner refuses to review requested health insurance rate increases. Oklahoma's Governor refuses to do anything to help insure working Oklahomans who are not making enough money to purchase insurance and whose employers do not provide health insurance as a benefit.

So what are the answers? A legislator from Tennessee (which also has neglected the health of its citizens) says that those who cannot purchase insurance should "be like the Mennonites and pay their doctors with vegetables," and a senate candidate from Nevada said that she was "not ready to back down" from a system where doctors are paid with chickens, because, "Doctors are very sympathetic people."

Unhealthy, uninsured Oklahomans jeopardize the viability of health care for all of us. Certain politicians and media outlets repeatedly remind us about how bad the Affordable Care Act is and appear to gleefully report that it isn't working, but they do, remind them that it would be helpful to work together in a bipartisan way to resolve this problem, because we all know that our uninsured, working poor are not going to get very far by offering a rutabaga in return for an appendectomy.

session a zero balanced budget must be voted on and passed. I do not like every aspect of the budget, but I am elected to work alongside 100 house members, 48 senators as well as our Governor.

The fact is, between 2012 and 2016, state funding for higher education increased .58 percent, even after receiving a cut in 2015 when the state was facing a \$611 million budget shortfall. On the other hand, some agencies have received cuts of up to 25 percent during that time period.

From 2008-2016, OU's total cuts in appropriations was \$14 million; they raised tuition in response and collected more than \$154 million, part of

which is used to maintain a villa in Tuscany. Seriously, OSU's cuts during the same period totaled \$16 million; they also raised tuition in response and collected more than \$126 million.

Even more, the state Regents for Higher Education currently has nearly \$300 million in its revolving fund. OU currently has an endowment of more than \$1.5 billion, while OSU's endowment is \$904 million. These savings and investments enable our higher education system to get through this difficult financial downturn.

I am grateful for the opportunity to represent you at the Capitol. I will keep you


ity, Medicare and Medicaid over the next 19 years (10,000 Americans turn 65 every day and the odds are 25 percent of them will live to be 90 or older);

Smith receives 2016 Leonard Wyatt award

The Samuel Roberts Noble Foundation presented Robert Smith with the 2016 Leonard Wyatt Memorial Outstanding Cooperator Award during a special presentation yesterday at the organization's all-employee meeting.

The Leonard Wyatt Memorial Outstanding Cooperator Award is given annually to one of the 1,500 farmers and ranchers who work with the Noble Foundation's Agricultural Division.

As part of its mission, the organization provides farmers, ranchers and other land managers - called cooperators - with no-cost consultation services and educational programs in an effort to help them achieve their financial, production, stewardship and quality-of-life goals.

"Robert is a small-scale progressive producer who uses all the information and resources available to make informed decisions," said Hugh Aljoe, producer relations manager. "We are proud of the lasting relationship we have forged with Robert and the Smith family, and we are proud of all that he has accomplished."

Criteria for the Leonard Wyatt Memorial Outstanding Cooperator Award are based on accomplishments within the farmer or rancher's operation, their community service and their willingness to assist other producers.

Smith and his wife, Joyce, live in Noble and run a small

cow-calf operation of 40 head on 200 acres. He utilizes prescribed fire and intensive grazing for brush control and land management, which also lessens his need to feed hay in the winter.

"It's an honor to receive this award," Smith said. "I'm pleased to see the progress I've made through the guidance of the Noble Foundation. Patience is key, along with the Noble Foundation's efforts, to building a successful operation. I sincerely appreciate the Foundation's commitment to helping producers and advancing agriculture."

Smith became a cooperator in 2004 and an Integrity Beef Alliance Program founding member in 2007.

"Every year has been profitable for him, except for one when he had to repair a tractor engine," Aljoe said. "Robert is proof that small-scale producers can have positive return to the operation when land and resources are well-managed."

Smith shares his knowledge and experience with his peers in the agriculture industry by hosting educational events for both the Noble Foundation and local county extension. As a fireman by trade, he also contributes to the Noble Foundation's prescribed fire programs.

Smith and his wife have three children, Steven, David and

Houseplant care

With the cooler temperatures of fall and winter fast approaching, our gardening interest often turns from plants outside to plants indoors.

Success with houseplants is governed by one's careful management of light, temperature, water, nutrients, and humidity, along with using the proper potting medium.

Light

Very few plants tolerate dark corners. Most houseplants require the light that would be found within four to eight feet of a bright south window. Some will tolerate a spot very near the window, while others will prefer less light some distance away.

Too little light can result in tall, lanky, small-leaved plants. Too much light can cause leaf burn on sensitive species like African violet. If the room is not naturally lit, artificial lights should be used.

Temperature

Most houseplants prosper in a temperature of 65°F to 75°F, but the humidity of the average home is too low to suit them.

A plant prospers in relative humidity of about 50 to 60 percent, which is more than most people like. This can be helped by using a humidifier or by setting the pot on a tray of moist gravel or pebbles.

Do not allow the water to touch the bottom of the pot, as the water would then be wicked into the potting medium and keep the plant too wet.

Watering

More houseplants succumb from improper watering than from any other single cause. In general, most houseplants need to be thoroughly watered and then allowed to nearly dry

before the next irrigation. Use tepid water when watering houseplants.

Enough water needs to be poured over the potting medium to allow water to drain freely through the drain hole at every watering.

If water does not drain out the bottom, re-water until it drains freely. Never leave a houseplant standing in water, as this will cause root rot.

Drainage

Drainage is an integral part of watering a plant. If a decorative, drainless pot is desired, it would be better to use a "pot within a pot" technique: pot the plant in a container with drain holes and then set that into the larger, decorative pot. Never allow excess water to collect in the outer pot.

Potting Medium

Consult your local garden center, greenhouse or florist

for help selecting an appropriate potting medium.

It is important that the potting medium has good water holding capacity, yet is loose enough to promote good drainage and aeration.

Fertilizers

The easiest way to fertilize your houseplants is while watering. Select a houseplant fertilizer and dilute according to label directions.

Houseplants can be fertilized at every watering with a very dilute rate or fertilized at a slightly higher rate once every third or fourth watering.

Do not fertilize as often or as much in the winter, in dimly-lit rooms or in potting mixes that contain soil.

away from the ballot box.

"It's a political decision, not a policy decision," he said. "These are laws that make sense for Republicans because it helps Republicans win seats."

Bryan Dean, a spokesman for the State Election Board, said there have been several cases of election fraud prosecuted in the state in recent years. However, he said he is not aware of any instance where the fraud was because of voter impersonation.

Monday's decision came after a lengthy legal fight that ini-

tially saw another district court judge dismiss the case in 2012 by ruling that Gentges lacked standing to bring the challenge. That decision was overturned by the Oklahoma Supreme Court in 2014 and sent back to the district court level.

Rescuing rabbits

Purcell family opens home, hearts to unwanted bunnies

It's no accident that life in Jeff and Cecilia Harris' home revolves around rabbits.

Since they acquired their first pet rabbit in 2009, their interest in — and devotion to — the animals has grown.

Grown so much, in fact, that they were led to found Bun Hatter Rabbit Rescue which they operate out of their home in Purcell.

"We just grew into it," Jeff said.

Their son, Liam, wanted a pet and since the couple believes dogs are going to bite eventually and the boy is allergic to cats, their pet choices were limited.

Mini-Bun was the first, adopted off of Craigslist. Countless others have hopped through the Harris' rescue since, the most recent being a doe rabbit and her newborn litter.

Bun Hatter acquired those when Cecilia took a call from Norman Animal Control.

"Virtually all the rabbits we get, people have dumped them or taken them to animal control," Jeff said. "People get them as Easter pets or they decide 'Our bunny is lonely.' So they get another rabbit and multiplication happens."

Bun Hatter doesn't take in cottontails. It requires a special license to care for wild rabbits and when any do come their way, they take them to Wild Care, a wildlife rehabilitator in Noble.

"We just do domesticated rabbits," Jeff said.

"And believe me, there are plenty of those," Cecilia continued. "We have defective bunnies no one wants anymore."

They patronize Tractor Supply here for all their rabbit supplies, but for veterinary care, they have to travel to northwest Oklahoma City to Dr. Michelle Leak's practice.

"They are small animals, but they're not cats," Cecilia said, explaining the need for a vet

who specializes in rabbits. "She is part of a group in Oklahoma City that helps with rescue."

All the rabbits that they adopt out are spayed or neutered first.

They also collaborate with other rescues, including Wildrescue Inc., in Denton, Texas, and Rabbit Rescue OKC in the city.

Bun Hatter participates in greet-the-rabbit adoption events. One upcoming event will be at Tractor Supply on September 17. And on September 22, they will have rabbits at Freddy's on Main Street in Norman.

Their Bun Hatter presence on Facebook has more than 16,000 likes. Fans hail from as far away as Australia and Malaysia to the United Kingdom.

For whatever reason — and they haven't a clue — their greatest fan base can be found in Bangkok, Thailand.

Cecilia makes hats and costumes for the rabbits and Jeff is in charge of photo shoots.

Their efforts have resulted in calendars and picture books (the latest was an all-rabbit

adaptation of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol.")

"We do it for fun and to make people laugh," Jeff said.

Their sales aren't enough to cover the expenses they incur caring for rabbits.

Anyone interested in contributing to Bun Hatter can purchase gift cards at Tractor Supply or contact the rescue through Facebook.

The Harrises moved here in 2014 from North Texas. And they plan to remain here for several more years as Liam loves Purcell schools and wants to graduate from Purcell High School.

Jeff teleworks for his job in medical database communication. Cecilia is enrolled in an online leadership program at the University of Oklahoma that gives her plenty of time to stay home with the bunnies.

"We never thought we'd turn into a rescue when we adopted the first bunny," Cecilia said.

"People throw them away," Jeff continued. "How can you not do something?"

service in the area of furniture repair for those retailers.

As the business "ramped up," the Brancos opened a furniture repair shop in Woodcrest, Calif.

"We started that business and the next thing I knew, we were hiring people. We were that busy."

The company grew to five employees, including Joe and his dad.

After the elder Branco retired in 2003, he began to travel. A niece was a horse trainer and working for a farm near Purcell. Often, his travels brought him to Oklahoma.

"The next thing I knew, Dad said he'd bought a place," Joe said.

That was 2005 and the brick home was situated on 40 peaceful acres on 210th Street between Ladd and Sooner Roads.

His father called it "my dream home."

Joe said his father died not long after settling into the home.

Joe felt drawn to his father's dream. But his wife, Gayle, had made her own career working for the City of Riverside as a customer service representative.

While Joe and Gayle discussed it and prayed about it,

the house sat vacant.

"I didn't want to let it (the house) go out of the family," Joe said. "My wife and I talked about it probably a good two years."

And then things just sort of fell into place.

Gayle retired from her job after 20 years and their son, who is also named Joe, moved to Oklahoma to attend Oklahoma City Community College while working for Bass Pro Shop.

"He fell in love with it (Oklahoma)," Joe said.

Joe and Gayle put their home in California up for sale and moved their lives and business to the home place.

Their roots are already deep in Oklahoma soil.

Extended family lives just down the road and the Brancos are members at Emmanuel Baptist Church in Purcell.

Their son recently graduated from OCCC with a 4.0 grade point, receiving a degree in cyber security. He is engaged and works for a large firm in downtown Oklahoma City.

Daughter Jennifer, 27, lives at home and is her dad's helper in the scaled back shop located in a metal building back of the house.

Gayle is enjoying retired life and bit by bit, the couple is making the house and land their own.

"We lived in the country before, but it was country/city," Joe explained.

The pace is slower than what it was in California, but little by little word of Joe Branco and what he can do with wood and furniture is spreading.

"Work is coming in and we are being blessed," he said. "Keeping full time with odd jobs will be nice for me. I love it."

When he's not at work in his shop, Joe can frequently be found at a "big fishing pond" on the property.

Joe said his dad created beautiful furniture from bits and pieces that were fire damaged or just discarded by owners.

He watched those transitions — and learned.

The transition never failed to amaze him. Wood, he added, is "always reusable."

"I hate to see people throw furniture away by the side of the road," he explained. "The way I see it, we're not cutting down all the beautiful trees we see."

"There's nothing you can do to hurt wood."

Modesto Regalado, 78, and his wife, Belinda, 57.

Purcell police were called to the couple's home at 224 Gros Ventre at 10:53 p.m. to investigate a report of gunshots.

When officers entered the house, they found the couple "in close proximity" in a hallway, the detective said.

Two other family members, including a 15-year-old juvenile, were in the home when the shootings occurred, Stephens said.

Both victims were reportedly alive when police arrived, but Modesto Regalado was pronounced dead minutes

later by Wadley EMS paramedics.

Belinda Regalado was unconscious and transported to Norman Regional Hospital where she later died.

Stephens said police recovered a firearm, but he declined to say the type or caliber.

Four shots were fired and all were accounted for, he added. Belinda Regalado had been shot more than one time.

Stephens said police had made two domestic related calls to the home over the past three days.

Those incidents involved threats and intimidation from

outside the house. Stephens said identity of the aggressor in those incidents isn't known, he added.

Police called in the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation to assist.

OSBI "has resources to work a crime scene beyond what we have," Stephens said.

Police are also awaiting autopsy results from the state medical examiner's office.

Stephens said police questioned the other occupants of the house before releasing the scene around 6 a.m. Tuesday. They were to be interviewed again on Wednesday.

Power:

2 1/2 hours unlike Purcell where the juice was off for 7 1/2 hours.

The lighting came from a thunderstorm that blew through the area in the wee hours of Saturday morning. After the pole burned the cross arm broke causing the electric outage.

City manager Dale Bunn said the lighting strike followed the ground and was hot enough to catch the pole on fire, basically at the corner of Hardcastle Blvd. and Chandler Road.

"It was a shared pole for the city and OG&E," Bunn said. "The electricity blipped so OG&E and the city turned off the power," Bunn said.

Rerouting of the power was deemed risky and that is the reason the entire city was without power.

"We had some concerns about the switching," the city manager said. "We are in the process of isolating some of the switching and restructuring to avoid this from happening again."

The biggest delay faced by both the City of Purcell electric department and OG&E crews was digging a hole for a new pole.

A natural gas line was located right where they were to dig the hole for the replacement pole.

"We had to locate the line

and the normal locate contractor was unable to locate it," Bunn said. "We called ONG to come out but they couldn't find it either."

"Since we knew we were going to be drilling right there by it so we called in our VACTOR. It is able to use a combination of high pressure water and suction that allowed us to drill the six foot hole."

Since OG&E was also on the pole it allowed them to restore the cross arms and reset the wiring.

Waiting for the location of the gas line was by far the most time consuming portion of the process.

Bunn said once all the equipment was in place it took about an hour getting all the switching figured out.

"We were backing into the system from the OG&E line overhead. It was a dangerous situation for our guys and the OG&E guys."

Working for the city electric department were Trey Phillips, Brian Morris, Dillon Gardner, Jason Tacker and Anthony Lamirand. Bobby Green operated the VACTOR machine.

Former Purcell Electric Department employee Ray Taylor was the foreman for the OG&E crew.

During the power outage, part of the Purcell 911 dispatch center was incapacitat-

ed due to a generator failure. Also, cell phone service and internet service was out of commission for about a 1 1/2 hours when an AT&T tower was down. It lost power and then had a generator malfunction.

Purcell Emergency Management Director Kevin Rhoads made a robo call to some cell phone customers early in the outage letting citizens know about the situation.

Some citizens did not get the call. Rhoads explained you can get in the system simply by going onto the city of Purcell website and signing up under the residents tab.

It has been estimated Purcell businesses lost nearly \$300,000 in sales city-wide or about \$12,566 in sales tax dollars during the 7 1/2 hours of no electricity.

Reports are in that Walmart lost thousands of dollars of product during the outage in addition to not being able to make sales.

Power was restored at 1:24 p.m.

During the outage a handful of businesses were able to continue business thanks to generators.

Among those were both McClain Bank and First United, Turner's Drug, Purcell Municipal Hospital, the McClain County Courthouse and jail and Cash Saver grocery store.



“It was a good scrimmage,” Higbee said.





In Catoosa schools, cash for new buildings but cuts for classrooms

Perhaps nowhere in Oklahoma is the irony of school funding more stark than in Catoosa Public Schools, a district of 2,100 students 15 miles east of Tulsa.

School bonds have resulted in an infusion of cash, spent on MacBook computers for all middle and high school students, a monolithic dome cafeteria that doubles as a tornado shelter, new air conditioner units, buses and a plethora of other upgrades. The school board in July approved a contract to build a \$1.5 million press box with an elevator at the high school football field.

The bond-issue proceeds — Catoosa reported \$5 million in fiscal year 2015 in its latest audit — go into a special fund that can only be used for remodeling or repairing buildings, not salaries or operating expenses.

So while the school district is scrimping in some ways — switching to a four-day week to save \$200,000, staff reductions — it's simultaneously investing millions in school buildings, drawing the ire of some parents.

Superintendent Rick Kibbe said the recent construction is the final stage of a long-term plan started with the first of three successive bond initiatives in 2008.

"When you build a school building, you're building it for 30-plus years down the road," Kibbe said. "As far as the vision goes, we need to make it

an investment for the future."

The four-day school week, on the other hand, will be re-evaluated every year, Kibbe said.

That's little consolation to parents like Chris Buhler, who is irked by the board's decisions to move to a four-day week and, more recently, use surplus money from land sales to pay for the press box.

The \$1.5 million construction contract for the press box project was approved at a special meeting July 18. The district is using \$824,000 in

occurs.

Two Catoosa board members, Amy Shouse and Dean Miller, voted against the press box proposal but neither would speak with Oklahoma Watch about their decision.

Buhler, who grew up in Catoosa and whose daughters attend Catoosa schools, said he would like to see the board focus on other priorities.

"That money could have bought us another year of having a five-day school week and not having our kids in school eight hours a day," Buhler said. "They could have even bought the teachers' school supplies ... They're not looking at the community itself. They're looking at what's best for the superintendent, the way I see it."

A total of 75 percent of voters approved the most recent bond, in 2013: \$21.2 million for technology and building upgrades. The district promoted the bond issue with messages on its website such as, "No projected tax increase!" and "The dream continues!"

The projects include a \$4 million cafeteria for middle and high school students that doubles as a storm shelter and at least \$4 million for technol-

ogy improvements. With the dome shelter, Catoosa, where seven people died in a tornado in 1993, joins some other communities adding safe rooms to schools. The bond issue also paid for a turf football field, microscopes and textbooks.

When Kibbe joined the district in 2007, a budget shortfall had just spurred the loss of 26 jobs, causing high school students to stage a walkout, according to the Tulsa World.

In April 2008, he successfully spearheaded the first of three successive school bond initiatives, generating \$9.9 million for remodeling the school and purchasing new equipment and buses. A second bond in 2010 generated about \$10 million.

Kibbe, who earned a \$132,975 base salary as superintendent last year, ran for a state House seat this year but lost in the primary. He also ran in 2002, Oklahoma Ethics Commission records show.

Very good day! Welcome to more "front porch."

Matthew's gospel is many things, and in the 16th chapter we see a very special element in this story of our Lord. For the first time, Matthew records the concept of a church, making Matthew's gospel uniquely the "church" gospel. Of the four gospels, only Matthew mentions the church, the first time here in the 16th chapter.

This important teaching regarding the church occurs when Jesus comes to the coasts of Caesarea Philippi, where He turns to the disciples and asks whom men say He is. The disciples had heard many whispers among the people as to who this Jesus is — John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, one of the other prophets — but the Lord is more concerned with whom his disciples think He is.

Peter, in one of his greatest moments, makes that great confession there on the coasts of Caesarea Philippi: He says to the Lord confidently, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (v. 16). It is a confession every man should make, one every man must make to go to heaven.

The Lord commends the outspoken apostle for stating the world's greatest truth and reminds him that this knowledge did not come through "flesh and blood" but from the Father in heaven. Then Matthew quotes the Lord's next powerful words: "And I say also unto thee, That

thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (v. 18). What a great announcement!

For the first time we hear about the Lord's intention — no, more than that, His promise — that it is His eternal mission to build the church. This promise is so engraved in heaven's record that even Hades will not prevent this church from being established — that is, Satan's crucifying of our Lord at Calvary will not prevent our Lord from rising triumphantly from the grave to seal the building of this great church!

We are so thankful today that Matthew reaches into his vocabulary and pulls out the Greek "ekklesia" to introduce the world to the church of our Lord Jesus Christ. Literally, it is the "called out." Of course, we know it is not only Matthew's doing: it is the inspiration of the Holy Spirit (John 14:26). Matthew will again mention the "ekklesia" twice in chapter 18, verse 17, regarding handling of disputes in the church.

I want us all to appreciate fully this introduction to the church. Matthew — the writer of a "Messianic" gospel — harmonizes his teachings regarding the Messiah with the prophets of old who prophesy of the coming of this great institution, Isaiah telling us that the day will come when the "mountain of the Lord's house" will be established in the city of

Jerusalem (Isaiah 2:2-3).

We know through a careful journey through the New Testament that this "church" — the "ekklesia" — arrives on the day of Pentecost, as recorded in the second chapter of Acts. It is in the book of Acts that the inspired writer Luke writes the history of the early church.

Luke records in the second chapter that 3000 people in Jerusalem respond to the first gospel sermon — repenting and being baptized for the remission of sins (v. 38) — then adding at the end of the chapter that "the Lord added to the church daily those who were being saved" (v. 47). Those who, upon their faith in the Lord Jesus, make that great decision to repent and be baptized are then "added to the church."

There is so much more to say about this grand church; but for now we are thankful that in our study of Matthew we get an early glimpse into its importance and its place in the Lord's plan. Shortly after the events of Matthew 16, the Lord will have in place a plan for us to receive the gospel and be added to that great institution that Jesus will "purchase with his own blood" (Acts 20:28). First, of course, would come the shedding of blood, the story Matthew will soon record in his gospel.

Faith Pointe Baptist Church is used as a voting location. We will be closed on Tuesday, August the 23. Please mark this date on your calendar and remember to vote.

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Corner is not affiliated with any other organization. Our services are only provided at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, 3404 NW 36th, in Norman.

Today we recognize a Marine veteran from Edmond as our Volunteer of the Week. I'm proud to have Ralph Coleman as a volunteer. Ralph has been a volunteer with us for more than a year. During that time his knowledge of the VA claims process has grown each week.

Being a veteran himself, he understands the problems that many other veterans have encountered in the transition from military to civilian life. Ralph is married to Chaney who sup-

ports the work he does for other veterans and their families.

Last week we assisted 193 veterans and surviving spouses with their VA claims and questions. As the Accredited VA Claims Agent for the men and women whom we represent, I receive all of their VA rating decisions. This enables us to know if what we are doing is helping each veteran or surviving spouse who are represented by us. We send a notice out to each person who is approved or denied detailing what other benefits they are eligible to receive or to return if they received a denial of benefits.

There were four veterans who received a VA disability rating of 100 percent for their service connected conditions. The total combined annual benefit for these disabled veterans will be \$151,469 per year. I received rating decisions on 20 veterans who were approved for VA benefits ranging from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. Their combined annual payments will be \$257,621.52 per year.

We had two surviving spouses who were approved for DIC payments. These ladies will receive a combined annual benefit of \$30,100 per year. We assist those who qualify to file for the VA Aid and Attendance for veterans or their spouses. Last week we received decision's approving this benefit for a combined total of \$39,849.24.

Our drivers Clayton Lee and Louie Metseff were very busy last week transporting veterans to their VA appointments. The total mileage for both of these drivers was more than 1,000 miles. I appreciate what these two veterans are doing to make a difference in the lives of our veterans and their families.

I appreciate our folks who help our surviving spouses each week. They saw about 20 people just last week. Like with our other groups, we are seeing an increase in the numbers of surviving spouses who come to visit us each week at Faith Pointe Baptist Church. We often hear from this group they didn't even know VA benefits were available to them.

We have several people from Legal Aid who are available each Tuesday and Thursday morning to help veterans with legal matters. Their services are free to all veterans. I appreciate what they are doing to help veterans navigate the legal system. All of us could use a little help from time to time.

As we grow closer to our one-year anniversary at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, I would like to say that there have been many changes that we have undergone. One of the biggest has been the establishment of policies and procedures that will be used to guide this organization after all of us are gone. The implementation of these rules has been difficult for everyone involved. My hope is that by setting up these guidelines, we will qualify for grants and other funding sources that will allow us to serve a larger number of veterans and spouses and to continue this mission for the next generation of veterans and their families.

There is no place that I know of that provides the quality of representation to veterans and surviving spouses as they navigate the VA claims process. The assistance that we provide with rent, utilities, food items, medical testing or other services is significant. Since February 2016 we have provided more than \$190,000 used to support the needs of veterans and their families.

As we are averaging close to 200 veterans and surviving spouses being assisted each week, we are on schedule to see close to 10,000 veterans and surviving spouses this year. If our economy continues as it has the last couple of years, these numbers may also continue

to grow. We are continually seeking men and women who would like to join our team of volunteers who would like to make a difference in the lives of others.

Every week we see veterans who have recently been discharged and others who are 60 plus years of age who have been laid off from their jobs. I recently had an Army veteran who was my age who said he could not feed his family after losing his job. I want to make a difference in his life along with the thousands of others who are in the same shape.

I appreciate the many volunteers who have given their time to help others. Over the last 12 to 14 years there have been many volunteers who have helped us to improve the lives of our veterans and their families. Some of them have stayed with us many years while others only a short time. I sincerely appreciate every person who has been a part of what we do.

On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214's (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham's Veteran's Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.





\$75K-plus missing

DA – Dibble clerk embezzled funds

A former Town of Dibble employee allegedly embezzled more than \$75,600 from city coffers and now faces an embezzlement charge in McClain County District Court.

An arrest warrant for Brandy D. Dover, 36, of Lindsay, is outstanding.

According to an affidavit, an Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation special agent was called in by mayor Doug Gilleland to conduct the investigation.

Gilleland told Tommy Johnson the Dibble Town Council appointed Dover the city/court clerk in February 2014.

Among Dover's duties

was receiving payments for fines and water bills, making bank deposits and paying the town's bills.

When Gilleland examined bank statements, however, he reportedly discovered no cash had been deposited for several months.

When asked about this, Dover allegedly told the mayor she held the cash back to make change.

The council fired Dover in February 2016. At that time there was only about \$1,200 cash on hand, according to the affidavit.

The council hired a certified public accountant to examine records and determine how much cash should have been depos-

ited into the town's bank account.

Chris Angel, the CPA, examined all the cash receipt books from the two years Dover was clerk.

He reported a cash shortage of \$75,638.24 from September 2014 until February 2016.

According to Dibble Police Chief Jeff Franklin, Dover had sole access to the cash.

The town provided a floor safe in which Dover was to secure cash between deposits.

The safe was in Dover's office, which was locked after hours and on weekends.

Dover was the only employee who had the combination, Franklin added.

New law requires young cyclists to take rider safety course

A new state law that goes into effect August 26 requires motorists younger than 18 who apply for a motorcycle endorsement on their driver's license, to complete a certified motorcycle safety basic rider course.

Rep. Chuck Hoskin, D-Vinita—himself a motorcycle rider “for more than 50 years”—was the principal author of House Bill 2260, which cleared both houses of the Legislature and was signed by Governor Fallin.

The bill requires anyone

who is 16 or 17 and applies for a motorcycle endorsement on his/her driver's license to first complete a certified Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) rider course approved by the state Department of Public Safety.

Previously, riders in that age group had the option of either completing an MSF training course or appearing before a Department of Public Safety driver's license examiner to take the motorcycle written and driving test. However,

under the new law, the MSF test must be completed in advance.

The motorcycle written and driving tests will be waived, but applicants for an original license will be required to take the basic law test and vision screening.

“By requiring formal training for riders under the age of 18, this bill will save lives and prevent injuries,” said John Pierce

Dragons have new coach

John Higbee and staff have versatile players

As John Higbee enters his 27th year as a football coach one thing is completely different. The first 26 years that included five years at Noble, one year at Haltom City, Texas, 12 years at Ada, one year at East Central University and the last seven years at Clinton had one thing in common.

Higbee was an assistant coach.

Now he is the head coach of the Purcell Dragons.

"I've been a Bear, a Buffalo, a Cougar, a Tiger and a Tornado," Higbee said. "Now I'm a Dragon."

Coming out of high school Higbee was going to play football at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College in Miami.

"I was hurt before I went up there and it got even worse," Higbee said referring to a back injury that plagues him to this day.

Higbee eventually ended up at Oklahoma State University where he earned his degree.

"They talked me into being a manager for the football team," Higbee said with a slight grin.

That was a memorable year, however.

It just so happens that was the year the Cowboys' Barry Sanders won the Heisman Trophy.

"Also on that team were Coach (Mike) Gundy at quarterback and receiver Hart Lee Dykes. Thurman Thomas had just left," Higbee said.

Higbee and his staff welcome back seven returning starters on both sides of the ball and find the stable relatively well stocked with athletes both in the line and skilled kids as well.

The offense: Multiple

"We'll run some gun but will move the ball around," Higbee confirmed.

Higbee's run based offense will be "backfield by committee, at least at first."

Among Dragons who will see playing time at tailback are Brett Webb, Omar Brown, Waylon Steiner, Isaiah Couch and Jarrett Sweeney.

"Sweeney can play tailback or fullback or slot," Higbee said. "He's very versatile."

The new head coach said any of those tailbacks could also be used at fullback.

"I don't know if we are going to break big plays but we're going to be able to move the ball," Higbee said. "Our backs need to see where the holes are and make their cuts

accordingly."

Also in the possible mix for fullback duty are Caylin Nimmo, Jalyn Shea and Ethan Wayland.

Another very versatile senior for the Dragons is Dylan Collateta.

A lineman by trade, Collateta could also slide into the fullback slot or even tight end.

"He's pretty intelligent and has good feet," Higbee said. "That's one of the fun parts of being a brand new coach. Some of what you do is an experiment since you don't really know where everyone belongs."

If Collateta does play fullback or tight end that would make him an offensive lineman backup, the coach said.

In the early pre-season Ben Claunch was the right tackle and Edgar Garcia was the right guard along with senior Chris Rader.

Kyle Varner was penciled in at center and Claudio Munoz was the left guard. Trey Haley was the left tackle.

Also in the line mix is Ethan Hall and Darrell Kimball. Dylan

"He is about as versatile as Sweeney," Higbee said. "He can play on either side of the ball. We've just got to find the spots where Kimbrell and Sweeney can be the most effective."

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

The defense: 50

"Of course it all depends how they develop but I think we can come up with six guys (to rotate) in the defensive line," Higbee said. "It just depends on how everybody responds and wants to play."

The coach said Kaleb Miller could also help.


"He can run," Higbee confirmed.

'Dawgs loaded with experience

Hall welcomes back 10 starters on each side of the ball

With 10 returning starters checking into fall camp for the Lexington Bulldogs, coach Jeff Hall has trouble not breaking into a smile.

But Hall and his Bulldogs will need all the experience they can muster since they are moving from Class 2A to Class 3A and are in the same district with their arch rival Purcell Dragons.

The only starters lost to graduation off last year's 5-6 playoff team are John Burton and Tyler Brown.

Other seniors who moved on last year were Nathan Ford, Luis Solis, Austin Bridgeford and Brady Jones.

Hall begins his fifth season at the helm of the Bulldogs and is 34-18 at Lexington and 57-37 overall as a head coach.

The offense: Flex Bone

Quarterback Toby Prevost returns for his sophomore campaign after starting nine games last year as a freshman.

The surprise sensation of last season was the emergence of then sophomore Zach Smith.

After starting the season as the third team running back, Smith rushed for 2,100 yards and 21 touchdowns and was the Heart of Oklahoma Offensive Player of the Year.

"Zach is a perfect example of someone taking advantage of an opportunity," Hall said. "Solis got hurt in a scrimmage and we put him in and he went lights out. Our coaches got together afterwards and said we can't keep him off the field.

"This year he's bigger and faster and is just going to be a junior. He's put on a lot of weight and still got faster. And on top of all of that, he's a great kid."

Alex Estrada will line up in the slot.

Last year's slot receiver was Broc Sukenis. But this year Hall and his staff have asked Sukenis to move to center.

"Broc truly doesn't care where he's asked to play," Hall said. "He cares about the team's success and will be the example I will always use. He is 100 percent for the team and will do whatever it takes. Some guys give it lip service but Broc is all in."

Dusty Gullion will man the left tackle position while Fischer Bowling will be the left guard.

Junior Caden Jones has moved to guard to give the Bulldogs more depth in the line. Greyson Griffith will be the right tackle while Dylan Reed and Tanner Weston will be the receivers.

Junior Hunter Findley will provide experience in the receiving corps and in the defensive backfield for Lexington this year after getting his feet wet as a sophomore last season.

"We're very optimistic," Hall said of the 2016 offensive unit. "Historically, in this offense the first year is a learning curve and year two gives us more flexibility.

"We were limited on our play calling last year. It is so detailed," Hall explained. "We already saw in the spring that we were miles ahead of where we were this time last year because the kids know the scheme."

Hall explained the Flex bone offensive success depends on the big eaters up front.

"This offense doesn't work if you don't have a good offensive line. They are the key," he said. "They don't get the glory but nobody gets the glory if they don't perform."

Hall said the Flex Bone offense simply takes what the defense will give it.

"This offense is predicated on what the defense does. We don't predetermine who gets the carries. We read it almost every time. Toby did it last year and we feel confident in him going into the season.

"Cameron Webster, who was penciled in as a starter, missed the entire season. He's back," Hall said. "Tanner Weston was injured in the first game and he's back.

"I think overall we will be better this season," he continued. "Of course in 3A the competition is going to be better but I'm pleased with the progress that has been made."


Offensive coordinator Aaron Dillard said one goal of the offense this season is to finish what they start.

“We’ve been young for so long,” Hall said. “It’ll be nice to have some upper classmen.”



"They were always on me to be better than I was and I try to do the same thing for my kids now. It was the same thing from my coaches about going to college and getting my degree."

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






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











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







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






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Speed to burn Warriors' key

Beller said if the offensive line comes together this



"In total we ended up with 22 guys starting at some point during the season on defense.



have the ability to get speed on the field with our personnel groupings to be heavy or light. It will depend on the needs at the time," Beller said.



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

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

That dream has come true and now the former Washington Warrior, who was a Heart of Oklahoma Offensive Lineman of the Year in 2000, is the head football and head baseball coach at Hobart High School.

Coming out of high school, where he had a stellar career, Allison went on to play college football at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, earning a bachelors degree in education in 2005.

Allison did his student teaching at Clinton before accepting his first full time coaching position at

Merritt High School.

He coached there for 2 1/2 years before accepting the head baseball coaching position at Sayre where he was also an assistant football coach and defensive coordinator.

In the fall of 2013 Allison served one year as assistant coach and then was promoted to head football coach at Velma-Alma.

Allison coached the Hobart Bearcats in baseball this past spring and in April was hired as the head football coach. He will head up both sports for the Bearcats.

Ironically, the Bearcats will travel to Washington in Week 8 of this season's football schedule.

It won't be Allison's first rodeo back at his Alma Mater. He coached baseball teams from both Velma

and Sayre against the Warriors at Washington.

But it will be his first time to set foot on Reed Field wearing some other color than red.

Allison said there were obviously things he learned at Washington that prepared him for college and the real world after that.

"But the coaches I played for coach (Dennis) McCray, coach (Keith) Hamilton and Darren Roberson... those guys had a huge influence on me," Allison said.

"I've known what I wanted to do since high school," he continued. "That's when A.J. Brewer was the principal. They prepared me for college, no doubt about it."

About the Week 8 date at Reed Field.

"It'll be a little different," he said. "I'm sure I will be a little more anxious and excited and nervous. Probably a little more so than other nights. Obviously I want to put on a good show. Hopefully we can."

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















Wayne to rely on experience

Brandon Sharp will start nine seniors on both sides of the ball this season

With nine seniors penciled in to start on both sides of the ball, the 2016 edition of Wayne football could be a season to remember.

Coming off last year's 6-5 record, Sharp and his Bulldogs have a couple of holes to fill but otherwise look poised to make a good run this season.

Graduation took the likes of Trevor Blackwell, Chris Caudle, Bryer Hanner, Isidro Ibarra and Brody Groff.

However, the Bulldogs return eight starters on offense including Jackson Embry at quarterback, Braden Smith at running back, Jace Elliott at fullback, Fayte Givens at wide receiver, Brock Walck at wide receiver, Zach Madden and Gabe Lablanc at tackles and Jordan Esparza in the offensive line.

Others who have playing experience that rotated in and out last year include Justin Montanez and Colton Smith.

The offense: Shotgun and spread

"We will run a lot of inside and outside zone with jet sweeps and the option," head coach Brandon Sharp said. "It'll be mostly a one back but we will also mix in some two back gun formations."

The Bulldogs have moved Esparza over to center to take over for Blackwell. The two new guards for the Bulldogs this fall will be Martine Flores and Cole Mills.

Last season Flores split time with Caudle at guard.

Sharp said the tackles this season will be Lablanc and Madden.

Those big eaters will be paving the way for a bevy of seasoned and very talented skilled kids, the coach confirmed.

Embry returns to quarterback the Bulldogs after playing well in his junior campaign.

"He ran the ball well and came up with big time plays

for us down the stretch," Sharp said. "He's solid and is bigger, stronger and faster than he was last year.

"Jackson has had a good summer and we're expecting good things from him," the coach said.

Smith and Jordan Womack will be in the backfield.

Womack has moved back to Wayne after a year in Norman.

"He's a good player and has a chance to be a really good one for us," Sharp said of Womack.

"The strength of the offense is that we have a great group of skilled guys," Sharp continued. "But everything goes back to experience. These seniors have been running our system for three years and know what's expected of them.

"Just their experience and that fact that we are starting nine seniors on both sides of the ball is key.

"We have a good group in the offensive line with Cole (Mills) being the only real newcomer. They have a good

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chance to be a real good unit.
