## Appeal rejected

Judge upholds Underwood verdict

More than 8 years after he was sentenced to die for the brutal murder of 10-year-old Jamie Rose Bolin, Kevin Ray Underwood last week lost his death sentence appeal in U.S. District Court.

Underwood's attorneys had argued their client's mental illness made him ineligible for the death penalty.

That claim was rejected by

U.S. District Judge Timothy DeGiusti.

Now 36, Underwood was 26 when he lured his young neighbor into his apartment with a ruse of letting the fifth grader play with his pet rat and watch a SpongeBob cartoon video.

It was April 12, 2006, and within minutes, Underwood

## Stamping out hunger

Area youth lending a hand

As summer nears an end, 128 Oklahoma teenagers converged on Camp Big Cedars (15 miles East of Lexington) to help stamp out hunger in developing countries.

American Farmers and Ranchers (AFR) insurance held its annual Youth Leadership Summit week.

As a culminating event the 128 Oklahoma high school

sophomores, juniors, and seniors joined forces with the non-profit organization Stamp Out Starvation to package and ship 75,000 meals destined for Haiti.

Stamp Out Starvation Director Monty Stewart said they also work with regional food banks to help people in need stateside as well.

The meals contain rice, soy, 21 vitamins and minerals, and dehydrated vegetables.

Added to boiled water and

cooked until the rice is done the meals contain enough food to feed six people in underfed countries.

Stewart noted that for an average American or for somebody that is in a well fed country the prepackage meals will feed four people.

The organization has packaged more than 2.26 million meals in 2015 and are on

## Snake bites to people, pets and livestock

Snakebites do not typically occur because the reptile is attacking or being overly aggressive. Rather, most are the result of the timid creature being startled and going into self-defense mode.

"There is no need to be fearful of snakes. They aren't trying to bite you," said Dwayne Elmore, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist. "Give venomous snakes a wide berth and they will move away from you. Most bites occur when someone either puts their hand where they can't see (and inadvertently on or near a snake) or when someone is harassing or trying to kill a snake."

The same can be said for pets and livestock that are bitten. The curious nature of dogs leads to some incidents and horses may accidentally step on or put their head down to look at a snake.

In the rare event someone is actually bitten by a venomous snake, there are several things they should not do, and one they definitely should.

"Don't panic. Don't use a tourniquet. Don't cut the wound

and don't use electricity," said Elmore. "Just stay calm, elevate the wounded area and get to a hospital immediately."

The advice also is true for pets, as they should be taken to the veterinarian immediately. There are a few first-aid tactics you could try on your way, however.

"Try to carry your pet rather than allowing them to walk and keep them quiet and warm during transport to the veterinarian," said Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at OSU.

Tourniquets should not be applied as it can cause additional harm. While bites from nonvenomous snakes can cause swelling and bruising, bites from venomous snakes can have much more serious symptoms.

"Generally there is extensive swelling that spreads rapidly. The bite wound may bleed or produce a bloody discharge," she said. "The bite wounds from the fangs may not be visible due to the swelling or the small mouth size of young or small snakes. Shortly after being bitten, dogs may dem-

onstrate weakness, cool feet, pale mucous membranes and hyperventilation. The gums may turn pale or blue. It's not uncommon for snake venom to also cause vomiting shortly after the initial bite occurs."

The quicker pet owners are able to get their animals to the vet the better. Bites on or near the head tend to be more severe than bites to the leg and paws. The same is true for livestock.

"I don't think you want to panic about snakes with horses. You have to think about how big they are," said Kris Hiney, OSU Cooperative Extension equine specialist. "Something that could kill a small dog isn't going to really hurt a horse. For horses, their biggest risk factor is if they get bit on the face."

A bite to or near the face can cause a lot of swelling and give the horse trouble with breathing. Bites on the face of your horse should be seen by

## Purcell Library presents genealogy research sessions


The Purcell Public Library invites local genealogy researchers to find help in providing information for members of the community tracking down their family history.

**OSU EXTENSION News****Snakes are more scared of you than you are of them**

Spending time outdoors, tending to a garden, working on a brush pile or even weed eating the yard will increase the chances of encountering one of Oklahoma's slithery occupants.

The good news about running into a snake is that it is most likely harmless and actually quite beneficial.

"They are very important and help control rodents. They add beauty and interest to your garden," said Dwayne Elmore, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist.

Snakes invoke unwarranted fear in a lot of people, which comes from a lack of knowledge about which are venomous and which are not. Picking up a copy of the "Field Guide to Oklahoma's Amphibians and Reptiles" or visiting [oksnakes.org](http://oksnakes.org) can help clear up some of that confusion.

"Homeowners are often concerned about them, particularly whether it's a venomous or nonvenomous snake. Even venomous ones are very beneficial," Elmore said.

The broad head of a snake is generally a giveaway to its potential danger, with a couple of exceptions. The western hog-nosed snake is a nonvenomous snake that also has a bigger head. Additionally, some nonvenomous water snakes have broad heads that can be mistaken for a venomous cottonmouth, which only occurs in parts of eastern Oklahoma.

Some of the more common snakes found in Oklahoma gardens are the black rat snake and several different garter snake species. Those with a pond or

water feature in the yard may encounter a yellow-bellied watersnake or broad banded watersnake.

"These are all harmless, although sometimes they will put on defensive postures, or even try to rattle their tail in leaves. These are all just efforts to try to keep you from killing them," Elmore said. "Don't be confused by those actions and interpret it as hostility, they're just trying to defend themselves."

Most strikes by snakes are situations in which a homeowner simply did not see the snake and put their hands somewhere where they were not looking or were barefoot walking through vegetation.

"Be mindful of that and make sure you can see where you are putting your hands and feet," he said. "Consider wearing thick gloves and certainly don't put your hands under objects without looking first, particularly in compost piles, piles of wood debris or flat objects, such as metal siding and plywood."

If a snake is spotted and known to be nonvenomous, homeowners should just leave the snake be and let it go about its business. The same holds true for venomous species, but with some extra caution and more space between you and the snake.

"If you do identify a venomous snake in your landscape, it's best to leave it alone," said Elmore. "If you're concerned about it staying in the landscape, which it probably won't, you can call a nuisance wildlife control operator to have it removed."

A list of operators can be found under the "Laws and Regs" tab on the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation website, [wildlifedepartment.com](http://wildlifedepartment.com).

The most common venomous snake to be found in the home garden is the copperhead.

"It's a very cryptic, small snake. It's very docile, how-

your veterinarian as soon as possible.

Extreme swelling of the bite to the face of a horse could close off air flow through the nose. Horses can only breathe through their nose and this could potentially suffocate the horse.

**Underwood:**

had pummeled the girl on the top of her head and upper back.

Jamie Rose died from asphyxiation.

Underwood then sexually violated her and attempted to decapitate her.

The girl's mangled body was discovered some 48 hours later in a plastic tub tucked out of sight in the bedroom closet of the man who snuffed out her life.

Underwood told investigators he had hoped to fulfill a cannibalistic fantasy.

According to officials, Jamie Rose was a victim of opportunity because the first person who walked by Underwood's apartment that day "was going to be a victim."

DeGiusti discounted Underwood's Asperger's syndrome diagnosis, as well as claims about irrelevant and improper testimony at his 2008 trial in Cleveland County District Court.

A jury deliberated just 20 minutes to convict Underwood of first-degree murder.

Jurors sentenced him to die and Underwood remains on death row.

### You control your healthcare, not the government

Since 2010, the health of America has been at the mercy of a flawed, disruptive system. The Affordable Care Act, more commonly known as "Obamacare," has created more problems than the solutions that it had promised.

Too many Americans have suffered from skyrocketing healthcare costs - from rising premiums and deductibles, to outrageous hospital visit costs and home care costs. Moreover, the consequences of funding and logistics have been a nightmare for the American taxpayer.

The Republican alternative is not a return to the pre-Obamacare status quo, but rather a patient centered, consumer friendly approach to providing affordable, quality health care to all Americans.

Without question, our healthcare system before Obamacare was bureaucratic and expensive. Unfortunately, Obamacare has made it worse on both fronts. It severely reduces

our ability to choose our health providers and creates expensive mandates.

It has forced people to purchase expensive plans they did not want, and put the federal bureaucracy in charge of one of the most important aspects of a typical American family.

Over the past six years, the House has voted over 60 times to repeal various provisions of Obamacare, and to ultimately repeal Obamacare for good. As a part of those efforts, the Labor, Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee, of which I am Chairman, has taken firm steps to defund Obamacare.

## Sen. Sparks issues comments on governor's call for special session

Senate Democratic Leader John Sparks (D-Norman) issued the following comments in response to the report that Governor Fallin is considering calling the Legislature into special session to use "extra money" to fund a pay raise for public school teachers:

"Once again, Governor Fallin and the Republican majority in the legislature are showing how bad they are at public finance and how good they are at election year political

pandering - because that is all this proposal for a special session on teacher pay raises is.

"I've said it before and I'll say it again: a special session to figure out what to do with the \$140.8 million in 'extra money' the Governor's finance team found back in June is unlawful and unnecessary. We don't need to spend taxpayer dollars we don't have to pass a new law to

### Examining the value of tax incentives

I was excited to receive the recent meeting notice showing the Oklahoma Incentive Evaluation Commission would discuss proposed evaluation criteria for 12 state economic incentives scheduled for review this year.

A 2015 state law requires each state economic incentive to be independently evaluated once every four years. The evaluations will help determine the effectiveness of each incentive and recommend whether it be

retained, reformed or repealed.

This is important work. It would happen even in a good economy, but it's even more significant in a year when lawmakers had to work hard to fill a \$1.3 billion hole in the state budget.

Some of our tax credits, rebates and incentives have been on the books for decades. It's past time they received scrutiny and measurable evaluation.

The incentives being studied this year include: five-year ad

valorem tax exemptions for various industries; tax credits for electricity generated by zero-emission facilities and for manufacturers of small wind turbines; the Oklahoma Film Enhancement Rebate Act; the historic rehabilitation tax credit; aerospace engineering tax credits for employees as well as tuition or compensation reimbursements; the Industrial Access Road Program; the excise tax exemption on aircraft sales; the Quality Events Pro-

gram; and Oklahoma Capital Investment Board programs.

We need to determine whether these incentives make sense for the state. Some were set up to expire after 10 years; some have no sunset date. In my opinion, if an incentive hasn't shown a return on investment, it should be stricken.

I want a business friendly state, one that encourages a diverse array of companies to build here, bring jobs, contribute to our local economies and

shape our communities. I want to stay competitive with other states. This will help us improve our education and health care, our state's infrastructure, public safety and more. But, if we are throwing money to the air and not seeing the benefits, then I say its past time to cut.

Commission members said evaluation criteria should include the effects that similar

# Trump's fundraising in Oklahoma eclipses Clinton's for first time

Donald Trump has a new reason to believe that deep-red Oklahoma will swing his way as the presidential campaign accelerates into the final months.

Federal Election Commission filings released recently show that June was the first time the Republican presidential nominee has raised more money in the state than his Democratic rival Hillary Clinton.

Until that month, the latest for which campaign finance data is available, Clinton had outpaced Trump in contributions from Oklahomans every month since early 2015. In fact, from January 2015 to January 2016, Clinton raised more money in the state than the five Republicans who remained in the race early this year. Trump came in second to Ted Cruz in the GOP primary.

In June, Trump reported raising \$113,685 in individual contributions from Oklahoma donors, compared with Clinton's \$93,408. Trump's previous monthly high was in May,

when he received just under \$14,000.

A Democrat hasn't carried Oklahoma in the presidential election since Lyndon Johnson in 1964.



Clinton still far exceeds Trump in total amount raised in Oklahoma since January 2015—\$1.2 million to Trump's \$159,000. Like Trump, June was Clinton's largest fundraising haul in Oklahoma. Clinton lost to Bernie Sanders in the Democratic primary.

The fundraising numbers for July won't be released until August 20.

Trump has struggled to win

over many prominent Republicans nationally since his campaign began to take off.

In early May, Gov. Mary Fallin endorsed Trump, and Republican megadonors are expected to start bundling donations and pumping in cash themselves, if they haven't already.

Trump's campaign and the Republican National Committee added more than 80 fundraising leaders in late June, including Larry Nichols, co-founder of Devon Energy Corp.

A May poll by Cole, Hargrave, Snodgrass and Associates showed Trump leading Clinton, 48 percent to 28 percent, in the state. The last general-election forecast by Nate Silver's FiveThirtyEight group gave Clinton a one-in-250 chance of winning Oklahoma.

## We must restructure

Once again, I believe I have an obligation to correct misinformation, innuendos, exaggerations, rhetoric, and inaccurate statements being made by House District 42 Representative, Lisa Billy. In her "Weekly Wrap—Recession, not tax policy reason for current budget constraints", Lisa Billy claims that our current budget crisis is beyond the control of the legislature. She claims that the \$1.3 billion budget hole is solely because the price of a barrel of oil dropped to \$30.32. Nothing could be further from the truth. The sad truth is that 70% of the \$1.3 billion budget hole was caused by the legislature, while only 30% was caused by the drop in oil prices. As a matter of fact, \$910 million was manmade (legislature made) while Saudi Arabia was responsible for \$390 million of the Oklahoma budget hole. Saudi Arabia through the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) has continued to flood the market with oil, trying to run our local oil and gas companies out of business. The result has been that less and less production taxes have been collected by the state, which has resulted in the \$390 million loss to the state budget. The \$910 million budget loss to the state falls directly at the feet of the legislature. Most of it is due to the corporate tax policies, not personal or individual, of the legislature. For example, corporate income tax credits, incentives, and rebates are largely responsible for the revenue failure and a direct result of legislative actions, not crude oil prices. The corporate intangible property tax, which was eliminated several years ago, has also had a devastating effect on the economy and was created by (you guessed it) the

legislature. These corporate tax policies have done nothing but raise income and property taxes for individual citizens.

Lisa Billy stated that "... Oklahoma House of Representatives members worked late into the last legislative session to balance the state budget..." The truth is that only 5 out of 149 legislators worked on the state budget, and only worked late because they didn't start on it until the last week of the session. Even then, they had no idea how to balance it—so they simply borrowed \$200 million that tax payers will pay back with an increase in taxes. They then used one-time money to fill the rest of the budget deficit, which will come back to haunt us next year. Lisa Billy also states that "Increasing tax rates... only puts more burdens on the businesses and individuals paying the taxes..." No one has ever said anything about "increasing taxes", although Lisa Billy said so. Only by ending corporate rebates, incentives, credits, and giveaways can we pull out of this economic slump and balance the budget. Another way to balance the state budget is to consolidate or do away with some of the 616 state agencies, boards, and commissions. As a matter of fact, the State Auditor and Inspector has consistently said that to balance the state budget, the legislature must stop spending. That is unlikely to happen, however, as most of the big-spending state agencies are headed by former legislators who are friends of current legislators. It figures: big-spending legislators support big-spending agency heads. Lisa Billy ends up her column by saying "... we may need to do less to restructure our tax policies and more to try

to boost our gross domestic product." I wholeheartedly disagree. We must restructure our tax policies by ending the tax giveaways to the corporate world. We could then reduce individual income tax rates and individual property taxes even more, if corporations paid their fair share. We must stop government spending on unneeded agencies, boards, and commissions. We must stop unlimited spending by some state agencies, including the Attorney General's Office which increased spending from \$20 million to \$40 million over the past 5 years! This is a total waste of taxpayer dollars.

I'd be more than happy to debate any of the claims made by Lisa Billy or the heir-apparent to the District 42 House seat, but that's probably not going to happen. Lisa Billy is leaving office, so has no reason to defend her assertions—and Tim Downing dodged 5 scheduled public forums before the state primary, to discuss these issues.

determine how and where this money should be spent.

"We passed a budget in May of 2015 which directed how this money was to be spent. The Governor's finance team needs to simply re-allocate this money back to the agencies to which it was originally appropriated.

"In addition, I find the timing of this call for special session curious. To suddenly want to come to the table to pass a teacher pay raise plan in the midst of a heated campaign season where educators and parents are not only concerned but motivated and active wrecks of political pandering.

"Finally, the idea that using

one-time 'extra money' to fund an ongoing expense like teacher salaries is fiscally unsound. To use one time money for a recurring budget item is short sighted at best and sets our teachers up for serious disappointment in the future when there isn't more one-time money to keep funding their new, higher salaries.

"We need to address the issue of teacher pay and our ongoing teacher shortage. But, this isn't the way to do it. If the Republicans in the legislature really cared about teachers, they

This year we will also celebrate the life in documentation of the James and Polly Finn family.


James Finn was a Civil War and Indian War (buffalo soldier) veteran. He was born in 1840 and died in 1919.

This month, Brazil comes to Oklahoma with the Olympics in Rio de Janeiro. Try Brazil's national dish, Feijoada, while you watching the games.

### Feijoada (Black Bean Stew)

- 2 pounds dried black beans
- 1 TBL olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 6 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 pounds meat (see note\*)
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 TBL kosher salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper

Place the beans in a large pot or bowl and cover with water above the level of the beans. Soak overnight and drain.

In a large pot, heat the oil. Add the onions and garlic and cook over low heat until softened, about 5 minutes.

Increase the heat to high, add the meat, and allow it to sear on all sides. Add the beans, bay leaves, salt, pepper and enough water to cover the beans.

Cover the pot with a lid and cook on low for 2 to 3 hours until the beans and meat are tender.

If using, add sliced smoked sausage during he last half hour of cooking.

If the beans become too thick, add more water. Season with additional salt and pepper to taste. Serve beans over steamed rice.

\* Note about meat: Use approximately 3 pounds of pork or beef (including bones). Tough cuts of meat work well in feijoada. Some choices include pig's feet, pig's ears, tongue, oxtail, short ribs, corned beef, chunks of top round, bacon, chorizo sausage and smoked sausage. Feijoada typically includes a few different varieties of meat in each batch.

meeting. The \$700,000 will cover half the cost of Main StreetScape Phase 1, which will focus on areas between 2nd and 3rd Avenues, including the entire 2nd Avenue intersection.

The city learned of the award on Monday, Bunn said, adding \$700,000 was the maximum award.

"They were impressed by our presentation," Bunn said. "They love our downtown, love our center parking."

Work in phase 1 will include new curbs with handicap access, sidewalks, lighting and landscaping.

Bunn said the improvements

will basically extend work already completed around city hall.

Council members approved five people to serve on the city's new Parks and Recreation Board.

Appointed to 1-year terms were Ryan Bayless and Ryan Rogers while John Blue and Shawn Tompkins will serve 2-year terms. Daniel Ott was named to a 3-year term.

However, the council balked at approving proposed bylaws for the new board, opting instead to task the board with drafting bylaws which will then be presented for council approval.

Council member Tom Mc-

Curdy raised the main objection, asking why bylaws would tie the board's purpose to "the vision and recommendations of the Parks 2020 Vision."

"I've never seen bylaws list something like that," he said.

Parks and recreation director Chris Griffith said the bylaws can be amended to reflect Vision 2030, 2040, etc., allowing the bylaws to function as a "living document."

McCurdy also questioned why the bylaws specified up to nine members on the board.

Griffith said that provision would allow individuals to be added to the board for specific projects.

"It would give the board flexibility," Griffith explained.

The council also approved an ordinance that bans chip and seal paving on streets which will be maintained by the city in new developments.

The ordinance also modified the city's minimum asphalt surface standards for those streets, increasing asphalt from from five to six inches.

ized equipment or training. "Not only can DRS help people with disabilities find a job, we can frequently help them to maintain or advance at their current employment," said Jan Hatch, DRS Vocational Rehabilitation program manager.

DRS staff will be available to discuss employment services and answer questions.

"Sometimes a person just needs a job coach to partner with them in looking for, applying for and maintaining work or an applicant needs help with interview skills - DRS can provide these services," said Linda Gerber, DRS Vocational Rehabilitation counselor.

Mrs. Harlan worked at Delta Community Action and was instrumental in writing grants


and organizing Salvation Army functions.

### 2016 Paint Horse Youth World Championship Show Lauren Gralla, Norman, Wins 13-and-Under All-Around Championship

The American Paint Horse Association successfully concluded the 2016 AjPHA Youth World Championship Show on July 9 after 13 days of premier competition for youth ages 18-and-under, as well as specialty ranch horse and cutting events.

The event took place June 27-July 9 at the Will Rogers Memorial Center in Fort Worth, Texas. The show crowned 82 world champions during the 13-day show, which is the largest competition in the world for Youth riding American Paint Horses.

Lauren Gralla, Norman, 13-year-old daughter of Todd and Tonya Gralla, Norman, captured her second consecutive All-Around Youth 13 and Under title showing A Sudden Legacy, a 2004 sorrel overo gelding by A Sudden Impulse and out of Zippus Satin N Lace.

Last year Lauren said her goal was to win Horsemanship. She won Reserve World Champion, so she was determined to win it this year. Lauren accomplished her goal and more, winning five World Championships - Horsemanship, Showmanship, Trail, Western Riding and Hunter Under Saddle. She also won a

Reserve World Championship in Equitation. This dynamic duo is a top contender in All-Around events every year, winning nine World Championships and more than \$5,000 in scholarships in the past two years.

Lauren's younger brother, Nicholas, 11, won the World Championship in Aged Youth Mares at Halter.

Todd Gralla is Vice President of the Oklahoma Paint Horse Club and Tonya is treasurer. Todd is the son of Stan and Mary Ann Gralla, who had Gralla Paints and Gralla Architects at their farm just east of Lexington for many years. Gralla Architects was started in 1971 and specialized in designing equine facilities, from racetracks to veterinary facilities to horse farm and barn layouts to bio-isolation facilities and more, and were known all over the world. Todd is also an equine architect, and now works at Populous, an equine design architecture firm in Norman. Stan is retired and now living in Norman.

You may remember an article in this column in 2008 about Todd's equine facilities around the world, and at that time heading a team from his gh2 Equine Architects, Norman, to build a multi-purpose equine facility in Egypt.

This year, the Paint Youth World Show offered more than \$165,000 in scholarship prizes to AjPHA members competing

at the event. Included were scholarships for top finishers in 82 world championship performance and halter classes, along with scholarships for rookie exhibitors, randomly selected entries and other special events—all of which was presented in addition to prizes awarded in individual classes and for overall champions at the show. Scholarship money was provided by the American Paint Horse Foundation, as well as private donations from APHA members and industry supporters.

Entries at the 2016 Youth World Championship Show were up nine percent over 2015, due in large part to significant increases in the Walk-Trot and Novice Youth divisions. Exhibitors and horses were drawn to the show from all over the United States and Canada for their chance to earn scholarships ranging from \$1,300 to \$4,500 per class. With 153 exhibitors earning scholarships during the event—83 of which were first-time recipients—the 2016 Youth World Show put a new meaning behind the phrase "getting the most bang for your buck."

The American Paint Horse Association is the world's second-largest international equine breed association, registering more than a million horses in 59 nations and territories since it was founded.

into a pool, however, the hospital's impact doesn't stop there. Ripples travel outward in ever increasing circles.

So those hospital employees spending their salaries locally create an additional 39 jobs with \$1.5 million income in the local economy.

Factor in other segments of the health care sector like doctors, nurses, pharmacies, home health care, nursing homes, hospice, ambulance service, etc., and that amounts to another 525 jobs and an additional \$25.6 million in wages.

And the ripples keep growing, building to a total health sector (including PMH) impact of 781

The ratings range from one to five stars, with five being the best.

The Hospital Compare site already enjoys a solid reputation with the public, showing how 4,600 hospitals scored on various indicators of quality care.

"You can compare hospitals on the basis of such factors as clinical outcomes, customer satisfaction and patient safety," Moos continued.

The new overall star ratings offer a snapshot of particular hospitals' quality of care, by summing up 64 individual measures of hospital performance already posted on the website.

The ratings reflect such factors as how often patients get infections after surgery, how long patients must wait in the emergency department before seeing a doctor or nurse, and how likely patients are to get readmitted to the hospital after a heart attack.

The stars take into account the mix of patients at a hospital, so that those facilities with a high

percentage of sicker patients aren't rated lower than those that handle more run-of-the-mill cases.

Nationally, 102 hospitals received five stars, 934 rated four stars, 1,770 scored three stars, 723 received two stars, and 133 had just one star.

The 86 rated Oklahoma hospitals scored an average of 3.1 stars for overall quality of care – squarely in the middle.

A total of 51 scored three stars, 12 received two stars, and two had just one star.

Other Oklahoma hospitals' star ratings can be found at [medicare.gov/hospitalcompare/search.html](http://medicare.gov/hospitalcompare/search.html).

Hospital Compare's new overall star ratings follow last year's introduction of star ratings that looked only at patient satisfaction.

By adding star ratings to its Compare websites, Medicare is trying to help you make more informed decisions about your health care, Moos said.

Nursing Home Compare,

Home Health Compare and the Medicare Plan Finder already use star ratings to help you check out health care providers and insurers and choose one with quality in mind.

"Of course, as informative as these websites can be, they can't tell the whole story about where to go for care," Moos said. "They're simply a screening tool that lets you focus on a few providers that interest you."

Medicare also recently updated its "Guide to Choosing a Hospital," which includes a checklist of questions to ask your doctor and explains how to find the hospital that's the right fit for you. A free copy can be downloaded at [medicare.gov](http://medicare.gov) or requested by calling Medicare at 1-800-633-4227.

Once you've done your homework, you'll have peace of mind knowing you've made an informed choice about your care.

"We do not get to go to play-off games at the end of the season," Jones explained. "So, in reality, our season comes down


to our 12 district games. This is something new to us but it is the card we have been dealt.


Entering her third season at the helm of the Dragons, Jones is 35-41-2. Last year's club was 15-25, ending the year in the Regional Tournament.

Prescription drug overdose deaths appear to be subsiding in Oklahoma as new laws and outreach efforts take effect.



But black-market methamphetamine and heroin deaths are surging.

Drug law enforcers and medical professionals said they were both encouraged and alarmed by the latest overdose death data, generated by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner and compiled by the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics.

The encouragement comes



Each week we recognize a volunteer who is helping us to change the lives of our nation's veterans and their families. Today we have a special couple who are our volunteers of the week. Several years ago a Korean War Combat Wounded Marine, Kenneth Ingraham, came to us for help with his VA claim. After being approved for VA benefits, he returned for a follow-up visit to apply for the Oklahoma State Tax benefits. While he was there, I introduced him to one of our volunteers, Virginia Van Horn, who was also a widow.

As you can imagine over the next few years, a romance blossomed into a wedding service that was held last Tuesday afternoon at Faith Pointe Baptist Church. We are very proud of both of these volunteers who give their time to support other veterans and surviving spouses. Our volunteers along with many of their friends and family were present for the ceremony officiated by Pastor Jim Gann. We wish both of them the best of luck as they embark on this new chapter of their lives.

There were 198 veterans and surviving spouses assisted with their VA claims last Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Of that number, there were 87 veterans who applied for VA benefits with us for the first time. When I asked these men and women how they found out about us, they usually say that some of their friends or family recommended they visit us for help filing their claims for VA benefits.

Our ladies were able to assist 21 surviving spouses with their claims for VA DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance benefits. The DIC benefits may be payable to a surviving spouse whose spouse died from a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to their military service. Pension benefits for spouses may be paid depending on income, medical expenses, and when the veteran served in the military.

A veteran or surviving spouse may receive benefits when they

are in need of help with daily living. Shirley and our ladies who process surviving spouses also specialize in the Aid and Attendance benefits for both veterans and spouses. For questions about possible benefits, please stop by any Tuesday or Thursday mornings.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of the VA rating decisions and other correspondence that VA sends to each of the veterans and surviving spouses whom I represent. We then send a letter to the veteran or spouse telling them of other VA benefits that they may be eligible for and encourage them to return for a follow-up visit.

Before becoming Accredited, I would not know if a veteran's claim was approved or not. This information allows us to know the percentages of claims that are approved and the financial impact we are having on our community.

I encourage all veterans or their surviving spouses to visit with one of our volunteers for information about VA benefits. Most of the people who we are helping did not know that they may qualify for VA benefits. I always tell folks you should let the VA decide if you are eligible for any type of VA help. Personally, I believe most any veteran should apply for service connection of hearing loss and tinnitus if their job in the military exposed them to the acoustic trauma of loud noise. In 2002 I read in the Federal Register that the VA said that if a military service member was exposed to loud noises such as the ones listed above that it was presumptive that the veteran suffered from tinnitus and hearing loss. Since that time, we have helped thousands of veterans receive VA benefits based on their noise exposure in the military.

The folks from Legal Aid will not be with us this week as they will be attending training. Please stop by and pick up one of their cards if you need to speak with them this week.

On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214's (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA

forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham's Veteran's Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.

from increasing evidence that tougher oversight and outreach are causing the toll of prescription drug overdoses to stabilize and decline slightly.

"Deaths are down because of greater use of the Prescription Monitoring Program and greater awareness by physicians, through conferences, through training, through just networking," said Narcotics Bureau spokesman Mark Woodward.

The alarm stems from a troubling rise in methamphetamine and heroin deaths, some of which might be attributable to former prescription drug users switching to cheaper bootleg drugs.

"The Mexican cartels are just pouring ice into this country in record amounts," Woodward said, referring to black-market methamphetamine. "It's simply just to feed the demand, which still remains very, very high for meth."

Heroin has been making a comeback across the country. The latest data suggests that Oklahoma drug users are beginning to make that transition, too.

"Talking to people in recovery, I'll ask them, 'What was your drug of choice?'" Woodward said. "Five years ago, it was meth, meth, meth and prescription drugs. But for the last two or three years, (many) said it was heroin."

Highlights of the latest statistics:

--The total number of deaths officially attributed to overdoses dipped to 823 in 2015 from 870 the previous year. From 2001 to 2010, the number of fatal overdoses increased 137 percent, from 344 to 814. Since 2010, the annual death toll has increased only one percent.

--Five frequently-prescribed opioid painkillers were a factor in 482 deaths last year, or 59 percent of all fatal overdoses. In 2010, those five drugs contributed to 588 deaths, or 72 percent of the total. Oxycodone was the most frequent offender, followed closely by hydrocodone. (Because some deaths involve "cocktails" of lethal drugs, the individual drug tallies add up to more than 823.)

--Prescription benzodiazepine tranquilizers continue to be a factor in many overdoses, showing little change over five years. Alprazolam (Xanax) and diazepam (Valium) contributed to 195 deaths last year, or 24 percent of total overdoses. "Benzos" are seldom lethal by themselves but can be deadly when combined with opioids or alcohol.

--Methamphetamine overdoses are soaring. They accounted for 265 deaths last year, or nearly a third of all fatal overdoses. The total represented a 157 percent increase since 2010's death toll of 103. The fatality count keeps climbing despite a dramatic decline in the number of Oklahoma meth lab busts. Officials attributed the change to surging imports of Mexican meth.

--Heroin overdoses might soon account for 1 in 10 opioid-related deaths in Oklahoma. They increased to 31 last year from only 12 in 2011. So far in 2016, they are on track to hit 40 or more. Health experts said the increase reflects the rising cost of prescription painkillers as well as increased imports by Mexican cartels.

"We're seeing an increase in heroin because of the cost of Oxy (oxycodone)," said Hal Vorse, a physician who treats addicts at a clinic in Oklahoma

City.

"I saw a guy today who was doing 300 milligrams a day of oxycodone," Vorse said. "That's a \$300- to \$400-a-day habit ... They can get the same effect at about a third of the cost by using heroin."

Vorse said prescription oxycodone is currently selling on the street for \$1 to \$1.25 per milligram. A frequent user might need as much as 100 milligrams a day just to ward off withdrawal symptoms.

The rising use of black-market drugs such as methamphetamine and heroin appears to be an unintended, if perhaps unavoidable, consequence of concerted efforts to combat the significant increase in prescription drug abuse over the last two decades.

They cited several changes in recent years.

First, a new law that took effect in November 2014 reclassified hydrocodone "combo" painkillers such as Lortab and Norco as Schedule II controlled dangerous substances. That meant doctors could not write prescriptions for more than 90 days and could no longer phone in prescriptions to pharmacists.

Another new law enacted in 2014 expanded the ability of emergency medical personnel and family members to administer Naloxone, a drug that reverses the effects of opioid overdoses. Its increased availability is believed to be reducing the number of fatal overdoses among people who continue to abuse dangerous drugs.

Yet another new law that took effect in November 2015 requires doctors to check the state's Prescription Monitoring Program database at least once every six months before prescribing opioid painkillers or benzodiazepine tranquilizers. That helps them spot abusers who are obtaining overlapping prescriptions from other doctors.

Meanwhile, extensive coverage of prescription drug abuse and more aggressive education programs aimed at health professionals and patients have heightened awareness of the overdose crisis.

In addition, tougher enforcement actions, including highly publicized criminal prosecutions of overprescribing physicians and shutdowns of high-volume "pill-mill" clinics, might be causing doctors to exercise more caution.

"Probably the biggest impact is just more physicians becoming aware that this is a big issue," said Lyle Kelsey, executive director of the Oklahoma State Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision.

"I think it's really starting to settle out into two categories -- those (doctors) that play the game and want to rack up a bunch of money and get out ... and those that are trying to take all of the knowledge and say, 'How can we do this right?'" Kelsey said.

"Ten, 15 years ago, everybody was pushing the idea that you couldn't get hooked on opiates, and you could just prescribe them," Kelsey said. "Now, it's kind of like standing in front of a locomotive and trying to slow it down."

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Three popular songs use the book of Ecclesiastes for their inspiration: "Try and Catch the Wind" (Donovan), "Turn, Turn, Turn" (the Byrds), and "Dust in the Wind" (Kansas). These songs and the book from which they come (Ecclesiastes) present to us some profound truths. But these truths are not based on faith. They are based on experience, on observations, of a wealthy man named Quothelth.

Quothelth looked back over his life and his great accomplishments, and then he says: "I reflected on everything that is accomplished by man on earth, and I concluded: Everything he has accomplished is futile — like chasing the wind." (Eccl. 2: 4-6, 8-12) All is vanity! All man's labors are in vain. Wisdom only leads to greater complexity and awareness of one's own ignorance. Even the greatest pleasures don't last.

History repeats itself in a kind of monotony ("there is nothing new under the sun"). There is a time for dying and being born, for planting and

reaping, but these times are beyond our control. They just happen and we become part of the endless cycle of life. Both the wise man and the fool end up in the grave. And, to top it all off — when you die, all the wealth you have accumulated will end up in the hands of your children who are going to squander it all away anyway! I wonder how this book ever got in the Bible? Where is God in all of this?

Quothelth says God has a plan — but we can't know the plan. And so we remain frustrated. Quothelth does admit that it is better to be wise than foolish, and that there is a pleasure in working hard. So it is better to be wise and to work hard. But in the end, all of what we are will become simply be as dust in the wind. We, and all the things we have done, will blow away and be forgotten.

What lesson can we learn from this sacred Scripture? Perhaps the book is offering us another proof for the existence of God. St. Thomas Aquinas, in his Summa Theologia, offered his five "proofs" for the existence of God. First, there is movement in the universe. The earth revolves around the sun, the moon revolves around the earth. Something had to get things moving in the first place. God is the Prime Mover.

Second, everything is cause and effect. We are living in the effects of the big bang that created the universe. God is the First Cause, the One who started it all. Third, God answers the question "Why? Why is there any universe at all?" Fourth, we notice that there are degrees of good, truth, and beauty. We can say that one thing is more beautiful than another, or more good than something else. We must have an innate sense of the all-beautiful, the all-true, the all-good. That something is God. And finally, God is the Great Designer who has created a universe that is intricately and wonderfully designed.

With the book of Ecclesiastes, we see another proof for the existence of God. We have this incurable, deep yearning within

us for things that transcend our earthly existence. The realities of life do not correspond with the deepest yearnings of our heart. And our desires will never be fulfilled in this life. We want to be loved in a way that no one around us can love us. We will always be disappointed.

We want to love others, but we fall short of the task. We want to be creative, but there are real limits to our creativity. We want to be make a difference in our world, but we find ourselves constantly disappointed. These deepest yearnings point to God. For only in God will my soul find that for which it most deeply longings — complete love, complete beauty, complete truth.

We should end in the same way that the book ends: "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the duty of all mankind. For God will bring every deed into judgment, including every hidden thing, whether it is good or evil." (Eccl. 12:13-14) God will see to it that all bad actions will ultimately end badly. And He will see to it that all our good actions will ultimately end well. This is all that we can expect — and it is quite a lot!



## How to identify a venomous snake

Most snakes are harmless to humans. They pose no real threat, lack venom and are oftentimes very docile.

However, a few species in Oklahoma do need some special attention. Rather than finding out the hard way, by being bitten and rushed to the emergency room, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension Wildlife Specialist, Dwayne Elmore, offered some helpful tips for identifying the seven venomous snakes in the state.

One of the more famous and easily recognizable venomous Oklahoma snakes is the copperhead.

"The copperhead is a medium-sized snake, usually between 1-3 feet in length, with light and dark tan or chestnut-colored, hourglass-shaped bands that wrap all the way around the body," Elmore said. "It is the only snake in Oklahoma with that color pattern."

Juvenile copperhead snakes may have a yellow or green tip of the tail, but that goes away as the snake matures. A bite from one of these snakes will require a visit to the hospital, but is usually not fatal.

The cottonmouth, or water-

moccasin, is one of the most difficult venomous snakes to identify (unless its open mouth can be viewed) because it can have a variety of color patterns. They can be earth tone, red or brown and have grayish banding.

"There is a dark band that runs on the side of its face, under the eye. There are no other water snakes that have this band," Elmore said. "This species is confined to eastern and southeastern Oklahoma and is easily identified by the signature white lining of the mouth."

Oklahoma also is home to five species of rattlesnake, with the biggest and most concerning being the western diamondback.

Contrary to the name, western diamondback rattlesnakes do not always have rattles. Although they can have a color variation, they will all have alternating dark and light bands on the tail and interlocking diamond shapes on their backs.

The timber rattlesnake also can have color variations. These snakes can be gray with black bands and an orange stripe down the back, or gold with black bands and a gold stripe down the back. Either combination will be completed with a black tail and extremely

docile personality.

The prairie rattlesnake is identifiable by a black band close to the rattle and light stripes down the sides of its face. These two traits are constant while other color variations will exist.

The pygmy rattlesnake, which is very uncommon throughout most of the state, is small, but packs a punch. This gray snake has black spots with a red stripe running the length of its back.

"The pygmy's rattle sounds like a mosquito buzzing," said Elmore.

The final rattlesnake species found in Oklahoma is the western massasauga. This snake has a row of dark brown blotches running the length of its back with three smaller rows of lighter colored blotches along each side.

"Some of the snakes are hard to distinguish from others," said Elmore. "But all venomous snakes in Oklahoma are pit vipers, with obvious heat-sensing pits between the eye and nostril, making their heads bulky and somewhat heart shaped from above."

If one of these seven species is spotted, it is best to leave the area and allow the snake to escape.

## Fall gardening

Even though it is near 100°F every day this week, now is the time to consider fall gardening.

Fall in Oklahoma can be a great time for gardening. Fall usually means calmer winds and mild temperatures. Many of the fruits and vegetables grown in the fall will have their very best flavor of the year.

Many vegetables tolerate frosts, such as broccoli, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, radish, spinach and leaf lettuce. These can be planted in August and early September and harvested up until a hard freeze.

Frost susceptible vegetables can also be grown, if planted early enough so that the edible plant portion matures before frost. Green beans, cowpeas,

cucumbers, and squash mature quickly and will provide produce up until the first frost. Plant these vegetables up until the middle of August.

They can also be covered during light frosts with plastic for extended harvest or if you get a later start on planting.

Because of the hot soil temperatures we normally have this time of year; seeds will need a little help to germinate. To get seeds up in the garden if they days are hot; cover them with a layer of vermiculite, compost, straw or peat moss. This will cool the soil near the seed and reduce moisture loss.

A shade screen can also be used to help reduce sunlight and slow drying. Old wire window screens formed into "row tents" or boards held up at an angle

work well.

I have also been successful with lightly watering the soil two or three times a day to cool the temperatures until germination.

Most seeds will germinate faster if you soak them overnight before planting to soften the seed coat. Do not soak beans or peas.

Check your plants each day and maintain adequate soil moisture. Some nurseries may have transplants (tomatoes/peppers) that are easier to establish than trying to direct seed in the garden.

## Only seven species of snakes found in Oklahoma are venomous

The vast majority of the more than 40 species of snakes found in Oklahoma are nonvenomous, but that does not mean they do not strike fear in many people.

However, snakes would rather avoid people and are incredibly important animals.

"Snakes, both venomous and nonvenomous, cause great anxiety in many people and

are considered cold-blooded killers," said Dwayne Elmore, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist. "They are cold-blooded, of course, but unless you are a rodent, frog, insect or earthworm, you have little to fear."

Fortunately, most of the snakes capable of inflicting injury are very docile.

"Many bites occur as a result of someone harassing the snake

or putting their hands under objects without looking first," he said. "Rattlesnakes come to mind when most people think of venomous snakes."

Note the term venomous, rather than poisonous. Venomous animals inject a toxin directly into their prey as opposed to poisonous animals, which contain a toxin within portions of their bodies that cause harm if ingested or touched.

"Five species of rattlesnake

occur in Oklahoma, including the timber, western diamond-backed, prairie, western massasauga and western pygmy," Elmore said. "The prairie rattlesnake can, on occasion, show some temper, but the remainder are typically mild in nature."

The copperhead is a common venomous snake in the eastern half of Oklahoma. They can be unbelievably docile, but do occasionally bite noisy dogs

and errant hands.

"Their beautiful, but cryptic coloration calls for a sharp eye when moving yard debris," he said.

It is commonly believed every water snake is a venomous "water-moccasin," but, this is not accurate.

"While there are several species of water snakes in Oklahoma, only one species, the western cottonmouth, is venomous," Elmore said. "Al-

though cottonmouth often act aggressive, their bark is worse than their bite."

All snakes provide important ecological services, including those that are venomous. Elmore suggests using some caution when spending time outdoors, and simply walking away from snakes you may encounter, as they are an important part of the ecosystem and should not be harassed or killed.
