Another special meeting will be August 2.


Midkiff said the board was accompanied by site principals and maintenance personnel.

.53" rain recorded Nearly 26 inches for the year


Cooler temperatures followed Tuesday morning's July rain that dropped up to .53" on the area.

> Dr. Manning said she was motivated to bring together a team of Oklahoma teachers and experienced colleagues such as Jan Barrick, owner of Oklahoma City-based school improvement firm Alpha Plus Systems, and current OSSM President Dr. Frank Wong, for the math textbook project because Oklahoma schools desperately need quality instructional materials in mathematics.


> Approximately one out of three Oklahoma college freshmen need remediation in math and budget cuts have prevented most school districts from purchasing new mathematics materials for the past several years. And if districts have managed to purchase new math materials in recent years, they aren't aligned with Oklahoma's new rigorous math standards.

> Manning said in the coming weeks the next steps for the textbook project are to have it peer reviewed and then piloted in select districts for the coming 2016-2017 school year. Feedback and data will be collected from the pilot school districts throughout the year and it will be offered to all school districts for sale by summer 2017, she said.

"There isn't anything currently on the market like what we are developing for Oklahoma schools for math," said Dr. Manning."Our materials will provide not only step-by-step directions for teachers for classroom lessons tied to every Oklahoma learning objective in math, they will also include problems for students with a focus on realworld connections, continuous review sections for students to build on what they have learned and guided practices for parents so they can assist their students at home.'

Regulations for Garage Sales

1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.

2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.

4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.


5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale. 6. If you have any questions, call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

line defense against ticks is a repellant containing DEET, but no repellant is 100 percent effective. In the event one – or a few - ticks slip past the baraid involves a pair of tweezers.

"When you find an attached tick, use tweezers to grasp and pull it out with slow and steady pressure or tick removal devices that do not twist to remove the tick. If tweezers aren't available, adult ticks can be pulled out by hand with slow steady force. Smaller ticks such as seed ticks or nymphs should be pulled out with tweezers," said Justin Talley, Oklahoma State University Cooperative

gist. "Do not yank the tick is at risk for getting bitten, but Ticks have been troublesome out and do not put any kind we tend to see a higher risk Vaseline, bleach or alcohol on the tick."

Once a tick has been re-The most effective front moved, there are several options for disposing of it safely. It can be washed down the drain or sealed in a plastic bag that is then put in the garbage.

"The important thing is to rier of protection, proper first dispose of ticks properly so you're not just throwing them out on your property because even if you squeeze some of the blood out, those ticks can survive and lay eggs," Talley said.

> Because Oklahoma is anticipating a heavy tick season this year, there also is increased concern around tick-borne illnesses such as Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Bourbon Virus or Heartland Virus.

"Anyone who is going out-

Extension livestock entomolo- side where there will be ticks who are outside on a constant basis, such as landscapers and individuals in production agriculture such as cattle owners and horse owners,"Talley said. After spending time outdoors, but before heading indoors or getting into a car, people should check carefully to ensure no ticks are hitching a ride.

> Once an attached tick has been removed, it is a good idea to seal it in a plastic bag and save it in the event symptoms develop.

"We recommend keeping the tick for about a month," Talley said. "That way, if you begin developing symptoms, you can tell your doctor you were bitten by this particular tick. That gives the doctor a lot of clues Lindsay Mansion at (405) and helps direct the treatment."



Our Volunteer of the Week is Shirley Danley of Norman. She always tells me that she has the best job because she gets to assist veterans. Shirley is one of our ladies who specializes in helping veterans and spouses to apply for the Champ VA Medical Insurance and Life Insurance along with the Oklahoma State Benefits package. Shirley is a Norman resident with 10 brothers who served in both the US Navy and the Marine Corps. She knows firsthand the problems many veterans experience when returning to civilian life.

Since we have been at Faith

demand for our services, has grown. To meet this need, we are looking for more volunteers.

Volunteers must be caring, at least 21 years of age and pass an OSBI background check. We start at 7 a.m. or earlier and are usually finished by 11 or 12. We are assisting more than 200 veterans and spouses each week with their VA claims and questions. As the VA Accredited Claims Agent, I review every document submitted. Please consider being a volunteer with us.

Last week we were able to assist 217 veterans and spouses with their VA claims. Of that number, there were 87 who filed their first claim for VA benefits. We used the VA Form 21-0966 Intent to file for most of this group, this form is used to establish a start date for VA benefits and gives them up to one year to obtain the evidence needed to file a Fully Developed Claim using VA form 21-526EZ for Veterans or the VA 21-534EZ for surviving spouses.

For those of you who have some computer experience the VA has an option for veterans and surviving spouses to set up an eBenefits account. An eBenefits account can be used to upload VA applications for benefits and as well as the VA claim as it works its way through the VA rating process. I'm not suggesting you try to file your own claim, as there are too many things that can go wrong. It's much easier to have a claim approved when it is filed the first time correctly with all the evidence needed included. Some of the veterans and surviving spouses we assist have initially gone to other organizations, but their claims for VA benefits were ultimately denied. Over the many years, we have been assisting veterans and surviving spouses, I have found that if you don't send in evidence supporting your request for service connection of a disability, the VA will deny your claim. The VA tells you what is needed to support your request for service connection of a disability. For those veterans and surviving spouses who were denied, consider visiting with one of us on Tuesday or Thursday morning. Don't forget Legal Aid is also on site to help you. Our ladies who assist Surviving Spouses were able to help 42 last week to apply for DIC, Pension or the VA Aid and Attendance benefit. The number of veterans and spouses who are in need of financial assistance is continuing to increase. The request for financial assistance has gone up steadily throughout 2016. As more people in our state lose their energy-based jobs, we will probably continue to see an increase in the number of veterans who need help. We are thankful for veterans

like Louie Metseff. He and his wife Norma are taking over the responsibility of our food basket program. They are now purchasing the food items and preparing each basket we give to those who are hungry. I like to see couples who can give back to our community together.

Louie is also one of our drivers. He and Clayton Lee transported 11 vets this past week logging in 706 miles. For information about transportation call 405-550-8806, ext. 105.


Last week I received decisions showing 12 veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Their combined annual income will be \$399,484.44 per year. There were 17 veterans who received VA rating decisions from 10-90 percent. This group of men and women will receive a combined annual income of \$238,290.20 per year. We had one Surviving Spouse approved for benefits who should receive \$15,050.38 each year.

On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214's (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K Grahams Veteran's Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.

Years ago in our classroom for a moment so he can get a in front of one of the first we encouraged students to look for "good stuff." The idea was to encourage them always to keep their eyes open for inspirational stories or thoughts that could aid them along the way. The young man goes to his teacher one day and asks if he would give him knowledge. The request perplexes the boy, but he obeys, nonetheless, and meets his teacher down at the river a little while before the sun goes down. The teacher takes the puzzled boy by the arm as soon as he comes to him and leads him out into the river chest deep.

He stops there, takes the boy by the back of the neck, and dunks him in the water for a good 10, 15 seconds. He finally pulls the boy up – just

little bit of a breath – then dunks him again the second time, then the third. When the boy comes up out of that water after that third dunking, he is sputtering and gasping for air, and he cries out, "Sir, I need air! I need air!"

The teacher waits until the boy catches his breath - at least somewhat – and says to him calmly, "Son, when you want knowledge the way you wanted air just now, then come back and see me."

Then the teacher walked out of the water to his home, leaving the young man in the middle of the river to ponder the lesson on his own.

It may have taken awhile, but he did learn the lesson, even if he had to learn it the hard way. It is one thing to want knowledge, and it is another thing altogether to thrive, yearn, and long for it. It is not until we become desperate for truth, and knowledge, and righteousness that we will take the steps necessary to achieve them. We have to want it the way we want air! Many years ago, Jesus stands com

crowds He would face, and teaches that very same lesson, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness," He says, "for they shall be filled" (Matthew 5:6).

Then on another occasion. He reminds His followers, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me' (Matthew 16:24)

What the Lord is teaching is that if we want to be true disciples, we need to want it with all we have!
