The Oklahoma Tax Commission returned \$136,199,541 in sales taxes to 514 cities and towns in July.

That was a decrease of \$870,089 from the \$137,069,630 those municipalities

received a year ago.

The use tax disbursement of \$10,046,332 was distributed among 399 cities and towns.

In county returns, 76 counties shared in a \$28,031,592 sales tax disbursement.

The use tax disbursement of \$2,231,747 was distributed among 74 counties.

The disbursement represent sales from May 16-31 and estimated sales from June 1-15.

The McClain Co. Free Fair is set for September 7-10 and will be held at McClain Co. Expo Center in Purcell. The State Fair will begin September 15 and run through September 25.

"The McClain County Fair is a strong asset to the community, and we continue to look for ways to improve, educate and entertain on a bigger and better scale than last year," said a fair organizer.

"Plans are well under way to bring to our community a fair filled with live entertainment, livestock shows and kiddy tractor pulls."

A special contest this year is the Quilt Block Challenge. This contest is open to any resident of McClain County, any 4-H member or any OHCE member. Winners will be determined by viewer's choice. Instructions can be viewed online or in the fair book.

The Kiddie Tractor Pulls will be held at 7:30 on Friday, September 11 for children ages 4-12 years old with registration on site. This is just one of the many activities geared for family entertainment; others

include: children's stick horse rodeo, pie making contest, cake decorating contest, salsa contest, fair art contest, boot decorating and t-shirt design contest to name a few.

The livestock shows will feature dairy and beef cattle, swine, market and dairy goats, sheep, poultry, rabbits and horses. 

The City of Purcell does free brush pickup two times per year in the fall and again in the spring. These schedules will be published in **The Purcell Register** and can be obtained at Purcell City Hall.

During the remainder of the year, the City of Purcell will do brush pickup by work order only. This means that the customer has to call in to City Hall to request pickup with charges to be assessed to the customer utility account.

The charges may range from \$15 for a small load up to \$50 for a large load.

The garbage company, WCA, does bulk waste pickup on the fourth Monday of each month. This includes small loads of brush. The brush needs to be cut in three foot lengths and bundled with twine.

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Food for Thought returns to the library with easy salsa ideas

Bringing their unique ideas for easy recipes and maximizing resources available in the kitchen and pantry, the Food for Thought Learning Institute returns to the Pioneer Library System for a fourth year as part of this year's Summer Reading Program.

Representatives of the group will be at the Purcell Public Library at 6:30 p.m. Monday, July 25.

As unbelievable as it is that people are purposely and ruthlessly picking off police like they are in a video game, the story out of Washington State is even more unbelievable.



Funding the fight for a cure

As the summer months begin, we are reminded once more that the fight against the Zika virus is not over.

The fear of Zika breaching our shores has many Americans worried that partisan gridlock will prevent the government from taking the necessary steps to aggressively fight the potentially rapid spread of this horrible disease.

But Americans can rest assured, our top national health agencies, including the Centers of Disease Control (CDC) and the National Institutes for Health (NIH), are on the front lines. Over the past months, both Democrats and Republicans in the House have worked to find solutions to combat the

virus, and to provide robust funding for our health agencies to end the spread of Zika.

Unfortunately, Democrats in the Senate and the Obama White House continue to put their political agenda ahead of the immediate needs of the American people. They would rather have a phony political issue than a serious effort to ensure funding exists for the long term efforts to eradicate this virus.

Legislation recently passed by the House of Representatives included more than \$1.1 billion to combat the Zika virus. As the legislation moved through both chambers, Republicans were confident that this would be the ultimate path to immediately begin fighting the disease.

But Democrats were eager to put their own political agenda above the health and safety of Americans, as well as putting aside military and veterans' needs, which were also included in the legislation. Sadly, Senate Democrats made it clear that they would rather have a political issue than a medical solution.

To help fast-track the response to widespread viruses like Zika and Ebola, the Labor, Health and Human Services appropriations bill for fiscal year 2017 includes a reserve fund for the Centers for Disease Control to access in times of bio-emergencies.

This reserve essentially gives

Recession, not tax policy reason for current budget constraints

As Oklahoma House of Representative members worked late into the last legislative session to balance the state budget, we heard much rhetoric about how our tax policies were to blame for the \$1.3 billion budget hole the state faced.

It was with great interest, therefore, that I read the most recent report released by the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer has confirmed the state actually has been in a recession that started in 2015, sparked by three straight quarters of constriction in gross domestic product (GDP).

The State Treasurer and others point out that in a recession, it's impossible to expect tax receipts to grow. One popular argument during the past legislative session was that if we had not cut the state's top tax rate all our problems would

have been solved.

Increasing tax rates, though, only puts more burdens on the businesses and individuals paying the taxes, making for less money to spend in the general economy and on growing their businesses.

Instead of blaming tax rates and tax policy, the State Treasurer's report gives us a clearer picture of where the fault actually lies – declining economic activity in the state.

Among the 41 states that experienced growth in GDP during the fourth quarter, they saw the rise in industries such as information, construction, professional, scientific and technical services.

In Oklahoma, which is heavily dependent on the oil and gas industry, we were subject to the sharp decline in the price of a barrel of oil, which reached a

low of \$30.32 in February. The good news is the price crept back to almost \$49 for a barrel of Benchmark West Texas Intermediate crude in June.

That gives us some hope for more revenue as legislators begin work on the fiscal year 2018 budget, but it also highlights the continued need for our state to diversify its revenue sources.

Another discussion that reached a fever pitch during the legislative session was the state's policies on tax rebates, credits and incentives. While again, I would point out that these are not to blame for the state's current recession, I do agree that each of these needs to be examined for the actual fiscal benefit they provide Oklahoma.

The waitress would only state, "They said they give thanks for what you do every day."

Not so good news

Dear Editor,

With regrets I must once again respond to State Rep. Lisa Billy's weekly column, specifically the one dated July 14. It is titled "Good News for School Budgets."

Our representative seems pleased and proud that the Oklahoma School Land Commission last week provided tiny increases of tax payer money to the public schools and institutions of higher education. Of course it did so in compliance with current law, not because of anything Lisa or the Legislature directed it to do. Casual readers of her report might think, based on the headline, that all is well when it comes to funding Oklahoma education. The reality is exactly the opposite and citizens should know it.

Here are the facts. The School Land Commission allocated an increase of \$700,000 among our 27 colleges and universities. Simultaneously the Legislature reduced appropriations for those same institutions by \$67,000,000 this year on top of a cut last year of \$120,000,000.

Therefore, total loss of state revenue for higher education as ordered by the Republican controlled legislature just during the last two years = \$187 million.

Total new money from the SLC = \$700,000.

And this is good news? Apparently so for Rep. Billy and her Republican colleagues or she wouldn't be bragging about it in her article to your readers.

Lisa justified this fiscal train wreck by reporting, and I quote, "while higher education did receive cuts in the state's current budget, it was determined ... higher education was in a better position to weather these cuts."

What she doesn't tell you is that for those who attend college this fall or folks that support others who will, tuition rates are going up ranging from 7 percent at OU and OSU to as high as 13 percent at regional colleges.

Rep. Billy's silly attempt to bamboozle her constituents about funding for public education clearly means she is unaware of, or doesn't care about, President Abraham Lincoln's wise advice to politicians.

Lincoln wrote: "You can fool all of the people some of the time and some of the people all of the time but you can't fool all the people all of the time."

I don't think Lisa and her like-minded colleagues fool anybody ... anymore.

Better idea on overtime threshold

NNA endorses common-sense bill

The National Newspaper Association today applauded a proposal by four House Democrats to phase in an increase in the threshold salary requirements for overtime-exempt employees.

A bill by Reps. Kurt Schrader, Oregon; Jim Cooper, Tennessee; Henry Cuellar, Texas; and Collin Peterson, Minnesota, would help small businesses to comply with a new rule by the U.S. Department of Labor that would increase the salary threshold by about 100 percent in one leap on Dec. 1, 2016. The Overtime Reform and Enhancement Act would instead impose a 50 percent increase in December and then phase out the remainder over 4 years.

It has been compared as the "FEMA for health," where it allows immediate response to epidemic threats, without waiting for Congress to approve the funds necessary to respond to significant threat to the health of American citizens.

The legislation also remained committed to its purpose of funding vital research programs at both the CDC and NIH.

In its core, it is a strong representation of American values, and touches the lives of every American. We must

always seek to find cures for some of our most dreaded diseases.

I am deeply concerned that these efforts are being thwarted by partisan political shenanigans.

It's not just wrong, it's irresponsible.

pen on a time clock. Covering the news requires flexibility and creativity that rigid work rules do not allow. Our concern has been that, with our budgets constrained by the slow economy, we would have no choice but to cut back on news coverage and cut jobs, in order to keep everyone within the rules. Rep. Schrader recognizes, as we do, that the increase is needed and he wants to create a schedule that enhances jobs rather than squeezing them out of small businesses. NNA hopes members of Congress see the wisdom of this approach."

The overtime threshold sets a floor for the annual salaries of executives considered exempt under the Wage and Hour Act. Today's threshold is \$23,660. It is to be raised to \$47,446 on Dec. 1 under a rule imposed upon businesses by the Department of Labor. It will go into effect unless Congress adopts a more moderate rule. Many small businesses, including many non-profits, restaurant owners, homebuilders and NNA, have said the steep increase would cripple their abilities to support their workforces and carry out their missions.



Adam Parrish, manager at Norman's Home Depot, was crew chief, supervising painting and installation of a new vanity in the ladies rest room and new wood-look laminate flooring.

The veterans focus began five years ago as part of the Home Depot Foundation's Team Depot.

Dale Haynes, post adjutant, said the Legion had to shut down the hall two years ago because it was in such disrepair.

The roof at the rear of the building had collapsed and parts of the building flooded during unprecedented rains in May 2015.

Earlier this year post members began to reclaim the hall, working a couple mornings a week.

But there was more work than resources. And that's when Robert Potvin approached Parrish at the Norman Home Depot.

"Robert came to the store and talked about what they were doing," Parrish recalled.

That led to a grant application to the Home Depot Foundation and the award of a \$1,300 grant for flooring, paint and the new vanity a few weeks later.

Parrish said the foundation has awarded \$125 million to veterans groups nationwide.

Grant recipients must be 501c3 non-profits such as the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

In addition, the foundation provides material assistance to ensure that veterans have safe, secure places to live, Parrish said.

The foundation's commit-

ment to its veterans mission is \$250 million over the next four years.

"Every store tries to do one (veteran) project a quarter," he added.

At 67, Potvin is the youngest of the post's 59 members.

He and others hope the new look to the hall will attract new, younger members.

The hall will be available for the community to use.

"We're not going to rent it, but we will accept donations to offset the cost of utilities," he said. "We hope to open this up and do things like pancake breakfasts, fish fries, etc."

Haynes said the post was chartered in 1946.

"We don't want to see it die,"

Haynes added.

Post commander is Glen Parker.

In addition to 59 members, there are 14 members in the Legion's Ladies Auxiliary.

Parrish also hopes that Team Depot's work helps the post to grow.

"It's a great time for us to come out ... and give back to the vets who have done so much for our country," he said.

Facts:

not know about the hospital and the upcoming election.

Here are their facts:

- The proposed sales tax is solely for the hospital. It is unencumbered and can be used for hospital operations or capital purchases.
- Purcell Municipal Hospital is the city's second largest employer with a \$4.9 million payroll and 139 employees.
- Physicians staff the PMH emergency room around the clock, seven days a week.
- The emergency room is certified to administer clot-busting drugs in the case of a stroke.
- The nearest other emergency room is 19.6 miles from Purcell and travel time depends on road construction and traffic.
- Of 76 rural hospitals in Oklahoma, 36 receive sales tax support. To date, PMH hasn't needed that revenue. But it

needs it now.

- The hospital provides free community services, including a monthly diabetic support group, blood pressure checks and health fairs.
- The hospital recently expanded Purcell Medical Center between Cash Savers and Tractor Supply to accommodate walk-in patients and serve as an after-hours urgent care clinic.
- The new Telehospitalist program allows patients who don't have a local physician to remain in Purcell and be treated from Oklahoma City through the telemedicine program.

In addition, the committee of civic leaders and other supporters provided answers to questions being raised around town.

- What has the hospital done to improve its financial position?
- The hospital introduced an expense reduction plan in

February that cut eight positions and reduced hours for 16 employees. One more position has been eliminated since then.

- Closed the Maysville Medical Center.
- Discontinued 403B contributions for employees, flowers for employees and families of deceased patients, mileage reimbursement for employees, wound care, MRI, sleep study and mammography.
- Cut advertising to clinic only.
- Modified food purchasing to maximize contract pricing.
- Cut patient satisfaction survey cost in half.

Why didn't the hospital get the money from the other sales tax election?

- Under the 2009 ordinance, revenues were "restricted to capital expenditures for the use and benefit of the City and any

public trust having the City as beneficiary hereof including, but not limited to ..."

- The current proposition states "with the proceeds thereof being used to fund the operation, maintenance, staffing, construction, equipping and remodeling of Purcell Municipal Hospital ..."

Will the money generated from the sales tax be enough to sustain the operations of the hospital?

- With the current monthly cash deficit, the money generated from the sales tax will be enough to sustain the hospital."

How can the citizens of Purcell afford another penny sales tax?

- To put it in perspective, an additional penny sales tax on a \$100 purchase is only \$1. Likewise, on a \$1,000 purchase, the additional tax would be \$10.

Our volunteers were able to help 29 surviving spouses with their claims for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance, a new weekly record for us. To speed up the VA decision-making process, we are filing a VA form 21-0966 Intent to file the form on the first visit made by the surviving spouse or veteran. This gives the claimant a start date for the beginning of benefits. Many times it will take a month or two for them to obtain an appointment with their medical provider to have the VA form 21-2680 Aid and Attendance form filled out. These forms are available online at the VA website or stop to pick one up and get assisted by one of our knowledgeable volunteers. Please feel free to call (405) 550-8806. Listen to the options and dial the number of the person who you need to speak to. For assistance press: Dale option 101, Helen option 102, Rhonda option 103, Shirley option 104, Clayton option 105, Pastor Jim Gann option 106.

We are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that uses your donations to provide services to veterans and their families. This may include rent, utility bills, food items, medical testing along with a myriad of their other unmet needs. We also provide transportation to veterans to the OKC VA Hospital and other medical providers for those veterans who need this service. Currently, we are spending an average of \$3,000 each week to provide these services to those in need.

We are continually looking for men and women in our community who would like to give back to others who have been less fortunate. An OSBI background check is required before being approved as a volunteer. We are currently assisting an average of 200 veterans and surviving spouses each week.

Our vehicles that are used to transport veterans and supplies were wrapped with our information by Infiniti-Tint of Norman last week. Our vehicles are now easily identifiable with their military logos along with the flags and eagles. We also added our (405) 550-8806 phone number on each side.

recipient of two Silver Stars, one for his actions in the Korean War and another one while serving in Vietnam as well as several Purple Heart medals. We are going to work on his PTSD claim as the VA only initially rated him at 30 percent. Later we will request service connection of Traumatic Brain Injury as he was shot in the head and has not yet been evaluated for a TBI. It looks to me like this is one of the Veterans who may have slipped through the cracks of the VA system in past years.

Each week that we provide our services at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, I'm very proud to call this church our home. We are helping over 200 people each week to have a better life.

A group of folks from Legal Aid also joins us each Tuesday and Thursday and is available to assist our veterans and their families. Most of the people who we help are not receiving assistance from other organizations. I have talked to people who were taking turns on who got their prescriptions each month. Many of our seniors and young are doing without the necessities of life. This is one of the many reasons our volunteers are going to do all we can to assist veterans and their families to receive all of their VA benefits.

We have volunteers from Legal Aid to help veterans and their families with questions. They arrive at 9 a.m. on both Tuesday and Thursday, there is no charge for their services.

We appreciate Pastor Jim Gann and the congregation of Faith Pointe Baptist Church

for supporting our mission to help the veterans and their families who have served in the military. Pastor Gann is available each day to help you with your spiritual needs.

Homeowners, families should protect against mosquitoes

Oklahomans planning to work and play outdoors this summer should be prepared to protect against mosquitoes.

Whether working in the garden, taking a brisk evening walk or enjoying a family picnic, there are safety precautions people can and should take when outside.

"The lifecycle of a mosquito all depends on water," said Justin Talley, Oklahoma State University livestock entomologist. "They have to have water for their immature stages to develop, so anywhere there's water, there could be mosquitoes developing in it."

Around the house, the most important step families can take in preventing mosquitoes from building up is to reduce the amount of standing water around the property.

"The main concern with standing water is the potential to serve as a breeding ground

for mosquitoes, which could be infected with viruses such as West Nile and Zika," Talley said.

Homeowners should check their property for any areas that have the potential to hold water, such as bird baths, containers in gardens and even tree holes and make sure the water is draining.

In cases where the home has a water feature, property owners can put out mosquito dunks or granules to prevent mosquitoes from developing in the water.

Homeowners also can spray ornamental plants with an insecticide that repels mosquitoes from landing on them or, if they do land, leaves a residue that will prevent the population from building up.

When it comes to outdoor activities, wearing long sleeves and long pants can provide a first line of defense in terms of preventing mosquito bites.


However, the most effective protection comes from repellents containing at least 15 percent DEET. Some natural products, such as lemon eucalyptus oil, also are effective at repelling the pests.

"Mosquitoes are generally most active at dusk and dawn," Talley said. "If you're outside early in the morning or late in the evening, you need to put on some type of repellent. However, container breeding mosquitoes that can carry Zika and other viruses are active during the afternoon and will feed during the daytime."

Repellents with DEET should not be used on children 3 years or younger and no repellent of any kind should be used on children 2 months or younger.

"When you're putting repellent on a child, usually the best technique is for adults to put some repellent in their hand and wipe it on to ensure thorough coverage," Talley said.

Our world is fractured with misunderstandings, and prejudice, and profiling. People are often judged only by the color of their skin – brown or black or white. The Bible always invites us into a different world. It invites us to create a new world.

The liturgy of this past Sunday invites us into a world of hospitality. What does it mean to be hospitable? What does it mean to welcome someone? What gifts are promised to us by our hospitality? Hospitality is the invitation of strangers to become friends. Hospitality is the inviting of strangers into a common space in order to listen to them tell their stories. Hospitality is, in the end, an act of risk. It is risky to talk to and to listen to strangers. Why? Because it might change us. It might change our own perspective. By listening to someone, we hear their story. We understand them better. We know better the things they love, the things they fear, the things that make them afraid. We understand better their story of how they have become who they are.

Abraham invited the three men to rest, to sit under a tree, to eat food that his wife had prepared (Gen. 18). Abraham wanted to hear their story, he wanted to hear about their journey. He sat under the tree and listened to them. Because of this, Abraham and Sarah were blessed. They were blessed with the promise of a new child. They were blessed with a brand new life, a little baby.

Mary and Martha welcomed Jesus into their home (Lk 10). Martha prepared a meal. Mary sat at the feet of Jesus. Together they were blessed with the words of a Savior, with the words that bring eternal life, with the words upon which they can build their house. Their house can be built upon a rock, a rock of faith that will not be washed away with the strong winds and the waves, a rock of faith that endures the storms of life. That is what Mary was listening for, at the feet of Jesus.

When we welcome the stranger, we do not expect friendship necessarily. We only expect understanding. We expect deeper knowledge. We expect to recognize the things that bind us all together – love of our family, love of our children, hope for the future and a desire for God.

Astronomers tell us that when we look at the stars, we are looking far into the past. The closest star is four light years away. So, the light we are seeing was formed four years ago. Some stars that we see are 4,000-6,000 light years away. The light we see from them today was formed when we were still using stone tools here on earth! When we see their light, we are looking into the past. Just so, when we look into someone's eyes, we are seeing light that was formed from events that happened in that person's past – events that have formed that person. We don't know what they are. We may never know what they are.

And so we accept that person out of hospitality.

The Eucharist is an act of hospitality. When we receive the body and blood of Jesus, we are welcoming him into our hearts. It is a risk to welcome Jesus into our hearts. Why? Because we might be changed. Just like the three magi who visited the child Jesus in the manger, we will go home by another way. We will leave as changed persons.

Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen once commented that "no one who encounters Christ will come away without being changed." We are welcoming Jesus into our lives. We desire to know Him more deeply. We expect deeper knowledge. We expect deeper intimacy. We expect that Jesus will change us and will bless us, also, with new life.



**Lexington School Notice to Parents Regarding
Child Identification, Location, Screening and Evaluation**

This notice is to inform parents of the child identification, location, screening and evaluation activities to be conducted throughout the year by the Lexington School District in coordination with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. Personally identifiable information shall be collected and maintained in a confidential manner in carrying out the following activities:

Referral
Preschool children, ages three through five and students enrolled in K-12 who are suspected of having disabilities which may require special and related services may be referred for screening and evaluation through the local schools. Local school districts and the Regional Education Service Centers coordinate with the Sooner Start Early Intervention Program in referrals for identification and evaluation of infants and toddlers who may be eligible for early intervention services from birth through two years of age or for special education and related services beginning at three years of age. The Oklahoma Area Wide Service Information System (OASIS), through a toll free number (1-800-42-OASIS), also provides statewide information and referrals to local schools and other service providers.

Screening
Screening activities may include vision, hearing, and health. Other screening activities may include: review of records and educational history; interviews; observations; and specially developed readiness or educational screening instruments. The Regional Education Service Centers provide assistance and consultation to local schools in these efforts.

(1) Readiness Screening
Personally identifiable maturational assessment test information is collected on all kindergarten students participating in maturational assessment test screening to assess readiness prior to entry into first grade. Results of the screening are made available to parents or legal guardians, teachers, and school administrators. No child shall be screened for readiness or evaluated without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

(2) Educational Screening
Educational screening includes accepted procedures for the identification of children who may have special learning needs and may be eligible for special education and related services in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Each school district in the state provides educational screening. No child shall be educationally screened without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

- Educational screening is implemented for all first grade students by giving maturational assessment tests each school year.
- Second through twelfth grade students shall be screened as needed or upon request of the parent, legal guardian or teacher.
- Students entering the public school system from another state or from within the state without previous educational screening, shall be educationally screened within six months from the date of such entry.

Evaluation
Evaluation means procedures used in accordance with federal laws and regulations to determine whether a child has a disability and the nature and extent of the special education and related services that the child needs. The term means procedures used selectively with an individual child and does not include basic tests administered or procedures used with all children in a school, grade, or class. Written consent of the parent or legal guardian for such evaluation must be on file with the Lexington School District prior to any child receiving an initial evaluation for special education and related services purposes.

Collection of Personally Identifiable Information
Educational records containing personally identifiable information collected by schools in the identification, location, screening and evaluation of children shall be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the **Policies and Procedures for Special Education in Oklahoma**. School districts develop and implement a local policy regarding the collection, storage, disclose and destruction of confidential student records. Parents may obtain a copy of the local policy from the Lexington School District's Superintendent. These are the rights of parents and children regarding personally identifiable information in accordance with FERPA:

- To inspect the students' education records;
- To request the amendment of education records to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the students' privacy or other rights;
- To consent to disclose education records, except where consent is not required to authorize disclosure;
- To file complaints with the Family Policy and Regulations Office, United States Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202, concerning the alleged violations of the requirements of FERPA (34 CFR § 99.1-99.67); and
- To obtain a copy of the FERPA policy adopted by the Lexington School District upon request being made to the Lexington School Superintendent.

Before any major identification, location, or evaluation schools shall provide notice to parents. Accommodations for other languages or means of communications may be provided upon request. Such notice shall occur at least annually prior to conducting these activities and shall include the rights of parents under FERPA. For further information, please contact the following:



BBQ tradition comes to Purcell

Van's Pig Stand brings more than 80 years of experience

Restaurants come and restaurants go.

So it says something extraordinary when a restaurant brand can claim 86 years of continuous operation and the distinction of being the oldest single family-owned and operated barbecue eatery in the state.

Recently it's Purcell's good fortune that Van's Pig Stands chose the McClain County seat as the location of their fifth restaurant.

Mark Shuman is one of the owners.

"We'd been looking at Purcell since 2005," Shuman said this week. "It's a small town - what we go for - similar to Shawnee."

When Van's management first considered Purcell, however, Val's Barbeque was a going concern here.

"When Val's went out of business, we wanted to come in and be part of your community," Shuman said.

The new Van's Pig Stand at 2234 N. Green Ave., employs 28.

The building, Shuman noted, went through two previous occupancies as a restaurant.

Still, some extensive work in the kitchen was needed to make it pig stand ready.

Among the major changes were "a lot" of vent hoods and

walk-in coolers.

"I like the inside of this store a lot," Shuman said. "The store has a lot of character in it. We like to take buildings that were something else and put our twist on them."

There's a standard menu to be found at all five Van's locations - two in Shawnee, and one each in Norman, Moore and Purcell.

But local managers are also given leeway in offering a limited menu unique to that restaurant.

Purcell, he added, has a third-pound hamburger for \$3.99.

"That's a real good deal," he added.

Also, at least once a year all the Van's Pig Stands offer two pig sandwiches for \$5.

Shuman said Van's Pig Stands marked their 86th anniversary on June 5.

Five years ago, they celebrated the 81st anniversary with 81-cent sandwiches.

The first Van's Pig Stands opened in 1928. Leroy Vandergrif opened one in Wewoka and his brother, Briggs, opened a second in Wichita Falls, Texas.

In 1929, the brothers opened two more pig stands in Seminole and Wichita, Kan.

Leroy Vandergrif chose Shawnee for his third pig stand location on June 5, 1930, and Van's Pig Stand has been a presence in Oklahoma ever since.

Shuman got his own start with the pig stands as a dishwasher in the original Shawnee restaurant

in 1992.

Shuman estimated the Purcell pig stand smokes and serves about a ton of meat a week.

He said all the pig stands like to rely on local vendors. One hang up here has been "we haven't found a local source for hickory yet."

Most of the restaurant staff is local too, hailing from Purcell, Lexington and Dibble.

"Most of the night staff are high school students from here in town," Shuman said. "Parents have done a really good job of raising their children. They have a good work ethic."

Hours are 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Sundays through Thursdays and 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays.

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
