





First Oklahoma case of West Nile Virus announced for 2016

The first case of West Nile transmits the virus when biting WNV and 10 people died from 2016 mosquito season in Oklahoma has been confirmed in a Pittsburg County resident.

In addition, collections of mosquitoes which tested positive for WNV have been previously reported by public health officials at the Tulsa and Oklahoma City-County Health Departments.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) encourages residents to take precautions to reduce the risk of contracting WNV, a mosquito-borne illness. WNV is spread through the bite of the Culex mosquito, which

virus (WNV) disease for the humans, horses and some other mammals.

This type of mosquito increases in numbers during mid to late summer when the temperatures climb and the weather pattern is dry.

Summertime typically marks the beginning of the WNV season in Oklahoma, with outdoor activities providing opportunities for encountering infected mosquitoes.

Although the severity of this year's WNV season cannot be predicted, it is important to know the months with highest risk in Oklahoma occur from July through October. During feeds on infected birds and 2015, there were 89 cases of

the illness.

Symptoms of WNV vary widely depending on a person's risk for more severe disease that involves the central nervous system. Some may experience sudden onset of fever, headache, dizziness, and muscle weakness and recover within one to three weeks while others develop life-threatening meningitis or encephalitis causing confusion, stupor, paralysis or

Long-lasting complications of WNV disease can include difficulty concentrating, mi-

one in grades 6-9; and 4 high school tests in English, math, science and U.S. history.

Finally, House Republicans pushed through a measure designed to return flexibility in evaluating teachers back to local school districts, an effort supported by the Department of Education and school administrators from across the state.

House Bill 2957 eliminates the quantitative or student outcome measurements of the Teacher and Leader Effectiveness (TLE) evaluation system, which relieves school districts and teachers from VAM, Value Added Measures, a teacher evaluation system based on student test scores.

School districts do have the option of continuing to use quantitative measurements in evaluating teachers at the expense of the local school district.

The bill retains the qualitative measurements, which evaluate teachers based on classroom instruction and learning environment. The measure also creates a professional development component to be used as another qualitative tool in the evaluation process. The Department of Education will create the professional development component to be introduced during the 2018-2019 school year.

It is estimated that this measure could save local school districts millions, and would save the Oklahoma Department of Education more than \$900,000 annually.





Hewett: Substance abuse. Probably 75 percent of our inmates are directly or indirectly there because of substance abuse. We are working very

closely with our partners in the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, OSBI and mental health agencies on this issue.

Lake: The most difficult problem facing law enforcement today is public trust and transparency. Policing is a *duty of the highest honor – also* of the highest responsibility, the highest visibility, and the greatest challenge. Our actions, our conduct, what we do and how we do it makes all the difference in inspiring trust. As sheriff I will inspire trust within my deputies and they will be the best, the brightest and the most dedicated in defending the ideals and the citizens that make the county great. One of the problems facing McClain County Sheriff's Office is the perception that county residents presently are not a priority to the current administration. Complaints of unanswered calls, lack of deputy presence in the county, failure to follow up on calls and public safety issues at the jail are just a few of the many issues.

As an Accredited VA Claims Agent I receive the VA rating decisions on each of the veterans and surviving spouse whom I represent. As each decision is reviewed, we send a letter advising next steps.

On some VA decisions, the veteran or spouse may have been denied service connection for a disability. We now have the ability to send that person a letter asking them to return for a follow-up visit to find a way to change a denial to an approval. Last week I received the rating decisions from VA for 16 of these men and women veterans and the monetary benefit will be more than \$572,000 per year. They will also be eligible for other federal and state benefits.

For those of you who received that VA rating, please bring the following items for your next visit: Rating Decision, Marriage License, Spouse Insurance Cards, DD-214. When checking in, please check the blank for 100 percent so we can send you to the right volunteer. We have three ladies, Virginia, Mary and Shirley, who specialize in state and federal benefits for those rated 100 percent or for the Surviving Spouse DIC benefits. I also received 27 rating decisions for veterans whose service-connected disabilities were rated from 10-90 percent. The combined annual monetary benefit for these veterans will be more than \$357,00 per year.

Speaking from my experiences at the VA Hospital in OKC I have always received the appropriate treatment. Sometimes I do feel that they could use more doctors to alleviate the wait time. For the residents of the neigh- Personally, I believe the people

OSU Extension News

Redbud leaffolder

One of the most popular trees in our area is the Oklahoma State Tree, the Redbud. It supplements our landscapes with beautiful hues of purple, pink and whites at a time of year when very few other plants are blooming. They are a pretty durable small specimen tree with very few pests usually.

This year, it appears an insect $referred to as the {\it red} budle affolder$ is building populations large enough to do serious damage to our prized plants. This insect can cause severe damage to the foliage of redbuds if left untreated. The characteristic injury is folding the edge of the leaf onto the upper surface and fastening it down with strands of silk.

Where the infestation is heavy, there may be two to four folded areas on a leaf. Leaves may also be tied to each other or to nearby surfaces. In the folded areas the larvae feed on the upper surface layer of the leaf. This brings about the dry-

The redbud leaffolder overwinters as a pupa attached to a fallen leaf. They may become detached from the leaf and come to rest in debris or on the surface of the soil. Adults emerge in late April to early May and lay eggs on the leaves near the veins.

The first generation continues through June. Second and third generation eggs are laid in a thin web in a folded leaf. The second generation occurs in late July and August and the third in September and early October. The third generation overlaps the second in the fall. During rainy summer weather a fungus disease sometimes attacks and kills the larvae.

The adult is a small moth with dark brown wings which have 10 small white spots. The head and collar are also white. It is slightly over 1/4 inch long and has a wingspread of about 1/2 inch. The eggs are oval, white, and very small. Small larvae are ing out of the leaf and it turns white but during the latter part brown. When the damage is of the next to last instar dark The mature larva has alternat-

ing white and black bands and is about 1/2 inch long. The worms are very active when touched, often wiggling right off the leaf. The dark brown pupa is held to a leaf by a sparse, loosely made web.

Populations appear to be heavy again this year. If you have a redbud tree you should check for the presence of folded leaves on the plant. If after unfolding some of the leaves and finding the worms present an insecticide application may be warranted.

There are several products on the market that should prove satisfactory as long as they are labeled for ornamentals and you can get the product to "run" down into the folds of the leaves. An organic solution would be an application of Bt (Bacillus thuringiensis) that stops the worms from feeding once it is ingested.
