The seed threshing operation is yet another of the broomcorn industry's less conventional functions. 





## Oklahoma is getting \$2 billion. How should it be spent?

### **TrevorBrown Oklahoma Watch**

Oklahoma is about to go on a multi-billion dollar spending spree — but there's a catch, \$1.87 billion. actually several.

Oklahoma, like other states, has already dolled out hundreds of millions of federal dollars on COVID-19 response efforts through Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES) funding that was approved by Congress last year.

State leaders, however, have another reservoir of money to spend thanks to a new relief package - the American Rescue Plan Act — that President March.

The new law will send about \$1.9 billion in direct funds to the state along with several hundred million more going out to cities, counties and smaller communities.

"This is an opportunity for the state of Oklahoma with an amount of money we have never seen before," said Rep. Kevin Wallace, R-Wellston.

But as lawmakers begin to look to the public for guidance, there are tight restrictions on where the money can be spent, across the country. It hasn't authorizes the spending. After will be split up. the Legislature's newly formed Joint Committee on Pandemic Relief Funding met for the first time Wednesday, here's a look at the main questions surrounding the money. In addition, Oklahoma's 77 counties will split \$728 million, the 10 largest cities will receive a total of \$315 million and smaller cities and towns (under 50,000 population) - classified by the federal government as "non-entitlement users" will receive \$238 million.

and spend it by the end of 2026. With such a large pot of money and with the prospect of possibly pooling funds with local governments to fund larger projects, Houston said it's critical that officials start the work now.

"It's important to think long term because these funds are long-term funds," she said. "This isn't like CARES dollars that have to go out the door tomorrow."

## What Can They Spend it

Although federal guidelines are relatively broad, officials will be restricted on how to spend the money.

According to the U.S. Department of Treasury, allowed uses include:

• Supporting public health, such as funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare and certain public health and safety staff.

• Addressing negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries and the public sector.

• Replacing lost public sector revenue, using this funding to





In recent weeks, we have seen courageous Cubans flood the streets across their country. The Cuban people desperately desire to protest the tyranny and incompetence of the communist dictatorship that has ruled their country with an iron hand for 62 years.

Their brave protests are demanding the very things most Americans take for granted – free elections, free speech and economic opportunity.

Cuba's brutal communist regime has been quick to respond to the demonstrations of its own citizens. Protestors have been beaten in the streets, hundreds of non-violent demonstrators have been imprisoned, the internet has been cut off and media outlets have been silenced. Sadly, many western leaders and countries have ignored or soft-pedaled the plight of the Cuban people and the barbarity of the regime that rules this beleaguered island nation.

In our own country, apologists for the Cuban regime in Congress have actually blamed America for the troubles of Cuba.

for many decades, is the cause of the current demonstrations. In doing so, they ignore the brutality and ineptitude of the communist clique that has ruled Cuba for six decades.

And they also turn a blind eye to Cuba's efforts to spread its own brand of communism, called "democratic socialism," across Latin America.

Indeed, even as it faces demonstrations in its own streets, Cuba's communist regime is helping to prop up despotic regimes in Venezuela and Nicaragua.

The struggle of brave and bold Cubans demanding freedom is a sobering reminder of the harsh and oppressive reality of socialism and communism. These seductive ideologies have failed time and time again when put into practice in countries around the world.

When Fidel Castro came into power in 1959, Cuba was one of the wealthiest countries in the Western Hemisphere. Castro promised economic prosperity and freedom under the guise of "democratic socialism."

administrations of both parties self-perpetuating communist dictatorship.

> While many Cuban apologists on the American left blame the U.S. embargo for Cuba's problems, the real culprit is its own communist regime. Indeed, as America's own thriving Cuban community has demonstrated, when given political freedom and economic opportunity, Cubans, like other people, will thrive and prosper.

> Indeed, the contrast between the thriving Cuban community in Florida and the miserable plight of Cubans in Cuba itself is convincing proof of the superiority of democratic capitalism over the false promises of communist dictatorship.

> I am disappointed that so many members of Congress have been oblivious to the drama taking place in Cuba just 90 miles off our shores.

Rather than blaming American policy for the failures of Cuba's communist regime, they should be encouraging the brave Cuban protestors and urging our government to do what it can to support their protests and rally the world to

**Delta spreads faster** The Delta variant of SARS-CoV-2 emerged from India in late 2020 and has spread across the globe like wildfire by out-competing other variants worldwide. How did it do this?

While the exact mechanism is still being studied, this variant tweaked its outer spike protein to better bind to and infect our cells than it ever has before. People infected with Delta have over 1,000 times more virus in their cells than the original strain, making Delta infection spread sooner after exposure than ever before and with much higher amounts of virus, resulting in rapid spread from person-to-person.

The symptoms may be a little different

Gone are the days where loss of smell was a go-to symptom for COVID-19. Common signs of Delta infection include headache, runny nose, sneezing, and a sore throat — sounds a lot like allergies or a cold, right?

That's problematic because many people will assume it's "not COVID" and continue their lives while shedding large amounts of virus to others. And many will still end up hospitalized since the inflammatory damage from COVID is far more severe than that in allergies or a cold.

Coughing, fever, and loss of smell or taste are all still possible, just not a hallmark sign in every case. So please get tested frequently.

### Delta isn't necessarily more severe in kids — but it is more transmissible

We don't yet know if Delta causes more severe disease in demic of the unvaccinated at kids than previous variants, but this point. we do know it spreads through unvaccinated people, including children, rapidly. The available vaccines are safe, well-studied and remain effective.As new variants emerge, the ability of the vaccine to prevent infection does drop a little. For example, the Pfizer-BioNTech mRNA vaccine was originally 99 percent effective at preventing severe disease, then dropped to 93 percent effective with the Alpha variant, and currently sits around 88 percent with the Delta variant.

Here's the thing though. Eighty-eight percent is still very good. Breakthrough infections among the vaccinated remain rare and disease in these instances often remains mild. This vaccine is worth it.

### We need you to make good choices

The choices we make this fall will be a little different depending on our families, communities and lifestyle. I know we all have decision fatigue, but we need to think critically just a little bit longer.

There will be settings where masking remains appropriate regardless of vaccine status - especially in large indoor crowds. There will be events that may not be worth the risk to you or your family depending on vaccine status and your health.

Most importantly, if you are eligible for COVID vaccination but have not received it, please get any lingering questions answered and make the choice to get vaccinated.

during the school year by school ing procedure. or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps, "Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" (TANF), or "Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations" (FDPIR) must list the child's name, his/her food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you do not list a food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk regardless of the child's income. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals or milk for them, contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the school for a hearing to appeal the decision. The school's policy statement contains an outline of the hear-

The household of a child currently certified to receive food stamps, TANF or FDPIR benefits will be notified of the child's eligibility and that the child will be provided free benefits unless the household notifies the school that it chooses to decline benefits.



Smart irrigation practices benefit plants and budgets

Using smart irrigation practices is as important as selecting the right plants when establishing and maintaining a landscape, according to Oklahoma State University Extension experts.

Josh Campbell, OSU Extension urban agriculture and natural resources educator in Oklahoma County, said July and August are when Oklahomans use the most water in the landscape.

"It's important for homeowners to know how to irrigate their landscape efficiently and in a cost-effective manner so the plants can develop strong root systems," Campbell said.

To help maximize water efficiency, Campbell said consumers need to select plants that are suited for Oklahoma's environment. The initial period of establishing the plant to encourage root growth will require more water, but it will make the plant more sustainable for the future.

"From the homeowner's perspective, they'll get healthier plants that will require less water, and this can put money back in their pockets," he said.

Although parts of Oklahoma experienced higher-than-normal rainfall this summer, even novice gardeners know they can't count on rainfall as the sole source of plant irrigation. "Your return on investment will be good," he said. "Utilizing smart irrigation technology is a huge asset for homeowners and doesn't cost much more than a regular system."

A regular irrigation system works on a timer set to go off at predetermined times. Smarter technology has the advantage of using real-time weather information and smartphone app controls to reduce wasted water.

For example, a regular system might be set to go on at 10 a.m. every other morning during the heat of the summer. However, a surprise rainstorm could pop up while the homeowner is at work. With smart irrigation, automatic adjustments save many gallons of water while nature takes care of the watering chores.


The Chickasaw Cultural Center reopened to guests July 24. Hours of operation have changed to Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. until 5 p.m.
