He is currently director of the Neuroscience Service Line at OU Health University of Oklahoma Medical Center, a post held since August 2016.

Wright, an RN, began his medical career in 1984 after receiving his bachelor's degree in nursing from West Texas State University. He also has a master's degree in business administration from Colorado State University.

He worked as a critical care staff nurse and travel nurse through 1991 when he joined the staff at St. David's Medical Center in Austin.

Over the span of more than 12 years, he advanced from ICU/CCU staff nurse to director of critical care and neuroscience

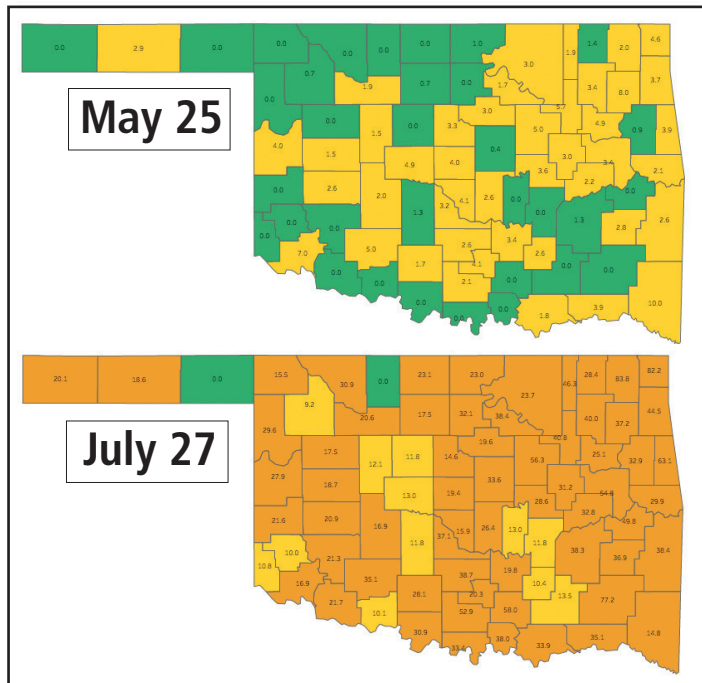
Once the seed has been threshed from the bush, the heads of its 18-inch long fibers are placed on the slats in the drying

The four competed on the team three years, advancing to area competition during their junior and senior years.

In addition, Evan performed with the Oklahoma Youth Orchestra and Summer Arts Institute Orchestra.

This weekend the clouds will disappear and we will be left with some pretty good sunshine as highs will make their way into the mid-90s.

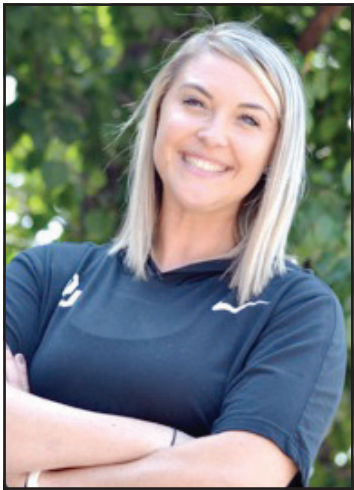
These days will be pretty

and all they pushed through to get to that point.”

At the Early June Division I softball tournament, the Sooners concluded play with a 5-1 victory over the Florida State Seminoles.

It was the Sooners fifth championship overall, having won championships in 2000, 2013, 2016 and 2017.

The 2021 season was Bump’s first year to serve as the Sooners’ trainer. She said obviously the biggest high in the season was the WCWS win; however, she said the whole season was

amazing.

“The ferocity that I got to watch this team play with was incredible,” Bump said. “They are amazing athletes.”

She said the Sooners have “some crazy drive, and when they set their minds to it they will make it happen.”

She added, “They knew what they wanted, and I knew they could do it.”

Bump, originally from El Paso, Texas, first came to Oklahoma University in 2012 for graduate school.

At that time she worked as a graduate assistant athletic trainer with the women’s rowing program. Also during that time, the rowing program won back-to-back Big 12 Championships.

“After my two-year program was up, I knew I wanted to come back to Oklahoma in the future,” Bump said.

Her husband of seven years, Brant Bump, who just recently concluded service as a Chief Warrant Officer in the U.S. Army, is also an OU graduate along with a majority of his family.

“When he ended his time in the Army, we knew where we wanted to land,” Bump said. “It just happened to work out that OU had a position available in Athletic Medicine when I moved back to Oklahoma.”

Bump said she and Brant are still new to Newcastle, having built their home here in November 2020, but she’s already made herself a part of the community as a member of the Newcastle Lions Club.

Robin Fielder, Lions Club president, said Bump is on both the membership committee, and on the planning committee for the Veterans Day 5K, which will be held later this year at Newcastle’s Veterans Park. The intent of the 5K run is to raise funds for veterans.

Fielder said Bump, for obvious reasons, was very active with the Sooners’ softball program during this year’s season, but she also found time to help Lions Club with its Bingo fund raisers and its food drive.

With a new school year starting August 23, Bump is already active with Sooner Athletics. Although the Division 1 softball games don’t begin until February 2022, the Sooners have a full roster of 22 players composed of five red shirt seniors, two seniors, four juniors, four sophomores, and seven freshmen.

Bump said at this time her plans are to continue working with OU Athletic Medicine and the women’s softball team providing medical care.

As one can see from the returning players and the large freshman class, the Sooners are expected to have another good year. Bump will be there doing her job to help keep them healthy and playing strong.

Newspapers face challenge with postal rate increase

A planned postal rate increase by the United State Postal Service to offset projected losses has stoked opposition from publishers and mailers, as well as members of Congress.

"We believe that the PRC, Postal Regulatory Commission, did not have the authority to approve a rate increase above the rate of inflation, which is what they did," said Brett Wesner, National Newspaper Association chair and owner of 10 newspapers in western Oklahoma, including the Cordell Beacon. "If they don't have the right to do it, it can't hold. It has to be reversed."

The postal service announced its intention to increase the cost to mail letters and postcards by 6.9 percent on average beginning August 29. Postage for magazines, newspapers and catalogs will rise by 8.8 percent, which is a big concern for newspaper owners, especially on the heels of a 1.8 percent increase in January.

Oklahoma Rep. Frank Lucas (R, Cheyenne) joined 11 other House Republicans and nine House Democrats in writing a letter on July 1 asking the postal service to postpone the increase until January 2022. The letter said the increase is "premature and counterproductive."

"We have heard clearly from employers in our districts and across the nation that a second increase in a single year will be highly disruptive and result in significant job losses and significant reduction in their use of Postal Service mail services," the lawmakers said

in their letter. "Many of these companies, especially small businesses, cannot afford a second increase, saying such action will reduce revenues and lead to job losses."

The increase will also impact businesses, with prices rising for shipping out marketing materials.

The Postal Regulatory Commission, which is an independent agency that oversees the Postal Service, endorsed the price increase request on July 19, allowing the USPS to proceed with the increase. Despite the endorsement, the proposal has been met with opposition.

The newspaper, magazines and nonprofit mailers filed a petition in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit on April 13, seeking to review the PRC's authority to approve price increases above inflation. Oral arguments were set for September 13.

On July 26, the group asked the court to put the increase on hold at least until the court makes a decision on the appeal. The court has not yet responded.

Wesner said community newspapers rely almost completely on the postal service to deliver their papers. With both the newspaper and their readers struggling during the pandemic, it is not possible to pass the cost to their customers. "We really feel that this is an inappropriate move, it's not

necessary. And the timing is horrible," Wesner said. "The rates haven't gone into effect yet, so we haven't seen any newspapers close specifically because of these rates. But it wouldn't surprise me at all to see some just say: well this is the final straw."

Wesner said more than 2,000 newspapers have closed in the past 10 years, for various reasons such as decreasing readership and advertising.

Phillip Reid, who owns 11 Oklahoma newspapers, said it is difficult to increase the price of newspaper subscriptions in small markets, because readers think newspapers should not be expensive. Postal rate increases reduce the profit margin significantly, he said.

"In all of our towns that [our newspapers] are in, we're the biggest customer for the post office," Reid said. "Now, it feels like a penalty."

Reid's printing facilities send out about 65,000 copies and Wesner sends out about 20,000 copies weekly. With more than 200 local newspapers in Oklahoma and thousands across the country, Wesner said, if the postal rate increases are approved, some papers will go out of business and it will not help the post office's business either.

Jeff Mayo, owner of seven Oklahoma newspapers, said

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Absentee ballots

Apply now for September 14 vote

McClain County voters who want absentee ballots mailed to them for the September 14 Lindsay and Maysville school special elections should apply now, county election board secretary Karen Haley said.

Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the county election board by 5 p.m. September 7 to be processed in time for the election.

No excuse is needed to vote by absentee ballot.

Absentee voters may apply in person at the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse or may mail, fax or email their applications.

Voters can also submit a request using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp. Request forms are also available at oklahoma.gov/elections.

"With some exceptions, all absentee ballots must be notarized before being returned," Haley said. "Voters should give themselves plenty of time to make sure all steps have been followed and that the ballot is returned correctly in order to be counted."

Exempt from having a ballot notarized are vot-

ers who are physically incapacitated, those who care for physically incapacitated individuals who cannot be left alone, and voters confined to nursing homes. Those voters may opt to have their ballot witnessed by two people.

Military personnel and residents living overseas, along with their spouses and dependents are also eligible for certain allowances. Military personnel should contact Voting Service Officers in their units for absentee application forms.

Residents living overseas may obtain absentee voting applications from any United States military installation or United States Embassy or Consulate.

Those who need to complete a new Voter Registration Application should apply through the Federal Voting Assistance Program at FVAP.gov.

Biden's converging crises

Since President Biden assumed office, the United States has been confronted with several crises, including an economic disruption caused by the coronavirus pandemic, an open southern border and an increase in dangerous crimes nationwide.

After a year of battling a dangerous virus, Americans are trying to get back on their feet and return to normal. However, the crises our country is facing as well as the spike in COVID-19 cases caused by other contagious variants is certainly making such an endeavor difficult.

For every month since President Biden assumed office, Americans across the country have experienced rising prices at the gas pumps, in the grocery stores and in essential home items.

A report published by the Consumer Price Index reports that inflation has increased to a steep 5.4 percent, the highest it has been in 13 years since the Great Recession. Everything costs more in President Joe

Biden's America.

What Americans used to pay for from pennies on the dollar is now costing substantial portions of their paychecks. Indeed, such inflation is taxation on the American people, and this inflation is a direct result of President Biden and Democrats' unprecedented government spending bills and tax hikes.

The success of America's middle class and small businesses are certainly at stake since they cannot afford the inflation tax that comes with the Democrats' failed economic policies. And now they are forced to raise their own prices as they struggle to pay for gasoline and food.

They are also facing labor shortages as Americans are opting to take unemployment benefits instead of returning to work as a direct result of the \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act signed into law by President Biden earlier this year that included \$300 billion in weekly unemployment benefits, which many Americans are still receiving.

While extra unemployment

benefits were critical in the early days and months of the pandemic in helping Americans who found themselves jobless by no fault of their own, economies are open and businesses are trying to fill positions. These benefits are now disincentivizing Americans to return to work and creating enormous labor and goods shortages.

For this reason, I am extremely appreciative of Governor Stitt's decision earlier this year to utilize existing federal funds to incentivize Oklahomans to get back to work. In his plan, the first 20,000 Oklahomans to return to work who were receiving unemployment benefits would receive a \$1,200 incentive using funds from the American Rescue Plan.

Getting Oklahomans and Americans back in the workforce is critical to helping our economy get back on track, and this was certainly a responsible use of federal dollars.

Now, President Biden and Democrats continue to propose trillions more in spending.

I recognize Sandy is sincere in her opposition to my suggestion that all eligible Oklahomans be vaccinated against this virus, especially the new and more dangerous Delta variant. Additional evidence is released daily as to the importance to do so.

For example: (1) On July 11, 487 more of our friends and neighbors in this state were newly infected. On July 25 1,125 were.

(2) There are no available pediatric beds left in our state so children are being shipped out of state to Texas for care.

(3) Nationwide in June there were 11,000 more Americans coming down daily with COVID-19. In July the number increased five fold to over 64,000.

(4) Oklahoma remains in the worst 10 states as measured by the rate of new cases.

I'm sad to say Sandy also offered some misinformation when she suggested pregnant women unnecessarily endanger themselves if they take the shots. That is not true. Also people with valid, religious objections to being vaccinated are eligible for exemptions to the shot requirements.

Finally, there is no question the three vaccines widely available to citizens above the age of 11 work. As proof 98 percent of new hospital admissions have been unvaccinated people.

There is little I can say, or medical experts can say, or even her local doctor can say to convince Sandy of the importance of getting protected from this killer virus but just because she wants to play roulette with her life, and by extension her family's lives, doesn't mean you should.

How rising construction costs could impact your homeowners insurance

Replacement Cost Coverage or Actual Cash Value Coverage

Take note of whether you have replacement cost coverage or actual cash value coverage. Replacement cost coverage would pay the cost of replacing something with a brand-new version.

If your home is destroyed, replacement cost coverage will pay the cost of materials and labor needed to rebuild the structure. On the other hand, actual cash value coverage (often referenced as replacement cost minus depreciation) will pay the actual reduced value of an item.

If your home was destroyed, the actual cash value would take into account the age of your home's walls, roof, floors, lighting, etc. You would only be paid for their depreciated value, not the cost of actually replacing them.

This weekend is also Oklahoma's Sales Tax Holiday where families can save on sales tax on certain clothing and shoe purchases of up to \$100. The annual event begins Friday, August 6 and will end at midnight on Sunday, August 8.

To learn more about the holiday or see a list of sales tax-exempt items, visit the Oklahoma Tax Commission website at Oklahoma.gov/tax.html.

Speaking of education, I also want to remind parents about the state's free college tuition program, Oklahoma's Promise. This is an incredible program that is underutilized, so it's important we help spread the word to assist more of our students get their college degrees or pursue further education at

one of our wonderful career technology centers.

To be eligible, students must be Oklahoma residents enrolled in the eighth-11th grade or homeschooled and ages 13-16. Parents' adjusted gross income must not exceed \$60,000 at the time of program enrollment or \$100,000 when the student starts college.

In the case of divorced couples, only the income of the custodial parent is used. If the custodial parent is remarried, that individual's income and the stepparent's income must be counted.

There are special income provisions for children adopted from certain court-ordered custody and children in the custody of court-appointed legal guardians as well as families receiving Social Security disability and death benefits.

If approved, students can earn

tuition at an Oklahoma public two-year college or four-year university, or a portion of tuition at an accredited Oklahoma private college or university or for approved programs at Oklahoma public technology centers.

Create your own backyard paradise

You don't need a plane ticket, tank full of gas or train ride to enjoy a bit of paradise. Create your own in a small alcove, large patio, or deck in your own backyard.

Start by visualizing what paradise looks and feels like to you. A table and chair surrounded by beautiful plants makes a wonderful space to relax, read a book and enjoy some alone time.

For some, it means a patio or deck filled with colorful planters and surrounded by ornamental grasses, vine covered trellises, flowering shrubs, and evergreens. These will help define the space, provide privacy, mask unwanted noise, and provide a great space for entertaining.

Don't let a lack of space, patio, or deck stop you from building a backyard getaway. Look for those underutilized areas. Perhaps it is a back corner of the yard, space next to the garage, side yard or a spot under a big shade tree. A vine covered arbor, piece of indoor-outdoor carpet and a few planters can turn any space into a backyard retreat.

Once you identify the space and desired function, think about the ambience you want to create. For a tropical escape, include leafy plants like elephant ears and bananas in pots, wicker furniture, a water feature and colorful flowers like begonias, hibiscus, and mandevilla.

Don't overlook hardy perennials. Plants like big leaf hostas, variegated Solomon's seal, crocosmia, cassia and others help create the look and feel of the tropics. Continue this theme by using bamboo, wicker, and wood for any needed screening.

If it is a visit to the Mediterranean you prefer, include stonework, planters with silver foliage plants like dusty miller, and sage and a few evergreens. Use upright junipers and grapevines trained on arbors for screening.

An urn or topiary make an attractive focal point. Fill the garden space with herbs, blue oat grass, calendula, salvia, and alliums.

For a casual visit to England, craft yourself a cottage garden.

Construct a narrow path leading through an archway at the entrance to your secret garden. Create an informal collection of flowers, herbs, and medicinal plants. Use a birdbath, piece of garden art or water feature as your focal point.

If it's the north woods you prefer, make a firepit the focal point, add some rustic furnishings and complete the scene with native plants. Or let your personality shine with a colorful bistro set, garden art, and flowers of orange, red, and yellow.

As your vision comes into focus, it is time to start putting your ideas on paper. A simple sketch will help you define the space, arrange the plants, and identify the appropriate furnishings and building materials. It is much easier to move items on paper than once they are set into the ground.

Always contact your local underground utility locating service at least three business days in advance. It's free and as easy as calling 811 or filing an online request.

They will contact all the appropriate companies who will mark the location of their underground utilities in the designated work area. This reduces the risk of injury and inconvenience of accidentally knocking out power, cable, or other utilities as you enhance your landscape.

Because this important step is often overlooked, August 11 has become National 811 Day. It's a reminder to include this important step when undertaking any landscape project, large or small. And remind others to do the same.

Once complete, you'll simply be able to step out your back door and enjoy your slice of paradise.

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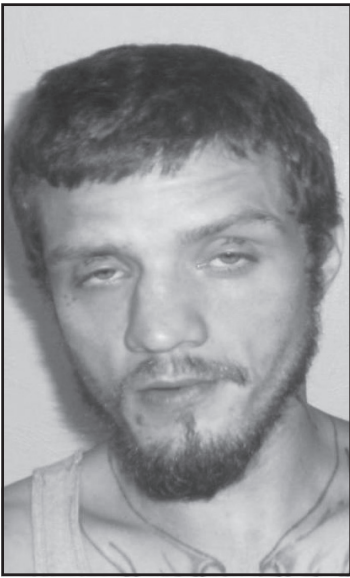
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FBI agent? Nope

Lex man facing four charges

A Lexington man who claimed he was an FBI agent is charged in McClain County District Court with two felonies and two misdemeanors.

The charges against Christopher W. Ferrell, 29, are second degree burglary, battery/assault and battery on a police officer, impersonating a police officer and obstructing an officer.

Prosecutors filed the four counts Friday, noting Ferrell has four previous felony convictions in Cleveland County.

Bond was set at \$25,000. According to an affidavit, Purcell police were called to investigate a disturbance at an apartment at 208 E. Main on July 25.

A woman said two people were in her father’s apartment, adding her father was not there.

Police contacted Ferrell and a female companion. When questioned, Ferrell allegedly rambled that he was with the FBI. He then handed the officer a school ID card that

wasn’t his.

After being placed in handcuffs, Ferrell reportedly gave police supervisor a fictitious name and birth date.

When no ID card could be found matching the name and birth date, the officer again asked Ferrell his name.

He then identified himself as Christopher Ferrell after saying the FBI told him to use a false name, according to the affidavit.

Police contacted the resident by phone and he confirmed Ferrell and the woman had no permission to be in the apartment.

Police recovered a bag allegedly packed by Ferrell and his companion and containing items belonging to the resident.

Ferrell, who reportedly was using methamphetamine, was taken to Purcell Municipal Hospital emergency room.

While there, his handcuffs were removed to he could drink a glass of water. He then became agitated, punching and kicking an officer who was trying to put handcuffs back on him, according to the affidavit.

During the struggle, he allegedly broke the officer’s radio, the affidavit stated.

Back to School: Lunch box food safety

Back to school is an exciting time filled with new school supplies, including a new lunch box. But a good lunch can easily go bad if not properly packed.

Without proper storage, perishable food is at risk for harmful bacteria after two hours, said Ravi Jadeja, food safety specialist for Oklahoma State University’s Robert M. Kerr Food and Agricultural Products Center.

“Bacteria that can cause foodborne illness, or food poisoning, grows rapidly at

temperatures between 40° to 140°,” Jadeja said. “These microorganisms can multiply to dangerous levels in just two hours, but packed lunches and snacks can be kept safe by following the USDA’s four steps to food safety: clean, separate, cook and chill.”

By following these FAPC recommended guidelines, children can have a safe and healthy school year.

Foods need to be cooked to a certain temperature to kill bacteria, but they also need to be properly stored to make sure bacteria doesn’t grow between the time you prepare food and when lunch time arrives.

Parents and caregivers can unintentionally decrease the safety of a packed lunch, whether it’s for an adult or child, when starting with the wrong food, said Barbra Brown, food specialist with the OSU Cooperative Extension and associate professor in the department of nutritional sciences.

“If they [consumers] pack food that needs to be kept cold but are not able to do so, harmful bacteria will increase to a potential case of foodborne illness by lunch,” Brown said.

newspapers are under tremendous pressure to continue covering their communities because of the shrinking number of locally-owned newspapers.

“We firmly support our post office, but this rate increase on top of the likelihood of reduced service is not good business. Not for the newspaper and not for our readers,” Mayo said.

Harve Allen, a spokesperson for the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, said nonprofit organizations will also be affected, due to the mailers they send out asking for donations.

Scott Martin, Norman Chamber of Commerce president, said businesses could be hurt because “these increased rates could dramatically impact their overhead, thus increasing the cost of goods and services charged to their customers.”

Next month’s price increase is part of the Delivering to America plan, which the postal service said would reverse a projected \$160 billion in losses over the next 10 years. Postmaster General and CEO Louis DeJoy said that even with the increase, the USPS has some of the lowest postage rates for letters in the world

and continues to offer a great value in shipping.

The postal service has also suggested cutting post office hours and extending the time it takes to deliver mail since the agency will switch some services to ground transportation instead of air transportation. The Postal Regulatory Commission has already rejected increasing shipping times.

Lawmakers said they are working on several postal reform proposals to provide Postal Service financial relief from longstanding and unique funding obligations. For instance, the Postal Service

Reform Act will include the removal of the requirement that the Postal Service pre-fund all its retiree health care benefits.

“While we continue to work to ensure the long-term financial sustainability of the Postal Service through legislation, we believe it is vital that the Postal Service not take any action that will weaken its long-term financial success by chasing customers out of the mail market,” they wrote.

Will Rogers sparkles from Portrait Gallery

“All I Know is what I read in the papers.”
—Will Rogers (1879-1935)

Washington’s National Portrait Gallery exhibit honoring America’s master of all media and the world’s hearts, “One Life: Will Rogers” got pandemic-whacked.

But nothing could stop Will from sharing his wit and wisdom.

The exhibit is curtains up online through Jan. 30 in English (<https://npg.si.edu/exhibition/one-life-will-rogers>) and Spanish (<https://npg.si.edu/es/exhibition/una-vida-will-rogers>), letting Will master the only mass media he hadn’t ruled already.

He was America’s voice as it became a world leader during the 20th Century’s first third: Hollywood’s highest paid actor and writer; newspaper and radio commentator whose columns, daily telegrams, broadcasts, and stage appearances were essential reading or listening.

He spoke simply about serious issues with sharp but gentle insights. Editors knew his writing often had misspellings, or grammar errors.

Some were deliberate; others came from using a portable typewriter on his lap between shooting movie scenes, going on stage or the radio, or flying in beloved but cramped airplanes.

“I joke about all the politicians but if I didn’t like ‘em I wouldn’t. I like ‘em all,” he wrote in 1933.

The top brass at the *New York Times* had orders that no one was to alter Rogers’ copy. His plain talk was charming.

Will also provided major relief during the Great Depression. He joined President Herbert Hoover, a frequent target of his jabs, for a joint radio broadcast where

Rogers sharply criticized administration Great Depression policy:

“The only problem that confronts this country today is at least 7,000,000 people are out of work. There is no other one before us at all. It’s to see that every man that wants to is able to work, is allowed to find a place to go to work, and also to arrange some way of getting a more equal distribution of the wealth in country.”

Will served as ambassador at-large for Presidents Hoover, Calvin Coolidge and Franklin D. Roosevelt.

And with his close friend Wiley Post he showed what aviation could become.

He died in an Aug. 15, 1935 plane crash with Post near Barrow, Alaska while doing what they loved in testing a new plane while exploring an aerial shortcut from North America to Russia.

Next week: The Kid describes the annual event on the ranch where Rogers was born. Each year aviation enthusiasts bring planes dating back to Will and Wiley when they scratched the itch called, “Let’s go flying.” It is tribute to aviators who lost their lives.

Lexington School Notice to Parents Regarding Child Identification, Location, Screening and Evaluation

This notice is to inform parents of the child identification, location, screening and evaluation activities to be conducted throughout the year by the Lexington School District in coordination with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. Personally identifiable information shall be collected and maintained in a confidential manner in carrying out the following activities:

Referral

Preschool children, ages three through five and students enrolled in K-12 who are suspected of having disabilities which may require special and related services may be referred for screening and evaluation through the local schools. Local school districts and the Regional Education Service Centers coordinate with the Sooner Start Early Intervention Program in referrals for identification and evaluation of infants and toddlers who may be eligible for early intervention services from birth through two years of age or for special education and related services beginning at three years of age. The Oklahoma Area Wide Service Information System (OASIS), through a toll free number (1-800-42-OASIS), also provides statewide information and referrals to local schools and other service providers.

Screening

Screening activities may include vision, hearing, and health. Other screening activities may include: review of records and educational history; interviews; observations; and specially developed readiness or educational screening instruments. The Regional Education Service Centers provide assistance and consultation to local schools in these efforts.

(1) Readiness Screening

Personally identifiable maturational assessment test information is collected on all kindergarten students participating in maturational assessment test screening to assess readiness prior to entry into first grade. Results of the screening are made available to parents or legal guardians, teachers, and school administrators. No child shall be screened for readiness or evaluated without prior notice to the child’s parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

(2) Educational Screening

Educational screening includes accepted procedures for the identification of children who may have special learning needs and may be eligible for special education and related services in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Each school district in the state provides educational screening. No child shall be educationally screened without prior notice to the child’s parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

- Educational screening is implemented for all first grade students by giving maturational assessments tests each school year.
- Second through twelfth grade students shall be screened as needed or upon request of the parent, legal guardian or teacher.
- Students entering the public school system from another state or from within the state without previous educational screening, shall be educationally screened within six months from the date of such entry.

Evaluation

Evaluation means procedures used in accordance with federal laws and regulations to determine whether a child has a disability and the nature and extent of the special education and related services that the child needs. The term means procedures used selectively with an individual child and does not include basic tests administered or procedures used with all children in a school, grade, or class. Written consent of the parent or legal guardian for such evaluation must be on file with the Lexington School District prior to any child receiving an initial evaluation for special education and related services purposes.

Collection of Personally Identifiable Information

Educational records containing personally identifiable information collected by schools in the identification, location, screening and evaluation of children shall be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the **Policies and Procedures for Special Education in Oklahoma**. School districts develop and implement a local policy regarding the collection, storage, disclose and destruction of confidential student records. Parents may obtain a copy of the local policy from the Lexington School District’s Superintendent. These are the rights of parents and children regarding personally identifiable information in accordance with FERPA:

- To inspect the students’ education records;
- To request the amendment of education records to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the students’ privacy or other rights;
- To consent to disclose education records, except where consent is not required to authorize disclosure;
- To file complaints with the Family Policy and Regulations Office, United States Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202, concerning the alleged violations of the requirements of FERPA (34 CFR § 99.1-99.67); and
- To obtain a copy of the FERPA policy adopted by the Lexington School District upon request being made to the Lexington School Superintendent.

Before any major identification, location, or evaluation schools shall provide notice to parents. Accommodations for other languages or means of communications may be provided upon request. Such notice shall occur at least annually prior to conducting these activities and shall include the rights of parents under FERPA. For further information, please contact the following:

The application period for schools will be open in September and January. Applications for communities will open in November and March.

Grant dollars are limited and awarded on a first come, first serve basis. In previous funding cycles, demand for incentive grants have exceeded available funds.

To be eligible, schools and communities must pass and implement approved policies

to promote clean air, access to healthy and nutritious foods and physical activity. Documentation of having met each criterion is required.

To date, TSET has awarded over \$7.5 million in incentive grants.

Burglaries:

District Court with second degree burglary, injuring a church or contents and pattern of criminal offenses.

An arrest warrant is outstanding.

According to an affidavit, the church was ransacked and burglarized on January 15.

Stolen were musical and sound equipment, electronics, kitchenware, computers, DVR recording system and cameras, and tools.

The McClain County Sheriff’s Department located some of the stolen items along I-35 northbound near mile marker 100.

Police used LeadsOnline, a web-based tool for law enforcement, and located three speakers, a sound board and Black & Decker hedge trimmers which Morris reportedly pawned in Norman on January 20.

Serial numbers had been removed from the speakers and soundboard.

Then on January 27, police were contacted by the Garvin County Sheriff’s Department about a church burglary suspect they had just caught following

a pursuit in which he wrecked the vehicle he was driving.

When the undersheriff confirmed the suspect in custody was Morris, police attempted to interview him. But he refused to answer their questions, according to the affidavit.

Police contacted Morris’ father who said his son was driving the older man’s pickup in Garvin County.

He also said Morris didn’t live with him, but was storing property at the father’s place in Oklahoma City.

The son had placed a digital lock on the garage and the father didn’t have access to it. Additional items were stored in a bedroom and in the back yard, according to the affidavit.

Police executed a search warrant at the father’s residence, recovering an “immense amount of property” believed stolen from area churches.

The churches include John-son Road Baptist Church, Go Church in Norman, New Hope Church in Oklahoma City, First Baptist Church in Mustang, Tri-City Worship Center in Newcastle, Vamoosa Baptist Church in Konawa, First Bap-

tist Church in Minco, Bethany Church in Bethany, and St. John’s Nepomuk Church and Vision Church, both in Yukon.

Investigating agencies in addition to Purcell Police De-

partment include police departments in Norman, Oklahoma City, Mustang, Newcastle, Minco, Bethany and Yukon, as well as the Seminole County Sheriff’s Department.

block to provide the handlers with a solid surface on which to tap the butts of their bundles, thereby, facilitating an even distribution of the heads.

After a normal six weeks curing period, the dried out heads or plumes are bailed and sold to buyers operating throughout the south central Canadian River Basin.

Throughout the golden years of McClain County’s broomcorn industry, the perennial high school football rival, Lindsay, in Garvin County, prided themselves on being the, “Broom-corn Capital of the World.”

In the midst of all the dirt and grime generated by the endeavors of the broomcorn harvest, proper dining etiquette was never overlooked! Before the mad rush of grub grabbing Johnnys began, appropriate behaviors were properly addressed.

Clean hands and clean faces were always made possible, but, not mandatory by the Johnny’s purging dips and splashes lathered up with home made lye soap, in the communal waters of a Number Three galvanized wash tub. And, by the time, the last guy accessed the tub, it was a mud bath of broomcorn residue!

With all that is going on amid today’s reality entertainment craze, I can’t help but believe that the broomcorn ethos could have ever slipped past the note of memorialists the way that it managed to do back in the middle of the 20th Century. Given it’s beyond spectacular, culinary rollout and its “You must see to believe,” harvest theatrics, I have to believe that in today’s environment, the reality production crews would be right there smack dab in the middle of it all!

The sharp contrast between

the Broomcorn Johnny’s dogged sweat hog morning of blight-filled working conditions in the console of tabled broomcorn and that of the Bon Appetite extravaganza tables of food served up at noon for the Johnny’s indulgence is beyond worldly comparison. And, any such attempt to compare would most assuredly require a, “Heaven to Hell,” analogy! As an uninitiated 18-year-old broomcorn Johnny enduring the stifling heat while trying to work my way up into a job somewhere in the shade, I never realized it would be the food, not the broomcorn misery, that ultimately stands out in my memories.

I knew the luncheon spread, locals called it dinner, was something to look forward to, but I had no idea that I was experiencing a smorgasbord of gourmet improvisation whose fabled height of gastronomic excellence would never again enliven my tastebuds!

And so to this very day, I remain convinced that the quintessential epicurean dining experience is not to be found in today’s five-star restaurants, but, was served up long ago on the tables of McClain County’s unsung broomcorn chefs.

Out of necessity, these were ironic, yet, iconic chefs who never thought of themselves as such, nor did any of us who ungraciously engorged ourselves on their gastronomic delights! All from ancestral recipes, never written down, yet, forever copied, but, never quite duplicated.

At the time, I knew I didn’t eat that well at home, but, I had no idea that those Oklahoma broomcorn feasts were anything out of the ordinary. I just allowed that was the way all rich broomcorn farmers ate

every day.

Nevertheless, upon reflection, these many years later, my fantasy taste buds, find their way back to the savory stuffed pork chops, corn bread and cold buttermilk, hot potato salad, red eye gravy over mashed potatoes, pinto beans with pork belly, southern fried chicken, deep fat fried okra, high rising yeast bread with freshly churned butter with other entrees galore.

All served at a boarding house arm’s length spread across open air tables. And, for the hardest of hardy eaters, an occasional mess of Poke Salad greens gathered in from the wilds of a nearby persimmon tree thicket. All washed down with an energizing brew of Lipton’s ice tea gulped from a big mouth mason jar packed with clinking chunks of ice chips from a 50 pound block.

Any time a product of work or art is up for praise, as the broomcorn food fest is, the salient question which must always be broached; Compared to what?

Love for the American cuisine, along with my intrepid existence after the broomcorn fields has afforded me a dazzling array of storied dining venues from which to compare. The \$300 a plate setting I laid out for my wife and I to dine at the much ballyhooed French Laundry in California’s illustrious Napa Valley most definitely gives a pricing edge to the broomcorn cuisine.

Admittedly, the black sea caviar on a bed of the chef’s exquisitely crafted tapioca was certainly a watershed dining experience for me.

However, I am still sticking with the deep fat fried okra beside a ladle of freshly picked blackeyed peas with butter-

milk laced cornbread from the broomcorn cuisine. And, furthermore, when I lined up at the five star buffet at Hawaii’s celebrated Turtle Bay Resort, a one of a kind luau, with high expectations of a gastronomic Eureka—only to discover the buffet’s biggest draw was poi, my appetite suddenly tanked.

Learning of poi’s origin, which is an unflavored edible root pounded out from the Taro Plant, I just couldn’t help but yearn for those days of yore, dining at the broomcorn fest board!

The brigade of housewives turned into self-styled chefs responsible for broomcorn’s open-air food feasts, “Help yourself, It’s all on the house,” personifies the different roles played by women in the kitchen and men in the field.

I think most broomcorn survivors will agree that the drudgery in the field and epicurean zest in the kitchen pretty well explained the Johnny’s tolerance for sticking with what has to have been high among mankind’s most punishing means of earning a wage!

In the field and in the kitchen, each with their own satisfying rewards, hard cold cash on the barrelhead from the fields, and, from the kitchen, out of this world country cooking, the likes of which today’s money cannot buy!

So! In saying, “Goodbye!” to a once relevant industry, just know that the long hot summer will be a better one without the constant irritation of broomcorn fuzz! The happy news is that the great old-fashioned cooking once enjoyed by the Johnnys, can still be found today in traditional country eateries such as the Chickasha diners up and down Oklahoma’s South Canadian corridor.

In June 2004, he took an interim consulting position in the cardiovascular unit at Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles.

That was followed by just over 9 years as director of cardiovascular, neuroscience and critical care services at the 268-bed Lutheran Medical Center in Wheat Ridge, Colo.

Food:

“Higher-risk foods should not be used in a lunch that will sit at room temperature for more than a couple hours.” High-risk foods include meat, poultry, seafood, eggs, tofu, dairy products (milk, cheese and yogurt), opened canned-fruit, cooked fruits and vegetables, cut/peeled fresh fruits and vegetables, pasta and rice. Safe foods to pack for room temperature storage include peanut butter sandwiches (depending on school policy regarding nuts/peanuts); popcorn; bread; crackers; bagels; fresh fruit that is unpeeled and uncut; unopened single-serving containers of fruit, fruit juice and pudding; commercially prepared meats, poultry, seafood and dried beans which can be opened and eaten immediately; dried fruits; nuts; cookies; cereal bars and granola bars. “When packing foods that need to be refrigerated when a refrigerator is not available, chill those foods before they are added to the lunch box and include an ice pack, freezer gel pack or frozen water or juice in a leakproof plastic freezer bottle or container,” Brown said. “Leave space at the top when you fill the container for expansion when freezing happens.” To maintain the cold temperature until lunch time, keep at least two cold sources in the insulated lunch bag. By strategically packing the lunch, place the most perishable food closest to the cold sources. Freezer ice packs and frozen water bottles will keep the food safely cold at less than 40°. Developing a routine to return the ice packs to the freezer is crucial, therefore they will be ready for packing a lunch the next day. When packing hot items, use an insulated container to keep the food hot. To heat the empty container before packing hot food, carefully fill the container with boiling water. If the container is left closed until lunchtime, the food will stay hot at 140° or above. It’s important to use an insulated lunch bag, instead of a paper bag when packing perishable food items. To keep the insulated bag cold, consider storing the bag in the freezer overnight to ensure it is as cold as possible before packing a lunch. If the lunch is packed in advance, store the entire bag in the refrigerator until it’s time to leave for school. Food safety isn’t just about the food. The lunch bag itself can harbor dangerous bacteria if not cleaned regularly. Depending on the quality of the lunch bag, using a washing machine can eliminate unwanted bacteria. “If a brown paper bag is the choice, it should be one purchased for sack lunches and a new one used each day,” Brown said. “If reusable containers are chosen, either hard or soft sided, they should be washed with hot water and detergent after every use. The same goes for thermoses and water bottles.” Throwing away any trash and food scraps during lunch time will help keep the lunch bag clean from any odor or bacteria. It’s important to prepare just the amount of perishable

food that can be eaten during lunch to reduce the possibility of that food being consumed as leftovers. “If packing a lunch for a child, teach them to throw away used food packaging perishable foods at the end of lunch,” Brown said. “If there’s a need for something to snack on later in the day, pack a non-perishable item just for that purpose.” By packing hand sanitizer or moist towelettes with the lunch, children can thoroughly clean their hands before they enjoy their food.

Superintendents and school boards are left to make some tough judgment calls.

Dr. Sheli McAdoo, Purcell superintendent, said the plan is to “start school as normal as possible.”

“The vast majority of our staff have completed vaccination which makes this year better from that standpoint,” she continued. “We will continue to deploy our mitigation strategies of cleaning, hand washing protocols, social distancing and encouraging masks in areas where this is not possible.”

McAdoo noted state law doesn’t allow for mandating masks unless there is an emergency order from Gov. Kevin Stitt – something she doesn’t anticipate.

“So we will make masks available for anyone that wishes to utilize them,” she said. “We will provide a virtual learning option as we did last year. Our goal will be to remain in school

with no to little interruptions of in-person learning.”

For their part, parents, students, teachers and staff are all ready to get back to school.

“Fall activities have begun to practice and we are encouraging good mitigation techniques for everyone,” she said. “Several of our students aged 12 and up have received the COVID vaccine which allows them to not have to quarantine if they are identified as a close contact.”

The district is asking staff to protect students and themselves by following the mitigation protocols. Masking is encouraged in cases where social distancing isn’t possible. McAdoo said this applies “whether they are vaccinated or not.”

McAdoo expressed gratitude to the McClain County Health Department for serving as an “easy option for student vaccinations for back-to-school, as well as COVID vaccines if requested.”

Navigating the first 1-1/2 years of the pandemic took tons of planning and cooperation from countless people.

Development Law, who will be primarily utilizing their employees Jeff Sabin and Emily Pomeroy, according to the agreement. The Center for Economic Development Law has been involved in legal services for TIF agreements throughout the state and has a long history working with government entities on the legal issues of TIF districts.

County Commissioner Wilson Lyles said, “This is just very preliminary with the hiring of this firm. There is no cost to the county. The folks who

and county emergency management, the Oklahoma State School Board Association and Cooperative Council of School Administrators.

McAdoo also looks to the district’s board of education, administrators, teachers, students, parents and community members.

“Their input is critical and has been very helpful in navigating the pandemic,” she said. “There is no doubt that it has been a team approach.”

While there are some residuals of COVID from last year and dealing with the Delta variant this year, McAdoo believes the district is “better prepared” with vaccinations and “has protocols that we know are effective if used correctly.”

“We are looking forward to the new school year and welcoming our students back,” she said.

Wayne superintendent Toby Ringwald anticipates “business as usual” when classes resume.

“We will be recommending but not requiring masks or quarantine,” he said. “We will, however, encourage parents to keep their students at home if they are not feeling well.”

Virtual learning will be offered again, but Ringwald expects most instruction will be in-person.

“Obviously, all of this is subject to change if any mandates come down from the state health department,” he continued. “We will address situations as they come and we will follow all mandates that are passed down to us from a state level.

“Our community is ready to have normal school again, and that is what we plan to do this year. The overwhelming response I received last year was to keep our doors open, and we did not have to shut school down due to COVID at any time.”

Superintendent Chad Hall said Lexington Public Schools will continue to weigh local conditions and how they might affect school operations.

“Our priority will always be on safety balanced with personal responsibility to the extent possible,” he said, adding recommendations regarding personal protective measures are “always echoed as best practices.”

are interested in doing this are picking up any fees associated with this.”

According to the agreement, Southwind Hills Land Development, LLC, had approached the Center for Economic Development Law asking for assistance with a possible development in McClain County. If eventually approved, the private developer would receive for an agreed upon time, any new taxes created in the district to pay for public infrastructure.

The agreement also indicates that Southwind Hills Land Development would also pay for the county’s legal costs incurred in consideration of the private developer’s project plan and related economic development agreement.

The agreement further states that the costs of these services would be provided by the developer, but the Center for Economic Development Law would represent McClain County in its interests.

The following are services to be provided by the Center for Economic Development Law:

- A TIF agreement which would provide public financial assistance to the developer to fund public improvements.
- Drafting of the Project Plan to facilitate the developer’s proposed project.
- Preparation of documents for a TIF and Project Plan including analysis, financial impact, commissioner’s agenda items, and resolutions.
- Consultation regarding procedures and actions for formal consideration of a TIF and the Project Plan.
- Other necessary and appropriate actions with respect to approval and implementation of the Project Plan and TIF.

“We are learning right now about a TIF itself, and the things this organization would like to do,” Lyles said. “If it benefits all of the citizens of McClain County, that’s our thought before any decisions are made. We are exploring our options.”

The agreement also provides for McClain County “to retain all authority to approve, reject, modify or amend any action that the Board of County Commissioners determine to be in the best interests of the residents of the County. As well, nothing in the agreement creates an obligation by the County to approve a proposed Project Plan or TIF.

Commissioners Glen Murray, Lyles and Terry Daniel all voted to move forward with the approval of the contract agreement.

According to The Center for Economic Development Law’s website, the firm “represents cities, towns, counties, public trusts, and other local public entities in Oklahoma on a range of development activities. The firm also represents non-profit organizations and development entities in structuring public-private partnerships to facilitate development, operation, or management of special projects, places, and activities. The firm offers extensive legal services in the creation of legal and financial strategies for economic and community development projects.”

Southwind Hills Land Development’s website touts that the company has more than 2,000 acres either completed, in design, or under construction. The project they are proposing for a TIF is their Selah planned community just outside the Town of Goldsby and the City of Newcastle.

According to the company’s website, Selah is “an up and coming wellness community, unlike any of its kind in Oklahoma, composed of 520 acres of front porch living, fresh air, fresh food, and focused on reconnecting family and neighbors.”

It will be “a walkable community set among acres of preserved green space with miles of nature trails that connect homes and restaurants with arts and businesses.”

Tina Adkins, spokesperson for Selah, said, “Our vision for Selah has and always will be inspired by the past, built for the future. With this in mind, Selah will be an ever evolving project as we truly listen to the needs and desires of our local community members.”

She said Selah is just 10-15 minutes southeast of Newcastle in unincorporated McClain County.

“Selah is an ungated, public space offering a host of amenities to visitors and homeowners alike such as a Pool Club with a pool house and restaurant, a beautiful lake for fishing and kayaking, walking trails throughout, a beautiful working farm providing a Farmer’s Market, U-Pick flower gardens, and space for the agriculture community and visitors to attend educational classes,” Adkins said.

She added that Selah will also house a multitude of parks and recreations such as skate parks, soccer parks, playgrounds and animals, including horse stables and boarding and even riding classes.

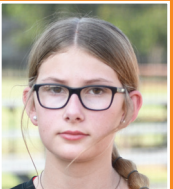

During the last twenty plus years that we have been providing our services we have learned that veterans who have medical evidence that supports their application for VA benefits has a much better chance of being approved.

If you or anyone you know is a medical provider (MD, NP, DC, PA, etc.) who would like to learn how to help veterans, while still being compensated, please reach out to us.

The number of volunteers who have joined our team continues to increase on a weekly basis. The training that they receive every other Monday is second to none. Each application for VA benefits either for veterans or surviving spouses is checked and rechecked to ensure that we are doing everything possible for the men and women who have served our nation.

We are continuing to add more volunteers to be able to provide our services to the many veterans and their families who are asking for our help, but not as quickly as we have new veterans reaching out to us for support. Some of those who visit us for assistance end up becoming a part of what we do. They know that our goal is to make a difference in the lives of those who served in our military.

I would like to say that we don’t turn veterans away but the number asking for our help continues to increase daily and we are fighting to attend to every person who reaches out to us.

We are a non-profit that is operated almost completely by volunteers. We are dependent on the people we help to assist the next veteran or surviving spouse, and we invite each and everyone of you to step up and help ease the burden that can lay so heavily on the shoulders of our nation’s heroes.

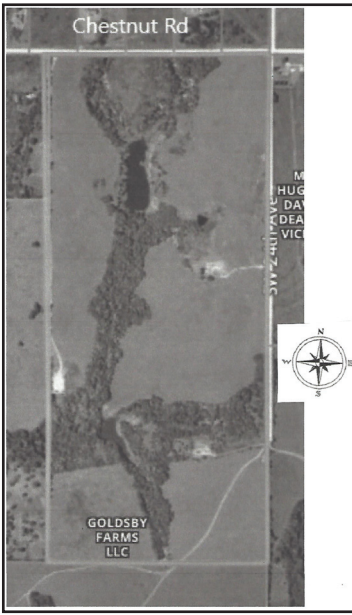

Welcome to the ‘front porch.’

We have been writing this summer about an amazing trip to Yellowstone where my hiking companion Todd Perrin and I got lost for two days deep in the wilderness. It was one of the greatest but most exhausting and harrowing experiences I ever had. But the journey was as much of a spiritual journey in many ways, as it was a physical one.

Since our return on July 18, we have tried to assimilate and make sense of all of these events. I am sure we will share a good many things with you here and there for a long time. Our first visit back to our Lexington church since those life-changing events was this past weekend.

I felt I needed to, as best as possible, put some of the spiritual lessons into a nutshell for our church family here. So, on Sunday, August 1, we tried to do that, in a two-part series called “No man crosses the same river twice.”

We settled for the time being on six points total, six great

spiritual lessons that impacted that journey, and we’ll be able to share at least those lessons here in this space in the weeks ahead.

The first lesson, and I think this is appropriate, was that we need to learn to walk and not faint.

Walking and not faint!--one of the great keys to walking with the Lord continually.

The reference here, of course, is to the last verse of Isaiah 40 where the prophet says that “they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up with wings as eagles, they shall walk and not faint.”

Just a word on that verse is all we’ll have space here: That verse is amazing because it is in reverse order, or, at least, reverse of what we might think. Most passages that build up to a climax such as that go in ascending order.

We would expect the writer to say, “But they that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall walk and not faint, they shall run and not be weary, and they shall

soar with wings like eagles.”

But that is not what the prophet does. Instead, he goes in “descending” order. First is the soaring with wings -- said almost with the understanding that we cannot always soar with wings spiritually -- then we have the running and not being weary, even there with the understanding that the running is only temporary, too.

But the final portion, the walking and not fainting, is not something we do once in a while. No, it is an everyday, all day, no exceptions, no days off walking with the Lord. It is walking and not giving up, not quitting, not becoming discouraged.

What an appropriate way to begin to share our journey, there with the prophet’s beautiful and poetic scripture! Putting a life-story into a microcosmic view, that, precisely, was the story on our Yellowstone hike. Stay tuned. We’ll pick up here for next week, Lord willing -- much more to reflect on. August 8, 2021 is the nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

This Sunday is the third of five in which Chapter 6 of the Gospel of John contains the gospel reading. 41 The Jews murmured about Jesus because he said, “I am the bread that came down from heaven,” 42 and they said, “Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know his father and mother? Then how can he say, ‘I have come down from heaven’?” 43 Jesus answered and said to them, “Stop murmuring among yourselves.

51 I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.” As Christians, we do believe that Jesus is the living bread. However, had

we lived during Jesus’ time on earth, can we be sure we would not have “murmured” as well?

Sometimes we might think we have this Christian life figured out but the second reading from Ephesians 4:30-5:2 is as applicable today as when St. Paul wrote it. “Brothers and sisters: 30 Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were sealed for the day of redemption. 31 All bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling must be removed from you, along with all malice.

32 And be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ. 1 So be imitators of God, as beloved children, 2 and live in love, as Christ loved us and handed himself over for us as a sacrificial offering to God for a fragrant aroma.”

It is easy for us to be kind, compassionate, and forgiving to others if we receive the

same treatment from them. The sticky part is that we are supposed to be kind, compassionate, and forgiving to everyone.

Every day I must resist being angry at one thing or another. Bitterness is also a tough problem. While it is rare that I ever would shout, revile, be furious, or possess malice, sadly, the things that I do are right there glaring with equal brightness.

In the week ahead, let us be mindful of our behavior and strive to be more like Christ.

The Wednesday evening Bible class studied the 16th through 21st verses of the third chapter of Philippians where the apostle Paul continued to encourage readers to follow his example and noted others who were doing likewise. He then pointed out that there would be many who would live as enemies of the cross of Christ and that their end would be destruction.

The Sunday morning adult Bible class, still studying persecution and it’s relation to

race, looked at the unsupported theory that black skin was the mark of Cain. This theory was imported from Europe in the 18th century and adopted by the 19th century American pro-slavery preachers to justify slavery.

During the Sunday morning assembly Keith Shackelford presented a lesson on the daughters of Jerusalem based on Jesus’ admonition to some women who were mourning and grieving for Him as He was being led to the cross, as recorded in Luke 23:26-31. He made the point that as sad as His condition was at the time, there were other things which were even more worthy of mourning. He referred particularly to the coming destruction of Jerusalem and the day of judgment for those who did not accept Christ.

The Sunday evening lesson explored the subject of the baptism of the Holy Spirit. The sermon looked first at Matthew 3:11-12 and parallel accounts in Mark 1:8 and Luke 3:16-17 where John the baptizer prophesies that One more powerful than he would come and baptize

with the Holy Spirit.

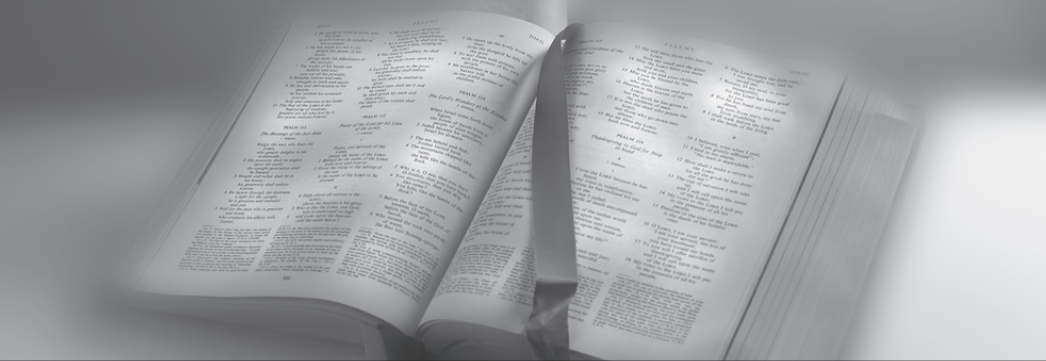
One example of baptism of the Holy Spirit is recorded in the second chapter of Acts where the Holy Spirit filled the house where the apostles and a crowd of people from numerous nations where Jews had been scattered after the destruction of Jerusalem had gathered.

All the people in the house were immersed (baptized) in the Holy Spirit and the gospel of Christ was preached for the first time. Another example is found in Acts 10 which records that the Holy Spirit came down on all those who heard the message that the apostle Peter preached to the household of a Roman centurion named Cornelius.

Our next Food Bank Give Away will be Saturday, August 21, from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. We are asking everyone to go back to wearing masks because of the wide presence of the Delta variant of COVID-19. It has been found to be more contagious than the original and can be carried by even those who have been vaccinated, even though it may be a milder form. Masks can be provided if you do not have one, and hand sanitizer will also be available.

This week’s lesson is about communion in our church. The word is taken from Latin and means “union with” referring to a connection between the believer and God. Communion has many other names: the Lord’s Supper, the Eucharist, the Lord’s Table, the Great Thanksgiving, Holy Communion. I will use the word communion for simplicity. There are three basic traditions surrounding communion: Open Communion, Closed Communion, and Close (without a “d”) Communion.

Nearly every church practices some form of communion. It is usually patterned on the New Testament description of The Last Supper, that is, the Passover Seder celebrated on the eve of Jesus’ death. There is much variety in the ceremony itself as well as different views of who is allowed to partake of the elements of communion.

Most churches place some restrictions on who may or may not participate in communion. Many require at least a profession of faith in Christ and assurance that the recipi-

ent is not living in unconfessed sin. Others require baptism and even official/local church membership.

The practice of Open Communion in some Protestant churches allows all who attend worship to partake of the elements used in the ritual. These more inclusive churches proclaim that the table of Holy Communion is Christ’s table, not any one church’s table. This table is open to anyone, either church members or non-members, who seek to respond to Christ’s love and who seek to lead a new life of peace and love.

It is not about who we are at any one moment in time. Instead, it is about who God is and what God the Creator has done through Jesus Christ. The churches who practice Open Communion invite everyone, without regard to their spiritual standing or evidence of sin in their lives. The United Methodist Church and the United Church of Christ are two groups that allow Open Communion.

Closed Communion is the practice of restricting the ritual elements to be served only to those who are members of a particular church, denomination, sect or congregation. The assumption is that the person participating is “in good standing” of that group, however that may be defined. Some of the churches that practice Closed Communion are the Catholic, Orthodox, confessional Lutheran and other Christian churches.

Close (without a “d”) Communion is a more conserva-

tive variation on Closed (with a “d”) Communion. More specifically, participants are saved, properly baptized members belonging to the same denomination or a like faith and order (that is, believing all the teachings of the Bible in common, that is “same faith, same practice”). Communion may even be restricted to the members of a local congregation only. It may be said (in my words) that Close Communion is Closed Communion that is very closed.

Just to let you know: the Lexington United Methodist Church (LUMC) regularly celebrates Open Communion on the first Sunday of the month. We use bread and grape juice. Other groups may use actual matzo or some other unleavened bread, like pita or even crackers. They may even use wine, although historically Methodists (and the Salvation Army) use juice in order not to tempt those who may be recovering alcoholics. Since we practice Open Communion, we leave it up to the individual to decide if they wish to participate or not. None of us are worthy. We believe that Christ is a gift, bringing grace to us all.

We invite all of you to worship and have fellowship with us at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, followed by Sunday school at 11 a.m. Our address is 631 East Ash, just west of Lexington High School. Enroll now for 4-H

4-H families can now enroll for the 2021/2022 4-H Year through the new online enrollment system, 4h.zsuites.org. The 4-H enrollment year runs from Aug. 1, 2021 to July 31, 2022. Please call the Extension Office if you have any questions about enrolling in 4-H.

To enroll as a 4-H member, youth must be eight years old and in the third grade on Sept. 1, 2021. If they turn eight after

September 1 and are in the third grade, they will not be eligible to enroll in 4-H until the next 4-H year but can enroll as a Cloverbud. When a child turns nine years old, they may join as a 4-H member regardless of grade level.

Cloverbuds can participate in many of the same activities as the 4-H members and events that are non-competitive. To enroll as a Cloverbud, youth

must be five years old through the second grade. Enrollment can be done online if the child is five on or before Sept. 1, 2021.

Major appropriations bill passes house, Oklahoma amendments voted down

The U.S. House passed a major appropriations bill along party lines July 29, without amendments proposed by members of the Oklahoma delegation.

The bill passed by a vote of 219-208, with only Democrats voting for the bill and only Republicans voting against. The bill includes funds for several government departments and agencies for fiscal year 2022.

Both Reps. Tom Cole (R-Moore) and Kevin Hern (R-Tulsa) submitted amendments for inclusion on the bill, all of which were turned down by the Democratic majority.

Cole's amendment, which would have provided more than \$150 million in funding to help with tribal judicial systems in the wake of the McGirt Supreme Court decision which ruled Congress had never disestablished the Muscogee Nation, was voted down by Democrats en masse along with other Republican-proposed amendments.

Cole traced his opposition to the bill to its partisanship, in his floor remarks.

"But the problems with this bill aren't just with the money spent," he said. "In drafting this package, the majority has also chosen to strip out longstanding bipartisan policy provisions, and instead has filled this package with partisan, far-left policy that simply cannot pass both chambers and become law."

Hern's six amendments to the bill, which were voted against in a group by themselves, aimed to cut 20 percent of spending from each bill combined in the appropriations package.

"Speaker (Nancy) Pelosi doesn't want fiscal accountability, which is why she piled all of my amendments into an en bloc to ensure none of them pass," Hern said in his remarks on the House floor. "Congress has spent recklessly in the last year, and the American people are sick of it."

None of the other members of the Oklahoma delegation submitted amendments that saw debate on the House floor.

Rep. Frank Lucas (R-Cheyenne) released a statement explaining his views about the passage of H.R. 4502.

"The American people deserve a Congress who is willing to put partisanship aside in order to keep the lights of the federal government on," he said.
