Choctaw runoff

New terms begin September 6

The Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma Election Board last week certified Joey Tom as winner of the District 7 seat of the Choctaw Nation Tribal Council.


Tom's 660 votes in the August 7 runoff race bested 603 cast for his opponent, Adrian Johnico.

In the July 10 general election on July 10, Tom and Johnico received 40.07 and 36.67 percent of the total votes, thus forcing the runoff.

Other winners of Tribal Council seats on July 10 were Jess Henry, District 4; and Anthony Dillard, District 10.

Incumbents were lone candidates for three districts. They were Jennifer Woods, District 6; James Dry, District 9; and James Frazier, District 12.

Following an installation ceremony, the council members will begin their new terms at noon September 6.



Sales, use taxes trending up

This month the Oklahoma Tax Commission returned \$183,420,800 in sales tax to the state's cities and towns. That is an increase of

\$15,296,631 over the \$168,124,169 disbursement a year ago. Municipalities also shared \$30,430,832 in use taxes.

Counties shared \$29,985,550 in sales tax \$5,479,222 in use tax. The taxes reflect sales from June 16-30 and estimated sales from July 1-15.

Broomcorn memories of a sharecropper's son

(Editor's note: This is the first installment of a series on broomcorn)

From deep in Norman's suburbs, I picked up my latest edition of *The Purcell Register*. The front page story "Broomcorn' Last Thresh" jumped right out at me! A lifetime ago, I was a share cropper's son. One of our crops was broomcorn.

I went to my study and took down from the wall one of my cherished possessions - my johnny knife. I was flooded with memories of bygone days, some good, some bad. Such things keep me grounded, and mindful of my McClain County roots from more than a half century ago.

My motivation for writing this letter is twofold. First, to correct some of the misinformation in the article, and secondly, to share my memories and thoughts on raising broomcorn. Along with the technicalities, I will share snippets of the colorful, local small farming culture.

We had no running water. We "drew" water from our well, with a bucket, pulley, and rope. We had an outhouse and the Sears catalog to go along with it. There was no telephone nor television, although we did eventually get a television the year before we moved to town (Purcell).

My family had 80 rented acres of land, with an old house (1920s vintage), and out buildings which included

a broomcorn shed. We had electricity, which consisted of a single long cord, with a bulb dangling from the 10 or 12 foot ceiling in each room. It was 10 or 12 miles, due west of Wayne, in the old time Bryant school house community.

Technically, we were not sharecroppers. We rented or leased the land. The rent or lease money took the place of sharing a portion of your crop with the "landlord."


This allowed the owners to be

somewhere else and not have to worry about turning "goods" into cash.

Although it was a misnomer, we were still known as sharecroppers. "Pop" had to figure out how to pay the rent, have the equipment to plant and (hands) to harvest and turn a profit. The Oklahoma weather had to cooperate. The time frame would have been somewhere

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Osborn makes a lot of sense

For those of you who missed Rotary last Wednesday, you missed one of the best speeches I've ever heard.

Bar none.

The speaker, who was pro-cured by new Rotarian Nicolle Carr, was Oklahoma's Commissioner of Labor Leslie Osborn.

Prior to being elected Labor Commissioner Osborn served 10 years in the Oklahoma House of Representatives.

In 2013 then speaker T.W. Shannon appointed her to chair the Judiciary committee.

She was the first female in state history to have that position.

Later in her House career Speaker Charles McCall appointed her as the first female in history to chair the House Appropriations and Budget Committee.

Oklahoma was going through an economic drought at the time.

"You don't want to be chairman of appropriations when you don't have any money," she quipped.

Osborn said the current climate of Democrats hating Republicans and vice versa

needs to stop.

"We don't need hate," she said. "And that is what you get when you watch the national evening news."

She told Rotarians she quit watching the national evening news two years ago and is much better for it.

"I check my news app on my phone a couple of times a day to see if something big has occurred that I need to know about but that's it," she said.

She told a story about an "aunt" of hers that she used to talk to almost daily.

The aunt has become so callous from Facebook and watching Fox News that now the two of them haven't talked

in five months.

Another story she told is that Oklahoma doesn't seem interested in investing in things like teacher pay and education, which is a dead end road.

When she was first in the Legislature, Oklahoma ranked 50th in the country in taxes collected.

"That's last in case you're wondering," she told the group tongue firmly in her cheek.

"I'm a Republican but we need to raise taxes to pay for the government's services," she said.

"I was told I was the worst Republican ever," she said at the time.

She said she wasn't trying to be anything other than a good Oklahoman.

"I wanted to get Oklahoma up to at least 46th but we are now back to 50th with the current Legislature cutting taxes.

"We're not only not a top 10 state, we are at the bottom," she said.

What she is is a statesman and a darn good one.

I wish she was running the state or maybe even the nation.

Keep up the good work Leslie Osborn. We need more like you.

Update from the Capitol

I was recently saw a quote by President Reagan, "The person who agrees with you 80% of the time is a friend and an ally, not a 20% traitor." His quote summarizes what so many of us are feeling. I've never shied away from speaking my mind and seeing that quote made me realize I've been afraid to speak my truth. I've always believed when you shy away from telling your truth, you begin to lose your identity. I don't want to lose sight of who I am, so I think it's important to share my truth.

Regardless of your party, you may have seen the disgusting Facebook post by Oklahoma Republican Party Chairman, John Bennett, where he compared vaccine mandates to the Holocaust. He asked all "Patriots" to call for a special session to address vaccina-

tion requirements. Once other members of the Republican Party began denouncing the comparison, Chairman Bennett doubled down, following up with a video basically shaming anyone who didn't agree with his comparison.

During the Holocaust, an estimated 11 million men, women and children were brutally murdered in gas chambers, starved, tortured, and shot. Their bodies were buried in shallow graves with hundreds of others piled on top of them, not even given the opportunity for a proper burial.

My husband's grandfather fought during WW2 and fell in love with the most precious German woman that God ever made. I remember the one and only time I ever heard her speak of the Holocaust; she had family who served in Hitler's Army and others who helped Jews

escape the horror. She lived through that and, eventually, my husband's grandfather sent her to live in the States until his return home to America. Although born in Germany, Grandma McBee was an American patriot who loved and supported the U.S., respected her elected officials, regardless if she agreed with them, and taught her children, many of whom served in the U.S. military, to love and support their country too.

All of that said, I find myself in a situation where many of my colleagues and I don't agree with Chairman Bennett. His comments are insulting to

Americans for hire

When the coronavirus pandemic struck the world last year and many communities across the nation were forced into lockdown, small businesses experienced some of the most devastating blows. For many businesses that survived the unthinkable and sudden economic hits, challenges have remained amid reopening. And that is because of several concerning factors threatening their recovery and success made worse by President Joe Biden's misguided policies.

First, just like families and households across the United States, small businesses are faced with the painfully sharp and continuous rise in prices on pretty much everything. In fact, it was recently reported

that the Consumer Price Index increased by 5.4 percent last month, which reflects the same dramatic inflationary uptick as just before the stock market crash in 2008. Similarly, the Producer Price Index, another indication of the health of an economy, alarmingly rose by a record high of 7.8 percent. Meanwhile, since real wages cannot keep up with increasing prices, inflation has effectively become a new tax on hardworking Americans, including small business owners.

In addition to the rising costs of buying and producing, small businesses are simply having a hard time filling open jobs and getting people to come back to work. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, unfilled positions were at a record

high at the end of June with 10.1 million job openings reported. Moreover, the National Federation of Independent Business reported that nearly half of the business owners they surveyed recently across the nation had openings they could not fill. However, although more jobs have become available, the Labor Force Participation Rate, which measures the adult labor force as a percent of the population or those currently participating in the workforce, has hovered around 61.7 percent since June 2020. This ongoing labor shortage has made it difficult for Main Street businesses to operate and deliver at full capacity.

Tips for drying flowers

Enjoy and share the beauty of your flower garden all year long. Pick and dry a few flowers to use in flower arrangements, craft projects or as gifts for friends and family.

Pick the flowers when they are at peak bloom and blossoms are dry. Cut flowers for drying mid-day when they contain less moisture to reduce the dry time.

Use a bypass pruner or garden scissors to cut the stems above a set of healthy leaves. Remove the foliage and gather them into small bundles. Secure the stems with rubber bands that contract as the stems shrink and continue holding them tight. Use a spring-loaded clothespin to hang the bundles from a hanger, clothes line or nail. Allow the flowers to dry in a warm, dark, dust-free location.

Flat-faced flowers like daisies tend to close a bit when dried upside down. Try laying them face down on a flat surface. Simply cut off the stem and place the flowers face down on newspaper in a warm, dry location. Once dried, you can glue them in place or use florist wire to create stems for arranging.

And don't forget to pick a few seedpods from perennials and ornamental grasses. These have dried, for the most part,

on the plants and make great additions to your dried flower arrangements and projects.

Consider taking a trip to your local florist or craft store for more ideas and materials for drying delicate flowers. Silica sand works well for delicate blossoms like iris as well as roses, mums and more. Simply fill the bottom inch of a container with silica sand. Remove all but an inch of the flower stem.

Place the flower, stem side up or on its side, on the surface of the silica sand. Gently pour silica sand over the flowers until completely covered. Follow label directions. Most flowers dried this way maintain their beauty when dried in silica sand. Just use a small paint brush to gently remove any remaining sand.

Test flowers for dryness before putting them in an arrangement or storing for future use. Carefully rub a piece of the flower between your fingers. If it feels dry, it is ready to use. If it still feels moist, continue letting them dry.

Store extra dried flowers in a location with low humidity and away from direct sunlight. Consider loosely wrapping

Broomcorn:

around 1953 to 1955. I was about 12 or 13.

Of course, we were on the bottom rung of the farming community social ladder. Social stratification was alive and well. I am aware that my view from the bottom, of the latter, is a myopic one.

I do not wish to be misunderstood, I would not trade my memories and lessons learned for anything. "Necessity is the mother of invention." I am sure broomcorn farming on a much bigger scale, would make for different memories.

Addressing another misnomer, it was not the "horse industry" that was the demise nor the next stage of sharecroppers and broomcorn, to horse ranching. It was technology. Plastics could make an arguable better broom.

The substitution of "plastic straw" for "broomcorn straw" was easier, less expensive. The exception was the occasional witch, who needed a new broom for transportation. Can you imagine a witch flying around on a plastic broom? The demand was slim.

The small farmers who raised broomcorn didn't plant Bermuda or other grazing grasses, after plastic brooms came out. The distance between the horse culture and the amount of land and capital required, compared to broomcorn farming, is vast. If one is really in touch with the share cropping broomcorn culture, you would have a hard time even thinking your way across the divide.

Cattle ranching and farming communities were always blended to some extent; changes in land usage didn't happen "overnight."

A few ranchers had cow ponies to work the cattle. Horse ranching on a large scale, was a rich man's game. If you follow the money, the money came first. Don't get me wrong. I love horses, the culture, and the romance of it all. The land we farmed is still farmed, while many farmers "run" cattle, some more some less.

Most small farmers, in the old days, normally raised a variety of crops, so that if one failed, the others might not. It was a complicated guessing

game to outwit the Oklahoma weather, and the "markets." My best guess is, when broomcorn was superseded by plastic, the farmers just planted something else.

Although, undoubtedly, some current horse ranch land was once broomcorn land, the transition took many turns. Oklahoma's farming/ranch-

ing culture is rich and multi-layered, from bib overalls, to cattle ranching, with a few cow ponies - and on to the "Quarter Horse Culture."

Although it has been 65 years or so since I last rode a tractor, I cannot imagine how anyone could rent, lease, or pay for land by only running horses, even in those days.

The 2020 Census counted county's total population at 41,552 – 7,156 more than in 2010.

This time the fastest growing honor goes to Canadian County with a total population of 154,405 and a gain 38,384 heads or 33.6 percent.

Lexington added four runs in the third to hold the one run lead.


But, Purcell would not be held down as they scored four in the fourth to solidify their win.

I would like to thank all our volunteers who help provide services to many veterans and surviving spouses. Many of us are working behind the scenes either from home or at our Norman office. Each volunteer making a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served this nation. Each week we are increasing our appointments for either in person or by telephone. When veterans or surviving spouses appoint us as their POA for VA claims, we can review their complete VA electronic claims folder. Reviewing the veteran's military medical records, service

records, and their VA claims folder enables us to assist them obtain all of the benefits they are eligible for.

As our organization was accredited by the VA General Counsel last year, some of our volunteers are receiving the accreditation that will allow them to assist veterans under the Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation. This means that instead of Dale being your only representative, the organization will be representing you. All those receiving this accreditation have undergone extensive training and passed exams. Additionally, last week we started training five more volunteers to assist veterans with their claims and questions about VA benefits. Some of them will go on to receive training to become accredited.

We continue to monitor the COVID-19 situation in our town and state and plan to keep our volunteers and clients as safe as possible. In addition, we have returned to using our Plexiglas shields on an as needed basis to separate our volunteers from the clients who visit us.

One of the jobs I have is representing veterans and surviving spouses before a Board of Veterans Affairs Hearing Judge or a Decision Review Officer. Each year we represent our clients at several hundred of these hearings. As I'm not a lawyer, quoting past decisions is not what we do. We do our hearings the same as our claims: to provide medical evidence supporting the veteran's claim for service-connection of a disability. We will often ask the veteran to obtain a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire from a medical provider that supports their request for service connection of a disability or an increased rating.

We are always looking to add more volunteers. The more people we have behind the scenes affects how many people we can serve. If you have a little extra time on your hands, please take the opportunity to help us help others.

August 22, 2021 is the twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

As mentioned before, the readings are supposed to complement each other. This Sunday's readings focus on choosing to place our trust in God all the time.

In the first reading, Joshua 24:1-2A, 15-17, 18B, Joshua tells the leaders of the tribes of Israel at Shechem that if it does not please them to serve the Lord, they should choose who they wish to serve.

Joshua said, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." The leaders emphatically stated their allegiance to the Lord. They said the Lord had brought them out of Egypt and slavery and had performed great miracles along the entire journey. They said, "18B Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God." They trusted in God all the time.

Psalms 34 is the responsorial Psalm. 18 When the just cry out, the Lord hears them, and from all their distress he rescues them. 19 The Lord is close to the brokenhearted; and those who are crushed in spirit he saves." Even in sorrow, trust in God all the time.

The second reading is from Chapter 5 of Ephesians. It advises, "21 Be subordinate to

one another out of reverence for Christ" and "2A Live in love, as Christ loved us." While this might not sound like something difficult, remember we are to love even those who, in our minds, don't deserve it. Even when loving difficult people, trust in God all the time.

The Gospel reading is John 6:60-69. Jesus is reminding his disciples that no one can come to him (Jesus) unless the Father grants it. He tells them it is the spirit that gives life and that the flesh is of no avail. The path of Christian living is clear but it is sometimes difficult.

"66 As a result of this, many of his disciples returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied him." Then Jesus asked the Twelve if they wanted to leave, too. "68 Simon Peter answered him, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. 69 We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God." We may be like Peter and have faltering steps sometimes. Still, trust in God all the time.

We may find it difficult to trust in God all the time. Here are a few examples:

- 1) There is a pandemic. People are sick and some are dying. Unemployment goes out of sight. You can't even hug people.
- 2) Your spouse kicks you to

the curb. You lose your children, your home, your place in the community, and all your stuff.

3) Your children grow into adulthood and forget you exist

4) Your loved ones get a terminal illness and there is nothing you can do.

5) Infirmities because of illness or age plague you 24/7.

In the midst of all of that, trust in God all the time. The words of the hymn, "Be Not Afraid," written by Robert J. Dufford, S. J., say it best.

"If you pass through raging waters in the sea, you shall not drown.

If you walk amid the burning flames, you shall not be harmed.

If you stand before the pow'r of hell and death is at your side, know that

I am with you through it all. "Be not afraid.

I go before you always. Come follow me, and I will give you rest."

Welcome to the 'front porch.'

This past Lord's Day, the amazin' blonde and I took our third weekend trip up to Lexington as we had done for years until about six months ago. At that time, we had to trade that weekend to go down to a little congregation in Conway, Louisiana to help re-open its doors after it had closed for a year. The Lexington congregation freely agreed to take on a little more of the teaching load to allow us to take on that work, one that has been a tremendous blessing for all. But this past week, with a change of schedule, we were open on the third Sunday and came up to hear two of our local teachers - Tim Flynn and Dale Wells. That really was a blessing.

I thought of all of that as I prepared to share our second point from our first-Sunday lesson, "No man crosses the same river twice" sermon, based on our scary Yellowstone experience. That second point is that we must make sure we bear one another's burdens, as the apostle says in Galatians 6:2. I had not thought of that point when I delivered the lesson, but now I do. I think the Lexington congregation exemplified that attribute well in the working with the Louisiana congregation: The congregation here lent them our help while it took on

more of the load themselves, something our teachers here are very capable of doing, evidenced by Tim and Dale's lessons on Sunday. The principle works not only with individuals helping each other but, in this case, with congregations also lending a helping hand.

In our 'crossing the river' study, we were able to illustrate this point with our unique hiking experience. My friend Todd Perrin, an excellent hiker who attends a church with whom we have long been associated from the north side of Houston, had a great burden to bear as he and I set off alone in that Yellowstone wilderness. The principle seemed to work on a number of levels. Randy Butler, who had a higher tech GPS phone, had stayed behind to help Roy Deering to get up the mountain and out of the park after turning his ankle - and Todd had to take on the responsibility of guiding us on the remaining six days of our wilderness tour. Of course, as we have noted, things did not go as planned and Todd and I got lost, making Todd carry even more of the load than he had planned. I can say with

certainty that had he not taken on that responsibility that we would not have gotten out of the wilderness in due time and in a safe condition, if at all.

As I related that part of the story in the lesson, my mind immediately went to one of the most poignant scenes of the Lord's crucifixion journey, the scene where the Roman soldiers compel a man named Simon to bear the cross of Jesus after the load had become too heavy for our Lord to bear. I did not remember which of the gospels related that incident when it came to mind, but I guessed it might be Luke since Luke seems to offer more of the human element in his lovely gospel - and, sure enough, there it was, in Luke 23:26. I can tell you that the life of the man who carried the cross of Jesus that day would never be the same after that tremendous scene. Biblical evidence indicates that he very likely becomes a member of the church later in his life.

Then I remembered again. It is true: No man crosses that same river twice.

We need to focus on the Lord, not letting troubles make us give up. We need to get into God's word and believe what it says. God's standard is perfection.


The evening message was from Psalm 66, believed to be written by Hezekiah. It is the "song of a happy man", giving glory to God for what He has done for us.


