

2. Don't skimp on masks

If an airport or other busy, indoor public places stand between you and your turkey dinner, opt for a high-quality surgical mask such as a KN95 over those of the cloth variety.

One 2021 study currently under peer review from researchers at universities including Yale and Stanford found that surgical masks are 95 percent effective at filtering out virus particles, compared to just 37 percent for cloth masks.

"Remember, masks offer two-way protection: for you and those you're around," said OMRF immunologist Hal Scofield, M.D.

3. Testing, one, two

For gatherings with multiple households, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suggests considering adding testing to holiday preparations.

"At-home rapid tests provide an easy way to do this," said Scofield, of antigen tests available from local pharmacies. "Tests come two to a box. Test once 48 hours before your event, and



Scofield added that in the case of high likelihood of disease, a negative antigen test is most likely a false negative. "But, if you have no known exposure, are fully vaccinated and have been wearing your mask, a negative antigen test is likely to be a true negative," he said.

4. Ventilate to celebrate

With the highly transmissible delta variant in circulation, good ventilation remains as important as it was in 2020.

"Eat on the back patio, turn on exhaust fans, or open the windows," said Chakravarty. "This may also help protect against the transmission of other airborne viruses back in circulation, such as influenza."

5. Check the numbers

> "Checking beforehand may provide some last-minute guidance on whether attending is wise, particularly if you're in a higher-risk category," Scofield said.

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


Veterans appreciated

However, they'll have to be changed slightly due to the greater than expected urban area growth revealed in the final U.S. Census data.

For instance, Senate District 18 will move from northeastern Oklahoma to the Oklahoma City metropolitan area due to the unexpected growth in the Oklahoma City suburbs. The proposed Senate maps generally shift western districts slightly further toward the Oklahoma City area, and eastern districts somewhat further toward the Tulsa area.

Unlike the legislative districts that must be within a certain percentage of the same population, the U.S. Constitution requires that congressional maps be drawn to within one person. For this reason, the proposed maps for Districts 1-3 numbers were received in than the current legislative and have populations of 791,871, while Districts 4 and 5 have populations of 791,870 each.

Religion in Government

I am inspired this week by an assignment my wife is doing for a Law in Education class. Her assignment was to write about religion in school and particularly release time for religious classes. It is an interesting assignment for her because, unlike most of her class, she grew up in a state that actually does have release time in the high school. Religion, in general, is an interesting subject and historically speaking I have found most people are confused about what the Constitution says.

When I teach classes on the Constitution, after I cover the checks and balances and go over how the Constitution protects the people from the government and the government from the people, I then like to throw out some interesting questions to

First, I ask what the Constitution says about political parties, hint it says nothing. Then I like to ask, which article covers the separation between church and state. This is a trick question because even though the vast majority of Americans believe this line is in our founding document it is not. In actuality, the original Constitution said nothing at all about religion or God. You cannot argue for or against religion using the original document, there is simply nothing there to support your claims.

Now after the Constitution was ratified, the first Congress amended the Constitution with the First Amendment which contains the Establishment Clause that states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

You can interpret that for yourself if that clause restricts religious influence on government or just whether government cannot interfere with the practicing of religion. If you are wondering where the wall between church and state comes from, it was in a letter Thomas Jefferson sent to the Danbury Baptist Association.

If you are so inclined to see the Constitution as a Christian document, there are two good arguments. Biden's Thanksgiving tax

Over the past several months, Americans have felt the dramatic rise of prices on everything, from the cost of groceries, filling up at the gas pump and heating their homes as well as trouble finding items on store shelves.

That is until the government decided to crack down on polygamy in Utah in 1878. The courts really did not start taking up religious cases until the 1940s.

If you are inclined to believe there should be a wall between the two, the best historical ground is simply if the Founders wanted to protect Christianity, they could have done so. Almost every state Constitu- all be concerned about how tion in 1789 had religious protections. The Founders did not just forget to add it.

However, while not everyone reads the Establishment Clause the same way, what is important is how the courts have interpreted it and the Supreme Court today has seen it as a wall. Today, whenever the courts have to decide a religious issue they apply what is known as the Lemon Test.

In 1971, the Supreme Court struck down a practice in Pennsylvania where the schools were helping to pay for teacher's salaries and books at religious schools. Alton Lemon led the charge against Pennsylvania for violating the Establishment Clause. Acknowledging the First Amendment's language is vague, the Court determined a simple three question test to determine if any government is running afoul of the Constitution. The Lemon Test asks, 1) the primary purpose of the assistance is secular, (2) the assistance must neither promote nor inhibit religion, and (3) there is no excessive one inmate said. Otherwise, the state and religion would be aliens to each other—hostile, suspicious, and even unfriendly." 

Good week to all! Welcome to the "Front Porch."

I'm going to dip into the archives this week to share a fitting piece. It shows that the principles from 2017 are the same as today, and the same as A.D. 17, for that matter.

Remember the Lord teaching in His first recorded sermon: "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled" (Matthew 5:6). It is one of my favorite beatitudes, and perhaps today's visit will help you pursue that much-needed 'righteousness' more in your life.

There's an old story of a warship out on the sea one foggy night; and the captain sees a light just ahead that is on a collision course with his "we are on a collision course. Please change your course ten degrees."

"Thank you for the warning, sir," comes the reply, quickly, "but I'll need you to change your course ten degrees."

"Sir," replies the captain, already irritated, "I am a captain. Please change your course!"

With his voice raised to a fever pitch, the captain barks, "Young man, I am a warship. Change your course immedi-

With that, the captain quickly changes his course ten degrees.

It's a simple story, yes, but its lesson reminds us of the way of life.Lighthouses, you see, don't move. They are stable. They are set deep into the ground. Really, they are 'immovable.' It doesn't matter the rank of the officer or the size of the warship, the lighthouse is not going to move ship. Immediately the captain to accommodate a ship. The key here is not that you feel you have such unchanging principles already firmly established in your life. I want you to understand that. The key is probably the opposite: You understand that you do not have those principles established as you need and want them; and you are willing to work toward building something worthwhile and long-lasting to guide your ship through choppy water on dark, foggy nights.
