## Board hears traffic study

For pickup and drop off of students at elementary school

### Traffic presentation

Purcell City Manager Dale Bunn (standing), Purcell Police Captain John Albertson, left, and Traffic Engineering Consultant BJ Hawkins addressed the Purcell Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday night about a traffic pattern study concerning drop off and pick up of students at Purcell Elementary.

Purcell's Board of Education was presented options on dealing with drop off and pick up at the elementary school during Monday night's regular monthly meeting at the administration building.

City manager Dale Bunn and BJ Hawkins of Traffic Engineering Consultants, Inc., made the presentation that included the potential of opening up additional parking and an extended driveway at the elementary building.

The estimated price tag for the project would be around \$100,000, according to Bunn.

The consultants also told the board the city will update signage around the school in an attempt to assist drivers.

No action was taken.

The board did update the student transfer policy and altered the 2022-23 school

One of the main reasons for

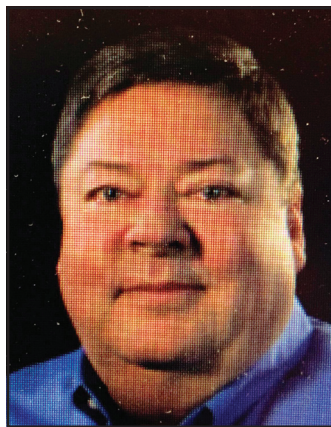

# Plant a terrarium for a unique winter garden or gift

Create a garden under glass to enjoy or give as a gift to new, experienced, and even reluctant gardeners. This self-contained system makes it easy to be a successful gardener with minimal care. Purchase a terrarium or repurpose something hiding on a shelf in the basement, garage or shed. Even a cool glass container, cloche or bell jar turned open side down and placed on a shallow

planting tray will work. Just glue a decorative doorknob or handle on the top for easy access. Make it more festive for the holidays. Visit the ornament aisle in your favorite craft store. Create a mini terrarium from DIY Christmas orbs for holiday decoration or the perfect hostess gift. Use closed terrariums like this when growing tropical plants. They thrive in the high humidity and moist soil. Leave the top off or use open containers like glass

vases, or mason jars for cacti and succulents. Use a cacti and succulent mix for these drought tolerant plants. They prefer the lower humidity and drier soil that open terrariums and cacti potting mix provide. Once you have the container, you need to fill it with potting mix, plants, and other decorative items. Consider a layer of decorative stone, twigs, sea glass or sand at the bottom for added color and interest.

Some gardeners include a layer of charcoal to help absorb any odor. The key is not overwatering as the decorative stone and charcoal won't prevent waterlogged soil from killing your plants. Consider covering the stone layer with black landscape fabric to prevent the potting mix from filtering through and covering up these items. Cover this with a layer of well-drained potting mix for tropical plants and cacti and succulent mix for drought tolerant plants. Add contours to the soil level if space allows for added interest. Select a variety of plants of different heights, textures, and colors to create an attractive terrarium garden. Many



# Temperature roller coaster

Several days of extreme above average temperatures have left us feeling much more like late August than mid-December. These temps look to wind down as we head into late this week, as our highs will return to (still above average) 60s for our Thursday and Friday.

Friday, a storm system will develop near I-35 and move eastward. The initiation point isn't locked in, so a 40 percent chance remains. This storm is driven by a cold front that will push our highs Saturday and Sunday into the upper 40s and lower 50s.

The weekend will be pretty gloomy with mostly cloudy skies, and temperatures in the mornings approaching freezing. Next week we rebound just a bit, with partly cloudy skies hanging around, but temperatures will return to the mid 60s by next Wednesday.

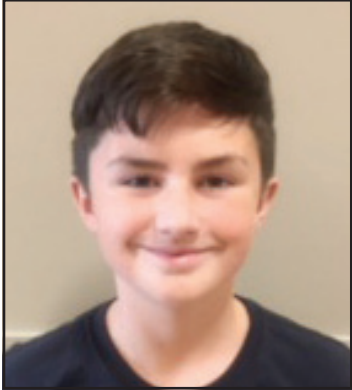
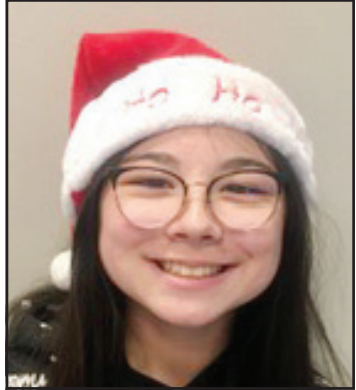

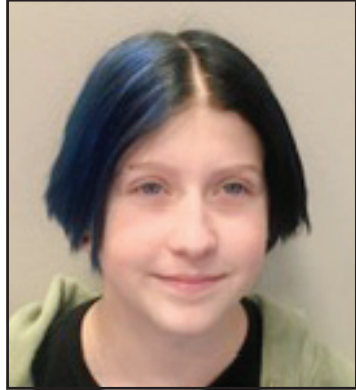

Plant:

garden centers now sell small specimens perfect for these mini gardens.

Low growing tropical plants such as baby’s tears, creeping fig, moss, and ivies make excellent groundcovers. Small specimens of dracaenas, crotons, palms and podocarpus make nice upright features. Fill in the middle ground with ferns, nerve plants, polka dot plants and more.

Once assembled, terrariums are relatively easy to manage. Moisten the soil and cover. Crack the lid open if condensation builds up on the glass.

Then replace the cover and monitor the soil moisture and condensation. Add additional moisture carefully. A turkey baster is an easy way to water only the plants in need of a drink.

Place your terrariums in a bright location away from direct light. Heat can build up in this covered ecosystem and cook your plants when placed in a sunny location.

Now is the perfect time to gather or purchase fun glassware, planting and decorating supplies, and, of course, plants. Then take a break from the hectic holiday season to plant up a few holiday decorations and green gifts for your loved ones.

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# Somehow, some way, may this be a Christmas worth remembering

We had difficulties when we were growing up in Martin County, Ky., but overall, we thought we were doing okay. President Lyndon Johnson came to Inez, Ky., in 1964 to let us know we weren't doing very well.

He began his campaign in our community and we became the poster child for American poverty. We hadn't really thought of ourselves as poor until we started hearing about ourselves in the news.

I had numerous friends who didn't get much for Christmas. Often it was one or two small gifts or nothing at all.

Several classmates at my elementary school in Tomahawk, Ky., were fortunate if they had a coat to wear in the winter. Ragged looking shoes on a kid's feet during the winter was a common sight.

Several classmates came to school to wash their faces and hands in the boys' bathroom. The school lunch was the only decent meal some of the kids ate during the week.

It was a while before President Johnson's 1964 promises started helping our area. Even with the roll out of government assistance many families subsisted until the coal boom of the seventies which has almost died.

Today our county is reinventing itself with agriculture, a service center to aid bitcoin mining, tourism and small businesses.

I don't remember every Christmas, but I remember one.

My dad broke his back falling off a barn when I was a child. He was out of work for several months and in those days, we didn't have government safety nets to see us through tough financial times.

Christmas came as usual and we did put up a tree. Our family gathered on Christmas Eve and we had food, fellowship and laughter. We always raised a garden and my parents stored food so it came in handy during tough times.

I expected nothing for Christmas that year because the heaviness of family financial pressure was obvious even as a child.

Surprisingly, my mother handed me a small wrapped box that Christmas Eve and said Merry Christmas. I was shocked because I expected nothing that year.

Opening the box, I found a watch that had numbers that glowed in the dark. It may have cost \$5 but it was priceless to me. I was thrilled and wore it every night to just look at the glowing numbers.

Dad was recuperating that Christmas. His temporary disability and our financial stress made life gloomy for us that year. Yet, here I am remembering that Christmas as one of the best of all.

It was during that Christmas that I remember the presence of family. Mom and dad were alive. We had food to eat. We had a roof over our heads and our family had each other.

This may not be your best Christmas, but maybe, just maybe you can still have

Christmas.

The empty chair is painful. Depression is real. Financial or other personal difficulties may have disabled you. Millions have died from COVID-19. Thousands are suffering from horrific tornadoes and loss of life.

Hurricanes have pounded us in the East and fires have incinerated our West. In the midst of all this inflation eats away at America's paychecks like an unchecked malignancy.

The message of Christmas is the story of peasant parents, enduring difficult travel, taxes to be paid and no place to sleep but a barn and a cow's trough for their newborn baby.

Somehow, they found strength in each other and in God who brought them and their baby through a very difficult time.

We never forget their story and their plight, it's truly a Christmas worth remembering.

We are going to remember this Christmas, no doubt. Somehow, some way, with God's help and each other, may this be a Christmas worth remembering.

## Garvin:

other ways to keep our communities safe.

Other issues I'd like to tackle include creating a standardized system for state agency background checks, tightening up regulations and closing loopholes for juvenile sex offenders, providing an income tax credit for automotive manufacturing, creating District Attorney Multidisciplinary Teams to focus on elder abuse, and providing bidding preference for Oklahoma-based companies.

Besides working on legislation, we're also continuing work on the budget. State agencies have all submitted their requests for the upcoming session and now our appropriations subcommittees will start meeting with them to get a better understanding of their financial needs.

My first agency budget hearings start this Wednesday, where we will hear from the

Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth, the Office of Disability Concerns, the Oklahoma State University Medical Authority, and the University Hospitals Authority OUHCS. These public meetings will be streamed live on the Senate website at [www.oksenate.gov](http://www.oksenate.gov). We'll be meeting with the other eight agencies under our purview in the coming weeks.

In closing, the Joint Committee on Pandemic Relief Funding is continuing to meet regularly. This bicameral, bipartisan legislative committee is working hard to decipher how best to utilize the state's \$1.9 billion of American Rescue Act Plan (ARPA) federal funding, and they'd like to hear from you.

At <https://oklahoma.gov/arpa.html>, you'll find information about the ARPA funding and the parameters on spend-

ing it, how the committee will be vetting proposals, and how the public can submit project proposals for the committee's consideration.

The committee will provide a list of proposals to Gov. Stitt, who has the final say on how these federal funds will be spent. They must be allocated by the end of 2024 and spent by the end of 2026.

These are our tax dollars, so it's important to pay attention to this process. You'll find the meeting schedules and can watch them live at [www.oksenate.gov](http://www.oksenate.gov).

bill can chose to either bring the updated bill directly to the floor for a vote or bring the bill to conference committee.

If the bill passes the original chamber, it moves to the governor's desk.

In conference committee, legislators from the House and Senate on the applicable committees meet to discuss the differences in language. If they come to an agreement on new language, the bill goes to both chambers for a final vote and then moves to the governor's desk.

While I'm preparing for the new session, I'm enjoying spending time in House District 42. It's always a joy to celebrate the holidays in

the district and to participate in the many parades, parties and other celebrations. I hope you and your loved ones take advantage of the many events in our area and stay safe this holiday season!

Before closing out this column, I want to mention my upcoming town hall with officials from the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority, the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control, and local law enforcement.

We will meet on December 16 to present information on the medical marijuana industry and answer questions from attendees.

## Oklahoma redistricting completed by Legislature

The Oklahoma Constitution requires legislative and congressional districts to be redrawn by the Legislature every 10 years following the release of results from the U.S. Census.

This year, Census data was delayed until August, forcing the Legislature to meet in special session to accomplish this duty.

Final redistricting maps were approved in the special session held in mid-November, and the governor signed each plan into law.

To complete our task this year, House and Senate bipartisan redistricting committees and nonpartisan staff members held 30 public town hall meetings throughout the state to gather input and answer questions about the redistricting process.

This was the most public meetings ever held for this process. We also took public map submissions for both legislative and congressional districts.

The goal of redistricting is to keep districts as equal as possible in population size to ensure fair representation for all Oklahomans, whether they live in a major city, a suburb or a rural area. The redrawing every 10 years is needed to match population shift.

The ideal population for each legislative district, based on the 2020 Census, is 39,202 residents. House District 20 has 38,918 people, with 43.69 percent registered as new to the district.

Our suburban/rural HD20 represents the cities of Blanchard, Cole, Goldsby, Newcastle, Noble, Norman, Slaughterville and Washington within Cleveland and McClain counties.

Currently, the district also represents parts of Garvin and Pottawatomie counties and a portion of Purcell and Pauls Valley. Those areas will no longer be in the district when the new boundaries take effect in November 2022.

Compared to preliminary maps enacted in May, the district shifts further north, taking in more of McClain and Cleveland County than before.

Our House District primarily is in Congressional District 4.

During the redrawing of congressional district boundaries, there was some questioning over the final version of Congressional District 5, particularly in southwest Oklahoma City.

In the current map, there is a carve out of a portion of south Oklahoma City. The new map moves that portion a bit to the west and expands boundaries of the district to the north to include Lincoln and portions of Logan counties.

The map includes input from multiple people, and I'm confident in the final product.

### Holiday Crinkle Cookies

2 cups plus 2 TBL flour  
3/4 cup plus 2 TBL cocoa powder  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup oil  
4 large eggs  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. peppermint extract  
Powdered sugar  
Hershey's Kisses

Mix flour, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt. In a large bowl beat sugar, oil, eggs and extracts. Stir in dry ingredients just until combined.

Refrigerate covered at least 2 hours.

Preheat oven to 350°. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Scoop tablespoons of dough, shape into balls and roll in powdered sugar.

Place on cookie sheets about 1-1/2 inches apart. Bake 10 to 12 minutes.

Remove from oven and use a wrapped Kiss to form an indentation in each cookie.

Allow cookies to cool at least 2 minutes before removing to a cooling rack. After 5 minutes, place Kisses on cookies.

# Poinsettia care for the consumer

The Poinsettia, often referred to as the "Christmas Plant," was first brought to the USA from its native land Mexico, in 1825 by the first US ambassador Joel Robert Poinsett.

Today, with the multitude of colors, sizes and shapes available, poinsettias offer an abundance of holiday cheer for every decor.

### Tips for the Wise Consumer

Taking into account the following tips while making your poinsettia selection will help you to have a plant that will last throughout the holiday season.

If you buy your poinsettia at a retail store that does not specialize in plants, the store may not provide proper care for the plant.

Remember when purchasing your poinsettia to choose the one that is not wilted and appears to be cared for. Avoid the plants with foliage that is beginning to yellow.

The actual flowers of the poinsettia plant are the golden yellow clusters (cyathia) in the center of the colored bracts (the colored bracts are actually the plant's leaves that changed color to attract insects and not flower petals as most consumers think).

As you choose your poinsettia, make sure the plant you choose still has the cyathia.

If you purchase your poinsettia from a store that has kept the plastic or paper sleeve packaging on the plant, remember, if this packaging has been kept on the poinsettia for a lengthy amount of time, the leaves may turn yellow and drop before the holiday season is over.

You, as a consumer, should look for the wide variety of colors, abundance of cyathia, nice bracts, and long lasting colors.

### Temperature Control

When you walk out of the store with your poinsettia, remember that the plant needs protection from the weather, especially if

the temperature is below 50°F.

If the store did not provide a plant sleeve for your plant, ask them for one, even a grocery bag would be helpful. Your poinsettia should not be exposed (even in the wrapping) to temperatures below 50°F for more than a short trip to the car.

Do not leave your poinsettia in your car while you finish shopping. If the poinsettia is chilled below 50° it may begin to drop the leaves. Immediately unwrap your poinsettia when you arrive at your destination. Enjoy!

At home locate your plant in a spot with bright, natural light, but not exposed to direct sunlight for more than one to two hours. If in a sunny location, make sure the plant never wilts.

Do not place your plant in an area that is exposed to drafts, heat from appliances, radiators, or ventilation ducts. And, though absolutely NOT poisonous, the plant should be placed away from small children and animals. Ingestion of the plant could cause discomfort if eaten.

The best method for watering your poinsettia is to water it thoroughly at the kitchen sink. If the poinsettia you bring home has a pot cover or foil wrapper, pierce the bottom to allow proper drainage, or better yet, remove the plastic/foil cover and, then, water with tepid water, allowing all excess water to drain from the pot.

Once draining has ceased, it is safe to replace the plastic/foil cover and return the plant to its display location.

The potting medium should only be allowed to nearly dry between thorough waterings. Do not let the soil dry out completely. Never allow the plant to sit in water, as the roots will rot and the plant will die within a day.

The color of your poinsettia will last longer with temperatures not over 75°F during the day and 60°-65°F at night.

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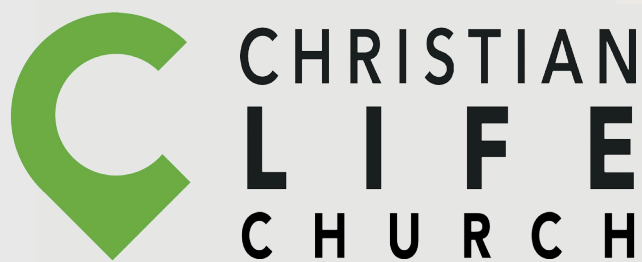

We may not have been blessed in southeastern Oklahoma with the timely fall rains needed to allow many producers to get their wheat planted in a timely manner, but in my travels around the county, I have seen several wheat fields that are up and growing well.

Assuming rainfall comes in the weeks ahead; wheat pasture could be a key source of protein and energy for cow herds by late December and early January.

Probably the best way to utilize these wheat pastures when raising cows is to limit graze them to provide the protein the cows need, while at the same time reducing the need for supplemental feeding.

Limit grazing of wheat pasture has proven to be one of the most efficient approaches for using this high-quality forage with mature beef cows.

The protein requirements of a dry cow can be met by allowing

her to graze on wheat pasture for one day and returning her to dry pasture grass or hay for the subsequent two to three days.

A pattern of one day on wheat and one day off should meet the protein needs of the same cow after calving. It is important that adequate forage be available in the dry grass pastures or in the form of hay to provide much of the energy requirements of the cows during the “off” days.

The day on wheat pasture should be defined as the amount of time required for the cow to graze its fill of wheat forage – three to five hours, typically – rather than 24 hours. This short time on wheat allows the cow to gather adequate amounts of protein to carry the animal over the ensuing days on dry grass or hay. A three-to-five hour grazing limit helps to avoid the unnecessary loss of valuable forage due to trampling, bedding down and manure deposits.

Given typical weather conditions in the fall, enough wheat

## sture can azing benefits

forage should be accumulated by late November to early December to supply the protein needs of up to one-and-a-half cows per acre throughout the winter months when limit grazing is practiced.

If these same cows were allowed to graze the wheat pasture continuously, due to wastage of the forage, this same pasture might only allow for stocking cows at one cow per acre, for only one month of grazing. These numbers will vary depending on wheat forage growth on each pasture so it would be wise for producers to inventory their forage production prior to stocking the pasture.

Glenn Selk, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension emeritus livestock specialist, cautions that cow-calf producers who decide to use continuous grazing programs should watch out for the possibility of grass tetany.

“Grass tetany will normally strike when older cows are

grazing cool season pastures in the early spring; the danger will tend to subside as hot weather arrives,” he said.

A mineral-deficient condition primarily caused by calcium, and to a lesser degree to magnesium, is thought to be the major factor that triggers the disorder. Grass tetany normally affects older cows that are nursing calves younger than three months of age. Dry cows are seldom affected.

“When conditions for the occurrence of grass tetany are suspected, cows should be provided mineral mixes containing 12 percent to 15 percent magnesium, consumed at a rate of three ounces to four ounces per day,” Selk said.

Selk reminds producers that it is best for the supplements to be started a couple of months ahead of the typical period of tetany danger, so that proper

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# 80th Anniversary of the sneak Japanese attack on the U.S Navy at Pearl Harbor — sinking of USS Oklahoma remembered

On December 7 hundreds of visitors from Oklahoma and across the United States gathered at the USSOklahoma Memorial to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

WhenJapanese dive bombers descended over Pearl Harbor, the USSOklahoma was among the first battleships to be attacked, taking eight torpedoes and sinking with 415 sailors and 14 marines aboard. The loss of life was second only to the USSArizona, which lost 1,177 sailors and marines.

The USSOklahoma Memorial is now a fixture on Ford Island, where so much history from the Pearl Harbor attack is now commemorated, but that was not always the case.

Every other ship that had been sunk on Pearl Harbor’s battleship row had a memorial except the USSOklahoma, so retired Navy officers Gregory Slavonic and Tucker McHugh teamed with other Oklahomans, including Oklahoma City architect Don Beck, to build a lasting tribute to the USSOklahoma’s fallen heroes.

Slavonic and McHugh established a committee that raised \$1.5 million in private donations to fund construction of the giant memorial featuring a black granite wall and 429 7-foot-tall standards cut from

white marble, representing each life lost on the ship.

“There are rows of these standards representing each individual that lost their life,” said memorial designer Beck. “You can walk between these rows, and the idea is you can walk among the lost souls and get a feeling of what it’s like to see 429 who gave their lives.”

The memorial was completed in 2007, and it was dedicated on the shores of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, only a few weeks after Oklahoma’s 100th birthday.

“This is what we do as Americans,” said retired Navy Cmdr. McHugh. “You go back to the Civil War or the Revolutionary War, we build memorials to honor heroes who have come before us. The fact that 429 men on the USSOklahoma died that day..., and there was nothing to honor them individually with their names on anything. That was just not right. That was not going to stand, so that’s why we built the memorial.”

The USSOklahoma Memorial’s grass-roots origins within the Sooner state made it unique among other memorials commemorating Pearl Harbor Day, said retired Rear Adm. Slavonic.

“The Oklahoma is the first memorial that we know of—and the park service told us this — that funds were raised by a private organization that did all

the leg work, did all the design work, and the only thing the park service did was allow us to have the land,” Slavonic said.

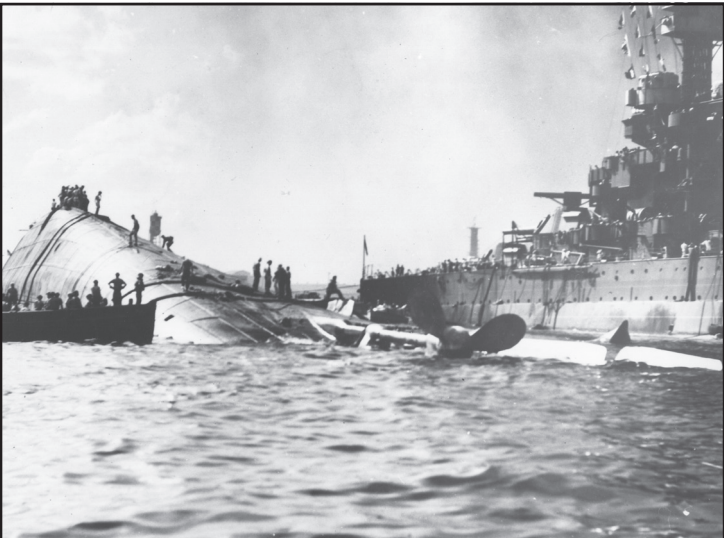
“That memorial, God willing, will be there for 100 plus years and you won’t have individuals taking it down,” Slavonic said. “It represents all the good things about our Navy, and about our state and our nation.”

Many veteran families will attend Tuesday’s Pearl Harbor Day commemoration, including two USSOklahoma survivors.

Sailor David Russell barely survived the attack on the USSOklahoma, managing to catch a rope and climb to safety aboard

the USS Maryland. Despite that experience and seeing so many of his shipmates perish, he was onboard USS Mahan, a destroyer, serving as a gunner’s mate just 16 days after the attack. He served another 19 years in the U.S. Navy, and is now 101 years old, living in Virginia.

Sailor Swede Boreen was able to escape the USSOklahoma before it sank and climbed aboard the USS Maryland. He only needed to slug down a cup of coffee before getting right back to work. He was given a rifle and was on patrol that very night. He then served another 18 years in the Navy and is now 101 years old, living in Oregon.

## Public input sought

On rail-grade crossings in state

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation is seeking public input on the Oklahoma Highway-Rail Grade Crossing State Action Plan.

This plan is intended to help identify the best strategies for improving highway-rail grade crossing safety statewide and identify rail safety needs and opportunities in Oklahoma.

The public may provide input on the state action plan via the online survey until January 6. The five-minute survey provides the community an opportunity to comment on all

highway-rail grade crossing-related issues in Oklahoma.

“Collaboration and involvement with the community is essential for the needs identified in the state action plan to not only improve highway-rail grade crossing safety statewide, but also for them to be implemented and be effective,” ODOT Multi-Model Division Manager Jared Schwennessen said. “The survey takes place

## Stop porch pirates his holiday season

You know it’s that time of the year when packages of all shapes and sizes begin to litter your porch. This year, C + R Research reported that over 230 million US digital buyers would be shopping online, making it a busy time for package theft.

With 43 percent of Americans citing themselves as victims of porch piracy, it’s safe to say that being aware is half the battle. The other half is doing something to prevent it.

With 8 in 10 Americans shopping online in 2021, Oklahoma does have some protections with a three-strike system for criminals stealing packages from homes and businesses. In 2020, the Porch Piracy Act was signed into law, enforcing stricter penalties against porch pirates with punishments of up to two years in prison or up to a \$5,000 fine.

Despite the law, it still largely falls on homeowners to protect their packages from thieves. Taking the proper precautions can prevent theft from occurring. Here are four tips to keep your holiday deliveries safe:

**Consider Shipping Insurance**—Shipping insurance is sold by postal services, courier companies and shipping insurance companies. **Give Specific Instructions**—Instead of having deliveries left unsecured at your front door, you can instruct drivers to leave a package at a back door, with a building superintendent, in a coded lockbox or with neighbors. You can also have deliveries placed on hold and request a specific delivery time. Most, but not all, of these services are free.

**Install Security Camera or Doorbell Camera**—Security cameras or video doorbells can also come in handy. The mere presence of these cameras or smart doorbells may be enough to ward off the potential package thieves. Even if it doesn’t, you’ll at least have evidence for a police report. Bonus: installing these cameras may qualify you for a homeowners insurance discount.

**Sign Up for Tracking Notifications**—Most carriers offer package tracking services and text or email alerts to know when a delivery will be made so that you can adjust your schedule accordingly. Sign up for text or email notifications to check your delivery status.

Finally, if your package is stolen, here’s what you can do.

• **Contact the Seller**—File a claim with the seller and ask for a replacement.

• **Contact the Shipping Company**—File a claim with the postal service that shipped your package. FedEx, UPS, USPS, DHL and Amazon have a claim-filing system to help you track down your package.

• **Check Your Credit Card**—Many credit cards have purchase protection covering lost or stolen items. Make sure you use a credit card to purchase the item.

**File an Insurance Claim**—Your homeowners’ or renters’ insurance may cover mail theft. Remember that filing a claim only makes sense for high-value packages worth more than your policy’s deductible.

### Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

## Hydroponics gardening attracts horticulture curiosity

During the past year, Oklahoma State University Extension has been flooded with inquiries related to hydroponics plant production.

Extension specialists said the nontraditional gardening method is viable, but it also involves more complicated growing techniques. Its surge in popularity is based on several factors.

“We saw interest in gardening in general with the onset of COVID-19 when everyone was at home,” said Josh Campbell, Oklahoma County Extension educator. “They wanted to connect with nature and the food supply by learning more about food sources and safety.”

What makes hydroponics appealing? Plants can grow in a liquid nutrient solution without the presence of soil, and it is a viable means of production for tomatoes, lettuce, cucumbers and peppers, as well as ornamental crops.

“Hydroponics is an option in urban areas where there’s a lack of access to land bases or productive soil,” Campbell said. “People interested in science and technology from an agricultural standpoint see it as the future for production in small spaces.”

Bruce Dunn, an OSU professor of horticulture and landscape architecture, said another big driver of hydroponics curiosity is the efficiency and cost savings of local food production.

“Most of our produce comes from California, and when we see \$4 per gallon gas along with labor and transportation issues, those things hang up

our veggies from getting out here to Oklahoma,” he said. “Local food movements want to reduce the carbon footprint and eliminate food deserts. We get calls every month from people saying they’re going into local food production.”

For the home gardener considering hydroponics gardening on a small scale in a garage or greenhouse, the method can be an economically viable option.

“The benefit of hydroponics production in a greenhouse is that you can schedule the harvest of fresh produce,” Dunn said. “If you divide the greenhouse into quarters and stagger germination times, you’ll have something to harvest every single week.”

However, both Dunn and Campbell acknowledge hydroponics gardening is more capital intensive and not as forgiving as traditional gardening. Phases of production that occur in natural, eco-gardens are difficult to replicate in a hydroponics environment.

“Hydroponics growers must ask for a premium to make any money, and that often requires farm-to-table restaurants or suppliers who will pay that

higher price,” Dunn said.

“I’ve seen very few growers scale up their operations to commercial levels and still make a profit,” Campbell said. “You have to be a great horticulturalist and skilled business person to handle the logistical challenges of growing food in a controlled indoor environment. If you don’t provide the right nutrients, water or light, things can get out of hand quickly.”

The saturation of Oklahoma’s cannabis industry is also responsible for many of the hydroponics inquiries. As marijuana growers begin to close shop, they are contacting OSU Extension specialists, searching for alternative ways to use their large, empty greenhouses.

“I’ll get inquiries of people vaguely saying, ‘I’m growing this plant...’ and I know exactly what they’re growing,” Dunn said with a chuckle. “There are more cannabis growers in Oklahoma than there are in California, and that may not be sustainable.”

“It’s an opportunity for Extension to help vegetable producers identify their hurdles and solve problems,” Campbell said.

every five years and results will be included in the plan.”

ODOT, which oversees rail safety within the state, invested more than \$100 million in railroad crossing improvements during the past five years.

ODOT works in partnership

with the railroad companies and federal government, including this federally mandated highway-rail grade crossing survey, to make continued safety improvements with its 3,450 public at-grade crossings.

Per federal requirements, the

Oklahoma State Action Plan will include a review of key crossing risk factors, identify crossings with crashes in the previous three to five years and list goals and strategies for addressing grade crossing safety issues.

intake can be established.

“Given that grass tetany also can occur when calcium is low, calcium supplementation should be included as well,” he said.

Symptoms of grass tetany from deficiencies of both minerals are indistinguishable without a blood tests.

“Cows grazing lush small grain pastures should be fed mineral mixes containing both calcium and magnesium,” he continued.

Grass tetany quickly leads to death if not treated. Many cows demonstrate clinical symptoms almost indistinguishable from milk fever or ketosis. When the disease is suspected, immediately call a veterinarian to diagnose and initiate treatment.

Some of the things to watch for in your cow herd are symptoms that may occur in the following order: excitement and nervousness, lack of coordination, muscle twitching, grinding of teeth, frequent urination, viciousness, staggering and falling, labored breathing, tetanic contraction of muscles, convulsions, and death. The complete sequence of visible symptoms often takes place in only six to 10 hours.

In beef herds, the herdsman does not always have the opportunity to observe the signs of the disease, and affected cattle may be found dead in the pasture. This problem is not only associated with wheat, but any cool season pasture such as ryegrass or fescue can cause this problem in the springtime.

Again, with a proper mineral supplementation program, most cases of grass tetany can be avoided, so producers should not be afraid to utilize cool season pasture to provide their cow herds with these high protein cool season forages.

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# Oklahoma municipal and tribal officials say infrastructure money is needed

WASHINGTON -- Mayors and tribes across Oklahoma have lists miles long of projects they hope to fund with some of the more than \$5 billion that has been unlocked for Oklahoma by the federal Infrastructure Bill.

The \$1.2 trillion infrastructure package signed into law on November 16 authorizes spending to fix crumbling roads and bridges, expand broadband, and fund clean energy, transit, and other public works over five years.

Native American and Alaskan tribes will receive \$11 billion from the package, from which \$3.5 billion will go to the Indian Health Service agency.

The state and municipalities will receive about \$4.6 billion for roads and bridges, \$520 million for water infrastructure projects, nearly \$500 million for airport and public transportation and more than \$100 million to improve internet access for the 1.12 million low-income Oklahomans, according to the White House.

Despite the substantial bipartisan support the legislation received in the Senate and to a lesser degree in the House, every member of the Oklahoma congressional delegation voted against the bill.

Major cities and tribes across the state said they have large needs for the cash that will become available as a result of the legislation.

"We have stormwater needs because we're the largest city in the state of Oklahoma not to have a stormwater utility because we're the only city in the state that has to vote on the creation or raising of the utility, so having funds to address gaps in that area will be fantastic," said Norman Mayor Brea Clark.

Clark said three Norman bridges have failed in the past five years, and her office is excited about infrastructure money going toward bridge and road repairs because the city is behind in their maintenance.

The city has an important project at 36th Avenue NW that was supposed to receive federal funding, she said. Clark said the city has matching money from a general obligation bond voted on by Norman residents waiting to be combined with federal funds to complete the project.

According to the city's website, the project involves widening 36th Ave NW from north of Tecumseh Road to north of Indian Hills Road from two to four lanes, with five-foot-wide on-street bike lanes.

"This project has a high chance of moving forward and finally being completed because of the progress we've already made, and hopefully, the infrastructure bill will fill that gap and get it over the finish line. So this is very important in Norman, and we should be able to act on it immediately," she said.

Jerald Gilbert, Enid's city manager, said the city is very excited about the prospect of additional infrastructure funding to fix the city's aging and insufficient infrastructure.

"Roads, streets, and bridges are a huge need for us in Enid. Water and sewer lines are another exciting possibilities. Just about any infrastructure that you could imagine, requires repairs, replacements, or improvements," he said.

Oklahoma City Mayor David Holt said he is very interested

in money for roads and bridges and the city's transit dollars.

"We're a city built around the automobile, but in the last couple of decades, our residents are wanting to see public transit alternatives and prioritize more money in that bucket to partner with some of the things we're already doing," Holt said.

Holt said Oklahoma City is building its first bus rapid transit line between Classen Boulevard and Northwest Expressway, two important medical and commercial areas.

The other thing he looks forward to, Holt said, is Amtrak's promise to use infrastructure money to connect Oklahoma City to southern Kansas.

"If you look at the Amtrak map across the country, the Heartland Flyer comes up from Fort Worth and ends here in Oklahoma City, so funding in the bipartisan bill for passenger rail would potentially link us up to Newton, Kansas, which is a northern suburb of Wichita, making the whole Amtrak network more available to our residents," he said.

Holt acknowledged that projects funded by the infrastructure bill would take years to complete, and future mayors would probably "cut the ribbons" when they are finished.

He said the relocation of Interstate 40 near downtown is an example of a major infrastructure project. The project was first conceived in the 1990s, and he cut the ribbon 25 years later.

"When I talk about these things, and the benefits I see for Oklahoma City, I also recognize we're talking about years to award these dollars and years beyond that to begin construction," Holt said.

Lawton Mayor Stan Booker said "We have a lot of water-sewer infrastructure that we're hoping can be advanced with infrastructure money, and also some industrial roadwork; those are roads used for industrial traffic.

"So, those are the main areas we could benefit from the most, industrial infrastructure and water-sewer infrastructure," Booker said.

Randy Sachs, a spokesman for the Choctaw Nation, said infrastructure money will allow the Nation to make intergenerational infrastructural investments in broadband expansion, road construction and surface improvements, electrification and power generation, and many other things.

"The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act are historical and incredibly large. Because of this, the transfer of funds could be slow, and implementation could be even slower. Federal agencies and departments will likely hold numerous consultations and listening sessions and accept written and oral comments to fully understand the needs and desires of tribal governments before distributing these funds," Sachs said.

It will also allow them, he said, to continue to care for their environment, which they believe is one of the primary responsibilities of tribal communities.

"The Choctaw Nation is grateful to the Biden Administration and our allies in Congress for ensuring Indian Country was not forgotten during the drafting of this important legislation," he said.

# OMRF study reveals genetic cause of neurological disease

Worldwide research led by an Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation scientist has uncovered genetic variants that cause a wide variety of neurological and developmental disorders.

Wan Hee Yoon, Ph.D., a scientist in OMRF’s Aging and Metabolism Research Program, used fruit flies to confirm the cause of nine pediatric patients’ symptoms.

“These children experienced a wide range of symptoms, but we found one crucial link among them,” said Yoon, who joined OMRF in 2017 from the Baylor College of Medicine. “The common thread was that each person had mutations in the same gene.”

The study published in the American Journal of Human Genetics involved children from eight unrelated families, all from Europe and the Middle East.

The children ranged in age, with some as young as 1 and 2 years old. Symptoms ranged from epilepsy, gait problems and an underdeveloped brain to hearing and sight loss.

DNA sequencing revealed that each patient shared a variation of a gene known as OGDHL. Yoon turned to *Drosophila*, the common fruit fly, to prove the mutations in

the OGDHL gene were not just a shared trait but the actual cause of their disease. The tiny insect has served as his primary research model for 17 years.

Why fruit flies? For Yoon, the answer is simple: Flies are small, easy to maintain, and he can manipulate their genome using advanced technology. About 75 percent of their genes mirror those in humans.

Fruit flies contain a counterpart gene to the human OGDHL gene. Yoon’s lab removed that gene from the insects and introduced the mutations found in the patients. Doing so caused similar neurological symptoms in the fruit flies.

The scientists also found that the loss of OGDHL in human neurons caused defects in mitochondria — the driver for energy and metabolism — in brain cells. “That told us that OGDHL is essential in the development and function of neurons,” Yoon said.

Yoon said it’s too early to know how common the mutation is but noted the findings would help doctors better diagnose patients and understand how variations of the gene lead to disease. “It was the first step in someday finding a treatment or perhaps even a cure,” he said.

While it is ideal to get a

flu vaccine before flu starts spreading in your community, getting vaccinated later is still beneficial during most seasons.

Flu most commonly peaks in February and significant activity can continue into May, so there is still time to get vaccinated if you haven't already.

OSDH encourages Oklahomans to take time this National Influenza Vaccination Week to go to your doctor or local pharmacy to get your flu vaccine, encourage your loved ones to get their flu vaccine and learn more about the benefits of getting vaccinated against flu.

Getting an annual flu vaccine is recommended for everyone six months and older and is the best way to help protect against flu.

Graduating with his administration degree in 2004, he found it difficult to leave the daily interactions with students to take on a role in school administration.

"In 2015, I accepted a principal's position with the Midwest City and Del City school district," he said. "I served two years as an assistant principal and three years as head principal at Kerr Middle School. My last administrator's position in Mid-Del School District was as head principal at Midwest City High School before coming to the Chickasaw Nation."

As an administrator with the school system, Mr. Elliott's duties included overseeing the Professional Learning Communities, which consist of teams of teachers using various data sources to improve teaching and learning for students by offering enrichment and remediation in the classroom.

He served on the Mid-Del Response to Intervention (RTI) Committee, the High Reliability School Leadership Team, and was a part of the Equality and Equity Committee for the District. He coordinated safety and security protocols along with being the Safe & Healthy School Committee leader.

He also implemented a Trauma Informed Team for Kerr Middle School and organized a mentor teacher program to assist teachers new to the profession.


No stranger to the educational services offered by the Chickasaw Nation, Elliott now works with and oversees both new and older programs and services that assisted him as a Chickasaw student.

"I have benefited through the programs offered by the Chickasaw Nation," Elliott said. "My first job where I received a paycheck was through the Toksali SMART Program, where I worked at the Chickasaw Nation headquarters. I also received tuition assistance to complete my bachelor's degree."

Elliott has two children; Reagan, 16 and Lauren, 11.

"I look forward to serving the citizens of the Chickasaw Nation and to continuing our tradition of seeking new and innovative ways to enhance the education experience for our citizens," Elliott said.

# Cutting waste during the holiday season

’Tis the season to celebrate the holidays, exchange gifts, attend parties and enjoy extended family around the table. It’s also the season to generate more waste: Between Thanksgiving and mid-January, most households generate about 25 percent more waste than any other season.

All the pretty wrapping paper and colorful bows make a nice backdrop for the holidays, but not so much at the curb, said Keima Borsuah, Oklahoma State University Extension assistant state specialist with the Solid Waste Management Program.

“When planning gifts and menus this time of year, think about the three Rs – reduce, reuse and recycle,” Borsuah said. “Of course, people enjoy giving and receiving gifts, but choose items of value, purpose and meaning. These gifts will be less likely to end up in a yard sale or even the trash.”

Another suggestion she has for cutting down on waste is to focus on gifts of experiences such as museum or zoo memberships or tickets to an amusement park. For those family and friends who have everything already, consider gift certi-

ates for cleaning services, car detailing or a homecooked meal. “Often during this time of year we want to give things, but something as simple as a gift of your time is priceless,” Borsuah said. “Do an activity that creates a memory, not more waste. Another idea is to give a homemade gift certificate for shoveling snow this winter, planting flowers in the spring, mowing the lawn in the summer or raking leaves next fall.”

Other ways to cut down on holiday waste include:

- Shop local to reduce cardboard waste. This not only eliminates the need for a box in which the gift is shipped, it also saves money on shipping costs.
- Choose gifts that have been recycled or made from sustainably sourced materials.
- Consider rechargeable batteries and chargers for electronic gifts.
- Reuse old maps, comics, newspaper or old posters as gift wrap.
- Reuse ribbons, bows and gift bags.
- Skip the wrapping altogether. Instead, hide the gift and leave written clues as to where it can be found.
- When decorating the tree, use energy efficient LED lights.
- Start a child’s or grandchild’s savings or educational

account, or donate in a family member’s name to their favorite charity.

Crystal Bennett, manager of municipal services with Republic Services, said her company services 14 million customers across 40 states, including Oklahoma.

“We see upward of 25 percent more at the curb during the holiday season and on through January,” Bennett said. “This extra trash not only affects the landfills but also our drivers. It takes them longer to get through their route, and because each stop has more waste than normal, the drivers must divert to the landfill more often.”

She also noted the increased amount of cardboard generated during the holidays, which she described as the “Amazon effect.” Customers order small products from the website that are shipped in large boxes, creating extra waste.

“During the pandemic when people were isolated in their homes, they began doing more and more shopping online,” she said. “Consumers need to break down the cardboard boxes before putting them in the recycle bin. This way the boxes take up less space and consumers can get more in each container. Also, when shopping in person, check products and packing for

the recycling symbol.”

While many residents are good at recycling, Bennett said people aren’t as good at reducing and reusing.

“Think about what you’re buying and consider if it can be recycled or reused. So many things can’t be recycled, but they can be reused or repurposed,” she said.

With the new year right around the corner, Borsuah suggests embracing “reduce, reuse, recycle” as a personal mantra going into 2022.

“Get your new year started off right with resolutions that will truly make a difference in everyone’s lives,” she said. make sure to read the directions on seed packets regarding spacing between each plant, as well as spacing between each row. Gardeners must make sure the seeds are planted at the proper depth to ensure productivity. Additional fertilizers may be beneficial to stimulate growth and production.

“Keep in mind the weather always plays a key role in planting times, but it’s a good idea to get your cool season crops in the ground soon,” Hillock said. “Start thinking ahead because it won’t be long until those warm-season crops will need to go in the ground.”
