Huge drug bust nets cocaine, meth, pills, guns and cash

Just before 8 p.m. Tuesday, Pettis County Sheriff's Office deputies, the Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force and the Morgan County SWAT team executed a search warrant on 1821 S. Barrett Aven. in the heart of Sedalia. Officers arrested James Johnson and Whitney Raymond and seized a mammoth amount of drugs, an arsenal of weapons and \$61,000 in cash.

rants, while Johnson will face the brunt of the remaining drug charges including first-degree trafficking.

"I'm happy about it," Anders said. "Anytime you get that amount of dangerous narcotics, specifically the stimulants, that's a good day. Both of those drugs (cocaine and meth) are highly addictive, they're very damaging. I don't like that being in the community and I don't think the community likes it being there either.

I was elected to do a job and I'm just trying to do that to the best of my ability."

Although Anders was on scene, he was quick to point out it was a team effort.

"This is by no means a Brad Anders thing," said Anders. "This is a team effort."

Anders is the Director of the Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force, made up of deputies from eight surrounding counties.

"They're on my payroll," Anders said. "It's a great, great, task force. I couldn't be happier."

Knowing Johnson was highly-armed went into the planning for the raid.

"We do a threat assessment for every warrant that makes sure whether or not it rises to the level of needing a tactical team to make the entry," said Anders. "We're looking at whether or not they have cameras, whether they have dogs, whether they have guns, if it's a felony, things like that that get us to the level of, yes, this is a full-team operation."

Dreams come true for three area children

Dreams of castles, Mickey Mouse and Buzz Lightyear will come true this Sunday as three Dream Factory of Sedalia families travel to Disney World in Orlando, Florida.

The Dream Factory is a nonprofit organization that is not limited to granting dreams to only terminally ill children but also grants dreams to "critically and chronically ill children" from the ages of 3 through 18. Sedalia Treasurer Linda Johnson said because of the pandemic, children could not be granted dreams last year, but this year three local children were selected. Finnian Paszkiewicz, 8, and his siblings and mother and father Lynn and Chris Paszkiewicz, of Sedalia; Tyler Parker, 17, and his grandparents Paul and Debbie Parker, of Leeton; and Ava Williams, 12,

and her parents Edward and Jennifer Williams, of Malta Bend.

Johnson said Give the Kids the World Village, which is sponsored in part by Perkins Restaurant & Bakery, is dedicating a whole week next week to the Dream Factory Organization. Due to this, three local families were able to participate.

"It's our entire organization and all of the chapters are able to go during this week," she explained. "It's going to be 25 families.

"They all spend so much time at the doctors that it will be a highlight in their life," she continued. "It will give them something to look forward to."

Johnson added that for the 33 years the Dream Factory of Sedalia has been in the area, the staff has given 229 children a dream. Those dreams are funded by the annual Dream Factory of Sedalia Tractor Pull hosted

each June.

The families will leave on Father's Day and return the following Saturday. While there, they will stay at the private resort, Give the Kids the World Village. Tuesday evening the families met at the Sedalia Perkins restaurant to receive their trip itinerary, confirmation numbers for the flights and their spending money.

Perkins District Manager Amber Clark and Sedalia Manager Destiny

Parker were there to greet the families.

Parker said she went to the Village about a year ago and added it was "neat" to know area families were getting to go also.

"I'm excited, I'm happy for them," she noted.

Clark said Perkins has a Gingerbread House at the Village and the company does multiple fundraisers throughout the year.

Juneteenth celebration slated for Saturday

Hubbard Park will see a flurry of activity this Saturday as Juneteenth celebrations begin.

Canceled last year, like so many activities due to COVID, the event is back and will feature food, music, games and a day to enjoy summer with the family.

Sedalia/Pettis County NAACP President Rhonda Chalfant, Ph.D., explained Juneteenth is a "commemoration of the day in 1865 when Union soldiers came to Galveston, Texas, to let the

enslaved peoples there know the (Civil) War was over and that they were free." June 19 has become an annual holiday for Black people to celebrate the end of slavery in the United States.

Those helping plan the annual event are Noah and Cookie Poole, Beverly Clark, Alona Reid, Steve Boggs and Chalfant. Opening ceremonies will begin at 3 p.m. and will include dignitaries from the city and county including elected officials. Chalfant noted Sedalia Police Chief Matt Wirt and Pettis County Sheriff Brad Anders will attend.

"Pastor Jones from Burns Chapel is going to give the invocation," Chalfant said. "Alona Reid is going to give us a brief history of Juneteenth. And we'll probably be having the Black National Anthem, which is 'Lift Every Voice and Sing.'"

There will be games for the first two hours of the event. People can participate in a donut and watermelon eating contest. Donuts will hang from strings above and people can try their skill of trying to eat them without touching them.

Route 65 closed under Route 83 to remove bridge deck

U.S. Route 65 under Missouri Route 83 south of Warsaw will be closed from 6 p.m. Thursday, June 17 until 7 a.m. Friday, June 18. If necessary, the contractor also will work 6 p.m. Monday, June 21 until 7 a.m. Tuesday, June 22.

Contractor crews will remove Route 83 bridge deck/driving surface over Route 65. All lanes of Route 65 will be closed in both directions under Route 83 while crews remove the bridge deck/driving surface over Route 65.

Route 65 drivers will be detoured up and over the northbound and southbound ramps at Route 83. Signs and message board will alert drivers approaching the work zone. Drivers should seek an alternate route.

Weather and/or scheduling conflicts could alter

the work schedule.

This work is part of a project to remove the bridge deck/driving surface of the Route 83 bridge and replace it with a new surface. In addition, new guardrail will be installed at the ends of the bridge. The bridge is expected to remain closed until mid-September to complete the work.

Justice Dept.: Missouri governor can't void federal gun laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department is warning Missouri officials that the state can't ignore federal law, after the governor signed a bill last week that bans police from enforcing federal gun rules.

In a letter sent Wednesday night and obtained by The Associated Press, Justice officials said the U.S. Constitution's Supremacy Clause outweighs the measure that Gov. Mike Parson signed into law Saturday. The new rules

penalize local police departments if their officers enforce federal gun laws.

Acting Assistant Attorney General Brian Boynton said the law threatens to disrupt the working relationship between federal and local authorities, they said in the letter, noting that Missouri receives federal grants and technical assistance.

"The public safety of the people of the United States and citizens of Missouri is paramount," Boynton wrote in the letter.

President Joe Biden has made gun control laws a priority of his

administration, and the House has passed two bills requiring background checks on firearms sales and an expanded review for gun purchases, though they face a tough road in the Senate. But states, including Missouri, have increasingly worked to loosen gun laws, including abandoning requirements that people get training and pass background checks to carry concealed handguns.

Missouri's law would subject law enforcement agencies with officers who knowingly enforce any federal laws to a fine of about \$50,000 per

violating officer.

Republican lawmakers who worked to pass the bill have said they were motivated by the potential of more restrictive gun laws in the Biden administration. But state Democrats have argued the law is unconstitutional and have predicted it would not pass a challenge in the courts.

The Justice Department argued in the letter that the state lacks the authority to shield any Missouri businesses or citizens from federal law or to prevent federal law enforcement officials from carrying out their duties.

Diehl takes command of 509th Bomb Wing

WHITEMAN AIR FORCE BASE, Mo. — U.S. Air Force Col. Daniel Diehl took the reins of the 509th Bomb Wing from outgoing commander Col. Jeffrey Schreiner during a change-of-command ceremony June 16, at Whiteman Air Force Base.

Military change-of-commands are a time-honored tradition that formally symbolizes the continuity of authority as the command passes from one individual to another. The transfer of command is physically represented by handing the command flag, the tangible symbol of the unit, from the outgoing commander to the new.

"As I take my position at this historic base and storied unit, I want to congratulate Col. Schreiner on a masterful job leading the world's most lethal stealth platform," Diehl said. "I have big shoes to fill and it is an honor to continue the impressive work he began."

After two years in com-

mand and leading Team Whiteman through the global COVID-19 pandemic, Schreiner is headed for a new leadership position with the United States Strategic Command at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska.

Maj. Gen. Mark Weatherington, Eighth Air Force and Joint-Global Strike Operations Center commander, presided over the ceremony and assured airmen in attendance that the Wing has transitioned into very capable hands.

"It was an honor to preside over the event and to pass the 509th Bomb Wing reins from one remarkable leader to another," Weatherington said. "The airmen, civilians and families of Whiteman Air Force Base and the vital, strategic mission of the B-2 Spirit stealth bomber are in good hands."

Diehl is an experienced pilot with more than 2,500 flight hours in the T-37 Tweet, T-38 Talon and B-1B Lancer and has accumulated 664 combat hours throughout his Air Force career.

He transitioned to

Whiteman AFB from Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, where he commanded the 7th Operations Group, Air Force Global Strike Command's largest B-1 bomb group. At Whiteman, Diehl will be responsible for the combat readiness of the Air Force's only B-2 Spirit wing and supporting installation functions.

Over the past months, he trained and qualified in the stealth bomber and is slated to meet with representatives of each group on base to immerse himself in Team Whiteman's wide-ranging missions and community.

"I have already felt extremely welcomed by the members of Whiteman Air Force Base and I am humbled to become a part of this elite group," Diehl said. "The mission of the 509th is absolutely vital to our national defense and every member of Team Whiteman is an invaluable asset in keeping our Air Force the greatest air force the world has ever known. I look forward to working alongside these talented and dedicated team members!"

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
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Caston to be named S-C cheerleading head coach

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COVID-19 cases rise in Missouri areas popular among tourists

O'FALLON, Mo. (AP) — A swath of southern Missouri is seeing a big rise in coronavirus cases and hospitalizations at just the wrong time — as tourists eager to get out after being cooped up for a year make their way to popular destinations such as Branson and Lake of the Ozarks.

Data from the state health department's COVID-19 dashboard on Wednesday showed 206 people hospitalized with the virus in southwestern Missouri — nearly double the 111 hospitalizations from that region at the start of May. The number of people in intensive care units in the region has tripled — from 22 a month-and-a-half ago to 65 now. Meanwhile, statewide hospitalizations have remained steady since March.

Health experts cite

two factors driving the surge: The presence of the faster-spreading Delta variant, and a reluctance among residents to get vaccinated.

While 52.6% of Americans have initiated vaccination, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, most southern Missouri counties are well short of 40%. Branson sits in Taney and Stone counties, where the vaccination rates as of Wednesday were 27.4% and 28.4% respectively. Miller County, at Lake of the Ozarks, had a vaccination rate of 22.9%.

"We think that with the Delta variant here, those that aren't vaccinated are just sitting ducks," said Steve Edwards, CEO of CoxHealth, which operates several hospitals in the region.

Memorial Day marked the unofficial beginning of the

tourism season, and big crowds are gathering again at Branson's popular shows and attractions, and at the beaches, resorts and entertainment areas around the Lake of the Ozarks.

Jason Outman, CEO of the Branson Lakes Area Chamber of Commerce and Convention & Visitors Bureau, said Branson set a record with 9.1 million visitors in 2019. That number dropped to 6.3 million last year amid the pandemic, and tourism tax revenue fell 30%.

The rebound has been huge. So far in 2021, Branson is on pace to top 2019 attendance and tax revenue, Outman said. He doesn't believe the uptick in coronavirus cases will do anything to dampen the resurgence.

"We're seeing individuals that are just ready to come and have fun and experience what

Branson has to offer," Outman said.

Lisa Rau at the Branson area amusement park Silver Dollar City agreed. She said visitors are enthusiastic even though the park continues with precautions, which include frequent disinfecting, crowd limits and asking the unvaccinated to wear masks.

"People are wanting to get out and travel, they're wanting to get to the outdoor activities, which is something we have an abundance of," Rau said.

But health leaders are worried about the emerging presence of the Delta variant in southern Missouri. The variant was first detected in India and is a more transmissible version of the disease. It currently makes up 6% of all cases in the U.S.

The variant is also believed to be responsible for a surge in northern

Missouri. CDC data shows that some of the counties with the highest per capita increases in the nation are in the state's sparsely populated northern tier.

While those counties have higher per capita cases, southern Missouri counties are seeing big jumps in actual cases.

Greene County, which includes Springfield, reported 375 new cases in the past seven days — the most in the state. By contrast, St. Louis city, whose population of 300,000 is roughly the same as Greene County's, had 74 new cases over the same seven days. Taney County had 88 new cases over the same period.

New cases also are rising in counties along the Lake of the Ozarks, including Camden and Miller counties.

The lake region drew national attention during the Memorial Day

weekend of 2020 when hundreds of people gathered at bars and swimming area as the coronavirus was spreading across the U.S.

New restrictions are unlikely. Political leaders, business operators and residents in Branson and the Lake of the Ozarks region were overwhelmingly opposed to mask mandates and other measures last year, even at the height of the pandemic.

Edwards said he fears the surge will worsen. The CoxHealth hospitals in southwestern Missouri have seen the number of patients triple to just under 60 since late May.

"We have worries," he said. "I hope we don't hit our high water marks from this winter where we had as many as 170 COVID-positive patients in-house. But I don't think we've hit our peak this summer yet, either."

Kansas teenager charged in homicide in Kansas City, Mo.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A Kansas teenager will be tried as an adult for murder in the shooting death of a Kansas City, Missouri, man, Jackson County prosecutors said Wednesday.

Jayvon Hunter, 16, was charged Tuesday with second-degree murder and three other counts in the Oct. 19 death of 44-year-old Cristobal Gutierrez-Castillas.

The Jackson County Prosecutor's office said in a news release that surveillance video shows Hunter and others arriving at the shooting scene on scooters. Hunter is seen arguing with the men before firing a shot that hit Gutierrez-Castillas, according to charging documents.

The video shows Hunter going through the victim's pockets and taking his cell phone before leaving the scene, according to the documents.

It was not immediately clear if Hunter had an

attorney.

Prosecutors recommended \$150,000 cash bail.

BJC, Washington U. to require vaccinations for employees

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Two of the largest employers in the St. Louis area have announced they will require employees to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 by fall.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch reports that BJC HealthCare and Washington University both announced the vaccination requirements on Tuesday. The announcement comes at a time when demand for vaccines is waning in Missouri, a state that already lags behind the national average in COVID-19 immunization rate.

The St. Louis region's three other major health systems — SSM Health, Mercy and St. Luke's Hospital — have not issued vaccine requirements but said they were discussing the issue.

Missouri Hospital Association President and

CEO Herb Kuhn said hospitals across the state have "seen COVID-19's devastation in lives and health lost," and many are evaluating vaccine requirements.

Washington University will require all faculty, staff and trainees to be vaccinated by Aug. 30. BJC will require employees to be fully vaccinated by Sept. 15.

Kansas City police investigating shooting death Tuesday

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Police in Kansas City are investigating a shooting death inside a home in the Ivanhoe Northeast neighborhood.

The shooting occurred around 2:45 p.m. Tuesday near East 36th and Olive streets, police said in a news release. Arriving officers found a man in the home who had been shot. The man was declared dead at the scene.

The victim's name was not immediately released, and no arrests or suspects in the case were announced.

Police said the death marked the city's 69th homicide this year, compared with 83 homicides in Kansas City by this time last year.

Officials: Missouri woman drowned in Big River at state park

DE SOTO, Mo. (AP) — An eastern Missouri woman has drowned in Big River at a state park in Washington County, authorities there said.

The incident happened Tuesday afternoon, when Monica Boyer, 67, of Cadet, was wading in the river near the Washington State Park boat access, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch

reported. Investigators believe Boyer waded into deeper water, where she slipped, went under the water and did not resurface.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol said Boyer's death was the latest of at 10 in waterways across the state in the first two weeks of June.

“And I want to see Sea World,” Ava added.

Her father noted getting to go on the trip is “phenomenal and amazing.”

“It’s like a trip of a lifetime,” he added.

And per Ava’s request, her parents plan to take her to the beach.

The Paszkiewiczz are also excited to go on the trip. Lynn said the family

is “counting down the sleeps” until time to fly out on Sunday. Finnian added he was excited to go to Legoland.

Lynn said Finnian has a rare genetic disorder, 1Q21.1 Deletion syndrome, and Hypermobility Ehlers-Danlos syndrome.

“(Ehlers-Danlos syndrome) runs in the family but the Deletion is unique to him,” she said. “It causes intellectual disability and feeding and growth issues. So, he has a feeding tube and a lot of neurological issues.”

Lynn added this will be a great getaway for the family because they always have so many doctor’s appointments, hospital stays and tests.

“It will be a nice break,” she noted. “We won’t have to think about that for an entire week.”

Still, Anders admits being surprised by how well-armed Johnson was with 29 firearms.

“We’re always thankful for an outcome like this where no one was hurt, everybody remained safe including the suspect,” he said. “That’s the ideal outcome.”

Anders had high praise for the Morgan County SWAT team for securing the residence and thanked Morgan County Sheriff Norman Dills for loaning his most professional team to a neighboring county.

Anders indicated Johnson had made threats to law enforcement in the past.

“He had made some threats on Facebook about a year ago about killing law enforcement,” Anders added.

It’s worth noting Hannah Fizer was killed by a sheriff’s office deputy one year ago Sunday, June 13,

and Johnson was Hannah Fizer’s boyfriend at the time of the shooting.

While interviewing Anders, another death threat was sent to the sheriff’s office via Facebook from an individual who stated he wasn’t afraid to die and was planning on killing as many officers as possible.

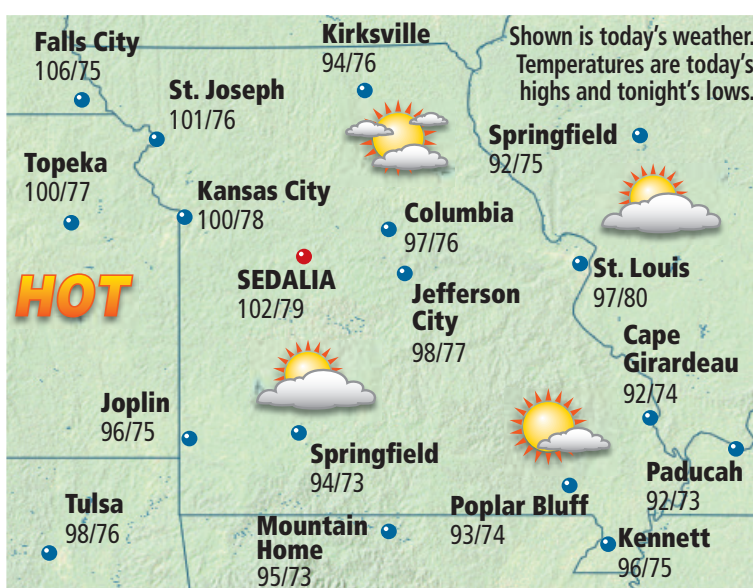

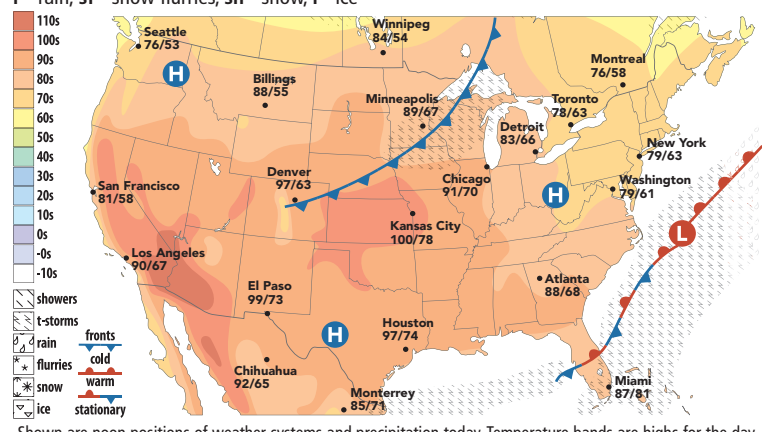

Brett Mooney walked to represent the tying run. With two outs, Duffin Makings sent a fly ball to center field for what appeared to be a routine play. Two runs scored as the ball glanced off the fielder's glove.

McGinnis was met with a bath of ice after lining the go-ahead single.

"It was a fly ball out to center field," McGinnis said. "The kid was camped under it and I was walking toward the dugout."

Having seen Chillicothe's Tanner Sears as a high schooler in Concordia, McGinnis was hunting fastballs with the game on the line. He said losing two extra-innings games earlier this season motivated him in the batter's box.

"We had to win a close game," McGinnis said. "We've lost a few heartbreakers. It was great to get a win."

The Mudcats broke the tie in the 12th inning, plating three runs on consecutive hits against Sedalia's fourth pitcher of the night.

Chillicothe's Koby Linder pitched six scoreless innings in relief, retiring the Bombers with four pitches in the ninth. The Mudcats reliever conceded three hits and a walk.

Harden available, Irving out for Nets as they try to advance

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Brooklyn Nets will continue to play without Kyrie Irving and don't know exactly what kind of production they will get from James Harden as the star players deal with injuries.

None of that might make any difference if Kevin Durant keeps performing the way he has thus far in Brooklyn's second-round playoff series with the Milwaukee Bucks.

The Nets own a 3-2 series lead thanks largely

to Durant, who delivered a performance for the ages as Brooklyn rallied from a 17-point deficit in a 114-108 Game 5 victory Tuesday at Brooklyn.

That leaves the Nets facing a dilemma as the series returns to Milwaukee for Game 6 on Thursday. After Durant played all 48 minutes and Harden played 46 minutes Tuesday, how long can they reasonably play in Game 6?

"I think that's something that we have to feel out as we go," Nets coach Steve Nash said Wednesday.

Castro HR, Tigers rally for sweep over skidding Royals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Willi Castro homered during a three-run rally in the seventh inning and the Detroit Tigers beat the Kansas City Royals 6-5 Wednesday for a three-game sweep.

It was the Tigers' first sweep in Kansas City since 2014.

The Royals have lost six in a row and 11 of 12. Kansas City starter Brady Singer was removed after just three innings with tightness in his pitching shoulder.

"It popped up after his last start," Royals manager Mike Matheny said. "We knew going into today that we were going to see how he was feeling and try to limit the work. We'll see how he responds from here, but we were just

being cautious."

Tarik Skubal (4-7) picked up the win. He allowed three runs on six hits in six innings, striking out seven against an all-righthanded lineup.

"The whole point as a starting pitcher is to give yourself a chance to continue the game," Detroit manager A.J. Hinch said. "He's progressively gotten better at not having the big, explosive innings. He allowed us to slowly and surely get to their bullpen and come from behind and win."

Skubal had a plan going in, and he stuck with it.

"I threw a lot more changeups than I did sliders," Skubal said. "I knew the changeup would be a huge pitch for me against this lineup, just being able to work down and expand the zone."

Michael Fulmer earned his fifth save in six chances.

Adalberto Mondesi hit a home run in his first at-bat since returning from the injured list. Salvador Perez also connected for the Royals, hitting his 17th of the season.

"(Mondesi) is unbelievable," Matheny said. "The first time he steps in the box, he blasts it."

Greg Holland (2-2) gave up three runs while getting just one out.

Holland issued a four-pitch walk to the first batter he faced, Niko Goodrum, in the seventh and Castro homered to make it 3-0.

"The hitting coach said after he gets two strikes he likes to throw the breaking pitch," Castro said. "I was just trying to battle and let my abilities do the work."

Molina's RBI single in 9th lifts Cardinals past Marlins 1-0

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Yadier Molina grounded an RBI single down the third base line in the ninth inning and the St. Louis Cardinals edged the Miami Marlins 1-0 Wednesday to sweep the season series.

Molina's eighth career regular season walk-off hit came with one out and sent Miami to its fourth straight loss.

"I'm ready for any spot but, I mean, you got to turn (up) your level in those kinds of spots, your concentration has to be there," Molina said.

Paul Goldschmidt reached on an error by shortstop Jazz Chisholm Jr. to start the ninth. After Matt Carpenter walked with one out, Molina singled off Marlins starter Sandy Alcantara (4-6).

"I'm throwing my best pitch, trying to get a ground ball to make a quick double play over there, but he made an adjustment," Alcantara said.

The Cardinals went 6-0 against Miami this year for their first season sweep over the Marlins.

St. Louis won all three games at Busch Stadium in its final at-bat — Goldschmidt's solo homer in the ninth produced a 2-1 win Tuesday night.

"Stay together, stay with it, keep fighting, but also just lock in what you're doing," Cardinals manager Mike Shildt said. "Just have a good at bat. Make a quality pitch, make a good play. Stay present. Be aware of the situation. Just keep playing the game that's in front of you at that moment."

Ryan Helsley (4-4) and Andrew Miller combined for two scoreless innings of relief.

Cardinals starter Johan Oviedo is still seeking his first major league win despite pitching a career-high seven scoreless innings. The right-hander allowed six hits, struck out four, walked none and 63 of his 87 pitches were strikes.

"Just keep my mind on one pitch, that's the key for me," Oviedo said.

Alcantara pitched a team season-high 8 1/3 innings. He gave up six hits, struck out seven with one walk, and the one run he allowed was unearned.

NFL loosening many COVID restrictions for vaccinated players

The NFL is almost back to business as usual — for vaccinated players.

The NFL and NFL Players Association have updated COVID-19 protocols to loosen restrictions for fully vaccinated players and to encourage others to get the vaccine.

Unvaccinated players must continue to get daily testing, wear masks and practice physical distancing. They won't be allowed to eat meals with teammates, can't participate in media or marketing activities while traveling, aren't permitted to use the sauna or steam room and may not leave the team hotel or interact with people outside the team while traveling.

Vaccinated players will not have any of those restrictions, according to a memo sent to teams on Wednesday that was obtained by The Associated Press.

Media access to the press box, field and sidelines, locker room and postgame interview room will be available only to media members who are fully vaccinated.

Several players have expressed concerns about receiving the vaccine. The updated protocols give them more incentive to get it.

Players can be fined up to \$50,000 for violating protocol.

Washington pass rusher Montez Sweat said last week he "probably won't get vaccinated until I got more facts and that type of stuff, but I'm not a fan of it at all."

Teams have brought in experts to discuss the vaccine with players and staff.

"They're doing a great job of continuing to educate us and giving us resources and then kind of giving us the option to make that informed decision with where we're at personally and go from there," Vikings wide receiver Adam Thielen said.

Los Angeles Chargers quarterback Justin Herbert was asked if other players have spoken to him about the vaccine because he was a biology major at Oregon.

"I haven't talked to too many people about it," he said. "There's a small group of guys that have been vaccinated, and I've been vaccinated. I thought if it's available to be able to do all these things, it would help me in the long run. I think it's better for everyone, but it's up to everyone. So it's their opinion. I think it's a tough situation regardless, but nobody's asked me too much."

The vaccine has been a big issue for the Buffalo Bills throughout the off-season, with coaches and management pushing for vaccination to ease restrictions and players not wanting to talk about it.

"We feel like we know that in our country and around the league where and how things are improving, and to me there's a direct correlation to people getting vaccinated," Bills coach Sean McDermott said. "I would like to continue to see our team move in that direction, continue to move an increased number of people that are getting vaccinated. ... It's good to have the guys here, but I think the reality of our situation is that now — but also for sure come the fall, training camp — protocols are going to continue to be enforced, in particular for those who are unvaccinated as it relates to the masking and the different things that are in place. Just trying to be real about it and make sure people understand what normal is gonna look like, in particular for those who are unvaccinated come the fall."

Nash would rather not drain his veteran team this early in the postseason as the Nets chase their first NBA championship. With all the injuries involving star players across the league, Nash acknowledged he thinks "the championship this year will be decided on health as much as anything."

But he also wants to avoid a Game 7.

"There is no championship if you don't get out of this series," Nash said. "There's obviously a point where you have to go and you have to play like we did last night. If it presents itself that we don't have to overburden them, we'd be happy not to. But if we have to, we have to. That's just the nature of it."

Nash said both Durant and Harden felt fine after their heavy workloads Tuesday.

Harden shot 1 of 10 and scored just five points but had eight assists and six rebounds in his first action since tightness in his right hamstring knocked him out in the opening minute of Game 1.

Irving missed all of Game 5 and won't play Thursday after spraining his right ankle in Game 4.

Durant picked up the slack Tuesday by collecting 49 points, 17 rebounds and 10 assists. He became the first player in NBA history to have at least 45 points, 15 rebounds and 10 assists in a playoff game.

That continued an impressive postseason for

Durant, who is averaging 33.6 points, 10.8 rebounds, 5.8 assists, 2 steals and 1.4 blocks in this series.

"He's the best player in the world right now," Bucks forward and two-time MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo said after Game 5.

The Bucks wasted a golden opportunity to take control of the series when they couldn't hang on to their big lead in Game 5. Now they find themselves in a must-win situation.

"We've got to focus on ourselves and control what we can control," Antetokounmpo said. "What we can control is our effort, and going into Game 6, hopefully we can bring it and put ourselves in position to win the game."
