Planet Fitness opens to constant traffic

Planet Fitness this week opened its new facility at 3117 W. Broadway Blvd. in the Thompson Hills Shopping Center and Manager Anna Armstrong said business has been brisk. "It's busy all the time," Armstrong said. "Everybody is seeing that the parking lot is getting full and they're noticing that. We changed our sign up front and we advertised on the marquee so it's been grabbing a lot more attention. We've been constantly doing tours and showing people the facility and they're just falling in love with it and enjoying the new fitness center that has come to Sedalia."

Roger and Sue Carter came Thursday to exercise and were happy with their choice to join.

"It's just a good place to work out," Roger Carter

said. "I've never been a Planet Fitness member before, but we toured the facility and liked what we saw, so both my wife and I decided to join and see what they had to offer. I like equipment and so far I like the workout."

The new 13,000-square-foot club features a variety of cardio machines and strength equipment, a 30-Minute Express Circuit, a Cardio Theater filled with Flat Screen TVs, fully-equipped locker rooms with day lockers and showers, and a Black Card Spa (for Black Card members) which includes hydromassage loungers, tanning beds, and massage chairs.

Armstrong said New Year's is the perfect time to open a fitness club as people want to get back in shape after the holidays.

"We're probably going to earn probably 60% of our revenue for everything,"

Armstrong said. "Everybody's going to have new fitness goals. Also, Planet Fitness is also hosting the ball drop this year for New York so that's really cool that we're going to see a lot of purple and yellow for New Year's."

"On base, you always had your own gym," Craft said. "I've just never been

Warming shelter to open this weekend

With single-digit temperatures plus freezing rain and snow predicted, the Sedalia Warming Shelter will open its doors for the first time this season on Saturday and Sunday nights.

Warming Shelter Meal Coordinator Kirk Martin said on Thursday the shelter will once again be housed in the St. Vincent de Paul St. Patrick Parish. He noted the shelter is open when the real-feel temperature or wind chill is 15-degrees or less on a clear day and when it is 30-degrees with a 50% or greater chance of precipitation. On Thursday, the National Weather Service placed Sedalia under a winter storm watch and is predicting Saturday's lows to be 3 degrees with an 80% chance of snow and ice. Sunday will be clear with a low of 14 degrees. "We make the call at 10

a.m. the day of," Martin said of the decision to open the shelter. "But the long-range forecast shows that we're going to be open definitely Saturday and Sunday nights at this time.

"Normally it's just been (open) at night," Martin explained. "Now last year

we did a 14 or 15-day run because the weather never got out of the single digits during the day. So, we did stay open then."

The shelter will be open from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. each night. If no one shows up by 10 p.m. the shelter will close for the night.

Winter weather moving in on the New Year

A Winter Storm Watch is in effect for Pettis and Johnson counties from late Friday night through Saturday evening.

According to the National Weather Service, widespread wintry precipitation is expected across the region. Total snow accumulations of 2 to 8 inches and ice accumulations of around one-tenth of an inch are possible. Winds could gust as high as 35 mph.

The watch covers portions of east central and northeast Kansas and central, north central, northeast, northwest and west central Missouri. Highest snowfall totals are likely along and north of St. Joseph to Chillicothe to Kirksville. Greatest ice accumulations are likely along a Butler to

Sedalia to Boonville line. Snowfall totals across the Kansas City metro look to range from 3 to 6 inches.

Sedalia-Pettis County Emergency Management Agency Director Trisha Rooda said temperatures will drop significantly below freezing early Saturday morning through Monday afternoon.

The wind chill Saturday night will range from -5 degrees to -20 degrees, and winter precipitation is going to start building from the south late Friday and the rain will transfer into a mix of rain, freezing rain and snow for Mid-Missouri in the morning. The Sunday morning wind chill is going to be -10 degrees, which will be the coldest the area has experienced so far.

"I would start to refresh what a winter storm

warning is versus what a winter storm watch is," Rooda said. "So we're in a winter storm watch and that it alerts the public of the possibility of a blizzard, a heavy snow, we may get some ice and these are issued 12 to 48 hours before the storm actually gets here."

Rooda said residents should prepare for winter weather.

"If they are worrying about pipes freezing, if they livestock, if you have pets, that is all stuff that you can work beforehand, gather your supplies in case you have to stay home for a few hours or several days, are we going to lose electricity," Rooda said.

Rooda added that each person has their specific needs as well, like medication and the needs for pets.

600 cars in line at COVID-19 testing site in Missouri

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The latest COVID-19 surge in Missouri has residents scrambling to get tested, but having difficulty finding a place to do it.

Urgent care centers, pharmacies and other places offering COVID-19 tests are struggling to keep up with demand. In the small eastern Missouri city of Winfield, a state-sponsored site had been, until recently, administering about 50 tests per week.

But by 11 a.m. Wednesday, an hour after the site opened, 600 cars were waiting in line, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported, citing comments made by Winfield police to the state health department. The traffic backup was so bad that police and city officials closed the site due to safety concerns.

Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services spokeswoman Lisa Cox told the Post-Dispatch

that the department plans to add an additional testing site in St. Louis this weekend, three sites in St. Louis next week, and one to three sites in Kansas City.

Meanwhile, Republican Gov. Mike Parson on Thursday announced he's letting the pandemic-related state of emergency expire on Friday. In a statement, he said state government is ready to help but "there is no longer a need for a state of emergency."

"Thanks to the effectiveness of the vaccine, widespread efforts to mitigate the virus, and our committed health care professionals, past needs to continue the state of emergency are no longer present," Parson said.

The state's COVID-19 dashboard on Thursday reported 2,265 people hospitalized with the virus, the highest number since August. Health experts across the state say

the surge is far from over.

"We anticipate things will get worse before they get better," said Dr. Hilary Babcock, a Washington University infectious disease specialist at BJC HealthCare. "The case numbers are really staggering, and are rising at a pace that we have never seen before."

In Springfield, CoxHealth had 66 inpatient COVID-19 cases two days before Christmas. The hospital had 110 a week later, the Springfield News-Leader reported. A hospital study found that 94.6% of those hospitalized earlier this week were not vaccinated.

The Kansas City region also is being hit hard. The Kansas City Star reported that 1,809 new cases were reported in the metro area on Wednesday alone. The total includes cases in Kansas City and its suburbs in both Missouri and Kansas.

GOP lawmakers propose new US House district lines

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Republican-led commissions responsible for redrawing Missouri's congressional districts on Thursday proposed new boundaries.

GOP lawmakers released redrawn maps for the state's eight U.S. House districts.

Republican lawmakers said their proposal complies with the Supreme Court standard of "one person, one vote."

Critics have argued that standard could allow lawmakers and commissioners to redraw maps using only the voting-age population. All states currently base redistricting on total permanent population.

The proposals still need to be passed by the full Legislature after lawmakers reconvene in January for their roughly five-month annual session.

Legislative districts are redrawn every 10 years with new census data.

State lawmakers make new U.S. House districts. Citizen commissions are responsible for drawing the state legislative districts.

Schmitt: Doctor in child sex abuse case should stay in jail

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — A Missouri doctor who is charged with 11 counts of child sex abuse should remain in an Arkansas county jail for now because he has COVID-19, the Missouri Attorney General's office said in a court document filed Thursday.

David Smock, of Stockton, was arrested Tuesday in Harrison, Arkansas, and has been jailed there since then.

His attorneys have asked that he be released on bond or his own recognizance. They argue he has health conditions, no prior criminal convictions, no

history of mental health problems and "does have the means to pay his bond."

A hearing on the bond motion is scheduled for Monday in Cedar County Circuit Court, The Kansas City Star reported.

Smock is the longtime physician at the Agape Boarding School, Christian school in Stockton. He faces charges in Cedar and Greene counties.

A Greene County judge ruled last week that when Smock was arrested, he should be held without bond pending trial, saying it was reasonable to believe he would not appear on a summons and is a danger to others.

Schmitt argued in his motion that Smock has a long record of sexual abuse of minor boys, that dates to 1988 and extends from California and Arizona to Missouri.

Southeast Missouri man charged in shooting death of woman

BLOOMFIELD, Mo. (AP) — A southeast Missouri man has been charged with second-degree murder in the shooting death of a woman.

The Sikeston Standard Democrat reports that 39-year-old John Clary of Bloomfield also is charged with felony murder and weapons charges. The charges were filed Wednesday. Clary is jailed without bond and doesn't yet have a listed attorney.

The victim, 38-year-old Misty Reynolds of Bloomfield, was shot to death Tuesday in a rural area near Bloomfield. A deputy responding to a 911 call found Reynolds on the porch bleeding. She died a short time later at a hospital.

A probable cause statement said Clary told a state trooper that he grabbed a gun and threatened to kill Reynolds' ex-boyfriend. Clary allegedly told the trooper that Reynolds grabbed his hand and as they scuffled, he pulled the trigger and shot her.

Christians around the world celebrated the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, God became Man, on Dec. 25, again this year. Lots of planning and work goes into the celebration of his birthday: Christmas cards made or written and addressed, presents purchased (in-store or online), the house and maybe the yard decorated, food purchased and prepared, guests invited and calendars planned for parties. So, all this preparation for the birthday, then on the day of his birth, hopefully, the family gathers, presents open and prayers said together with the congregation at the Church.

Now that we celebrated his birth, is it over? Not for many of us! Now, the celebration continues throughout the Christmas season. "Other household items would be extra batteries for your radio, if you have extra flashlights," Rooda continued. "Do you have anything in your car like jumper cables, blankets, non-perishable food, some water, cat litter, scoop shovel and lots of items like that."

Residents' emergency to-go bags will come in handy for winter weather instead of waiting to go to get supplies from stores.

Rooda personally prepares during winter weather by making sure she has her to-go bag ready. She makes sure they have plenty of feed and hay for her livestock. For her, it comes down to what food she can make without heat like non-perishable items.

She is busy with her job, so she makes sure all the contacts she needs are printed off and has a battery back up so she can charge her cell phone. Rooda also makes sure that if she needs to be in town that she arrives before the storm hits.

Rooda also makes sure that if the Sedalia warming shelter is open that it has a backup generator so they have electricity the entire time.

Rooda also provided a refresher about the signs of frostbite. Frostbite will cause loss of feeling or color around your face, fingers and toes so she suggested wearing multiple layers of clothes and making sure you have the right equipment on.

When someone reaches hypothermia, residents will see

shivering, exhaustion, fumbling hands, slurred speech and drowsiness. Someone with signs of hypothermia should go to a warm room, warm the center of their body first (chest, neck, head and groin), keep dry and wrap up in a warm blanket including their head and neck.

Rooda and the Missouri State Highway Patrol gave some tips for driving in inclement weather, although both agencies also cautioned against any travel if possible.

- When you travel, make sure your vehicle is completely clean of snow, use your headlights to increase visibility, and reduce your speed when the roadway appears wet or snow is present. Missouri law states if you're using your windshield wipers, your headlights must be turned on.

- During inclement weather, driving the speed limit is not "exercising the highest degree of care." Missouri law states the responsibility of exercising the highest degree of care while driving rests on the driver's shoulders. Adjust your speed to the weather, do not use cruise control and increase your following distance. Allow extra driving time to reach your destination at a slow, safe speed.

- Troopers suggest keeping your fuel tank at least half full. In preparation for winter weather, place an ice scraper, battery booster cables, blankets, extra coats, gloves, water, non-perishable food, first aid kit, flashlight, a small shovel, and a bag of sand or cat litter in your trunk now, before an emergency occurs.

- Before you travel, make sure your cell phone is fully charged and keep it with you. The MSHP emergency number is 1-800-

525-5555 (or *55 on a cellular phone). These numbers ring at the nearest troop headquarters.

- Before traveling, check current road conditions at MoDOT's "Traveler Info Map" available at traveler.mdot.org/map.

Rooda highly encourages people to stay home and off the roads for the people who need to be out on it like first responders, emergency vehicles and plows.

"I encourage residents to sign up for Nixle through the Sheriff's Office website..." Rooda said, noting that residents will be given warnings before a storm hits.

The City of Sedalia's Public Works Department reminds residents not to park along Emergency Snow Routes during snow emergencies. When more than 2 inches of snow/sleet/ice is expected within a 24-hour period, the City declares a snow emergency and the Emergency Snow Routes are put into effect.

Based on current weather predictions, Street Department crews are expected to be pre-treating roadways early Saturday morning, Jan. 1, according to a news release. Travelers are advised to remain a safe distance from heavy snow removal equipment and salt spreaders as they treat roadways and plow snow/ice.

The release states residents should be aware the city does not immediately plow alleys. With over 140 miles of City streets to plow, the first focus is on clearing streets and then working with the Sanitation Department on alleys that are used for garbage collection.

Partial settlement in fatal shooting by Kansas City police

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A federal judge has approved a partial settlement of a lawsuit filed by the parents of a man who was shot and killed by Kansas City police in 2018.

Court records do not include the amount of the settlement paid to the parents of 34-year-old Robert White by The Downtown Council of Kansas City and the area's community improvement district, The Kansas City Star reported.

The lawsuit filed earlier this year contends White was unarmed when he was shot 17 times as he was being used as a "human shield" by Tim Mosley, 33, who was also shot and killed by officers.

The lawsuit continues against a private security company, the Kansas City Board of Police Commissioners and the officers involved in the shooting.

The officers involved said they weren't able to determine which of the two men was holding a gun pointed at them before they fired.

Jackson County Prosecutor Jean Peters Baker's office determined White was an innocent bystander but said officers were not legally responsible for his death because they

had only a few seconds to determine what was happening at the time.

The Downtown Council of Kansas City uses funds from an area community improvement district to pay for security in the area.

Kansas City police seek driver involved in fatal hit-and-run

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Police in Kansas City, Missouri, are searching for the driver who fatally struck a pedestrian on the city's east side.

The accident happened around 6:30 p.m. Wednesday in the 10500 block of East 42nd Street. Police say a man was struck by a car that fled.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene. His name was not released.

Police say they are searching for a Nissan Sentra that may have damage to the front driver's side, based on evidence left at the scene.

Missouri weighs longer hunting seasons for some fur-bearers

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Missouri conservation officials are considering a plan to extend the hunting season for species such as bobcats and rac-

coons that are typically killed for their fur.

A proposal from the state Department of Conservation would extend the season for eight so-called furbearing species. They include raccoons, opossum, coyotes, mink, muskrats, river otters, bobcats and striped skunk.

The Missouri Conservation Commission this month gave preliminary approval to a plan to expand the hunting period by more than three months for some species, St. Louis Public Radio reported Wednesday.

Interest in fur trapping has declined in recent decades, and as a result, populations of some breeds are flourishing, including coyotes and raccoons. State wildlife biologists say that opens the door to additional hunting.

Missouri hunters collected nearly 835,000 animal pelts in 1940, about 70% of which were from opossum and raccoons. By contrast, hunters sold or registered about 41,000 fur pelts during the 2019-20 hunting season.

For most species, the season length would increase by no more than one month. But for raccoons and opossum, the overall yearly hunting period would be 3½ months longer.

Turkey hunters are among those advocating for the change.

They're concerned that an increase in predator populations might be contributing to declines in chick survival.

"A lot of people are anxious to do something because of the turkey nesting," Conservation Commissioner Steven Harrison said at a meeting this month. He was disappointed that the proposed regulations wouldn't begin until June, after the turkey nesting season.

A final vote is expected after the public comment period, which runs from Jan. 19 to Feb. 17.

Plumbing worker dies in trench collapse in Grain Valley

GRAIN VALLEY, Mo. (AP) — A plumbing worker has died after a trench collapsed in western Missouri.

KMBC-TV reports that the accident happened Wednesday in Grain Valley, about 23 miles east of Kansas City. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration said crews with Preferred Plumbing Inc. of Kingsville were installing plumbing lines for homes under construction when the 10-foot-deep trench gave way.

The victim's name wasn't immediately released.

OSHA is investigating the accident.

HUD, HHS trample on religious rights

The hostility toward religious rights that has been coming out of Washington is unprecedented in American history.

The little town of Point Lookout, Missouri, is the home of the College of the Ozarks, a small Christian school designed for those with limited income. In place of tuition, every student is assigned a campus job at "Hard Work U."

A relative of mine who graduated from the college last summer said the education she received was "phenomenal," the professors "stellar." I was impressed that a college with an enrollment of only 1,426 students would have so many PhDs on its faculty.

Being Christian, the college adheres to the now quaint notion that men and women should have separate dorms. That put it in the crosshairs of Joe Biden's Department of Housing and Urban Development, which ordered the college to cease "housing discrimination based on gender identity." In other words, men must be assigned to women's dorms and vice-versa — and share showers.

The college sued on the grounds that its religious rights were being violated. I think it has a good chance of winning this case, thanks to a ringing 7-2 U.S. Supreme Court decision in 2020 that rescued the Little Sisters of the Poor from another heavy-handed federal demand.

The Sisters, a Catholic order that serves the elderly poor, had refused to include various contraceptive services, including abortifacients, in their employee health plan, which Obamacare required. When the full legal weight of the federal government falls on the Little Sisters of the Poor — and this went on for years — you know something's badly wrong

in Washington.

Not to be deterred by the Supreme Court setback, the Biden administration has turned its sights on the tiny College of the Ozarks. Picking on somebody your own size isn't how it's done in Washington these days.

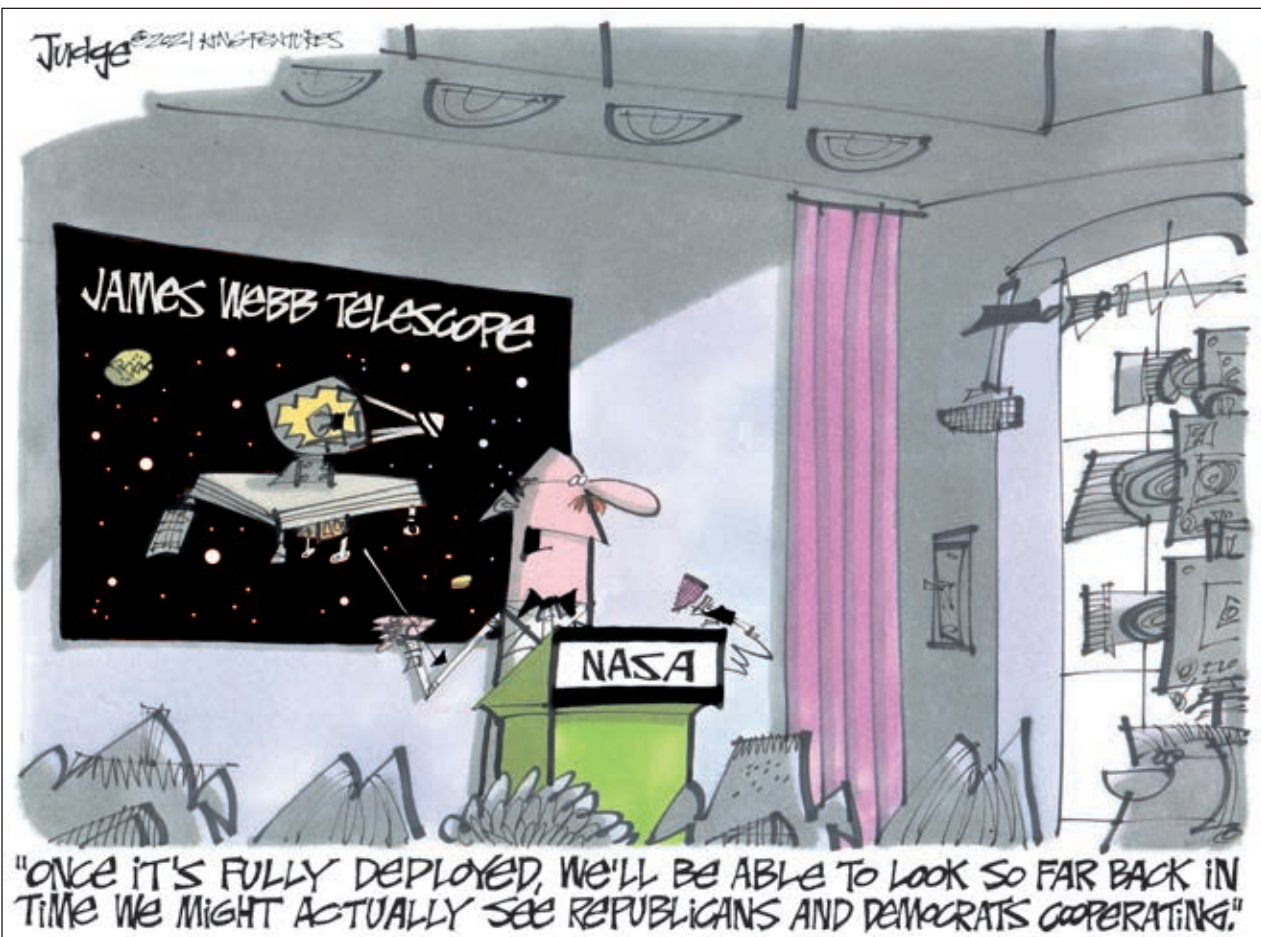
As bad as things are, they're about to get worse. The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has a rule coming out in April that will effectively gut the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993.

The new rule will eliminate consideration of all religious objections relating to abortion, contraception, gender-transition medical procedures and the like — protections President Trump had strengthened.

The more than 600 Catholic hospitals in the nation will be impacted the most by such a rule, but it won't stop there. Protestant hospitals also will be affected, not to mention doctors and nurses whose consciences forbid their participating in such procedures.

This is an ecumenical moment, in which all religious hospitals and health care providers should join forces to fight HHS's brazen assault on their religious freedom and the First Amendment to the Constitution that guarantees it.

warns Emily about in "Our Town": The normal days, the days that are "just days."

When Wilder's Emily, who dies in childbirth, is given the gift of returning to Earth for one day, the Stage Manager tells her to choose one of those "just days," and not a momentous day. She ignores his advice and chooses her 12th birthday. She is dismayed to find that her family is more interested in the day than in each other. "Why don't we just look at each other?" she cries. "Mama, please look at me!"

Do I remember "just days"? Have I looked at my daughter enough? Do I remember her 4-year-old face? Her 10-year-old face? Her high school freshman face?

I remember being in

such a hurry all the time. I called her "my little duckling" because I always walked so fast that her little legs couldn't keep up. We walked down the sidewalk, mother duck in front and the little duckling behind. Why, oh why, could I not have simply slowed down?

I remember being stressed by balancing work and family and all the things that go along with being a working mom — trying to volunteer at the school, trying to juggle all the responsibilities that go along with being the major caregiver of a child, trying to be all things to all people. Why, oh, why, was I so caught up in trying to be the perfect everything?

I'm sure I can come up with lots of examples of the numbers of "just days" in 33 years that I did not look at our Emily. And so I try to take time to deliberately look at her now.

I see a lovely young woman who is kind, caring, funny, treasured by many — both her current friends and those in her past — and finding her own way. She, like many young women, is unsure of herself as she builds

her own life but seems to be doing a good job of it. Her favorite movie is still "The Godfather," and she has inherited my love of reading, often listening to audiobooks as she drives to her job locations throughout Arkansas.

I was present when she made some work phone calls, and I thought, "Wow! She's pretty good at this!" I wondered when that had happened. I watched her put together dinner for us that looked good and tasted good. I wondered when she had learned to cook. I watched her plan for a party and get everything ready. I wondered when she had learned how to do that.

Then it occurred to me. Even if I think I wasn't looking at her, she was looking at me. She learned to work, and cook, and plan a party where guests would be comfortable by watching me. Maybe I did an okay job after all. Regardless, I want my Emily to know I am looking at her in the "just days" we now have together — and because of distance, they are too few. But I look.

Capital Region needs better communication in crisis

On Wednesday, Capital Region Medical Center was going into its sixth day of a systemwide network and telephone failure, with no end in sight.

For any business, that would be a public relations nightmare that could result in a loss of credibility and customers. For a health care provider, the effects have the potential to be far greater.

That's why we're surprised Capital Region hasn't been more open with the public about the problem.

The issue started Dec. 17 when the hospital shut down its network as a precaution after finding "unusual activity" within the phone system. The hospital did not say what kind of unusual activity, but we now know that it was a cyberattack.

Until at least recently, many callers have continued to receive busy signals. When calls go through, staff are unable to transfer to specific departments.

However, other than a Facebook post with instructions for getting prescriptions refills, the hospital was mum for days. It wasn't until Wednesday that the hospital even acknowledged it was hit by a cyberattack.

Until then, Capital Region administrators did not respond to multiple calls and emails from the News Tribune concerning the outages.

At first, uncertainty at Capital Region led the county's Emergency Medical Services to briefly divert patients to another hospital.

Panicked patients have taken to Facebook to try to find answers and express their exasperation. Posts indicate some people aren't able

to get through to get prescriptions filled and some don't know the statuses of their surgeries.

On Wednesday, the hospital finally broke its silence, stating it was a cybersecurity attack and the hospital "is working diligently to bring our systems back online as quickly, and securely, as possible, nothing is more important to us than the health and safety of our patients and continuing to provide the care our patients expect."

The statement went on to say the hospital is putting procedures in place to "continue safely caring for patients."

The little information that was released didn't even come from the hospital's top brass; it came from the public relations office.

As of this writing on Thursday, we still don't know when the phones/computers will be restored. Was there

a backup plan in place? Did it not work? What specifically is being done to communicate with patients?

What steps are being taken so this doesn't happen again?

Was this simply a cyberattack, or was it ransomware? And one of the most important questions: Are patient records secure?

The public relations office was somewhat vague, saying "if investigators find personal or health information was involved in the incident, the hospital will "notify those individuals in accordance with applicable laws."

We understand the hospital likely doesn't have all the answers itself yet. However, for situations in which patient care can be at risk, the hospital needs to communicate quickly with the public and be as transparent as possible.

Martin noted their volunteer base this year is made up of nine churches and one organization — this is an increase of five since last year. Volunteers come from St. Vincent de Paul Parish with two teams, First United Methodist Church Celebration Center, First Christian Church, Wesley United Methodist Church, Antioch Fellowship, New Life, Maplewood, Liberty Life and a team put together by the Rev. Anne Kyle of Calvary Episcopal and Trinity Lutheran plus members of the Sedalia Rotary Club.

“We are a group of churches that have come together,” Martin stated. “That’s actually one of the shining stars of this, is multiple churches and organizations coming

together to work as one for the community.

“Our goal is to get up to 15 teams,” he added. “That way everybody just has to cover twice a month.”

Teams need to be vetted and must come through either a church or organization.

“If they are coming through a church or organization, we are assuming that those churches or organizations will vouch for them,” Martin noted.

Martin added Open Door will provide all the necessities for those staying at the shelter including food.

“If people want to make donations of food, clothing and blankets please donate to Open Door,” he said. “Because Open Door does take care of our needs.

“And then if they are wanting to make a monetary donation, they can donate that to Open Door and tag it for the Mercy

Rest Stop,” he continued. “And/or they can go to Mercy Rest Stop website and set up a donation that way.”

He added when the Warming Shelter began, it was started as a service to prevent death due to exposure.

“This (the Warming Shelter) is actually the beginning point of the concept of the Mercy Rest Stop,” he explained.

The Mercy Rest Stop will be built on the property of the Open Door Kitchen and will provide the homeless and nearly homeless with the “necessities of life” such as 24/7 sanitary restroom facilities, a 24/7 water source, showers, laundry, cooling and warming stations, and a place for resources and communication, plus a place to meet agency caseworkers to obtain assistance.

The Sedalia Warming Shelter will be open from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. Saturday and Sunday in the basement of St. Vincent de Paul St. Patrick Parish, 415 E. Fourth St.

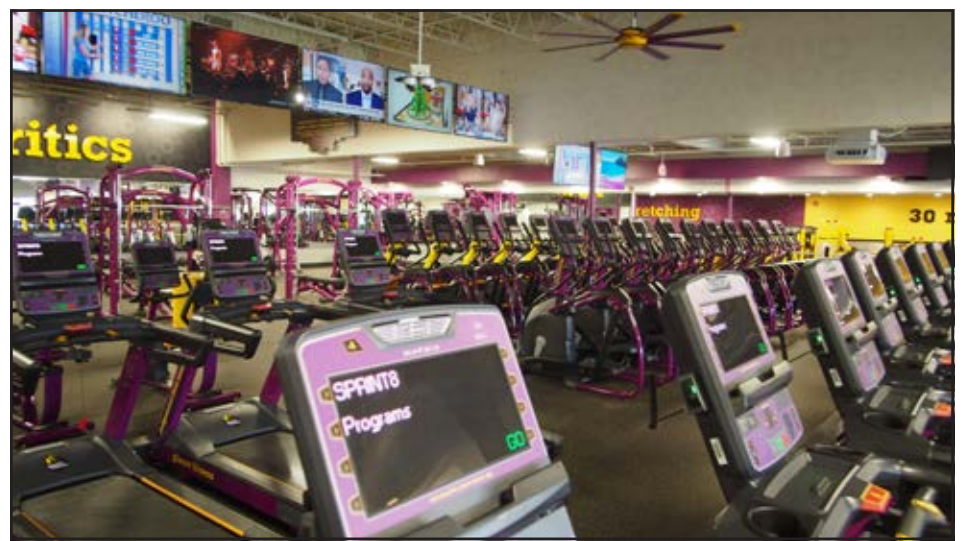

Federal prosecutors seek evaluation of serial killer suspect

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Federal prosecutors are asking a judge to set a hearing to discuss the mental health of a man charged with killing six people in Missouri and Kansas.

The U.S. Attorney’s office in St. Louis filed a motion Wednesday asking for a hearing to determine if 26-year-old Perez Deshay Reed, of Bellefontaine Neighbors, is mentally competent to stand trial on federal gun charges, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported.

Reed is charged in federal court with transporting a gun across state lines with the intent to commit a felony.

He is also charged with killing two people in St. Louis, two others in St. Louis County and two in Kansas City, Kansas, in September and October.

Prosecutors believe Reed used the same weapon in all six killings.

State prosecutors had not filed a similar request for a mental exam as of Thursday. Reed, who is due in St. Louis Circuit Court on Jan. 26, is currently jailed without bail.

Reed has pleaded not guilty to the charges.

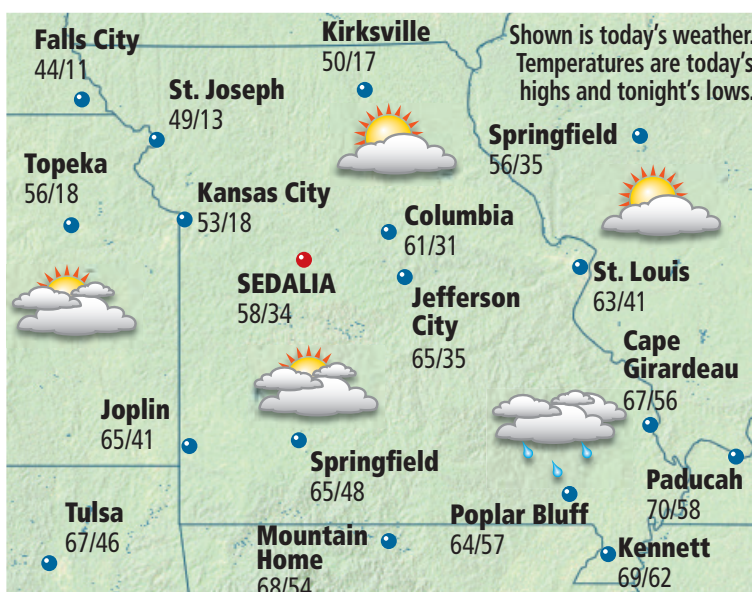

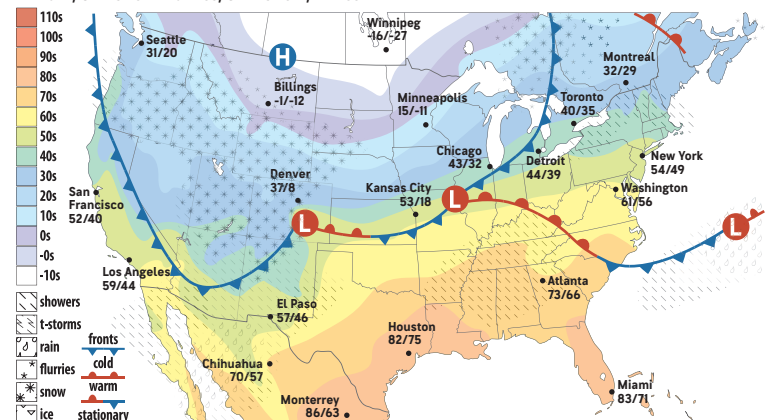

Surprising Michigan takes run at Georgia's dominate D in CFP

Just about everything about this season has been a joyride for No. 2 Michigan, the first team to start unranked in the AP Top 25 and reach the College Football Playoff.

"We're happy to be here, but not just happy to be here," Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh said.

Reaching the playoff in 2021 was always the expectation for No. 3 Georgia, and it seemed like a foregone conclusion by November as the Bulldogs rampaged through their schedule.

Not even a resounding loss to Alabama in the Southeastern Conference title game could keep Georgia out. But instead of bounding into the Orange Bowl semifinal off huge victories like Michigan, the Bulldogs enter trying to reestablish the air of invincibility they carried much of the season.

"You lose some, and you just go on getting better,"

Georgia All-America defensive tackle Jordan Davis said. "Obviously we're not going to be the same team from last game to this game with Michigan, but we just have to keep moving forward and worry about ourselves and just get ready for the game."

The Wolverines (12-1) and Bulldogs (12-1), two storied programs that haven't played in more than half a century, took very different paths to their meeting Friday night at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens.

The winningest program in college football history, Michigan doesn't fit the profile of an upstart, but few could have seen this breakthrough coming in year seven under Harbaugh.

"I feel like the buzz -- created some new buzz with this 2021 team," Harbaugh said. "Yeah, let's face it, it had died down a little bit, and I do feel like our guys have created some new buzz, and it's been a good thing."

Chiefs visit Bengals in showdown of 2 of AFC's top teams

Bengals quarterback Joe Burrow admitted this week that he heard the warning from Baltimore defensive coordinator Wink Martindale against putting him in the Pro Football Hall of Fame so early in his young NFL career.

Burrow proceeded to shred the Ravens for 525 yards passing in a blowout of their AFC North rivals.

He just may need to

replicate that performance on Sunday, when AFC West champion Kansas City comes to town. After all, the Chiefs have their own quarterback — Patrick Mahomes — who appears destined to one day land in Canton, Ohio.

"I think whoever is lining up across from us, we're going to be excited to play," Burrow said in brushing aside any talk of a showdown between quarterbacks.

"This is a big opportunity, whether it's the Chiefs or

whoever we throw out there against us. We have an opportunity to win and make the playoffs."

Indeed, the Bengals (9-6) can clinch their division with a win over the Chiefs (11-4) on Sunday. That would take a whole lot of pressure off their regular-season finale in Cleveland, and give Bengals coach Zac Taylor the rare opportunity to rest Burrow and some of his other stars ahead of a wild-card playoff game the following week.

Non-P5 Cincy takes CFP journey to Cotton semi against Bama

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Cincinnati quarterback Desmond Ridder and the breakthrough Bearcats aren't caught up in what their unprecedented playoff appearance could eventually mean for other non-Power Five teams. This is their journey.

After a season-long debate about whether the outsider deserved a spot in the College Football Playoff, and being the only team to win every game along the way, the fourth-ranked Bearcats (13-0) get their shot

in the CFP semifinal Cotton Bowl on Friday against top-ranked defending national champion Alabama.

"We've already had so much pressure on us throughout the entire season of marking off the checklist, so why add the pressure of every other non-Power Five school that we have on our back," Ridder said. "It's really just been about us and will always continue to be about us."

The SEC champion Crimson Tide (12-1) is the playoff standard bearer. This is Alabama's seventh semifinal appearance in the eight seasons of the four-team CFP.

Hester, Ware, Andre Johnson 1st-year Hall of Fame finalists

DeMarcus Ware, Andre Johnson and Devin Hester, all in their first year of eligibility, are finalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's class of 2022.

The 15 modern-day players who will be considered on Jan. 18 by the selection committee include tackle Tony Boselli, in his sixth year as a finalist, and defensive lineman Richard Seymour, in his fourth year.

Other finalists announced Thursday are safety Leroy Butler, wide receivers Torry Holt and Reggie Wayne, lineback-

ers Sam Mills and Zach Thomas — all finalists for the third time; defensive linemen Jared Allen and Bryant Young, and cornerback Ronde Barber, two-time finalists; and tackle Willie Anderson and linebacker Patrick Willis, their first time in the finals.

A maximum of five modern-day players can be elected for enshrinement in August to the Canton, Ohio, hall. The inductees will be announced on Feb. 10 at NFL Honors, the prime-time TV program during which The Associated Press reveals its individual award winners for the 2021 season.

Three others — Dick Vermeil in the coaching category, Art McNally as a contributor, and Cliff Branch as a senior player — also are candidates for the class of 2022. Voting on each of those three will be held individually.

Hester is the rare finalist who made his mark mostly on special teams. He opened the 2007 Super Bowl for Chicago with a 92-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, the only time in Super Bowl history that has occurred. An All-Pro three times, Hester was a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2010s and one of two return specialists on the NFL 100 All-Time Team.

Thomas, a five-time All-Pro, also was a regular on special teams, for Miami, and made his mark as one of the surest tacklers in football as an outstanding linebacker from 1996-2008, a golden era for the position.

Boselli has been part of a strong group of offensive

linemen considered for the Hall of Fame in recent years. Kevin Mawae, Steve Hutchinson and Alan Faneca preceded the former Jaguars star into the hall. A three-time All-Pro, Boselli made the All-Decade Team of the 1990s despite playing only half the decade.

Like Boselli, Butler is in his 16th year of eligibility. The Packers' hard-hitting safety, a four-time All-Pro who also made the All-Decade Team of the 1990s, was among the most versatile defensive backs the game has seen.

The late Mills is under consideration in his 20th and final year of eligibility as a modern-day candidate. A three-time All-Pro who made his mark initially in the USFL, Mills then starred for the Saints and expansion Panthers — helping Carolina to the NFC championship game in its second season.

Ware, a four-time All-Pro, led the Cowboys in sacks for eight seasons, topped the NFL with 20 sacks in 2008 and 15 1/2 in 2010, and won a Super Bowl with Denver for the 2015 season. He finished with 138 1/2 sacks and made the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s.

Johnson, the other first-year eligible in the final 15, twice made the All-Pro team during a strong time for wide receivers. He led the league in receptions twice (103 in 2006 and 115 in 2008) and in receiving yards twice (1,575 yards in 2008 and 1,569 yards in 2009). Johnson finished his career with 1,062 receptions for 14,185 yards and 70 receiving touchdowns.

Two of his contempo-

raries, Holt and Wayne, also are in the finals. Holt was selected to NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s and won a Super Bowl with the 1999 Rams. Wayne retired as NFL's second all-time leading receiver in the postseason with 93 catches and won a Super Bowl with the Colts.

Anderson was considered one of the elite right tackles in the game for 13 pro seasons with Cincinnati and Baltimore, making three All-Pro squads.

Pass-rushing standout Allen was a four-time All-Pro who led the NFL in sacks twice (2007, 2011) while playing for the Chiefs, Vikings, Bears and Panthers. The versatile Seymour, a three-time All-Pro selected to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s, played in four Super Bowls for New England. Young was the 1999 Comeback Player of the Year and had 89 1/2 career sacks for San Francisco while being voted to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s.

Young's last season in 2007 was the first for Willis with the 49ers — and he won Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. A member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2010s, he was a five-time All-Pro.

Barber was one of the league's stingiest cover cornerbacks during his 26 seasons in Tampa, where he also played some safety. A key to the Cover-2 defensive scheme, Barber was a three-time All-Pro and a member of NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s. He led the NFL with 10 interceptions in 2001 and won a Super Bowl the next season.

Blackhawks' Lacquette becomes NHL's 1st First Nations scout

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — When Brigette Lacquette first heard from the Chicago Blackhawks, she didn't think the message was real.

It was, and it arrived at a perfect time.

Lacquette became the first Indigenous woman to scout for an NHL team when she was hired by the Blackhawks this year.

Making history is familiar for Lacquette, who became the first First Nations woman to play hockey for Canada in a Winter Olympics in 2018. The defender earned a silver medal, but was left off Canada's Olympic roster for 2022.

"I had to go through some things mentally and emotionally throughout the summer just with everything in life," Lacquette told The Canadian Press.

"This job has kept me busy and I have something to look forward to and something I want to excel at, get better at every single day and give it my all. It turns out, I really love this job."

The 29-year-old Ojibwa from Mallard, Manitoba, also played in three world championships over six years on the national women's team, winning two silver medals and a bronze.

Lacquette saw a seemingly random message on her Facebook page in May from Blackhawks assistant general manager Ryan Stewart, who oversees pro evaluation.

"I had to Google him because, to be honest, I didn't think it was real," Lacquette said.

The Blackhawks were looking to replenish their scouting staff after a COVID-19 contraction, Stewart said.

"We were looking for more diverse ... just more opinions, more different people to bring into the fold here," he said. "So doing a lot of research and doing different things, her name just popped up and I kind of dove deeper into it."

"Everybody I reached out to — from former coaches at college to teammates — raved about her hockey sense and her integrity as

a person. To me, if you've got hockey sense as a player it translates very well to scouting."

Lacquette was still awaiting word at that time on whether she would be invited to try out for the 2022 Olympic team.

"I told him I'd let him know next week. I thought 'That's actually super cool, like that's crazy,' but my mind was focused on playing hockey," she said.

"I didn't get centralized, and then I inquired more about the job. Talked to higher-ups and they offered me a job as a pro scout. They told me my job was basically watching all the kids that are drafted in the NHL that play in the Western Hockey League."

Lacquette's territory recently expanded from the three prairie provinces into British Columbia.

"October was definitely a struggle. I didn't really know what to expect," Lacquette said. "I was excited to drive down to Lethbridge and watch a hockey game, but then I was like 'What am I looking for?'"

"I've been playing hockey my entire life, so then watching the game and breaking down aspects of it and the players' skills and rating them, and writing reports on them, the more I get to watch them, the more I notice that they are improving or not improving."

Said Stewart: "I've been amazed at her reports and she knows the detail that helps translate a player to a

pro level and then obviously bigger than that to the NHL level. She's grasped that kind of range real quickly here."

Knowing the tension over sports teams and Indigenous logos and names, Lacquette said she did her homework on Chicago's logo and Black Hawk, a Thunder Clan leader who resisted the takeover of lands belonging to his people.

"They're honoring Black Hawk who is the logo," Lacquette said. "They do a lot of land acknowledgment stuff and good work with the First Nations communities. They have some stuff on their website they share if people don't understand."

Lacquette consulted with her mother Anita of the Cote First Nation in Saskatchewan and father Terence of O-Chi-Chak-Ko-Sipi First Nation in Manitoba about taking the job.

"My dad was excited. He said 'This job is something a lot of people work their whole lives for and don't get,'" Lacquette said. "With regards to the logo, they do understand. I did explain it to them."

"I do see both sides of it. There's obviously a lot of people that don't support it. There was this one girl who made a really big deal about me accepting a job, and saying she doesn't support me."

Lacquette was the best qualified person for the job, Stewart said.

"She has an excellent hockey mind, period," he

said. "There's a long line of people lining up to be scouts, but we hand-pick and we're very selective as to who could be a scout for us."

Lacquette joins a small group of female NHL scouts alongside Cammi Granato (Seattle Kraken), Blake Bolden (Los Angeles Kings) and Meghan Hunter (Blackhawks).

Lacquette compared job notes via direct messages with Bolden, who became the first Black female NHL scout in 2020. Lacquette broke that barrier for Indigenous women.

"It's cool I get to be the first, but I feel like a lot of these kind of jobs and opportunities are going to be opening up a lot for a lot of the other teams in the NHL," Lacquette said. "I mean, the time is now."

Lacquette still plays for the Professional Women's Hockey Players' Association (PWHPA).

She scouted the Canadian junior men's selection camp and played for the PWHPA against the Canadian women at the same arena one December weekend in Calgary.

She's unsure what her future playing career will be.

"I'm just taking it day by day. I'm not thinking too far ahead," Lacquette said. "It still feels good to train and skate with the PWHPA."

"I'm not really sure where I'm going to go from here. Right now, I'm focused on my job. It gives me a new goal."

But beating the Chiefs right now just might be the toughest task in football.

After a lousy start left them with a losing record seven games into the season, Mahomes and the rest of his cohorts have turned things around in a remarkable way. They have ripped off eight consecutive wins, including last week's 36-10 romp over Pittsburgh to clinch their sixth straight division title, and are back near full strength after a COVID-19 outbreak.

"It's a big game any way you want to phrase it," Taylor said. "You want to win the division and go to the playoffs. The Chiefs happen to be the team that's right in front of us that allows us to do that. It's a tremendous football team. They've had a lot of success over the years. We understand that. But we don't put too much into that. This is about us."

That's not to say the Chiefs don't have plenty riding on the outcome. They head into the weekend leading Tennessee by one game for the No. 1 playoff seed, which means the lone AFC bye and home-field advantage throughout the playoffs.

"The job's not finished," Mahomes said. "We want to get the No. 1 seed."

As for his showdown with Burrow on Sunday?

"Not only is he a great football player, I think he's a great leader," Mahomes said. "He can lead anybody, no matter where he's at. He can go out with swag, that mentality, 'We're going to win no matter what.' It takes a lot of experience and going out there and doing it for people to believe it."

TAKE AWAY THE HOUSE

Chiefs linebackers coach Matt House was hired as the defensive coordinator at LSU this week. But Chiefs coach Andy Reid said this week that House will continue to work in Kansas City as long as the team is alive in the playoffs.

"He'll be tremendous for the Tigers," Reid said. "We have a bunch of them on our team. They're fired up for him."

RECORD WATCH

Burrow needs 38 completions to break Carson Palmer's single-season franchise record of 373 set in 2007, and he needs 129 yards passing and four TD passes to break Andy Dalton's records of 4,293 yards and 33 TDs set in 2013.

He's not the only Bengals player on record watch, though. Wide receiver Ja'Marr Chase needs 278 yards receiving to pass Chad Johnson (1,440) for the most in a single season, and running back Joe Mixon's 16 touchdowns overall are one shy of Carl Pickens' record set in 1995 and his 13 TD runs are two shy of Ickey Woods' record set in 1988.

TAKE IT AWAY

The Chiefs have dominated the

turnover battle in recent weeks, a big reason they've ripped off eight straight wins. The Chiefs have forced 20 turnovers and committed six over the past seven games. Last week was a prime example: They picked off Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger while recovering two fumbles while not committing a turnover.

STAR WARS

Want to know how much offensive firepower will be on display Sunday? The AFC offensive player of the week awards gives a pretty good indication. Mahomes has won it twice and tight end Travis Kelce picked up the honor for Kansas City in Week 15. Burrow also has two awards, including this past week, while Chase won it for Cincinnati in Week 7 and running back Joe Mixon in Week 12. That's nearly half of the honors given out this season.

SHELL GAMES

One way teams have tried to slow down Kansas City is by playing two safeties in a "shell" deep downfield, forcing them to dink-and-dunk their way downfield on offense. But there have been signs the past few weeks that Mahomes and Co. have figured out that strategy, and that means it might not be so successful for Cincinnati.

"Teams are mixing more than what we think," Reid said. "We're seeing some shell, some single safety, some man — they throw a lot at you and this crew is no different. They have a whole package that they really execute well."

Colts' Leonard off virus list, ready to face Raiders

Indianapolis Colts linebacker Darius Leonard couldn't wait to get back to work Thursday.

He has even bigger plans for Sunday.

Less than three hours after team officials activated the two-time All-Pro and two other starters from the reserve/COVID-19 list, Leonard explained how difficult it was to miss Saturday's game at Arizona — and how eager he is to face the Las Vegas Raiders this weekend.

"Actually, I tested negative that morning and then probably around 1 or 2 is when I tested positive," he said while wearing a mask on a video call with reporters Thursday. "I got on a plane ride back home around 7 and now we're here. I feel good."

That's good news for the Colts, who had six starters including Leonard out because of the virus last weekend and would have been severely short-handed Sunday if the NFL hadn't reduced the isolation period from 10 days to five.

Under the previous guideline, Leonard would have missed this week's game, too.

Instead, all six starters who missed the Arizona game because of the virus have been activated over the past two days. It's still unclear whether quarterback Carson Wentz or right tackle Braden Smith will clear the protocols before Sunday.

But nobody missed the game more than the passionate Leonard, who uses any slight as motivation. And now the masterful takeaway artist has even bigger plans for Sunday — clinching a playoff spot by beating

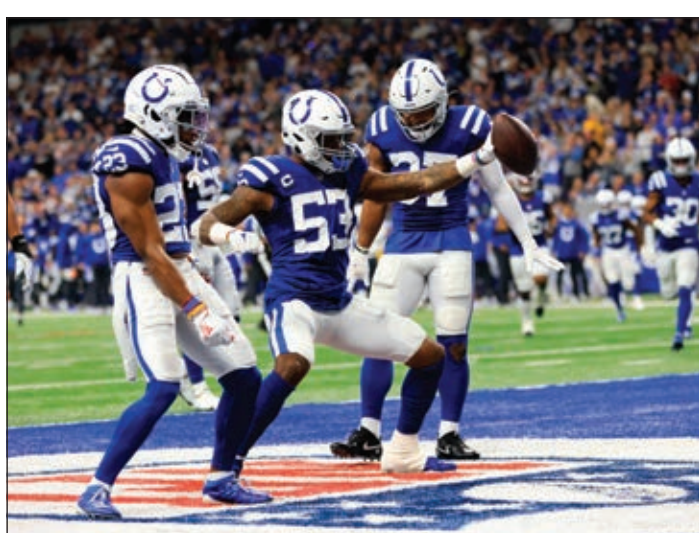

the Raiders.

"That definitely sucked — going home, not being able to go out there and perform with my guys, not being able to see my family, not being able to watch the game fully," he said. "Thank God, they changed the rule. I'm back, I'm feeling good and I'm ready to rock 'n' roll."

The Denver Broncos canceled practice Thursday as they retested five players whose results showed both positive and negative results. They held virtual meetings and planned to expand Friday's practice to make up for the lost time on the field.

"The decision was made because we have some positives today. Some may be false positives. We're working through that," coach Vic Fangio said. "We'll come out with the list here later today (with who) might be on it."

"I just felt that we needed to hit the pause button, get our hands around what we've got here as far as numbers and roster and we're going to hold the meeting here this

afternoon instead of practicing and the hope is tomorrow to have a good practice on Friday and Saturday and go out there and get us a W."

The Broncos (7-8) visit the Chargers (8-7) Sunday.

Fangio said in the five new cases, the first test came back positive for COVID-19 and the second result was negative "and now they have their procedures they go through when that happens, so we're kind of in limbo on a couple of guys right now."

On Wednesday, the Broncos activated starting center Lloyd Cushenberry III off the reserve/COVID-19 list and placed wide receiver Tim Patrick, swing tackle Calvin Anderson and backup safety Caden Sterns on the virus list along with practice squad wide receiver Tyrie Cleveland.

Also:

— Browns center JC Tretter, the NFL Players Association president, was activated from the COVID-19 reserve list as Cleveland got a little healthier heading into its

Monday night game at Pittsburgh.

Tretter, whose tenure as president has spanned the epidemic, missed last week's loss at Green Bay after testing positive. He had not missed a snap since signing with the Browns in 2017 after three seasons with the Packers.

Browns rookie cornerback Greg Newsome, who had also been in concussion protocol, returned along with kicker Chase McLaughlin.

— The New York Jets got four starters back from the COVID-10 list as left guard Aljah Vera-Tucker, right guard Laurent Duvernay-Tardif, defensive end John Franklin-Myers and safety Ashtyn Davis were all activated.

Practice squad wide receiver Vyncint Smith and defensive end Hamilcar Rashed Jr. were also restored to the practice squad from the practice squad/COVID-19 list.

The Jets had as many as 25 players on the COVID-19 list earlier this week, plus coach Robert Saleh, who returned to the team Wednesday. With the activations Thursday, New York was down to 10 players on the list.

— The Minnesota Vikings have placed linebacker Nick Vigil on the reserve/COVID-19 list.

— The Cincinnati Bengals returned defensive tackle D.J. Reader and defensive end Wyatt Ray to the active roster from the reserve/COVID-19 list. Both players had been on list since Dec. 25.

— The Carolina Panthers added safety Kenny Robinson, defensive end Darryl Johnson and practice squad running back Reggie Bonnafon to the COVID-19 list.

Gator Bowl fill-in Rutgers 'letting it hang out' vs Wake

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Accepting a spot in the Gator Bowl was easy for Rutgers. Getting there proved much more daunting.

The Scarlet Knights, a late substitution for Texas A&M in Friday's game against 20th-ranked Wake Forest, spent several days trying to land a charter flight for the trip and eventually needed two to get everyone to Jacksonville.

In the meantime, suggestions poured in: Take a train. Rent a cruise ship.

Even after the flight came together, players and a few coaches were forced to wait 2½ hours on a tarmac in Newark, New Jersey, to finally take off.

"Literally, when the wheels got off the ground, I said, 'All right, this is official. We're doing it,'" coach Greg Schiano recalled Thursday. "I promised these guys we're coming down and we're letting it hang out."

Winning the game might be the biggest challenge.

The Demon Deacons (10-3) have one of the nation's most potent offenses. They average a school-record 41.9 points, which ranks second in the Atlantic Coast Conference and fifth in the nation.

Led by quarterback Sam Hartman and a dynamic receiving duo of Jaquarii Roberson and A.T. Perry, they have scored at least 21 points on every opponent this season — more than 40 eight times — and now face a Rutgers team that averages 20.5 a game.

"The explosiveness on every play is probably the biggest challenge to defend," Hartman said.

That task became even tougher when the bowl game, usually a monthlong affair complete with three weeks of practices, became a quick turnaround.

But the Tide most likely wouldn't have made it back without Heisman Trophy winning-quarterback Bryce Young leading a late game-tying, 97-yard TD drive in the regular-season finale against Auburn that ended in an overtime win. The sophomore first-year starter then set an SEC championship game record with 421 yards passing in a 41-24 victory over Georgia, which was undefeated before then and plays Michigan at the Orange Bowl in the other CFP semifinal.

"It's always challenging when you come off of winning a championship for players to have the same hunger, to have a sense of urgency to prove something," said Alabama coach Nick Saban, who has six national titles the past 12 seasons. "But because we were young, I think it took this team a little longer to maybe respond on a consistent basis like we wanted them to."

Ridder is among more than 30 Cincinnati seniors, many who decided to return

for an extra year with coach Luke Fickell after the Bearcats went 9-1 last season with the only loss being 24-21 when Georgia kicked a last-second field goal in the New Year's Six Peach Bowl.

"I've had a great experience over my five years here, and I'm just hoping we can seal it off with one of the best experiences there is," said Ridder, a potential NFL first-round pick who holds the American Athletic Conference and school record with 12,280 career total yards.

"To be here and not take advantage of it would be a real regret," tight end Josh Whyte said.

Before sweeping through the American Athletic Conference, the Bearcats won 24-13 at Notre Dame the first Saturday of October. That was the only loss for the Fighting Irish, who wound up fifth in the final CFP rankings on Dec. 5 and the first team out while Cincinnati made history.

Cincinnati still goes into the Cotton Bowl as a 13½-point underdog, according to FanDuel Sportsbook.

"We don't see ourselves as underdogs. We feel like we can play with whoever," All-America cornerback Ahmad Gard-

ner said. "We always have a chip on our shoulder. ... So the fact that we're able to finally be where we always wanted to be puts more of a chip on our shoulder."

Alabama's only loss was 41-38 at Texas A&M on Oct. 9, a setback that got the Tide's attention.

"It showed a lot of guys how it feels to lose and how it feels to be down. We got the experience early, so we know how it feels to be down and out, the world against you," senior defensive end Phidarian Mathis said. "So you don't want to feel like that no more. So we just took that as motivation and try to get better every week."

ALL-AMERICAN MATCHUP

"Sauce" Gardner was a scrawny 160-pound freshman when he arrived at Cincinnati, and receiver Jameson Williams blossomed at Alabama after playing for Ohio State the past two seasons. Both are All-Americans this season.

Gardner has never given up a touchdown in coverage at Cincinnati, and hasn't given up a catch inside the Bearcats 20 this season.

Williams has 68 catches and leads the SEC with his 1,445 yards receiving (21.2 yards per catch) and 15 TDs. He has 11

catches of at least 50 yards, including TDs of 67 and 50 yards in the SEC title game.

SUCCESS IN CFP AND AT JERRYWORLD

Alabama is 8-3 in CFP games and has won its last five semifinal games since a loss to Ohio State, with Fickell as the defensive coordinator, in the first year of the four-team playoff at the end of the 2014 season.

The Crimson Tide are 5-0 at AT&T Stadium, two of those CFP semifinal games in the home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys. They beat Michigan State 38-0 in the Cotton Bowl six years ago, and last New Year's Day won 31-14 over Notre Dame in a Rose Bowl moved from Pasadena because of COVID-19 restrictions in California.

RUNNING FOR THE TIDE

Brian Robinson, finally Alabama's featured running back in his fifth season, has 1,071 yards and 14 touchdowns rushing.

Bearcats leading rusher Jerome Ford spent two seasons at Alabama before transferring to Cincinnati two years ago. Ford, who said this week that he would "appreciate if people stopped calling me the Alabama transfer," has 1,242 yards and 19 TDs in his second season with the Bearcats, his first as the starting tailback.

"I'd say that shirt really begins from fall camp and spring ball when we knew that a lot of people would be counting us out," offensive tackle Andrew Stueber said. "I saw somewhere there was a .05% chance of making it to the College Football Playoff. A lot of people didn't believe in us, and it kind of drove us this whole season."

"Why not us?" has been another Michigan rallying cry.

After blowing a 16-point lead

in the second half to Michigan State in their only loss on Halloween weekend, the Wolverines rallied late to win at Penn State, snapped an eight-game losing streak to Ohio State and beat Iowa to win the Big Ten for the first time since 2004.

"Definitely riding that into this game, and just ready to go out there and take advantage of every opportunity we get," Vastardis said.

There is a different vibe around Georgia.

Nobody doubted the Bulldogs would be a playoff contender this season. Led by a defense stacked with blue-chip recruits and future NFL draft choices, they allowed less than a touchdown per game through a 12-0

start — and then lost 41-27 to Alabama.

Georgia has not won a national title since 1980. While coaches and players don't worry about that, those who support the program do, and losing to Alabama brought on the here-we-go-again feelings for Bulldogs fans.

Smart said the key to coming back from a loss is to keep it technical and analyze what went wrong with the players.

"Don't be judgmental," Smart said. "Don't say things: 'If you do this and if you do that, you're going to get your butt beat.'"

While Alabama attacked Georgia's defense with a Heisman Trophy winning quarterback (Bryce Young) and All-America receiver (Jameson Williams), Michigan's calling card is the running game.

The Wolverines, led by third-team All-America running back Hassan Haskins, average 223 yards rushing per game,

5.31 per carry and have scored 39 touchdowns on the ground. Georgia, led by Davis and All-American linebacker Nakobe Dean, has been an immovable object against the run, allowing 82 yards per game, 2.61 per attempt and just three rushing touchdowns.

"They're definitely a physical team, and it's a tremendous challenge for our front seven," Davis said.

QB COMBOS?

Michigan has used two quarterbacks all season, sprinkling in backup J.J. McCarthy to complement starter Cade McNamara. McCarthy's athleticism is part of how offensive coordinator Josh Gattis brings some diversity and creativity to the offense.

Georgia has had two starting quarterbacks this season, with JT Daniels beginning as QB1 before an injury opened the door for Stetson Bennett to claim the job. Bennett, a former walk-on,

will start the Orange Bowl after a rough game against Alabama.

"We just (rallied) around him and let him know he's not in this alone even though he was receiving a lot of bad talk about him," receiver Kearis Jackson said.

Daniels' status seems uncertain after he arrived in Georgia a day later than the rest of the team.

ON EDGE

Hutchinson and outside linebacker David Ojabo combined for 25 sacks, a little more than 75% of Michigan's total.

It will be on Georgia tackles Jamaree Salyer and Warren McClendon to keep two of the best pass rushers in the country away from whoever is playing quarterback for the Bulldogs.

"They present different matchups," Salyer said. "Each of them are very good at different things, but very talented players, and I'm excited for the matchup."

A look back at

2021

As we look back on 2021, it can be hard to find the blurry line where 2020 ended and 2021 began. Many of the themes we experienced in the first year of a new decade carried over into this year.

While the pandemic has continued into year two and is about to enter year three, it looks different this time around. The world slowly came back to life as events returned, athletics returned to full capacity, businesses kept their doors open consistently, and school was no longer virtual, although Zoom is now a standard business tool. We all started coming to terms with the “new normal” we had hoped would come to an end in 2021.

Sadness remained, however. COVID-related deaths continued to climb worldwide and case counts have only grown in Johnson County and beyond. Arguments over mask and vaccine requirements spilled into our everyday lives, from yelling at school board meetings to increased vitriol on social media.

We have no idea what 2022 has in store for any of us because here we are, still navigating the pandemic 365 days later.

The following are the top 10 stories of 2021 as selected by the Democrat staff.

1. Pandemic enters year two

As we entered 2021, vaccines had just been introduced and top tier demographics such as health care workers, elderly people and those with compromised immune systems were among the first to receive the vaccine. In Pettis County, the first vaccines were administered in late December 2020 to health care workers at Bothwell Regional Health Center. In January, Sedalia became the site of one of the state’s mass vaccination sites, with local health care workers administering thousands of vaccines on the Missouri State Fairgrounds with the help of the Missouri National Guard. A total of 2,200 people were expected to be vaccinated during the first three-day clinic Jan. 28-30.

Vaccines continue to be administered on an individual basis after the mass vaccination sites ended earlier this year, and the Pettis County Health Center, Bothwell Regional Health Center and Katy Trail Community Health have vaccinated thousands of citizens.

But just like masks in 2020, vaccines didn’t come without controversy. As of the last week of December, 51% of Pettis County residents 18 and over are fully vaccinated and 56.8% have initiated the vaccine, which falls behind the state’s statistics. The state is reporting 71.6% of the population over 18 has started vaccination and 63.8% are fully vaccinated.

In May, as cases waned and things were beginning to return to normal, the PCHC board voted to remove the county’s mask mandate in mid-May, replacing it with a public health advisory recommending masks and social distancing.

School districts continued to grapple with handling the pandemic while keeping students and staff safe and in school. Policies varied across the county and state throughout 2021. In Sedalia School District 200, masks remained a requirement through the end of the fall semester. This action led to many heated Board of Education meetings filled with parents and community members arguing both sides of the issue.

By the end of the year, Pettis

County had surpassed 8,400 total cases of COVID-19 and more than 100 COVID-related deaths during the pandemic.

2. Major developments in emergency services

Several developments happened this year as the Sedalia Police Department and Pettis County Sheriff’s Office continue to combat crime.

The year started with Pettis County’s first new sheriff in almost two decades after Sheriff Brad Anders defeated former Sheriff Kevin Bond in the November 2020 General Election. Anders has years of law enforcement experience in Lee’s Summit and Sedalia and has already made numerous changes and improvements to the sheriff’s office and Pettis County Jail.

After years of planning and work, the Pettis County Joint 911 Call Center assumed responsibility for all 911 calls in Pettis County as of 11 a.m. Aug. 16.

The combined communication units of the Sedalia Police Department and the Pettis County Sheriff’s Office merged into the new Pettis County Joint Communications housed in the basement of the Sedalia Municipal Building to eliminate redundancy and provide better service.

Under the direction of Director Dannelle Lauder, employees from the sheriff’s office and the police department were retrained on the new equipment and protocols before taking their new positions at the call center. Personnel not making the move to the joint 911 center have been reassigned to other duties. The 911 call center in the Municipal Building has been expanded into a much larger room outfitted with modern amenities and equipment.

A new K-9 began patrolling with the Pettis County Sheriff’s Office. A 2-year-old German Shepherd named Cav has already helped make numerous drug arrests, which is coincidental, as Cav was purchased after a conversation at a drug bust. He works with handler Deputy Jimmy Moore. Cav is a certified narcotics and patrol dog and can track suspects as well.

The Sedalia Police Department welcomed its newest and youngest K9 officer in October. Ace is a 16-month-old Belgian Malinois from Poland who was purchased

from Shallow Creek Kennel in Pennsylvania.” K9 Gallo died in 2019 and K9 Charlie will be retiring within the next year. Ace’s K9 handler is Officer Shania Fox, who joined SPD in 2019.

SPD also added another dog in 2021: therapy dog Kyah.

The SPD continued to utilize its Crime Resolution Unit, which is intended to stay ahead of criminals through a combination of drug enforcement and community-based policing. The unit has evolved since it was formed in 2019. Four officers are now assigned to the unit full-time and supervised by Sgt. Kevin Klein, who was recently promoted to Professional Development Officer.

3. Landfill proposal creates controversy

One of the most popular topics of discussion in Pettis County this year was about a proposed landfill between Dresden and La Monte to be operated by Presidio Environmental Company.

A group of citizens opposed to the proposal formed Pettis County First, which hosted public information meetings, purchased advertising regarding the landfill, and retained legal counsel to help draft an ordinance presented to the Pettis County Commission.

Pettis County First has been seeking to craft an ordinance in its attempt to slow or even stop the construction of the proposed landfill on Buckley Road in western Pettis County.

Some citizens are entirely opposed to another landfill in Pettis County, while others are OK with the business as long as it is heavily regulated.

The Commission has also been working with legal counsel, Pettis County First and Presidio to determine the best course of action. Since there are no zoning ordinances in the county, an ordinance would need to be created and approved by the Commission regarding landfill regulations.

Derrick Standley with the Pettis County Development Corporation has applied with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources to build the proposed waste park and thinks fears of the negative impact to Pettis County are overblown.

In May, the Missouri Department of Natural Resources hosted a public information

session about the proposed waste park, and DNR representatives said the public information session was just one of many steps the landfill developers must go through before getting approval for the landfill.

As of December, the Commission continues to mull over its options with representatives of all parties and has not made any formal decisions.

4. Missing persons found dead

Several Pettis County residents have gone missing in the last decade, but two cases came to a tragic end in 2021.

Just this month, the Morgan County Sheriff’s Office confirmed the death of 37-year-old Jimmy Duane “JD” Guy Collins, a former Marine and Sedalia resident missing since Thanksgiving week. Morgan County Sheriff Norman Dills confirmed Collins’ body was located on private property near Highway M and Pond Road. The Morgan County Sheriff’s Office received a report Friday, Dec. 17 of a possible deceased person on the property.

An autopsy was performed at the Boone County Medical Examiner’s Office on Monday, Dec. 20 and the preliminary results showed signs of hypothermia as a possible contributing factor in Collins’ death.

After more than three years, skeletal remains found in wooded Pettis County were identified as a Sedalia man who went missing six years ago.

Pettis County Coroner Robert “Skip” Smith identified the remains as 39-year-old Timothy Gibson, of Sedalia, who went missing in 2015. Due to the condition of the skeletal remains, Smith was unable to determine a cause of death, but there is no evidence of foul play.

Gibson was last seen March 26, 2015, being taken to the hospital in Sedalia and was released shortly after. He had not been seen since.

The remains were found Saturday, Oct. 27, 2018, by a Missouri Department of Conservation agent in a densely wooded area near the Eagle Brook Farm subdivision. The Pettis County Sheriff’s Office and Smith contacted the Boone County Medical Examiner’s Office for assistance, and a forensic anthropologist and an investigator helped process the scene.

Almost exactly six years since Gibson was last seen, Smith was finally able to notify Gibson’s mother on April 15 that the remains belonged to her missing son.

5. Plenty of headlines in Warsaw

For a city of only about 2,600 people, Warsaw made headlines more times than citizens may have liked in 2021.

A father and two sons — 40-year-old Darrell Peak, 3-year-old Mayson Peak and 4-year-old Kaiden Peak — were reported missing from Green County after last being seen leaving their residence Feb. 25. On March 1, the trio was tragically found dead in an abandoned shed along U.S.

Highway 65. Darrell was known to be depressed, but family members said they had no indication he would harm the children. Powerline workers found their bodies Monday afternoon in Warsaw.

On June 12, around 4 p.m., the Benton County Sheriff’s Office received a notification about a possible missing person in the area: Cody B. Garrett, 28, of Columbia. Garrett’s mother reported him missing to the Boone County Sheriff’s Office after Garrett had not been in contact for approximately 48 hours. Garrett’s mother reported that Garrett had told her he was headed to Benton County with some friends to do some shooting and never returned.

A ping of Garrett’s phone led Benton County deputies to his vehicle located on Benton House Avenue in Warsaw. Garrett’s body was located approximately a half-mile away from his vehicle, down a secondary bike trail. The medical examiner ruled the cause of death to be a homicide.

On June 18, around 5 p.m., law enforcement responded to a residence located on Panorama Road near Warsaw for a domestic disturbance involving gunfire. After an investigation, it was determined that Heather M. Mathias (McCormick), 50, of the residence, shot Charles M. McCormick III, also of the residence, twice before taking her own life.

A fatal shooting followed an alcohol-fueled river’s edge party in Benton County on July 18. John M. Moreno, 24, is charged with second-degree murder, a class-A felony, two counts of armed criminal action and first-degree assault. Lance M. Lyman, 28, of Warsaw, was shot around 5 a.m. Sunday along the Osage River. Apparently, Lyman intervened when Moreno assaulted an unnamed female. Moreno opened fire as the party was breaking up and Lyman was hit.

This summer, Warsaw School District Superintendent Shawn Poyser left with no public explanation and was replaced by interim superintendent Dr. Jim Finley. Dr. Tony Berry was named the new interim superintendent in August. Earlier this month, the district announced it had hired Scott Gemes as its new superintendent for the 2022-23 school year. Gemes previously worked for the district as an Athletic Director, Assistant Principal, and high school math teacher.

Jason L. Kroenke, 25, of Warsaw, has been charged with first-degree murder and armed criminal action concerning a fatal shooting Nov. 23. Around 4:16 a.m., dispatch received a call from an address in the Bent Tree Harbor subdivision in Warsaw reporting an accidental shooting. Upon arrival, Benton County deputies attempted life-saving measures on the victim but could not revive her. The victim has been identified as 27-year-old Tarah D. McIntyre, of the residence.

The search also continued for 47-year-old Echo Lloyd, who vanished from her Benton County home the week of May 10, 2020. On May 15, her daughter discovered she was missing from her home. Nothing else was missing but her keys, her pistol and her medications. Her vehicle and purse were still at home. Lloyd is a white female with brown hair and brown eyes. She is 5'4" and weighs 100 to 110 pounds. Anyone with any information is encouraged to contact the Benton County Sheriff's Department at 660-438-5252 or the Highway Patrol Missing Persons Clearinghouse at 573-526-6178 or missingpersons@msdp.dps.mo.gov.

There were some positive notes, too. The sheriff's office created a new investigative division with a full-time detective. After more than three years of work and planning, the new Benton County Jail opened this spring at 1620 E. Main St. just outside of Warsaw.

A few new businesses opened in Benton County, including the Creative Palette, an art studio, and Benton Ridge Winery and Campground.

Benton County was also the scene of a heroic rescue. Kenny Schlup and Earl Rasa, of Sedalia, were recognized by the Missouri State Highway Patrol for saving the lives of a young couple from Kansas at the Lake of the Ozarks in January. The two men found Seth Arvesen, 20, and Camille Vandergriff, 19, before they succumbed to the 37-degree water Jan. 21 at Turkey Creek Cove in Benton County.

6. Variety of crime in 2021

There wasn't a direct theme of local crime in 2021, with incidents ranging from shootings and an escaped prisoner to drug trafficking and homicide.

The Sedalia Police Department took three juveniles into custody in reference to a homicide on Dec. 10. Detectives discovered

that three male juveniles ranging in age from 15- to 16-years-old went to 1815 S. Kentucky Ave. to burglarize the home. The juveniles made entry through the back door and were confronted by the residents. During a scuffle, Tylar Simon was mortally shot. The other resident, Nolan Simon, was assaulted. Detectives learned that at least one of the juveniles was familiar with the home and the residents.

After the shooting, all juveniles fled the scene. SPD detectives obtained a search warrant for the home and processed the crime scene for evidence. Over the weekend, the three juveniles were taken into custody.

Detectives also determined one or more of these juveniles in combination committed burglaries at Chrome Cutz, 1716 W. Ninth St., on Nov. 18, Sunkiss'd Tanning Salon, 1716 W. Ninth St., on Nov. 18, and Kehde's Barbeque, 1915 S. Limit Ave., on Nov. 20.

A Missouri Department of Corrections prisoner escaped while on work duty in June on the Missouri State Fairgrounds, prompting a regional manhunt.

Jason Laird, 44, of Gainesville, was on work release through the Tipton Correctional Center. He was one of around 20 inmates spread around the grounds guarded by a single guard when he fled, leaving only his rake behind.

The Pettis County Sheriff's Office, Sedalia Police Department, Missouri State Highway Patrol and over 30 Missouri Department of Corrections employees combed the area near State Fair Community College and neighborhoods to the west using bloodhounds, the police department drone and a Missouri State Highway Patrol airplane that circled the area for hours. He was found four days later in a wooded area of Ozark County.

Countless drug investigations and arrests happened, including several at local motels. That prompted city and county officials to look more closely

at regulating those businesses to prevent further crimes. For example, the American Inn, 1217 S. Limit Ave., was served a Cease-and-Desist order in November by the Sedalia Police Department. Multiple instances of illegal activity, a lack of a business license, the inability to pass fire department safety inspections, and an unwilling attitude from management to work with the City led to the closure of the business.

7. Community projects completed

In 2019's Top 10 stories, "City, county plan ahead" won the No. 1 spot as 2019 was a year that saw the beginning of numerous long-term projects that will significantly impact the community for years to come. In 2020, those projects remained in progress and earned another Top 10 spot. In 2021, many of those have been completed.

The Loftus Early Childhood Center welcomed its first students in August, Child Safe of Central Missouri opened its new location on West Main Street in May, and an expanded VA Clinic on Winchester Drive opened in December.

The Heckart Community Center at Liberty Park remains under construction but is only mere months away from opening in mid-March. The Olen Howard Workforce Innovation Center at State Fair Community College is also under construction and the SFCC Foundation has continued to receive significant donations from area businesses and donors. Katy Trail Community Health's second location near South Kentucky Avenue and West Main Street remains unfinished but is close to completion.

After two and a half years of grants, applications, regulatory approvals and construction, the Sedalia Rail Industrial Park is now officially connected to Union Pacific rail.

A ribbon-cutting was hosted in May to celebrate the official opening of the Katy Trail as the final gap of the trail was complet-

ed through the City of Sedalia.

Many projects were completed this year, but some also were started. In October, Furnell Investments broke ground on the new pavilion it is building at West Second Street and South Ohio Avenue. The Downtown Pavilion project is a public-private partnership that will create a new venue on the northside of downtown Sedalia.

8. Businesses open, thrive despite COVID

The pandemic affected businesses and economic development across the country and in Pettis County, but the local business community seems to have rebounded in 2021.

The Sedalia Area Chamber of Commerce had no shortage of ribbon cuttings for new businesses, new locations or other positive changes at local businesses.

Sedalia's second medicinal cannabis dispensary, Organic Remedies, was among the new businesses.

Other new openings include Overstock Outlet Sedalia, The Chubby Hairstylist, Broadway Cuisine, The Warehouse, Lolly's Candy Shop, Funky Pot, Big Bear Pumpkin Patch, Desert Rose & Oakwood Boutique, Bothwell Gardens Bed and Breakfast, Planet Fitness, South 65 Event Barn, New York Deli, Oola's Salon, and The Art Room.

Reader's World was in danger of closing but found a new owner in the 11th hour and remained open for the holidays. And, B&B Theatres took over management of Galaxy Cinemas.

9. Celebrating milestones

As the pandemic raged on, Missouri and Sedalia still had plenty to celebrate.

Statewide, Missouri celebrated its bicentennial throughout the entire year. There were monthly events across the state, a parade in Jefferson City and traveling photo and quilt exhibits. Pettis County hosted its celebration this summer on the fairgrounds in conjunction with dozens of

other ice cream socials in other communities. The Missouri State Fair celebrated the bicentennial as well.

St. Ann Catholic Church, on Dam Access Road west of Warsaw, celebrated its 75th anniversary with special services and other activities Sept. 26. This summer, the historic Katy Depot celebrated its 125th anniversary with a two-day event and Hubbard Park marked 100 years. October marked 50 years since the Bothwell Auxiliary was founded.

Businesses marked anniversaries, with Neet Archery Products and Yeager's Cycle both hitting 65 years.

Nearby, the University of Central Missouri in Warrensburg celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2021. The university also hosted monthly events all year, from ghost tours to art and artifact exhibits, alumni and student events, and of course, homecoming.

Also, the Lyceum Theatre celebrated 60 years in 2021, while OATS marked its 50th anniversary.

And while it was delayed due to the pandemic, the Green Ridge Sesquicentennial plus one was celebrated in 2021.

10. Events return to Pettis County

Among the changes from the 2020 version of the coronavirus pandemic to the 2021 version was the return of in-person events.

While some facilities still required masks and/or social distancing, many favorites were back, such as a full-scale Missouri State Fair, several parades and countless fundraisers. Previously canceled awards ceremonies saw a return in 2021 and art shows were hosted again. The holidays were quieter than usual in 2020 due to a lack of festivities, but many of those also returned in December 2021, such as the Chamber's annual Christmas parade in downtown Sedalia. And a new popular event was the Street Food Throwdown on the fairgrounds.

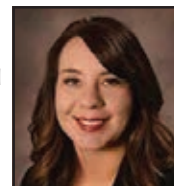

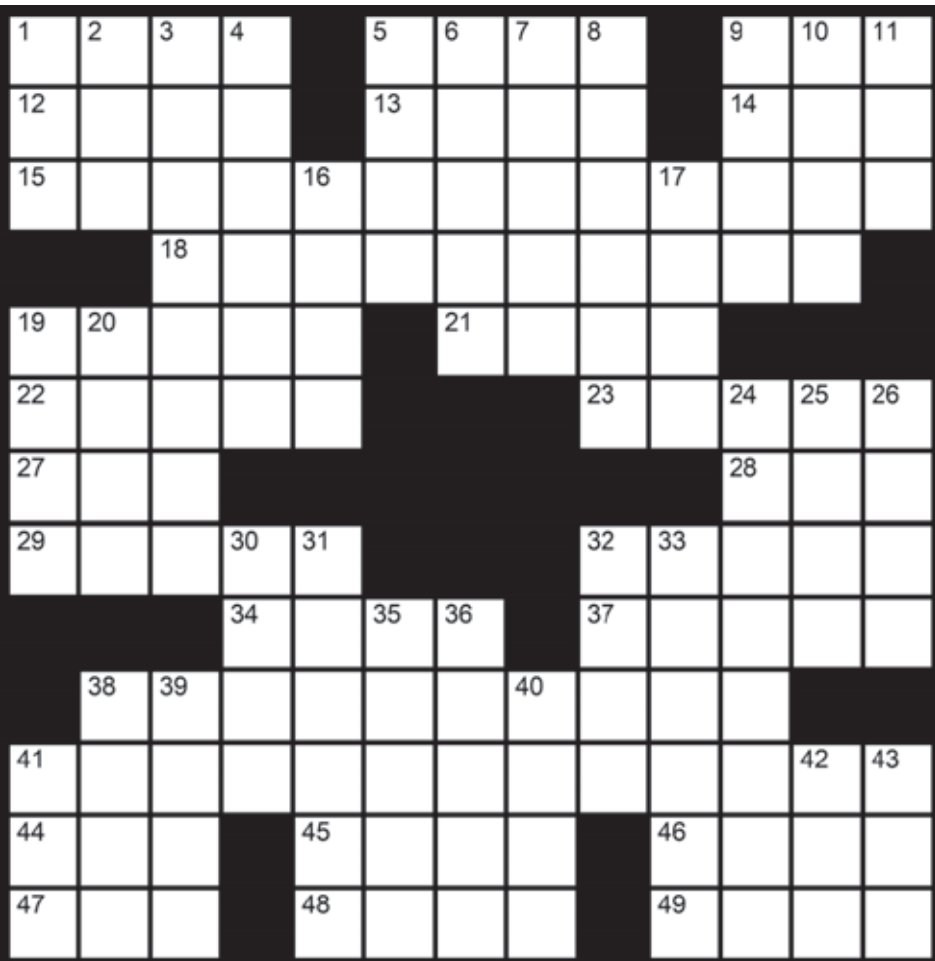

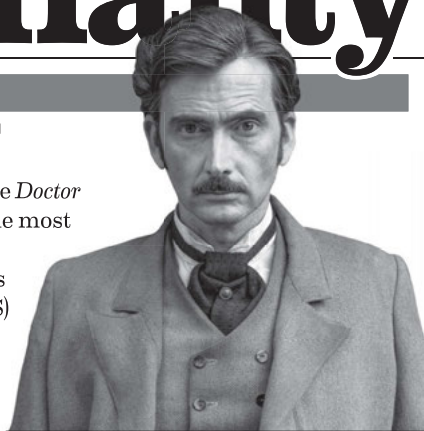
WALTER SCOTT ASKS...

DAVID TENNANT

It's hot-air balloons, trains and camels for the *Doctor Who* star, 50, as he climbs aboard one of the most famous road-trip tales ever told. Tennant stars in *Masterpiece's* update of Jules Verne's ***Around the World in 80 Days*** (Jan. 2 on PBS) as Phileas Fogg, a British gentleman who bets a fortune that he can circumnavigate the globe in only 80 days, unheard of considering the year is 1872.

How does your Fogg differ from previous incarnations? The Phileas Fogg in the book is rather inscrutable, quiet, ponderous, even aloof. He doesn't portray anxiety at any stage of his round-the-world trip. But our Fogg is filled with anxiety and self-doubt. He's not a man that believes he can do this at any stage, so he's very different.

Was the adventure modernized? It wouldn't work to modernize it because you'd make it around the world in a day and a half. So it had to be of its time, and the world was a different place. Our script doesn't shy from the truths of that, but it finds some storytelling potential. We can look at it from a modern perspective and wonder, *Has society moved on or backward?*



How excited were you to get the role of the Doctor on TV's *Doctor Who*? As a child, I was obsessed. It definitely captured my imagination. I had posters on my wall and I queued up to meet Tom Baker, who played the role, on a book signing tour. It was being excited by that storytelling that made me want to become an actor.

Do you make New Year's resolutions? Absolutely not, because you're just setting yourself up for disappointment. If there's something you need to change in your life, I'm not sure that the arbitrary change of date is the impetus. If it is, then probably you don't have the wherewithal to manage it. But perhaps that's a little Scottish Presbyterian of me.

GORDON RAMSAY'S 'NEXT LEVEL'

In the food maestro's new unscripted competition, *Next Level Chef* (Jan. 2 on Fox), three teams compete each week in kitchens on different "levels"

of a set that's three stories tall. Can they work their way from the base-



ment to the top? Ramsay, 55, and fellow celebrity chefs **Richard Blais** and **Nyasha Arrington** lead the teams of line cooks, home chefs, social media stars and food truck owners as they compete for the \$250,000 grand prize. "Is that dish good enough to get to the next level? If not, you face elimination," says Ramsay.

FROM A COP TO A DOC

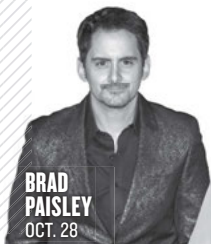

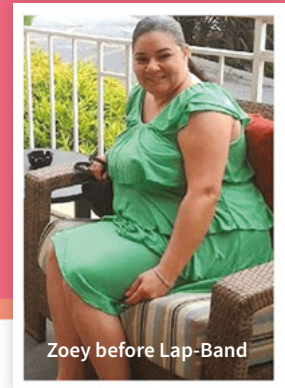

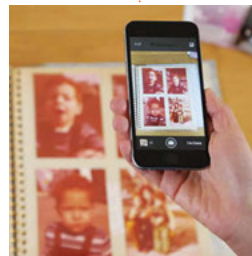

"The 'why' helps you stay focused when the cleanout gets challenging," he says.

START SMALL

To avoid burnout, don't try to tackle an entire two-car garage at one go. Instead, pick a junk drawer or shelf to finish in one sitting. Savor it, then move on to the next small task.

DOCUMENT THE STORIES

"It's not the items we can't get rid of; it's the emotions attached to them," Paxton points out. Film your mother talking about her wedding dress or a piece of furniture. "Capture the stories, keep the emotions. Then you don't need to hang on to the item anymore," he says.

SELL, DONATE, TOSS

Make giveaway piles for nonprofits, relatives or friends. Mark items with who gets them and pickup times and give them away if they're not picked up. 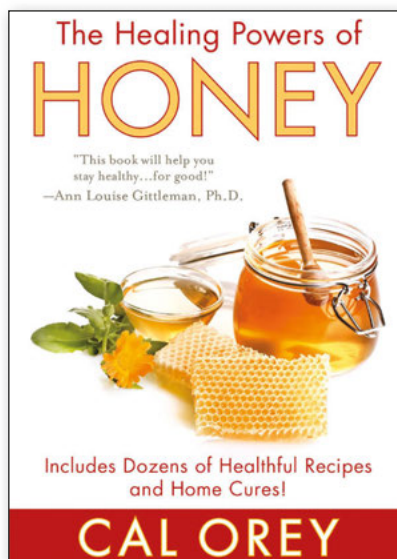

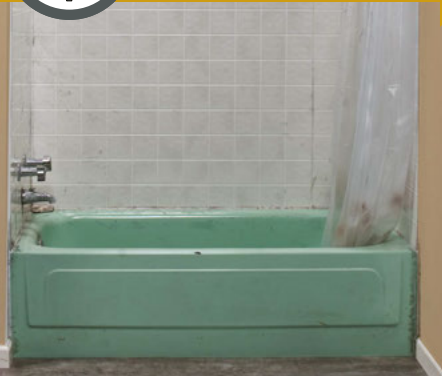

ANTHONY Just a Kid From Compton ANDERSON

The *Black-ish* star opens up about how he was shaped by the neighborhood he was raised in, how the loss of his father was a wake-up call for his health and the surprising hobby that he turns to for escape.

Anthony Anderson made his acting debut earlier than most. He was just a baby in Compton, Los Angeles, when his mother, Doris, was performing in a community play that needed a baby who could cry on cue. “I actually think my mama was pinching my thighs and my ass to get me to cry,” says Anderson, 51, laughing, “but whatever worked for us!” He’s been hitting his cues ever since as an actor, a television host and the star and executive producer of ABC’s *Black-ish*, on which Anderson plays Andre “Dre” Johnson, a father of five trying to raise his kids with a strong cultural identity within their predominantly white, upper-middle-class neighborhood. The acclaimed comedy begins its eighth and final season on Jan 4.

The real-life married father of two, wearing a white T-shirt, jeans and sneakers, has just downed a healthy juice shot and is plucking bites from a blueberry muffin as he sits down to talk with *Parade* in Los Angeles about his life and long career. As an actor, Anderson broke out playing comic roles in films including *Big Momma’s House*, *Barbershop* and *Me, Myself & Irene*; on his first sitcom, *All About the Andersons*; and in his seven seasons on *Black-ish*, for which he earned 11 Emmy nominations. He also has taken on dramatic roles in *The Departed*, *The Shield* and playing Detective Kevin Bernard for three seasons of *Law & Order*—a role he will be reprising next month in the revival of *Law & Order* (premiering

Feb. 24). And he has produced the *Black-ish* spinoffs *Grown-ish* and *Mixed-ish*.

In addition to hosting the NAACP's Image Awards for the past eight years, Anderson has co-hosted *To Tell the Truth* since 2016—along with the prank show *House Haunters*—beside his very first co-star: Mama Doris. “My mom put her dreams of being an actor on hold when she became a single mother at 17 with me,” says Anderson, “so for me to be in a position to be able to allow my mother to live her dream? I was like, ‘You know what, Mom? Come on this ride with me.’” Today, he shares what that ride entailed—from his funny family and his work as a health advocate for Type 2 diabetes to the career he built for himself out of the struggling neighborhood where he got his start.

When you post on social media, you often add the #justakidfromcompton hashtag. Now that you're a man from Hollywood, why is it so important to keep connecting with who you were?

Being just a kid from Compton shaped me into the man that I am today. I grew up in Compton in the time of crack cocaine, the height of gang violence,

drive-by shootings, Crips and Bloods and all of that. Maneuvering through those minefields where I lived, walking behind the enemy lines just to get to school, taught me about survival. It taught me how to think quick on my feet, it taught me about loyalty and it taught me about family. I was just a kid from Compton who had a dream. I go back to the schools that I went to as a child and I talk to them. I'm here to let you know that with hard work, perseverance, dedication, you too can achieve whatever it is you want to achieve in life, as long as you put the work in. I'm a living testament to that.

When was it evident to you that *Black-ish* was going to change the racial landscape for television?

Well, [the show's creator] Kenya Barris and I hoped that we would have this impact when we sat down and talked about creating this show. This was our lives. We're

both from Los Angeles—him, Inglewood; me, Compton—first generation successful. We just wanted to tell these stories through the lens of this Black family living the American dream, wanting to do better than the generation before them, and making sure that their kids have everything they didn't have, but holding on to their culture, their heritage and who they are. And to be stopped on the street by professors and people of all walks of life who say, “We're using your show or this particular episode as a tool to teach my students . . .” or, you know, “as a tool to teach my children,” “as a tool to learn for myself,” that's when I knew that we had accomplished what we set out to do.

How do you think Dre Johnson has changed over the past seven seasons?

I think he has drawn a wider and deeper line in the sand. His convictions are that much stronger about who he believes he is and where he should be in the world in which he lives and works.

***Black-ish* touches a lot of hot-button topics. Viewer reviews of the show range from “It's the funniest and most important show on television” to “It's racist.” What is your take on that?**

It says we're doing everything right. We've drawn from our personal experience, so if people say that it's racist, then yes, it is—because some of the things we've had to deal with as African Americans living in America *is* racist. It's from our perspective: This is how I feel when this happens; this is what me and my family have gone through. And I believe that's why our show resonates with an audience that it does, worldwide, because of the specificity in which we deal with topics and tell our stories.

Many of us are focusing on health this time of year. Last May, you undertook a 12-week “dad bod” challenge. What was the hardest part of the challenge for you?

Getting started! I started off with light weights around my house, and then I started boxing, and I found that it was just like everything: Before you get there, you're like, “Agh,” dreading it, but then once you get started, you're like, “Why haven't I been doing this my entire life?!” Now I've found the balance: You know, if I'm gonna eat this slice of sweet potato pie, that means I'm going to put in an extra 45 minutes on the treadmill. Is this sweet potato pie worth the extra 45 minutes? [He licks his fingers.] Yeah, it is! Since I've started, I've lost close to 30 pounds, and I've been able to keep 22 of it off.

How has Type 2 diabetes affected your life?

I was diagnosed 21 years ago. A few years later, my mother was diagnosed. It's hereditary, but it's also the way I was living and what I was putting into my body. Then my dad was diagnosed, and I realized he was living with this when I was a teenager! I was like, “Pops had diabetes all this time and didn't even know it!” As you can imagine, his quality of life was so bad. Most men, we never go to the doctor unless an appendage is falling off of us! He finally succumbed to the complications of Type 2 diabetes when I was 33. When he passed, that was another wake-up call for me to get out and spread the word within the Black and brown communities about the importance of preventive maintenance. And it is definitely a lifestyle change. It's about exercising and diet—making healthier choices in our lives. As I sit here eating this blueberry muffin [laughs].

Growing up, was your family funny?

Yeah, my entire family was funny. And that's how we got through the hard times. It wasn't always good, just in terms of grow-

ing up check to check, hand-to-mouth. My mom was a telephone operator for the County of Los Angeles. My dad worked in the steel mills and then became a self-made man and got into plus-size women's fashion—'cause he liked 'em big, like my mama! But everything was always handled with a sense of humor. And if you ask my mother, she thinks she's funnier than me.

If we asked the people you grew up with, “Anthony was the ‘blank’ of the family,” what would they say? I'll never forget, my mother was in a production of *A Raisin in the Sun* at Compton Community College. Me and my brothers were in the back of the theater, and I just happened to look up onstage and see my mother rehearsing and I said, in that moment, “*That* is what I'm going to do with the rest of my life.” So, since the age of 9, I've been preparing myself for not only where I am, but where I see myself going in my career. So I would hope that they would say Anthony was the driven one, the relentless one, because [acting] is all I ever prepared myself to do.

What does it feel like to nail something funny? To have the audience go on a ride with you and to be able to evoke laughter out of someone who may need you to escape their reality, words can't begin to describe that feeling. It's euphoric.

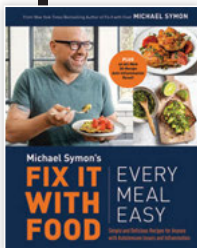

- 1 cup sliced cremini (baby bella) mushrooms
- 1 cup cooked brown rice, chilled
- ½ cup frozen peas
- ½ cup thinly sliced asparagus
- 1 tsp ground coriander
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 2 Tbsp finely chopped flat-leaf parsley
- 2 large eggs

1. Heat 3 Tbsp oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium until shimmering. Add mushrooms and rice. Cook, stirring occasionally, 3 minutes or until

mushrooms and rice turn crisp and light golden brown. Add peas, asparagus, coriander and a pinch of salt and pepper. Cook 2 minutes or until vegetables soften. Remove from heat; stir in parsley. Divide between 2 plates.

2. Return skillet to medium heat. Add remaining 1 Tbsp oil; heat until shimmering. Carefully crack eggs into pan. Cook 2 minutes or until whites begin to brown around edges. Season with salt and pepper. Remove from heat, add 1 Tbsp water, cover and let steam 30–90 seconds or until yolk is desired doneness. Top each serving with 1 egg. **Serves 2.**
