New bus contingency plan created for Sedalia 200

For the first time in Sedalia School District 200 history, school was canceled last Friday due to a lack of bus drivers. Sedalia 200 and First Student have created a new contingency plan if a similar situation happens again.

At 5 a.m. Friday, Jan. 7, Sedalia 200 alerted all parents that school was canceled for the day because 13 of 29 drivers were ill. Out of the 13 drivers absent, only one was a COVID-19 close contact; the rest had bronchitis, influenza or were out for scheduled surgeries.

First Student, a business that contracts with Sedalia 200 to provide bus transportation, follows federal mask and quarantine guidelines for COVID-19. Students by federal law have to wear masks on buses, while masks are optional in Sedalia 200 buildings.

Sedalia 200 Superintendent Steve Triplett told the Democrat this week that eight school routes are difficult to handle anyway, but with 13 drivers gone, the district had no choice but to cancel school Jan. 7.

“With this new plan, we will just have community pick-up stops at various points throughout town that are basically on a 2-mile radius from the schools,” Triplett said.

The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education requires schools to provide busing for any student who lives 3.5 miles from school. Triplett said Sedalia 200 needed a contingency plan so some

type of district-offered transportation is available and classes can occur.

First Student transports around 2,500 to 3,000 students a day for Sedalia 200.

“This plan is not set up to transport that many kids. We are looking to transport those kids who live 2 miles and more from their given school and just have no other way to get to school,” Triplett added. “Whenever we can’t run the regular routes, we are going to ask parents to try and find a way to get their child to school safely that day and home without having to utilize bus services.”

The number of students who attend a particular school will contribute to the number of pick-up locations in the plan.

“The thought is if you’re within 2 miles of the school, we would ask if you can do everything you can to make your own way to school,” Triplett said.

Sedalia 200 released the plan Sunday. Parents can find the plan on sedalia200.org or with the online version of this article on sedaliademocrat.com.

The plan, which would accommodate up to eight driving staff absences, states:

“This plan consolidates routes to allow First Student to transport students using fewer drivers/buses. Families should note that all of these community bus stops are different from standard daily bus stops; students may need to walk farther to be picked up/dropped off or families may need to drive their student to their designated stop. It also provides transportation

for students who live 2 miles or more from their school; regular daily bus service picks up students who live more than 1 mile from their school.

“Families whose students are too young to be dropped off without supervision (kindergarten and first grade) or who choose not to have their student walk home from the emergency plan bus stop should be at the designated stop at the time that their school dismisses. This will help buses get all students dropped off in a timely manner, as buses will be running multiple routes.”

While the plan is in effect, students who do not ride a bus on a morning route are not eligible to ride a bus home and will need their own transportation.

Parks and Rec hiring for Heckart Center

Today marks 63 days until the Heckart Community Center’s Grand Opening and Sedalia Parks and Recreation Director Amy Epple told the Park Board on Thursday her staff was spending about 80% of their time getting ready.

“Most staff are working seven days a week right now,” Epple said. “A lot of things are going on, but we’re happy and we’re excited for March 18 at 10 a.m.”

Although the pools are dry now with final touches still underway, it won’t be long until they are finished.

“They’re finalizing right now with some tile and some lights in the pool and everything like that,” Epple said. “We’ll probably have water here on Jan. 24 and the pools

will start filling up, maybe not the hot tub, but the other leisure pool and the competitive pool will start having water.”

Paric Construction is due to be finished in mid-February, and Parks and Rec staff will start moving in soon after.

“Staff will start moving in, we’ll get the Senior Center to start moving their equipment over here

and get them opening,” Epple said. “They’ll start serving meals on March 18 as well, it’s just getting these last pieces of the puzzle.”

Indoor and outdoor playground and fitness equipment is not arriving until February and will need to be installed quickly so new staff will have time to train on it.

Mercy Rest Stop organizers dispel misinformation Project not planned as homeless shelter

Several misconceptions about the Mercy Rest Stop have neighborhoods near the proposed building site, 417 W. Pettis St., thinking the facility will be a homeless shelter but organizers say this is not true.

As the Democrat has reported in past articles: “The facility, to be built on the property of the Open Door Kitchen, will provide the homeless and nearly homeless with the ‘necessities of life’ such as 24/7 sanitary restroom facilities, a 24/7 water source, showers, laundry, cooling and warming stations, and a place for resources and communication, plus a place to meet agency caseworkers to obtain assistance.”

Bill Turner, president of the Mercy Rest Stop Coalition Board of Directors,

spoke with the Democrat on Thursday about the misconceptions.

“It is with great disappointment the Mercy Rest Stop Coalition Board of Directors has discovered that a great deal of false information about the intended purpose of this service has been spread throughout the community,” he said.

“This has caused residents near the project site

undue stress and anxiety,” he continued. “We have taken immediate steps to bring them the truth...”

Turner has worked with Sedalia Second Ward Councilwoman Tina Boggess to clarify the purpose of the facility by creating a fact sheet. He added the board wishes to thank Boggess for helping them to understand the present situation.

Ruling raises new questions about remote testimony in court

An overturned conviction in Missouri is raising new questions about video testimony in criminal court cases nationwide, and the ruling could have ripple effects through a justice system increasingly reliant on remote technology as it struggles with a backlog of cases during the coronavirus pandemic.

Missouri's highest court on Tuesday reversed the statutory rape conviction of Rodney Smith in a case from St. Louis, finding that an investigator's video testimony violated the defendant's Sixth Amendment right to confront the witnesses against him.

The investigator appeared remotely in 2019 because he was on paternity leave, testifying that DNA evidence taken from the victim's clothing matched the defendant's DNA. The girl had since recanted her accusations, so the conviction and sentence of probation turned on the DNA evidence.

Many state and federal courts halted all criminal trials for months during the pandemic, allowing remote trials only when defendants explicitly agreed to forfeit any rights to in-person confrontation of their accusers. The Missouri ruling differs from many pandemic-era cases because the judge went ahead despite the defendant's objections.

State court systems typically handle millions of cases every year in total, the vast majority of which will not be directly affected by the legal questions raised in the Missouri ruling. The number of trials also plummeted during the pandemic. But even if that decision impacts only several hundred cases, it would mean yet more challenges for an already overburdened judiciary.

The decision could eventually make this

a test case for the U.S. Supreme Court, said Michael Wolff, a former chief justice of the Missouri Supreme Court and a professor at the St. Louis University School of Law.

"This guy was convicted with the use of Zoom technology and could not have been convicted without it," Wolff said. The nation's highest court has allowed exemptions for child witnesses to testify remotely to shield them from a potentially traumatic experience, but "you still don't get away from the fact that the Constitution says there's a right to confrontation."

The U.S. Supreme Court has grappled with the legal ramifications of remote testimony for decades, though the constitutional questions it raises have never been fully answered.

A landmark ruling in *Maryland v. Craig* in 1990 upheld a trial judge's decision to let a victim of child abuse testify remotely. In a 5-4 decision, the court said the Sixth Amendment doesn't guarantee an "absolute right" to in-person confrontations, especially if remote testimony "is necessary to further an important public policy." It said lessening the trauma of testifying to a child was a compelling public interest.

The dissenters said the Constitution provided no wiggle room and that the point was "to place the witness under the sometimes hostile glare of the defendant." Some of those same justices were in the majority 14 years later in *Crawford v. Washington*, which asserted that the right to confront an accuser in person was near-to-absolute.

Recently, the Minnesota State Court of Appeals differed from the Missouri court by ruling that allowing a witness to testify via live, remote two-way video did not violate a defendant's rights.

During the pandemic,

multiple trial-level state and federal courts have displayed care in not appearing to trample on the principle, which dates to Roman times, that those accused of crimes that could cost them their freedom have a right to confront their accusers.

In August, the Commonwealth of Kentucky Court of Appeals upheld a lower court's decision denying a prosecutor's request to let one witness testify by video at a fraud trial from prison because traveling to court would put him and others at risk of getting COVID-19. The appeals court said "general concerns about the spread of the virus do not justify abridging a defendant's right to in-person confrontation" and that prosecutors never proved the witness was particularly vulnerable to COVID-19.

"The fundamental question has been this: is a remote witness testifying by technology functionally the same as being there?" said Fredric Lederer, chancellor professor of law and director of the Center for Legal and Court Technology at William & Mary Law School. "We don't know if this is constitutional at this point."

Remote technology has helped drive down no-show rates in many areas by allowing people to attend even if they have to work or care for children, said David Slayton with the National Center for State Courts.

Still, especially in criminal proceedings, testifying in person can help show witnesses are speaking voluntarily. People often take body language into account as they are judging truthfulness, but research has raised serious questions about the widely held idea that people can gauge trustworthiness better in person, Lederer said.

"There really is no science to back that up," he said. "At all. Quite the

opposite."

While the original Missouri case unfolded before the pandemic began, the use of remote video during court proceedings has expanded exponentially since it took hold.

"This potentially affects every criminal case in which a prosecutor wants to present a remote witness," he said.

But in many pandemic-era proceedings, defendants have agreed to waive their Sixth Amendment rights so trials can go forward. The Missouri case was different in that the defendant objected to the investigator appearing remotely.

"If there was not an objection, I think the courts would be wary about upsetting the results of a conviction," Wolff said.

In St. Louis County, for example, prosecutors are confident in the convictions they have secured during the pandemic, largely because defendants waived the right to confront witnesses in person, said Chris King, spokesman for Prosecuting Attorney Wesley Bell. "So there should be no grounds for appeal," King said.

Defense attorney Nina McDonnell argued the recently decided Missouri case and said the ruling is especially important during the pandemic.

"It makes it clear that it should be up to what rights (defendants) want to give up or maintain, not any other factor," said McDonnell, an assistant public defender in St. Louis.

Two years into the COVID-19 pandemic "we know it's not the same thing" to have video testimony, McDonnell said. "That's why courts are scrambling to reopen."

MoDOT urges caution in weekend travel

Accumulating snow is forecast for much of the state Friday evening beginning in the northwestern part of the state and moving southeast overnight continuing through Saturday. The Missouri Department of Transportation urges people to avoid travel if possible. If you must travel Friday night or Saturday, use extra caution, anticipate slower travel times and consult the Traveler Information Map for road conditions.

"The forecast is calling for a wet, heavy snow accumulating on

roads throughout the day Saturday," said Natalie Roark, MoDOT state maintenance director. "The heavier the snow, the more difficult it is to clear. Motorists should be prepared for delays or — if possible — should stay off the roads during periods of heavy snowfall to give our crews a chance to work."

All available crews will be out across the state working 12-hour shifts, but staffing is still short across the state due to turnover and sickness.

"It may take crews

longer to return roads to a mostly clear status after the storm ends Saturday," Roark said.

Should you be involved in a minor crash or slide off the road, remain in your vehicle with the seat belt buckled. Equip your vehicle with a winter weather emergency kit before you travel in winter weather. Include any necessary medications, a phone charger, a blanket, bottled water, nonperishable foods and a flashlight. For more items to include in a winter weather emer-

gency kit, visit modot.org/winter.

Check current Missouri road conditions on the Traveler Information Map at www.modot.org, or through MoDOT's smartphone app. You can also find road conditions and warnings by following MoDOT on Facebook and Twitter or by calling 888-ASK-MODOT (888-275-6636) to speak with a customer service representative 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

State education board keeps 36-hour virtual learning rule

NORMANDY, Mo. (AP) — School districts struggling with staff absences because of COVID-19 are facing difficult decisions about how to provide the required number of instruction hours while being limited in the number of hours of virtual learning permitted.

The state allows school districts to provide 36 hours — about a week — of alternative instruction out of the 1,044 total hours of instruction required each school year.

Districts that close temporarily because of staff absences could be required to extend the school year to meet the 1,044 hour requirement, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported.

For example, an elementary school in the Normandy Schools Collaborative in St. Louis reached the 36-hour limit on Thursday and Normandy High School is close.

Mike Jones of the Normandy School Board this week called state leaders "Neanderthals who belong to a different age" for not giving districts more flexibility to move online during the latest surge of the virus.

The State Board of Education maintained the 36-hour limit on Tuesday after hearing a presentation about the problem.

Mallory McGowin, spokeswoman for the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, acknowledged many schools currently are struggling to find enough staff for in-person learning.

But she said education officials continue to believe schools are among the safest places for most Missouri students.

2 children killed in Missouri mobile home fire

ST. ROBERT, Mo. (AP) — Two children were killed and two other people were injured in a Missouri mobile home fire, authorities say.

The Waynesville Rural Fire Protection District said in a Facebook post that crews from throughout the region responded Wednesday night to the scene northeast of the town of St. Robert. They found two victims outside the mobile home and then pulled two trapped victims out of the burning structure.

Two children were pronounced dead at Fort Leonard Wood hospital and a third youth was flown to a Springfield hospital for treatment, the post said. The fourth victim, a man, was taken to a nearby hospital.

The names of the victims weren't immediately released.

The Missouri State Fire Marshal's office is investigating the cause of the fire.

29 charged in 6-state shoplifting ring that hit pharmacies

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — State and federal authorities announced Thursday that they arrested and charged more than two dozen people for taking part in a multistate shoplifting ring that made off with more than \$10 million in stolen goods over the past few years, most of which was over-the-counter medications.

U.S. Attorney Clint Johnson in Tulsa and Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor announced state and federal charges against 29 defendants. Johnson said 25 of those charged had been arrested and four others were still at large.

Prosecutors said the defendants took part in a conspiracy to steal mostly over-the-counter medications from retailers such as Walmart, Costco, Walgreens, CVS and GNC in Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. The ringleaders would then arrange for the sale of the items on websites such as Amazon and eBay.

"Consumers and businesses incur a high price for thieves who commit larcenies and profit by selling their stolen goods to well-organized theft

rings," said Tulsa Police Chief Wendell Franklin, whose department launched its investigation in 2019 after an organized crime investigator from a pharmacy retailer shared information about bulk thefts from its Tulsa-area locations. "Thieves should take notice. Tulsa is not going to capitulate and allow criminals to disrupt commerce in our city."

Prosecutors allege that a 48-year-old Tulsa woman, Linda Been, led the ring, which netted an estimated \$4.5 million from the sale of stolen goods such as Flonase, Mucinex, Nexium and Allegra to fencing organizations outside of Oklahoma that then sold the merchandise on e-commerce sites. They allege that Been, whose name is listed in jail records as Linda Gann, would provide shoplifters with a detailed list of items to steal and pay for their expenses when they traveled out of state. She also would pay for the shoplifters' bond if they were arrested, prosecutors allege.

State and federal court records don't indicate whether Been has an attorney who might speak on her behalf.

Biden chooses 3 for Fed board, including first Black woman

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Joe Biden will nominate three people for the Federal Reserve's Board of Governors, including Sarah Bloom Raskin, a former Fed and Treasury official, for the top regulatory slot and Lisa Cook, who would be the first Black woman to serve on the Fed's board.

Biden will also nominate Phillip Jefferson, an economist, dean of faculty at Davidson College in North Carolina and a former Fed researcher, according to a person familiar with the decision Thursday who was not authorized to speak on the record. The three nominees, who will have to be confirmed by the Senate, would fill out the Fed's seven-member board.

The nominees would join the Fed at a particularly challenging time in which the central bank will undertake the delicate task of raising its benchmark interest rate to try to curb high inflation, without undercutting the recovery from the pandemic recession. On Wednesday, the government reported that inflation reached a four-decade high in December. Inflation has become the economy's most serious problem, a burden for millions of American households and a political threat to the Biden administration.

Raskin's nomination

to the position of Fed vice chair for supervision — the nation's top bank regulator — will be welcomed by progressive senators and advocacy groups, who see her as likely to take a tougher approach to bank regulation than Randal Quarles, a Trump appointee who stepped down from that post last month. She is also viewed as someone committed to incorporating climate change considerations into the Fed's oversight of banks. For that reason, though, she has already drawn opposition from some Republican senators.

A Harvard-trained lawyer, Raskin, 60, previously served on the Fed's seven-member board from 2010 to 2014. President Barack Obama then chose her to serve as deputy Treasury secretary, the No. 2 job in the department.

As Fed governors, Raskin, Cook and Jefferson would vote on interest-rate policy decisions at the eight meetings each year of the Fed's policymaking committee, which also includes the 12 regional Fed bank presidents.

Raskin's first term as a Fed governor followed her work as Maryland's commissioner of financial regulation. Before her government jobs, Raskin had worked as a lawyer at Arnold & Porter, a high-profile Washington firm, and as a managing director at the Promontory Financial Group.

Kathleen Murphy, CEO of the Massachusetts Bank-

ers Association, worked with Raskin when Raskin was Maryland's banking regulator from 2007 to 2010 and Murphy led the Maryland bankers' group. Murphy said the state's financial industry regarded her as a "strong regulator but a fair regulator."

"She has always had a very collaborative approach," Murphy said. "She wanted to make sure all the voices were at the table when decisions were made."

Still, Raskin is likely to draw fire from critics for her progressive views on climate change and the oil and gas industry. Two years ago, in an opinion column in The New York Times, she criticized the Fed's willingness to support lending to oil and gas companies as part of its efforts to bolster the financial sector in the depths of the pandemic recession.

"The decisions the Fed makes on our behalf should build toward a stronger economy with more jobs in innovative industries — not prop up and enrich dying ones," Raskin wrote, referring to oil and gas providers.

On Thursday, Sen. Pat Toomey, the top Republican on the Senate Banking Committee, criticized Raskin for having "explicitly advocated that the Fed allocate capital by denying it to this disfavored sector."

Raskin is married to Rep. Jamie Raskin, a liberal Maryland Democrat who gained widespread visibility as a member of the

House Judiciary Committee when it brought impeachment charges against President Donald Trump.

If confirmed, Cook, together with Jefferson, would be the fourth and fifth Black members of the Fed's Board of Governors in its 108-year history. She has been a professor of economics and international relations at Michigan State since 2005. She was also a staff economist on the White House Council of Economic Advisers from 2011 to 2012 and was an adviser to the Biden-Harris transition team on the Fed and bank regulatory policy.

Cook is best-known for her research on the impact of racial violence on African-American invention and innovation. A 2013 paper she wrote concluded that racially motivated violence, by undermining the rule of law and threatening personal security, depressed patent awards to Black Americans by 15% annually between 1882 and 1940 — a loss that she found also held back the broader U.S. economy.

In an interview in October, Cook said that despite encouragement from prominent economists such as Milton Friedman and George Akerlof, she struggled for years to get the paper published. The major economics journals, she said, typically didn't deal with "patents, or economic history, or anything that related to African-Americans."

Supreme Court halts COVID-19 vaccine rule for US businesses

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has stopped a major push by the Biden administration to boost the nation's COVID-19 vaccination rate, a requirement that employees at large businesses get a vaccine or test regularly and wear a mask on the job.

At the same time, the court is allowing the administration to proceed with a vaccine mandate for most health care workers in the U.S. The court's orders Thursday came during a spike in coronavirus cases caused by the omicron variant.

The court's conservative majority concluded the administration overstepped

its authority by seeking to impose the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's vaccine-or-test rule on U.S. businesses with at least 100 employees. More than 80 million people would have been affected and OSHA had estimated that the rule would save 6,500 lives and prevent 250,000 hospitalizations over six months.

"OSHA has never before imposed such a mandate. Nor has Congress. Indeed, although Congress has enacted significant legislation addressing the COVID-19 pandemic, it has declined to enact any measure similar to what OSHA has promulgated here," the conservatives wrote in an unsigned opinion.

In dissent, the court's three liberals argued that

it was the court that was overreaching by substituting its judgment for that of health experts. "Acting outside of its competence and without legal basis, the Court displaces the judgments of the Government officials given the responsibility to respond to workplace health emergencies," Justices Stephen Breyer, Elena Kagan and Sonia Sotomayor wrote in a joint dissent.

President Joe Biden said he was "disappointed that the Supreme Court has chosen to block common-sense life-saving requirements for employees at large businesses that were grounded squarely in both science and the law."

Biden called on businesses to institute their own vaccination require-

ments, noting that a third of Fortune 100 companies already have done so.

When crafting the OSHA rule, White House officials always anticipated legal challenges — and privately some harbored doubts that it could withstand them. The administration nonetheless still views the rule as a success at already driving millions of people to get vaccinated and encouraging private businesses to implement their own requirements that are unaffected by the legal challenge.

The OSHA regulation had initially been blocked by a federal appeals court in New Orleans, then allowed to take effect by a federal appellate panel in Cincinnati.

Both rules had been

challenged by Republican-led states. In addition, business groups attacked the OSHA emergency regulation as too expensive and likely to cause workers to leave their jobs at a time when finding new employees already is difficult.

The National Retail Federation, the nation's largest retail trade group, called the Supreme Court's decision "a significant victory for employers."

The vaccine mandate that the court will allow to be enforced nationwide scraped by on a 5-4 vote, with Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Brett Kavanaugh joining the liberals to form a majority. The mandate covers virtually all health care workers in the country, applying to providers that

receive federal Medicare or Medicaid funding. It affects 10.4 million workers at 76,000 health care facilities as well as home health care providers. The rule has medical and religious exemptions.

Biden said that decision by the court "will save lives."

In an unsigned opinion, the court wrote: "The challenges posed by a global pandemic do not allow a federal agency to exercise power that Congress has not conferred upon it. At the same time, such unprecedented circumstances provide no grounds for limiting the exercise of authorities the agency has long been recognized to have." It said the "latter principle governs" in the health care arena.

The buses' number will be displayed in the bus's front window, so parents should note their student's pickup and drop-off location, pickup time, and bus number.

Students with special needs who qualify for transportation as

a related service will continue to ride their bus as usual. Loftus Early Childhood Center students are also not affected by the changes in this plan.

First Student Sedalia Location Manager Connie Miller said that in the 44 years she has worked at First Student, she has never seen something like this happen.

Miller, who helped develop the plan, said

she tried to set the community pick-up locations so students don't have to cross major roads. Families can pick the stop closest to their home or most convenient for them.

"I tried to center them far enough away from each other but yet close enough so that the children in town could walk, but a parent would probably have to take them because they're over

the 2 miles from school and centralized from different areas that from where the buses are," Miller said.

Miller explained what would happen if more students were at a community pick-up than fit on a bus.

"I have a couple of standbys out there just in case of that..." Triplett said. "Once a driver starts to get half full, they will call into base and say I'm getting

there and there will be another bus that will go out there."

The first bus won't leave students at a stop by themselves, so the driver will wait for the next bus to show up. If the weather is bad, the students waiting for the next bus will stand in the first one to avoid the weather.

Triplett and Miller said the hope is that the district and First Student never have to

put this contingency plan into action, but it is available if a situation were to happen.

"Lots of training and hiring, we're getting applicants for lifeguards, fitness instructors, front desk, child watch, we're hiring custodians as well," Epple said. "We're taking those applications, we're doing interviews, and will start training here in February."

Right now, the hiring process is paramount as Epple wants to be fully staffed to hit the ground running.

"Our staff will be over there training lifeguards in the pool by mid-February as well other training because there's a lot of things that happen, we don't just open the door and say, 'go to your spot,'" Epple said. "Training is really one of the biggest things I push for with my staff."

Thursday, the board approved a change order from Paric for \$45,877 to put a drain at the Third Street entrance where water was pooling up. Epple took the added expense in stride.

"This is a \$26.4 million project, this is the second change order that we've asked them to approve, so I think we're very fortunate,"

Epple said. "We don't want that rainwater freezing or anything else and cars sliding right there, so wish we didn't have to do it, but it needs to happen and we'll get it done and it's correct then."

Parks and Rec staff have been running the numbers on baseball concessions and the stands are losing money due to COVID, rising food prices, and labor costs.

"We're looking at almost \$25 an hour," Epple said. "It's \$100 a night per concession stand and then the cost of food and we're just not bringing in the money. It comes to a point where we've got to be financially responsible for taxpayers' money; a concession stand should not be losing money."

Epple will be going to the board in February asking for solutions, which may include branching out to other organizations or even utilizing food trucks.

The fact sheet states: "There's a great deal of misinformation about the Mercy Rest Stop and its purpose spreading through the community. The intent for the rest stop has always been to make valuable services available to everyone in the community. The following facts have been true from the start and will remain in place."

The facility will not and was never intended to be a homeless shelter.

Information on the fact sheet states:

- It is not a place where people will be allowed to sleep overnight inside the building except in two types of situations: 1. In extreme weather conditions, such as being too cold to be outside. When conditions improve, they will leave the facility. During such time, there will be onsite supervision. 2. When a family is in crisis, such as when their house burns down, they will be housed long enough to give them time to make other arrangements.
- The only 24/7 service provided is access to water and restrooms from the

outside of the building.

- Security cameras will be in operation both inside and outside 24/7.
- No illegal activities will be allowed in or around the property.
- Overnight camping will not be allowed on the property.
- Use of the parking lot for overnight stays will not be allowed.
- Patrons will receive free services such as job training, job placement, mental health counseling, medical referrals, spiritual counseling, laundry facility, showers, etc.
- The intent is to provide a hand up to those in need, not to

give handouts.

Turner added the project is widely supported by businesses, civic groups, churches, families and school children.

"The Mercy Rest Stop Coalition Board of Directors will not be deterred from making this project become a reality, nor will we betray our commitment to those in need of these services or the fine people of this community who have trusted us with their donations and support," Turner noted.

1 St. Louis firefighter dead, 1 injured in house collapse

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A St. Louis firefighter died Thursday and another was injured after a large house collapsed while the firefighters were searching to make sure no one was inside.

Fire Chief Dennis Jenkerson said the blaze broke out before noon at a 2 1/2-story structure in

north St. Louis. It wasn't clear if the home was vacant, and because homeless people often stay in vacant houses to keep warm in the winter, firefighters went into the burning building.

The firefighters extinguished the blaze on the first floor and went to the second, but the flames there were so intense they decided to leave, Jenkerson said. As the two firefighters were about to exit the second floor, the roof and upper floor of the brick home

collapsed on top of them.

The firefighter who died was identified as Benjamin Polson, who had been with the department since November 2019, fire officials said.

Jenkerson said Polson "was trapped under a tremendous amount of debris until we dug him out."

The second firefighter was injured from the initial collapse and while trying to rescue Polson, Jenkerson said. His condition wasn't immediately known.

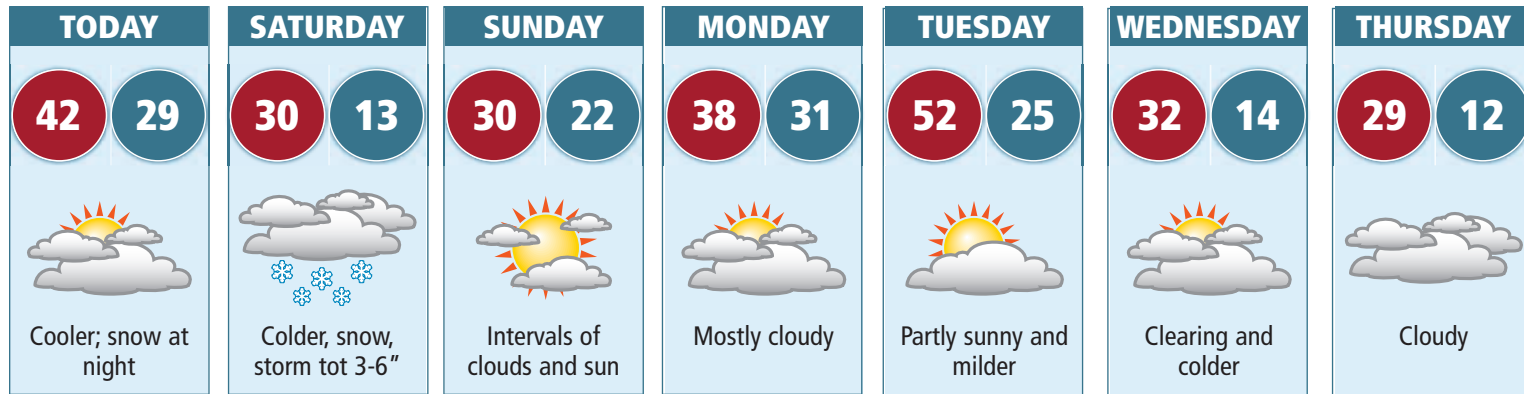
"We get paid to protect lives. We get paid to take a risk and, you know, it's hard to tell somebody on the street who is yelling and screaming at us that there might be someone in there, well this risk might be too great," Jenkerson said. "So we take the risk and unfortunately, terribly the risk we took today wasn't worth it. We lost a firefighter."

The fire damaged several nearby homes. The cause has not been determined.

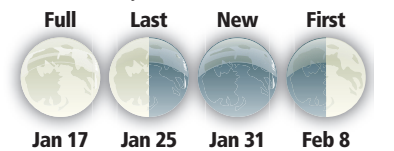

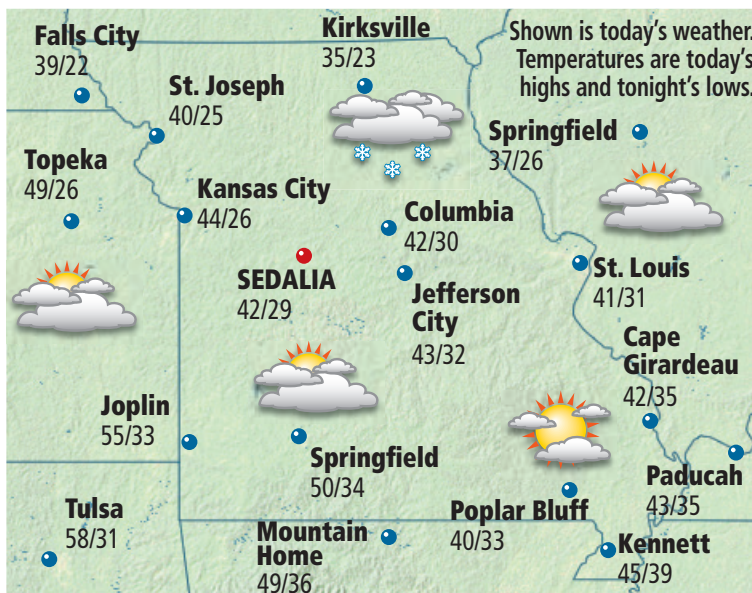

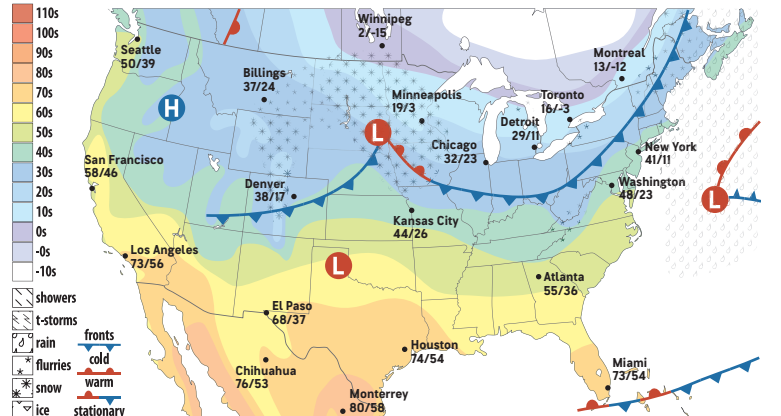

WARRENSBURG — After 36 combined years of service at the University of Central Missouri, 13 as head coach, Flip Piontek has announced his retirement from Jennies volleyball.

Caitlin Peterson, who's spent a combined 17 seasons with a program as a coach and student

athlete, has been named the program's next head coach.

Piontek will remain on Peterson's staff as an assistant until officially retiring June 30.

"Having Caitlin here with her loyalty to the Jennies volleyball program made it an easy decision for me to switch roles with her for a while to make the transition easier and then retire at the end of June," Piontek said

Say it ain't so, Joe: Haden eyes last stand in Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Joe Haden felt terrible in the middle of last week as symptoms of COVID-19 took their toll.

A day later, the veteran Pittsburgh Steelers defensive back left better. Physically, anyway. Mentally, Haden feared his second time in the league's protocols would end the same way the first did: with Haden watching on TV as Pittsburgh's season came to a swift end.

A year ago, Haden was a well-compensated bystander as the Steelers were run off Heinz Field by Cleveland in the first round of the playoffs. He couldn't shake a familiar feeling as Pittsburgh prepared to face Baltimore last weekend with a shot at the postseason on the line.

"I was pissed," Haden said with a laugh Thursday. "I was so upset. The only thing I wanted to know was, 'Is there any way I can get back playing?'"

Haden did exit the protocols in time to make four tackles in a 16-13 overtime

victory over the Ravens that helped push the Steelers (9-7-1) into an improbable trip to Kansas City (12-5) on Sunday to face Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs. While Haden played less than half of Pittsburgh's defensive snaps, his presence helped a unit that's been uneven at best find a way to limit the Ravens to just one touchdown.

His reward? At least one more week in black and gold and just the second playoff game of his 12-year career. That's not a great ratio, and Haden knows it. It's why he's telling his teammates — particularly players like first-year defensive back Tre Norwood — not to take the opportunity for granted. Haden spent the first seven seasons of his career playing for bad Cleveland teams. He knows how rare the opportunities to play deep into January are — and how easily they can be taken away.

So he is attempting to savor every moment, as fleeting as it may be for a player in the final year of his contract who will likely be elsewhere next fall.

Chiefs have Kelce, Hill vs Steelers this time around

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The last time the Kansas City Chiefs played the Pittsburgh Steelers, their record-setting wide receiver had just recovered from COVID-19 and their star tight end was sitting at home and still dealing with the virus.

They still rolled to a 36-10 victory at Arrowhead Stadium.

Should give the Chiefs a lot of confidence for the rematch in the wild-card round of the playoffs Sunday night.

"It was a pretty frustrating time," Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce said. "I think even though I had some symptoms, it was nothing that would keep me out of the facility, and practicing

and going to play in a game. It was pretty frustrating to not go out there with my guys. But once the game started, I had fun watching us go to work. We were hitting on all cylinders."

That's a considerable understatement.

Even without Kelce on the field, and with Tyreek Hill slowed by the illness, Patrick Mahomes still threw for 258 yards and three scores. He hit nine different targets, turning Byron Pringle and Mecole Hardman into fantasy fill-in heroes.

The defense did its part, too. It pitched a first-half shutout, helping Kansas City build a 23-0 lead, and hardly faltered down the stretch. By the time the clock hit zeros, the Steelers

SKC re-signs mainstays Zusi, Espinoza

A Sporting Kansas City depth chart still looking rather thin at some positions filled out with familiar names Thursday.

The club announced that it had reached agreements to re-sign Graham Zusi and Roger Espinoza, two of its longest tenured players. Both were inked to one-year deals, with Zusi's including an option for 2023.

In particular, Zusi, who had a strong 2021 campaign as the team's

starting right back, would have been a surprise to move on.

"It would have had to be outrageous for me to consider [going elsewhere in free agency]," Zusi said in a media call Thursday.

The 35-year-old is a seven-time MLS All-Star who has been with the club since being drafted in 2009. He is Sporting's all-time leader in appearances (373 matches) and ranks highly in a number of other major categories. A midfielder earlier in his career, Zusi charts as second in SKC's all-time lead-

ers in assists (87), minutes (29,980) and starts (327), and stands 10th in goals scored with 33. At the international level, he's been capped 55 times for the U.S. Men's National Team, including four matches at the 2014 FIFA World Cup.

An early December trade of 21-year-old Jaylin Lindsey, who seemed to be the heir apparent at right back, seemed to clear the way for the return of Zusi with the club already needing to fill holes at the opposite outside back spot, among others.

White eyes curtain call as Kim preps for another Olympic run

The nicknames are retired. The mop of red hair that once served as Shaun White's signature look more than a decade ago is long gone.

The torch the now 35-year-old snowboarding icon carried so capably for so long since his first gold-medal-winning run down the halfpipe in Torino 16 years ago has been picked up by a series of newcomers who grew up watching him.

The group — led by two-time Japanese silver medalist Ayumu Hirano — will stand at the top of the pipe in Genting Snow Park looking to do what's only been done once in the last four Games: stand atop the podium with White and the rest of the sport looking up.

For the first time in his career, White will head into the Olympics not as the favorite but the lion in winter trying to summon the kind of magic that's been hard to come

by since he returned for a three-year hiatus.

White didn't lock up a spot on Team USA until the final days of qualifying and hasn't stood atop the medal stand since that pressure-packed final with Hirano and Australia's Scotty James in Pyeongchang, where he collapsed into the arms of his mother Cathy after the medal ceremony, physically and emotionally drained.

He's back for what is almost certainly one last run, where he'll get an up-close look at a changing of the guard. The Japanese, led by Hirano and world champion Yuto Totsuka, have dominated the halfpipe with the kind of boundary-pushing tricks that used to be White's domain.

Hirano became the first snowboarder to land a "triple cork" — three head-over-board flips — in competition in December, the next logical step in progression four years after White won gold by drilling consecutive double cork 1440s

(four twists). It's a step Hirano has made thanks in large part to being pushed by Totsuka and younger brother Kaishu.

"(The Japanese) have a great team culture," said Mike Jankowski, head coach of the U.S. Olympic snowboarding and freestyle skiing programs. "You see them all day. They're having fun. They're laughing. I mean, obviously, they're fierce competitors and they're out there to win. But they're also the camaraderie that I see with them, it's fun."

The increasingly high risk-reward nature of the sport adds a layer of uncertainty that the sport's marquee event has lacked.

At least on the men's side. Things are a bit clearer on the women's halfpipe, where American Chloe Kim will look to bookend the gold medal she captured as a fresh-faced teenager in Korea four years ago.

While Kim understands the pressure she will face in China as the

only one in the competition with an Olympic gold medal at home, she's hardly out of her comfort zone. She came to Korea as the sport's Next Big Thing and left it as a champion while navigating a white-hot spotlight courtesy of her precociousness and her Korean heritage.

By comparison, doing it again seems like no big deal. If anything, she's come to embrace the stakes. It showed during a pre-Olympic event in December when she drilled the last of her three runs to edge Spain's Queralta Castellet.

"It was weird though because that third run was the most calm I felt," Kim said. "It was really an all-or-nothing feeling. I think in those moments you get like you get this serene sensation where it's like just going for broke, you know?"

Or in Kim's case, going for gold.

Other things to look for during a very busy three weeks in Zhangjiakou.

"Once you get in, everybody is on an equal playing field," Haden said. "It doesn't really matter what side you are, how you got in. It's three games to the Super Bowl. In four games, you are Super Bowl champ."

Even if the idea of the Steelers — who are nearly two-touchdown underdogs to the two-time defending AFC champion Chiefs, according to FanDuel Sportsbook — putting together an extended run seems unlikely. Any shot Pittsburgh has at slowing down Kansas City relies heavily on Haden and the rest of the defensive backfield find a way to keep Patrick Mahomes, Tyreek Hill and Travis Kelce in check. Haden will need to be at his best, some-

thing he can still summon regularly more than a decade into his career.

Haden didn't have an interception, just the second time in 12 years that's happened during a season in which he played at least 10 games. But he still made an impact. In a 19-13 win over AFC South champion Tennessee last month, Haden recovered a fumble to set up a field goal and held Titans wide receiver Nick Westbrook-Ikhine short of the first-down marker in the final seconds to preserve the victory.

"That was a huge play," defensive coordinator Keith Butler said. "And he's come up with those plays like that for us and he's been around the league for a long time."

Just, it seems, not much longer in Pittsburgh. With so many needs in other areas — particularly along the offensive and defensive lines — he's likely too expensive for the Steelers to keep around.

Still, the example of profes-

sionalism he's set over the last five years will linger in a room filled with younger players like Norwood and James Pierre. One of them, as Butler pointed out, is how to live well — if you can afford it.

"I mean, obviously, he drives around with a chauffeur," Butler said with a laugh of Haden, who has earned more than \$121 million in his career. "So he's done pretty good in this league. He's not daggummit hurting for anything, that's for sure. But I love Joe. He's a great guy. He's a great guy to have on our team, that's for sure."

NOTES: WR JuJu Smith-Schuster's season might not be over after all. Smith-Schuster, who underwent right shoulder surgery in October, practiced on Thursday for the first time since getting hurt in a win over Denver on Oct. 10. Coach Mike Tomlin did not say whether Smith-Schuster could be available on Sunday.

Now, they have to figure out a way to slow down the same team with two of the league's best at nearly full speed.

"I think they're probably better equipped to answer in terms of the impact of the presence of those guys and what they mean," Steelers coach Mike Tomlin said. "Obviously, we have a bunch of tape to look at and we respect what they're capable of, their talents and how they utilize their talents."

Kelce just might be the best tight end in history once he gets the ball in his hands. He's not the

fastest player, or the most athletic, but he has an uncanny ability to find the open field and turn a short gain into a big one. He had 92 catches for 1,125 yards, and 564 of those yards came after the catch — the seventh-best total in the NFL this year.

Even though he missed the Pittsburgh game in December, Kelce still eclipsed 1,000 yards for a sixth straight year.

"There's a lot of teams that won't be out there this week, and it's a blessing," Kelce said. "It's a blessing to be here in Kansas City and have the success that we've had over my entire nine years in the league, and I just try to take advantage of those opportunities because not everybody gets them."

Kelce's feeling so blessed these days that he just laughed off the fact that Hill, whom he described as "one of my favorite teammates ever," broke his franchise record for receptions with 111 this season.

"That one is supposed to belong to a wide receiver," Kelce said.

Only two of Hill's catches came against the Steelers, though, when he was noticeably slowed by the effects of COVID-19. He mostly served as a decoy, which freed up the rest of the Kansas City wide receivers to run wild.

That won't be the case on Sunday night.

"He's a special player. He makes the defense

account for everybody," Mahomes said. "To have his speed on the field, it makes defenses play different coverages. They know they can't put him in man-to-man situations because of how talented he is."

Even though they didn't see Kelce or Hill in December, the Steelers are intimately familiar with them. They need only look back to their game in Pittsburgh in 2018, when Kelce caught seven passes for 102 yards and a touchdown and Hill reeled in five for 90 yards and another score; Mahomes wound up with six TD passes in a 42-37 victory.

"We got to work hard to keep a lid on it," Tomlin said. "We're going to be challenged in total, but it's January ball. That's what we signed up for, that's what I'm looking forward to living it out with the group that we have."

Notes: RB Clyde Edwards-Helaire (shoulder) did not practice Thursday. He worked on a limited basis Wednesday. ... One of the problems

the last two weeks of the regular season for Kansas City was missed tackles, and it's something defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo addressed this week. "We want to play better than we did the last two games. I think we'd all agree with that," Spagnuolo said. "What we're faced with is no margin for error. That's the first thing we talked about."

TE Darren Waller returns to provide boost for Raiders

For Las Vegas Raiders star tight end Darren Waller, the hardest part about his five-week absence for injuries and COVID-19 wasn't the rehabilitation or the inability to play in crucial games down the stretch for his team.

It was all the idle time that was hardest to navigate for a player who battles daily to remain sober after nearly throwing away his career because of drugs and alcohol.

"My disease of addiction, that can have me thinking all kinds of crazy things," Waller said. "I've got to make sure that I'm talking about those things when I have all that idle time. I've got my therapist, stay going to (Alcoholics Anonymous) meetings. Stayed in the playbook. Working on music. Just staying solid, keeping my head out of that idle time and just into things that I enjoy and stay into the game of football as much as I can."

Waller made it through that stretch and managed to return to the field for last week's season finale, which sent the Raiders to their second postseason trip in the past 19 years.

Las Vegas will visit Cincinnati on Saturday in the wild-card round, ending a stretch of futility that weighed on everyone in the organization.

"To see this happen now is awesome to see but I'm also not surprised the least bit that we're here," Waller said. "I believe this is a work in progress over the years. It's awesome to see that happen and build that new culture here. I feel like Al Davis would be proud."

Waller has been a big part of the turnaround since being plucked off Baltimore's practice squad late in the 2018 season where he was languishing after being suspended twice for violating the league's substance abuse policy.

Waller quickly became a star with the Raiders, catching 90 passes for 1,145 yards in 2019 and

then catching a team-record 107 passes for 1,196 yards and nine TDs last season.

Waller hasn't been as productive this season as he missed one game in October with an ankle injury, then five more following a knee injury on Thanksgiving in Dallas and then one more when he tested positive for COVID-19 just when he was ready to return to practice.

Waller has just 55 catches for 665 yards and two TDs on the season but his presence helps open up the offense for other players.

The Raiders were happy to get Waller back last week against the Chargers, even if he only had two catches for 22 yards on nine targets.

"With Darren and I, there was some rust there and some miscommunications and little things here and there that's easily fixable and easily correctable," quarterback Derek Carr said. "I mean we're correcting it on the field kind of thing and all that."

The Raiders survived the stretch without Waller, winning three straight games before the

finale thanks to slot receiver Hunter Renfrow's emergence as Carr's top target, a spark from the running game and an improved defense.

Watching that can sometimes be difficult.

"It's tough, honestly, because I'm a human being at the end of the day and I'm still trying to shed some of my old thinking patterns," he said. "So, when I'm not out there, I can think these thoughts of, 'The team is balling without me being in there. Am I useless?' Just these irrational thoughts. It is tough for me."

But Waller said he has learned how to deal with those doubts and knows he plays a role even when he's not playing and is able to remain locked in on his task.

And his teammates and coaches know how important he is.

"We all know he's a great player," offensive coordinator Greg Olson said. "We'll continue to target Darren as we move forward as long as he's up and he's healthy and he's playing for us, then we're going to target him. He's a difficult player to defend and I think everybody understands that."

"I am incredibly honored to be the next head coach of this historic program," Peterson said in the release. To this day, she is still No. 2 all-time in career UCM assists with 5,502. Following her collegiate career, she was a graduate assistant for Piontek before joining Martin for a single season as an assistant at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Alabama.

"I'm excited to welcome Caitlin as the next head coach of Jennies volleyball," Central Missouri vice president of intercollegiate athletics Jerry Hughes said in the release. "She has been an integral part of the storied history of the Jen-

nies volleyball program as both a student-athlete and coach and will without a doubt continue the celebrated history of success within the Central Missouri volleyball program."

Piontek became the head coach of the Jennies in 2009 and coached the Jennies to six MIAA regular season crowns, three MIAA postseason tournament titles, two NCAA Regional Championships and 10 NCAA Tournament appearances.

He coached 32 AVCA All-Americans and 82 All-MIAA selections. The conference honors included 2011 MIAA Player of the Year Allie Huffman, 2013 MIAA Player of the Year Julie Bates, 2015 MIAA Player of the Year Carly Sojka and 2021 MIAA Player of the Year Au-

drey Fisher.

He received the MIAA Coach of the Year Award four times and the Regional Coach of the Year award four times.

Before becoming head coach, he was an assistant coach under Martin for 23 seasons. He compiled a 332-78 (.810) as a head coach and 729-174 as an assistant. His combined 36 years tally to be a record of 1,061-252.

"I'd like to thank Flip for his outstanding 36 years with the Jennies volleyball program as both a head and assistant coach," Hughes said. "His track record speaks for itself, and he has continued the championship tradition of Central Missouri Jennies volleyball."

Peterson's transition to head coach becomes official Sunday, Jan. 16.

Espinoza, 35, opted for humor when asked whether the idea of joining another club was viable. He said that he was vacationing "around the world and [my] phone was off," and that he was unsure if

he'd received any offers.

The Honduran international has played 52 times for his country's senior side, appearing in two World Cups (2010 and 2014). He first came to the club in 2008 as a SuperDraft pick, and after becoming an all-star, spent two years with English side Wigan Athletic, some of that in the Premier League.

Afterward, he re-joined SKC

in 2015, helping the club to its U.S. Open Cup title that year, and another in 2017. Espinoza ranks third in overall appearances (335), starts (295) and minutes played (26,143), and fifth all-time in assists (43).

Espinoza is expected to still play a reasonable amount of minutes in the midfield to provide depth, even if his total of 2,097, and 24 starts, declines next season.
