EPA tells Sedalia to get the lead out

An EPA requirement for an expansive drinking water survey was brought to the attention of the Sedalia City

Council Monday night. Concerned with getting lead out of the water supply, the EPA is requiring municipalities like Sedalia to inventory their water supply lines.

Public Works director Brenda Ardrey explained the federal requirement to the council during her Fiscal Year 2024 strategic planning presentation.

Water Infrastructure Act lead-lined replacement will be required through an inventory," Ardrey said. "The city has to inventory all of our service lines going into homes, business, or other commercial structures by Oct. 16, 2024."

The most overwhelming part for Public Works was the government's demand that the city develop a plan to replace all lead service lines by 2034.

"The threshold for replacement is any line 10% of which is lead," Audrey said.

Pageantry evoking Churchill greets Zelenskyy in Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) — At a time of grave consequence, a wartime leader crossed the Atlantic to arrive at a White House decked in holiday decor to consult with the American president about a war in Europe.

The moment was Dec. 22, 1941, as British Prime Minister Winston Churchill landed near Washington to meet with President Franklin D. Roosevelt just weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor. Almost 81 years later to the day, the pageantry of that trip was echoed on Wednesday as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy arrived for a surprise visit with President Joe Biden and an address to Congress.

Zelenskyy is a changed leader since he last came to the White House more than a year ago, when Russia's bloody invasion of Ukraine was still over history's horizon. The former comedian was somber, even grim, in a black suit as he spoke about threats to his country's security. Now perpetually dressed in army green fatigues, he evokes comparisons to Churchill for his fierce defense of a country facing an existential

crisis. His heightened stature on the world stage was reflected as soon as he entered the White House grounds, where he was greeted by a color guard lining the driveway on a brisk winter day. A red carpet was waiting for him, and Zelenskyy shook hands with Biden and first lady Jill Biden.

Together, they posed for pictures before ducking into the building.

The two presidents walked to the Oval Office, where they sat in armchairs in front of a portrait of Roosevelt. There was a roaring fire in the fireplace and a Christmas garland draped over the mantle, giving the room a cozy holiday ambience despite the grim reason for the meeting.

Biden told Zelenskyy that the Ukrainian people "inspire the world" and said that "you are the man of the year in the United States of America," referencing Zelenskyy's recognition

from Time magazine. Zelenskyy, speaking in English, thanked Biden with "all my heart" for the American support. He presented Biden with a medal that had been awarded to the Ukrainian captain of a HIMARS battery, a rocket system provided by the U.S.

"He's very brave, and he said, give it to a very brave president," Zelenskyy said.

Biden called the gift "undeserved but much appreciated."

The war in Ukraine is the largest conflict in Europe since World War II, but it's often been discussed in abstract terms in Washington as officials debate how to help Ukraine.

Zelenskyy's presence eliminated that distance, if only for the several hours that he spent here. At a news conference with Biden at the White House, he ruminated on the potential for a "just peace" when the war ends.

As a national leader, he said, he wants to protect the "sovereignty, freedom and territorial

integrity of my country." But he also wondered about parents who have lost children.

"The longer the war lasts, the longer this aggression lasts, there will be more parents that live for the sake of vengeance," he said in Ukrainian. He briefly struggled

to find "the proper language" to describe the Russian invaders before settling on "these inhumans."

Still in his brown boots, Zelenskyy toured the U.S. Capitol rotunda with legislative leaders and addressed a joint meeting of Congress. Some lawmakers wore the Ukrainian colors of blue and yellow.

Zelenskyy received a standing ovation, and appeared almost bashful when he began speak-

"It's too much for me," he said.

Speaking again in English, Zelenskyy's voice was gravelly and defiant as he insisted that Ukraine "will never surrender" in the face of Russia's "primitive"

But the creases on his face betrayed fatigue from months of war and the whirlwind journey to Washington. He traveled under American protection, accompanied by the U.S. ambassador to Ukraine on a train to Poland. Then he was whisked to a U.S. government plane for the flight.

Security was tightened around the White House, with pedestrians barred from Pennsylvania Avenue. A privacy screen was erected at the entrance to Blair House, the traditional lodging for visiting dignitaries, to camouflage Zelenskyy when he arrived to prepare for his meeting with Biden.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., drew a connection between Zelenskyy and Churchill. Her father, Thomas D'Alesandro Jr., was a member of the House at the time of Churchill's 1941 visit. The British leader addressed Congress on the day after Christmas.

"Eighty-one years later this week, it is particularly poignant for me to be present when another heroic leader addresses the Congress in a time of war - and with Democracy itself on the line," Pelosi wrote in a letter to colleagues.

Ukraine has astounded the world with its ability to stave off the invasion, and it recently reclaimed some of its territory from Russian troops.

There are fresh concerns, however, about the future of a conflict approaching its second year. Russia has continued its aerial bombardment of Ukrainian cities, and Defense Minister Sergei Shoigu said his country's military would expand from 1 million to 1.5 million personnel.

At the end of his speech, Zelenskyy presented a Ukrainian flag, signed by soldiers near the front line, to Pelosi and Vice President Kamala Harris.

Pelosi returned the favor by gifting Zelenskyy a folded, framed American flag that had flown over the Capitol earlier in the day.

Zelenskyy held it aloft, then carried it with him, lawmakers patting him on the back as he rushed toward the exit, headed back to



Loved or hated, Fauci's parting advice: Stick to the science

WASHINGTON (AP) — Long before the bobbleheads and the "Fauci ouchie," Dr. Anthony Fauci was a straight-shooter about scary diseases - and "stick with the science" remains his mantra.

Fauci steps down from a five-decade career in public service at the end of the month, one shaped by the HIV pandemic early on and the COVID-19 pandemic at the end.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Fauci said he leaves excited by the vaccines - but worried that lies mark a "profoundly dangerous" time for public health and science.

"Untruths abound and we almost normalize untruths," Fauci said. "I worry about my own field of health, but I also worry about the country."

Fauci, who turns 82 on Christmas Eve, has been a physician-scientist at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases for 54 years, and its director for 38 of them.

Because he candidly puts complex science into plain English, Fauci has advised seven presidents, from Ronald Reagan to Joe Biden, about a long list of outbreaks - HIV, Ebola, Zika, bird flu, pandemic flu, even the 2001 anthrax attacks.

"Stick with the science and never be afraid to tell somebody something that is the truth - but it's an inconvenient truth in which there might be the possibility of the messenger getting shot," Fauci said. "You don't worry about that. You just keep telling the truth."

He added, with characteristic understatement: "That's served me really quite well with one exception that, you know, the truth generated a lot of hostility towards me in one administration."

For all his prior influence on national and even global responses to infectious diseases, it wasn't until COVID-19 paralyzed the world in early 2020 that Fauci became a household name -- giving the latest updates at daily White House press conferences and in frequent media interviews.

But eventually, Fauci found himself having to contradict then-President Donald Trump's attempts to downplay the severity of the viral threat and promote unproven treatments. Trump and his allies began attacking Fauci, who even received death threats that required a security detail for his protection.

As the world enters another year of COVID-19, Fauci still is a frequent target of the far right – but also remains a trusted voice for millions of Americans.

Under his watch, researchers at the National

Institutes of Health laid the scientific groundwork for the speedy development of powerful coronavirus vaccines. An analysis released by the Commonwealth Fund last week found the shots saved 3.2 million lives in the U.S. alone and prevented 18.5 million hospitalizations.

With another winter uptick underway, Fauci's disappointed that just 14% of people eligible for the updated COVID-19 boosters - shots that add protection against omicron strains have gotten one.

"That doesn't make any sense at all, when you have a vaccine that you know is life-saving," he said. But he's also looking forward to next-generation vaccines that do a better job of preventing infection, citing promising leads like nasal vaccines.

For all the political attacks, the public did struggle to understand why some of

his and others' health advice changed as the pandemic wore on — such as why masks first were deemed unnecessary and later mandated in certain places.

Fauci said one of the pandemic's lessons is to better convey that it's normal for messages to change as scientists make new discoveries.

"That doesn't mean you're flip-flopping. That means you're actually following the science," he said.

Fauci has had a hand in life-saving scientific advances for decades. As a young researcher at the National Institutes of Health, he helped develop highly effective therapies for rare but once-fatal blood vessel diseases known as vasculitis syndromes.

Then came the AIDS crisis and days that Fauci, treating patients in NIH's hospital, recalled as "very

dark and very difficult." "As a physician you're

trained to heal people. And

we weren't healing anybody. Everybody was dying in front of us."

Fauci created an AIDS division that, together with drug companies and universities, led research into drugs that eventually transformed HIV into a manageable chronic disease. Later, under President George W. Bush, Fauci helped develop PEP-FAR, the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief, to bring those HIV medications to poor countries. The program is credited with saving more than 20 million lives over the past 20 years.

But it took years to get even the first anti-AIDS medications - and in the late 1980s and early '90s, furious activists protested what they saw as government indifference. Fauci brought the activists to the table, making it standard practice for patient advocates to have a voice in government decisions about drug research.

Boy who got new heart inspires tribe to boost organ donation

Greyson Parisien's time on earth was short. But the boy with dark-rimmed eyeglasses who was enchanted by the music in "Frozen," the sound of ripping paper and his dad playing the guitar is having an outsized impact on his tribal community in the far reaches of North

Dakota. His journey to correct an irregular heart led the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians to add an organ donation box to tribal IDs, which it unveiled during a November ceremony.

The rate of organ donations among Native Americans is much lower than other ethnic groups. For some tribes, cultural beliefs are a factor. In rural communities, time, distance and spotty internet access can hinder the process.

"You don't think about donation and how many people are not donors," said Greyson's grandmother, Joan Azure. "I was thinking, 'There has to be more donors.' When you're going through this personally, you don't want someone to die but you also want your child to live."

Fewer than 1% of the 100,000 people nationwide waiting for organ transplants are Native Americans, who make up nearly 3% of the U.S. population.

The figures are higher in some states, including New Mexico where 1 in 5 people on the waiting list are Native American. In South Dakota, North Dakota and Minnesota, nearly 5% of patients awaiting an organ donation are Native American.

Greyson had surgery at 5 months to correct a heart problem, and then he needed an external device to pump blood through his small body. A heart transplant allowed him to leave the hospital after a year and return to the Turtle Mountain reservation, headquartered in Belcourt, North Dakota.

Tribal members followed Greyson's treatment through updates his family posted on social media. They saw him hooked up to medical equipment and dressed sharply in boxy eyeglasses, bow ties and khakis, his hair combed in a mohawk.

When he died suddenly

of pneumonia in September 2019, the community sought understanding and assurance that it wasn't because of his new heart. He was 21 months old.

Greyson's story and spirit live on in parades, powwows and conversations. Joan Azure also highlights her grandson during a week devoted to children born with congenital heart problems.

The Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians honored Greyson this year with a resolution to add an organ donation box to tribal IDs. The tribe unveiled the IDs in November, waived the \$10 fee and encouraged tribal members to check the

"Today is a monumental day that people will remember, especially Native nations, for decades to come," tribal Chairman Jamie Azure said, standing ne Greyson's photo, was taken after he got a new heart smiling with arms stretched to the sky.

The tribe believes it could be the first of the 574 federally recognized Native American nations to designate a spot on tribal IDs for organ donors.

Susan Mau Larson, the

chief strategy officer for LifeSource, part of a network of nearly 60 organ procurement organizations, said she hopes other tribes follow suit. Several are working with tribal communities to raise awareness of organ donation and transplant.

Those conversations can be tough, especially when personal or traditional beliefs don't align with Western medicine. They happen in tribal communities, at events and in hospital rooms as someone nears the end of their life. And there are guidelines: Identify the decision maker in a family. Tell a story, don't explain the process. Give the family time to discuss. Be comfortable with silence. And comfort families, regardless of the decision.

In the Southwest, Darryl Madalena encourages tribal members to think about becoming organ donors by making a connection between kidney disease which afflicts Native Americans at higher rates than the U.S. population — and organ donation and receipt.

He talks about tribes' increasing reliance on Western medicine and asks, hypothetically, if members would be prevented from

journeying on if they had a pacemaker or an artificial hip. If not, why not donate or receive an organ?

"So much of westernized medicine is in the fabric of our communities, our lives, our culture," said Madalena, the Native American liaison for New Mexico Donor Services. "If you pull one string, that may be very detrimental to the health of Natives."

Madalena's work is partly driven by the memory of his partner, Mylia Phouamkha, a Hopi woman who died within a week of being hospitalized with liver problems in 2019, without enough time to seriously consider a transplant.

She and Madalena had a son together, Micca, who was 2 years old at the time.

"If your heart tells you and you have it within yourself to have a transplant if you need it ... I would say yes, do it," said her father, Myron Ami, as Micca sat on his lap.

Madalena has faced criticism for mentioning death, which can be a taboo topic. His community of Jemez Pueblo in New Mexico believes that people enter this world physically and spiritually whole, and that they should leave the same

"That's what we're taught, that's what the beliefs still are," he said.

The Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians doesn't hold the same beliefs, Joan Azure said. About 40% of people in Rollette County where the tribe is based have signed up to become organ donors, compared to 65% overall in North Dakota.

Education, means or opportunity are big factors, said Mau Larson. Simply getting a driver's license means traveling 80 miles (130 kilometers) from the Turtle Mountain reservation. But tribal IDs are renewed every two years, giving tribal members a more frequent opportunity to choose organ donation.

Studies show that organ recipients are best matched with donors of similar genetic makeup, Mau Larson said. Kidneys are especially needed in Native Ameri can communities, where one-quarter of the population is diabetic, she said.

Greyson and his family spent much of his life in Rochester, Minnesota, for his medical care, hundreds of miles from the rolling hills and lakes of the Turtle Mountain reservation. His heart came from a girl

named Coralynn, whose picture on a puzzle piece was interlocked with Greyson's on a parade float banner reading "Not all Heroes Wear Capes!"

After Greyson died, his family asked a Turtle Mountain elder to to bestow a traditional name upon him, through their creator. The elder was in a sweat lodge praying when it came to him: "Waasizo Gichi Anong Ningaabii' Anong," or "Shining Big Star in the West," said Joan Azure.

"Even in his worst moments, his smile shined brightly, his presence brought happiness and light to everyone he came into contact with," she said. "And he provided guidance to many with that bright shining light through his bravery and strength."

Adnan Syed hired by Georgetown's prison reform initiative

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — Adnan Syed, who was released from a Maryland prison this year after his case was the focus of the true-crime podcast "Serial," has been hired by Georgetown University as a program associate for the university's Prisons and Justice Initiative, the university said.

Syed started working this month for the initiative, which advocates for others in the criminal legal system, the university tweeted Wednes-

In his new role, Syed will support Georgetown's "Making an Exoneree" class, in which students reinvestigate decades-old wrongful convictions, create short documentaries about the cases and work to help bring innocent people home from prison, the university wrote in an online announcement.

"PJI's team and programming has so much to gain from Adnan's experience, insight, and commitment to serving incarcerated people and returning citizens," the organization tweeted.

Syed had been one of 25 incarcerated students at Georgetown's inaugural Bachelor of Liberal Arts program at the Patuxent Institute in Jessup, Maryland, during the year leading up to his release, the university said.

"To go from prison to being a Georgetown student and then to actually be on campus on a pathway to work for Georgetown at the Prisons and Justice Initiative, it's a full circle moment," Syed said in the university's announcement. "PJI changed my life. It changed my family's life. Hopefully I can have

the same kind of impact on others."

Syed, 41, hopes to continue his Georgetown education and eventually go to law school.

After spending 23 years in prison, he walked out of a Baltimore courthouse in September after a judge overturned his conviction for the 1999 murder of high school student Hae Min Lee, Syed's ex-girlfriend.

Baltimore Circuit Court Judge Melissa Phinn ordered his release at the behest of prosecutors who said they had recently uncovered new


Prosecutors said a reinvestigation of the case revealed evidence regarding the possible involvement of two alternate suspects. The two suspects may have been involved individually or together, the state's attorney's office said.

The suspects were known persons at the time of the original investigation and were not properly ruled out nor disclosed to the defense, prosecutors said.

Baltimore State's Attorney Marilyn Mosby's office also cited new results from DNA

testing that was conducted using a more modern technique than when evidence in the case was first tested. The recent testing excluded Syed as a suspect, prosecutors said.

Syed always maintained his innocence. His case captured the attention of millions in 2014 when the debut season of "Serial' focused on Lee's killing and raised doubts about some of the evidence prosecutors had used. The program shattered podcast-streaming and downloading records.





"We are estimating that in the city of Sedalia between lead service lines, galvanized lines which have been lead contaminated, and lead-joined pipe, we likely have somewhere between five to six thousand customers that will be impacted by this project."

Unlike any project Ardrey had ever seen, the federally mandated requirement differs from normal operations as it includes a requirement on the public water supplier to replace impaired service lines on the customer side of the meter.

"To get that number accurate," Ardrey said. "We have to go in and look at any homes that have service lines placed before

"Is there any federal funding for that?" asked City Administrator Kelvin Shaw.

"Grant funding," replied Ardrey.

Mayor Andrew Dawson asked how far the line replacements would go into resident's homes and

who was responsible for the costs.

"According to the EPA, it is a shared responsibility." Ardrey answered. "For the first time EPA has placed on the public drinking water provider the responsibility to inventory on the private side of the meter. So, this is a first-time federal event in drinking water."

The EPA is requiring the city to know if the lead supply on the homeowner's property may be contaminated. An issue that may bring concerns of property rights and municipal duties to the fore.

"So, do you know if we can just knock on the door and go into the basement and see galvanized pipe in the basement and say it's here?" Dawson asked. "Or are we going to have to dig from the meter back to the foundation anyway?"

"I don't think we've got the answer for that." Ardrey admitted.

Though the EPA's deadline to get the lead out is 12 years away, Ardrey said she will need to immediately hire up to six additional workers for the lead supply line inventory due in less than two years.

20-year church abuse probe ends with monsignor's quiet plea

Twenty years after city prosecutors convened a grand jury to investigate the handling of priest-abuse complaints within the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Philadelphia, the tortuous legal case came to an end with a cleric's misdemeanor no contest plea in a near-empty City Hall courtroom.

Monsignor William Lynn, 71, had served nearly three years in state prison as appeals courts reviewed the fiery three-month trial that led to his felony child endangerment conviction in 2012. The verdict was twice overturned, leaving prosecutors pursuing the thinning case in recent years with a single alleged victim whose appearance in court was in doubt.

In the end, they said Lynn could end the two-decade ordeal by pleading no contest to a charge of failing to turn over records to the 2002 grand jury. A judge took the plea during a short break from her civil caseload last month, and imposed no further punish-

"He lost 10 years of his life, 10 years of his priestly life," said defense lawyer Thomas Bergstrom, speaking of the decade

"You're fighting an uphill battle because the public at large misunderstood what he was convicted of. They thought he was an abuser," Bergstrom said.

Lynn was the first U.S. church official ever charged, convicted or imprisoned over their handling of priest-abuse complaints.

His trial attracted a packed courtroom full of press, priest-abuse victims and outraged Catholics, along with a few church loyalists. Lynn, the longtime secretary for clergy, was accused of sending a known predator — named on a list of problem priests he had prepared for Cardinal Anthony Bevilacqua — to an accuser's northeast Philadelphia parish.

The trial judge allowed nearly two dozen other priest-abuse victims to testify about abuse they had suffered in the archdiocese over a half century. An appeals court later said their weeks of testimony over uncharged acts were unfair to Lynn — who some saw as a scapegoat for the church, given that the bishops and cardinals above him were never charged.

"This is one defendant, one count of endangering the welfare of children, with one group of children," Judge Gwendolyn Bright said before his retrial was set to start in March 2020. "We're not bringing in the

so-called or alleged 'sins of the Catholic Church."

The pandemic closed the courthouse, and the case against Lynn stalled yet again until the recent plea

A spokesperson for District Attorney Larry Krasner, who inherited the case from his predecessors, called Lynn's unannounced Nov. 2 plea "the appropriate path for bringing finality and closure to the victims, who have endured retraumatization throughout the legal process for years" and said they did not want to face another trial.

The archdiocese did not immediately return a message seeking comment.

Lynn, who remains a priest, has been saying Mass for retired nuns and hopes to assume more duties, according to Bergstrom, who declined to make his client available to the press on Wednesday.

At his trial, Lynn said he had made a list of 35 suspected predator priests so Bevilacqua would address the matter, only to have the list be destroyed.

"I did not intend any harm to come to (the victim). The fact is, my best was not good enough to stop that harm," Lynn testified.

In recent years, prose-

testified to his long struggle with addiction — back in court for the retrial, complicating their trial strategy. **Assistant District Attorney** Patrick Blessington, the lead trial prosecutor in 2012, had said he could try the case without a victim by arguing that Lynn had placed "a bomb" in the parish, whether or not it went off.

Blessington is now retired. And, ultimately, District Attornery Krasner decided not to try that strategy.

"The victims in this matter expressed to the commonwealth that proceeding (with another trial) ... would cause irreparable harm and further victimize them," his office said in its statement.

The trial accuser said that he had been abused by two priests and his Catholic school teacher. One of them, defrocked priest Edward Avery, took a plea offer days before trial. The Rev. Charles Engelhardt, who said he had never met the accuser, was convicted at a 2013 trial and died in prison. Teacher Bernard Shero was released in 2017 after his conviction was overturned and, like Lynn, pleaded no contest to lesser


the Fourth of July.

Lay those aside, and you may find that in this time of the Savior's birth, birds sing all night long. Perhaps it's that I did nothing traditional, or that I was, in the most basic sense of the word, alone, though 20 of my closest friends (at the time) were with me, making the best of it. I simply know that I can recall with remarkable clarity most of that evening.

No one gave anyone presents. I didn't get to cook, and I didn't deliver food gifts. I didn't play any music. I was unable to talk to any of my family when it was 11 my time - they wouldn't have been awake. It should have been a dismal evening.

And yet, it was not. A group of us went to a French restaurant owned by an Afghan man, his Afghan wife, and his French wife. They tried to make us merry by feeding us good food and serving us one of three cocktails: Our waiter,

who was a true Muslim and had no idea about the ingredients in the cocktails, tried valiantly to offer us our choices, and I think most of us ordered the vodka and what was a little better than Hawaiian Punch.

Many of my cohorts that evening were dyedin-the-wool American expats and had not lived in the United States for decades, missing Christmas Eve with their families every year, so they didn't feel as I did - like a fish out of water, as they say, and a little like the kid who doesn't fit in at the school lunch table.

Regardless, I had a lovely dinner, and then we were transported back to the base and our barracks rooms. What remains most clearly in my heart, however, is that as I walked from the heavily guarded gate to my little room, I looked up and saw a star - kind of like the shepherds in "The First Noel." And at that moment, regardless of my loneliness, I felt peace.



The FBI keeps piling up abuses

I've written about disturbing trends in our country that have more in common with despotic governments than democratic ones. But nothing has prepared me for what the FBI did to Mark Houck and Paul Vaughan.

Houck and his son, 12, were peacefully demonstrating at an abortion clinic in Philadelphia in October 2021 when a male escort for a woman seeking an abortion began harassing Houck's son and shouting obscenities in his face. Houck did what any father would do and came to his son's aid, shoving the escort away.

In late September nearly a year after the incident — some two dozen FBI agents armed with automatic weapons and carrying a battering ram descended on Houck's home, where they shackled him while his terrorized children

screamed. No arrest warrant was produced until Houck's wife demanded to see one. Houck was taken away and jailed, but the Philadelphia district attorney declined to file charges, which should have been the end of the story but wasn't.

Almost the same scenario played out last October when Vaughan was arrested in his Tennessee home in front of his children. Both men were charged with violating the federal Freedom of Access to Clinic

Entrances (FACE) Act. They could be sentenced up to 11 years in prison and fined up to \$350,000.

Since when does a "shove" justify such draconian penalties? I have no problem with the FACE Act per se, but the range of sentences needs to be adjusted downward.

The FBI used to be the most respected law enforcement agency in the nation. But those days are gone. Its role in the "Russian collusion" lies, designed to bring down Donald Trump in the 2016 presidential campaign, badly tarnished its reputation.

The FBI's invasion of Trump's home in Florida in August in search of classified documents — an unprecedented act against a former president was another case of the FBI run amok.

Last July, the FBI sought from Sheriff

Brad Anders a list of 14 Pettis Countians having concealed carry permits, which Anders rightly refused to provide. Why did the FBI want that?

The huge number of FBI agents, well beyond what was needed (if any were justified at all) that invaded the homes of Houck and Vaughan, brandishing their weapons, had nothing to do with fighting crime but everything to do with terrorizing and intimidating pro-life Americans from demonstrating in front of abortion clinics.

Rep. Kevin McCarthy, the next speaker of the House of Representatives, has a list of things he wants to investigate. The shocking treatment of Houck and Vaughan — and learning who issued the FBI's orders should head his list.

Jan. 6 report: Trump 'lit that fire' of Capitol insurrection

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Jan. 6 committee's final report asserts that Donald Trump criminally engaged in a "multi-part conspiracy" to overturn the lawful results of the 2020 presidential election and failed to act to stop his supporters from attacking the Capitol, concluding an extraordinary 18-month investigation into the former president and the violent insurrection two years ago.

Trump "lit that fire," the committee's chairman, Mississippi Rep. Bennie Thompson, writes.

The 814-page report released late Thursday comes after the panel interviewed more than 1,000 witnesses, held 10 hearings and obtained more than a million pages of documents. The witnesses — ranging from many of Trump's closest aides to law enforcement to some of the rioters themselves — detailed Trump's "premeditated" actions in the weeks ahead of the attack and how his wide-ranging efforts to overturn his defeat directly influenced those who brutally pushed past the police and smashed through the windows and doors of the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021.

The central cause was "one man," the report says: Trump.

The insurrection gravely threatened democracy and "put the lives of American lawmakers at risk," the bipartisan nine-member panel concluded, offering a definitive account of a dark chapter in modern American history. It functions not only as a compendium of the most dramatic moments of testimony from months of hearings, but also as a document that is to be preserved as a warning for future generations.

In a series of recommendations, the seven Democrats and two Republicans on the committee suggest that Congress consider barring Trump from holding future office. The findings should be a "clarion call to all Americans: to vigilantly guard our Democracy and to give our vote only to those dutiful in their defense of our Constitution," says House Speaker Nancy Pelosi in a foreword to the report.

The report's eight chapters tell the story largely as the panel's hearings did this summer — describing the many facets of the remarkable plan that Trump and his advisers devised to try and void President Joe Biden's victory. The lawmakers detail the former president's pressure on states, federal officials, lawmakers and Vice President Mike Pence to game the system or break the law.

In the two months between the election and the insurrection, the report says, "President Trump or his inner circle engaged in at least 200 apparent acts of public or private outreach, pressure, or condemnation, targeting either State legislators or State or local election administrators, to overturn State election results."

Trump's repeated, false claims of widespread voter fraud resonated with his supporters, the committee said, and were amplified on social media, building on the distrust of government he had fostered for his four years in office. And he did little to stop them when they resorted to violence

and stormed the Capitol, interrupting the certification of Biden's victory.

The massive, damning report comes as Trump is running again for the presidency and also facing multiple federal investigations, including probes of his role in the insurrection and the presence of classified documents at his Florida estate. This week is particularly fraught for him, as a House committee voted to release his tax returns after he has fought for years to keep them private. At the same time, Trump has been blamed by Republicans for a worse-than-expected showing in the midterm elections, leaving him in his most politically vulnerable

state since he was elected in

Looking forward, the committee makes several suggestions for action, including an overhaul of the Electoral Count Act, the election law that Trump tried to circumvent. Bipartisan legislation to make it harder for lawmakers to object to presidential results, and for the vice president to intervene, is set to be passed as part of year-end spending legislation on Friday and sent to Biden for his signature.

The panel also notes in that section that the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution holds that anyone who has taken an oath to uphold the Constitution can be prevented from holding office for engaging

in insurrection or rebellion. Trump "is unfit for any

office," writes the committee's vice chairwoman, Republican Rep. Liz Cheney of Wyoming.

Posting on his social media site, Trump called the report "highly partisan" and falsely claimed it didn't include his statement on Jan. 6 that his supporters should protest "peacefully and patriotically." The committee did include that statement, noting that he followed it with election falsehoods and charged language exhorting the crowd to "fight like hell."

The report details a multitude of failings by law enforcement and intelligence agencies, noting that many of the rioters came with weapons and had openly

planned for violence online before they overwhelmed underprepared law enforcement. "The failure to sufficiently share and act upon that intelligence jeopardized the lives of the police officers defending the Capitol and everyone in it," the report

At the same time, the committee makes an emphatic point that security failures are not the primary cause for the insurrection.

"The President of the United States inciting a mob to march on the Capitol and impede the work of Congress is not a scenario our intelligence and law enforcement communities envisioned for this country," Thompson wrote.

"Donald Trump lit that

fire," Thompson writes. "But in the weeks beforehand, the kindling he ultimately ignited was amassed in plain sight."

The report details Trump's inaction as his loyalists were storming the building, detailing the hours when he watched the violence on television but did nothing to

A White House photographer snapped a picture of Trump at 1:21 p.m., learning of the early violence from an employee upon returning to the White House after his speech — after his own security officials had rebuffed his efforts to go to the Capitol himself. "By that time, if not sooner, he had been made aware of the violent riot," the report states.



Cole Camp's Harrison returning from broken arm

efore the pain set in, Cole Camp junior running back Reid Harrison recalls the definitive early touch he received in the district championship football game against Lincoln on Nov. 11.

"It was a counter play, and I knew I was getting the handoff and had space," Harrison said. "I was one tackle away from breaking it, he barely tripped me and I had my legs taken out from under me."

After using his arm to cushion the fall, it was left in the shape of a letter of the alphabet that wasn't quite natural.

"I knew something was wrong, but my brain hadn't comprehended [my arm] broke," Harrison said. "I immediately signaled to the athletic trainer because it hurt, but I had so much adrenaline that it was really painful, but maybe not as much as it could have been."

Bluebirds head coach Kevin Shearer ran to check on Harrison after that play that happened during the team's second offensive

"[Reid's] upset and apologizing; he wanted to play in that football game as much as anybody," Shearer said. "As a coach, I was thinking the gameplan's gotta change, but I needed to calm Reid down, and that's why I got on the ground and started talking to him, reassuring him that it would be OK. As I saw [the injury], then it's, 'OK, there goes 30, 45% of our playcalling, and one of the most critical defenders I have. It was about the team then."

Harrison remembers Shearer, also his coach for the basketball season on the horizon, telling him to breathe. He said he couldn't open his eyes. It's possible the experience of breaking his shoulder before allowed him to provide some comic relief in such a moment.

Chiefs eying AFC's playoff bye, Seahawks a postseason spot

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Chiefs can't climb into first place in the AFC and secure that coveted first-round playoff bye with a win over Seattle on Saturday, nor can the Seahawks slip into the postseason by knocking off the West Division champs.

Trevor Bauer reinstated by MLB's independent arbitrator

NEW YORK (AP) — Trevor Bauer was reinstated Thursday by Major League Baseball's independent arbitrator, allowing the pitcher to resume his career at the start of the 2023

The 31-year-old Los Angeles Dodgers star was given an unprecedented two-season suspension without pay by baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred on April 29 for violating the league's domestic violence and sexual assault policy after a San Diego woman said Bauer beat and sexually abused her last year, an accusation the pitcher denied.

The players' association filed a grievance on behalf of the former Cy Young Award winner, and a three-person panel headed by independent arbitrator Martin Scheinman started hearing the case on May 23.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Standout Michigan center Olu Oluwatimi had a season that was even better than his dreams.

The graduate transfer from Virginia wasn't surprised the Wolverines had a successful season, which earned them a matchup with TCU in the Fiesta Bowl in a New Year's Eve semifinal for a berth in the national title game. It also didn't stun the AP All-American to win the Rimington Award as the college football's best center.

Oluwatimi was thrilled — and surprised — to

become the first player in school history to win the Outland Trophy that recognizes the top interior lineman on either side of the ball.

He would, though, like to forget a five-day stretch in November.

Oluwatimi lost three friends and former teammates at Virginia in a shooting attack that shocked the Cavaliers and prompted the cancellation of the last two games of their season.

"They will always be my brothers even though they're no longer with us," Oluwatimi said quietly in a recent interview with The Associated Press. "I know they're definitely looking

down on me, and hopefully they're proud."

Four days after the tragedy, his father had surgery to remove a brain tumor a year after having major heart surgery. "It was a tough week," Oluwatimi said.

Oluwatimi endured the emotional trauma without missing a beat, drawing praise for his mental toughness from Wolverines coach Jim Harbaugh.

"I think back to being that age and there's no way I could have handled that," Harbaugh said. "But he has the strength of 10 men and thank God that that was a successful surgery."

Wilson's poor performance has Jets in quite a QB quandary

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The frustrated, rain-soaked New York Jets fans were flatout tired.

Of getting drenched. Of being embarrassed. Of watching their quarterback fail snap after

The booing of Zach Wilson began in the first er just before halftime when his desperation throw was intercepted. The fans had seen enough late in the third quarter, and Robert Saleh and the Jets knew they needed to do something.

Wilson was replaced by Chris Streveler, elevated from the practice squad a few hours before New York's 19-3 loss to Trevor Lawrence and the Jacksonville Jaguars on Thursday night.

"We were trying to change up to get the run game going," Saleh said, refusing to call it a benching. "Obviously, I know Zach was struggling, but Streveler came in, ran a couple of plays and sparked the offense, got the explosive play and it just snowballed in a good way for Strev.

"We just wanted to give him an opportunity for him to finish that drive. By the time we got it back, we said, we're already here, let's just keep going with Strev."

And the Jets are left with one massive question when it comes to their quarterback situation: Now what?

Wilson, the No. 2 overall pick last year, was no match for Lawrence, picked one spot ahead of him. While Lawrence has blossomed in his second season, Wilson has faltered badly.

He went 9 of 18 for 92 yards with an interception and a dismal 41.9 rating for the Jets (7-8), whose playoff hopes took a devastating hit

"I just felt like I didn't have any rhythm out there," Wilson said. "I was just trying to find some confidence out there on the field and just find something to get us going, a little spark. I had opportunities, and I've got to really connect on those."

But on a wet and windy night at MetLife Stadium, those chances came at a minimum. Wilson made throws that either sailed past his receivers or missed them completely. And the banged-up offensive line provided little protection for Wilson, who was making his second start after a three-game benching because Mike White is sidelined with a rib injury.

"Right now, the feeling is I've just got to put my head down and try to get better for these guys," Wilson said. "That's kind of my message when I'm out there, that I'm trying to give everything I've got. I'm trying to lay it out there for the guys.

"And it's not good enough."

Not at all.

That's what has the Jets in a quarterback quandary. Do they continue to put Wilson out there despite his inability to function in the offense at a high level?

"We haven't seen the last of him," Saleh said.

But perhaps the next time could be a while. Especially since the Jets are fighting for their playoff lives with only

and Miami left on their schedule.

Saleh was not prepared to consider who'll start the next game, saying he and the offensive staff would take the Christmas weekend to think about it and make a decision next Monday. A lot will depend on White's health.

The fact is, the offense has looked a lot more efficient with White, Joe Flacco or even Streveler running things than it has with Wilson. The Jets will be in the market for a quarterback in the offseason, either to compete with Wilson or to replace him.

"I've got to look myself in the mirror," Wilson said. "I've got to go back and watch this tape. You've got to be hard on yourself. You just say, Why are we not moving the ball?' And that starts with me.'

This is what it has come down to for the Iets and Wilson — just 20 months removed from being drafted as the face of the franchise. The same fans who once cheered him would now rather see a fourth-string former CFL player under center for their team.

"I don't blame them," Wilson said of the fans. "We have a very passionate fan base and they're here to watch us score touchdowns and we're not scoring touchdowns. We're not getting first downs, we're not moving the ball. We obviously can't throw the ball.

"So, of course they're going to be frustrated."

Colts still playing to win as **Chargers chase playoff spot**

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Indianapolis Colts haven't changed the game plan.

They're still trying to run first, still relying on a stout defense and still trying to win games despite their ever-changing circumstances.

Indy has played most of this season without threetime All-Pro linebacker Shaquille Leonard, will be missing 2021 NFL rushing champ Jonathan Taylor for the final three games because of an ankle injury and heads into Monday night's matchup against the Los Angeles Chargers with its third starting quarterback, Nick Foles.

Interim coach Jeff Saturday made the move for one simple reason.

"It's no secret, we haven't converted in the red zone and ultimately, you've got to make plays in the NFL and we're not making nearly enough explosive plays and not making plays in the red zone," he said when announcing Matt Ryan was getting benched again. "I feel like Nick will give us a better chance to go win these last three games."

It's an odd move. Indy (4-9-1) was mathematically eliminated from playoff contention with Jacksonville's win over the New York Jets on Thursday, before taking the field for its third and final primetime game of the season. Plus, Saturday went with the 33-year-old Foles over 24-year-old Sam Ehlinger, who went 0-2 as the starter earlier this year.

The Chargers (8-6), meanwhile, have climbed to sixth in the AFC standings and are closing in on their first postseason appearance since 2018 and second since 2014. By Monday night, they'll know if they can clinch a spot with a win or if they must wait another week.

And the Chargers might be playing their best defense of the season as they prepare to face a quarterback who has not thrown a pass all season or made a start since Dec. 26, 2021. LA's last three opponents have scored a total of 51 points and no foe has topped 24 since Week 5.

"I feel like you have to be able to match up with a lot of different styles in the league," coach Brandon Staley said. 'Miami and Tennessee could not be more different, but your defense has to be able to change and still perform at a high level. I think I've been able to see more of that."

Now they're taking on a team in flux.

Saturday hasn't decided how he'll split carries between Deon Jackson, Zack Moss and Jordan Wilkins or

if there will be any significant changes with Foles running the show.

What he really wants is the Super Bowl 52 MVP creating a magical final run for the Colts. "He's come in at different

times in his career and has been fantastic," Saturday said, noting Foles' title-winning run with Philadelphia following the 2017 season. "I think he's very comfortable in this position."

A WORK IN PROGRESS

The Chargers' offense is getting closer to resembling what many expected when the season began. With the return of receivers Mike Williams and Keenan Allen, Justin Herbert has topped the 300-yard mark in three straight games and has excelled in making plays on the run.

Still, one problem remains — second-half droughts. Los Angeles has no third-quarter touchdowns in its last nine games and has been outscored 175-109 in the second half and overtime this year.

"We have to get the explosions, stay away from negative plays and score in the red zone," Staley said. "That is the formula. Our guys have to really attack with that mindset."

ON THE REBOUND

Indy has lost four straight since Saturday won his coaching debut and the

reason is no mystery — its inability to finish.

Philadelphia and Pittsburgh rallied from fourth-quarter deficits to win, Dallas scored 33 points in the fourth quarter to turn a two-point lead into a rout, and last week, the Colts blew a 33-0 halftime lead as Minnesota won 39-36 in overtime — the largest comeback in NFL history.

The key to rebounding this week just might be finding Taylor's replacement.

"We did some good things (at Minnesota)," Moss said. "There's obviously some things we could have cleaned up but you know, I think it was a good step for us as a team on the offensive side."

MAKING HISTORY?

Taylor and Chargers running back Austin Ekeler shared the league lead for total TDs (20) in 2021, and Ekeler is back on top of the AFC this season with 14. Ekeler also is closing in on a historical milestone. He needs five receptions to record the sixth 100-catch season by a running back in league history.

The Colts know all about Ekeler. When these teams last met in the 2019 season opener, he had 154 scrimmage yards as the Chargers won 30-24 in overtime.

The Chiefs have been squeaking by the past few weeks, hardly looking like the juggernaut that's been to two of the past three Super Bowls. They lost at Cincinnati, barely held on against downtrodden Denver and needed overtime last week to beat one-win Houston and maintain their hopes of the No. 1 seed.

The biggest issues for Kansas City have been self-inflicted: The Chiefs had 10 penalties for more than 100 yards against the Texans, and they have committed at least one turnover in nine consecutive games.

"The biggest thing," said Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes, who is riding a streak of 20 consecutive completions, "is that you just focus on getting better as a team. You want to be playing your best football as you get to the playoffs, and we have stuff we need to clean up. That will be important this week."

The Seahawks have things to clean up, too. More important, they desperately

need to get healthy. Wide receiver Tyler Lockett is out with an injury while running back Kenneth Walker III continues to deal with a sore ankle.

"Let's just start with this game. We've got to play really sharp football across the board," Seattle coach Pete Carroll said. "We have to take advantage of all the opportunities that we get. We've got to catch the interceptions, we've got to stay onsides and not give them things. We have to make them have to work and play a championship-style game.

"If we can do that," Carroll said, "now we are getting to our capabilities."

BROKEN LOCKETT

Lockett will miss just the second game of his long career due to injury after breaking a bone in his left hand last week against San Francisco; he had surgery to stabilize it this week and hopes to return this season.

Lockett and DK Metcalf have been a dangerous tandem, the former with 78 catches and eight TDs and the latter with 79 and six. And while Marquise Goodwin has been a nice addition, and former first-rounder

Laquon Treadwell could see some snaps, Lockett's absence is going to mean Metcalf gets more attention.

"It's always going to be strange whenever Tyler is not playing, or somebody has been there for so long and not playing," Metcalf said. "It's just another challenge along the way that we've got to overcome."

RUNTO DAYLIGHT

Seattle showed improvement in stopping the run against San Francisco. Even though it still allowed 170 yards, it held the 49ers to 3.5 per carry until a long run late in the game. The performance was especially encouraging given the Seahawks didn't have nose tackle Al Woods and backup Bryan Mone hurt his knee in the first quarter.

"Some execution things were pretty good, but again, we are not into the whole moral victory thing," said coordinator Clint Hurtt, whose defense is allowing 161.1 yards per game on the ground, better than only one team in the league. **BANGED-**

UP BACKFIELD

Walker is still dealing with a sore ankle that the Seahawks rookie first injured earlier this month against the Rams; he had 12 carries for 47 yards against the Niners but was still sore days later. And backup DeeJay Dallas is still trying to come back from a high ankle sprain. That could mean another opportunity for Travis Homer in the Seattle backfield.

SPEAKING OF INJURIES

The Chiefs expect wide receiver Mecole Hardman to play for the first time since Week 9, when he landed on injured reserve with an abdominal problem. He had scored in three straight games with five TDs total before getting hurt.

"Yeah, there's a good chance," Reid said. "We'll see if we can't get him in there a little bit."

COVER YOUR COUGH

An illness swept through the Chiefs defense this week, sidelining Pro Bowl defensive tackle Chris Jones, run stuffer Khalen Saunders, pass rusher Mike Danna and safety Deon Bush for practice. Jones was noticeably ill during last week's win over the Texans, playing just 40 of 63 defensive snaps.

Packers sign OL Elgton Jenkins to 4-year contract extension

Green Bay's Elgton Jenkins has signed a contract extension that assures the Packers won't lose one of the NFL's most versatile offensive linemen to free agency.

The Packers announced the deal Friday. Terms weren't disclosed, but a person familiar with the situation says Jenkins received a four-year extension with a base value of \$68 million that could go up to \$74

"It's a great day for us, a great day for Elgton," Packers coach Matt LaFleur told reporters before Friday's practice. "Obviously he's earned it and he does it the right way. It's always fun as a coach to see guys that get rewarded for not only their performance but what they do in the locker room and the leadership he brings. I can't say enough great things about him."

NFL Network and ESPN first reported the extension. Jenkins' contract had been set to expire at the end of the season.

"Since the moment he walked into the building, Elgton has been a core

member of this franchise while displaying an uncommon versatility, unselfishness and toughness," Packers general manager Brian Gutekunst said in a statement. "He's a tremendous leader and teammate, and he

has earned everything that has come to him."

Jenkins has played his entire career with the Packers, who selected him out of Mississippi State in the second round of the 2019 draft.

The 2020 Pro Bowl selection has started multiple games at every position on the line other than right guard.

"I don't think there's a position up front he can't play," LaFleur said.

Jenkins primarily plays left guard, but he took over at left tackle for eight games last season to fill in for the injured David Bakhtiari. Jenkins played only those eight games last season before a torn anterior cruciate gotten better and better and better," LaFleur said. "I think you've seen that as of late. Each and every week, he seems to get a little bit better." Jenkins has 33 career

starts at left guard, eight at left tackle, six at right tackle and three at center. His performance on the line helped the Packers win three straight NFC North titles from 2019-21.

The Packers (6-8) are seeking their third consecutive victory Sunday at Miami (8-6). The Packers probably will need to win their final three games and get plenty of help to earn a fourth straight playoff appearance.

Michigan, until this month, had not dipped into the transfer portal much and Harbaugh is thankful he did a year ago.

The 23-year-old Oluwatimi, who is from Maryland, was on Air Force's team as a freshman before transferring to Virginia, where he started in 35 games over three seasons and was a finalist for the Rimington Award in

2021.

He wanted to transfer again to take advantage of an extra season of eligibility the NCAA gave athletes enrolled during the 2019-20 school year because of the pandemic. The 6-foot-3, 307-pound Oluwatimi wanted to join a program that would put him in a better position to pursue his goal of playing in the NFL.

"I knew I wanted to be here before I hit the portal," Oluwatimi said in an office on the second floor

of Schembechler Hall. "It was here or Clemson, but it wasn't close. Michigan is so prestigious, the program is ascending and needed a

"When I watched them play and saw the physicality of the offensive line, as a lineman, it was the perfect culture to try to be a part of for my last year."

Over the last two seasons, Harbaugh has had award-winning offensive lines that allowed him to implement his preferred

run-heavy offense. The Joe Moore Award recognizes college football's best offensive line and Oluwatimi helped the Wolverines win it for a second straight year a first for any program.

"He's very powerful," said Michigan tight end Joel Honigford, who played on the offensive line before switching positions two years ago. "If he gets his hands on you, it's pretty much over for you that play. He's a really good communicator and he allows the guys around him

to play thought-free and just play football."

As rough as November was for Oluwatimi, there was a lot to like this month with a Big Ten championship along with the various awards.

"When I committed to Michigan, the only thing I didn't expect was to win the Outland," he said. "I don't say that in a cocky way, but I was a finalist for the Rimington last year and I expected us to be 13-0 with a chance to compete for the national

championship."

Oluwatimi and his teammates, though, are far from satisfied.

"If we stop here, we're not any better than last year's team that lost in the playoff," he said. "It all starts with TCU, which has a Hesiman finalist at quarterback and an unorthodox defense with a three-man front that can present problems. We're really good, too, and we're trying to be immortal as one of the best teams in college football history."

Bills try to clinch AFC East against Bears, eye No. 1 seed

LAKE FOREST, Ill. (AP) — The Buffalo Bills still have a few important goals to achieve before they turn their attention toward the biggest prize of all.

They can clinch their third straight AFC East title this week, and a No. 1 seed playoff seed is in sight.

For all the prizes out there, coach Sean McDermott insisted the focus is simply on beating the struggling Bears when his team visits frigid Chicago on Saturday.

"We're facing a Chicago Bears team that is playing really good football right now and they play extremely hard," he said. "I think Coach (Matt) Eberflus has done a great job of changing that culture, perhaps, at least from the outside looking in, in terms of how they're playing.'

The Bills (11-3) clinched their fourth straight playoff berth with last week's win over Miami and would lock up the division with a win or tie against Chicago (3-11). A loss or tie by the Dolphins against Green Bay would also do it.

Buffalo has the inside track toward the top seed in the AFC — and the firstround bye and home-field advantage through the conference championship game that come with it.

The Bills and AFC West leader Kansas City have identical records. But Buffalo has the tiebreaker after beating the Chiefs in October. The Bills are also a game up on Cincinnati, with the teams scheduled to meet on Jan. 2.

As for Saturday's game, it won't be easy. And that's not just because Buffalo will have to deal with Justin Fields.

The National Weather Service was predicting a high of 10 degrees with gusting wind — and that's after heavy snow on Thursday and Friday. The Bears' coldest home game by temperature was 2 degrees with a minus-13 wind chill against Green Bay on Dec. 22, 2008. The coldest by wind chill was minus-15 against the Packers on Dec. 18, 1983, when the temperature was 3.

The Bears have dropped seven straight — one shy of the franchise record — after a narrow loss to Jalen Hurts and the NFL-leading Philadelphia Eagles last week. But Fields continues to dazzle.

He has 1,000 yards rushing and is closing in on the single-season rushing record for a quarterback. He joined Michael Vick (1,039 in 2016) and Lamar Jackson (1,206 yards in 2019 and 1,005 in 2020) last week as the only QBs to reach 1,000.

WINDY CITY MEMORIES

Bills defensive coordinator Leslie Frazier is more than familiar with windy conditions.

He spent his five NFL seasons in the Windy City, playing cornerback on the the Bears' famed 1985 defense. Now in his sixth season on Buffalo's staff, Frazier has become accustomed to the gusts blowing in off Lake Erie that create havoc during Bills home games.

"Whoooo. I've played in some very, very windy games at Soldier Field. I don't know if I played in one quite like the one we had against New England a year ago," Frazier said, referring to a 14-10 loss to New England in which Patriots quarterback Mac Jones attempted just three passes because of the conditions. "It would be close between the two."

LEAVING EARLY

The Bills are getting ahead of Mother Nature and a winter storm set to hit Buffalo on Friday by leaving for Chicago a day early. The team planned to fly out of Buffalo after practice on Thursday.

McDermott said the decision to leave Thursday would not disrupt the team's preparation. The Bills have become accustomed to revising their schedule. Last month, a lake-effect storm, which dumped seven feet of snow on parts of western New York, led to the team traveling to Detroit to play a "home" game against Cleveland.

"I told him that I'd have to learn to shoot left-handed," Harrison

Fortunate that there was no stress fracture, Harrison, who otherwise would have had to go to Columbia, was headed to Bothwell. He asked to turn on the radio to listen to the game, though admitted the pain quickly became too much to even focus on that. It's impossible to say how the game might have turned out with him for its entirety, but without what Shearer calls a once-ina-coaching career athlete who was critical to the Bluebirds on both sides of the ball, Lincoln lifted the district trophy that night.

Luckily, the resulting injury wasn't a compound fracture, and from both the player and coach's understanding, the amount of muscle in Harrison's arm may have prevented it from being worse.

"I'm pretty thankful, because I couldn't even look at my arm, let alone [seeing] bone, so I'm glad it didn't go through," Harrison said. "Very thankful."

Thankful for everyone who did and have continued to support him, the rehabilitation process have been a relatively swift one for Harrison. He sported a soft cast for two weeks, then began physical therapy and began range-of-motion

work. At the four-week mark, he was allowed more range and began to focus on building back strength with small dumb

"It's starting to resemble a functional arm, and the size comparison, it's gotten better," Harrison said. "Now, Coach Shearer's got me going in every day with [teammate and senior] Ethan [Shearer], shooting and running so I can get back in shape. That's been a struggle. I've never been so out of shape in my life, but I'm slowly getting there."

As the seasons changed, without Harrison the Bluebirds have had to tinker on the hardwood.

"We made a transition last year and made Reid our point guard and moved [Ethan] back to off-guard," Coach Shearer said. "That worked pretty good, but with Reid going down, we had to move [Ethan] back over to be that primary ball handler. He's done a great job with that."

There's been some benefits. Junior Gentry Dieckman has been pushed into more of a scoring role, and both Grady Strathman and Tyler Howard, also juniors, have been contributing outside shooting, too. But Harrison's talent is in some ways irreplaceable.

"Defensively, Reid is unbelievable on that side of the ball," Coach Shearer said. "I want to say we averaged over three steals a game last year with him. He's a primary defender like [senior Owen] Ives], so that's been a big loss. But other guys have risen

It's also allowed Harrison that perspective of seeing things differently while sidelined. "It's been hard not to play, but we're so deep that it's been cool watching everyone develop," he said. "And it gives me another aspect of seeing the coaching side. I always see Coach Shearer get frustrated at little things where I'm like, 'This doesn't have a purpose.' Then you sit on the sideline, and I get it now."

Despite suffering another loss at the hands of Lincoln, 34-32, in the final of the Warsaw Tournament, the Bluebirds are still 6-2 entering the holiday break. When they come out on the other side for the Stover Tournament, beginning against Holden on Jan. 2, they're expected to have Harrison back. He'll be released to practice again as soon as school resumes.

"[When I was injured] I definitely thought 'there goes part of my season, but I didn't really think I'd miss the whole thing," said Harrison, who knows his body is still adjusting as the basketball fundamentals return to full functionality. "It's definitely one of those 'one step back, two step forward' deals. It's definitely gonna get better. It's fun to see those guys stepping up."

Scheinman upheld a 194-game suspension rather than Manfred's intended 324-game penalty but reinstated Bauer immediately, assigning 50 games to cover part of the lengthy time Bauer was put on administrative leave while MLB investigated during the 2021 season and early this year.

"Can't wait to see y'all out at a stadium soon!" Bauer wrote on Twitter.

Bauer will lose more than \$37 million in salary for the final 144 games of last season and for the first 50 games of next season, through May 23. The lost salary next year is effectively a clawback from part of his administrative leave, when he continued to receive pay.

MLB said Scheinman affirmed that Bauer violated the domestic violence policy.

"While we believe a

longer suspension was warranted, MLB will abide by the neutral arbitrator's decision, which upholds baseball's longest-ever active player suspension for sexual assault or domestic violence," MLB said in a statement. "We understand this process was difficult for the witnesses involved and we thank them for their participa-

While Scheinman issued his award to the parties, a full written decision is not expected until later. The panel included MLB Deputy Commissioner Dan Halem and union assistant general counsel Bob Lenaghan.

"While we are pleased that Mr. Bauer has been reinstated immediately, we disagree that any discipline should have been imposed," Bauer's representatives, Jon Fetterolf, Shawn Holley and Rachel Luba, said in a statement. "That said, Mr. Bauer looks forward to his return to the field,

where his goal remains to help his team win a World Series."

The players' association declined comment on Scheinman's decision.

Bauer was never charged with a crime. His accuser sought but was denied a restraining order against him, and Los Angeles prosecutors said in February there was insufficient evidence to prove the woman's accusations beyond a reasonable doubt.

Bauer, who hasn't played since the allegations surfaced and MLB began investigating, repeatedly has said that everything that happened between him and the

woman was consensual. An email sent after business hours Thursday seeking comment from the woman's attorney, Bryan Freedman, wasn't immediately returned.

Bauer sued his accuser in federal court, a move that came less than three months after prosecutors decided not to file

criminal charges against the pitcher. Bauer named the woman and one of her attorneys, Niranjan Fred Thiagarajah, as defendants in the lawsuit. The Associated Press does not typically identify people who say they have been victims of sexual assault.

The lawsuit said that "the damage to Mr. Bauer has been extreme" after the woman alleged that he had choked her into unconsciousness, punched her repeatedly and had anal sex with her without her consent during two sexual encounters last

The pitcher has said the two engaged in rough sex at his Pasadena home at her suggestion and followed guidelines they agreed to in advance.

Another woman, from Columbus, Ohio, told The Washington Post that Bauer repeatedly choked her without her consent and sexually assaulted her over the course of a yearslong relationship. Bauer, in a statement through his

representatives, said their relationship was "casual and wholly consensual."

The suspension will cost Bauer \$37,594,233 from his \$102 million, three-year contract: \$28,131,868 of his \$32 million salary in 2022 and \$9,462,365 of his \$32 million salary in 2023.

Under Major League Rule 2, Bauer will not count against the Dodg ers' player limits for 14 days, giving the team until Jan. 6 to decide whether to cut ties. If the Dodgers jettison Bauer, they would remain responsible for the roughly \$22.6 million he is owed next season and he would be free to sign with any club.

"We have just been informed of the arbitrator's ruling and will comment as soon as practical," the Dodgers said in a statement.

The money not paid to Bauer will be reflected on the Dodgers' luxury tax payroll, cutting the amount of tax they must pay this year and are projected to pay in 2023.

After winning his first Cy Young with the Cincinnati Reds in 2020, Bauer agreed to join his hometown Dodgers. He did not pitch after June 29 in 2021 and finished with an 8-2 record and a 2.59 ERA in 17 appearances.

Bauer was placed on administrative leave on July 2, 2021, under the domestic violence policy, a leave extended 13 times.

Among 15 players previously disciplined under the policy, the longest suspension was a full season and postseason for free agent pitcher Sam Dyson in 2021. None of the players previously disciplined under the policy appear to have challenged the penalty before an arbitrator.

Bauer's suspension was the longest of any MLB player since pitcher Jenrry Mejia was given a lifetime ban in 2016 for a third violation of the drug agreement. Mejia was reinstated for 2019 and returned in the minor leagues.

Coming full circle at Christmas

Adopted Asian-American finds her roots

he importance of fathers is not greater than that Christmas centuries ago when Joseph searched to find a place for the birth of God's only son. And just as Joseph searched to find a home for an infant, an American soldier in Vietnam found an orphan baby girl, adopted her, and brought her back to the states. This season her story has come full circle.

Smithton veteran James M. "Smitty Smith, 87, passed away on Dec. 6, but his daughter Teresa Smith, of Indianapolis, Indiana, remembers her father fondly for giving her a second chance.

"I read a quote somewhere once that struck me," she noted in her eulogy. "It said, 'no matter who your father is or was, whether a great man or someone who left a lot to be desired, there is something in him that will make you a better person."

"Smitty" found Teresa, known at the time as "Me," which means America, in 1966, in Saigon, Vietnam. He took her out of the Frenchrun Association of the Children's Friends orphanage after

he found a rat had bitten her.

"He rented an apartment off base. He couldn't keep me on the military air base at Tan Son Nhut, and hired a lady to stay with me while he was working," Smith said. "During a three-month period in Vietnam, from when I was 6 months to 9 months old, while my dad was working to get me adopted, my parents wrote back and forth to each

other almost every day. My mom (Jenna Smith) kept the letters and transcribed parts of them which I captured in a booklet I made and gave to my dad for Father's Day in 2005."

She read a portion of a March 25, 1966, letter penned from Saigon.

'Teresa is sure a cheerful girl," her father wrote. "She will lay there and coo up a storm and just give everyone big smiles. She cheers me up all the time.

"I'm so happy we have such a beautiful daughter," he continued. "I know that she will give us much enjoyment out of life, darling. I want so much to get home, and us all be together.

"I want to tip-toe in before we go to bed and make sure the blanket is up snug and everything is all right," he added. "Then you and I can stand there and watch her sleep. I love to sit on the edge of my bed and watch her sleep. It makes everything in the world seem right."

For many years Smith, who now works for Homeland Security, thought her mother, Truong Thi Leo, abandoned her in Vietnam; it was years later she learned the truth. Her mother was single, and her father was an American special forces soldier from Tennessee. When her mother was ready to deliver, she went to the Hung Vuong hospital, Teresa was born,

and her mother returned to her village of Ben Tre. But, when she returned to pick up her daughter, she was already

Smith noted her mother spent years looking for her. She eventually immigrated to the U.S. to live in South Dakota in 1991. Unfortunately, she died in 2004 before she

and Smith found each other. "When I was in France in 1997, my mother was living in South Dakota with my sister and my little brothers," Smith said. "All these years she was looking for me... she never found me."

In the meantime, Smith had been searching for her family as well. During her search, she found a photo of her biological father and, in the same week, a picture of her birth mother, sent from a half-sister. In addition, she found in the 60s that her mother was working in Saigon and overseeing 100 members of the service staff for the American military.

Smith soon learned she had many family members and, in November, visited Ben Tre, Vietnam, met her older brother, and visited her

mother's grave. "He (God) allowed me to find my biological family," Smith noted. "And now we're building a house in Ben Tre, and when I retire, I'm going to spend two or three months there."



Easy, pull-together appetizer ideas for holiday entertaining

Now's that time of the year when it feels like someone has pressed the time-lapse button and everything is moving at triple speed. Many of us are feeling the pinch: not having enough hours in the day yet also wanting to slow down and spend time with people we love (or at

least like a lot). And then there is the meal planning. And maybe the party planning. And perhaps houseguests, or family members returning home for the holidays.

Anyway, you don't need me to tell you how busy you are. So... how can we do some light entertaining, without a whole lot of fuss or

A little appetizer spread is just the thing. Simple bites you can put out while the main meal is being prepared. Or maybe the appetizers are the whole of it, a nice chance to clink glasses with the neighbors or some old friends passing through

But appetizers can be tricky. They SEEM like a simpler alternative to a full meal, but if you aren't careful, they can become toilsome.

Let's start with the easiest option — the cheese platter. If you take a few extra minutes and add a few extra ingredients, you can pull together a cheese (or charcuterie or grazing) board that looks photo-worthy.

Plan on a few different types of cheese; play around with hard and soft cheeses, cow's milk vs. goat vs. sheep, mild mixed with pungent. Layer in some crackers or sliced baguette, fresh and dried fruit, olives, nuts, a condiment or two (think preserves, tapenades and so on). Take a moment to make

the board or platter feel lush and abundant. Done!

Don't for a moment be hesitant about putting out store-bought nibbles. In fact, take a beat and check out the prepared foods section at your grocery store, or explore a prepared food market. Look for things like grilled artichoke hearts, stuffed pepperoncini, cooked shrimp, cheese straws, savory tartlets, focaccias or little phyllo pastries.

Stock the pantry for last-minute spreads and surprise guests. High-end nut mixes (check on allergies first), jarred bruschetta, pestos, stuffed olives, marinated and pickled vegetables, stuffed grape leaves, gourmet crackers. If you tuck away a little supply of these special

items, you can pull them out

at a moment's notice.

And stock the freezer! There are loads of precious little frozen appetizers available. Yes, pigs in a blanket, but also spanakopita, cheese puffs, mini quiches, crab cakes, bacon wrapped scallops, empanadas, dumplings, mini pizzas, jalapeno poppers and so on.

Also, many frozen appetizers can be made in the air fryer, so if you've been looking for ways to put that appliance to work, now's the time. Keep a well-wrapped,

good bread in the freezer too, and some sort of bruschetta or crostini is waiting to happen. Bread defrosts very quickly.

Some ideas for pull-together appetizers:

 Spread baguette slices with softened butter mixed

with sea salt and minced fresh dill. Drape a piece of smoked salmon over the top, add a few capers and serve with lemon wedges and dill sprigs.

– A quick, fresh herb dip. I always have extra fresh herbs around, especially during the holidays, left over from one recipe or another. Make the easiest herb dip ever by mixing 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup sour cream and ½ cup chopped mixed fresh herbs like basil, oregano, thyme, marjoram, chervil and parsley. Add kosher salt and freshly ground pepper to taste. Serve with cut-up raw vegetables (crudité) or baby roasted potatoes or pita chips for dipping. Or, spread the dip over toasted Italian bread slices and top with slices of

roast beef or turkey. — Roasted Chickpeas. Toss a can of rinsed and drained chickpeas with a tablespoon of olive oil and some kosher salt. Add some dried herbs or spices if you like, like chili powder, cumin, garlic powder, Italian seasoning. Spread on a rimmed baking sheet and bake in a preheated 375 degree F oven for about 20 minutes, until they turn golden brown. Serve warm or at room temp.

— Quick Guacamole: Mix together 2 diced ripe avocados with half a minced onion; 1 medium tomato, seeded and chopped; kosher salt and pepper; and the juice of a lime. Add some minced jalapeno and chopped cilantro if you like. Serve with lots of tortilla chips.

- Cheddar Popcorn: Make some homemade popcorn, and when it's hot and freshly cooked, drizzle some hot melted butter over it, and add a couple of handfuls of finely grated sharp cheddar cheese, a bit of salt and maybe dried oregano or paprika.

Toss well. Keep some sparkling water, wine (regular and sparkling), beer and soft drinks on hand.

Also, let's remind ourselves that our family and friends came over to see us the food is secondary!

Chance the Rapper to bring free concert, festival to Ghana

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When Chance the Rapper visited West Africa earlier this year, he initially thought his trip with fellow Chicago hip-hop artist Vic Mensa would be just another vacation getaway.

Instead, the Grammy winner connected with Mensa's father's family in Ghana and other natives from the Motherland on a deeper level. He saw Ghana's beautiful ocean coastline and waterfalls, engulfed himself in the musical culture and art scene and learned more about the country's rich history of being the first sub-Saharan African country to free itself from colonialism.

After a couple more trips to Ghana, Chance decided to create a free concert series and visual arts show so others could experience the country's vibrant culture just like he did. During the summer, Chance and Mensa brought eight students from Chicago to Ghana to learn more about Africa.

"I felt so free in Ghana. .. and I want others to feel the same way," said Chance, who along with Mensa will host the inaugural Black Star Line festival in Accra, Ghana, in 2023. The weeklong festival will feature events, panel discussions and a free concert on Jan. 6 with performances by Chance, Mensa, Erykah Badu, T-Pain, Jeremih, Sarkodie, Tobe Nwigwe, Asakaa Boys and M.anifest.

The event will be held in Accra's Black Star Square, a monument to the political freedom that was won by Ghanaians in 1957. The festival's title was inspired by civil rights leader Marcus Garvey's Black Star Line, which was founded in 1919 and operated by Black people who helped link global shipping and tourism opportunities

between America, the Caribbean and Africa.

Garvey inspired Chance's music video " YAH Know, "featuring King Promise, and his upcoming album "Star Line Gallery," which is expected for release next year. He's already released a few other new music videos - such as " Child of God," " A Bar About a Bar " and " The Highs & Lows " with Joey Bada\$\$ — in which he calls "album art" to highlight popular artists in Africa.

Chance said Naila Opiangah 's art piece for "Child of God" will be on display at the festival. He said his new "songs are candid realities of Black life."

"Artists have amazing graphics and album covers and single artworks that are made by great artists every day that's released," he said. "But the only time you get to see it is on this little inch-by-one inch depiction of it. These pieces are painted by world class artists. The ability to go see those pieces and interact with them in real life kind of adds people's understanding of the music."

Through his festival, Chance says he wants to bridge the gap between Black people abroad and Africa.

"I think that specifically the story of the founder's independence is something that all black people should know," he said "There are no free sub-Saharan African countries until 1957. I think they should know about the revolutionary leaders on the continent and abroad. I think that if we had this connectedness and this interaction, people will actually have a chance to

Initially, it was tough gaining commitments from big-name music artists to travel and perform in West Africa. With few sponsors, much of the expenses to fund the free concert were out-of-pock-

She added her life had come full circle; she now has a half-sister, Mai, and family living in Las Vegas.

Smith gave a word of wisdom about fathers and their importance to their children.

"If men knew how important they are in their children's lives and how much they can impact them," she explained. "They never, first of all, would get divorced, and they would never allow themselves to have illegitimate children. Because you basically create orphans — and it affects them their entire life."

She added that in the Vietnam War, many children were left behind, and many were killed.

"And if they weren't killed, they had this primal wound," she noted. "They tried to find their fathers..."

She added she was favored" that she found a loving family but was still affected, and her biological mother was affected.



Teresa Smith recently returned to her biological mother's village, Ben Tre, Vietnam, and met her older brother.

"Nothing is lost forever; nothing is hidden forever; the truth comes out in the end," Smith said. "My life was saved because I was adopted early."

Smith said in her eulogy, the last three hours she spent with her father, "Smitty," "him in his bed, and me reclining in an armchair to his right, he would keep looking over

at me. I would reach over, rub his arm, and touch his marvelous Superman hands.

"The truth is: it's men that cause civilization to advance; it's men that move the world forward. It's THEIR superpower," she continued. "And it's Dads who introduce us to this larger big (and often scary) world; not only

that, they have the power to cause us to embrace it, to throw ourselves entirely in, with gusto, and great expectations and even bravado. We know that when they're at our sides, we can be fully confident and at peace, knowing that all is still well in the world."

Krasinski's 'Jack Ryan' returns to TV after 3-year wait

Season three of "Tom Clancy's Jack Ryan," starring John Krasinski, returns to Amazon Prime Video with a storyline that may feel familiar.

We meet Ryan, now stationed in Rome, as he discovers an underground plot by Russia to invade surrounding countries and recreate the Soviet empire.

The episodes were written three years ago, and production wrapped long before Russia invaded Ukraine.

Filming "Jack Ryan" was delayed when the pandemic forced everything to shut down. Krasinski turned his focus to a weekly homemade newscast called " Some Good News," sharing positive stories during a

dark time. Like many, he wasn't focused on diet and exercise while in quaran-

Kraskinski jokes his "Some Good News" shape was ideal because you never saw him standing up as he was always seated like a newscaster. "You didn't even see the bottom half of me. That's where I felt most comfortable," he said.

When it was time to

buckle down, Krasinski said he was motivated by the idea that the show would be a reason for many to finally resume working after months of waiting.

"It was actually a very cleansing thing," said Krasinski, who is also an executive producer and helps write the episodes. "I took a great responsibility with all these hundreds of people who were brave enough to put their lives on the line to bring back our industry in some small way.

"It was almost like getting into my best possible shape and self, both physically and mentally,

to prepare for something that we knew would be much more different and much more harrowing, but hopefully that much more worth it."

In the new episodes, which began streaming on Wednesday, Ryan's attempts to alert the CIA to his discovery about Russia result in the agency turning on him and issuing a Red Notice calling for his arrest and extradition back to the U.S. to face charges. Ryan's former boss James Greer (played by Wendell Pierce) assists as much as he can from the inside, and Ryan seeks out his old pal Mike

November (Michael Kelly), who left the agency at the end of season two, to help thwart Russia's plan.

Krasinski and Kelly's relationship on screen provides some moments of levity, amid all the action and looming catastrophe. Kelly, who is known for serious roles such as "House of Cards," says it's a fun departure to have those lighter on-screen moments.

"John will write a lot of those one-liners for me on the day and I'm so grateful I get to have the humor. To get to play something a little closer to myself was such a treat," said Kelly.

Janelle Monáe, the not-so-secret weapon of 'Glass Onion'

NEW YORK (AP) — To get a sense of Janelle Monáe's powers of transformation, look no further than her Instagram photos of past Halloweens. Monáe doesn't just throw something on. When she turns into the White Rabbit from "Alice in Wonderland" or Diva Plavalaguna from "The Fifth Element," Monáe looks legitimately ready to step onto a movie

"I am indeed a self-proclaimed transformer," Monáe says, smiling. "I love going outside of what I think I know about me."

Monáe, who grew up in a working-class Baptist family in the Quindaro neighborhood of Kansas City, Kansas, first remade herself in music as a retro-styled dynamo. Performing in a tuxedo and a vintage pompadour, she fashioned herself as a time-traveling android alter-ego named Cindi Mayweather. Acting was probably inevitable for Monáe, who studied musical theater at the American Musical and Dramatic Academy before dedicating herself to music.

"It is that character building that I love," Monáe said in a recent interview. "I love just getting my body into discovering a new way to talk and to breathe, and, hopefully, being a reflection for other folks. Go outside of who you think you are every day."

But as much as Monáe has been a natural, fullbody entertainer and a red-carpet head-turner – a self-evident movie star – it has sometimes seemed since her two 2016 bigscreen debuts in "Hidden Figures" and "Moonlight" that Hollywood hasn't known quite how to fully harness the wide-ranging talents of such a self-propelled, mold-breaking Black female artist.

But in Rian Johnson's

whodunit sequel "Glass Onion: A Knives Out Mystery," which debuted Friday on Netflix, Monáe may have found a film to suit her proclivity for shape shifting. In Johnson's puzzle box of a movie, Monáe's character is the most mysterious and enigmatic of a colorful ensemble. If "Knives Out" gave Ana de Armas a chance to shine, "Glass Onion" is a revelation of Monáe's many layers.

"It's been an incredibly transformative experience for me as an actor," Monáe says. "I got an opportunity to show range. This character goes from comedy to the deep emotional, heavy-lifting dramatic scenes all the way to action, where I found myself working with a stunt coordinator at five, six in the morning in Greece after eating baclava."

The less said about exactly how Monáe fits into

"Glass Onion," the better. In Johnson's film, which had a one-week theatrical run in late November, Edward Norton plays a tech billionaire, Miles Bron, who invites friends to his private Greek island. Detective Benoit Blanc (Daniel Craig) is on hand for a murder mystery that spins out of control and a plot that, in dredging up Bron's past, skewers a social media mogul not so unlike some of today's real-world tech tycoons.

"I got an opportunity to honor those women who are the minority in the majority in those spaces, who have their ideas taken from them, who are not given credit for their work, who have to deal with these alligators, deal with these tech bros, deal with these geniuses who in fact haven't done anything except for cause confusion," says Monáe.

Monáe is something of

a futurist, herself. Earlier this year she published a collection of sci-fi stories titled "The Memory Librarian," adapted from elements in her 2018 album, "Dirty Computer." In it, Monáe depicts a future world where human desires are controlled by an organization called New Dawn and the identities of LGBTQ people can be wiped by a drug called Nevermind.

Monáe earlier this year said on "Red Table Talk" that she identifies as non-binary. Her pronouns, she has said, are her/she, they/them and "free-ass motherf----." The film industry, especially this time of year when awards are given to actors and actresses, can be more codified in its classifications. Monáe, herself, was named best supporting actress for her performance in "Glass Onion" by the National Board of Review.

The multidimensional characters of "Glass Onion," Monáe says, has given her more hope that she can find films that authentically connect with her. "I just want to tip my hat off to those writers and directors who are thinking about dynamism when they're writing these characters," she says. That includes Johnson, who she's been a fan of since seeing his 2012 science-fiction film "Looper." Says Monáe: "I was like: Who is this guy who likes time travel as much as me?"

Johnson, for his part, felt he was working with "a true artist."

"It's not like she has a tremendous artifice to her, but I've never met her where she doesn't look better than I will ever look in my life," he says, laughing. "She's an entertainer but she's also an artist. It's not a facade that she just puts on for attention.

All the stuff that she does comes from a place that's really close to her heart."

Through her Paisley Park-like creative hub Wondaland in Atlanta, Monáe is trying, she says, to "tell radical, rebellious, smart stories." With A24, she's developing a TV series on Josephine Baker, the French dancer and WWII resistance fighter. She's eager for more.

"As timeless as I like to think I am, time waits for nobody," Monáe says.

But regardless of future roles, for Monáe metamorphosis is more of a habit. On a weekend during shooting, Johnson sent out hand-written invitations to the cast to gather for their own murder mystery. Monáe arrived decked out as Sherlock Holmes, complete with top hat, beard, mustache, cane and cape. Or as Monáe says, "Ready

Paul Bettany explores being art star Andy Warhol on Broadway

NEW YORK (AP) — Paul Bettany has long been an admirer of art superstar Andy Warhol, from a distance, like an art lover wandering a favorite gallery. But when he was initially offered a chance to get much closer and play his hero on stage, he declined.

"I don't know how you get underneath the wig and the glasses and the carefully curated public persona. I don't know how to do it," Bettany recalled thinking. "I think there might be a reason that Andy is always a cameo in films."

Persistence on the part of a producer and reading Warhol's diaries convinced Bettany that he might at least try. Now he finds himself on Broadway eight times a week underneath a wig, wearing glasses and making the very art onstage that he long admired.

Bettany stars in "The Collaboration," Anthony McCarten's fictional account about the real period in the mid-1980s when Warhol was compelled to work with new sensation and potential rival of the New York art world, Jean-Michel Basquiat, played by Jeremy Pope.

They were different men — one white, one Black; one older, the other younger. Warhol, 58, was a conceptional artist whose Pop Art explored household brand objects like Campbell's soup cans and celebrities like Marylyn Monroe, while Basquiat, in his late 20s, was a neo-Expressionist, concerned with colonialism and racism. "We speak different languages," Basquiat says in the

The work explores what may have been their dynamic as both men try to figure the other out and visit each others' studios, and deals with race, commercialism, police brutality, addiction and the artist's soul. The audience watches them paint together, too.

Long before the role came along, Bettany had been a fan of both artists and visited a remounting of their collaboration at the Whitney in 2019. He hopes audiences go home after seeing the play and think about each man in a different way.

His Warhol is droll yet vulnerable, needy and yet sometimes haughty, curious and also competitive. He is threatened by the younger artist and feels old. "I am afraid. Not of death, of life," he says in the play.

Bettany is filled with praise for his subject. "If Warhol hadn't existed, it would be like the Beatles not existing. Music would just sound different now and things would look different — magazines would look different, the posters would look different, design would look different," he says.

The way Bettany shades his performance is clever, giving the audience at the beginning a glimpse of what they came IN expecting — a clipped, chilly Warhol in a turtleneck who then gradually unwinds as the play progresses into a fluid, fully

fleshed-out person. "Paul did this brilliantly as an actor, I think. We introduced the Andy that we know, and then he just opens more doors and more doors and more doors into the land of imagination," says Kwame Kwei-Armah, the play's director.

While no one knows what was the exact dynamic of the two men — Warhol died in 1987 and Basquiat a year later — the play tries to stay as true to what we know of the art superstars.

"This is our version. Nobody really knows. But I do think that's the wonderful thing about drama," says Bettany, quoting McCarten as saying that "documentary can get you so far. It can get you to the front door, but it's never going to invite you in for

a cup of tea. Drama and imagination can get you there."


Critics have had mixed reactions in New York, but Bettany's performance has been praised, with the Daily News saying he "treads lightly and wisely through a tough assignment given all of the pre-existing Warholian preconceptions."

The play, which crossed the Atlantic after having played London's Young Vic Theatre this spring, was made into a film before it landed on Broadway, mostly shot in Boston. It opens the play up — adding more scenes, introducing audiences to Warhol's mother and showing Warhol and Basquiat on the streets making graffiti art. Filming it added even more depth to the Broadway production.

One thing Bettany shared with Warhol was that the play shows the artist gingerly returning to painting after 25 years of making reproductions — roughly the same time Bettany has been away from stage work.

In the meantime, he's been noticed for playing android superhero Vision in the Marvel Cinematic Universe. Bettany, 50, earned an Emmy Award nomination last year for his role in "WandaVision."

Doing theater at 50 is very different from doing

it at 25, he says. When he was younger, he'd finish a play and be so buzzed he'd be unable to sleep, winding down in a club or a pub until the wee hours.

"Now I've got kids. Six o'clock in the morning, I'm up," he says laughing. "By the time I've left the

theater tonight, I'll get home at 11, and I will have electricity running through my body. All I want to do is be with people and get it out of me. So I'm not sure it's the healthiest thing in the world for me, frankly, but I love the doing of it."

Projects examining Richmond's history win \$16M in funding

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — The former Confederate capital has secured an \$11 million grant to build an interpretive center that city officials hope will someday be part of an ambitious, long-envisioned memorial campus honoring the memory of enslaved people.

Richmond's grant is among more than \$16 million in total funding The Mellon Foundation is providing to recipients in Virginia's capital city for projects that are "examining, preserving and reimagining" its "rich historical narratives," the New York-based nonprofit told The Associated Press ahead of a formal announcement Tuesday.

Among the other grant recipients are a public art project, a museum and an initiative uplifting the story of a historically Black neighborhood. All are part of a push in Richmond — which recently removed its massive collection of Confederate statuary — to highlight other parts of its history.

"Richmond has been the site of many stories that have shaped our understanding of who we are as Americans, but public commemoration in Richmond historically has been limited to only a few," Elizabeth Alexander, president of the Mellon Foundation, said in a statement.

"Today, the people of this city are lifting up the collective memory of its historic Black communities, unflinchingly addressing the city's past as the capital of the state with the most enslaved people prior to the Civil War, and participating in the reimagining of the city's public spaces to better reflect the fullness of its history," Alexander said.

City officials said in an interview and in written plans

shared with AP that the \$11 million grant will fund the creation of an "interpretive center" in 12,300 square feet of space in the first floor of the sleek, glassy train shed of historic Main Street Station, a landmark visible to motorists cutting through the city on Interstate 95.

Officials hope the center will be a space to welcome and orient visitors to Shockoe Bottom, one of the oldest neighborhoods in one of America's oldest cities. The neighborhood was once a hub in the domestic slave trade, though that history is barely visible now.

Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children were jailed, bought and sold in Richmond, and shipped across the South in the decades preceding the Civil

War. For a time, Richmond was second only to New Orleans as a slave-trading

Community activists have long pushed for a public site in the neighborhood telling that history and honoring enslaved people, but the initiative has moved forward in fits and starts.

The preservation of Shockoe Bottom rose to national attention in 2014 when former Mayor Dwight Jones proposed a baseball stadium-centered economic development project in the area that was ultimately scuttled in the face of outrage from community members who said Shockoe Bottom was sacred ground.

Today, modest remembrances to the neighborhood's slave-trading past are tucked away in a hard-tofind area adjacent to I-95, a parking lot and rumbling train tracks.

In 2020, Richmond officials joined by community activists outlined plans for a Shockoe Bottom heritage campus that would include a museum and a park for reflection. The state has chipped in funding and the city has set aside almost \$28 million for the project, including the museum planning, which is in its earliest stages, faces flooding-related zoning hurdles and will require significant additional money.

The interpretive center will offer "a space to educate and immerse audiences in the history of Shockoe and is one of the first steps in bringing the larger Heritage Campus to fruition," Mayor Levar Stoney said in a statement.

Officials say the center will provide educational and artistic content about Richmond's role in the slave trade, and space for visitors to Shockoe Bottom to escape the elements and orient themselves to the neighborhood, which includes other historical sites, including the Virginia Holocaust Muse-

Among Mellon's other Richmond grantees is The Valentine Museum, which is dedicated to the city's history, and plans to use the money in part to "reimagine" the studio of Edward Valentine, a sculptor of Confederate figures.

The foundation is also backing The JXN Project, an initiative aimed at telling the story of the role Richmond, and especially the historically Black Jackson Ward neighborhood, played in the Black American experience.

Also receiving support are Reclaiming the Monument, a public art project that captured national attention for its projections on the now-removed base of an enormous Robert E. Lee statue; Untold RVA, an existing project that aims to tell hidden histories; and Cary Forward, which plans a "multidisciplinary arts space, interpretive center, artist/scholar residency, and archival library."

The foundation said its award to Richmond was the first ever grant to a municipal government from its Monuments Project, a \$250 million funding commitment launched in 2020 that aims to reimagine history-telling in public spaces.

In an interview, Alexander said the project had supported initiatives including the Kansas relocation of an approximately 25-ton stone considered sacred to the Kaw Nation, and the Irei project, an effort to build a memorial to people of Japanese ancestry incarcerated in camps during World War II.

In Richmond, which Alexander said she visited over the summer, the foundation found a city unusually eager to "contend and grapple" with its past.

"The only way to move forward anyplace is to really look truthfully at our past and to envision a better future that is based on truth-telling and reckoning," Alexander said.

The foundation, which was established in 1969 by the children of industrialist, statesman and philanthropist Andrew W. Mellon, bills itself as the nation's largest supporter of the arts and humanities.

An Iranian masterwork opens with its director behind bars

NEW YORK (AP) — After being arrested for creating antigovernment propaganda in 2010, the Iranian director Jafar Panahi was banned from making films for 20 years. Since then, he's made five widely acclaimed features.

His latest, "No Bears," opens soon in U.S. theaters while Panahi is in prison.

In July, Panahi went to the Tehran prosecutor's office to inquire about the arrest of Mohammad Rasoulof, a filmmaker detained in the government's crackdown on protests. Panahi himself was arrested and, on a decade-old charge, sentenced to six years in jail.

Panahi's films, made in Iran without government approval, are sly feats of artistic resistance. He plays himself in meta self-portraitures that clandestinely capture the mechanics of Iranian society with a humanity both playful and devastating. Panahi made "This is Not a Film" in his apartment. "Taxi" was shot almost entirely inside a car, with a smiling Panahi playing the driver and picking up passengers along the way.

In "No Bears," Panahi plays a fictionalized version of himself while making a film in a rural town along the Iran-Turkey border. It's one of the most acclaimed films of the year. The New York Times and The Associated Press named it one of the top 10 films of the year. Film critic Justin Chang of The Los Angeles Times

called No Bears 2022's best movie.

"No Bears" is landing at a time when the Iranian film community is increasingly ensnarled in a harsh government crackdown. A week after "No Bears" premiered at the Venice Film Festival, with Panahi already behind bars, 22-year-old Mahsa Amini died while being held by Iran's morality police. Her death sparked three months of women-led protests, still ongoing, that have rocked Iran's theocracy.

More than 500 protesters have been killed in the crackdown since Sept. 17, according to the group Human Rights Activists in Iran. More than 18,200 people have been detained.

On Saturday, the prominent Iranian actress Taraneh Alidoosti, star of Asghar Farhadi's Oscar-winning "The Salesman," was arrested after posting an Instagram message expressing solidarity with a man recently executed for crimes allegedly committed during the protests.

In the outcry that followed Alidoosti's arrest, Farhadi — the director of "A Separation" and "A Hero" — called for Alidoosti's release "alongside that of my other fellow cineastes Jafar Panahi and Mohammad Rasoulof and all the other less-known prisoners whose only crime is the attempt for a better life."

"If showing such support is a crime, then tens of millions of people of this land are criminals," Farhadi wrote on Instagram.

Panahi's absence has been acutely felt on the

world's top movie stages. At Venice, where "No Bears" was given a special jury prize, a red-carpet walkout was staged at the film's premiere. Festival director Alberto Barbera and jury president Julianne Moore were among the throngs silently protesting the imprisonment of Panahi and other filmmakers.

"No Bears" will also again test a long-criticized Academy Awards policy. Submissions for the Oscars' best international film category are made only by a country's government. Critics have said that allows authoritative regimes to dictate which films compete for the sought-after prize.

Arthouse distributors Sideshow and Janus Films, which helped lead Ryusuke Hamaguchi's Japanese drama "Drive My Car" to four

Oscar nominations a year ago, acquired "No Bears" with the hope that its merit and Panahi's cause would outshine that restriction.

"He puts himself at risk every time he does something like this," says Jonathan Sehring, Sideshow founder and a veteran independent film executive. "When you have regimes that won't even let a filmmaker make a movie and in spite of it they do, it's inspiring."

"We knew it wasn't going to be the Iranian submission, obviously," adds Sehring. "But we wanted to position Jafar as a potential best director, best screenplay, a number of different categories. And we also believe the film can work theatrically."

The Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences

declined to comment on possible reforms to the international film category. Among the 15 shortlisted films for the award announced Wednesday was the Danish entry "Holy Spider," set in Iran. After Iranian authorities declined to authorize it, director Ali Abbasi shot the film, based on real-life serial killings, in Jordan.

"No Bears" opens in New York on Dec. 23 and Los Angeles on Jan. 10 before rolling out nationally.

In it, Panahi rents an apartment from which he, with a fitful internet signal, directs a film with the help of assistants. Their handing off cameras and memory cards gives, perhaps, an illuminating window into how Panahi has worked under government restrictions. In "No Bears," he comes

under increasing pressure from village authorities who believe he's accidentally captured a compromising image.

"It's not easy to make a movie to begin with, but to make it secretly is very difficult, especially in Iran where a totalitarian government with such tight control over the country and spies everywhere," says Iranian film scholar and documentarian Jamsheed Akrami-Ghorveh. "It's really a triumph. I can't compare him with any other filmmaker."

In one of the film's most moving scenes, Panahi stands along the border at night. Gazing at the lights in the distance, he contemplates crossing it — a life in exile that Panahi in real life steadfastly refused to ever adopt.
