New wastewater plans could save Sedalia millions on north plant

At Monday evening's Sedalia City Council meeting, Interim Public Works Director Chris Davies presented his departmental report, which had some surprisingly good news for the City and its citizenry.

Second Ward City Councilman and Public Works Committee Chairman Thomas Oldham explained the City's wastewater problems. Most begin and end with the aging north wastewater treatment plant.

"That north plant is decades old, six or seven," Oldham told the Democrat this week. "For the last five years I've been on council, we've just band-aided that plant through the years. It's now really getting to the point, like it is with so many aging technologies in different industries, but we'll get to the point that much of the parts needed are now not being created."

Years ago, Oldham was warned by then-Public Works Director Brenda Ardrey that the north plant was at the end of its lifecycle and would need to be replaced.

"It was mentioned then that we're going to have to have a new north plant within the next 10 years," Oldham said. "Well, five years later now, we're in that five-year time frame. We were under the understanding that the new north plant has to be completely phased and completely out of commission, and we are going to have to have a new north wastewater treatment facility that was going to have to be built in just a few years' time and cost

the City and the taxpayers roughly about \$60 to \$80 million. There is going to be a bond issue in March."

Then there was a change at the top of the Public Works Department and an outsider, Davies, was brought in six months ago.

"What's great about bringing somebody in like that is you have somebody who isn't biased towards the City," Oldham said. "Isn't biased towards the plan that we've created, and we allow somebody to really have the outside perspective looking in. He really has been able to revamp the Public Works Department from structure changes and the plans he put in place, and one of those plans is the wastewater treatment plan."

Davies determined expansion of the central wastewater treatment plant by simply rearranging irrigation basins and utilizing a patch of city property just north of the plant, which would allow it to easily handle the city's current needs.

"We're very fortunate we were able to bring in this expertise and kind of place our Public Works Department and wastewater on a new path and a more productive path," Oldham said. "We're saving the taxpayer millions of dollars, we're saving the taxpayer the building time. I'm very happy that we were able to save millions of dollars."

The City Council approved a task order contracting with Burns and McDonnell to complete an engineering survey outlining what is needed to properly utilize the central plant.

Parker Ellison, the son of Jason Ellison and Wendy McGinnis, plans to major in astrophysics at Yale. He found out he was accepted at the university in New Haven, Connecticut, last week. Yale is a top-rated school for the study of astrophysics, and Ellison told the Democrat he participated in the Yale Summer Program in Astrophysics the previous summer. He enjoyed the program so much that Yale became his top choice for college.

On Thursday, Dec. 21, Ellison said being accepted into an Ivy League college seems unreal.

"I'm extremely grateful," he added. "I just didn't think it would ever happen.

"I've always loved space," he continued. "I thought I wanted to be a pilot or an engineer. Then I realized when I took engineering classes that I liked the physics problems more than I liked the actual hands-on type of building

He said that's when he realized astrophysics was an excellent career choice and applied for the summer program at Yale.

"I used research tele-

scopes; we studied a supernova," Ellison said. "And then we actually wrote a paper about it.

"My team was actually invited to do a follow-up research paper, and a staff member offered to co-author it," he continued. "So, we're working on that right

The research paper is about proving a way of classifying supernovas.

"They all have different types," he explained. "And we used this method from the 1970s. It hadn't really been proven,

Above-normal temperatures expected for Christmas in Pettis County

With the winter weather season approaching, the Star-Journal reached out to the National Weather Service to see what the people in Johnson and Pettis counties should expect over the coming weeks and how they should be preparing.

"Through Christmas, we're going to be seeing above normal temperatures and out there in the Warrensburg and Sedalia areas," NWS Lead Forecaster Chris Bowman said. "Probably looking at highs in the upper 50s to maybe even 60 degrees on some days."

With the lack of cold temperatures, Johnson and Pettis county residents can wait until 2024 for snow. However, Bowman says there is still precipitation on the way. Rain of "about an inch to maybe an inchand-a-quarter" should be expected.

"(In) Missouri, the weather is very highly variable being in the middle of the country," Bowman explained. "You can usually get the system bringing cold air from Canada (and) we can usually get systems bringing in moisture from warm air from the south and moisture from the Gulf of Mexico."



Hillory Arlen Joy passed away on Wednesday, December 20, 2023, at Boone Hospital.

He was born to Charles H. Joy and Pauline Georgia Howard on September 11, 1931, in Urich, MO.

Grieving & often overlooked, Palestinian **Christians prepare for somber Christmas**

It's normally a moment of pure joy for the Rev. Khader Khalilia: the excitement, the giggles, the kisses, as his young daughters — in their Christmas pajamas — open their gifts. But this year, just the thought of it fills Khalilia with guilt.

"I'm struggling," said the Palestinian American pastor of Redeemer-St. John's Lutheran Church in New York. "How can I do it while the Palestinian children are suffering, have no shelter or a place to lay their heads?"

Thousands of miles away, near Jesus' biblical birthplace of Bethlehem, Suzan Sahori has been working with artisans to bring olive wood Christmas ornaments into homes in Australia, Europe and North America. But Sahori is in no mood for festivities: "We're broken, looking at all these children, all this killing."

In a traditional season of merriment, many Palestinian Christians — in Bethlehem and beyond — are gripped with helplessness, pain and worry amid the Israel-Hamas war. Some are mourning, lobbying for the war to end, scrambling to get relatives to safety or seeking comfort in the Christmas message of hope.

In the occupied West Bank, Sahori, executive director of Bethlehem Fair Trade Artisans, an organization selling crafts, will pray for peace and justice. She's grateful she's safe but wonders if that could change. She's also angry.

"The joy in my heart is stolen," she said. "I'm saying, 'God, how are you allowing all these children to die?' ... I'm mad at God; I hope He forgives me."

In better times, she finds the Christmas spirit in the Bethlehem area unmatched: It's in songs cascading into streets bedecked with lights, markets displaying decorations, and the enthusiasm of children, families and tourists snapping photos with towering Christmas trees.

Now, it's all quieter, somber. Tree lighting ceremo-

nies she attended last year have been scrapped.

The heads of churches in Jerusalem have urged congregations to forgo "any unnecessarily festive activities." They encouraged priests and the faithful to focus on Christmas' spiritual meaning and called for "fervent prayers for a just and lasting peace for our beloved Holy Land."

Thousands of Palestinians have been killed in Israel's ongoing offensive in Gaza, launched after Hamas' Oct. 7 killings and hostage-taking in Israel.

Days before Christmas, the Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem said two Christian women at a church compound in Gaza were killed by Israeli sniper fire. The Israeli military said troops were targeting Hamas militants in the area; it said it was investigating the incident and takes such reports very seriously.

Khalilia is striving to comfort the distraught amid his distress.

"It's hard to watch. It's hard to do your job," he said. "People are looking for us to walk with them in their suffering."

He worries about family in the West Bank; a brother lost his income working for a hotel as travel cancellations pummeled tourism.

Khalilia, who's from a town near Bethlehem, said his daughters will likely get fewer presents, with the savings going toward helping children in Gaza.

Many in the U.S., he said, don't realize that Palestinian Christians exist some ask if he converted from Islam or Judaism.

He tells them, "When you sing 'O Little Town of Bethlehem' on Christmas Eve, remember that Jesus was born in my hometown."

There are 50,000 Christian Palestinians estimated to reside in the West Bank and Jerusalem, according to the U.S. State Department's international religious freedom report for 2022. Approximately 1,300 Christians lived in Gaza, it said. Some Christians are also citizens of Israel. Many Palestinian Christians live in diaspora communities.

Susan Muaddi Darraj, a novelist in Baltimore, said

Christians embody a diversity of Palestinians that gets erased. "Our existence ... defies the stereotypes that are being used to dehumanize us."

This Christmas, family gatherings have become more important for comfort, she said.

"Especially in the diaspora ... where, for us, life feels like it's stopped but everyone else around us is going about their daily business."

Wadie Abunassar, a Palestinian Israeli in Haifa, said many in his Christian community are trying to balance the somber atmosphere with the Christmas message.

"Jesus came in the midst of darkness" and Christmas "is about giving hope when there's no hope," said Abunassar, a former Catholic Church spokesperson. "Nowadays, more than ever, we need this Christ-

mas spirit." It hasn't been easy.

"Being Israeli citizens, we feel the pain of our Jewish compatriots," he said. "Being Palestinians, we feel the pain of our Palestinian brothers and sisters."

In Bethlehem, the Rev. Munther Isaac, pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Christmas Church, said tears flow during Sunday services. Many are anxious; some have packed up and

Isaac was part of a group that traveled to Washington to advocate for a ceasefire.

"A comprehensive and just peace is the only hope for Palestinians and Israelis alike," said a letter signed by several Christian pastoral leaders in Bethlehem. Addressed to President Joe Biden, it asked him to help stop the war.

The signatories said they lamented all deaths, Palestinian and Israeli.

"We want a constant and comprehensive ceasefire. Enough death. Enough destruction. ... This is our call and prayer this Christmas."

Israel, whose forces have faced a ccusations by some of using excessive force, says it aims to destroy Hamas and accuses it of endangering civilians. Israel and its U.S. ally are also increasingly facing international alarm over the scope of deaths, destruction and displacement in Gaza.

Isaac's church is displaying a nativity scene where a baby Jesus figure, wrapped in a back-and-white Palestinian keffiyeh, is lying in the rubble. Making the display was an emotional and spiritual experience, he said.

"We see Jesus in every child that's killed, and we see God's identifying with us in our suffering."

This holiday season, longtime Gaza resident Suhair Anastas is wracked with guilt: She's managed to escape the war in Gaza while others haven't.

A Jordanian Palestinian, Anastas had been living in Gaza, where her late husband was from.

For more than a month, she and her 16-year-old daughter sheltered in a Catholic church's school there. Death felt particularly close when a deadly Israeli airstrike struck a Gaza Greek Orthodox Church compound housing displaced people. Israel's military said it had targeted a Hamas command center nearby.

"You go to sleep ... thinking, 'Will I wake up the next morning?" Anastas said.

Her trip to the border which involved driving, walking, taking a donkey-pulled cart and a cab — was terrifying.

"The bombings were around," she said. A friend's daughter, a child, kept asking: Are we going to die?

Anastas hopes to return to Gaza, but she's unsure what's ahead, or if her home will still be there.

Among the many questions over the future of Gaza and its more than 2 million people, is if its tiny Christian community will remain — and for how

Those still inside include Sami Awad's relatives. A Palestinian American, Awad said he failed to get U.S. help for his family members, who don't hold U.S. passports, to leave.

Looking forward to the gift of good food

Which one of you has been peeking

We started giving food for Christmas gifts the first year we were married. I read Gourmet Magazine every month, and because my mother always gave our friends stöllen and spiced tea at Christmas, and because I had learned that I love cooking, I thought I'd give it a try. Additionally, a lot of people were on our Christmas list, and I thought that cooking would fit our newlywed budget better than buying a "thing" for everyone on the list.

I knew that I wanted to make poppy seed bread. One of Mother's friends gave me that recipe only after I swore that I would never share it with anyone. The recipe makes seven little sweet, tender loaves containing at least a million calories each.

Mary Alice Lamy had introduced us to Jezebel sauce, which looks hideous but tastes really good when poured over cream cheese and spread on crackers. One ingredient is problematic, however: pineapple preserves. I found, though, that around Christmas, Bing's carried it. So Jezebel sauce was in.

I also decided to make cranberry tea. Micaela, my roommate and friend from Thayer, gave me this recipe. It isn't

really tea, but instead is a mixture of orange, cranberry, and pineapple juices, and is heated with cinnamon sticks until the whole house smells like Christmas.

My BFF Susan's mother, Sweet Hazie, gave me her recipe for Nuts and Bolts, alias Chex Mix. It's different from any other Chex Mix, probably because of the cayenne pepper.

I also tried deviled pecans that year: pecans roasted in butter, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco, and garlic salt. They, like the Nuts and Bolts, have quite a spicy kick.

The gift baskets were so successful that we've continued the tradition for 40 years. After that first year, though, I branched out. One year, I saw something in Gourmet that I wanted to try: Chocolate sauce and hazelnut puree were layered in a glass container, so that it looked like stripes in the glass. It was beautiful! I made that, although I had no idea what hazelnut puree tasted like.

One year, I made red pepper jelly after reading a Gourmet article that convinced me I could do it. One year, I made chocolate raspberry truffles, also from Gourmet, much to the delight of some of my friends. One year, I got Micaela's recipe for Millionaires, pecans doused with caramel and dipped in chocolate. They were a big hit.

Martha Stewart's Christmas book is filled with recipes, decorating tips and DIY decorations. I didn't do the DIY decorations, but I went through all the recipes, determining which ones looked good. I decided on a lemon pound cake with lemon glaze. Instead of one big cake, though, I bought little bundt cake molds and made tons of little lemon pound cakes with lemon glaze.

That book also taught me how to make marshmallows. I had no idea that marshmallows could be made at home. I always thought they were bought at the grocery store in a bag that said "Kraft." Surprise, surprise! Instead of just

puffy pillows, though, I made them in fun shapes, such as hearts or Christmas trees. I included a hot chocolate mix one year, so that my friends' children could have hot chocolate and marshmallows. I found out later that one friend never told his children about the marshmallows, and ate them all himself.

Ina Garten showed me how to make orange marmalade, and so for each of the past 10 years or so, I have given away homemade orange marmalade. Fortunately, I usually have a jar or two left over for Max and me.

Regardless of my trying to mix it up, a few things have remained the same every year: poppy seed bread, deviled pecans, and Nuts and Bolts. Lately, as I choose and prepare the items I will cook that year, I remember my mother, and how proud she was of the bread she made – and how, years later, friends told me that they looked forward to Christmas morning when they ate the stöllen she gave their family.

Maybe someday, people will remember what I make in the same way. I hope so. That would be a gift to me.


A Christmas story minus Santa Claus

UN says more than 1 in 4 people in Gaza are starving because of war

RAFAH, Gaza Strip — More than half a million people in Gaza — a quarter of the population are starving, according to a report Thursday by the U.N. and other agencies that highlights the humanitarian crisis caused by Israel's bombardment and siege on the territory in response to Hamas' Oct. 7 attack.

The extent of the population's hunger eclipsed even the near-famines in Afghanistan and Yemen of recent years, according to figures in the report. The report warned that the risk of famine is "increasing each day," blaming the hunger on insufficient aid entering

"It doesn't get any worse," said Arif Husain, chief economist for the U.N.'s World Food Program. "I have never seen something at the scale that is happening in Gaza. And at this speed."

Israel says it is in the final stages of clearing out Hamas militants from northern Gaza, but that months of fighting lie ahead in the south.

The war sparked by Hamas' deadly Oct. 7 rampage and hostage-taking in Israel has killed nearly 20,000 Palestinians. Some 1.9 million Gaza residents — more than 80% of the population — have been driven from their homes, and many of them are crammed into U.N. shelters.

The war has also pushed Gaza's health sector into collapse. Only nine of its 36 health facilities are still partially functioning, all located in the south, according to the World Health Organization. WHO relief workers on Thursday reported "unbearable" scenes in two hospitals they visited in northern Gaza: Bedridden patients with untreated wounds cry out for water, the few remaining doctors and nurses have no supplies,

and bodies are lined up in the courtyard.

Bombardment and fighting continued Thursday, and internet and communications that had been knocked out for several days gradually began to return across the territory.

U.N. Security Council members are negotiating an Arab-sponsored resolution for a halt in fighting to allow for increased aid deliveries. A vote on the resolution has been postponed twice this week in the hopes of getting the U.S. to support it or allow it to pass after it vetoed an earlier cease-fire call.

Thursday's report from the U.N. underscored the failure of weeks of U.S. efforts to ensure greater aid reaches Palestinians. At the start of the war, Israel stopped all deliveries of food, water, medicine and fuel into the territory. After U.S. pressure, it allowed a trickle of aid in through Egypt. But U.N. agencies say only 10% of Gaza's food needs has been entering for weeks.

This week, Israel began allowing aid to enter Gaza through its Kerem Shalom crossing, which boosted the number of trucks entering from around 100 a day to around 190 on Wednesday, according to the U.N. But a blast Thursday morning hit the Palestinian side of the crossing, forcing the U.N. to stop its pickups of aid there, according to Juliette Touma, spokesperson of UN-RWA, the U.N. agency for Palestinian refugees. At least four people were killed, the nearby hospital reported. Palestinian authorities blamed Israel for the blast, but its cause could not immediately be confirmed.

Israeli President Isaac Herzog said Israel has been working to increase its inspection of aid trucks to 300 or 400 a day and blamed the U.N. for failures in delivery. The amount of aid could triple "if the U.N., instead of complaining all day, would do its job," he said, without elaborating

on what more the U.N. should be doing.

Egypt's Rafah crossing has limited capacity for trucks to cross. U.N. officials say delivery of aid within much of Gaza has become difficult or impossible because of fighting, and more than 130 U.N. personnel have been killed.

The report released Thursday by 23 U.N and nongovernmental agencies found that the entire population in Gaza is in a food crisis, with 576,600 at catastrophic — or starvation — levels. "It is a situation where pretty much everybody in Gaza is hungry," Husain, the World Food Program economist, said.

"People are very, very close to large outbreaks of disease because their immune systems have become so weak because they don't have enough nourishment," he said.

Israel has vowed to continue the offensive until it destroys Hamas' military capabilities and returns scores of hostages captured by Palestinian militants during their Oct. 7 rampage. Hamas and other militants killed some 1,200 people that day, mostly civilians, and captured around 240 others.

Hamas fired a barrage of rockets at central Israel Thursday, showing its military capabilities remain formidable. There were no immediate reports of casualties or damage.

The United States has continued to support Israel's campaign while also urging greater efforts to protect civilians. The U.S. wants Israel to shift to more targeted operations aimed at Hamas leaders and the group's tunnel network.

The Health Ministry in Hamas-run Gaza said Tuesday the death toll since the start of the war had risen to more than 19,600. It does not distinguish between civilian and combatant deaths.

On Wednesday, the WHO delivered supplies to Ahli and Shifa hospitals in northern Gaza,

where Israeli troops have demolished vast swaths of the city while fighting Hamas militants.

Israeli forces have raided a series of health facilities in the north in recent weeks, detaining men for interrogation and expelling others. On Thursday, troops stormed the Palestinian Red Crescent's ambulance center in the Jabaliya refugee camp, taking away paramedics and ambulance crews, the group said.

In some health facilities, patients who are unable to be moved remain, along with skeleton staff who can do little beyond first aid, according to U.N. and health officials

Ahli Hospital is "a place where people are waiting to die," said Sean Casey, a member of the WHO team that visited the two hospitals Wednesday. Five remaining doctors and five nurses along with around 80 patients remain in Ahli, he said.

All of the hospital buildings are damaged except two buildings where patients are now being kept — the orthopedics ward and a church on the grounds, he said.

Inside the church, it was "an unbearable scene," he said. Patients with traumatic wounds struggled with infections. Others had undergone amputations. "Patients were crying out in pain but were also crying out for us to give them water," he said.

Israel's military says 137 of its soldiers have been killed in the Gaza ground offensive. Israel says it has killed some 7,000 militants, without providing evidence. It blames the high number civilian deaths in Gaza on Hamas, saying it uses them as human shields when it fights in residential areas.

and so that's what our paper is trying to do. We're trying to say this method actually works."

Ellison said there are many fields of study in astrophysics, but his goal is to do research and publish papers. He added he finds it fascinating to look through a telescope and see the stars as they were eons ago.

"It's literally looking back millions of years into the past," he said. "It's really cool in a sense. I think everybody is kind of drawn to space.

"Using these amazing research telescopes that I got the opportunity to use last summer, that is really when you get into it," he continued. "And you're looking at things that are billions of years old — stars that have probably already died."

Ellison has been on the Principal's Honor Roll for two years and is the recipient of the Sedalia School District 200 district-level John T. Belcher Scholarship. He is captain of Team SCREAM,

the Smith-Cotton competitive robotics team, and is a three-year letter winner in that program.

He is vice president of the S-C chapter of the National Honor Society, secretary of the Community Café Club, a Math Team board member and three-year letter winner, and secretary of the Tri-M Music Honorary Society. Ellison is also a three-time letter winner in band, where he is first chair and captain of the percussion section.

In a Sedalia 200 media release, Director of Smith-Cotton Bands Max Meigel and Team SCREAM Head Coach Michael Wright expressed their pride in Ellison.

Meigel said Ellison is a dedicated leader.

Bowman says that it's not out of the ordinary to see the winter weather extend into the spring months. In fact, at one point during his now 14year career at the Pleasant Hill office, there was snow in early May.

"I think it's safe to say that we'll have a couple winter systems," Bowman

said. "As far as the predictability goes for when and how much there is, there's no way to say with any level of confidence."

Snow and sleet brings the potential dangers of slipping, aquaplaning, and increasing likelihood of crashes. So, Bowman advises to drive slow, maintain a distance, and maybe pack a winter driving kit including socks, extra clothes, hats and gloves. He also

recommends to check the weather frequently, as there is no telling what'll come when you wake up in the morning.

"People should always be keeping track of the forecast throughout the year," he said, "but it's probably more important in the wintertime where you really do have that potential to have a quick drop in temperatures."

Biden pardoning thousands convicted for marijuana on federal lands and in D.C.

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden is pardoning thousands of people who were convicted of use and simple possession of marijuana on federal lands and in the District of Columbia, the White House said Friday, in his latest round of executive clemencies meant to rectify racial disparities in the justice system.

The categorical pardon Friday builds on a similar round issued just before the 2022 midterm elections that pardoned thousands convicted of simple possession on federal lands eligible. Friday's action broadens the criminal offenses covered by the pardon. Biden is also granting clemency to 11 people serving what the White House called "disproportionately long" sentences for nonviolent drug offenses.

Biden, in a statement, said his actions would help make the "promise of equal justice a reality." "Criminal records

for marijuana use and possession have imposed needless barriers to employment, housing, and educational opportunities," Biden said. "Too many lives have been upended because of our failed approach to marijuana. It's time that we right these wrongs."

No one was freed from prison under last year's action, but the pardons were meant to help thousands overcome obstacles to renting a home or finding a job. Similarly, no federal prisoners are eligible for release as a result of Friday's action.

But the order expands the grounds on which pardons are issued. In the last round, people were pardoned for simple possession under only one criminal statute. Friday's pardons also apply to several other criminal statutes, including attempted simple possession.

Biden's order applies only to marijuana, which has been decriminalized or legalized in many states for some or all uses, but remains a controlled substance under federal

law. U.S. regulators are studying reclassifying the drug from the category of drugs deemed to have "no currently accepted medical use and a high potential for abuse," known as "Schedule I," to the less tightly regulated "Schedule III."

The pardon also does not apply to those in the U.S. unlawfully at the time of their offense.

Biden's proclamation effectively pardons the covered people, but they will need to submit applications to the Justice Department's pardon attorney office to receive certificates of pardon that can be used for housing and employment purposes.

Biden on Friday reiterated his call on governors and local leaders to take similar steps to erase marijuana convictions.

"Just as no one should be in a federal prison solely due to the use or possession of marijuana, no one should be in a local jail or state prison for that reason, either," Biden said.

Checkered history of poinsettia's namesake and origins get new attention

SANTA FE, N.M. — Like Christmas trees, Santa and reindeer, the poinsettia has long been a ubiquitous symbol of the holiday season in the U.S. and across Europe.

But now, nearly 200 years after the plant with the bright crimson leaves was introduced in the U.S., attention is once again turning to the poinsettia's origins and the checkered history of its namesake, a slaveowner and lawmaker who played a part in the forced removal of Native Americans from their land. Some people would now rather call the plant by the name of its Indigenous origin in southern Mexico.

Some things to know: WHERE DID THE NAME POINSETTIA COME FROM?

The name comes from the amateur botanist and statesman Joel Roberts Poinsett, who happened upon the plant in 1828 during his tenure as the first U.S. minister to the newly independent Mexico.

Poinsett, who was interested in science as well as potential cash crops, sent clippings of the plant to his home in South Carolina and to a botanist in Philadelphia, who affixed the eponymous name to the plant in gratitude.

A life-size bronze statue of Poinsett still stands in his honor in downtown Greenville, South Carolina.

However, he was cast out of Mexico within a year of his discovery, having earned a local reputation for intrusive political maneuvering that extended to a network of secretive masonic lodges and schemes to contain British influence.

IS THE 'POINSETTIA' NAME LOSING ITS LUSTER?

As more people learn of its namesake's complicated history, the name "poinsettia" has become less attractive in the United States.

Unvarnished published accounts reveal Poinsett as a disruptive advocate for business interests abroad, a slaveholder on a rice plantation in the U.S., and a secretary of war who helped oversee the forced removal of Native Americans, including the westward relocation of Cherokee populations to Oklahoma known as the "Trail of Tears."

In a new biography titled "Flowers, Guns and Money," historian Lindsay Schakenbach Regele describes the cosmopolitan Poinsett as a political and economic pragmatist who conspired with a Chilean independence leader and colluded with British bankers in Mexico. Though he was a slaveowner, he opposed secession, and he didn't live to see the Civil War.

Schakenbach Regele renders tough judgment on Poinsett's treatment of and regard for Indigenous peoples.

"Because Poinsett belonged to learned societies, contributed to botanists' collections, and purchased art from Europe, he could more readily justify the expulsion of Natives from their homes," she writes.

A CHRISTMAS FLOWER OF MANY NAMES

The cultivation of the plant dates back to the Aztec empire in Mexico 500 years ago.

Among Nahuatl-speaking communities of Mexico, the plant is known as the cuetlaxochitl (kwet-la-SHO-sheet), meaning "flower that withers." It's an apt description of the thin red leaves on wild varieties of the plant that grow to heights above 10 feet (3 meters).

Year-end holiday markets in Latin America brim with the potted plant known in Spanish as the "flor de Nochebuena," or "flower of Christmas Eve," which is entwined with celebrations of

the night before Christmas. The "Nochebuena" name is traced to early Franciscan friars who arrived from Spain in the 16th century. Spaniards once called it "scarlet cloth."

Additional nicknames abound: "Santa Catarina" in Mexico, "estrella federal," or "federal star" in Argentina and "penacho de Incan," or "headdress" in Peru.

Ascribed in the 19th century, the Latin name, Euphorbia pulcherrima, means "the most beautiful" of a diverse genus with a milky sap of latex.

SO WHAT IS ITS PREFERRED NAME?

"Cuetaxochitl" is winning over some enthusiasts among Mexican youths, including the diaspora in the U.S., according to Elena Jackson Albarrán, a professor of Mexican history and global and intercultural studies at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio.

"I've seen a trend towards

people openly saying: 'Don't call this flower either poinsettia or Nochebuena. It's cuetlaxochitl," said Jackson Albarrán. "There's going to be a big cohort of people who are like, 'Who cares?"

Most ordinary people in Mexico never say "poinsettia" and don't talk about Poinsett, according to Laura Trejo, a Mexican biologist who is leading studies on the genetic history of the U.S. poinsettia.

"I feel like it's only the historians, the diplomats and, well, the politicians who know the history of Poinsett," Trejo said.

THE MEXICAN ROOTS OF U.S. POINSETTIAS

Mexican biologists in recent years have traced the genetic stock of U.S. poinsettia plants to a wild variant in the Pacific coastal state of Guerrero, verifying lore about Poinsett's pivotal encounter there. The scientists also are researching a rich, untapped diversity of other

wild variants, in efforts that may help guard against the poaching of plants and theft of genetic information.

The flower still grows wild along Mexico's Pacific Coast and parts of Central America as far as Costa Rica.

Trejo, of the National Council of Science and Technology in the central state of Tlaxcala, said some informal outdoor markets still sell the "sun cuetlaxochitl" that resemble wild varieties, alongside modern patented varieties.

In her field research travels, Trejo has found households that preserve ancient traditions associated with the flower.

"It's clear to us that this plant, since the pre-Hispanic era, is a ceremonial plant, an offering, because it's still in our culture, in the interior of the county, to cut the flowers and take them to the altars," she said in Spanish. "And this is primarily associated with the maternal goddesses:

with Coatlicue, Tonantzin and now with the Virgin Mary."

A LASTING FIGURE IN HISTORY

Regardless of his troubled history, Poinsett's legacy as an explorer and collector continues to loom large: Some 1,800 meticulously tended poinsettias are delivered in November and December from greenhouses in Maryland to a long list of museums in Washington, D.C., affiliated with the Smithsonian Institution.

A "pink-champagne" cultivar adorns the National Portrait Gallery this year.

Poinsett's name may also live on for his connection to other areas of U.S. culture. He advocated for the establishment of a national science museum, and in part due to his efforts, a fortune bequeathed by British scientist James Smithson was used to underwrite the creation of the Smithsonian Institution.

Holiday deliveries stolen? What to know about porch piracy and what you can do about it

NEW YORK — You found the perfect holiday gift online. You ordered it. A notification arrived on your phone, showing the package had arrived. But when you open your doors, the parcel is nowhere to be found.

If this has happened to you, then count yourself among the unlucky group of shoppers who fall victim to package thefts — or porch piracy, as it's commonly known.

Here's what you should know about the issue, and what to do if it happens to

HOW BIG OF A PROBLEM IS PORCH PIRACY?

It's hard to tell. Most police departments don't track package theft in its own category, which means there's a lack of national data.

The FBI's figures do show burglary offenses and larceny-theft — a category that includes shoplifting, pickpocketing, and instances of package theft — have decreased overall in the last 20-plus years. But since both categories are broad and the agency doesn't keep tabs on specific incidents of package thefts, it's challenging to know whether the problem is getting better or

worse.

Some police departments have started to segregate reports of package theft into their own category, which does show some worrying signs. In Denver, Colorado, for example, there's been more than 1,260 reported incidents of package thefts this year, up from roughly

750 four years ago. Some industry surveys show it's a headache for many online shoppers. A product research company called The Chamber of Commerce said it surveyed 1,250 U.S. consumers in October and found that 26% of them have been victims of package theft. The problem was roughly split between urban and suburban areas, it said, and only 18% of consumers who've had packages stolen reported it to police.

Another report, which used a variety of sources and was compiled by the bank Capitol One, showed 14% of Americans were victims of porch piracy last year. It said those thefts amounted to \$29.2 billion in losses.

WHAT ARE COMPANIES DOING ABOUT IT?

Retailers and delivery companies are trying to combat the problem in a variety of ways.

rariety of ways.
UPS and FedEx, for

example, allow customers to delay package deliveries if they're not home or divert them to other pickup locations, either for free or with a fee.

This year, UPS also rolled out a feature called DeliveryDefense that uses AI to assess delivery risks and generate a "confidence score" for addresses where merchants need to ship packages. If the address has a low score, merchants can offer customers in-store collection or UPS pick-up points, which include CVS and Michaels stores as well as other local businesses. UPS spokesperson Jim Mayer said 350 retailers are using the service, but de-

clined to provide examples.

Retailers like Amazon
and Walmart also allow customers to track their orders
and prepare for deliveries,
or pick them up in stores.

Amazon, which has a limited physical footprint compared to Walmart, has lockers where packages can be picked up at third-party locations, as well as its subsidiary Whole Foods. The company also gives its Prime members the option to have packages placed inside secure locations like their garage by Amazon drivers.

In addition, retailers and brands are partnering with companies that offer shipping protections, and choosing to take on those expenses or offer it to consumers who want to pay

for it.

One of these companies, Extend, noted that it works with 400 retailers, merchants and brands like Anne Klein and LensDirect, which sells contact lens and glasses. Rohan Shah, the founder of Extend, says high-end retailers who are focused on retaining customers are choosing to pay for warranties. But the majority are offering it to consumers as an add-on.

WHAT DO I DO IF I CAN'T FIND MY PACKAGES?

Retailers say customers should check their order status and confirm whether a package was delivered. If the delivery was finalized, they say customers should ask other members of their household or their neighbors to see if someone else accepted the delivery.

If that doesn't work, the best thing to do would be to reach out to the company from which you purchased the item.

Shah, from Extend, said retailers are often trying to determine if customers are telling the truth, and looking at things like the shopper's prior history of reporting stolen packages to determine how they should

respond. Some, he said, are asking customers to file police reports, which most people don't want to do

whether they're lying or not.

"There are these points –
what I like to call friction or
'gotchas' – where (retailers)
will try to minimize customers filing these claims
because they know it's going
to cost them," Shah said.

"It's a bit of a headache for
all parties involved."

Ben Stickle, a criminal justice professor at Middle Tennessee State University and a leading expert on the topic, said retailers are generally willing to replace stolen packages, which might be driven by a desire to maintain their brand reputation and customer loyalty.

Amazon encourages customers to contact customer service if they don't have their package in hand within 30 days of expected delivery. Customers who ordered items from Amazon's third-party sellers should contact those merchants, the company says on its website. Walmart also says customers should reach out to the company.

Target includes a clause on its site that says the risk of loss passes to the buyer after the company delivers an order to a carrier. Still, the company says on its site that customers who can't find their deliveries can request a replacement or a

refund online. If retailers aren't helping, Consumer Reports says customers should contact the shipping company. If the purchase was made with a credit card, it might also be worth checking the credit card company's benefits to see if it includes insurance for lost or stolen items, they said. Homeowners or renters insurance might also help, it noted, but those policies usually have deductibles of \$500 or more.

WHAT DOES THE LAW SAY?

Stealing packages delivered by the U.S. Postal Service is a federal crime. But punishment for taking parcels delivered by private carriers, like UPS or Amazon, falls under state laws, which can differ.

A bill to expand federal penalties to packages delivered by private carriers was introduced in Congress last year by U.S. Rep. Dean Phillips, a Democrat from Minnesota. But the legislation hasn't advanced.

Meanwhile, some states
— including Texas, New
Jersey and Michigan —
have been changing their
own laws in the past few
years to impose more
stringent penalties on porch
piracy.



Chiefs aim to lock up AFC West, continue dominance of Raiders on Christmas

KANSAS CITY, Mo.

— The one-sided nature of the Chiefs' recent history with the Las Vegas Raiders perhaps appropriately mimics the way the AFC West has turned into a one-team

division since Andy Reid

arrived in Kansas City

just over a decade ago.

After second-place
finishes in his first three
seasons, Reid has led the
Chiefs to seven straight
division titles, and they
could clinch their eighth
on Monday with a
victory over the Raiders
— or a tie if the Broncos
lose to the Patriots the
previous night. The only
streak longer in NFL
history belongs to the

Patriots, who won 11 straight AFC East championships from 2009 to 2019.

"That's something we talk about at the beginning of the year: Our first goal is to win the AFC West," Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes said. "We have to be ready this week, and that would clinch our first goal if we are able to do that."

The Chiefs (9-5) also are trying to keep their hopes alive of earning the AFC's No. 1 seed and lone first-round playoff bye. They head into the weekend two games back of the Ravens and a game behind the Dolphins, whom they have already defeated.

incoln boys basketball came into its W-K Holiday Shootout contest on Dec. 13 with Concordia in need of some good luck on the injury front.

Sophomores Dawson
Parrott and Riley Sanders
had revolved to the sideline,
each with hand injuries.
Senior Xavier Smith was
out on a temporary basis
due to illness.

It was foreseeable that the Cardinals, coming off an undefeated regular season last winter, would have to reconstruct after losing essentially every major piece of the rotation to graduation. All the knocks, however, had led to an 0-5 start that was far more challenging than anticipated.

"We've lost a lot of close games," Lincoln head coach Tyler Burke said at the time. "You see 0-5 and think, 'Oh, these guys [aren't so good].' But we've been in every game. We've got an inexperienced group. A young group. But they're talented.

That W-K game against Concordia didn't initially look like it would lead to a turnaround. Lincoln came out and trailed 13-10 after the opening eight minutes.

After that, though, there was tangible evidence of Burke's claims. The Cardi-

nals limited the Orioles to single-digits in each quarter the rest of the evening. Offensively, the ball moved, leading to good looks in the paint and some open looks around the arc.

Lincoln ended up going for 23 points in the third quarter and went on to get their first victory, 60-38.

Before the game, Burke said that this year's team would always be one that had to rely on five guys to score, and the production was spread out in the win. Anthony Srader had 16 points and was joined by two others in double-figures, Ben Eckhoff (12) and Camden Everhart (11). Zaden Cole and Chase Young added eight and seven points, respectively.

Fresh off that experience, the Cardinals traveled to the Otterville Holiday Classic, a tournament that some years has felt like there's to lose.

The expectations this year were likely a bit different as the 6-seed, but it still ended with some good results, even if it came with more adversity.

MLB widening the runner's lane to first, changing a rule that has caused World Series controversy

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball is widening the runner's lane approaching first base to include a portion of fair territory, changing a more than century-old rule that caused World Series controversy over interference calls.

MLB also is shortening the pitch clock with runners on base by two seconds to 18 and further reducing mound visits in an effort to speed games.

Another change adopted Thursday by the sport's 11-man competition committee requires a

pitcher who warms up on the mound before a half inning to face at least one

batter. The new runner's lane overrides a rule that has existed since the National League mandated in 1882 that runners must be within the 3-foot box on the foul side of the base line during the final 45 feet between home and first. Violators were subject to being called out for interfering with fielders taking a throw. The rule was designed to prevent collisions; foul lines intersected the middle of bases until the bags were moved

entirely into fair territory

in 1887.

The change widens the lane to include 18-to-24 inches of fair territory until the edge of the grass, though MLB said it will allow a grace period for compliance because of the need to modify artificial turf surfaces.

The old rule has long sparked frustration because right-handed hitters necessarily begin their sprint to first base in fair territory, and the first base bag is fully in fair ground, too.

Umpires' interpretations of the rule have sparked disputes.

Florida State players and coaches still hurting, refocus to try and stay unbeaten

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.

— The heartache won't go away. Not anytime soon, anyway. Not for Florida State players and coaches who were driven to earn a spot in the College Football Playoff and play for another title.

The Seminoles had to settle for the Atlantic Coast Conference championship, which followed a perfect regular season.

"Nobody can take that from us," senior defensive back Jarrian Jones said.

The CFP selection committee dropped Florida State (13-0) from fourth to fifth and outside the four-team playoff, a move it justified because of star quarterback Jordan Travis' season-ending broken leg. It prompted outrage from coach Mike Norvell and FSU administrators, and had state lawmakers crying out for answers

No one felt the pain like the players who did everything right for months.

"I ain't going to lie, I'm going to be hurt with that for the rest of my life," Jones said. "It just feels like somebody ripped your heart out of the chest."

Since the playoff snub, Norvell and his assistants have been busy. They hit the road to visit 2024 commitments and a few prospects they'd like to flip on national signing day. They've hosted several transfer prospects, most notably quarterbacks Cameron Ward (Washington State) and DJ Uiagalelei (Oregon State). They've landed a commitment from Georgia defensive end Marvin Jones Jr., the son of one of the Seminoles' top linebackers in program history.

history. They've also tried to listen and advise players through upcoming decisions on their futures. Standout defensive end Jared Verse, running back Trey Benson and receiver Johnny Wilson are among those who have opted out of the Orange Bowl against Georgia (12-1) on Dec. 30. 

Wilder, Joshua jostle for position as heavyweight scene simmers before Fury-Usyk unification bout

Deontay Wilder and Anthony Joshua were once the main characters in heavyweight boxing's soap opera.

Now they are extras. While Tyson Fury and Oleksandr Usyk continue preparations for a Feb. 17 unification bout in Saudi Arabia that will determine the division's first undisputed champion this century, Wilder and Joshua are in the kingdom this weekend and fighting simply to stay relevant.

Wilder, the WBC champion from 2015-20, was dethroned by Fury in February 2020 and has fought only twice since. What kind of shape will the 38-year-old American be in when he takes on Joseph Parker, the WBO champion from 2016-18?

After that comes the main event on what has been labeled the "Day of Reckoning" as Joshua, the former WBA, IBF and WBO titleholder, fights Otto Wallin, a

New York-based Swedish journeyman. Joshua has underwhelming wins over Jermaine Franklin and Robert Helenius on his record since back-to-back defeats to Usyk that left his career at a crossroads.

Whether Wilder and Joshua have the belief after their damaging losses to become heavyweight champion again is open to question. They are most likely to fight each other next — provided they both win in Jeddah — and the winner of what would be a big-money bout would, in theory, be in position to challenge for a world title.

"It's the closest that it's ever been in history," Wilder said this week of a potential meeting with Joshua that he regards as "the biggest fight in the world."

Maybe five or six years ago, but surely not any-

Not with Wilder having fought only Helenius since completing that trilogy against Fury in October 2021.

And not with Joshua

appearing vulnerable and fragile after three losses in a five-fight span from 2019-22, crushing an aura he had built.

"I think he's lost his confidence and momentum," Wallin said of Joshua ahead of their fight, echoing the thoughts of many in boxing. "You can see the decline ... Joshua looks unsure of himself."

Joshua, a 34-year-old Brit who has been world champion twice after winning gold at the 2012 Olympics, has twice changed trainers to fuel his career rebuild and has been working with another — Ben Davison, who was once in Fury's corner — for the Wallin fight. A long-time media darling, Joshua has been more tight-lipped since arriving in Saudi Arabia and seems to be all business this time.

"This position I am in is not a joke. It is serious," Joshua told British newspaper The Daily Mail. "I understand why I am here and what I am doing. I understand the pressure that comes with it."

Wallin, a southpaw like Usyk, is not a big puncher like Joshua and has won his last five fights on points. He is on a six-fight winning streak since losing to Fury in September 2019 but none have been against a top heavyweight.

As for Parker, the New Zealander's loss to Joe Joyce of Britain in September last year was a third defeat of his career but he has at least kept busy in the meantime with three straight wins against unheralded opponents.

The same cannot be said of Wilder, around whom there is most curiosity this week — not least because the "Bronze Bomber" last fought outside the United States in 2014.

It's the first time he has fought in Saudi Arabia, seemingly the new home of heavyweight boxing because of the lucrative purses the kingdom offers. It's the third time for Joshua — and it'll no doubt be a fourth if he and Wilder win to set up their likely fight in the spring of 2024.

Saints' aggressive play-calling ends up coming back to hurt them in loss to Rams

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — New Orleans coach Dennis Allen knew coming into Thursday night against the Los Angeles Rams that the Saints couldn't be conservative in their decisions. Not when they were facing a resurgent Rams offense and with the Saints' own playoff hopes on the line.

New Orleans' aggressiveness though turned into one of its biggest shortcomings in its 30-22 loss.

The Saints turned it over on downs three times, which the Rams converted into 13 points. Derek Carr's only interception of the night also resulted in Los Angeles scoring a touchdown on its ensuing possession.

"We came into this game wanting to be aggressive. Knowing the type of team and the offense that we were playing, kicking field goals wasn't going to be the way to go and try to win this game," Allen said.

Allen's second fourthdown gamble would end up being the most fatal. The Saints trailed 10-3 with a minute remain-

ing in the first half and had fourth-and-5 on the Rams 42. Carr felt pressure on his right side from linebacker Ernest Jones and had to throw it before tight end Juwan Johnson knew it was in the air.

Five plays later, Matthew Stafford hit Demarcus Robinson on a 4-yard touchdown pass and the Saints trailed by two touchdowns with 21 seconds remaining

before halftime. "That was huge, and it hurt when we didn't convert," said Carr, who was 27 of 40 for 319

yards, three touchdowns and a pick.

The Rams also got the ball to start the second half and extended their lead to 13 points on Lucas Havrisik's second field goal.

"That 14-point swing (at the end of the first half), that's huge momentum to lose," defensive end Cameron Jordan

New Orleans did rally with 15 points in the fourth quarter, but their hopes for a comeback were dashed when Puka Nacua recovered an onside kick with 3:52

remaining. The Rams then ran out the clock as the Saints didn't have any timeouts.

The loss was similar to the Saints' 33-28 loss to the Detroit Lions on Dec. 3. New Orleans also fell behind big early in that game only to see its rally fall short.

After leading the NFC South at the midway point, the Saints have dropped four of their last six. At 7-8, their lone viable path to the playoffs appears to be winning the division.

New Orleans closes with division opponents in its final two games, including Dec. 31 against Tampa Bay. The Buccaneers, who beat the Saints 26-9 on Oct. 1, are 7-7 going into Sunday's game against Jacksonville.

The Saints then close with Atlanta (6-8) on Jan. 7. The Falcons won the first meeting 24-15 on Nov. 26.

"At this point, we are who we are. We have two games left, there's no sugarcoating this," Jordan said. "It's frustrating to be in this position. We have to win out at the end of the day. There's no excuses."

Report: Footballs in New England were deflated in Chiefs game; Pats not to blame

The special teams footballs used in Sunday's game between Kansas City and New England were reportedly underinflated — not by the Patriots, this time — an ironic throwback to the Deflategate scandal that captivated the football world for parts of three seasons and led to penalties against the team and quarterback Tom Brady.

MassLive.com reported on Thursday that the Patriots complained to the officials during the first half of the Chiefs' 27-17 victory that the balls used by the punters and kickers — which are specially marked, and referred to as "K-balls" — were too soft. They were tested at halftime and found to be inflated to 11 psi, the website reported, instead of the league-mandated range of 12.5-13.5 psi.

After the 2015 Deflategate fiasco, when the NFL ruled that the Patriots were intentionally using underinflated footballs, the league took control of the game balls away from the teams.

"We were aware of it in the first quarter," Patriots coach Bill Belichick said Friday. "You have to talk to the league what happened on that, because we don't have anything to do with that part of it. They control all that."

An NFL spokesman did not respond to an email from The Associated Press seeking comment. Patriots kickers were not available during Thursday's open locker loom period. Chiefs coach Andy Reid said on Thursday that he hadn't heard of any issues but told reporters, "I'm not worried about all that."

The website reported and Belichick confirmed that the Patriots sensed something was wrong when Kansas City's Harrison Butker, who has put 87% of his kickoffs this season into the end zone for touchbacks, sent his game-opening kick only to the 3 yard-line. During the first half, both teams' kickers missed field goals, including a 39-yard attempt that was Butker's first miss of the season.

"I think you could see that by the kicks," Belichick said. "Butker had a perfect season going."

The balls were checked at halftime and fixed. Butker made two field goals in the second half and every kickoff for both teams reached the end zone.

Belichick wondered

why the balls weren't fixed sooner.

In the scandal that came to be known as Deflategate, the Patriots were fined \$1 million and docked two draft picks and Brady was suspended four games for what the league found was a scheme to provide improperly inflated footballs for the AFC championship game

against the Indianapolis Colts in January of 2015. In a 243-page report, an NFL investigator zeroed in on two equipment managers — one who referred to himself in a text message as "The Deflator" — and concluded that Brady was "at least generally aware" of the illegal deflation plans.

The Patriots defended

Brady, countering that the league's scientific evidence was flawed. Brady appealed to NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and then the federal courts; after a 2nd Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals panel reinstated his suspension,

games of the 2016 season. New England went on to win the Super Bowl.

Brady sat out the first four

Despite playing only 12 games, Brady was the runner-up in MVP voting.

In response to the scandal, the NFL changed its procedures to put pregame control of the footballs in the hands of the officials, not the individual teams.

Reports: Prized pitcher Yamamoto agrees with Dodgers on \$325m deal

LOS ANGELES — Prized free-agent pitcher Yoshinobu Yamamoto and the Los Angeles Dodgers have agreed to a \$325 million, 12-year contract, according to multiple

reports. Yamamoto is set to join Japanese countryman Shohei Ohtani with the Dodgers, who signed the two-way superstar to a record \$700 million, 10-year deal last week.

The Dodgers did not

confirm the agreement with Yamamoto on Thursday night. MLB.com and ESPN were among the outlets citing anonymous sources in reporting the deal.

The New York Yankees and New York Mets were among the many clubs that pursued Yamamoto.

It's the third major pitching coup for the NL West champion Dodgers this offseason. In addition to Ohtani, the team signed right-hander Tyler Glasnow to a \$136.5 million, fiveyear contract after he was

traded from the Tampa Bay Rays to Los Angeles.

Ohtani made a video pitch to Glasnow to join him in Hollywood.

"It was important to Shohei that this wasn't the one move we were going to make," Dodgers President of Baseball Operations Andrew Friedman said at Ohtani's introductory news conference last week.

Yamamoto was 16-6 with a 1.21 ERA this season, striking out 169 and walking 28 in 164 innings. He is 70-29 with a 1.82 ERA in seven seasons with the Orix Buffaloes. Yamamoto struck out a Japan Series-record 14 in a Game 6 win over Hanshin on Nov. 5, throwing a 138-pitch complete game. Orix went on to lose Game 7.

Orix posted the 25-yearold right-hander on Nov. 20 and Major League Baseball teams had until Jan. 4 to sign him.

Yamamoto's deal with the Dodgers would be the largest and longest ever guaranteed to a big league pitcher.

Ohtani was a two-time AL MVP with the Los Angeles Angels before becoming a free agent this offseason and moving to the Dodgers.

Yamamoto pitched his second career no-hitter,

the 100th in Japanese big league history, on Sept. 9 for the Buffaloes against the Lotte Marines. The game, watched by MLB executives, extended his scoreless streak to 42 innings.

A two-time Pacific League MVP, Yamamoto also threw a no-hitter against the Seibu Lions on June 18 last year. His fastball averaged 95 mph and topped out at 96.6 mph in Japan's semifinal win over Mexico at the World Baseball Classic in March.

He threw 20 fastballs, 19 splitters, six curveballs, six cutters and one slider in a 3 1/3-inning relief outing. Batters swung at 11 of his splitters and missed four.

Following hard-throwing 21-year-old sensation Roki Sasaki, Yamamoto gave up two runs and three hits in 3 1/3 innings with four strikeouts and two walks, allowing Alex Verdugo's RBI double. Yamamoto was charged with a second run when Isaac Paredes hit an RBI single off Atsuki Yuasa.

Under the MLB-NPB agreement, the posting fee will be 20% of the first \$25 million of a major league contract, including earned bonuses and options. The New York Mets' J.C. Martin was in fair territory when he was hit on the left wrist by pitcher Pete Richert's throw following his sacrifice bunt in the 10th inning of World Series Game 4 in 1969. That allowed Rod Gaspar to score the winning run from second against Baltimore as plate umpire Shag Crawford and first base umpire Lou DiMuro failed to call interference.

The call went the other way in the seventh inning of World Series Game 6 in 2019, when Washington's Trea Turner was called out for interference by plate umpire Sam Holbrook when he was hit on the back of the right leg by Houston reliever Brad Peacock's throw, a decision upheld in a video review.

"It's just going to make things easier for the ball-players and the umpires," Holbrook said this week of the change. "Players can run straight to the bag, especially the right-handed hitters. It's been talked about for a while. I think they're trying to do the right thing."

The out cost Washington a run when Anthony Rendon homered, and Martinez was ejected for arguing after the half inning, needing to be restrained by bench coach Chip Hale.

"I don't know how long that rule has been in place, probably a hundred years," Martinez said the following day. "These judgment calls are difficult. The umpires do the best they can on getting it right. I know that."

When Turner was called out for interference on a throw to first by Chicago Cubs catcher Willson Contreras following an errant pitch on a third strike on May 19, 2021, Martinez was ejected by umpire Chris Conroy. The manager picked up the first base

bag and slammed it to the ground and then kicked it. After another similar call went against Washington on June 14, 2023, Martinez printed out a photo showing where the baserunner was and held it up during his postgame news conference.

A similar play occurred in Game 2 of the 1998 AL Championship Series, when a throw by Yankees first baseman Tino Martinez after Travis Fryman's 12th-inning bunt struck Fryman on the back and rolled on the infield dirt. Second baseman Chuck Knoblauch screamed at plate umpire Ted Hendry for an interference call and pointed toward first rather than chase the ball as Enrique Wilson scored the tiebreaking run from first.

The changes were approved by the committee over objections from all five players who voted.

"As they made clear in the competition committee, players strongly feel that, following last season's profound changes to the fundamental rules of the game, immediate additional changes are unnecessary and offer no meaningful benefits to fans, players, or the competition on the field," the union said in a statement. "This season should be used to gather additional data and fully examine the health, safety, and injury impacts of reduced recovery time; that is where our focus will be."

Speeding games remained a priority for the committee too

committee, too.

Nine-inning games averaged 2 hours, 40 minutes during the regular season in the first year of the pitch clock, down from 24 minutes from 2022 and the lowest since 1985. That speed-up carried over to the post-season, where nine-inning World Series games averaged 3:01, the fastest since 1996. However, the average increased over the course of the season from

2:37 in April to 2:44 in September.

Mound visits are being cut to four from five, with a defensive team still getting an additional visit in the ninth inning if it has none left after the eighth. A catcher can signal for a mound visit, stopping the clock, without heading to the mound, and the clock will resume after a foul ball when the pitcher has the ball and is ready to resume the game, eliminating the requirement he also be on the mound — MLB hopes that eliminates pitchers walking onto the grass next to the mound.

MLB said the requirement to have a reliever who warms up on the mound face at least one batter was instituted because a pitcher took the mound for an inning and then was replaced without throwing a pitch 24 times last season, plus twice more in the World Series.

MLB withdrew its proposal to have the plate umpire reset the pitch clock immediately after a batter uses a timeout. The committee tabled two proposals: one that would require pitchers to work from the stretch position with runners on base, eliminating hybrid windup/stretch deliveries that were used by 8% of pitchers last season; and another designed to prevent fielders from blocking runners at bases.

Seattle chairman John Stanton heads the committee, which met by Zoom and includes St. Louis CEO Bill DeWitt Jr., San Francisco chairman Greg Johnson, Colorado CEO Dick Monfort, Toronto CEO Mark Shapiro and Boston chairman Tom Werner, along with umpire Bill Miller. Players include Milwaukee's Corbin Burnes, Arizona's Zac Gallen, Toronto's Whit Merrifield and San Francisco's Austin Slater along with alternates Ian Happ of the Chicago Cubs and Cole Irvin of Balti-

They Chiefs have an easier finishing stretch than either of those teams, and it begins with Las Vegas (6-8), which they have beaten six straight times and 11 of the last 12 in a series dating to Sept. 16, 1960, when the Chiefs were in Dallas and the Raiders in Oakland. In fact, the Raiders have won only once at Arrowhead Stadium since Oct. 28, 2012.

just tired of losing to," said Raiders cornerback Amik Robertson, who thought back to their 31-17 loss to the Chiefs in late November. "We've got the pieces. We've got the guys to be able to beat that team, and unfortunately we took an 'L.' That's something I thought about for a long time. I'm happy that it's back, that we've got an opportunity."

"It's a team that I'm

Despite the lopsided nature of the rivalry, the Chiefs and Raiders

remain just that: rivals. There is a mutual hatred between the franchises, borne of the days of Len Dawson and Jim Otto, nurtured through the era of Bill Kenney and Jim Plunkett, and continuing into the present. Mahomes is 10-1 in his career against the Raiders.

"Any time you play a team like this," Raiders quarterback Aidan O'Connell said, "you got to stay within yourself. Play one play at a time. Obviously there is history between the two

teams, but I think any game you have to lock in on each play, each situation, try to stay ahead of the sticks and just make smart decisions."

PLAYING ON CHRISTMAS

This is not the first time the Raiders and Chiefs have played on Christmas Day — the Chiefs won 31-30 in overtime in 2004, when Larry Johnson and Tony Gonzalez had two TDs apiece for Kansas City. The Chiefs also have a Dec. 25 win over the Broncos in 2016 and a Christmas loss to the Dolphins in the divisional round of the playoffs in 1971.

The only other game the Raiders have played on Christmas was in 2017, when they lost at Philadelphia.

AND PLAYING SANTA

Mahomes gives his offensive line gifts each year, and this year it was tricked-out golf carts that the big fellas whipped around the Arrowhead Stadium parking lot. Raiders wide receiver Davante Adams heard about it and was impressed, but noted that his own rookie QB probably won't have anything quite so extravagant lined up for his guys.

"It's a lot better than some gifts that I've seen quarterbacks give across the league. That's a hell of a gift," Adams said, "but Aidan's bank account I don't think is ready for that. So he'll do that when he's ready."

FLUKE OR FABULOUS

The Raiders raised

plenty of eyebrows a week ago, when they set a franchise scoring record in their 63-21 victory over the Chargers. They scored a club-record 42 points in the first half, and eight different Raiders reached the end zone.

Now, they need to prove that it was not a one-off occurrence.

"We're not expecting to have 60 points every time we go out there, but it was more the style and togetherness that we played with," Adams said. "When you can go out there and play together like that and everybody does their job and play at a high level, it's fun. So, hopefully we can continue to do that."

FINISHING MATTERS

The Raiders have gotten off to good starts in two of their last three games against Kansas City, jumping out to a 17-0 lead in their October 2022 matchup and leading 14-0 earlier this season. In both cases, the Chiefs rallied for victories.

SPEAKING OF FINISHING

The Chiefs are last in the NFL in fourth-quarter scoring, averaging 2.8 points per game — a full point behind Arizona, the next-to-last team. They were shut out by New England last week and managed only a field goal the previous week against Buffalo.

"We've got to do better there," Reid said. "Bottom line, you have to score."

All while commiserating a wild, 24-hour span in which they celebrated the program's first ACC title since 2014 only to be left out of the CFP the next day.

"It's been challenging," Norvell said. "You basically got 12 hours to celebrate what was an unbelievable accomplishment for this team. Then you had to learn how to work through disappointment, hurt, frustration, anger, every bit of it. And you're 18-to 22-year-old kids and a 42-year-old coach."

Norvell called it one of the toughest two-week stretches of his coaching career. But he also refused to let Florida State's accomplishments go unrecognized.

"I will always have the feelings of what happened," Norvell said. "But at the end of the day, I wasn't in that room. It wasn't my choice, so my beliefs of what it is, that's that. ... I'm so proud of what and who this team is and what they represented for 13 weeks of the season.

"It doesn't take away from what these guys have accomplished throughout the course of this year."

Florida State practiced Tuesday as the team continued preparing for Georgia. Quarterback Tate Rodemaker and Brock Glenn led the offense. All-ACC selections defensive end Patrick Payton and linebacker Kalen DeLoach guided the defense.

The Seminoles are

pushing forward in hopes of finishing the year undefeated. Florida State has won three national titles and won't be able to secure a fourth in 2023, but there is a chance for a perfect finish to an imperfect season.

Jones has been among the most vocal, saying he is looking forward to his NFL draft preparations but insisted he would play in the Orange Bowl.

"We set out to win every game that was put in front of us," Jones said.

That makes it common for readers to call our offices with a specific question about an article they read, not realizing we're the writers and aren't affiliated with the organizations we interview.

Since then, I've received countless phone calls from people wanting to sign up their families for assistance. A few called in the last two weeks asking when they could pick up their items. I connected every single one with Christmas Cheer organizers so they could get answers.

I know that Christmas Cheer – and Community Santa in Pettis County – serves so many residents who need extra help this time of year, but personally receiving phone calls made that even more evident.

In between those calls asking me about Christmas Cheer, I also got a few people asking for help of any kind because the end of the year had taken a turn for the worse for their families. They called the newspaper because they didn't know where to even begin.

The first such call was just before Thanksgiving from a woman who called the Star-Journal asking for information on holiday assistance. I offered her a list of nonprofits and other random contacts in Johnson County that hopefully were able to help. I also just listened as she told me about the impossible struggles facing her family this year.

But I realized that the second I hung up the phone, I had barely said anything to offer a little comfort in that moment. I could hear in her voice how stressed she was about what the holidays would look like at her house this year due to circumstances beyond her control. I tend to do that – I jump into action when someone says they have a problem or need something from me, and I forget that saying "I'm sorry" or "How are you doing?" or any form of comfort can also be a form of assistance. While actions are helpful in the long term, sometimes we just need to hear someone tell us it will be OK in the short term.

I wish I had told her that she should never feel humiliated - her words for asking for help. Being vulnerable enough to tell a stranger that you feel humiliated for needing help might be even more brave than asking for help in the first place. I wish I had let her tell me a little more about her family and how she was feeling; I could tell that I was probably one of the first people she had confided in, outside her family unit.

She told me her family usually donates to local charities, but they now need those charities for the first time. I could've said her kindness helped strangers before, and now the kindness of strangers would be helping her. We're all here to support one another, and we can only hope to receive kindness in return someday.

I know many parents work hard to provide their children with a good, safe life, but sometimes their dollars don't stretch as far as they'd like. Just last month, Carol McMillin with Community Santa told me that a good chunk of their applicants are in that exact spot: they have income from a job but not enough to cover the extras that are needed or wanted during the holiday season.

Christmas this year will look different for my family as well. While I am lucky enough to make ends meet, there are several people who won't be part of our celebrations. After Andy and I collectively lost three grandparents in less than a year, not to mention friends and family who also lost loved ones, it can be hard to feel joyful even when Christmas music is blaring, every commercial is about buying gifts, and you feel expected to exude holiday spirit at all times.

I didn't think to tell her any of those things, and I didn't save her phone number. So here I am, just a few days before Christmas, sharing those thoughts with our readers instead. Hopefully, this column reaches those who could use some comfort this holiday season. Hopefully, it also finds those who could use a reminder of the giving spirit that is so prevalent during this time of year.

I hope we all feel some gratitude for what we have while also allowing ourselves to feel sadness or grief if things aren't turning out as planned.

I hope that regardless of how many gifts are under the tree, we can enjoy the company of loved ones and remember what's really important in our lives. I hope we can still share some kindness with others, whether holding open the door, offering a smile, passing on a "Merry Christmas" greeting, or helping to carry a heavy load; we don't always know what someone is going through.

Turning out the lights

Country Acres Christmas Lights open for final season in Knob Noster

KNOB NOSTER – After 41 years, Country Acres Christmas Lights founders Donna and David Grygierczyk are letting go of their annual Christmas light show.

Donna and David said they love hosting the light show; however, the amount of time, work and effort that goes into planning, prepping and executing it is tiring.

"My wife and I are getting a little bit older," David Grygierczyk said. "I'm in my 60s. I love the display but I've built it all in a way that it's like a kit. It's easy to assemble but it still takes help. We rely on a lot of volunteers and over the years, I've always had the same people that I know I can count on to help me, but it's getting to the point now, as hard as it is to say, it's time. It's time to shut it down."

A big undertaking

David said he and some volunteers begin setting up the display in September so it can be ready in time for Thanksgiving, which is normally the day the annual light show premieres. He said part of the setup includes pushing pixels into matrix mats. He said the matrix mat that hangs over his garage door, in particular, has a little more than 11,000 pixels that have to be pushed in manually.

According to Country Acres Christmas Lights' brochure, "Overall there are more than 12,000 LEDs, 64,799 pixels and 194,493 computerized channels."

The lights are accompanied by music varying from traditional Christmas and children's songs to patriotic songs. Community members can choose to play the music through their car's radio by turning their dial to 107.1, or they can hear the music while walking the property. There are 40 songs divided into various playlists. One playlist comprising about 10 or 11 songs runs on a

loop per night. David said if people want to hear all 40 songs, they have to visit Country Acres for four consecutive nights. Attendees have the option to vote on a song to be played by scanning a QR code.

While listening to the music, people can also sit under the 41-foot-tall Tribute Tree, which pays homage to first responders who served in the armed forces. David, who once served in the military, said the Tribute Tree is the primary feature of the show.

Another unique feature of the display is the doll-house, a shed consisting of a collection of more than 60 animated Christmas-themed dolls. Donna Grygierczyk said she first received an animated doll from her mother as a gift in 1989, and eventually, she and her mother began

building dollhouses for her collection. After her mother's death, Donna wanted the doll her mother bought her to be part of the Country Acres Christmas Light Show but she said for seven years, the doll has not been fully functioning.

"A couple years prior to her passing, the first doll she gave me quit working," Donna said. "It would light up but it wouldn't move and so I made sure that this doll was going to be in the dollhouse. I got everything set up. I plugged everything in and that doll worked. After I unplugged it and waited for the season to come, the doll did not work. Seven years in a row, that doll will work the very first time I plug it in and doesn't work again."

Smiling faces

David and Donna said they are sad to let the show go because they've put smiles on so many faces and they've helped many people over the years. Although David said it's difficult to choose a highlight moment since putting on these displays, they recalled an incident that they

said warmed their hearts.

"We dress up like Santa
Claus and Mrs. Claus,"
David said. "Three or four
years ago, we had a family
sitting on our lap, taking
pictures and telling us all
what they wanted. When
they left to walk through
the display, the little boy
came back to me and he
said he would really like to
have a bed for Christmas.
It still kind of brings tears
to our eyes."

Ahead of 50th anniversary, 'Power Broker' author feels like a movie star

NEW YORK — Since the release a year ago of the acclaimed documentary "Turn Every Page," Robert

Caro has been feeling a bit

like a movie star.

"I walk up Broadway
and kids recognize me,"
the historian and author of
"The Power Broker" says.
"If I linger a bit, they start
talking about a chapter that

they like. It's so wonderful." The 88-year-old Caro, winner of virtually every literary prize, has long held at least semi-celebrity status. His better known admirers range from Conan O'Brien to former Presidents Bill Clinton and Barack Obama, and impatient readers regularly send emails to his publisher, Alfred A. Knopf, asking for an update on his fifth and final Lyndon Johnson book. (Still no release date in sight, Caro says.)

On this December morning, he's seated at a small table in the gift shop of the New-York Historical Society, engaged in another kind of ritual for public figures: autographs, available to anyone who buys one of his books from the

society's store or website.

Caro has spoken around the country, and beyond, but he is also very much a New Yorker, a native Upper West Sider who used to visit the historical society as a kid and, for years, has lived close by. Every few weeks, he comes here and signs copies of his books, including the four Johnson volumes released so far and his debut publication "The Power Broker," the landmark Robert Moses biography that next fall will be featured at a society exhibit marking its 50th

anniversary.

The signings are not public events, although one local resident, 28-year-old Shiloh Frederick, came in person so the author could autograph her copy of "The Power Broker." Frederick, who designs travel guides and other materials about New York City, has made several videos about Caro's epic narrative of Moses' reign as a municipal build-

er and its lasting impact.
"I was reading the book
and it inspired all of these
video ideas I wanted to
share with other people,"
she tells Caro.

"That's the best thing I could hear," he answers.

He signed dozens of books, which the society will ship to customers; he sometimes just includes his name and the name of the book's owner, and he sometimes adds a personal message. One book was ordered by a 90-year-old priest in Rhode Island to whom Caro wishes a happy birthday. For a reader self-identified as a "young budding historian obsessed with history," Caro inscribes, "To a fellow history lover." For Frederick, he writes, "To Shiloh, who really understands."

"This is incredible. I am going to cherish this," Frederick says. "It's getting a place of honor on my bookshelf."

Historical society officials say "The Power Broker" is the most popular of the Caro books, understandable for a Pulitzer Prize winner that serves as an unofficial history of New York City in the 20th century. The NYHS, which acquired Caro's archives in 2019, is calling the fall exhibit "Truth to Power," featuring "interview notes, manuscript drafts, and other artifacts intimately connected with his writing process."

As well explained in "Turn Every Page," Caro and editor Robert Gottlieb fought bitterly while working on "The Power Broker," cutting hundreds of thousands of words from a book that still ran over 1,000 pages. The deleted sections, predating the internet era, have an aura among Caro followers that lost studio recordings might have for Beatles fans. Readers have long wondered if Caro preserved a chapter on the urban theorist and community activist Jane Jacobs, who successfully pushed back against Moses in the 1950s and '60s when he attempted to run an expressway through Lower Manhattan.

Caro grimaces when asked about the Jacobs section, not just because he's heard about it so often, but because, he says, he has no specific idea what's inside the boxes containing his "Power Broker" materials.

"I couldn't stand to look at the stuff, so I never opened the boxes," Caro says.

A society spokesperson declined to offer further details on the exhibit, saying it was too soon.

Interest in "The Power Broker" remains strong among the general public. The Moses biography has sold more than 17,000 copies this year, double the total of a decade ago, according to Circana, which tracks around 85% of print sales. During the height of the pandemic, "The Power Broker" appeared in the background during so many televised Zoom interviews, it became an unofficial status symbol.

The book inspires responses in other formats Caro never imagined while writing it. This fall, Frederick used her Instagram page to help lead an effort to tear down monkey statues widely regarded as racist that Moses had placed in a Harlem playground. The podcaster Roman Mars plans a yearlong tribute to Caro's book on his show "99% Invisible," his guests including O'Brien.

"My show is about architecture and design, and "The Power Broker' is basically the bible of this," Mars says. "It made people like me think about how cities are built, how highways are

As readers await — and have awaited for more than a decade — the final Johnson volume, Caro's appearance at the historical society is a break from what has been an intense few months of writing since Gottlieb's death in June. The author has been working closely with Kathy Hourigan, who has served as a second editor on his books since he began the Johnson series in the 1970s. Hourigan is retiring this year as vice president and managing editor of Knopf Doubleday, part of a wave of buyouts at the publisher, but she will remain with Caro on a

freelance basis. The most Caro can say about the the fifth Johnson book is that it will be long, "very long." He has noted often that he already knows the last line, but that he does not work chronologically. He speaks of completing a "poignant" section on the funeral of Robert F. Kennedy, who was assassinated in 1968. But he is currently deep into the year 1965, when Johnson signed historic legislation on everything from voting rights to Medicare, while also making the ill-fated decision to send ground troops to Vietnam.

"The Vietnam War is so depressing. Honest to god, you find yourself just about crying to (hear about) these young kids who had to fight in the jungle," Caro says.

"The thing is," he says of Johnson and 1965, "it's everything about American power distilled through this one man, this one period."

Mickey Mouse will soon belong to you and me — with some caveats

LOS ANGELES — M-I-C-K-E-Y will soon belong to you and me.

With several asterisks, qualification and caveats, Mickey Mouse in his earliest form will be the leader of the band of characters, films and books that will become public domain as the year turns to 2024.

In a moment many close observers thought might never come, at least one version of the quintessential piece of intellectual property and perhaps the most iconic character in American pop culture will be free from Disney's copyright as his first screen release, the 1928 short "Steamboat Willie," featuring both Mickey and Minnie Mouse, becomes available for public use.

"This is it. This is Mickey Mouse. This is exciting because it's kind of symbolic," said Jennifer Jenkins, a professor of law and director of Duke's Center for the Study of Public Domain, who writes an annual Jan. 1 column for "Public Domain Day." "I kind of feel like the pipe on the steamboat, like expelling smoke. It's so exciting."

U.S. law allows a copyright to be held for 95 years after Congress expanded it several times during Mick-

ey's life.

"It's sometimes derisively referred to as the Mickey Mouse Protection Act,"
Jenkins said. "That's oversimplified because it wasn't just Disney that was pushing for term extension. It was a whole group of copyright holders whose works were set to go into the public domain soon, who benefited greatly from the 20 years of outro protection."

extra protection."

"Ever since Mickey
Mouse's first appearance in
the 1928 short film Steamboat Willie, people have
associated the character with
Disney's stories, experiences,
and authentic products," a
Disney spokesperson said in
a statement to The Associated Press. "That will not
change when the copyright
in the Steamboat Willie film
expires."

Current artists and creators will be able to make use of Mickey, but with major limits. It is only the more mischievous, rat-like, non-speaking boat captain in "Steamboat Willie" that has become public.

"More modern versions of Mickey will remain unaffected by the expiration of the Steamboat Willie copyright, and Mickey will continue to play a leading role as a global ambassador for the Walt Disney Company in our storytelling, theme park attractions, and merchandise," Disney's statement said.

Not every feature or personality trait a character displays is necessarily copyrightable, however, and courts could be busy in the coming years determining what's inside and outside Disney's ownership.

"We will, of course, continue to protect our rights in the more modern versions of Mickey Mouse and other works that remain subject to copyright," the company said.

Disney still solidly and separately holds a trademark on Mickey as a corporate mascot and brand identifier, and the law forbids using the character deceptively to fool consumers into thinking a product is from the original creator. Anyone starting a film company or a theme park will not be free to make mouse ears their logo.

Disney's statement said it "will work to safeguard against consumer confusion caused by unauthorized uses of Mickey and our other iconic characters."

"Steamboat Willie," directed by Walt Disney and his partner Ub Iwerks and among the first cartoons to have sound synced with its visuals, was actually the third cartoon featuring Mickey and Minnie the men made, but the first to be released. It features a more menacing Mickey captaining a boat and making musical instruments out of other animals.

In it, and in a clip from it used in the introduction to Disney animated films in recent years, Mickey whistles the 1910 tune "Steamboat Bill." The song inspired the title of the Buster Keaton film "Steamboat Bill Jr," released just a few months before "Steamboat Willie," which in turn may have inspired the title of the Disney short. The copyright wasn't renewed on the Keaton film and it's been in the public domain since 1956.

Another famous animal sidekick, Tigger, will join his friend Winnie the Pooh in the public domain as the book in which the bouncing tiger first appeared, "The House at Pooh Corner," turns 96. Pooh, probably the most celebrated prior character to become public property, took on that status two years ago when A.A. Milne's original "Winnie the Pooh" entered the public domain, resulting in some truly novel uses, including this year's horror film "Winnie The

Pooh: Blood and Honey."

Young Mickey could get the same treatment.

"Now, the audience is going to set the terms," said Cory Doctorow, an author and activist who advocates for broader public ownership of works.

Jan. 1, 2024, has long been circled on the calendars of public domain watchers, but some say it serves to show how overlong it takes for U.S. works to go public, and many properties with less pedigree than Winnie or Minnie can disappear or be forgotten with their copyrights murky.

"The fact that there are works that are still recognizable and enduring after 95 years is is frankly remarkable," Doctorow said. "And it makes you think about the stuff that we must have lost, that would still have currency."

Other properties entering the U.S. public domain are Charlie Chaplin's film "Circus," Virginia Woolf's novel "Orlando" and Bertolt Brecht's musical play "The Threepenny Opera."

The current copyright term passed in 1998 brought the U.S. into closer sync with the European Union, making it unlikely Congress would extend it now. There are also now powerful companies, including Amazon with its fan-fiction-heavy publishing arm and Google with its books project, that in some cases advocate for the public domain.

"There's actually more pushback now than there was 20 some years ago when the Mickey Mouse act was passed," said Paul Heald, a professor at the University of Illinois College of Law who specializes in copyright and international intellectual property law.

In some instances, the U.S. goes well beyond Europe, and maintains copyright on work that is already public in its country of origin, though international agreements would allow the U.S. to adopt the shorter term of other nations on work produced there.

The books of George Orwell for example, including "Animal Farm" and "1984," both published in the 1940s, are now public domain in his native Great Britain.

"Those works aren't going to fall into the public domain in the United States for 25 years," Heald said. "It would be literally costless for Congress to pass a law saying, 'we now adopt the rule of the shorter term,' which would throw a butt ton of works into the public domain over here."

The color purple: A new movie and old hue rich in meaning and history

NEW YORK — "I think it pisses God off if you walk by the color purple in a field somewhere and don't notice it," Shug tells Celie in Alice Walker's "The Color Purple."

In nature, among the priestly and royal, as a symbol of independence, pride and magic, purple is weighty in history and culture. Now, with the Christmas Day opening of the second film based on Walker's 1982 book, purple takes a seat at the box office after the historic popularity of "Barbie" and all things pink.

Consider it a many-layered cultural counterpart to its frothier cousin.

Power, ambition, luxury. Purple reflects them all. It also expresses creativity, independence, pride, peace, mystery and magic.

In contemporary history and fiction, it often represents something sought dearly. In the early 20th century, purple attire and signage signified loyalty and dignity among the suffragists. In Walker's novel, Celie, the main character, wants a pair of purple shoes but can't afford them, so she settles on blue.

Oprah Winfrey, who played Sofia in the 1985 film version of "The Color Purple," has donned purple frequently to promote the new musical she helped produce. And she wore a purple taffeta gown by Christian Siriano in her recently unveiled portrait for the National Portrait Gal-

To Oprah, purple is "seminal." To others, it's a shapeshifter, said Laurie Pressman, vice president of the Pantone Color Institute, which analyzes and consults on color, including for the folks who made this year's "The Color Purple."

"It can take on so

many contexts," Pressman said. "It's a color that stands out, that makes a statement, that has a singular presence in the world."

Some ways to think about purple, the hues nestled between blue and

PURPLE, THE DYE

The Romans conquered the Greeks in the second century B.C. and returned home with lots of pigments and dyes, writes Victoria Finlay in "The Brilliant History of Color in Art." The most celebrated was "purpura," which turned into a fashion phenom made with secretions of certain mollusks. The liquid transformed into purple when left out in the sun.

When Julius Caesar traveled to Egypt in 48 B.C. and met Queen Cleopatra, he noted her love of purple and embraced it himself. It's a love later taken up by Byzantine emperors. But before them, Caesar decreed that only Caesars could wear togas dyed completely purple.

Many, MANY mollusks were required to make purpura, which sometimes wasn't the color we know today. Finlay wrote that at least 250,000 were needed for half an ounce of dye. Ancient Tyrian purple, named for the town of Tyre in what is now southern Lebanon, was also rose, bluish red or velvety black, she writes.

Purple was reserved for royalty, priests and nobles at various times in history and in various

By the 14th century, the secrets of Tyrian purple were lost, according to the University of Chicago Library's 2007 exhibition "The Origins of Color." But all hail Tyrian purple! In 2001, through trial and error, the technique for making it resurfaced. Well before then, synthetic dyes, including purple, were available.

Prince's "Purple Rain." Jimi Hendrix's "Purple Haze." Juice WRLD's "Purple Devil." The rockers Deep Purple. The Grammy-winning song "Deep Purple," a No. 1 Billboard single for April Stevens and her brother, Nino Tempo, in 1963.

Purple has been peppering songs for decades, but no musical artist has been more closely aligned with the color than Prince. He became The Purple One after he and his band, the Revolution, put out "Purple Rain" in 1984 and a won a Grammy for it, along with an Oscar for the score to the companion

Though the song peaked at No. 2 on Billboard's Hot 100 in 1984, it forever connected Prince with the color. And he leaned in with his purple attire, purple guitar and purple piano. After his 2016 death, his estate worked with Pantone to come up with an official Prince purple, dubbed "Love Symbol #2."

Of the song's meaning and title, Prince once explained: "When there's blood in the sky ... red and blue equals purple. Purple rain pertains to

the end of the world and being with the one you love and letting your faith/God guide you through the purple rain."

Prince's Paisley Park estate outside Minneapolis remains bathed in purple at night.

In creating a world in sound, "purple doesn't have as clear a set of connotations" as some other colors, like the sadness of blue or the rage of red, said Nate Sloane, who specializes in the history of popular music and jazz at the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music.

For musical artists, he said, that's freedom.

"Its ambiguity means you can explore more emotions and concepts that are less clear and established," Sloane said. **PURPLE, THE PROSE**

The term "purple prose" stretches back to circa 18 B.C. and the "Ars Poetica" of Horace, according to Charles Harrington Elster in his 2005 book, "What in the Word?"

A phrase Horace used, the Latin "purpureus pannus," denoted an irrelevant and excessively ornate passage. Literally, it's a purple garment or

raiment (think fancy). Horace's 476-line poem, a manual of sorts on how to write poetry, warns against "mediocrity in poets no man, god or bookseller will accept."

Generally speaking, purple prose came to mean writing that is laden with flowery descriptors and/or an oppressive structure with no real payoff to a reader. Consider this: Many writers of the 19th century were paid by the number of words they used or pages they produced.

"Purple prose doesn't seem to have become wholly pejorative until the 20th century when steep declines in the vocabulary and reading comprehension of college-educated Americans caused a panic in the education establishment and the newspaper industry," Elster wrote.

A blog post from the publishing site Reedsy offers this made-up example: "The mahogany-haired adolescent girl glanced fleetingly at her rugged paramour, a crystalline sparkle in her eyes as she gazed, enraptured, upon his countenance."

PURPLE, ON CANVAS Monet, Chagall, De-

rain, Rothko, Matisse, Klimt. All were admirers of purple.

The color is said to have first surfaced in art during the Neolithic era, writes Hannah Foskett at the site Arts & Collections. The pre-Raphaelites in Britain especially loved purple.

Monet stands out for his use of violet in his Lily, Haystack, Snow and Rouen Cathedral series of paintings.

Another interpretation of purple, Foskett writes, is that it tires the eyes, "often symbolizing lust or sorrow in major artworks."

Color, in visual art, was helped along by the American portrait painter John Goffe Rand. In the 1840s, he invented a collapsible tube of tin in which to put his paint, rather than the pig bladders he and his counterparts had been struggling with for years, according to Finlay. With the invention of paint tubes, there were suddenly dozens of new pigments, including manganese violet.

"It was the first opaque, pure, affordable, mauve-colored pigment," wrote Finlay, "and it was seen as a wonder."

He said they've been putting on a programmable pixel display for the last nine years despite not knowing much about computers.



Behind 'Maestro' drama is raft of theater stars supporting story of Bernstein

NEW YORK — Leonard Bernstein was a towering figure on Broadway. So it seems only fitting that the new film darma of him leans on the Great White Way to get the story right.

Bradley Cooper's movie "Maestro" is studded with theater stars — 29 of the 38 principal cast members have a background in the theater, including Gideon Glick, Michael Urie, Greg Hildreth, Nick Blaemire, Ryan Steele, Zachary Booth and Gaby Diaz.

Look closely and you'll find actor-turned-director Scott Ellis playing Bernstein's manager, Harry Kraut, and rising stage star Jordan Dobson — whose credits include "Bad Cinderella," "Hadestown" and, significantly, "West Side Story" — playing a young conductor.

Casting director Shayna Markowitz said she didn't necessarily set out to land theater pros but it came naturally when she was trying to populate Bernstein's world authentically.

"There's kind of this amazing synergy between casting theater actors to portray people of the theater world and of Lenny's world," Markowitz said. "I just feel like we got really lucky with just these wonderful New York actors that are here and that wanted to be a part of this."

Markowitz worked with Cooper on telling the story of a conductor, composer, pianist who helped create such musical theater classic as "West Side Story," "Candide," "On the Town" and "Wonderful Town." Cooper stars alongside Carey Mulligan as Bernstein's wife.

Some selections seem inspired, like the casting of dancer Ricky Ubeda by choreographer Justin Peck. In 2015, "So You Think You Can Dance" winner Ubeda made his Broadway debut when joining the ensemble of a revival of "On the Town" and in "Maestro" he can be seen in a dream sequence of, yes, "On the Town."

But perhaps the best

Easter egg is a scene in the movie when the cast is rehearsing "Candide" with Cooper conducting. Actor June Gable approaches Mulligan's character to ask a question. Eagle-eyed viewers will recognize that's the same Gable who was nominated for a Tony Award in the mid-1970s for "Candide."

"She knew Lenny Bernstein and so was having a full-on, out-of-body experience being in that scene with Bradley," said Markowitz. "She was like, 'It was crazy. I was crying. It was as if he was there.' So that was a cool moment."

Casting directors like Markowitz use a service that alerts talent agents and managers about upcoming roles and she will makes up her own lists of actors she thinks would be perfect, which she did for "Maestro."

"Every director works a little differently. Every project is obviously different and the needs are different. I adapt to how the filmmaker likes to work," said Markowitz. "I think you want to find the very best actors who are most suited for the roles. That never changes."

Glick, who has appeared on Broadway in "Spring Awakening,' "Spider-Man: Turn Off the Dark" and was Tony-nominated for "To Kill a Mockingbird," auditioned on tape for the role of Tommy Cothran, music director at a radio station in San Francisco and a lover of Bernstein.

"Bradley created a very loose and immersive environment that was very, very playful and it sort of reminded me of that stage in the rehearsal process when you're doing a play or

a musical where you're not being result oriented and you're just exploring and taking chances," said Glick. "I think you can feel that in the film."

Some parts in "Maestro" are very small roles — just a few seconds of film needing a day's work — but have deep significance for the theater community, like the legendary songwriting team of Betty Comden and Adolph Green played in "Maestro" by Mallory Portnoy and Nick Blaemire.

"Actors sign on to do projects or audition for projects because they want to be a part of it. And so they understood the significance of both of those parts," Markowitz said. "Some actors just want to be a part of it no matter what and no matter how."

Ellis, a multiple Tony Award-nominated di-

rector, was coaxed back to acting by Cooper, a friend and colleague who had worked together onstage, most notably on "The Elephant Man" on Broadway.

Cooper thought his warm and loving relationship with Ellis could infuse the onscreen relationship he wanted to show between Bernstein and his manager.

"It was so relaxed and an incredible experience and something way out of my comfort zone," said Ellis, who estimated he last acted 30 years

"I'm sitting there in a dressing room surrounded by these incredible actors who, as a director, I would go, 'God, I'd love to work with you on a piece.' But, all of a sudden, I realize, 'No, I'm just one of them."

In many ways, "Maestro" is the latest artistic watering hole for Broadway veterans, joining "Law & Order," "Glee," "The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel," "The Good Fight," "The Gilded Age," "Fosse/Verdon," "Zoey's Extraordinary Playlist," "Only Murders in the Building" and "Smash." Markowitz, who works

across film and TV and who has cast "Dash & Lily," "Ocean's Eight," winning the inaugural BAFTA Award for best casting in 2020 for "Joker," said "Maestro" is

"This is a once-in-alifetime milestone film for sure," she said. "I feel so lucky to have had this experience, and I'm so happy with how people are receiving it as this really special thing, because it's it's very special

Marvel kicked out Majors after conviction, throwing plans into disarray

NEW YORK - Marvel had more riding on Jonathan Majors than perhaps any other actor. Now it's parting ways with him, and throwing years of plans for its cinematic universe in disarray.

Marvel Studios and the Walt Disney Co. dropped Majors from all future projects following the actor's conviction for assault and harassment on Monday, according to a person close to the studio who spoke on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorized to speak publicly on the matter.

The swift move by Disney marked a stunning about-face for an actor who had been one of Hollywood's fastest-rising stars. A Manhattan

jury on Monday found the 34-year-old Majors guilty of one misdemeanor assault charge and one harassment violation for a March altercation with his then-girlfriend Grace Jabbari.

Majors, who was acquitted of a different assault charge and of aggravated harassment, will be sentenced on Feb. 6. He declined to comment as he left the courthouse. Majors' attorney, Priya Chaudhry, said in a statement that "it is clear that the jury did not believe Grace Jabbari's story of what happened in the SUV because they found that Mr. Majors did not intentionally cause any

injuries to her." "Mr. Majors still has faith in the process and looks forward to fully clearing his name," said Chaudhry.

As the superhero studio prepared phase five of the Marvel Cinematic Universe, it cast the highly acclaimed Majors as the antagonist Kang the Conqueror. The character was to span several films and series as the Marvel Cinematic Universe's nextphase answer to Thanos, the villain of "Avengers: Endgame."

Majors had already appeared in " Ant-Man and the Wasp: Quantumania" and the first two seasons of "Loki." He was to star in "Avengers: The Kang Dynasty," dated for release in May 2026.

The future of "The Kang Dynasty" is now unclear. Disney declined to comment on whether it will recast the role of Kang or pivot in a new direction.

The studio has been

preparing for the possibility of Majors' exit from the franchise. But Marvel was limited in its ability to fashion rewrites due to the screenwriters strike that ran from May to late September. The studio recently hired screenwriter Michael Waldron to rework "The Kang Dynasty."

For Marvel, Majors' departure adds to a series of recent setbacks. Though its box-office success nearly \$30 billion worldwide from 33 films — is unsurpassed in movie history, the superhero factory has recently seen some atypical struggles. "The Marvels," released in November, has been the MCU's worst performer in theaters, with \$204 million in worldwide ticket sales.

Majors also recently starred as a troubled amateur bodybuilder

in "Magazine Dreams," which made an acclaimed debut at the Sundance Film Festival in January and was acquired by the Disney-owned indie distributor Searchlight Pictures. Following its premiere, an Oscar nomination for Majors was widely predicted.

"Magazine Dreams" had been dated to open in theaters in Dec. 8. But ahead of Majors' trial, Searchlight removed the film from its release calendar. Instead, on Dec. 8 t ext messages from Majors were read in the fifth day of the trial. In one, Majors begged Jabbari not to seek medical attention for a head injury sustained in 2022, warning she had "no perspective of what could happen" if the truth got out.

In late February as

"Creed III," starring Majors alongside Michael B. Jordan, was being released, Majors spoke in an interview with The Associated Press in the neighborhood of Chelsea, just a few blocks away from where his fight with Jabbari would weeks later spill out onto New York streets.

Majors then sounded acutely aware that his rapid new fame carried the risk of a downfall.

"Though I've not seen the boogeyman, I know it's out there," Majors said. "And I've been around to know it's comin'. I won't go down my rabbit hole of death, but it's comin'. But you outrun it. You just stay out of the frame. I'll stay out of the frame."
