Danny Young, president of the Ag Club, said the annual event brings in farm equipment dealers, livestock equipment vendors, and anything for farm, home, and ranch.

"The Missouri Cattlemen's (Association) has a booth there," he added. "There's all kinds of financing for anybody that deals with agriculture.

"There will be seminars for farmers who want to get their applicator certification," he continued. "There's seminars on gardening, all kinds of stuff. We have a lot of smaller booths on the upper level of the exhibition center, and they just sell all kinds of stuff."

He added that wives enjoy shopping in the upper level because the items take in purses, crafts, and other things many women enjoy.

"There is something definitely for everybody," Young noted.

He added the event is not only for farmers and agriculture-related people but for everyone, and it is also free to attend.

Young said the club had its annual Ag Club Banquet on Saturday, Jan. 20, and raised more than \$37,000 in the yearly pie auction. The proceeds will go toward local youth in agriculture.

"It was a huge success," he noted. "That (the money) goes to basically anything that deals with youth in agriculture.

"Last year, we funded 14 scholarships that totaled, I think, around \$21,000," he continued. "We sent a little over 830 area kids to the historical agricultural farming tour in Cole Camp. We donated \$8,000 to 4-H and FFA for their shows and events. That money all goes to youth in agriculture. So, that's a pretty neat deal."



As for the Ag Expo, Young said he doesn't have the exact number, but he believes the event has been going on for 25 years.

"It gives all of our central area that's surrounded by farmers, it gives them

a place in the wintertime to get out and see all of those vendors in one place," he explained. "Whether they are selling machinery or equipment or where they get their insurance from. Maybe it's who they do their banking with, maybe it's MFA.

"There's vehicle dealers there," he added. "It just gives them a one-stop place they can go and just visit all of the people they do business with. There are some new businesses there, and it gives them a chance to get acquainted with them. It's just a real neat exposure to everything agriculture."

Also, this year, the State Fair Community College Ag Department will have a concession stand at the Ag Expo featuring drinks, cookies, pies, and cakes. The Missouri Cattlemen's Association will have a booth with cheeseburgers and ribeye sandwiches.

"There's always a couple hours each day the MFA Oil has free hot dogs," Young said. "On Saturday, we have a pedal pull at 3 o'clock in the afternoon for kids to do the pedal pull. So, there's literally something for everybody."

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Agriculture Club supports local students




The proceeds are funded from the two annual fundraisers: the Agriculture Banquet and Pie Auction, hosted annually in mid-January, and the Central Missouri Ag Expo, hosted annually the first weekend in February.

The Central Missouri Agriculture Club provides scholarships in conjunction with Agriculture Future of America (AFA) to graduating high school seniors who plan on pursuing a four-year degree in an agriculturerelated field of study. This scholarship supports college tuition and fees in the amount of \$3,200 and includes sponsorship to the AFA Leaders Conference (a \$1,000 value) during the fall of the recipient's freshman year of college. The AFA Leaders Conference focuses on personal and professional development and is hosted annually in Kansas City, Missouri.

The Club also provides scholarships to students who plan to pursue an agriculture-related field of study at either a community college or a fouryear college/university.

The Central Missouri Ag Club also sponsors a Farm Family of the Year award.

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Local students visit Cole Camp for Farm Life of Yesteryear

OLE CAMP — As part of its focus on youth in agriculture, the Central Missouri Agriculture Club helps fund student trips to teach about the old-fashioned rural lifestyle. Students from area schools visited Cole Camp on Thursday, Sept. 28 and Friday, Sept. 29 to experience the rural lifestyle of a bygone era.

The Central Missouri Ag Club, MU Extension office, Pettis County 4-H, and Cole Camp Antique Tractor Association partnered with local schools to demonstrate the working history of agriculture in Pettis County.

Cindy Jolly was the event organizer, and said it was beautiful weather to host the hundreds of students bussed in each day for this glimpse of farm living.

"This is Farm Life of Yesteryears," Jolly said over the noise of the antique sawmill. "I've been doing it since 2009. We run a sawmill and talk about the demonstration after it's over. They cook molasses, we make apple cider on site, we make homemade butter, we have Grandma's Kitchen that shows antiques that go back into the middle 1800s."

More than 850 homeschooled kids and students from 12 schools in Benton, Camden, Cooper, and Pettis counties,

along with their chaperones, attended over the two-day event.

Keeping the high-tech students of today interested in the low-tech farm equipment meant moving in small groups from station to station as experts gave demonstrations of old equipment and techniques.

"We have some animals on site," Jolly said. "Some burros and llamas, we have corn shelling and then we have wheat thrashing and a stationary bailer. The ones I spoke to were quite impressed. One school was all kindergarteners, so they really enjoyed that. We show them the demonstrations, they get to ask questions out in the nice cool breeze. We give them a little sample of molasses, we give them a little sample of cider, we give them a sample of homemade butter. I love to do it every year."

One demonstration that really drew in kids was the crushing of sugar cane and boiling the juice into molasses. Verona Goetz grew up working the laborintensive process with her family and remembers it well.

"We buy the cane from the Mennonites in Windsor; they will strip it all and cut it off and put it on the wagon," Goetz said. "My family did this for years, I remember doing this as a little girl in the field. It got so labor intensive we haven't got enough people to go out and do it."

An antique tractor with an old universal joint turned a 100-year-old masher as Robert Weinberg fed the cane in and collected the greenish liquid to be boiled down for hours.

"For three and a half to four hours,"

Goetz said. "We start with about 50 to 60 gallons of juice and wind up with about 7 or 8."

All that work for a sweet, sticky goo. Luke Viebrock is a junior from Stover and spent the morning admiring the well-restored farm equipment.

"Just viewing all these nice antiques and learning about what they did in the past," Viebrock said. "They just did what they were told by their parents and really get to work."

Viebrock watched the cane refining process and marveled at the way fore-fathers put their back into it.

"Lot of hard work," Viebrock said. "Just taking the sugar cane and just crumbling it up, cutting down trees and using that for firewood. They just got their own products, and they were good homemade."

Viebrock was one student willing to try the freshly refined syrup and bravely sampled a spoonful.

"It's either they like it, or they don't like it," Goetz said. "They're going, 'Oh this tastes like honey, this tastes like pumpkin!' You know, everybody's taste is different."

Perhaps it was seeing how the molasses was made that helped Viebrock be one who enjoyed the flavor.

"It was sweet and tasted really good," Viebrock noted. "I wish I could have some more right now."

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
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
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
