## Huddle House brings all day breakfast to new Temp Stop diner

A Huddle House diner opened Feb. 4 at the Temp Stop, 4575 South Limit Ave.

"We're the same company as Temp Stop," Huddle House District Manager Scott Opoka said. "We're owned by Temp Stop and already have the Temp Stop location, so we just added it on."

The restaurant was doing a steady business Thursday morning between families with children and truckers just stopping in for a bite.

"It's a good fit for this part of town," Opoka said. "With the trucks that we have here and all the local folks on the south end of Sedalia."

Kimberly Biegel, General Manager at Sedalia Huddle House the Democrat told the south Sedalia diner has become very popular because of the good food and friendly service.

"It's been pretty steady and very fun so far," Biegel said. "The menu is all day breakfast. One of our things that they like to do is like our stuffed hash Browns, the waffles, the pancakes, whereas Huddle House likes to call them; sweet cakes."

The first Huddle House restaurant was opened in Decatur,

Georgia over 50 years ago and the company now has franchises from Florida to Nebraska.

"There's about 300 locations total, they're mostly in the south," Opoka said. "It's been really good, we've been really happy."

Biegel said she is proud of the team she has assembled who are helpful and get along well with each other and the restaurant clientele.

The diner embraces its clean and inviting look, along with quick service from the kitchen staff.

"It's been really good, everybody's chipped in," Biegel said. "We definitely came together as a team when we needed to."

The interior features a local taste, with displays of Smith-Cotton memorabilia along with a salute to local law enforcement, first responders and military.

The local flavor has also come with menu favorites.

"Right now, I think that our Biscuits and Gravy has been a really good seller," Biegel said. "The Stuffed Hash Browns has been moving quite a bit because that's a little bit of everything all piled up together, and then another one that's been good is our All the Way Hash Browns."

## Remember to Dream helps disabled with therapeutic riding program

COLE CAMP — Samantha Richerson is a therapeutic riding instructor with the Remember to Dream program at Lost Spring Stables, 25388 Hwy 52 in Cole Camp.

"We are a riding facility and boarding facility, but we also have a therapeutic riding program that's been here since 2009," Richerson said. "Remember to Dream is our therapy program and Lost Spring Stables is the farm's name."

The therapeutic horse-riding program is not-for-profit and brings in disabled riders from across mid-Missouri.

"We do all kinds, we tend to do mostly autistic, just because that's kind of been our specialty," Richerson said. "But anybody can contact us and see what we can do for them."

Many riders are referred for therapeutic riding through the Center for Human Resources or Twin Oaks and the program is fully booked.

"We have about 15 lesson horses, so we can fit all different kinds and types," Richerson said. "We have kids as young as four all the way up to 70-year-olds we've had on our horses to do lessons as well."

The stable has an able-bodied program for anyone who wants regular horse-riding lessons, to board a horse or haul in

their own horse and take lessons.

In the therapy program, horses and services are provided. Richerson is a PATH certified riding instructor.

"PATH is a specialty program for therapeutic riding," Richerson explained. "It's the training to be able to support these kiddos and what we can do to improve their life quality and the family's life quality."

Richerson says there's a special interaction between the horse and rider.

"They get the instant benefit of the horse resets them," Richerson said.

Sedalia Police Department Sgt. Brad Beard drove his cruiser slowly down East Third Street, playing an announcement over his P.A. system asking residents to move their cars from the Snow Evacuation Route.

"We're trying to get everybody so that the street department can clear the whole street instead of like

having only one lane that we can really use," Beard told the Democrat. "We have this prerecorded so when we turn our lights on and hit a certain button it tells everybody what our intentions are; they need to plow, and unfortunately the further in they plow, the farther away from the curb everybody has to park, so it makes it very thin for traffic."

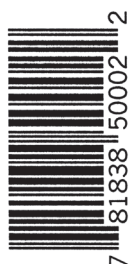

State Fair Community College and its extended campus locations in Boonville, Clinton, Eldon, Lake of the Ozarks, Jefferson City, and Whiteman Air Force Base will be closed Feb. 17 in observance of Presidents Day.

The State Fair Career and Technology Center (SFCTC) on SFCC's Sedalia campus, which provides technical training programs for students from area high schools, will also be closed.

## Missouri House votes on party lines to eliminate income tax on capital gains

A bill to remove the state income tax on profits from the sale of long-term investments passed the Missouri House Thursday on an almost pure party-line vote.

The bill, projected to cost the state treasury \$341 million in the first year and \$237 million in subsequent years, exempts money known as long-term capital gains, money earned on stocks, land or other assets held for a full year or longer. House Speaker Pro Tem Chad Perkins, the sponsor of the bill, said it is intended to help small business owners and others who sell assets as they approach retirement.

"These folks have worked their entire life and have counted on that to be their retirement," said Perkins, a Republican from Bowling Green. "And that's and that's who this is geared toward."

The bill passed 100-48, with only state Rep. Raychel Proudie, a Democrat from Ferguson, crossing party lines to support the legislation. Another Democrat, state Rep. Marlene Terry of St. Louis, voted present.

Democrats opposed the bill, said state Rep. Steve Butz of St. Louis, because it will make it harder for the state to sustain education and other services.

"The message from the Republican side is, as just stated, 'I'm just here to cut your taxes,'" Butz said. "What they don't ever really address is either cutting services or they're just going to rotate or shift the tax burden to another form of taxation."

Gov. Mike Kehoe has championed the cut as the first step in eliminating the state income tax. An identical bill is awaiting debate in the state Senate.

Missouri is sitting on a large general revenue surplus but current revenues are falling. Through Tuesday, general revenue collections for the year are down more than 2% and if the trend continues the state will receive about \$300 million less than in the fiscal year that ended June. 30.

At the same time, demands for general revenue are growing. Kehoe's supplemental budget to finish the current fiscal year sets aside \$142 million to replace a shortfall in lottery and casino revenues in public schools. And the budget for the coming year increases general revenue allocations to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education by more than \$400 million, with public school backers clamoring for an additional \$300 million to fully fund the state foundation formula.

During Thursday's debate, Perkins said states that already exempt capital gains — Texas, Tennessee and Florida — have economies growing faster than Missouri. A cut would attract new business to the state, he said.

Those other states have higher taxes than Missouri in several areas, Butz said after the vote. He reminded colleagues during debate that if the state cuts taxes too much to sustain services demanded by voters, it will be hard to restore them. Any tax increase above about

\$100 million requires a statewide vote.

"If we make a mistake here, there's no going back," Butz said during the floor debate.

Since the enactment of a 2014 tax bill, the top income tax rate has fallen from 6% to 4.7%, with two additional cuts of 0.1 percentage point already part of state law. Those cuts will take place when the state sees year-over-year general revenue growth of \$200 million.

In the intervening years, the Republican-dominated legislature has also eliminated the income tax on Social Security benefits and cut the top corporate tax rate.

The impact of the state capital gains exemption could be lessened if Congress accepts the proposal pushed by President Donald Trump to eliminate what is known as the carried-interest exemption. That allows investment fund managers to pay the federal capital gains rate, which is lower than the general tax rate under the federal income tax.

"The whole concept of capital gains tax elimination is so that we can grow the economy, so we can get those high paying jobs to Missouri and businesses can reinvest," said state Rep. George Hruza, a Republican from St. Louis County.

Democrats, however, see the cut as part of a political tax policy that doesn't meet state needs.

"Their tax policies," said House Minority Leader Ashley Aune, "seem to be far more about the message it sends to voters than actually saving the average Missourian money."

old male from Sedalia.

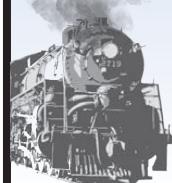
Neither driver was wearing a seatbelt. The woman was transported by Pettis County EMS to Bothwell Regional Medical Center.

### Presidents' Day is not enough

This past Wednesday was Abraham Lincoln's 216th birthday. Next Monday, we will observe a federal holiday in honor of George Washington's birthday.

Since 1970, most of the United States has haphazardly slapped these two together and called it Presidents' Day. We are nothing if not efficient! But as minor as the change may have seemed at the time, it's been the touching-off point for a troubling decline in the way we understand our American heritage.

Last year, NPR reported that eighth graders had the lowest U.S. history scores ever recorded by the National Assessment of Educational Progress. In addition, eighth grade civics scores dropped for the first time. "Only 14% of students reached at or above "proficient" mark in history, and in civics only 22% of students met the same benchmark," the news outlet said.

This is not a great sign for a democratic nation. Of course, most high school students still have to pass exams on the U.S. and state constitutions, but the information doesn't seem to be sticking after students leave school. Last year, the United States Department of Commerce Foundation reported that more than 70 percent of the Americans they surveyed could not pass a simple civics quiz. A third of them did not even know there were three branches of government!

But what does all this alarming information have to do with Washington's Birthday?

Simply put, in order to get people to know and care about the inner workings of their country, they must first have a reason to love and celebrate it. And our celebrations? They're pathetic.

Washington's Birthday (as the federal holiday is still officially called) used to be a much bigger deal. And so did Washington himself. In larger cities, there were parades, live music and speeches. Schoolchildren often celebrated with special lessons and cherry pie, a nod to the legend about young Washington cutting down the cherry tree. But little by little, the celebrations were trimmed down.

The childlike legends were disproven and poked fun at. The school and civic observances were mingled with remembrances for Abraham Lincoln, and in some places, they were dispensed with altogether in favor of impersonal lessons about the importance of "the presidential office."

The holiday was moved and moved again to make a three-day weekend possible. Even Washington's personal moral legacy was discounted, as he had been a slave holder. Today, as former Presidential Librarian Tom Putnam said, the holiday has been reduced to little more than "fodder for advertisers to market blowout sales at mattress and car dealerships."

From civic pride to mattress sales. This is America.

As every good teacher knows, important information sticks best when it is mingled with fun. Between the parades and pies, the people of our nation also used to have a tradition of reciting Washington's Farewell Address on the observation of his birthday. Its text is a powerful reminder of the very best ideals our nation is built upon and a potent warning against the same dirty party politics we are experiencing today:

"The alternate domination of one faction over another, sharpened by the spirit of revenge, natural to party dissension, which in different ages and countries has perpetrated the most horrid enormities, is itself a frightful despotism. But this leads at length to a more formal and permanent despotism. The disorders and miseries which result gradually incline the minds of men to seek security and repose in the absolute power of an individual; and sooner or later the chief of some prevailing faction, more able or more fortunate than his competitors, turns this disposition to the purposes of his own elevation, on the ruins of public liberty."

George Washington was neither a god nor a saint. But he may well have been a prophet, and we have stopped celebrating him to our own national detriment. The example of one good man is all it takes to light the fire of patriotism necessary to keep our republic alive. You can't inspire a nation with used cars and mattresses.

### The hits keep coming

The speed at which a group of unelected men is dismantling our government is head-spinning – which is probably the point. Speed means that we can't catch up, and at least some things will get by us.

Last week, all federal funding was frozen (courts put that on hold), USAID disappeared (also on hold), all 2.3 million federal employees were told to take a buy-out or else (courts put that on hold, but it's back now), and who knows what else happened.

The good news is in the parentheses – the courts put it on hold. So the checks and balances embedded in the Constitution are effective – at least for now. But when the co-president Elon Musk was holding forth in the Oval Office, he and the other co-president Trump said that perhaps we need to get rid of some of those obstinate judges.

That's what I next expect: The Court will issue an order and the White House will ignore it. That means the "rule of law" will become the "rule of one." That's not a good thing.

Actually, that has already happened. A federal judge said that the President was not complying with his order and ordered him again to re-start federal funding. I've been unable to determine whether he has

complied.

Though many people believe that government spends too much in general, problems with spending "cuts" do not show up right away. They appear later, when someone says, "Hey! What happened with my (fill in the blank)!" For instance, federal funding cuts to medical research, such as research at universities into things like cancer, aren't so good. Alabama Senator Katie Britt said to her local news source, *al.com*, that surely funding will be restored to the University of Alabama, "... a major recipient of that money, which has helped make it the state's largest employer" (<https://www.nbcnews.com/politics/congress/pain-hits-home-republicans-balk-trumps-spending-cuts-tariffs-rcna191832>).

According to the Missouri Independent, "By far the biggest recipient [in Missouri] of NIH grants was Washington University . . . , which received 1,192 grants totaling \$732 million, followed by the

162 grants worth almost \$70 million to the University of Missouri's Columbia campus." Cutting this funding will have a huge impact, but Missouri's Attorney General has not seen fit to sue the US government, along with 22 other Attorneys General, for withholding the money.

So it's great to cut spending, until it affects ME.

The same thing can be said about the end of USAID. While most people believe we spend too much money on foreign aid, "Since fiscal 2001, foreign aid has ranged between 0.7% and 1.4% of total federal outlays" (<https://www.pewresearch.org/short-reads/2025/02/06/what-the-data-says-about-us-foreign-aid/>).

Part of that foreign aid is food. But remember where all that food is coming from. The government is purchasing it from Midwest farmers. According to Devex.com (Devex is an international agency working in developing countries), "The U.S. government spends more than \$2 billion a year on rice, wheat, lentils, and soybeans from American farmers." Missouri farmers.

Things aren't always as simple as they seem.

When the government cuts funding for DEI initiatives, it's forgetting that "DEI" springs from the 1964

Civil Rights Act, which forbade employment discrimination on account of "race, color, religion, sex, or national origin."

Before that, businesses could legally deny employment to women, Black and Brown people, and Jews, among others. Through the years, the Court has expanded those categories to include groups such as pregnant women. Yes. Women could be fired for being pregnant.

DEI programs "seek to level the playing field for groups of workers who have historically been underrepresented in a given field or who, compared with their white or male peers, are underpaid for doing the same work" (<https://www.cbsnews.com/news/dei-diversity-equity-inclusion-corporate-programs/>).

For me, "DEI" helped me enter a traditionally male-dominated field – law. The ABA says that in 1980, the year before I graduated, women accounted for 3% of all lawyers in the US. Now it's 41%.

I have a feeling that pretty soon, people who thought "shaking up" the government was a good idea will have a different opinion – when it hits them.

In the meantime, Donald Trump didn't stop the Ukraine war in 24 hours, and eggs are still at record-high prices. Go figure.

Access to affordable, high-quality child care is not just a family issue — it's an economic imperative.

Addressing these business barriers not only supports working families but also strengthens workforce participation, particularly for women who disproportionately bear caregiving responsibilities.

Providers experience

Provider preparation prior to beginning and during the initial licensing process

Streamlining the licensing process and investing in greater childcare accessibility will help businesses attract and retain talent while enabling parents — especially mothers — to remain in the workforce without unnecessary financial or logistical burdens.

# Budget battle brewing over Gov. Mike Kehoe's school funding proposal

The debate over how much to spend on public schools could turn into the first big disagreement between Gov. Mike Kehoe and the GOP-dominated Missouri General Assembly.

Kehoe, a Republican who took office in January, refused to recommend a \$300 million boost to public school funding in his first budget proposal. But education advocates in the legislature, and the State Board of Education, are defending the request and pushing for it to be funded as lawmakers rewrite Kehoe's \$54 billion spending plan.

During a House Budget Committee hearing Monday, GOP state Rep. Ed Lewis spent a lot of time defending the law that generated the request. He did so, Lewis said in an interview, because the committee has many new members who need to learn that the question of how much money schools require is not just a question of how much lawmakers are willing to spend.

Of the 31 lawmakers on the committee, nine are new to the panel, including its vice chairman, state Rep. Bishop Davidson, a Republican from Republic.

"I am trying to do that because there are a lot of newbies, and the person who's sitting next to me has never been there, and now he's the vice chair and the chair of education appropriations," said Lewis, a former educator from Moberly who chairs the House Elementary and Secondary Education Committee. "I think it's my job to make sure that the things I've learned over the last four years are understood by some of those people that have never done this before."

At one point in the hearing, Lewis told his colleagues that if they don't provide the money, the state Senate will when it gets the budget later this year.

"The question is, do we want to, as the House of Representatives, think we want to go beyond the governor's recommendation

or leave that for the Senate to do?" Lewis said.

The budget committee is in the middle of hearings on department budgets. Any decisions on what will be in, and what will be out, of Kehoe's recommended budget will be made next month in markup sessions.

The foundation formula, as the public school funding mechanism is known, is costing taxpayers \$3.8 billion in the current year.

The amount required to fund it is determined by a variety of factors, including the amount spent in districts that do well on state achievement tests and expected attendance.

To meet that obligation, lawmakers use money from the state lottery, casino taxes and the general revenue fund.

Kehoe agreed to fund changes to the formula included last year in a major education bill that will add \$200 million to the total cost. What Kehoe doesn't want to fund is the new, higher basic spending requirement determined by annual evaluation under the Missouri School Improvement Program, or MSIP.

If lawmakers accept Kehoe's recommendation, it would be the first time since fiscal 2018 that the budget doesn't fully fund the formula.

"While we are committed to making good on the funding commitments passed by the legislature last year," Kehoe said in his State of the State Address last month, "this budget does not include the additional \$300 million liability that was imposed by an administrative body."

That "administrative body" is the State Board of Education, which met Tuesday for the first time since Kehoe presented his budget proposal. Board President Charlie Shields, who helped write the foundation formula in 2005 when he was a state legislator, said he understands Kehoe's position even if he doesn't like it.

The state general revenue fund must provide the \$300 million, if appropriated, and it is also being tapped for money to replace

shortfalls in revenue from gambling on the lottery and in casinos. Kehoe's budget proposal increases general revenue spending for the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education by \$464 million, Shields noted.

"In my time, in both the legislature and on the State Board of Education, I have not seen those levels of increases in education funding," Shields said in an interview.

He has not spoken to Kehoe about the budget proposal, Shields said, or Kehoe's call to rewrite the formula.

"We're cognizant that (the education department) sits within, you know, 14 other state departments, and there's limited resources," Shields said.

"The legislature will make decisions about that, but I don't think we have any question of either defending or explaining why we put in the request that we did."

Missouri has a substantial balance in the general revenue fund — \$4.3 billion at the end of January — and Kehoe's budget projects a \$2.6 billion surplus at the end of the fiscal year in June.

But state revenues are falling so far this fiscal year, and Kehoe wants a big income tax cut. That is putting pressure both on the governor and the legislature to limit new spending.

The key figure driving the increase for the foundation formula is called the State Adequacy Target, determined by the cost of education in districts that do well on the MSIP evaluation. Far fewer districts met the standards of the newly

revised MSIP, and they tended to be districts with more property wealth and fewer students in poverty or having special needs.

Over the past two years, the adequacy target has increased from \$6,375 per student to \$7,145. But the figure was nearly static for nearly two decades prior to that, increasing from \$6,117 in 2005 to \$6,375 in 2020, where it remained for four years.

The reluctance to fund the higher target, which has increased 17% since it was created while inflation has increased prices by 65%, has drawn fire from Democrats.

"It's very concerning that when the foundation formula remained flat for year after year after year, as inflation was just climbing through the roof, we didn't have a problem with the formula," state Rep. Kathy Steinhoff said when Kehoe unveiled his budget.

Steinhoff is a Columbia Democrat and former teacher.

"But now that the formula is starting to work and the student adequacy target is starting to gain and getting more money into our schools," she said, "now all of a sudden we're looking at it."

## Pettis County added to Amber Alert for missing Wisconsin teen

Pettis County was added to an Amber Alert on Wednesday, Feb. 12, as authorities continue to search for a pregnant 16-year-old teen from Wisconsin and the 40-year-old father.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Sophia Martha Franklin, who is three months pregnant, was last seen at her residence in Beaver Dam, Wisconsin at 9 p.m. Feb. 2. Gary F. Day was last seen at the residence at 7:48 a.m. Feb. 3.

A no contact order is in place between the two.

It is believed the pair is traveling to Arkansas in a Black 2014 Buick Lacrosse. Day is known to use multiple license plates on the vehicle,

including Pennsylvania plate KGW5186 and Arkansas plate BBR20L.

On Feb. 4, the State of Wisconsin issued a felony arrest warrant for Day on two counts of abduction of child and two counts of child enticement.

Franklin is described at 5-foot-9, 186 pounds with brown hair and blue eyes. Day is 5-foot-7, 165 pounds with blonde hair, green eyes and black-rimmed glasses. Clothing information is unknown.

In Missouri, the Amber Alert currently covers Pettis, Boone, Cooper, Howard, Moniteau, Morgan and Saline counties.

Bray had just returned from plowing snow routes with Mayor Andrew Dawson who rode shotgun during the light snow.

"Just out riding with Justin," Dawson said. "We're hitting some snow routes, moving some snow. We made a big effort yesterday get all the cars on the snow emergency routes flyer-ed to encourage people to move their vehicles."

As the team salted and plowed the Snow Emergency Routes, they also gently urged folks to clear a path for oncoming snowplows.

"We hooked up a PA system on one of the trucks where we've been broadcasting those emergency snow routes asking people to move their vehicles," Dawson said, "we're just trying to encourage people get their vehicle off the snow emergency route, it makes it so much easier for these guys because they're not having to worry about hitting cars."

Dawson made a point of thanking those who helped by getting out and moving their cars. He also mentioned possible fines for

those who don't move their vehicles for future snow emergency announcements.

The midweek snow was light and fluffy with negligible ice and much easier to remove than January's crippling storm.

"Definitely more manageable," Bray said. "The fact that we don't have ice and sleet is helping us out a lot. We're making some good progress. We pretreated yesterday, and we pretreated the emergency snow routes and residential."

A mountain of road salt is stored in a shed at Public Works and gets a salty-brine additive sprayed on it just before it is loaded on city trucks.

"It's called a 'hot load,'" Bray explained. "That's where we mix the calcium chloride in with the salt, that helps the salt work a little bit better and lowers the freezing temperature down."

The road salt/brine mix will keep melting snow in colder conditions than the road salt alone. Bray noted below 0 degrees Fahrenheit not much will effectively melt the snow besides steady exposure to the Sun.

Pettis County also pre-

treated the roadways with great results.

"A lot of people may not realize how goes into preparing for an event like this," Eastern Commissioner Israel Baeza said. "Thankfully we received less snow than we anticipated, but yesterday our crews were out treating roads which really paid off today. We weren't expecting a lot of rain, so we felt comfortable treating the roads."

While snow evacuation routes received extra attention and were mostly cleared of snow by Wednesday afternoon, MoDOT, City of Sedalia and Pettis County snow removal crews ask for your consideration as they work to finish clearing away the remaining snow.

Another round of snow is possible overnight Saturday, Feb. 15 through Sunday, Feb. 16, though only a dusting to an inch is in the forecast.

"I just want to ask people to be very careful when they're out there," Baeza said. "And just make sure they're giving enough room for our operators to do their job."

"The horse has a large magnetic field that will reset the rider for riders that can't walk on their own. The movement of the horse simulates the movement of walking, so it helps with all their internal organs, muscle structure, it's a full-body workout."

Three types of riders keep the staff and volunteers busy.

"We have some riders that come just as a place of relaxation, some come for the physical therapy, and then we have some that just come to have fun," Richerson said.

Kristin Donze has been bringing her son Nathan Spellmeyer to Remember to Dream for nine years.

"He's actually a shaken baby survivor," Donze said. "He's aware of everything, he knows what's going on and what's being said."

Spellmeyer can get into the saddle easily enough, and his mom and two vol-

unteers hold on as another gently leads the horse.

"My son's ornery, so some days he participates really well and some days he has to do some walking because he's being a little rough and rowdy," Donze said. "But he loves the horses he loves coming. We're very super active in the community and it just is one of the things that we do."

Spellmeyer enjoys the higher vantage point and the mild workout he receives.

"It helps with him with trunk control and it's working his all of his muscles all at once," Donze said. "Versus doing just physical therapy, only working on certain muscles. The whole rhythm of the horse and him working together. It's an amazing program, I think it's something that a lot of people should look into."

Tom Parker and his son Hayden have been driving from Sedalia once a week for the past year and a half.

"He knows what day's

what, he knows his schedules," Parker said. "He knows what's coming up and all you've gotta do is tell him, 'You're ready to go for horses?' and he says, 'Horses, yes. ... He's probably had three or four different horses, but this one is his newest horse. I think it does him a lot of good.'"

Hayden's father said the interaction with the horses brings a sudden change in his behavior.

"It can calm him, it can settle him," Parker said. "You can tell that it just kind of puts him in a zone when he's up there. When he first started coming here it was nothing for him to get on the horse and just sing while he's up on the horse riding."

Hayden likes indoor riding lessons, but after taking trail in the great outdoors a different rider emerged.

"He really likes the trail rides he goes on a trail ride when the weather's permitting and it's not muddy," Parker said. "He'll request it, he'll get on

there and tell her, 'Outside,' and she'll say, 'No, you can't go outside, today is too cold.'"

Hayden will argue back and forth a bit but will eventually consent to riding inside that day.

They each have an incredible story that has equipped them with experiences both on and off the field to help our young men with the tools they need to be successful in life and in football. They are passionate about relationships and the coaching profession."

Mayle joins the Mules after serving as the wide receivers coach at Missouri Southern in Joplin for the 2024 season.

Before his time in Joplin, Mayle was the wide receivers coach for Sierra College, where he produced an All-State selection in the NorCal Conference.

Mayle was drafted in the fourth round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys and went on to play in the NFL for the Cowboys (2015-17), Bal-

timore Ravens (2017-19) and Los Angeles Chargers (2019-20) before retiring and getting into coaching.

Mayle played college football at Washington State University Pullman, Wash., as a wide receiver where he played two seasons and cracked in the top 10 in yards and catches in program history. He is the only receiver ever in PAC-12 history to post over 250 receiving yards twice in a game in one year and led the PAC-12 in receptions (106) and yards (1,483) in 2014, both also Washington State single season records. Mayle also holds the WSU single-game records in receptions (15) and receiving yards (263). He capped off his senior year at Washington State as an All-American, All-PAC-12 and a semi-finalist for the Bilitnekoff Award which is given to the nation's best wide receiver.

Mayle graduated from Washington State with a bachelor's degree in social sciences in 2015.

"Vince is a rising star in this profession. His knowledge and passion for the game are on display in every interaction," Lamberson said. "His experience will be a valuable tool for our wide receiver room, and his excitement to serve our players is already being felt. He is a phenomenal addition to the program,

both on and off the field. He has the 'it' factor and can make an impact in every area of our players' lives."

Graham comes to Warrensburg after serving as an offensive student assistant at the University of Texas Permian Basin (UTPB) in 2023-24 in Odessa, Texas.

Graham was a quarterback for UTPB for two seasons, playing in 15 games for the Falcons. In his 15 career games, he was 289-549 for 3,229 passing yards with 29 touchdowns. He helped UTPB win the 2023 Lone Star Conference Championship. # Royals bring back Yost as a senior adviser to general manager

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Royals have hired Ned Yost as a senior adviser to general manager J.J. Picollo, bringing back the manager who led them to back-to-back American League pennants and a World Series title in 2015.

The club announced the move Tuesday, one day before pitchers and catchers were scheduled to report to spring training.

"My deep love for the Royals, for Kansas City, and for the people there never left," said the 69-year-old Yost, who retired after the 2019 season. "I just want to help, because I know I can help. I know what it takes to build a world championship club, and I think we're getting close. I think we're getting really close."

The Royals, who lost 106 games just

two years ago, went 86-76 last season, when Bobby Witt Jr. emerged as one of the bright young talents in the game and a rebuilt rotation produced a pair of All-Star pitchers. They wound up earning one of the AL wild cards and advanced to the divisional round, where they lost in four games to the New York Yankees.

Yost was hired as the Royals' manager on May 13, 2010, and went on to win a club-record 746 games. He was inducted into the franchise Hall of Fame during a pregame ceremony on Sept. 2, 2023.

"Our fans remember Ned's leadership helping produce some of the best moments in Royals history," Picollo said. "He knows what winning a World Series here takes because he's helped make it happen, and his experience both as a leader and with young players will help us make better decisions and keep pushing toward another championship."

## A late Nashville singer and Stover resident honored through podcast

A late Stover resident and Nashville singer, Shelly Bush, is being immortalized in a podcast that will go live on Friday, Feb. 14, the 10th anniversary of her death.

The podcast, created by Nashville session musician Ellen Angelico, will shed light on Bush. Bush grew up in Morgan County, sang at her local church and eventually went to Nashville following her dream.

Bush created an all-female band, **Broadband**, and is well known in the Nashville circuit but not elsewhere.

Angelico plans to correct that with her podcast "Girl in a Hurry: The Shelly Bush Story" a six-part podcast on SoundCloud that tells what it's like to make it in the music industry.

"I sat out to do this originally because I wanted to collect all of these amazing stories in one place," Angelico said. "But as I got further into the process, I realized I wanted to correct the historical record about Shelly's importance."

Angelico's podcast page states she "plays guitar, bass, pedal steel, mandolin, banjo, dobro, keys and trombone everywhere from the Grand Ole Opry to Guam." Angelico also played in Bush's band for two years before her death in 2015.

Angelico added that people like Bush who don't end up with hits or Grammys aren't often recognized in the "record of country music history." She said she feels Bush deserves that recognition.

"I wanted people to know about this amazing woman who had such a big impact on my life and the lives of a ton of other musicians in Nashville," Angelico said. "A Girl in a Hurry"

Bush died young, at 48, of cancer. Her obituary says she was a 1985 graduate of Morgan County R-I High School in Stover. She received an associate degree in music from State Fair Community College in Sedalia and a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Central Missouri State University, now the University of Central Missouri, in Warrensburg.

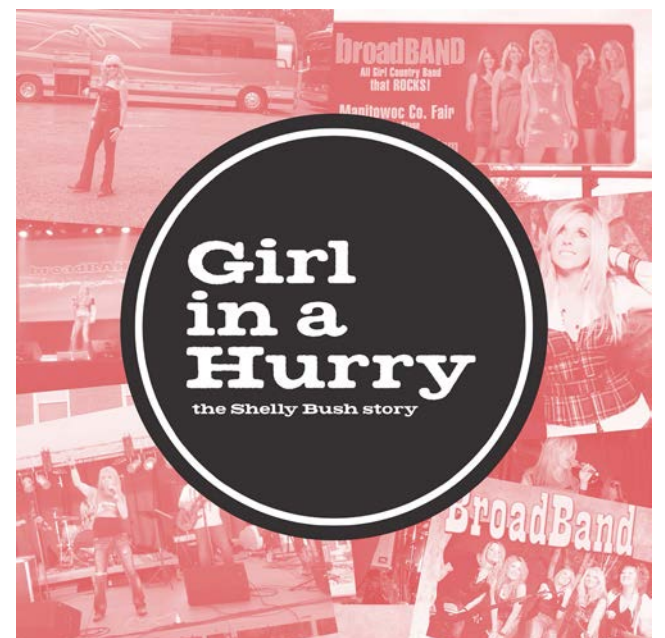
She desired to become a singer, and many people remember her pure voice. Her obituary also noted that music was her passion.

"At the age of 11, her parents took her to Nashville, where she recorded 'Rocky Top' at the Barbara Mandrell Studios; at that moment, a country music singer was born," the obituary states. "Her parents logged more than 400,000 miles in their white Monte Carlo, taking Shelly to music contests throughout the Midwest. She had a dream, and they were her biggest fans."

Angelico said that as an adult, Bush came to Nashville to work at the USPS office and play gigs.

"It got to the point where she couldn't juggle both," Angelico said. "She

was making more money playing gigs. So, she decided that she was going to dive in."

Angelico's podcast is named after a song Bush sang, "Girl in a Hurry." She's unsure if Bush wrote the song but noted she wrote some of her own material.

# This Valentine’s Day, be a love bug

Valentine’s Day isn’t just for humans, says University of Missouri Extension urban entomologist Emily Althoff. Missouri insects need and deserve love, too.

Insects affect the environment with major roles in pollination, pest control, decomposition and the food web, Althoff says. “Ensuring insects are happy and healthy is important to sustaining our environment as well as agriculture.”

Take these steps to show Missouri insects some love, she says: 1) Learn about at-risk species; 2) Limit pesticide use and use according to label instructions; 3) Plant flowers that bloom throughout the season; and 4) Protect existing habitats.

**Native bees: Bee our Valentine**

Learn about the wild world of Missouri’s native bumblebees, leaf-cutter and mason bees, carpenter bees, mining bees and more.

Encourage bee populations by incorporating flowering plants that bloom throughout the season. Enhance natural areas by using

undisturbed pastures, sunny bare patches and dead snags that provide nesting sites as part of the design. Also, plant cover crops and reduce tillage.

**Wheel bugs: I’m head over wheels for you**

These “wheely,” weird-looking bugs get their name from the cog-like protrusions from their thorax. They are the only species in the United States with this feature.

While wheel bugs aren’t as lovable as some other insects, they are insect predators that even eat the brown marmorated stink bug. “Love wheel bugs from afar because of their painful bite,” warns Althoff.

**American burying beetle: Orange you glad we’re Valentines?**

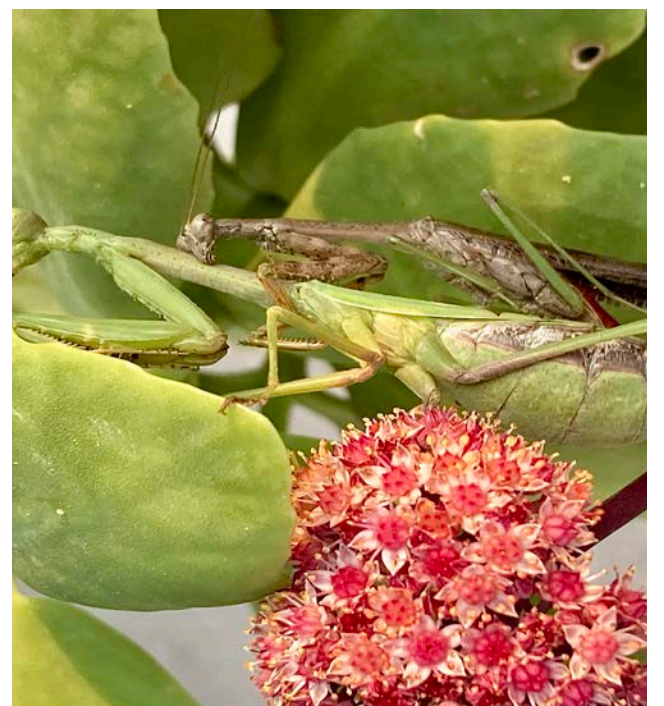
The American burying beetle (*Nicrophorus americanus*) is a native to Missouri and has a special story to tell, says Althoff. The largest carrion beetles in North America, they play a critical role as decomposers. They live in family groups where both parents care for the young.

This beetle was listed as a federally endangered species in 1989 largely due to a reduction of threats in its habitat – prairies, savannas and Mississippi lowlands. In 2021, it was reclassified to federally threatened.

This burying beetle gets a heart emoji for reducing pesky flies, helping with nutrient cycling and reducing disease by decomposing dead animals.

**Ladybugs: You’re cute as a bug, Valentine!**

This native ladybug species can be differentiated from the invasive

*Harmonia axyridis* by looking for an “M” shape on the pronotum or shield behind its head. The native species does not have this.

Both the larvae and adults consume pests. Plant continual flowering plants and retain brush and leaves for overwintering habitat to encourage ladybugs. Also, limit pesticide use.

**Praying mantids: You never have to worry about my ex**

These alien-looking creatures are beneficial in gardens despite their troubling expression of love. Female mantids occasionally eat the male’s head after mating. However, this is not as common as widely believed.

“They are generalist predators that use their raptorial front legs to grasp prey,” says Althoff. **Monarch butterflies: You make my heart flutter**

Monarch butterflies are some of the most charismatic insects in North America. Unfortunately, there has been an 80% decrease

in population since the 1990s.

This may be due to loss of milkweed habitat, pesticide use, destruction of overwintering sites, and changing weather conditions. Encourage monarch habitats by planting preferred hosts and learning how to use roadsides and rights-of-way for monarch plantings.

**Hover flies: You’re pretty fly, Valentine**

You might mistake these syrphid hover flies for bees but look closely, says Althoff. Bees and wasps have four wings, while flies have two.

“Have no fear though, these flies are beneficial pollinators, second only to bees,” she says. Their larvae feed on aphids, caterpillars, leafhoppers, planthoppers, mealy bugs and thrips. Encourage syrphids by planting continual flowering plants, allowing some pests to serve as food, providing wind breaks and limiting pesticide applications.



## PASTOR'S PULPIT

### Do you love me?

Discovering love again is sometimes very difficult. In the story, "Fiddler on the Roof," there is a scene in which Tevye, the husband, is asking his wife, Golde, "Do you love me?" It goes like this:

## Missouri Secretary of State Denny Hoskins warns Missourians about romance scams

Missouri Secretary of State Denny Hoskins, CPA, is urging Missourians to be vigilant against romance scams, a growing threat that preys on individuals seeking companionship online. As Valentine's Day approaches, fraudsters are ramping up efforts to manipulate victims into sending money or divulging personal information.

"Romance scams are among the most dev-

astating types of fraud, not only financially but emotionally," said Secretary Hoskins. "These scammers build trust over time, often posing as loving and devoted partners, only to exploit their victims for financial gain. Missourians should remain cautious when engaging in online relationships."

According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), romance scams result in millions

of dollars in losses each year, with victims often targeted through dating websites, social media platforms, and messaging apps. Scammers typically craft elaborate backstories, claiming to be deployed military personnel, international businesspeople, or professionals working overseas. They create a sense of urgency, asking for money under the guise of emergencies, medical expenses, or

travel costs to meet in person—requests that never materialize into a real encounter.

To help Missourians protect themselves, Secretary Hoskins offers the following tips:

Be skeptical of individuals who profess love quickly or avoid in-person meetings.

Never send money, gift cards, or personal financial information to someone you haven't met.

Conduct reverse image searches on profile pictures to check for stolen identities.

Discuss new online relationships with trusted friends or family members.

Report suspected romance scams to the Missouri Secretary of State's Office, the FTC, or the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3).

"Missourians deserve to form relationships

built on trust, not deceit," Secretary Hoskins emphasized. "By staying informed and vigilant, we can protect ourselves and our loved ones from these heartless schemes."

## Some people didn't know they had a bird flu infection, study of veterinarians suggests

NEW YORK — A new study shows that bird flu has silently spread from animals to some veterinarians.

The study published Thursday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention echoes two smaller ones that detected evidence of infection in previously undiagnosed farmworkers. In those studies, several of the infected workers remembered having symptoms of H5N1 bird flu, while none of the veterinarians in the new paper recalled any such symptoms.

The new study is more evidence that the official U.S. tally of confirmed human bird flu infections — 68 in

the last year — is likely a significant undercount, said Dr. Gregory Gray, an infectious disease researcher at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

"This means that people are being infected, likely due to their occupational exposures, and not developing signs of illness and therefore not seeking medical care," Gray said. He said it shows that officials cannot fully understand bird flu transmission by only tracking people who go to medical clinics with symptoms.

### Study suggests bird flu cases are undercounted

CDC researchers went to an American Association of Bovine Practitioners veterinary conference in Septem-

ber 2024 in Columbus, Ohio. They recruited 150 vets from 46 states to fill out a questionnaire and agree to have their blood drawn. None said they had suffered red eyes or other symptoms associated with bird flu.

Testing found three of the vets, or 2%, had evidence of antibodies to H5N1 infection. All three worked with dairy cattle, as well as other animals. None said they'd worked with a herd that was known to be infected, although one had worked with a flock of infected poultry.

Gray and some colleagues did a study last year of 14 dairy farmworkers and found two, or 14%, had evidence of past infections. Both had experienced symptoms but were never diag-

nosed.

Another study published last year by the CDC checked 115 dairy workers. The researchers found that eight of them, or 7%, had evidence in their blood of recent infection. Half recalled feeling ill.

The studies were far too small to use as a basis to provide a solid estimate of how many undiagnosed human infections are out there, Gray said. But even just a very small percentage could translate to hundreds or thousands of Americans who were infected while working with animals, he noted.

That's not necessarily a reason to be alarmed, said Jacqueline Nolting, an Ohio State University researcher who helped CDC with the latest

study.

Available studies suggest people who are infected mount antibody responses and may develop natural immunity, which is "good news," she said.

However, if the virus changes or mutates to start making people very sick, or to start spreading easily from person to person, that would be "a completely different story," Nolting said.

### Experts urge caution around animals

The H5N1 bird flu has been spreading widely among wild birds, poultry, cows and other animals. Its escalating presence in the environment increases the chances people will be exposed, and potentially catch it, officials have said.

Right now the risk

to the general public is low, the CDC says. But officials continue to urge people who have contact with sick or dead birds to take precautions, including wearing respiratory and eye protection and gloves when handling poultry.

"No one's really questioning that the virus has been moving around the country more than has been reported," said Keith Poulsen, director of the Wisconsin Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory.

He said he expected to see stepped-up information reminding veterinarians across the country to protect themselves with gloves, masks and other equipment to halt infection.

# Kehoe's budget proposal includes \$55 million for expansion of State Fair livestock facilities

Missouri Gov. Mike Kehoe has introduced a proposed \$53.7 billion state budget for the upcoming fiscal year, with a significant focus on bolstering the state's agriculture industry.

The proposal allocates \$55 million for the expansion of livestock facilities at the Missouri State Fair, highlighting the administration's commitment to the state's largest economic sector.

"Agriculture is near and dear to my heart and our state's leading economic driver," Kehoe said.

According to the Missouri Department of Agriculture, agriculture employs nearly 460,000 people state-wide, and Missouri is home to almost 88,000 farms.

Missouri is also one of the most diverse states when it comes to farming, too. Between the cattle country of southern Missouri, the cotton and rice of the Bootheel, the hog barns found along the northern border, and the corn and soybeans found

all over, Missouri has a lot of irons in the fire.

The proposed funding aims to modernize and expand the Missouri State Fairgrounds' livestock exhibition and educational facilities in Sedalia, providing improved infrastructure for farmers, ranchers and agricultural students.

State officials emphasize that investing in these facilities will enhance Missouri's agricultural prominence while supporting future generations in the industry. The funding would allow for improved livestock handling, updated technology, and expanded educational programs at the fairgrounds.

"Under this administration, our ag industry will continue to grow and thrive because it is not only the backbone of our economy, but our producers feed and clothe the world," Kehoe said.

The Missouri Department of Agriculture has expressed strong support for the initiative, noting that agriculture remains the backbone of the state's economy.

# Missouri soybean research project shuts down as Trump cuts off funding

A major soybean research project, which collaborates with the University of Missouri, will shut down April 15 due to President Donald Trump's dismantling of funding to the U.S. Agency for International Development.

The Soybean Innovation Lab, based at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, formed in 2011 to provide researchers and organizations with the resources needed to advance soybean development. The lab is comprised of over 100 technical soybean experts from 24 countries, each representing a variety of institutions.

The land grant system will lose 19 innovation labs across 17 states, in-

cluding Missouri.

MU has been involved in the Soybean Innovation Lab since 2013, said Kerry Clark, an MU researcher who leads the mechanization division for the lab. Clark said MU's sector of the Soybean Innovation Lab research received \$1.2 million, or about \$150,000 annually, before losing funding.

As part of the project, Missouri has been doing research on African soybean diseases that would help Missouri farmers combat a disease that can decimate soybean crops. The research found diseases in African soybean crops that could be prevented in Missouri and abroad, Clark said.

"(The cease in funding and the end of the project) puts us many years behind now in trying to combat

soybean rust, which is a disease that can take out soybean crops entirely," Clark said.

In Missouri, soybeans cover more than 5 million acres of the state every year. Soybeans are the No. 1 crop in Missouri, leading in both acreage and value, according to the Missouri Soybean Center. The economic health of Missouri depends on the growth of soybeans because the yearly on-farm value of soybeans is greater than \$2.5 billion.

"Soybeans are such an important crop for the state of Missouri," said Brady Deaton, a former MU chancellor and member of the Soybean Innovation Lab advisory board. "... So new knowledge, which is being generated by this innovation lab, flows to all producers and

consumers of soybeans, and in that sense, has some direct effect."

Deaton said the end of the project will affect knowledge about soybean breeding, soybean diseases and the uses of technology in Africa and other parts of the world.

Missouri's research pioneered new technologies, particularly threshing, which is the process of removing the soybeans from their pods. The research also focused on the uses of soybeans and nutrition, and understanding how it was being used for feeding both people and livestock, Deaton said.

The funding disruption also cuts off relationships between the research, business and government sector, said a social media statement from Peter Goldsmith, the director of

the Soybean Innovation Lab. He said the labs will lose relationships and collaboration with local businesses, organizations and government.

"U.S. soybean farmers lose one of their best tools to expand their markets and U.S. standards globally," Goldsmith said in his post. "Local economies in emerging markets lose soybean as an incomparable engine growing wealth, prosperity, and economic development."

The story goes deeper than just Missouri soybeans. Since his inauguration Jan. 20, Trump has attempted to gut funding and staff from the U.S. Agency for International Development, USAID, according to The Associated Press. These cuts directly affected the Soybean Innovation Lab. The

USAID distributes federal humanitarian aid to other countries.

Deaton said the soybean research fit into the goals of the USAID because it addressed high priority issues, including human and economic development around the world.

"The sudden cessation or cutting of the funds is just very damaging we will find," Deaton said. "I think, to the efforts of the United States and its foreign policy to bring about positive, meaningful change in those parts of the world where it's working, and it works in very targeted ways, in some of the poorest countries."

# US eggs prices hit a record high of \$4.95 and are likely to keep climbing

OMAHA, Neb. — Egg prices hit a record high as the U.S. contends with an ongoing bird flu outbreak, but consumers didn't need government figures released Wednesday to tell them eggs are terribly expensive and hard to find at times.

The latest monthly consumer price index showed that the average price of a dozen Grade A eggs in U.S. cities reached \$4.95 in January, eclipsing the previous record of \$4.82 set two years earlier and more than double the low of \$2.04 that was recorded in August 2023.

The spike in egg prices was the biggest since the nation's last bird flu outbreak in 2015 and accounted for roughly two-thirds of the total increase in food costs last month, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Of course, that is only the nationwide average. A carton of eggs can cost \$10 or more in some places.

And specialized varieties, such as organic and cage-free eggs, are even more expensive.

"We do use eggs a little less often now. You know, because of the price," said Jon Florey as he surveyed his options in the egg case at Encinal Market in Alameda, California. "I was going to make a quiche that I like to make and it's about six eggs, so I figured I'd do something else."

## When are egg prices expected to go down?

Relief is not expected any time soon. Egg prices typically spike around Easter due to high holiday demand. And the U.S. Department of Agriculture predicted last month that egg prices were likely to go up 20% this year.

Even if shoppers can afford eggs, they may have difficulty finding them at times. Some grocers are having trouble keeping their shelves stocked, and customers are encountering surcharges and limits on how many cartons they can buy at a time.

Encinal Market owner

Joe Trimble said he has a hard time getting all the eggs he orders from his suppliers, so most of the time his shelves are only about 25% full.

"It's something you don't think about until you look at the shelf and it's nearly empty," Trimble said. Eggs are "just expected to be there in the same way you expect there to be milk. It's a key item to have in a grocery store because people don't go out looking for something else to eat on a Saturday morning. They want it. They want to have some scrambled eggs or over-easy eggs on a Saturday morning."

## How bad is the bird flu outbreak?

The main reason that eggs are more expensive is the bird flu outbreak. When the virus is found on a farm, the entire flock is killed to limit the spread of disease. Because massive egg farms may have millions of birds, just one outbreak may put a dent in the egg supply. Nearly 158 million birds have been slaughtered overall since

the outbreak began.

The Agriculture Department says more than 23 million birds were slaughtered last month and more than 18 million were killed in December to limit the spread of the bird flu virus. Those numbers include turkeys and chickens raised for meat, but the vast majority of them were egg-laying chickens.

And when there is an outbreak on a farm, it often takes several months to dispose of the carcasses, sanitize the barns and raise new birds until they are old enough to start producing eggs, so the effects linger.

Bird flu cases often spike in the spring and fall when wild birds are migrating because they are the main source of the virus, but cases can pop up any time of year. The virus has also spread to cattle and other species, and dozens of people — mostly farmworkers taking care of ill animals — have been sickened.

But health officials say the threat to human health remains low and eggs and poultry are safe to eat

because sick animals aren't allowed into the food supply. Plus, properly cooking meat and eggs to at least 165 degrees Fahrenheit kills any virus, and pasteurization neutralizes bird flu in milk.

## What else is driving egg prices up?

Egg farmers also face higher feed, fuel and labor costs these days because of inflation. Plus, farmers are investing more in biosecurity measures to try to protect their birds.

Ten states have passed laws allowing the sale of eggs only from cage-free environments. The supply of those eggs is tighter and focused in certain regions, so the effect on prices can be magnified when outbreaks hit cage-free egg farms.

Many of the egg farms with recent outbreaks were cage-free farms in California. Cage-free egg laws have already gone into effect in California, Massachusetts, Nevada, Washington, Oregon, Colorado and Michigan.

Total demand for eggs is

also up significantly in recent years. Consumers are buying more eggs, and the growth of all-day breakfast restaurants is adding to demand.

CoBank analyst Brian Earnest said the current cost of eggs could discourage some buying, which would ease the demand pressure but might not have a noticeable effect. It will likely take months for egg producers to fill the gaps in supply.

"As consumers continue to stock up on eggs, supplies at the store level will remain tight, and with Easter right around the corner, that could prolong the tighter supplies," Earnest said.

While prices remain elevated, producers of baked goods and other food items that rely on eggs as a main ingredient will have to decide how much to increase prices or reduce production, he said.

“She wrote a lot of the music that she sang and did some outside cuts,” she said. “When I heard it (Girl in a Hurry), it just knocked me on my butt ... she was obviously talking about a romantic relationship in that song, but it was such a beautiful metaphor for her life.”

Some of the lyrics say, “I’m a girl in a hurry, so make up your mind. If you don’t know what you want, I’ll leave you behind. Life’s too short, and there’s no time to worry ...”

### A determination to keep performing

Angelico noted Bush was still performing when she became ill.

“She performed extensively while she was sick,” Angelico said. “I just got a text from a friend of mine, a drummer ... He texted me and said, ‘I’ll always remember Shelly calling me from the hospital in Texas asking if I was available to play some dates at Cadillac Ranch.’ She was literally booking gigs from the hospital.”

Playing in Bush’s band was phenomenal for Angelico.

“She was a wonderful person,” Angelico said. “She was deeply kind; she had an amazing talent; she worked harder than anybody else in Nashville. Anybody who knew her

would say that. I’m a musician myself, and I play gigs around town, and the last time I played on the

Grand Ole Opry, I mentioned that I was doing this project, and members of the Opry House band

were like, “Oh yeah, Shelly she was amazing, I put on her records, I saw her around town. Man, she

worked so hard.”

### “Shelly’s life mattered”

Angelico said that people at the “upper echelons of the music business were aware of how extraordinary” Bush was.

“She had this all-girl band, and girls don’t get the same opportunities in country music that guys do,” Angelico said. “So, Shelly gave musicians a chance, who might not have otherwise had a chance.”

Angelico noted she still stays in touch with Bush’s family.

“Actually, this podcast brought me closer to them than was before,” Angelico said. “I speak to her mom all the time.”

During her career, Bush made numerous albums.

“There’s only two of them available on major streaming services right now,” Angelico said. “But once the podcast is out, I would like to work on upping that number. If you want to check them out on Apple Music or Spotify, there are two fabulous albums, one’s called ‘Don’t Fall in Love,’ and the other’s called, ‘Reckless.’”

Angelico said creating the podcast about Bush made her feel “terribly nervous.”

“It’s an enormous responsibility,” Angelico said. “If you Google Shelly ... you can find her obituary, and that’s about it. There’s really not much

out there about her. I feel the weight of her legacy, and I want to do right by her. I want to do right by her memory; I want to do right by her family and all her friends. I want this podcast to show that Shelly’s life mattered; all their lives matter. This is an amazing story, and it deserves to be told, but it’s an enormous responsibility.”

A media preview of the podcast shows it is done with meticulous professional precision, and Angelico added she is “very proud of it.”

In her podcast, Angelico describes Bush as a beautiful, talented woman with a warm smile—the girl next door. She also interviews people who knew her.

“This is real life,” Angelico said. “Not everybody’s going to get Grammys, and not everybody’s going to win a Noble Prize. But that’s not what making music is about, and that’s not what life’s about.”

NEW YORK — Tune into the Oct. 11, 1975 premiere episode of “Saturday Night Live” — then without “live” in its name — and you may be instantly surprised at some of the bones of the show that are still intact today.

There’s the cold open skit, featuring cast members John Belushi and Michael O’Donoghue. At its end, Chevy Chase gingerly walks by the prone bodies of the two actors, playing dead, for the very first call of “Live from New York, it’s Saturday night!”

NBC is rebroadcasting that episode Saturday, part of a feast of 50th anniversary programming that includes a three-hour special on Sunday reuniting dozens of past cast members and friends and a homecoming concert from Radio City Music Hall being livestreamed Friday night on Peacock.

The original cast surely would have mocked the display of showbiz excess, much like the actors in last year’s fictional backstage depiction of opening night in the movie “Saturday Night” couldn’t hide their disgust at Hollywood legend Milton Berle.

### Not ready for prime time? Hardly

Back then, they were known as the Not Ready for Prime Time Players. Success has long since made a mockery of that name. Among viewers under age 50, the late-night show is more popular than anything NBC airs in so-called prime time, and that doesn’t even reflect the way many people experience it now, through highlight clips online.

“Saturday Night Live” is the engine of comedy, minting generations of stars from Belushi to Bill Murray to Eddie Murphy to Adam Sandler to Will Ferrell to Amy Poehler to Kristen Wiig to Kate McKinnon to Bowen Yang. It launched movie franchises too numerous to mention, and NBC’s late-night comedy lineup of Jimmy Fallon and Seth Meyers traces its lineage to “SNL.” It’s still the first place people turn when they want to make comedic sense of current affairs.

At its center, then and now, is the inscrutable figure of Lorne Michaels, the executive producer who was 30 during that first season and turned 80 last fall — on a show night, naturally.

Michaels left “SNL” for five years and, upon his return in 1985, hit upon the formula that guaranteed its continued relevance.

He recognized, as author Susan Morrison writes in the biography “Lorne: The Man Who Invented Saturday Night Live,” due to be released Tuesday, that “just about every person who has ever watched SNL believes that its funniest years were the ones when they were in high school.”

That means constantly moving forward, always adding new blood, even being ruthless about it. That means trusting young writers to keep the cultural references relevant, and invent new ones. That means booking musical acts that Michaels and his good friend, singer Paul Simon, probably haven’t heard of but his people tell him are on the cutting edge.

It’s not perfect. It never was.

“The history of the show reads like an EKG,” said James Andrew Miller, co-author with Tom Shales of the 2002 book, “Live From New York: The Complete, Uncensored History of Saturday Night Live.” “There are fantastic years, there are growing years, there are years to make you carsick, there are years to make you wonder if it should still be going on.”

Substitute the word “shows” for “years” in that quote, and it still makes sense.

### Creating viral moments before ‘viral’ was a thing

“Saturday Night Live” is often — usually — wildly uneven. But it produced viral moments before the internet existed. Garrett Morris’ news for the hard of hearing, Murphy’s irascible Gumby, “Lazy Sunday,” the cowbell sketch, Tina Fey’s impersonation of Sarah Palin: The memories alone produce laughs. The duds, the ideas that never took off or hosts who couldn’t rise to the challenge fade away. Or maybe they’re the price of genius.

It can be easy to lose sight of how hard this actually is, said Bill Carter, veteran chronicler of television comedy and author of “The Late Shift: Letterman, Leno, and the Network Battle for the Night.” A 90-minute program is written from scratch every week, sets are constructed in a New York office building, hosts of various degrees of talent accommodated.

Ready or not, the show must go on Saturday at 11:30 p.m. The clock is unforgiving.

“It’s a different creative enterprise, every show,” Carter said. “That’s why it is good and bad, but it’s also why it’s exciting ... ‘Live,’ that is the essential feature of the show. You know when

you are watching that it is actually happening in New York City right now.”

Only so much polish is possible. Someone may flub a line, or get the giggles. Sinéad O’Connor may rip up a picture of the pope, or Ashlee Simpson’s lip-sync might fail.

“Saturday Night Live” has leaned more into its history in recent years. Alumni make frequent reappearances, and spotting unbilled cameos has become sport. The Five-Timers Club of guest hosts, while a joke, treads the line of smugness.

It may seem like a franchise with no foreseeable conclusion, and is even built for that. Michaels will have more to say about that than anyone. The backstage boss is also the longest-running on-screen character; his appearance as a straight man to then-New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani on the first show after the Sept. 11 attacks is one of “SNL’s” most poignant moments.

“Can we be funny?” Michaels asked.

Replied Giuliani: “Why start now?”

### How long will Lorne Michaels stay with the show?

Observers say Michaels has stepped back a bit, relying more on the capable team that he’s built. There’s no indication that his eye for spotting talent has diminished. Those who have seen it say that his most fearsome skill — making a series of instant decisions between the show’s dress rehearsal and performance, shortening or lengthening skits, moving and changing them to produce the broadcast viewers see — is flourishing.

The years leading up to the 50th anniversary have been filled with speculation that this will be when he steps down, talk he’s even fueled himself in the past. But he hasn’t discussed it, or even given interviews surrounding the festivities. The subject is the focus of “After Lorne,” a new piece in New York magazine, where author Reeves Wiedeman describes Michaels as a man of mystery, sometimes an intimidating force, to those around the show.

Whoever replaces him — names like Fey, Meyers and Colin Jost have been mentioned — would likely face crushing pressure. At a time when broadcast television is fading, NBC would be sorely tempted to cut costs around the program in a way they haven’t with Michaels in charge, Miller said.

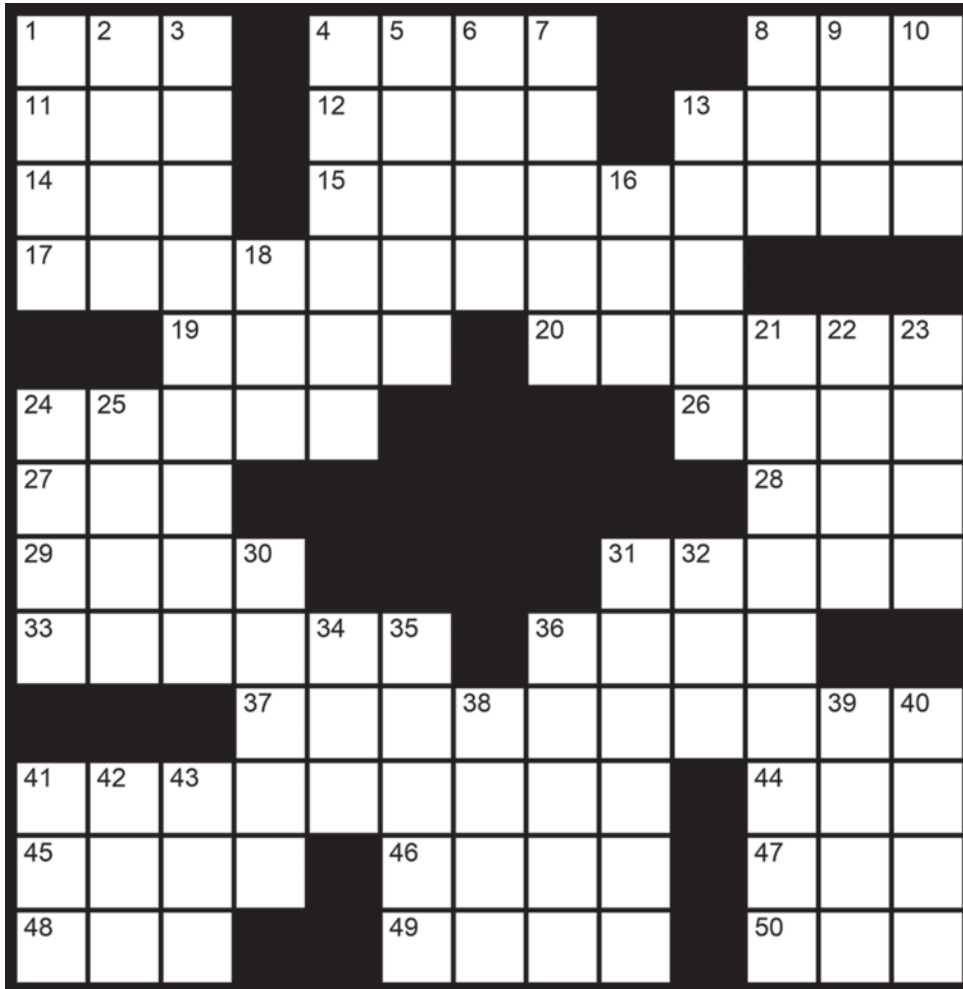

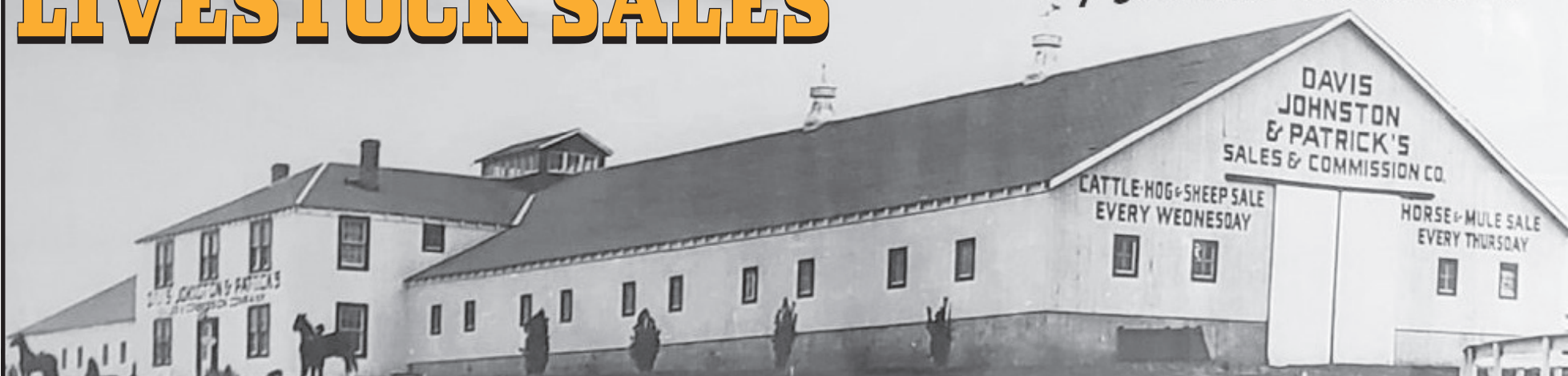
